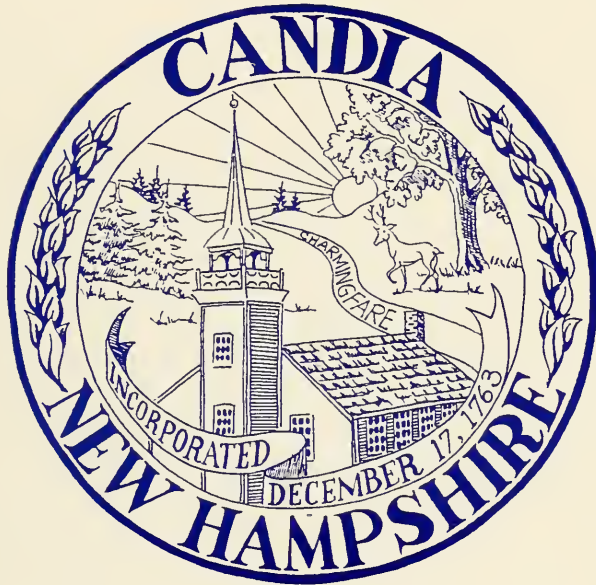

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 6:00 A.M. TO 7:00 P.M.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CANDIA, IN THE COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE ON TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia, on Tuesday, the Twelfth of March next, at six of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1: To choose the following Town Officers for the year ensuing:

- One Selectman for 3 years.
- One Town Clerk for 3 years.
- One Road Agent for 3 years.
- One Trustee of the Trust Funds for 3 years.
- One Moderator for 2 years.
- One Supervisor of the Checklist for 6 years.
- One Superintendent of Cemeteries for 1 year.
- One Library Trustee for 3 years.
- Two Planning Board Members for 3 years.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following changes in the Candia Zoning Ordinances proposed by the Planning Board to be voted by official ballot:

ZONING AMENDMENT #1 Are you in favor of the amendment to the existing town ordinance to allow the Planning Board to make the necessary changes in format, numbering, title, etc., without changing the substance or meaning? (This proposed amendment is a housekeeping amendment.)

ZONING AMENDMENT #2 5:01 E Economy Apartments: Replace this article with 13:04G

13:04G Accessory Dwelling Units

Any dwelling in a residential zone may be converted or built to contain one Accessory Dwelling Unit on the following conditions by Special Exception:

1. There shall be only one bedroom in the accessory dwelling unit.
2. Adequate sewer and water service shall be provided.
3. There shall be a maximum of 600 sq. ft. of space in the accessory unit.
4. On site parking for one additional vehicle shall be provided.
5. All existing set back ordinances must be met.
6. The accessory unit shall be within or attached to the main dwelling unit or located in an existing accessory building located on the same lot as the main dwelling.
7. The residential character of the area must be retained.
8. Density requirements of Article 13:04 C will not apply.

Add to Definitions:

Accessory Dwelling Unit

A second dwelling unit, attached or detached which is permitted by a land use control regulation to be located on the same lot, plat, site or other division of land as the permitted principal dwelling unit RSA 674.21

Add Accessory Units to Table of Uses 5:02 a.2

Accessory Units, subject to Provisions of 13:04G. Special Exception in Residential Zone

ZONING AMENDMENT #3 Repeal 13:04D Conversion of Existing Buildings

ZONING AMENDMENT #4 13:04 C. Two-Family and Multi-Family

2. c. Add "In accordance with section 2:05 only one multi-family or two-family building will be allowed per lot" – unless approved under innovative land use –.

ZONING AMENDMENT #5 Section 2:04 Driveways (Replace present section with the following)

The entrance of driveways and other accesses to the public way shall be done in accordance with RSA 236:13 and shall be inspected by the Road Agent. Access to the public way shall be on the bound of the lot used for "lot width and frontage" (6:02). Access to public way from another bound other than that used for frontage may be allowed by the Planning Board only upon a showing of public safety concern.

ZONING AMENDMENT #6 Article VI Dimensional Requirements

Add: 6:01 F Lot Shape

Lots shall be compact and regular in shape. No irregularly shaped portion of a lot narrower than 50 feet shall be used to satisfy the minimum lot size.

ZONING AMENDMENT #7 Article 10:05 C Lot Size determination:

Add to this article: Contiguous non-wetland portions of a lot shall be adjacent to or connected by no less than a 50 foot width of non-wetland area.

ZONING AMENDMENT #8 Add 6:01 G: No buildings, roads or driveways that are not part of the tower site shall be built within 150% of the height of any tower that is located in any zone.

Towers must be set back a distance equal to 150% of the height of the tower from any unaffiliated structure, parking areas or lots, driveways, roads, developed areas or property lines.

ZONING AMENDMENT #9 13:04 A. Neighborhood Business and Professional Offices in a Residential Zone

Replace with the following:

Those commercial uses identified in Sections 502b3, 502b5 and 502b6 of this ordinance and specifically referring to this section may be permitted as Special Exceptions in the Residential Zone provided that:

1. Such uses are located only on an arterial street as designated in Article III.
2. Such uses do not have an enclosed floor area in excess of 2000SF.
3. Such uses do not detract from the rural aesthetics of the area.

ZONING AMENDMENT #10 Section 503B Home Offices – Replace present section with the following.

Offices within a single family detached dwelling for an office occupation of a resident therein shall be allowed provided that not more than one person not resident on the premises shall be employed therein. The use must not cause any additional vehicular traffic between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Such use shall not have an enclosed floor area in excess of 600 square feet and must conform to section 9:06M regarding parking

Table of Uses 5:02B

B-6 Business and Professional Offices and Banks where permitted as SE in the R district, the conditions set forth in Section 13:03 and 13:04 A shall apply. The use is denoted as SE in the R district, permitted by right in the C, I, and LI districts, expressly prohibited in the INS district.

5:03 A. Home Occupation to be permitted by right in the R district.

5:03 B. Home Offices to be permitted by right in the R district.

