SELECTMEN'S REPORT

We have had a complete audit of the town books. Additionally, we asked for criticisms of methods and appropriate corrections to be made. Mr. Golding has worked closely with staff and Town officers to see that our methods will meet approved standards in the future. We have also requested a review of our procedures (with an eye toward improvement) from the Department of Revenue Administration. They were to have come in January, but, because of the new annual session press, have had to postpone their visit and review. We had hoped to have a report of their recommendations for our Town Meeting, but this will, of necessity, be postponed.

Your board is constantly faced with serious problems, legal and otherwise, caused by a laxity in proper procedure and record keeping in the past. Our town has grown too fast and present day demands for accuracy are too great for the once laissez faire approach to town government. We have made progress in knowing and correcting our deficiencies. We will continue until we are assured that future boards will not be faced with the problems we have had and continue to have.

We increased the lighting at the town garage area to cope with gasoline theft from town vehicles. The road agent and crew have done an exceptional job in keeping our roads open and safe this winter and should be commended for it.

Having our own police cruiser has proved to be a vast improvement over the former method of service. The police department is to be commended for adhering to their budget and providing as much service as they do with such a small operational budget. We would like to remind you to use the official dispatch number, 543-1233, in contacting the Unity Police.

We would be derelict in our duty if we were to delay any further the renovation of our historic Town Hall. We are proposing a long term bond issue or notes for its renovation and preservation. Unity has no long term indebtedness and interest rates are quite favorable at the present time. We hope you will lend your support to this project.

The Selectmen meet every first and third Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. You are always welcome to attend our meetings and offer suggestions for the good of the Town.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT'S REPORT

The position of Administrative Assistant continues to be a very challenging and exciting experience. Accomplishments this year include the continuing update of the property assessment cards, keeping the transfers in order and recorded, looking up information for the interested public, meetings, and discovering more land that was not being taxed.

Shirley Hodge, Tax Collector, feels that this year's tax book is about as good as she has seen since she became Tax Collector. We have gone to a new tax book, smaller and more manageable. It makes keeping up the grand list easier. Liz Lord, our in-town computer service, will be consolidating the tax bills so that the final billing will reflect any and all changes.

The Selectmen are suggesting that more of the town office paper work also be put on computer. Around Town Report time things get a little hectic to say the least, and if the typewritten work that is now done by hand was computerized, we could get the Town Report done sooner, and additionally keep a more accurate record of Town affairs.

Everett Hodge, Building Inspector, has worked on revising the building codes again and really would like to see better regulations.

The highway department is to be commended for their monumental effort to keep the town roads in excellent condition this winter. The town office received many telephone calls complimenting them on their work.

The Town Landfill has improved 100% due to the exemplary work of Harold Johnson. We are all most appreciative of his dedication to his work and the town.

Priscilla Swenson continues to help me in the town office, and with all the work we have to keep up with, it is genuine pleasure to work with someone who is sincerely interested in the town. The work is never-ending, but the feeling that you are accomplishing something substantial is never-ending, too.

Board of Selectmen Town of Unity, New Hampshire

I have examined the Financial Records of the Town of Unity, New Hampshire, for the year ended December 31, 1984, and have prepared from them the Reports, Exhibits and Schedules as listed in the Table of Contents. Except as explained in the following paragraphs, my examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

A statement of General Fixed Assets, (i.e., buildings, equipment, etc.) required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the Financial Report because the Town of Unity has not maintained records as to Historical Costs of its General Fixed Assets.

To my knowledge, the Town has never taken an officially supervised physical inventory of all supplies, materials, or other valued assets to be used in day to day operations. I, therefore, have not included an asset decribed as inventories in the Report.

Except for the above-mentioned desclaimers, in my opinion, the enclosed Financial Statements present fairly the financial position of the General Fund the Town of Unity, New Hampshire, as of December 31, 1984, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

To my knowledge, the Tax Collector does not publish the list of unpaid taxes and does not reconcile the balance of taxes due to the transactions accumulated during the year. It is also my understanding that due to several changes in personnel during the year of 1984, the Grand List was not kept up to date accurately reflecting the various changes during the year. Consequently, the amount of property taxes receivable represents the Tax Collector's list of outstanding taxes which was not audited by me.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Town of Unity, N.H. records its revenues and expenditures on the cash basis during the year. Accounts receivable and accounts payable are recorded at year-end.

