

### Town Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Brookfield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Brookfield on Tuesday the ninth of March, next, at seven of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

Polls will be open from 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

- 1. To chose all necessary Town Officers for the coming year. (By Ballot)
- To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the 1999 Taxes. (Majority Vote Required)
- 3. Polling hours in the Town of Brookfield are now 8:00am to 7:00pm. Shall we place a question on the state election ballot to change polling hours so the polls shall open at 11:00am and close at 7:00pm for all regular state elections beginning the year 2002. (Majority Vote Required)
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by Town meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95b. (Majority Vote Required)
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept a gift of real estate to the town, being an undivided part interest in a parcel of land of 5.14 acres, more or less, situated in Brookfield on the easterly side of Route 109, said parcel being shown as OPEN SPACE on the subdivision plan of Woodland Acres recorded in the Carroll County Registry of Deeds at Book 123, Page 68. (Majority Vote Required)
- 6. BY PETITION: "Be it resolved that the citizens of Brookfield hereby call upon the governments of all nuclear weapons states to secure by the year 2000 a Nuclear Weapons Abolition Treaty which sets an enforceable timetable for the elimination of nuclear weapons; and be it further resolved that the Town Clerk shall forward copies of this resolution to the President, members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation and our local state legislators." (Majority Vote Required)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand

- dollars (\$3000) for the Expendable General Fund known as the Town Buildings Maintenance Fund. (Majority Vote Required)
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1500) for Tri-County Community Actions Wakefield Seniors Meals. (Majority Vote Required) (Not Recommended By Selectmen)
- To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town gifts, legacies and devices made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19. This authority shall extend until rescinded. (Majority Vote Required)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than cash, to the Town for any public purposes. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-e shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the Town meeting. (Majority Vote Required)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Town of Wakefield to provide Brookfield with police, fire and ambulance services, subject to termination by vote of the town meeting of either town. Said agreement requires the approval of both town meetings before it becomes effective. (Majority Vote Required)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Town of Wakefield to provide Brookfield with access to the Wakefield Sanitary Landfill for a period of five (5) years, subject to earlier termination by vote of the town meeting of either town, in accord with the Agreement between the towns. Said agreement requires the approval of both town meetings before it becomes effective. (Majority Vote Required)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$160,000) for the construction and original equipping of new town offices; furthermore, to change the purpose of the existing Town Meeting Building Capital Reserve Fund to the Town Office Construction and Equipping Capital Reserve Fund and to authorize the withdrawal of an amount not to exceed eighty seven thousand dollars (\$87,000) which sum includes accumulated interest and to discontinue said fund; additionally, to also change the purpose of the existing Future Land Acquisition Capital Reserve Fund to the Town Office Construction and Equipping Capital Reserve Fund and to authorize the withdrawal of an amount not to exceed ten thousand five hundred dollars (\$10,500) which sum includes accumulated interest and to discontinue said fund, with the balance to be allocated from surplus. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the building is completed or by December 31, 2000, whichever is sooner. (2/3 vote required).

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable general fund trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Mutual Aid Fund for the purpose of paying unanticipated expenses incurred where mutual aid is required and to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2500) toward this purpose and to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) for the Records Preservation fund for the purpose of preserving town records and furthermore to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend. (Majority Vote Required)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the Town Meeting Building Capital Reserve Fund to the Town Office Construction and Equipping Capital Reserve Fund and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to be added to that changed fund. (2/3 vote required) (not required if #13 approved)
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand one hundred dollars (\$4100) to purchase a new Spreader and authorize the withdrawal of four thousand one hundred dollars (\$4100) from the Town Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required)
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand nine hundred ninety-seven dollars (\$20,997) for the completion, production and printing of the Town History and authorize the withdrawal from the Town History Fund (Expendable Trust) established for this purpose at the 1994 Annual Meeting. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required)
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the Expendable General Fund known as the Scholastic Recognition Award Fund. (Majority Vote Required)
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$13,500) to be added to the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund previously established. This sum to come from fund balance (surplus) and no amount to be raised from taxation. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required)
- 21. BY PETITION: "For the Town to assume all maintenance and to accept Pinewoods Dr. as a town road." (Majority Vote Required) (Not recommended by the Selectmen)

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred eight thousand three hundred one dollars (\$308,301) which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special or individual articles addressed. (Majority Vote Required)

#### **Animal Control**

Brookfield has had another reasonably quiet year. There have been a total of 117 dogs licensed, an increase of 4 from 1997. All licensed dogs had rabies shots. There were no animal bites of record. A total of 4 warnings were delivered to dog owners for dogs at large or barking disturbances. all have complied with the law to my knowledge.

One horse abuse complaint was checked on and determined to be unfounded. Horse and owner are both doing well. All strays have been returned to their

owners with any board charges paid by the owner and at no expense to the town.

#### **Town Archivist**

Perhaps the most significant event this year in the area of the town archives was the conservation of the first Town Record Book, which covered the period 1778 to 1813. among other historic events recorded in this book is the incorporation of the Town of Brookfield in 1794. The conservation was recommended by the town archivist and an advisory committee, and was approved by the selectmen. The extensive conservation was performed by the Northeast Document Conservation Center in Andover, MA, one of the leading conservators of documents in the United States. Several steps were taken to assure the stability of this volume, and it was rebound and is stored in a custom-made storage box. This process will assure the longevity of this particular document for generations to come.