ZONING AMENDMENT #11 Regarding 2:08 Lots recorded prior to adoption of this ordinance remove the present text and add refer to Section 2:02 E

ZONING AMENDMENT #12 5:02 Table of Use Regulations:

A. Residential

1. One Family dwelling not to be permitted in any other district other than the R district. Make necessary corrections in 13:04C to reflect this change and delete 13:04B in its entirety.

2002 TOWN WARRANT

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET ON SATURDAY, THE SIXTEENTH DAY OF MARCH NEXT AT NINE OF THE CLOCK IN THE FORENOON AT MOORE SCHOOL AUDITORIUM TO CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING ARTICLES:

ARTICLE 3: Shall we adopt an exemption for the disabled? The exemption, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$25,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$50,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$300,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters and recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Two Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$200.00)** in continuation of its support of the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program. (By request of the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program, Sponsored by the Portsmouth Housing Authority.)

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Four Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars and no cents (\$422.00)** in continuation of its support of the Greater Manchester Chapter of the American Red Cross. (By request of the Greater Manchester Chapter of the American Red Cross.)

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$1,000.00)** in continuation of its support of the Child and Family Services of New Hampshire. (By request of the Child and Family Services of New Hampshire.)

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Five Hundred and Thirty-two Dollars and no cents (\$532.00)** in continuation of its support of the Rockingham Nutrition & Meals on Wheels Program. (By request of the Rockingham Nutrition & Meals on Wheels Program.)

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,400.00)** in continuation of its support of the Area Homemaker Home Health Aide Service. (By request of the Area Homemaker Health Aide Service, Inc.)

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Six Thousand, One Hundred, Twenty-nine Dollars and no cents (\$6,129.00)** in continuation of its support of Rockingham Community Action. (By request of Rockingham Community Action.)

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand, Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$3,750.00)** in continuation of its support of Lamprey Health Care. (By request of Lamprey Health Care.)

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand, Eight Hundred and Twenty-eight Dollars and no cents (\$3,828.00)** in continuation of its support of the Visiting Nurse Association of Greater Manchester & Southern New Hampshire. (By request of the Visiting Nurse Association.)

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$1,000.00)** in continuation of its support of the Seacoast Child Advocacy Center. (By request of the Seacoast Child Advocacy Center.)

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$3,500.00)** to support perpetual care of the Town's cemeteries. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Superintendent of Cemeteries. (By request of the Superintendent of Cemeteries.)

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Four Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$4,000.00)** for the Fitts Museum. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. (By request of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum.)

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$500.00)**, and to place said funds in the expendable general fund trust fund known as the Playground Maintenance Fund, established pursuant to RSA 31:19-a at the March, 1998 Town Meeting. The purpose of this fund is for replacement of the surface of the playground and upkeep of equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. (By request of the Board of Selectmen and recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$8,850.00)**, for the purpose of copying and distributing Community Information/Welcome packages as well as the Candia Community Newsletter. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (By request of the Envision Candia Intro & Info Committee.)

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Seven Thousand Four Hundred Ninety-Three Dollars and no cents (\$7,493.00)**, in support of the Candia Teen Center. (By request of the Candia Teen Center.)

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Fifty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$50,000.00)** to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1991 Town Meeting, for the future purchase of fire apparatus and equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. (By request of the Candia Volunteer Firefighters Association, Inc. and recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Seventy-Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$73,500.00)** for Fire Suppression, Prevention, and Emergency Medical Service to the Town of Candia. The monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firefighters Association, Inc., and to be received as follows: Thirty-seven Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$37,000.00) on or before April 1, 2002, and the balance on or before July 10, 2002. (By request of the Candia Volunteer Firefighters Association, Inc.)

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum **not to exceed One Hundred Twenty Dollars and no cents (\$120.00)**, the amount being the balance of funds which were received by donation for the DARE Car/Community Service Vehicle, and to place said funds in the expendable general fund trust fund known as the DARE Car/Community Service Vehicle Maintenance Fund, established pursuant to RSA 31:19-a at the March, 1999 Town Meeting. The purpose of this fund is to provide for the repair and maintenance of the DARE car/Community Service Vehicle with the Selectmen appointed as agents. (By request of the Chief of Police and the Board of Selectmen and recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to replenish funds to the expendable general trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, known as the Incinerator Maintenance Fund, which was established in 1990, and to raise and appropriate the sum of **Seven Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$7,800.00)** to be placed in this fund. (By request of the Board of Selectmen and recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Candia Solid Waste Ordinance, adopted March 14, 1989, regulating the disposal of solid waste at the incinerator facility as authorized under RSA 149-M and RSA 31:39. The complete text is available at the Selectmen's Office, Town Clerks Office and the Recycling Center. (By request of the Solid Waste Committee.)

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Thirty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$30,000.00)** to cover the reimbursable costs associated with Police activities, including but not limited to Police Special Details and grant programs. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (By request of the Chief of Police and the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Hundred Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$100,000.00)** for the fourth and final phase of reconstruction on North Road. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (By request of the Road Agent and the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Ninety-Two Thousand, Six Hundred, Dollars and no cents (\$92,600.00)** for the operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library. Said funds are to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Smyth Public Library Association. (By request of the Board of Trustees of the Smyth Public Library.)

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$7,500.00)** for moving expenses for the Smyth Public Library. Move in will be upon completion of the new library at 55 High Street. Monies not expended will be returned to the Town. Said funds are to be spent under the direction of the Board of Trustees of the Smyth Public Library. (By request of the Board of Trustees of the Smyth Public Library.)

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$25,000.00)** to be used for the purpose of updating the Master Plan and the Capital Improvement Plan. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Planning Board for this purpose. This special warrant article will establish a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7 VI, which will not lapse until the plans are completed, or for three (3) years, until December 31, 2004. (By request of the Planning Board and recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will authorize the establishment of a capital reserve fund pursuant to RSA Chapter 35, for the future revaluation of the municipality and to raise and appropriate the sum of **Fifteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$15,000.00)** to be placed in said fund, and appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer the fund. (By request of the Board of Selectmen and recommended.)