Investments are recorded at Cost.

Capital purchases by the Town are expensed as purchased, and, therefore, are not included as Assets on the Balance Sheet.

2. Adjustment to Accrual Basis

The Town of Unity, N.H. prepares its budgets on the cash basis. Therefore, revenues and expenditures are shown on the cash basis and then adjusted to record receivables and payables.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND OTHER NOTES

Since no Yield Tax susidiary records are kept at the Town Treasurer's Office, no figure was reflected as a liability for the statement. All funds collected were reflected as receipts. In the future, yield tax subsidiary should be created so that an accurate figure could be established as to yield tax and yield bond payable as of any point in time.

Related to this, a numbered receipt system should be implemented for accountability of cash receipts. This system would not be an end all method to assure proper receipt and deposit of cash funds, but it would be helpful.

The delinquent property taxes listed by the Tax Collector as of December 31, 1984, should be utilized as a starting point to account for list of delinquent taxes owed in future years. If it is the desire of the Selectmen, I would assist the Tax Collector in implementing this system.

The accrual method of accounting is not being used by town personnel. It appears that a hybrid method of accounting is being used. As recommended in the internal control questionnaire, the Administrative Assistant should take sufficient accounting courses to understand these methods.

REPORT OF THE UNITY FREE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

1985

Where in Unity can you get fit with aerobics, enjoy a free movie during the summer, vaccinate your dog or cat or have free access to current best sellers, magazines, classics or filmstrips? Those are a few of the offerings of your library this past year. "The Friends of the Unity Free Library" sponsored two popular six-week aerobic classes as well as a rabies clinic in March. Twenty-three free movies were shown and refreshments offered during the summer.

The 13 participants of the summer reading program, "Quiet Riot" were treated along with their parents to the wonderful storytelling of Mr. Huggy (from the Chester, Vt., Hugging Bear Inn) and his bears at an awards party.

The "Friends" and trustees worked many long hours to put together the Annual Library Harvest Festival in September which has become a popular place to find arts and crafts, used books, antique cars, an exhibition by the N.H. Tractor Club, as well as a Unity Volunteer Fire Department sponsored bingo game.

A Christmas card workshop was also offered allowing participants to create their own special cards for the holiday season.

During the year we have added many new books to our collection and have access to free interlibrary loan from any library in New Hampshire and would encourage our patrons to avail themselves of this resource.

Current list of magazines available: Time, Science '86, People, Good House-keeping, Popular Science, National Geographic, National Geographic World, Ranger Rick, Woman's Day, Family Computing, Sports Illustrated as well as the China Review (a free publication) and the Boston Herald (a daily paper also received free). Donated magazines are The Humanist, Life, and Motorcyclist.

Space in the library has also been utilized by the Girl Scouts once a week.

Presently we are waiting for a large shipment of new books as well as a new revolving paperback rack to house the many new additions to our collection. We wish to thank the "Friends" for their donations of new books, a new heater, aerobic records as well as payment for two months' telephone service (due to increase in telephone rates). Also many thanks for the many book donations received from well-wishers throughout the year.

Income tax materials again are available to help patrons needing forms or information to compile upcoming tax returns.

Facts and figures for 1985: 8 interlibrary loan requests: average daily circulation 25, with a total yearly circulation of 3600 books. Days open numbered 144. Library hours are Tuesdays and Thursdays 1:00 to 5:30 PM (Jane Orzechowski, Librarian) and Wednesday 7:00 to 9:00 (library open through volunteer effort of trustees). Trustees meet first Wednesday of each month at 7:00 in the library (public encouraged to participate). "Friends" also meet in the library at 7:00 on the third Wednesday of each month and always look for new members to help support the Unity Library.

