

# TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State of New Hampshire; qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring forth your ballots for the necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and the ensuing three years.

Polls are to open at 10 A.M. and are not to close before 6 P.M. At 8 P.M. action will be taken on the following articles in the warrant:

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, up to the sum of \$50,000.00 if needed, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for interest thereon.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the operation and maintenance of the Bedford Public Library.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the installation of running water and a Rest Room in the Library.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to Gravel Class V Highways within the Town.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for Civil Defense.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,241.97 for Construction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$8,279.78.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for the tarring of Class V Highways under the direction of the Selectmen.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for spraying Elm Trees within the limits of the Highways. *Note:* (Not recommended by Budget Committee).
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for damages and legal expense including dog damages.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to purchase advertising space in the 1960 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the Care of the New Cemetery; \$25.00 for pumping water for the same; \$100.00 for care of Joppa Cemetery; \$50.00 for care of the Old Cemetery on Back River Road and \$25.00 for the care of the Beals Cemetery.

- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for maintenance of power equipment used in Town Cemeteries.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Grader.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Tractor Loader.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Planning Board.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to make the office of Chief of Police a full time job. *Note:* (By Petition).
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 to operate and maintain the police department, including the purchase and maintenance of a Cruiser. (By Petition) *Note:* (Budget Committee Recommended \$2,500.00).
- Rrticle 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the installation of one (1) Dry Hydrant at Sebbins Pond. Said Hydrant to be installed 8 feet from road and 100 feet from Pond, between properties of Desire Turcotte and Elphege Duval. (By Petition).
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of developing the Driscoll Land under the direction of the Park and Recreation Commission.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to cover the cost of rental of two (2) Hydrants, located one on Ruth Street and one on Park Drive.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$116.64 to cover the maintenance of three (3) Street Lights, two on Ruth Street; one in the vicinity of Ruth and Wayside Drive, and one within lighting distance of dead end Street, preferably near Fire Hydrant, also one on Ministerial Road in the vicinity of the Stevens and Davidson Property. (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to do the necessary grading to make available lots in the New Cemetery in the Center.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept Brook Drive, a distance of 410 feet by 40 feet, West of South River Road.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept Ruth Street for a distance of 480 Feet by 30 Feet East of Wayside Drive.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Ministerial Branch, a distance of 1200 Feet by 50 Feet in a Northeasterly direction from the intersection of Ministerial Circle.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept Oak Drive, in a Northerly direction on an additional 200 Feet by 50 Feet from its present accepted length for a total length of 1390 feet.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept Glenn Road for a distance of 1484 Feet by 50 Feet Wide, running East and West on the Oak Drive Development plan of the Henry Zankowski Construction Company.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept Dery Street an additional 100 Feet by 40 Feet wide, extending to the Bedford-Manchester Town Line.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore, chosen and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you — personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

- 1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it. Save yourself much possible difficulty — Use your town dump.

The librarians and trustees have attended district library meetings in Goffstown, Hooksett and Manchester. Our library was host to the group at one meeting. Children's Book Week was observed in November at which time I visited the Stevens-Buswell School and told a story to the entire group, a Brownie troop and a second-grade class visited the library, the library sponsored a "Book Jacket Contest" in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades. Doris Rice, David Worrell and Madeline Chisholm received awards for their prize winning jackets. Over forty children participated in this activity.

We are planning an Open-House during National Library Week in April so that everyone may visit our newly decorated building.

During July, it was my great privilege and experience to attend the library school at U.N.H.

We are now beginning to catalog the entire collection. This will be a long, painstaking task, but we feel it will certainly prove its worth in years to come.

We wish to thank the many interested friends from whom we have received gifts of books, magazines and money. Our special thanks goes to the Bedford Garden Club for their gift of two magazines subscriptions and a beautiful four volume set of "Illustrated Library of the Natural Sciences"; to the Bedford Women's Club for their gift of money for the purchase of fine arts books; and to the Bedford Mother's Club for their gift of nine children's books.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Board of Trustees of the Bedford Public Library has devoted considerable extra time during the past year, with unstituted assistance from both librarians, in an effort to make the best possible use of the \$1000 appropriation for the painting and renovation of the library. The outside of the building has had one coat of paint. The sign has been repaired and re-painted, and the entrance light repaired. All the first-floor rooms received two coats of paint. The bookshelves in the northwest room were made adjustable, and new lights provided. A reading desk and linoleum floor-covering for the children's room are in place. New shades and draperies are at all the windows. A telephone has been installed for the convenience of borrowers in renewing books. We hope every Bedford resident will visit the library and see what has been done during 1958.