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to the authority of RSA 673:1, II, to establish the Candia Heritage Commission, to consist of 7 members and 5 alternates, each of whom will be appointed by the Board of Selectmen for staggered 3-year terms, according to the terms of RSA 673:4-a. (By request of the Envision Candia, Candia Heritage Committee.)

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to allow the CCC to place the Town Forest, 64 acres along Flint Road, into a conservation easement, such easement to be held by a Land Trust organization (to be determined). Further, to authorize that the funds necessary to defray the costs associated with establishing the easement (surveying, appraisal, and monitoring) be expended from the Conservation fund. This would ensure that this piece would remain in open space in perpetuity, but would allow the land to be used for recreation, wildlife habitat, and/or appropriate forest management practices. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.)

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town will vote to place the 16 acre parcel of town-owned land on North Road, Map 402, Lot 9, under the care of the Conservation Commission. This piece of property is one of the last remaining pieces of undeveloped land along this road and is prime wildlife habitat. Stevens Brook runs through the southern portion of the property and it borders on some significant wetland habitat. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.)

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00)** to be deposited in the Candia Conservation Commission Fund, in accordance with RSA 36-A:5. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters and not recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will designate Baker Road, from the intersection of South Road to the intersection of Route 27, a scenic road in accordance with the provisions of RSA 231:157. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.)

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution: Whereas the rate of development in Candia and the southeastern region of the state has increased dramatically in recent years and is expected to continue for the foreseeable future, threatening the rural character of our town and placing increasing stress on the natural resources, historical features and wildlife in the region; and

Whereas the Town of Candia is in the process of updating it's master plan and developing an open space plan; and

Whereas one of the prevailing sentiments at the recent community profile event "Envision Candia" was to preserve the rural character of Candia while providing for controlled growth; and
Whereas the current zoning ordinances are in the process of being reviewed for revision;

Therefore be it resolved that the Town of Candia considers open space, the historical features and the rural character of the community to be a high priority. It supports plans and ordinances which allow for development commensurate with the needs of a growing population while maintaining these characteristics of the town by promoting the preservation of undeveloped tracts and corridors, and protecting in perpetuity its irreplaceable natural and historical resources. (By request of the Conservation Commission.)

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Million, Three Hundred Eighty-five Thousand, Ninety-eight Dollars and no cents (\$1,385,098.00)** which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include articles previously addressed. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (By request of the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 36: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Given under our hands and seal, this sixteenth day of March in the year of our Lord, Two Thousand Two.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The year 2001 has been an active one for the Candia Board of Selectmen. The addition of newcomer Clark Thyng to the Board gave us some new perspectives and a tireless worker for the Town. Clark was appointed as the Board's ex-officio member to the Planning Board, so he did not lack for issues! The Board dealt with an impressive roster of legal issues this year, including the issues surrounding the potential development of Libbee Road. We are pleased to report that there were no major reverses for the Town on the legal front.

The Board re-activated the Solid Waste Committee to help address the many ongoing issues with trash disposal. The amount of waste that we are dealing with is sometimes truly staggering! With the successful re-lining of the incinerator this past fall, we hope to keep the facility running smoothly for many years to come. However, as the amount of waste increases, we may well have to establish fees for some types of waste, to help keep costs under control. Stay tuned...

The Skateboard Park behind the Town Offices was completed this year. Although there have been some issues associated with the park, it certainly seems to be a success with the kids who use it. Skateboarders from miles around come to use our skateboard park; with the cooperation of everyone in keeping things under control, we expect that the park will remain a fun place for kids of all ages to enjoy.

The State Department of Transportation finally decided that a traffic light was justified at the Four Corners intersection. Construction commenced in 2001, but the traffic light won't actually be in operation until early 2002. This will be Candia's first fully functional traffic light, so we are anxiously waiting to see how it will affect the traffic patterns in town. On the same topic, the Board has been having discussions with the State DOT about improving traffic safety along the Route 43 / Route 27 corridor. Although many ideas have been proposed, we are still in the exploratory stages.

Mary Hall has agreed to take on the positions of Welfare Director and Health Inspector for the Town. These are difficult positions, and we appreciate Mary's willingness to tackle them. A large vote of thanks is due to Amy Lesniak, who held these positions for many years, and has made herself available to help Mary get started. Thank you, Amy!

The Board agreed this year to accept the Candia Food Pantry as a town food pantry. It is now located in the Town Offices, and may be used by anyone in town who may need food. The Candia Junior Women's Club continues to do most of the administration of the Pantry, making it a very frugal enterprise for the Town. The CJWC has also undertaken the organization of Old Home Day for 2002, so mark September 21st on your calendars!

As always, many thanks are due to our dedicated office staff, other town employees and town officials, and a great many volunteers for their tireless efforts to make Candia a better place to live. And, of course, our thanks to the residents of Candia for the opportunity to serve. The Board has made every effort to be fair and impartial, yet compassionate, in all its dealings. Hopefully, we have succeeded.

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

It has been a year of many changes and world shaping events. September 11th has affected us all, with renewed faith and patriotism as well as increased security and vigilance. It is important for us to support each other in our friendships, families, communities, and nations. We must encourage each other as we plan for the future. Changes have been evident in the Town Clerk's office as well.

This year, I was fortunate to have Cheryl Bond, a long time resident of Candia, agree to be my Deputy. She began training with me in June and has been a very welcome addition to my office. Cheryl has recently completed her Municipal Agent Certification, as well as on line training at the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Speaking of on line training, we are now directly connected to the Department of Motor Vehicles in Concord. You may now obtain Vanity Plates, Moose Plates, certified copies of registrations, replace full sets of plates or order one replacement plate, and even renew vehicles that do not exceed 26,000 lbs. We are excited about providing this new service for you, and hope you will be patient while we are still getting used to the new system. Many of you have expressed a wish that we could check on Vanity Plate availability, and now we can! Now that we are on line, however, **YOU MUST BRING YOUR OLD REGISTRATION TO TRANSFER YOUR PLATES TO A NEW VEHICLE OR RENEW YOUR REGISTRATION.** This is a DMV rule that we must comply with.