UPPER VALLEY - LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

The Upper Valley - Lake Sunapee Council is a public, nonprofit association of towns and cities in the Upper Valley and Lake Sunapee areas. Our thirty-one (31) communities are in two states and five counties.

The Council consists of a Board of Directors and a professional staff. Each town or city annually appropriates funds for the Council's operation and sends two representatives to participate on the Board of Directors. The Board elects officers, adopts the annual work program and budget, and develops policies and positions on issues that are important to UV-LSC communities.

The Upper Valley - Lake Sunapee Council is the official organization that brings towns and cities within our region together. By bonding together and pooling their resources, local governments have a highly trained, professional staff available to them for a wide variety of services. Areas of expertise include land use planning, master planning, economic and community development, water quality management, transportation, landscape architecture, housing, capital budgeting, historic preservation, downtown revitalization, solid waste planning, recreation and fiscal and environmental impact analysis. The Council also serves as a collective voice for these towns and cities in dealings with state and federal governments, thereby protecting and furthering the needs and interests of our communities.

Council Staff members include Robert Varney, Executive Director; Vicki Smith, Senior Planner; Lisa Mausolf, Historic Preservation Specialist; Gregg Lantos; Transportation Planner; Tad Redway, Landscape Architect and Planner; Melinda Artman, Community Development Coordinator; John Olmstead, Housing Rehabilitation Specialist; Susan Elder, Economic Development Specialist; Jim Klinger, Draftsman; and Andrea Adams, Joan Austin, and Lori Brown, Secretaries. These staff members offer a wide range of expertise available to our communities.

The Council has been busy working on a variety of regional programs during the past year. The following is a brief summary of some of our regional activities:

- * provided administrative and planning services to the Upper Valley Solid Waste District, a bistate district with 15 member communities;
- * developed regional septage management plans which will become components of the solid waste plans for the Sullivan County, Upper Valley and Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Districts;
- provided continuing assistance to the regional transit operators, and worked closely with the State Highway Department to develop a comprehensive highway planning program;
- * continued the regional historic preservation program, including historic surveys, national register nominations, and historic preservation plans;
- * continued the Sullivan County Economic Development Program to retain and expand employment opportunities in Sullivan County;
- * continued work on the Lake Sunapee Management Plan;
- * co-sponsored another successful Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day, Groundwater protection seminar and Municipal Law Lecture Series;
- * provided economic, population, housing and other data to communities,

organizations, banks, real estate firms and consultants for use in fiscal studies, market analyses and grant applications.

As requested by communities, the Council prepared applications for state and federal funds, evaluated development proposals, prepared amendments to local zoning, subdivision, site plan review and other local regulations and provided mapping, drafting and other planning assistance.

The UV-LSC has also provided a number of specific services to the Town of Unity over the past year including completion of the Master Plan and preparation of new subdivision regulations. We also helped prepare an application for septage land spreading. In the last year the Council has also prepared and submitted two feasibility grant applications for the Town involving establishment of a community center in the Town Hall and an engineering study of the Sullivan County Home's water system. The latter was successful and the Town was awarded a grant of \$15,000 in October. The UV-LSC also prepared a Land and Water Conservation Fund application for a Quaker City Conservation and Recreation Area.

The Council's staff of professionals stands ready to assist your community in addressing the planning and growth management issues which you will face during the coming year. We also encourage you to become more familiar and involved with the Council, since we are essentially an arm of local government addressing your needs.

NEWPORT AREA HOME HEALTH AGENCY TOWN OF UNITY REPORT

In 1985 the Newport Area Home Health Agency excelled in the provision of Skilled Nursing, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Speech Therapy, Home Health Aide services and Maternal and Child Health services. 1985 also saw growth in the Agency's ability to serve the region. The Town of Washington requested care for its citizens and has become part of Newport Area Home Health Agency's service area. A 24 hour call system was instituted making nurses available to patients evenings and weekends if necessary. Staff was trained and In-Home IV Therapy began being provided for appropriate patients. Home Health Agency staff went to Newport Hospital 3 to 5 times each week to participate in Discharge Planning and collaborate with their hospital colleagues to promote continuity of care from home to hospital and from hospital back home. Staff also visited patients in the Green House at Newport Hospital and other area hospitals whenever patient care required.