Book and magazine circulation continues to increase rapidly. To serve patrons more promptly, since November, the library has been open on Tuesday evenings from 7-9, as well as on Friday from 2-5 and 7-9 p.m. Begun experimentally, the trustees hope a larger appropriation in 1959 will enable them to maintain the Tuesday evening period, and extend it for that afternoon also.

In July, the librarian, Mrs. Ralph Wiggin, Jr., attended a three-week library training course at the University, as a recipient of a State Federation of Women's Clubs scholarship.

In August, the trustees applied to the State Library Commission for a State Aid grant, based on the library's service and aims. On September 30, word was received from the Commission of an initial grant of \$200, which will be used toward permanently cataloging the books (a tremendous task, as they have never been fully cataloged).

During 1958, several organizations and a number of individuals have given significant gifts of money, time, books, and magazines. These are deeply appreciated.

Public relations have been furthered by regular notices in the newspapers of new books purchased and on loan from the state, as well as other items of public interest.

The State Library Extension Service has been of invaluable help in the loan of hundreds of current books, as well as in the many visits of the area director, Mrs. Richard Sanborn. As a result of these visits, out-of-date books have been culled from the shelves, and those remaining are now ready for permanent cataloging.

Rapidly increasing use of the library, the higher cost of maintenance and operation, as well as of books, influenced the trustees to ask for an increased appropriation in 1959. We hope, too, to be able to pipe water into the building, thus providing toilet facilities.

The library belongs to the taxpayers; as your elected trustees, we assure each one we make every effort to stretch your appropriation that the library may be an increasingly valuable asset in the community.

### CIVIL DEFENSE

There were four 2½ hour courses in Radiological Defense held at the Little Green House from May 1 to May 14, 1958. These courses were under the supervision of the State Defense Agency and instructed by Clarence Bumford of Concord. Twenty-two men and women received certificates for completing this course. John Smith, Bedford's Radiological officer, received 5 Geiger counters and 4 dosimeters which were distributed to assigned teams. The town now has two complete Radiological teams.

On May 6, 1958 there was a National Alert. Fifty children in kindergarden and nursery school were dispatched by bus to Amherst. The school was the only one in this area to actually send it's children elsewhere. The test was declared a success.

Tentative plans are being made for other training programs for the spring of '59. The cooperation of the people of Bedford, by participating in these programs, will be appreciated.

We sincerely hope that our budget of \$350. will be approved. Due to the fact that certain equipment ordered early in 1958 still has not arrived, it will be necessary to pay for these out of our 1959 budget.

# THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION OF MANCHESTER, N. H.

# Annual Report of 1958

The Services of the Visiting Nurse Association are available for all of the residents of Manchester and Bedford regardless of race, creed, or ability to pay.

The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care and treatment according to the directions of the patients physician. She gives the supervision and therapy that are needed for the rehabilitation of the patient. The Visiting Nurse is close to patients and families at periods in their lives which are times of crisis and she is a supporting and understanding resource who is equipped with special knowledge and skills to assist them.

Instruction in maternal and infant care during pregnancy and after the baby comes is another important service.

The Visiting Nurse is also a health teacher who gives family health guidance. Instruction in the principles of healtful living and the prevention of illness are integrated throughout all of these services.

156 families in Bedford are currently being seen by the nurse.

### Vocational Guidance

Beginning in September, 1958, an instructor from the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation of the New Hampshire State Department of Education has provided a vocational guidance and counseling program for the residents of Manchester. This service is con-

ducted at the Visiting Nurse Association and held on the first three Tuesdays of each month.

We wish to express our appreciation to all who cooperated with our Association during the year, to the physicians, hospitals, health and welfare agencies and to our many other friends in the community.

We also wish to thank the Cogswell Benevolent Trust for their generous gift toward the purchase of needed equipment and to all who have supported our work by volunteering their services and by their donations to the Community Chest.