On August first, the state fee for passenger vehicles increased by six dollars. For those of you who estimate what you will owe for your registration from year to year, please take this new increase into account. For example, if you used to pay \$31.20 for your state fee, you will now be paying \$37.20.

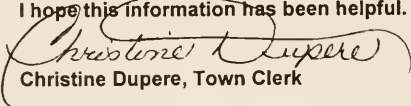
I have also received many questions regarding the new Veteran plate. Regular Veteran and Vanity Veteran plates can be obtained from any Motor Vehicle substation. You must provide a copy of your DD214 verification of service form, NA Form 13038, NAVPERS-553, WD ago Form 53-55, WD AGO Form 53-98, NAVMC 78-PD, NAVCG-2510< U>S> Dept. of Veteran's Affairs (VA) Verification of Service letter, NA Form 1341, or NCG Form 553 indicating you were HONORABLY DISCHARGED. By law, the plates are non-transferable and expire upon the death of the veteran. No transfer credit is allowed. Disabled Veteran plates can only be obtained from the Concord office.

Restoration of our Town Records has been an ongoing process, with another volume completed this year. Our microfilm reader, which we have had for the past seventeen years, has finally died and the Selectmen are budgeting for a new one. The one that is being considered will enable you not only to scan records, but to print the information as well. Those of you who have spent countless hours hand copying the information screen, will be very happy with this news!

Please don't forget that **YOUR DOG MUST BE LICENSED BY APRIL 30TH**. Fees for dogs that have been spayed or neutered are \$6.50, while those that have not are \$9.00. The first dog for someone over the age of 65 is \$2.00, and group licenses for five or more dogs are \$20.00. Make sure you have proof of current rabies inoculation, and group license folks need to bring a rabies certificate for each dog in the group. If you no longer have your dog or he has died, please call me so I may remove him from the list. Avoid large fines and license your pets promptly.

We will be having three more elections in 2002. The Town election and General Election for Executive Councilor will be held on March 12th, the State Primary will be September 10th, and the State General Election will be November 5th. If you need an Absentee Ballot, please call me and I will explain how you can obtain one. Phone 483-5573.

I hope this information has been helpful. I look forward to serving you in 2002.

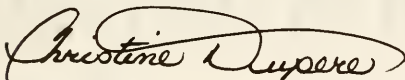

ROAD AGENTS' REPORT

Winter 2001 certainly was one to remember as far as snowfall is concerned. January started off rather quiet, then in February and March it seemed it was never going to stop snowing. It has been quite sometime since we have seen that much snow fall on Candia. This in turn caused our winter line item to be over expended. Along about mid-March I think even the most die-hard snow lovers must have thought enough is enough! I'm sure some people never thought they would ever see their mailbox again, with the mountains of snow we had to push off the roads on a seemingly daily basis. To some, this proved to be true and we apologize to them. We do our best to come within inches of the 1,500 or so mailboxes in town, but sometimes they do fall prey to the wing-plow!

Sometimes the freezing rain and snow fall so fast, it seems impossible to stay ahead of it. We try our best to keep up with whatever mother nature gives us. Drivers need to reduce speed and exercise caution when driving in winter conditions, doing so will help everyone safely reach their destinations. I would like to remind residents that plowing snow across and into the road is not allowed. Motorists should yield to snowplows for everyone's safety. Also, vehicles should not be parked within ten feet of the roadway. Following these few rules can make clearing our roads much more efficient and safe.

Town road projects for 2001 were as follows:

- ◆ Shim and overlay of pavement on Pine Ridge Drive.
- ◆ Grinding of pavement, gravel added, ditching, culvert replacement, and paving of Crittle Hill Road and New Boston Road.
- ◆ Reconstruction of 4/10 of a mile of North Road and 3/10 of a mile of New Boston Road. The project took four weeks to complete. As with any road construction project some inconvenience is likely. We did our best to see that this was kept to a minimum. I wish to thank those who live on and those who travel North Road for their patience during the project.

Town road projects for 2002 are as follows:

- ◆ Final phase of North Road reconstruction.
- ◆ Culvert replacement on Patten Hill Road and Podunk Road.
- ◆ Shim and overlay of pavement on sections of North Road and New Boston Road.

Hopefully, the taxpayers of Candia will continue to support our road rebuilding efforts with funding again this year at town meeting. This is the one capital improvement that the town of Candia has funded for the last 11 years, resulting in upgraded roads that can handle ever increasing traffic.

In closing, I wish again, to thank the various local contractors, who through everyone's combined efforts, has made our road projects reach completion on schedule and within budget, resulting in a great cost savings to the town. We hope to be able to continue to do reconstruction in this manner in the years to come.

REPORT OF THE CANDIA EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

This year I would like to take the opportunity to recognize the efforts and dedication of the men and women of the emergency services that we rely on.

On September 11, 2001, three hundred forty six emergency response personnel perished in New York City, as a result of terrorism. These men and women gave unselfishly of themselves and their families.

Additionally, hundreds of passengers and crew gave their lives, some to avert further disaster. Many of these people had no choice as to their involvement in the events. Still others respond to emergency and crisis daily as part of the "job".

The emergency responder is part of a team of people dedicated to making sure a community is prepared to handle a crisis of any size. The crisis may only effect a small percentage of the community, but is no less important than if it effects the whole community. The overall Emergency Plan establishes a guide for dealing with these emergencies. As with any plan, we try to consider every type of event. There are times when you are focused on one direction, that some event takes you by surprise. This makes planning and responding to emergencies very difficult.

The past year saw members of the LEPC (Local Emergency Planning Committee) working on topics of safe school evacuation and "shelter in place" procedures. In January 2002 many Candia parents received notices from the Moore School of the first "lock down/shelter in place" drill. This will be an ongoing process to insure the safety of our children when attending classes and other school activities.

Also a work in progress is the Town Emergency Plan. Changes in who fills a position and even available resources change from time to time. The past year has led to the further development of guidelines on terrorism and more specifically Anthrax concerns. This plan has been around for many years, and is always being revised.

In closing, I would ask the citizens of Candia to take a few minutes and thank some of the men and women of our emergency response services. The police, fire and medical people who give of themselves and their families daily. Many of them are your neighbors and respond unselfishly when an emergency arises.