The Newport Area Home Health Agency also continued its concern for the welfare of area children through its Well Child and Dental Clinic Programs, participation in WIC, administration of the Child Safety Car Seat Program, and the Child Abuse and Neglect Program funded through the United Way. Janet Bornstein RN was promoted to MCH Coordinator.

The Agency overcame many staff changes in 1985. Janett Merritt, valued MCH Coordinator, died tragically in May and is sorely missed. Staff nurses Catherine Baffa, Donna Charlebois, and Shirlee Murgatroy left the Agency and Edward W. Hamblin, Administrator, retired. Despite extraordinary change the Agency is now fully staffed with 6 registered nurses, 2 home health aides, contracts for therapists, and three administrative staff. We are prepared to continue expanding the quantity and quality of care to patients in our service area.

I wish to thank the staff, Board of Trustees, and Clinic Volunteers who make the provision of excellent patient care a reality.

UNITY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

ANNUAL REPORT

Since my last message to you as principal many positive and exciting things have happened at our school. We have successfully completed one year and have begun another.

In looking back over that year, we are reminded of some of the special activities that have occurred that add life and realism to many units of study. In April, we had the Montshire Museum do a special all day program called "Science Circus". During this day of science discovery, students were exposed to biology, photography and light, bubbles and nature. Needless to say, the bubble machines were the hit of the day. May brought about a "first": a three day tour of Quebec City in Canada for our eighth graders. Students were not only exposed to a metropolitan area but a new country, culture and language. This trip was a first that will be worth repeating.

In June, the annual all-school-field-trip took us to Squam Lakes Science Center. Students were given special talks on reptiles, mammals, and aquatic life. June also saw Unity's largest graduating class, thirty-one students went on to the local high schools.

August saw several new faces reporting for school along with the friendly familiar ones. Our staff this year includes Lisa Meyer, first grade, Susan Farland, grades 2 & 3, Kelly Woods, grades 3 & 4, Jane Elliott, Michelle Broad, Eric Peirce and myself teaching grades 5 - 8. Gary Pool is in the Special Education classroom and Pat Jacobs continues with the Chapter I reading program. September also brought about a totally new aspect of student education. For the first time, Unity has a specialist in music which has been a tremendous asset to our curriculum. Geraldine Rudenfeldt guides this program. We opened our doors this year with 126 students. This slightly lower number is a result of graduating a very large class and receiving a significantly smaller first grade group.

October brought the excitement of new things to study after the review units of September. November brought the onset of snow and winter and deepened the aspect of concentrated study and work for all students. December gave us Santa, Christmas and our concert for the holidays. This concert demonstrated to all those attending what musical talents our children possess and what they are capable of doing after only three short months of practice.

January and the new year again intensified study as the mid term season came and went. To relieve some pressure, Pantomimist Michael Zerphy was sponsored for a two day workshop and evening performance.

February brings love - in the form of the "I Love To Read and Write Week" where students will read as many books as they can. For every book read they will be allowed to release a helium filled balloon. Hundreds of balloons are expected to be released with cards requesting a return indicating where they were found.

In the future we are looking to continued improvement of academic skills and to continue with the special activities that help to make learning fun. With your children's special needs in mind, we will persist in striving for improvement in learning and organizational skills and social activities.

The staff and I wish to thank all those community members who have volunteered hundreds of hours to help improve our school. A special thanks goes to the PTC for supporting us with people, activities and financially. Without these volunteers the learning of the children would be less exciting and more difficult. Thank you!