# REPORT OF THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

At the Town Meeting in March, 1957, the Town voted to accept from James and Marguerite Driscoll the gift of a plot of land located south of North Amherst Road to be used for recreational purposes. At the same meeting the Selectmen were authorized to appoint a Commission to develop this land; we, the undersigned are the members of this Commission.

Since the Town did not receive the deed to this land until early in the Summer of 1958, it is only recently that we have been able to go ahead with any plans for its development.

The plot of land contains approximately 14 acres. There are virtually no trees of any size on the land. There is some small hardwood in the central portion and a fairly good growth of small white pine in the southwest corner of the area. The north and central portions of the land are mostly low and swampy.

In discussing possible uses of the land, everyone seems to agree that a swimming pool is one thing that the Town could use. There is some doubt that there is enough water available to supply a pool that would be acceptable to the State Board of Health. We are undertaking a study, in cooperation with the County Soil Conservation Agent, to determine whether there is sufficient water available for such a project.

However, there is no doubt that there is enough water to provide an area for ice skating. This opinion is confirmed by several of the older residents of the Town. We have received an offer from a resident of Bedford to donate a large portion of the work necessary to develop a skating pond covering approximately two acres in the section bordering the highway. Boy Scout Troop 114 of Bedford has already started clearing this area of underbrush so that a bull-dozer would be able to dig out the pond next Fall when the ground is dryer. When this pond is developed, provisions will be made so that it will be possible to use the water from the pond in the event of a fire. There is no water hole in this section of town.

If further studies show that there is enough water available, this pond can be developed into a swimming area at a later date. In the meantime, it is hoped that it might be developed into a wild bird refuge during the Summer months.

Several groups, including Boy and Girl Scouts and the Garden Club, have expressed an interest in developing portions of this land into picnic, camping and conservation areas. These projects will be started as soon as conditions permit.

the School Board to determine all matters in relation to said notes or bonds, including but not limited to, the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, all in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, as amended.

# REPORT OF THE BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

To the Residents of Bedford:

It has been my privilege to serve as Chairman of your School Board for the past year. During this year, I have been fortunate to have had the assistance and cooperation of all School District personnel. An example of this cooperation is quite specific. I would like to quote from an inspection letter recently received from the State Fire Marshall's Office: "the housekeeping conditions in all four schools is excellent. Good housekeeping goes a long way towards fire prevention." Assurances like this that our custorians and cooks are performing their duties well, makes ours much easier.

I would like to review briefly some of the physical improvements and additions which have been made to our school facilities.

First of all, Mr. Russell Keeler purchased 3 new 60 passenger busses. This helps insure safer and more comfortable transportation for our children. This purchase necessitated, because of their length, the construction of a new "turnaround" driveway at the Stevens-Buswell School. This driveway eliminated the hazards associated with putting these vehicles in reverse gear. In addition, at the Stevens-Buswell School, the basement classroom, the bathroom floors, and the kitchen anteroom were painted. New toilet facilities were installed and additional recreation equipment was purchased.

The Peter Woodbury School was painted on the exterior, gutters were replaced, the driveway was repaired, a thermostat was installed in the basement, water pipes were replaced, and new playground equipment was installed.

The Donald St. School received new boys' room facilities, an additional new fire extinguisher, new flags for caution signs, playground equipment, and fresh paint in the lunchroom.

The Memorial School had two classrooms and kitchen painted, tile placed around all classroom washing facilities, new athletic equipment added, and a new thermostat placed in the All Purpose Room.

In connection with the previously mentioned playground equipment, at all schools, I would like to thank the P.T.A. for the large part they had in making these facilities available.

The past year marked a milestone regarding local school administration. Due to increases in enrollment and heavy administrative duties, Mr. Donald Fournier became our first supervising principal. Mr. Fournier's authority extended over the Memorial and Donald St. schools. It is felt that this transition is working very well, and that we in Bedford are receiving dividends in the form of additional academic programs for our children, more direct supervision for some of the less experienced teachers, and improved school administration.

The School Board was required to replace one of its members during 1958. Mr. Malcolm Bunker submitted his resignation and was replaced by Mrs. Dora Bostwick. I regret that Mr. Bunker was unable to complete his term of office, but I am sure that Mrs. Bostwick is very capable, conscientious, and will make an excellent board member.