CANDIA POLICE DEPARTMENT

This year marked a year in which our freedom and national security was shattered by the tragic events of September 11, 2001. The law enforcement community as well as Fire-EMS personnel, hospital workers, and thousands of volunteer workers across the country were put into service without warning. Our country suffered great losses in the many men and women who gave the ultimate sacrifice to save those who were innocent victims. We extend our thoughts and prayers to all the victims and their families of this tragic event.

The Candia Police Department recorded one of the busiest years in 2001. Our department answered approximately 5,942 calls which reflects nearly a 22% increase from the previous year. The increases came in the way of, domestic violence, criminal mischief (vandalism), DWI arrests and assaults.

Another contributing factor, which kept our agency busy, was in the way of minors in possession of alcohol and DWI arrests. For this reason, the Candia Police Department applied and was approved for our first Intoxilyzer, which measures the amount of alcohol in a persons system who is suspected of driving while intoxicated. With the expected arrival to be in February, this system will undoubtedly lessen the time in which officers are taken from patrol duties to process these individuals. This will allow the officer to get back on the street more expeditiously. For these reasons we have asked the Board of Selectmen to support renovations within the current complex to better accommodate our expansion needs.

This year we added two additional part-time officers to the staff. Officer Richard Clement and Officer Anthony Laforge. Officer Clement resides in Hooksett with his wife and children. Officer Clement is a Firefighter/EMT-I with the City of Manchester. Officer Laforge resides in Manchester with his wife and family. Officer Laforge works for YDC in Manchester. Both officers are currently receiving training at the Part-time Police Officer Academy. They will start their field training in mid- February upon completion. We welcome them to our staff.

We continue to be approved for state and federal grants which have assisted us in a variety of ways in cost savings. On the federal level, we were able to secure nearly \$400 dollars in grants to assist us in the purchase of ballistic vests worn by the officers. On the state level, we received grants for DWI detection, speed enforcement, bicycle safety and car seat safety/inspections.

Community Resource Officer Scott Gallagher has been very busy. Officer Gallagher is now certified as a Car Seat Safety Inspector through the National Highway Safety Board. As a result, citizens can call upon Officer Gallagher and arrange an appointment for him to assist in the proper placement and installation of children's car seats. Candia Police Department is now recognized by the State as a Car Seat Safety Inspection Checkpoint. The Candia Police Department also has car seats on hand should the seat be found, during routine inspections, to be non-compliant or non-conforming. The replacement seat would be given out free of charge. Officer Gallagher is also busy with the DREAM program, working closely with staff at the Henry Moore School. We will continue to offer such programs such as Neighborhood Crime Watch and Home Security checks.

We would like to thank all of the citizens of Candia and others for your generous gifts, prayers or heartfelt "thank you's" given to our officers not only during the tragic events of September 11, 2001, but all year through. We remain committed to the people of Candia and strive everyday to improve our services. Lastly, I would like to say thank you to the men and women of the Candia Police Department, who every day make the department a well-respected and professional agency. I would also like to thank the Candia Board of Selectmen for their continued support all year.

CANDIA CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

During the year, the Commission considered several wetlands applications and notifications. Much of the activity this year centered around working together with the Planning Board and the Southern NH Planning Commission (SNHPC) to develop an Open Space Plan based on the Natural Resources of the town. A public meeting was held on September 18 for SNHPC to present the Plan.

The Commission presented a warrant article at the 2001 Town Meeting that proposed to increase the percentage of Land Use Change Tax going into the Conservation Fund from 25% to 50%. The article was amended from the floor to increase the percentage to 100%. It passed overwhelmingly. These funds will be used to protect open space, thus maintaining the rural character of the town.

In the spring two members of the commission (Fowler and Snow) attended a workshop sponsored by UNH Cooperative Extension once weekly for 10 weeks to learn how to use the ARCVIEW software to develop Geographic Information Systems (GIS) maps. The software was given to the town for its use in developing future maps, similar to those prepared by SNHPC for the Open Space Plan.

In May the Commission sponsored a public presentation by UNH students. They had worked on a resource inventory of the Ward Brook area of the Lamprey River during the spring '01 semester. The inventory will be used for the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program application, which we are in the process of developing.

Commission members wrote letters to urge the state legislature to support the legislation to fund the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP), which subsequently was passed and funded.

One Commission member (Lindsey) attended a 3 ½ day course sponsored by UNH Cooperative Extension in September. She is now an official Coverts cooperater (joining Betsy Kruse).

On October 19-20 the Commission co-sponsored the highly successful community profile, "Envision Candia," along with the Planning Board and the School Board. Several of the commission members were active in the planning and implementation of the event.

During October and November three members of the CCC (Fowler, Kruse, and Lindsey) attended a workshop once weekly for 4 weeks. It was co-sponsored by Bear-Paw Regional Greenways and the UNH Cooperative Extension, and provided information about protecting land through conservation easements.

In December the Commission heard a presentation by another group of UNH students who had worked with the Open Space maps prepared by SNHPC. They had developed a proposal for priority lands in Candia that should be designated for conservation.

In the fall Commission members, together with Deerfield Conservation Commission, met with a representative from the Rockingham County Conservation District to discuss the potential impact of widening I-93 on the two towns. We listed those lands that would be of highest priority to protect from possible future development.

Two new full members (Lindsey and Lamie) and one new alternate member (Seward) were added to the Commission this past year. Presently the members of the Commission are: Mabel Brock, Edward Fowler (Chairman), Paul Lamie, Dennis Lewis, Judi Lindsey, Betsy Kruse (Vice-Chair), Judy Seward (alternate), Dick Snow (alternate and Secretary), and Dick Weeks.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

In 2001, the Town of Candia adopted a building code and with it came a significant amount of permits for building/construction. In the year 2000, there were 165 permits issued and in 2001 there were 158 issued.

Of the 158 permits issued in 2001, they were as follows: 29 for new homes, 1 commercial building, 23 garages or barns, 24 additions, 21 for electrical work & services, 11 for pools, 14 for decks & porches, 16 for sheds, 9 remodeling & renovations (5 residential & 4 commercial), and 7 for miscellaneous items or repairs.