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the School Board Unity School District Unity, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements and account group financial statements of the Unity School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1985 as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Unity School District at June 30, 1985 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The supplemental schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Unity School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion, is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING UNITY, NH -- March 6, 1985

Minutes of the Annual School District Meeting held on the 6th of March, 1985, at the Unity Volunteer Fire Station. At 5:00 PM the polls were duly opened for acting upon Article I of the Warrant: "To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Auditor for ensuing year, and one member of the School Board for a term of three years". The Warrant was read in it's entirety, a total of six Articles, and the Assistant Moderator stated that the polls would be open until 8:00 PM at which time the remaining Articles would be acted upon.

ARTICLE 2. "To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto". Accepted as read.

ARTICLE 3. Ms. Mary Ellen Bellimer moved that "District raise and appropriate the sum of \$510,747 for the support of schools, for salaries of the District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State equalization and building funds, together with other income, the School Board to certify the appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town". Mr Donald Morse seconded. Open for discussion. A motion to amend was made by Mr. Wilbur Cox, Jr., that "the school budget be voted on line-by-line". Laura Davis seconded. Discussion on the legalities of such an amendment, with various judges' decisions cited and quoted. The motion was defeated by a show of hands vote of forty (40) yes, forty-two (42) no votes. School Board Chairman Donald Morse then explained the budget as proposed by the School Board. Mr. Morse opened by pointing out that 75% of the increases in the budget were for costs over which the District has no immediate control, Special Education and high school tuition being the two most prominent cases in point; the other 25% being partly to cover the cost of inflation and partly for an increase in salaries for teachers and aides. He stated that the teachers and the School Board had been in negotiation and had recently settled. Mr. David Osgood amended that the "budget figure be increased by \$5,000 to hire a special professional to teach music or art in the school once a week". Ms. Gata Hudson seconded. There followed discussion. At approximately 9:00 PM there was a call from the floor for a vote. Mr. Morse moved that the vote on the amendment be postponed until all discussion was over. Mr. Fred Bellimer seconded. Passed by general consent. Discussion of salaries and tax-rate now took place. Mr. Morse continued explanation of the budget, throughout which time there was general discussion. At 9:50 PM there was request from the District for clarification of the motion now in progress. The Moderator stated motion now in progress was to vote on an amended figure in Article 3 of \$515,747 to reflect a \$5,000 increase to be spent on a music or art teacher. Mr. Warren Allen amended the amendment to a figure of \$520,747 to reflect another \$5,000 increase to be used for raising teachers' salaries. Mr. Rodney Minkler seconded. Mr. John Callum moved "that we vote our own conscience and use a ballot vote". Mr. Cox seconded. So moved by general consent. Results of the ballot vote: forty-five (45) yes, thirty-seven (37) no votes. Motion passed. There followed a vote on the Article 3 as amended, with a figure of \$520,747. Results of the ballot vote: forty-seven (47) YES, thirty-three (33) NO votes. ARTICLE PASSED AS AMENDED.

ARTICLE 4. "To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire". Ms. Susan Lawrence so moved. Duly seconded. ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 5. Mr. Theodore Niboli moved that "the District authorize the School Board to accept and expend, on behalf of the District, any and all gifts or other funds received from miscellaneous sources as the Board shall determine to be advisable". Susan Lawrence seconded. ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 6. "To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting". There being none, at 10:45 PM the Moderator found motion to adjourn, duly seconded MEETING ADJOURNED.

After tabulation of the balloting on Article I, the Moderator read the results of the District's vote. There were one hundred and one (101) ballots cast. For School Board: ninety-nine (99) votes were cast for two candidates; Donald Morse was re-elected with sixty-one (61) votes, Susan Ryan receiving thirty-eight votes. For Moderator, Brian Whipple was the declared winner with thirty (30) votes out of fifty-six (56) write-in votes cast for ten (10) different people. For Treasurer, Phyllis Hamel was elected with eighty-two (82); there were 2 (2) write-ins. For Auditor twenty-two (22) write-in votes were cast for nine (9) different people. Michael Johnson was the declared winner with twelve (12) votes. For Clerk, forty-one (41) write-in votes were cast for seven (7) different people with Gata Hudson the declared winner with twenty-six votes.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator at 7:15 PM.

