To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Brookline on Tuesday, the eleventh (11th) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 2% discount for payment of property taxes within thirty (30) days of the date of the billing, or take any action relative thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in the Land Acquisition Fund for Conservation purposes. (Recommends 2-0)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,455.00 for consulting services by the Nashua Regional Planning Commission for work to be done on Brookline's Master Plan, or take any action relative thereto. (Recommends 2-0)
8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b; provided that no additional Town monies be spent.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$528.03 to secure state aid for Class IV and V Construction, Reconstruction or Betterment Aid (Chapter 241, Section 2, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended). (Recommends 2-0)

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith: (Recommends 2-0)

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 to be used for renovations to the lower Town Hall, or take any action thereon. (Recommends 2-0)

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$2,475.54 plus any interest thereon from the Capital Reserve for Basement Remodeling and use that sum for further improvements to the lower Town Hall. (Recommends 2-0)

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to use the unexpended balance of the Special Appropriation titled "Heating System" in the amount of \$1,470.80 for further improvements or repairs to the Town Hall, or take any action relative thereto. (Recommends 2-0)

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey Tax Map #C-003 to Alfred T. Powers for back taxes plus interests and costs.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey the premises at 47 Pepperell Road (Tax Map #K-046)

known as the Frost Estate to such of the previous owners as pay the sum of all the unpaid taxes, interests and penalties within thirty-five (35) days of Town Meeting; and in default of purchase by prior owners, to sell by advertised sealed bid to collect the unpaid taxes, interests and penalties.

- Article 13. We authorized the Selectmen to remove the building on B-055-12C and return the property to control of Melendy Pond Authority.
- Article 14. We authorized the Selectmen to sell D-042 for back taxes, costs and interest.

- Article 15. We raised \$35,197.00 for police equipment and wages, provided the program is funded by N.H. Crime Commission at 95% - 1st year, 50% - 2nd year, 25% - 3rd year.
- Article 16. We raised \$7,858.68 for a police cruiser, provided that 50% is funded.
- Article 17. We raised \$500.00 for conservation purposes.
- Article 19. We raised \$4,000.00 for Town Hall improvements.
- Article 20. We authorized the Selectmen to return the unexpended balances of Special Appropriations to the General Fund.
- Article 24. We authorized the withdrawal of \$1,125.78 and interest from the Capital Reserve for Tennis Courts and return it to the General Fund.
- Article 25. We voted to provide worker's compensation coverage for eligible employees.
- Article 26. We voted to accept the legacies as printed.

We voted to have the moderator appoint a Communications Comm. to report to the next Town Meeting.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The Brookline Public Library circulated over ten items of library materials per capita in 1979. The statistics presented in this report reflect the measurable work of the librarian and her staff during the year. The time and knowledge required to perform reference assistance and reader's advisory service cannot be measured by mere figures. The selection of library materials to meet the demands of the community and to insure the growth of the collection require decisions by the librarian based upon her knowledge of the materials available. The task is especially challenging in the face of the rampant inflation in the publishing world. In 1979, for example, 67 fewer books were purchased than in 1978, while the cost was \$234.85 more. How do you measure such expertise and its benefit to the citizens of Brookline?

Under Geraldine Phillips' leadership during the past ten years, the library has expanded its services. Physically it has become an attractive and functional facility.

Mrs. Phillips has been ably assisted this year by Pamela Ireland, with Charlotte Farwell and Dorothy Haight as substitutes, and volunteers Barbara Coon, Sandra Fessenden, Ellen Adamowicz and Louise Dixon.

The library is fortunate in having many persons who donate books, magazines, records, time and money. The Trustees thank them for their generosity. Thanks are also due to the Brookline Friends of the Library and to *The Brookliner* and Miriam Jepson for their coverage of library news.

The continued support of the community will enable your public library to meet your needs in the 1980's.

## REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

The Recreation Commission again managed its customary schedule of activities and programs for 1979. These included overseeing the operation of the Grove, maintaining and coordinating activities at the ball park and organizing both the Winter Carnival and the Summer Road Races. There were 121 memberships in the Grove this year, and 111 children took part in the Red Cross swim program. At the ball park, plans have been made to install a pump for the well to provide a water supply at the field.

The Commission's membership has undergone a nearly complete turn-over in the past two years. With these changes in faces has also come a new infusion of ideas regarding future projects. ## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

## REPORT OF THE FIRE ENGINEERS

The log of the Brookline Fire Department shows a total of 55 calls for the year 1979. Eight were for Mutual Aid to neighboring towns. Six were for service calls for pumping cellars, etc. Of the remaining forty-one, only one was a serious structure fire. Three were for the tragedy at Lake Potanipo, and three others were for serious auto accidents to which the Hollis Fire Department assisted with the use of the Hurst Tool.

Thanks is due to the Hollis Department for their training of Brookline Fire Department and First Responders in the use of the Hurst Tool.

Although there were four chimney fires in 1979, this was a low number considering the experience of surrounding towns. We urge townspeople to inspect their stoves and chimneys regularly as we expect a large increase in fire loss in this area.

Six brush fires and three unauthorized campfires, plus several individual causes finish our log.

We were very pleased with being able to place into service our new attack engine - 861 in May of this year. We are proud and believe the people of Brookline should be pleased to hear that it has twice been awarded "Best Equipped Engine" at musters competing against engines which cost at least half again as much as ours. We have had some problems with the brake system, but otherwise it is all we had desired.

At the same time, we call to the attention of the townspeople the age of our third-line piece. It was purchased in 1950 and will be thirty-five years old by 1985. Therefore, we are placing an article in the warrant to raise \$10,000 for placing in a Capital Reserve Fund for a truck to replace this one by 1985.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During the year 1979, the Police Department has increased its activities. Crime has been on the increase as it has in other area localities. The increased crime has resulted in the necessity of more patrol hours by the department. The cruiser has proven a great asset to the Police Department. Officers' activities, with the availability of a fully equipped vehicle, has enabled the Department to better serve the community.

This year, the Police Department has solved several major burglaries. This was accomplished with the assistance of citizens' awareness and their information to the Department through the many hours of investigation. Good public relations between the citizens and the Police Department has been beneficial in crime prevention. In any community the Police Department cannot accomplish their endeavors without cooperation by both the citizens and the police.

Within a matter of a couple of years, it will be mandatory that any full or part-time officer will be required to attend the New Hampshire Police Academy for certification. The state is at this time compiling a procedure to certify officers who have been in law enforcement for a required number of years. This will result in an added expense to the Town, as the state will require qualified, certified officers on any department, large or small.

I would like to thank the citizens of Brookline for their support and cooperation in making this a successful year.

**ANNUAL REPORT – 1979**

The First Responders have continued to provide round-the-clock emergency medical care and transportation services for the people of Brookline. The ambulance is maintained in a ready condition, stocked with supplies to administer first aid and life support care as needed.

There are twenty-five members of the organization, all of whom are licensed Ambulance Attendants. We attend monthly training sessions and regional seminars to broaden our skills. At this time, nineteen members are Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians.

During the year, eleven additional pagers were purchased, bringing the total to twenty-five. In addition, generous contributions from townspeople have provided an oxygen-powered portable suction device and a patented short spine board/vest used for auto extrication.

The ambulance responded to sixty-seven calls for emergency medical care in 1979.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School district in the town of Brookline qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the sixth day of March, 1980 at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers of agents of the district.

2. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire, or from any other source.

5. To see if the district will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,500 to install fencing, poles, lines, and a net on the paved play court at the Elementary School in order to permit the court to be used for tennis.

6. To see if the district will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,200 to patch the leaks in the Elementary School roof.