Some of my duties have included the following: inspections of group homes, day care facilities and private homes (if a complaint has been sent to this office), as well as inspections for faulty septic systems, water tests. I work closely with the New Hampshire Department of Health and Welfare. Locally, I report to the Board of Selectmen with any specific problems.

If you need to reach me with a specific health department issue, you may telephone the Office of the Selectmen at 483-8101 and leave a message for me.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The Town of Candia, through its Welfare Department, offers its residents temporary assistance for basic needs. It is operated under specific State and Town guidelines that regulate the expenditure of monies.

This year, we were able to make the holidays special for those less fortunate families in Town. At Thanksgiving, we were able to provide twenty-nine families with food baskets that included a Thanksgiving dinner, as well as nine for the elderly. At Christmas, we were able to provide food baskets and gifts for members of thirty-two families with a total of forty-six children.

Without their help, the food baskets would never have been a reality. As with last year, your overall financial support of the department from the community was terrific. This support provides us with the operating expenses and the apparatus purchases to continue to improve your Fire Department. Other funding support for building improvements, small equipment upgrades and special projects come from our continued fund raising efforts. Some of our fundraisers this year included our Annual Fund Raising Letter, Holiday Breakfast, Deerfield Fair Breakfast and our Christmas Tree sales. We are pleased to report that our Christmas Trees sold out at a record pace. It not only shows your financial support, but also the support for your local firefighters.

These individuals continue to receive no financial compensation for the countless hours they expend in training, station duty, and responding to calls at all times, in all types of weather. REPORT OF THE SMYTH PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Library was visited by Candia citizens more than 11,000 times during 2001, an average of 211 users each week. Almost 24,000 books and other materials were loaned during the year.

Smyth Library is open 30 hours per week during July and August, and at least 34 hours a week the rest of the year. Our collection of carefully selected books, books-on-cassette, and videos now totals over 18,000 units, most of which you are able to enjoy in your home. We also provide a quiet environment for reading, study and research.

Other library services include a quality copier and fax transmissions, two public *Mediaone* internet access stations, word-processing computer, reference department, including encyclopedias to take home, more than 40 magazine subscriptions, art prints to borrow, and free passes to the *Currier Gallery of Art* and *Seacoast Science Center*. Our website, www.smythpl.org allows you to search our entire collection, and see what you've checked out and when they're due, right from your own home. Link to *Proquest*, a comprehensive research database. Ask us about getting books from any other library via Interlibrary Loan.

Our annual non-competitive Summer Reading Program encourages year-round reading with special incentives. Three to five-year olds enjoy our weekly *Storytime* throughout the year. Watch for special cultural programs throughout the year. Ask us how you can join the *Friends of Smyth Public Library*.

And watch for the new Smyth Library, scheduled to break ground in Spring of 2002, next to the funeral home. Thanks again for your continuing support toward a quality small-town library!

2001 Fitts Museum Annual Report

The Fitts Museum celebrated its 100th year as Candia's Town Museum this past summer. A well-attended cake and ice cream anniversary party was held on the grounds by the museum trustees, with assistance from the Candia Historical Society, the Friends of the Library, the Candia Junior Women's' Club, the Spinners and Dyers Guild, the Fitts Museum Foundation and many other friends.

There were games for the children, and craftspeople demonstrating and exhibiting rug braiding, basketry, old tin ware, broom making, shingle making, quilting, bee keeping and spinning. Inside the building were exhibits of early photographs and maps, works of various Candia artists and writers, vintage clothing, Civil War artifacts and the tools of various early trades. The loom room demonstrated the process of turning flax to linen. Even the weather cooperated in making it a memorable event.

Other special days were the hosting of the Historical Society's June meeting and our two yearly events for the fourth graders; a trip to the Lewis Farm during maple syrup making season and a tour of the museum in the fall.

This year, the ongoing program of conservation included the framing of five maps and paintings, repair of two wooden articles and some binding repair on one large volume. Three historical documents were sent to specialists for deacidification and framing.

The building received its share of attention as well, getting a fresh coat of paint on its south side, and the installation of dehumidifiers to help with the dampness problem. The Trustees purchased a portable restroom. With rental costs so high now, it is more economical to own than to rent.

Additions to the collection were numerous again this year, too many to list entirely. Among them were books, photographs and textiles, a corn grinder, a 46 star American flag (1908), a pre-Revolution burl cream skimmer and the "railroad" stove that once warmed the Candia Depot station house. We are grateful to all those who have donated pieces of our Town's history, and we appreciate their thoughtfulness.

Plans for 2002 include painting and papering the hallway upstairs and down, having additional electrical and carpentry work done, sending a painting out to be professionally restored, renovation of the tool room, and continuing our conservation efforts on the collection.

There is work to be done on the building itself, including improving the gutter system, reinforcing a chimney area, closing in the foundation on the rear addition of the museum to deter animal visitors (to date we have had skunks, opossums, foxes and woodchucks take up residence), additional cellar improvements and a possible security system.

Some interesting programs are being planned to begin our next 100 years, and we invite you to join us on Saturday afternoons in July and August from 1:00PM to 4:00PM. Other hours can be arranged by contacting one of the Trustees. There is no admission charge. It is your museum, do come and enjoy it.

**REPORT OF THE
SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION**

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has a wide range of services and resources available to help the dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants who are selected for the specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of your appointed representatives, the Commission staff designs and carries out programs of area-wide significance that are mandated under New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local projects which would pertain more exclusively to your community.

Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of your Planning Board and/or the Board of Selectmen. The Commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects that are of common interest and benefit to all member communities, keeps your officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation and offers training workshops for Planning and Zoning Board members on an annual basis.