Warrant read by the Moderator: Special School District Meeting --

ARTICLE I: To see of the District will vote to apply for, accept and appropriate during the current 1985-86 school year, the sum of \$51,500 which the School District anticipates receiving in State Foundation Aid (Augenblick Funds); said monies to be in addition to, and not revenue against, monies raised at the March 1985 Annual School District Meeting and said monies to be expended for the following purposes:

Given under our hands and seals at said Unity, this 27th day of September 1985; Donald W. Morse and Mary Ellen Bellimer.

Ten minutes was allowed for discussion. School Board Chairman Donald Morse was then recognized who moved that the District vote to apply for, accept and appropriate during the current 1985-86 school year the sum of \$51,500 which the School District anticipates receiving in State Foundation Aid (Augenblick Plan Funds), said monies to be in addition to and not revenues against monies raised and appropriated at the March 1985 Annual School District Meeting; and said monies to be expended for the following purposes: Secondary Tuition \$20,000; Special Education \$25,000; Part-Time Teacher \$6,500; Seconded by Mrs. Bellimer.

Mrs. Bellimer presented the following amendment - that the District vote to apply for, accept and appropriate during the current 1985-86 school year, the sum of \$89,179 which the School District anticipates receiving in State Foundation Aid (Augenblick Plan Funds); said monies to be in addition to, and not revenue against monies raised at the March 1985 Annual School District Meeting and said monies to be expended for the following purposes: Secondary Tuition \$20,000; Special Education & Legal \$62,679; Part-Time Teacher \$6,500; second by Mr. Donald Morse.

There followed a lengthy discussion.

There was a motion from the floor made by Edward Gregory to amend the amendment to disinclude from the budget \$6,500 for a part-time teacher, second by Carol Gregory. There was a show of hands vote for this motion; 42 'yes'; 11 'no'.

There was more discussion as to all the various special needs in the school. The Moderator set a ten minute time limit on comments.

There was a question as to what was the amendment on the floor. The amendment was to be voted on to remove from the budget and appropriations \$6,500 for a part-time teacher.

By show of hands vote ballot clerks counted 50 'yes'; 35 'no'; to remove \$6,500 from the budget and appropriations.

At 8:45 PM Mr. Morse was recognized and called for a ballot vote, this was seconded by Mrs. Bellimer. The vote by ballot for the Article as amended: That the District vote to apply for, accept and appropriate during the current 1985-86 school year, eighty-two thousand six-hundred and seventy-nine dollars (\$82,679) which the School District anticipates receiving in State Foundation Aid (Augenblick Plan Funds) said monies to be in addition to, and not revenue against, monies raised at the March 1985 Annual School District Meeting; and said monies to be expended for the following purposes: Secondary Tuition \$20,000; Special Education & Legal \$62,679 with the remaining available funds to be returned to the General Fund of the Town.

The vote by ballot was 72 'yes'; 5 'no'. The Moderator approved and so declared. The Polls were declared closed at 9:10 PM.

SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

To the Citizens of Unity:

During the year 1984-85 all children were checked for pediculosis and scabies several times. The incidence of these diseases was very low.

All the students were measured for height and weight and these results were recorded on their permanent health records.

The children were all screened for vision and hearing. One hundred and forty-seven children were given the vision test with ten being referred for further evaluation by a doctor. Of the one hundred and forty-eight children screened for hearing only one was referred for further evaluation.

Of the sixteen children entering first grade, all but two had complete physicals and immunization records up to date prior to entering school.

Several weeks were spent checking every health record for up-to-date physicals and immunizations. Several letters were sent home requesting this be taken care of by the parents.

Seventy-eight children in grades 1-6 have had their teeth checked by the State Dental Hygienists. They dry brush their teeth every day after lunch and rinse once a week with fluoride.

A film on dental care was shown in January and all the children's teeth were rechecked in May. There was a remarkable improvement in their dental care.

I was asked, by teachers, to offer guidance and instruction in the areas of personal health and hygiene to several students.

I have truly enjoyed this past year in Unity.