There is one final statement that I would like to make. Studies and estimates indicate that our present classroom space is not adequate, even though present basement facilities are being utilized. Therefore, it is recommended by your Bedford School Board that additional classroom space be provided by September, 1959. Specificially, this space should be in the form of at least a four room addition to the Memorial School. It is sincerely hoped that this recommendation will receive your approval at the March, 1959 Bedford School District meeting.

The findings of the Secondary School Study Committee have been printed separately and copies are available from any member of the School Board. Copies will also be available at the Annual School District Meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford:

It is with pleasure that I submit my fourth Annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Time marches on and with it the school population of Bedford continues its seemingly inexorable pace. Your School Study Committee's report is incorporated as part of the complete School District Report so suffice it for me to say that never have I seen a group work any harder or more harmoniously in striving to find a reasonable solution to Bedford's educational problems. It has been a real pleasure working with them. Certain aspects of your School Board's Budget reflects the findings of the above proposals as recommended by your Board and Superintendent.

Bedford has every reason to be proud of its schools and I'm happy to see this pride reflected in the interest and support given them and their teachers by you the parents and citizens.

The appointment of Donald Fournier as Supervising Principal of the Bedford Memorial and Donald Street schools has proven to be educationally sound. Added time for administration of the schools programs and supervision of their teachers has aided materially in the development of the whole program. Miss McLain and Mrs. Marcy, Principals of Peter Woodbury and Stevens-Buswell schools have been doing their usual fine work in administering their respective schools and at the same time maintain high teaching standards. Your teachers are sincerely interested in your children and have given freely of their time and effort in providing them with the best possible educational experience.

A study of the following list will indicate that four new teachers were elected for Bedfords schools this year. I'm happy to say that once again we were fortunate in finding well qualified replacement.s It is a credit to you as citizens that Bedford is a desirable town in which to teach. Such a reputation has enabled me to be somewhat more selective than is ordinarily true in these times of acute teacher shortage.

#### NEW TEACHERS

#### Bedford Memorial School

Mrs. Beatrice Costanzo, B.S. - U.N.H. 1953 to replace Mrs. Anita Sparks, who resigned to accept a teaching position at the New Hampshire Industrial School. Mrs. Costanzo is teaching Grade 6.

Mr. Maynard Montois, B.Ed. - Plymouth Teachers College '58, to replace Allan Clark in Grade 6. Mr. Clark advanced to grades 7 and 8. Miss Demers replaced Donald Fournier who became Supervising Principal of the Bedford Memorial and Donald Street schools.

Mrs. Pauline Goodhue to replace Mrs. Violet Wilk, grade 3, who resigned to go to Connecticut with her husband. Mrs. Goodhue comes to us with many years of experience, most recent of which was in the elementary grades of Newbury, N. H.

#### INSTRUCTION

The growth of the instructional program under the direction of Mr. Paul L. O'Neil, Helping Teacher has been most gratifying. The response to in-service programs for the teachers has been excellent and is a good indication of the rapport between Helping Teacher and teachers. As his report on the instructional program follows I shall only say that every indication is for a continually improving and growing program.

#### SCHOOL LUNCH

The School Lunch program is maintaining its usual excellence under the direction of Mrs. Gladys Smend. A set of rules formulated by the School Board and posted in each kitchen is a healthy sign that the Board is aware of its responsibilities to the school children.

With food costs rising and Surplus Foods diminishing it has become increasingly difficult for the School Lunch programs to be self sustaining. With this in mind and to insure the continued quality of our lunches we are asking for \$1,000.00 in School District funds for the year 1959-60. This money could be used to supplement helpers salaries thus freeing a like amount for the purchase of the necessary foods to meet requirements. I might add that unless we meet specific nutritional requirements in our programs we lose eligibility for Surplus Foods under the State Program.

#### MAINTENANCE

I would like to take this opportunity to commend the custodians of all Bedford Schools on the condition of their schools this Fall. I have never seen our schools look so well.

The policy of your School Board in taking care of minor maintenance problems before they become big ones is paying dividends. Conscientious custodial services have made this program that much easier.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to all school personnel and to the School Board for their cooperation in working for the educational advantages in Bedford schools. It has made my work in Bedford a continued pleasure.

Your school committee, superintendent and Helping Teacher are proud indeed of the caliber of the teachers instructing the school children of Bedford. I know that the parents feel proud of their performance too for I have had many opportunities to meet and talk with them.