Services that were performed for the Town of Candia during the past year are as follows:

1. Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series. These meetings were attended by Candia officials.
2. Conducted traffic counts at sixteen (16) locations in the Town of Candia. Data was forwarded to the Town's Planning Board Chair.
3. Sponsored a legal discussion on the "Simplex Technologies vs. Town of Newington" case which was adjudicated by the NH Supreme Court. A number of Candia officials attended. A videotape of the proceedings and an associated paper authored by Attorney Drescher were forwarded to the Candia Planning Board.
4. Attended the Layout Commission hearing on the NH Route 43/NH Route 27 Signalization Project and continue to work with the NHDOT toward the completion of that project.
5. Prepared an open space plan for the Town.
6. Provided data to the Natural Resources Department at UNH, which was engaged in conducting a Natural Resource Inventory for the Town.
7. Conducted a vehicle speed classification study for the locations proposed by the Town.

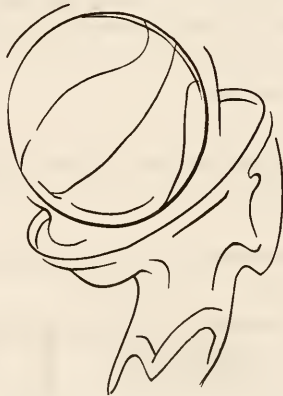

AMERICAN RED CROSS

In 2001, the Manchester Chapter American Red Cross provided our Community CPR course to seven kids. This 6.5 hour course taught them how to recognize and care for breathing and cardiac emergencies, call EMS, find and correct potential hazards in their home, prepare for emergency situations, and how to stay healthy to reduce risks of heart disease. Upon completion of this course, the 7 participants earned a Community CPR Certificate. We look forward to again offering this course and other courses in 2002.

Disaster Services provides disaster relief to those affected by house fires, floods, hurricanes and other disasters. Red Cross Manchester responded to one fire in Candia, providing emergency needs to one family of 7 people. Over \$770 was provided to the victims for emergency relief. Emergency services may include food, shelter, clothing and medical supplies.

Emergency aid to military personnel, veterans, and their families is one of the primary responsibilities of the American Red Cross. It includes family counseling, emergency communications, travel arrangements, and financial assistance.

CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES

Child and Family Services would like to express its appreciation to the residents of Candia for their continuing support. Town support, combined with other funds has allowed us to offer a variety of free or low cost services to Candia children and families who would otherwise be unable to afford them. No one is ever denied service because of inability to pay.

In the last year we served 30 Candia residents who received 117 hours of service. We ask for continued support for the year 2002 in the amount of \$1,000.00. Some of the available services include:

Family and Children's Counseling Professional social workers provide counseling services that utilize individual and family strengths to address a wide variety of problems including death, divorce, substance use, abuse and neglect, and other social and mental health issues. Counseling services strengthen the health of the community by assisting families in overcoming the debilitating problems that weaken the family structure and impede a child's healthy development.

Parent Education Courses are designed to help parents learn the skills necessary to address the challenges of parenting so that they can raise healthy children in loving and respectful families. Throughout the year, evening courses are held in local communities to accommodate the needs of working parents.

Adoption Services help insure that children being adopted are placed with good families who are prepared for parenting and ready for the unique joys and challenges of raising an adopted child. Services are also available after the adoption is final for adoptive parents, their children and birthparents.

Parenting Plus home based program that helps at risk families learn parenting skills and effective ways to cope with the stresses of family life.

Healthy Families this is a brand new program being offered. Healthy Families provides medical support and social services to low-income pregnant women and their children. Services are designed to improve the health of the baby and mother and to provide the support families need during the crucial first months of an infant's life. Services provided by an interdisciplinary team of medical, social work, and education professionals offer support throughout pregnancy and the first year after birth.

Child Health Support workers assist families who have abused or neglected children to help solve the problems that led to the abuse or neglect and to strengthen the family.

Family Skill Builder provides short-term, in-home education and support regarding budgeting, household management, parenting and other issues to families at risk of abuse or neglect.

Parentline A toll-free phone number linking parents to CFS social workers who answer child rearing questions, provide support, direction and appropriate referrals for further assistance.

Group Home provides long-term residential care and emergency overnight shelter for youth between the ages of 13 and 18.

Family Life and Community Education Staff are available to speak to the interest of community groups regarding behavioral health issues.

REPORT FROM THE LAMPREY HEALTH CARE

Lamprey Health Care provides a variety of services to residents of your community. Lamprey Health Care has been providing service for 30 years to our communities. We are very proud of this achievement and wish to thank the citizens of your community for your continuing support so that we can continue to provide service to our neighbors and communities. We are asking for level funding in the amount of \$3,750 for the upcoming year.

The Senior Transportation Program operated by Lamprey Health Care is one of the most important services provided to residents of the area. The busses provide necessary transportation for food shopping, for medical appointments, the pharmacy and for recreational trips. Residents are picked up at their homes and are assisted with bundles and with shopping if necessary. The Senior Transportation Program is affiliated with COAST.

All seven of the busses operated by this program are handicapped accessible. Special appointments which cannot be incorporated into the specific routes serving your area are arranged through the Transportation Coordinator and a group of volunteers. The Program almost operates as a "Friendly Callers" program in that the seniors who ride are in contact with the program, and if not, they are checked on to be sure everything is all right. The Transportation Health Workers (Drivers) from the program also do necessary errands for their riders if they are unable to do them due to illness, etc. This program does a great deal toward keeping our elderly population healthy, independent and in their homes.

The medical services provided by Lamprey Health Care include primary medical care, health promotion and education and social services. Increased capacity in both our Raymond and our Newmarket centers allows Lamprey Health Care to serve the residents of our local area in a timely and efficient manner. Staffing for both Centers includes seven Board Certified Family Physicians and one Pediatrician. Five Nurse Practitioners and a support staff of Registered and Licensed Practical Nurses, a Dietician, a Diabetes Educator and Community Health Workers round out the medical team. Medical care provided includes prenatal care, adult medicine and geriatric medicine, as well as, screenings and follow up for various medical conditions including an emphasis on breast & cervical cancer through our Women's Wellness program.

Lamprey Health Care has a primary mission to provide for the total health needs of the residents of our service area. From prenatal to geriatric care, from primary health care to transportation for seniors, we take great pride in the services provided to the communities we serve.