7. To see if the district will vote to reimburse the parents/guardians for transportation expenses of private school students, grades one through twelve, at a rate equivalent to the cost of two gallons of gasoline per family per school day. (By petition)

8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

9. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

**SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING**  
**March 8, 1979**

The annual School District Meeting for Brookline was held at the Town Hall on March 8, 1979, at 8:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Thomas Arnold at 8:00 p.m. Before reading the warrant, Thomas Arnold noted the following errors in the School District report:

Page 67, Total 110 Account - 1979-80 Proposed figure — change \$700.00 to \$770.00

Page 69, 1000 Series - Student Body Activities, 1978-79 Budgeted and 1979-80 Proposed figures — change 0.00 to \$550.00.

Page 69, 1400 Series Total, 1977-78 Actual — change \$497,813.51 to \$307,397.67.

Page 69, Total Budget, 1977-78 Actual — change \$544,744.03 to \$497,813.51; and 1979-80 Proposed — change \$662,720.13 to \$665,720.13.

The Warrant Articles were read by Thomas Arnold.

**Article 1.** To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

It was moved by Frederick Loskamp, seconded by Nancy Brodeur to table this article and act upon it under Article 7. Motion carried.

**Article 2.** To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

It was moved by Marcia Farwell, seconded by Gerry Phillips, that all reports be accepted as printed in the School Report. Motion carried.

Thomas Arnold noted that all Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers should be elected as voted last year.

Clarence Farwell inquired as to why only half pages were being used in some parts of the School Report, and asked if this space could be utilized.



Actual enrollment figures were requested by Terry Baum, also a breakdown by grade level.

Projected enrollment figures were requested.

Information regarding the staff that will make up the Supervisory Union 41 office and salaries for these employees was requested.

**Article 3.** To choose Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

It was moved by Frederick Loskamp, seconded by Richard Maghakian, that this article be passed over. Motion carried.

**Article 4.** To see if the district will establish a Secondary School Building Study Committee to report to the School Board by December, 1979.

It was moved by Marcia Farwell, seconded by Alan Haight, that the School District authorize the School Board to appoint a Secondary School Building Study Committee to report to the School Board by December, 1979. Motion carried.

Frederick Loskamp reported on tuition for Brookline students going to Hollis.

The following future possibilities were mentioned:

1. Middle/High School for Brookline
2. Cooperative or Regional School for Brookline

Alexander Blastos, Superintendent of Schools, was asked to explain Bond Issues.

**Article 5.** To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire, or from any other source.

It was moved by Clarence Farwell, seconded by Betty Hall, to accept the question as read. Motion carried.

**Article 6.** (a) To see if the district will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to sandblast, repaint, repaint the exterior of the elementary school.

(b) To see if the district will vote to withdraw the sum of \$5,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund to sandblast, repaint, and repaint the exterior of the elementary school.

It was moved by Betty Hall, seconded by Nancy Brodeur, that the School District appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to sandblast, repaint, and repaint the exterior of the elementary school and to withdraw the sum of \$5,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund to sandblast, repaint, and repaint the exterior of the elementary school.

A hand vote was taken on the motion – 33 in favor, 0 against.

Alan Haight moved to amend the motion to have the School Board reconcile the report on the Capital Reserve Fund and publish its findings, seconded by Donald Smith. Passed without dissension.

**Article 7.** To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

It was moved by Marcia Farwell, seconded by Frederick Loskamp, to appropriate the sum of \$665,720.13 for the support of the schools, for the payment of the salaries of School District Officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Motion carried.

It was noted that the following corrections should be made on page 78 of the School Report in regards to teachers' degrees: Susan Hineman - Degree should read M.A., and Lita Simeone - Degree should read B.S.