I thrive on parental interest in school affairs. It certainly is a healthy sign to see a teacher and a parent discussing school matters. Parents of Bedford come in for much favorable comment in this respect.

My report to the school committee recently, included the performance of the Bedford school children on the annual achievement testing program. It is interesting to note that these tests cover intensively the areas of reading, spelling, arithmetic, vocabulary, and language. Equally as interesting is the fact that when compared nationally on the results of these tests the Bedford youngsters are up considerably above average.

This speaks well of your school program and reflects the confidence and trust you have given your school administrators.

Compared to the other four towns in our supervisory union, Bedford can boast of the last number of retentions at the close of the school year 1958.

Our philosophy of retaining a child in a given grade is quite uniform and unless a teacher can foresee success in the next higher grade in the major areas, a conference is arranged with the teacher, parent, principal, and helping teacher to determine the child's future status and placement. Remember we are anxious to do what is best for your child during all phases of his school life. Your cooperation and understanding in the past has been most helpful.

Please feel free to visit Bedford classrooms at any time. It is through such visitations and teacher consultations that the "goingson" in your schools come into sharper focus and take on added meaning.

# **Art Supervisor**

The Art Program in the Bedford schools is becoming more and more dependent upon the individual grade teacher for its success. # Peter Woodbury School

Interest is still very high in the Science program as outlined by Allyn and Bacon's EXPLORING SCIENCE. The pupils find this program most interesting.

Music, Art, and Penmanship are all carried on under the direction and supervision of our supervisors, Miss Grace, Mrs. Osgood, and Mr. Matava respectively.

A new project in band work has been actively carried on during the past year, and is proving to be a growing interest course, under the very able direction and instruction of Mr. Philip Bograd.

As Principal of the Peter Woodbury School, I again wish to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to my teachers, supervisors, Mr. O'Neil, and Mrs. Ramsay, for their untiring cooperation, assistance, and interest during the year.

Dear Mr. Ramsay:

I am pleased to report on the progress of our handwriting program in your schools. Our major objectives are:

1. To have each pupil achieve or surpass the norm for his grade in speed and quality in formal handwriting.

- 2. To make good handwriting function in all related informal handwriting activities such as spelling, arithmetic, English composition, etc.
- 3. To develop concomitant virtues such as neatness, accuracy, attention to details and an understanding and appreciation of what is inherent in good handwriting.
- 4. To achieve these objectives with a minimum expenditure in time, effort, and materials.
- 5. To develop a writing consciousness on the part of teachers as well as children; to provide the necessary instructional and motivational materials and inform the teachers of the methods and techniques to be used in order to make the handwriting scores made by your students indicate the measure of success that has been attained.

During the school year ending June, 1958, we graded 2,655 formal test papers for your students. In the final period we found 81.4% excellent, 11.9% good, and 6.7% fair. This excellent record testifies to the interest and cooperation of your teachers.

During the course of the year, we graded approximately 7,965 informal papers for your students. Our purpose in grading these informal papers was to motivate good handwriting in related handwriting activities. In addition to our consultant services we furnished the pupils and teachers with the following handwriting materials: teacher outlines and folders, pupil folders, motivation graphs, individual certificates to pupils who qualified, diagnostic charts, handedness tests, envelopes, seals, etc.

In conclusion, I wish to thank you and the teachers and pupils for the splendid cooperation we have received at all times and for the excellent results that have been forthcoming.

#### HOT LUNCH PROGRAM

The following is my report of the Hot Lunch program for the school year 1957-58:

At the Peter Woodbury School, Mrs. Lola Currant served 10,035 hot lunches. Of these 390 were free or reduced.

At the Stevens-Buswell School, Mrs. Ralph Miltemore served 10,163 hot lunches. Of these 417 were free or reduced.

At the Donald Street School, Mrs. Richard Ramig served 4,375 hot lunches.

At the Bedford Memorial School, Mrs. Freida Chickering served 20,088 hot lunches. Of these 618 were free or reduced.

On January 1, 1958 all 4 schools were combined into one hot lunch program. This program is now under the single heading of Bedford Memorial -3. Under this plan each school follows the same weekly menus, conforming to State requirements.

Our receipts for the school year 1957 for Bedford Memorial -3 were \$14,391.89. Included in this total is our government reimbursement of \$3,039.85. Our expenditures totaled \$15,464.44.