Several town people have donated documents and photos to the archives this year, as in past years. An outstanding collection of contemporary photographs documenting the Mountain Lake - Copple Crown - Tumbledown Dick and Moose Mountains area was donated in 1998, with many aerial photos of that section of town included.

One researcher traveled from Massachusetts to use some of the archival materials from the nineteenth century. The archivist met with him for several hours to review the materials he needed to see, and discuss the event he was researching.

The volunteer archivist continues to be involved in the two state-wide organizations devoted to records management and archives. He attended three workshops this year sponsored by these organizations, as well as two field trips to other town archives to learn how they are managing their town records. All this is preparation for developing and installing a record management system for the storage and retrieval of all town records to be stored archivally in the proposed municipal building. In 1999, the archivist and volunteers will begin organizing the records in an acceptable archival system approved by the Board of Selectmen.

#### **Brookfield Conservation Commission**

The Conservation Commission has retained its continued interest in the asthetics of our comminity and so sponsored the annual Town Clean-up Day in early May, which was an unqualified success with many citizen participants, munchies and refreshments provided by the Brookfield Bloomers, and, as usual, dumpster service was provided by Jim Murphy. Our two ongoing projects of Dry Hydrants and Cemeteries Identification have produced little results this year compared to last year. Our bluebird project is largely completed, but Jenny Tapper and Judy Brenner continue to look for new opportunities to expand and continue this effort. Unfortunately, both Jenny and Judy were unable to continue as alternate members and their resignations were accepted with regrets, but heartfelt thanks during the spring and summer of 1998. Judy will continue, however, to shepherd the Town Clean-up Day effort.

Members of the commission have been attending and will continue to attend regional seminars in Milton on the subject of land conservation trusts, in an effort to coordinatie and plan land acquisitions and conservation goals among and between the various conservation commissions from Raymond to our south through Effingham on our north side. An issue arises when a tract of land becomes available as a conservation easement or trust which crosses town lines, county lines, or even state boundaries. Furthermore, many larger local communities have in place a mechainism to finance the acquisition of conservation lands if and when the become available, not as gifts, but at a price. While is is nor likely that Brookfield, because of its small size and limited resources will adopt a financing plan for such acquisitions, it is nowteworthy that within our town we already have a valuable and significant conservation easement in the form of the Lakes Region Conservation Trust at Copplecrown. Another goal of the regional seminar program is to find a way to educate landowner members of the towns about the advantages of donating land to conservation entities. The seminars were first organized and sponsored by the Milton Planning Board, and are held about once a month, attended by a host of representatives from each local community.

#### **Emergency Management Director**

The only emergency event for 1998 was the January ice storm. Due to the weight of the ice hundreds of trees fell on the power lines and blocked roads leaving most of the town without electricity for four days, and up to two weeks for some individuals. To respond to the demands of the storm and the needs of the town's residents an Emergency Operations Center was set up at the town house to coordinate the support and clean up activities, provide information, and track the conditions around the town. Crew assignments included road clearing, checking on those who were home bound, and keeping the townhouse open from 8am to 8pm. The new generator the town bought in 1997 provided the power necessary to run the pump for water and keep the heat going, while the kitchen was available for any one needing to cook meals.

I want to thank the dozens of volunteers who helped out and made it possible to respond quickly and effectively.

During any future emergencies the townhouse will be open to provide the necessary services, storm and response information, and the Emergency Operations Center.

Regarding our budget, we are pleased to report that we are able to continue all our services at a funding level from the town identical to that of the last several years.

Our focus this year has been to achieve a means of access for handicapped people. The proposed construction design provides elevator service to all three floors of the town hall and both stories of the Gafney Library for a total project cost of \$250,000. It is anticipated that \$100,000 will be awarded through a Community Development Block Grant for which the county has applied. The library is prepared to fund its share of the cost of the access corridor (\$65,000) through fund raising efforts and the Gafney Endowment Fund. Finally, in March of 1998 the voters of Wakefield overwhelmingly approved an appropriation of \$80,000 for this project.

#### Planning Board

The Planning Board, having been charged with the custodial and administrative responsibility for the Master Plan, Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision Regulations, and other relevant land use documents has had a busy year up-dating such docu-

ments to compliance with the many recent RSA changes promulgated by the NH State Legislature.

Work continues on a review of the current Subdivision Regulations, a subdivision application kit has been formalized, and the Gravel Pit Regulations have been reviewed under the requirements of RSA 155E and RSA 72-B. For training purposed, a mock subdivision review was held at a regular meeting in October. A minor change was made tot he Driveway Regulation.

In the course of its normal duties, the board approved 2 lot line adjustment plans and is currently in the discussion phase on a third. After preliminary discussion, a subdivision inquiry was discouraged.

During the year a building restriction clause was removed from a prior registered subdivision plat at the request of the land owner. The board continues to meet on a regular monthly basis on the second Monday evening of each month.