**Article 8.** No other business.

It was moved by Clarence Farwell, seconded by Gerry Phillips, that the meeting adjourn at 9:15 p.m. Motion carried.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Education is in a state of constant change. We must examine the priorities to see that what we are doing is meeting the needs of today's students. The Brookline/Hollis Accountability Committee is attempting to evaluate the curriculum in the areas of Mathematics, Language Arts, U.S. History, and N.H. History. The Committee, composed of teachers, administrators, students and parents, will be establishing goals and objectives at all levels: Elementary, Junior High, and Senior High. Competency testing will be a result of this Committee's work, as well as redesigning the curriculum where needed.

Our school's Combination Class arrangement, for grades 3 and 4 and grades 5 and 6, continues to be a successful concept educationally; giving the teachers the opportunity to meet individual student needs and emphasize the basic skills which are necessary so that our students may develop to the full extent of their ability and become responsible, contributing citizens of our community.

Through the aid of a large number of classroom volunteers, we are able to give students positive reinforcement in the essential academic areas of Mathematics and Reading; giving the students a positive feeling of success, affording them the opportunity to reach their full potential. Barbara Coon, as coordinator, and the individual aides have been a tremendous help to many students and teachers.

The Enrichment Program has been expanded to include grade 4 as well as grades 5 and 6. This program involves students in classes of Advanced English, Applied Mathematics and Algebra, and Independent Study. The Enrichment classes, manned by volunteers, attempts to meet the challenging individual needs of its students.

Through the various educational programs, Student Council Activities, and Volunteer Aide Programs, we have tried to involve many townspeople, parents and friends in the many aspects of our school. To this end, we feel that the Brookline Elementary School continues to be an integral part of the community, as it should be. Thank you for your continued support.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

In the Spring of 1979, the State Legislature abolished the term "supervisory union" and changed it to "school administrative unit." School Administrative Unit 41 now consists of the school districts in Brookline and Hollis. (Amherst became a separate unit effective July 1, 1979.)

The 1979-80 school year has been a year of concern over the energy crunch, a year of little snow (as of this writing), and a year of continuing excellence in the educational program at Brookline Elementary School.

Several School Board appointed committees have been continuing work that was assigned previously. The Accountability Committee (consisting of both Brookline and Hollis members) has developed performance indicators and essential student outcomes for grades 4, 8 and 12 in English, Mathematics, United States History/Government, and New Hampshire History/Government. Competency testing in those curriculum areas has been developed and is in the process of being evaluated for reliability. Promotion of improved student performance is the primary purpose of the accountability project.

School Board members, School Planning Committee members, and administrators have met throughout the past year to discuss future educational planning. Although Brookline and Hollis are in the tenth year of a 20 year AREA agreement which provides for secondary school pupils from Brookline to attend Hollis schools on a tuition basis, both School Boards are planning to study the feasibility of converting the AREA agreement to a Cooperative School District.

If the School Boards both determine that it is in the best interests of the children and the districts to enter into a cooperative agreement, a vote would be held in both districts to seek authorization. That vote, in all probability, would be held at the 1981 School District Meetings in each town.

The proposed 1980-81 school district budget, which appears elsewhere in this year's Town Report, bears very little resemblance to the format printed in last year's report. All school districts in New Hampshire have been converting to a new federal coding system (called Handbook II) because of a state mandate. Although this system must

be in operation on July 1, 1980, the S.A.U. 41 districts have implemented the new coding during the current year. The actual budget consists of over 183 individual line items which occupy 12 computerized pages. The form in which the budget is reported in the Town Report identifies each area in the Chart of Accounts, lists the sub-totals and a brief explanation of what items are included in each area.

The 1979-80 School Board, administration and staff have spent many long hours working on School Board policies, resolving policy problems, reviewing expenditures, and planning for financial and educational effectiveness. Concern over energy conservation, school building maintenance, curriculum and fiscal responsibility have occupied a great deal of the time and energy output of each individual connected with district management. Much progress has been made in all of those areas in 1979-80, and more is anticipated in the year to come.

We extend our thanks to the citizens of Brookline for their cooperation, support and understanding.