#### Selectmen's Report

The year started off with the "Ice Storm" of 1998. There were a few tough days but we survived quite well with no major disasters. Our newly acquired emergency generator serve us well as the Town House was kept open for our residents to get water, cook dinner, or just to get warm. We applied for and received a FEMA grant which more than paid for the cleanup of the storm without affecting our budget.

The Town meeting was lively in the discussion of Wakefield's services to Brookfield. The selectmen were instructed to work out a contract with Wakefield that would be fair to all concerned. After many meetings with Wakefield, we arrived at the contract that you will vote to accept or reject at the 1999 Town Meeting. We think this is a fair contract and we recommend that it be approved.

The second subject for discussion was for a new town office building. The price that was approved was based on a sketch that we had put together. After Town Meeting a committee was formed to make our dream a reality. It was the consensus of the committee that the building was too small and it should abe expanded, which it was. A set of construction drawings and specifications necessary to build were obtained. During the development of the project we realized the septic system for the Town House had outlived its useful life and needed to be replaced. A septic system was designed to accommodate both buildings. In addition to the septic system, the electric service to the well was in disrepair and requires replacing. The several items listed above drove the cost above the appropriation voted at the Town Meeting. As was stated at that meeting, if the cost exceeded the appropriation we would not build. There are some procedural matters that need to be addressed. We are back with solid numbers that were bid on a

drawing set, not a sketch, and all the I's dotted and T's crossed. We hope you will support this proposal.

In the month, disaster struck with a forest fire off Tumbledown Dick Road at the Wolfeboro end. With help from 15 fire departments and two helicopters, the fire was contained and limited to about 5 acres burned. The cost of forest fires is the town's responsibility entirely. It was almost a budget buster, but with extra FEMA grant money we were able to hold our own. We are recommending we start a trust fund to put monies away in case of another fire, in order to be better prepared to pay the costs. In addition, we are recommending that you support the article to clear our class VI roads of downed trees and brush so fire equipment can get into the back country. We are also working with Jeb Bradley to have the State put the dam back at Mountain Lake. New Hampshire Fish & Game Department removed the dam several years ago with the promise to replace it after the millfoil weeds had been eradicated. This will give a good water supply for forest fires in that area of the town.

The long awaited re-valuation of property was completed in late October, just in time for our second half tax bills. As with most new computer adventures, there were glitches that delayed our sending out our bills. We will make sure that the problems are resolved before spring bills. The town has managed to keep the town portion of the taxes the same as last year. We will strive to keep the tax rate the same. With the Claremont Decision unknowns, we do not know what lays ahead.

Brookfield 2000 is alive and well, but a little behind schedule. Please support our efforts to repair and maintain our buildings. Much more needs to be done.

We would like to say "Thanks" to all who have helped to keep our town on an even keel. The town needs more of its residents to volunteer for the many town boards that need to be staffed to keep our home town the very desirable place that attracted us in the first place. Please notify our town clerk or any other official to get on the "List". The rewards to the town will be great and you can be part of the solution

#### **Visiting Nurses Association**

This past year has been especially challenging for VNA-Hospice. Over 80% of our patients are on the Medicare program and the passing of the Balanced Budget Act in September 1997 initiated a new system for reimbursing Medicare home care which actually threatened the viability of this agency. The VNA-Hospice is a key component of the health care delivery system in this region and we know that the care we provide to our residents is essential to their ability to remain independent and in their own homes.

The VNA-Hospice is petitioning the residents and the Board of Selectmen in Brookfield to ask them to reimburse us for \$941. This money request represents non-reimbursable funds that were actually spent on the 666 visits made to Brookfield residents during the agency's 1998 fiscal year. This represents a 76.2% reduction

from last year's request. Thank you for your continued support.

We look forward to a long term relationship with them.

Officers Sanger and Babine were hired to fill vacancies created when Cpl. Timothy Thompson went to the Carroll County Sheriff's Dept. and Officer Timothy Brackett accepted a position with the Attorney General's Office. Both officers served the town well for over 6 years and we wish them success in their new careers.

Thanks to the extraordinary work by officers and substantial cooperation from citizens we currently enjoy a remarkable 61% clearance rate for burglaries.. For comparison, the state and national average runs 12- to 14%. Not withstanding our investigative success, we still experience far too many burglaries. You are our eyes and ears. Please call if you see something suspicious or unusual.

Lt. Kenneth Fifield was selected as the "1998 Officer of the Year" by department members, in recognition of his never-ending dedication to the department and the townspeople. Lt. Fifield oversees the management of case investigations, serves as the department prosecutor in the District Courts and maintains patrol obligations. He brings an incredible energy, eagerness and professionalism to the department. I personally extend my thanks and appreciation to Ken for his unequalled work ethic, loyalty and integrity.

I wish to thank the citizens and Select Boards of the towns of Wakefield and Brookfield for their support throughout the year. I especially wish to thank the members of the department for their continued dedication and service. You have made a substantial difference in the quality of life for so many people in the Wakefield area, and I am proud of my association with each of you.