RETIRED AND SENIOR VOLUNTEER PROGRAM REPORT

The Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) offers older adults a meaningful life through volunteer services that is responsive to community needs. RSVP provides opportunities for persons age 55 and over to serve on a regular basis in a variety of settings throughout their communities.

RSVP volunteers serve through a variety of organizations, agencies, and institutions designated as volunteer stations. The stations include courts, schools, libraries, day-care centers, hospitals, nursing homes, economic development agencies, and other community service organizations. Volunteer service include adult basic education, mentoring, tax aides, consultation services, community policing, low-cost weatherization and home repair, classroom aides, health care and substance abuse counseling, respite and in-home care, environmental surveys, telephone reassurance, and many other services.

RSVP functions under the auspices of an established community service organization with funding support and technical assistance provided. It is administered by a federal agency called the National Senior Service Corporation and has been sponsored by the Portsmouth Housing Authority since 1973. There are seven RSVP's in New Hampshire. We are the largest program in the state. We do not have a rate or fee schedule and our volunteers do not receive a stipend. Being a total volunteer program, we do not generate income. Funds to support the programs of RSVP are provided by grants, local town appropriations, and private contributions.

We are requesting \$200 in financial assistance from the Town of Candia for the 2002 fiscal year to help offset the enormous cost of the program. Each year the cost of administering the Program rises and unfortunately funds from the towns are being reduced. Our RSVP volunteers service without compensation but are eligible for personal and excess automobile liability insurance, transportation assistance, and participation in our yearly formal recognition luncheon. Your financial assistance will allow us to continue these benefits.

ROCKINGHAM NUTRITION & MEALS ON WHEELS PROGRAM

Primary Services

1. Types of Services provided this past fiscal year and currently.
 - A. **Group (congregate) meals:** well-balanced, hot and delicious noon meals that meet 1/3 daily caloric and nutritional needs of the older person. These meals were provided to Candia residents (60 years and older & their spouses) from various local meal centers. Monday through Friday.
 - B. **Meals on Wheels:** provides the same well-balanced, hot meals as the congregate program, but these meals are delivered to the homes of the elderly and handicapped residents of Candia. There are age, disability, and/or income criteria for this service. Drivers go to each person's home, deliver the meals perform small tasks for the person, if needed, and report any noticeable change or problem to the site manager. The meals are geared to the elderly and are low fat, low sodium, with diabetic substitutions available. For Meals on Wheels clients whose situations warrant it, we can also provide weekend meals (canned or frozen), night meals, frozen holiday meals, and canned "Blizzard Bags" to be used during the winter when the driver is unable to deliver meals due to inclement weather.
 - C. **Transportation Services:** provided by RNMOW staff and volunteers transporting the elderly to and from the Epping Community Center for meals.

Support Services

1. Types of Services provided:
 - A. **Information:** refers to the information that is given to the clients via a RNMOW employee, and includes monthly menus with health tips; agency newsletters, which contain health and elderly issue news; announcement; flyers, etc.
 - B. **Referrals:** made to the Visiting Nurse Association, Division of Elderly and Adult Services, hospitals, Community Action agencies, RSVP, and other service organizations to help mobilize resources to aid in the independent living of the client.
 - C. **Outreach:** efforts made to inform the community and the elderly about our services in order to reach the truly needy.
 - D. **Activities:** "extras" that are provided for the clients. These include guest speakers to cover topics such as Medicare, Social Security, Estate Planning, Nutrition and others of interest to our senior citizens; entertainment; remembering clients with small gifts at holiday time, etc.
 - E. **Service Time:** time spent in direct service to clients such as bringing in or opening mail, getting newspapers, picking up prescriptions, shoveling snow, emotional support to clients in crisis or with special needs.
 - F. **Home Visits:** refers to the visits that the site manager makes to a client's home. All homebound clients receive home visits. Reasons for the visits include: completion of an intake application on a new client; completion of a predetermination assessment on a client already receiving meals; to check on a sick client having problems, etc.

SERVICE FOR YOUR TOWN RESIDENTS:

Last fiscal year (7/1/00 – 6/30/01) we served 10 Candia residents on a continuing basis, an estimated 989 meals and provided 808 units of support services. We are requesting continued support in the amount of \$532.00.

REPORT OF ROCKINGHAM COMMUNITY ACTION SERVICES

Rockingham Community Action (RCA) is a private, non-profit organization. Our mission is to prevent, reduce, and work toward the elimination of poverty. RCA has been addressing these needs for thirty-five years.

Greater Raymond Community Action Center is an outreach office of RCA that serves residents of Candia and 12 other communities, and as such acts as Candia's central resource for information regarding all available human services. RCA also offers intake, clinic and distribution sites in over half of the county's thirty-seven communities for the application and provision of various Community Action services.

Community Action provides a wide range of services that are unduplicated elsewhere in the county. Many of our services meet immediate, critical needs, while others are designed to help families achieve long-term economic self-sufficiency. The following services were provided by Community Action to eligible residents of Candia from July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001:

- 43 households received one of a group of Fuel Assistance Programs.
- 3 households were enrolled in Workforce Development.
- 1 home received Housing Rehabilitation & Energy Conservation services through the Weatherization or Energy Management Programs.
- 1 Family Day Care child and child care provider participated in the Family Child Care Program.
- 8 childcare referrals were arranged through the Child Care Resource and Referral Program.
- 42 individuals received help through the WIC or Commodity Supplemental Food Programs.
- 1 child was enrolled in Head Start.
- 18 individual food allotments were provided through the Emergency Food Assistance Program.
- 1 household received Crisis Services (emergency grants to low-income households for rent, mortgage, electricity, fuel or other basic necessities)
- 3 individuals received help through the Health Insurance Counseling, Education and Assistance Services.

In addition to these major programs, much of our staff time is devoted to working with people who come to us seeking help. During the past year, we logged 59 calls or visits from Candia residents, many of which were crisis calls involving evictions or foreclosures, fuel or utility problems, the lack of food or clothing, or general financial needs. By working closely together with local and state welfare administrators, landlords and mortgage lenders, fuel and utility companies, other human service agencies and interested clergy and civic groups, we are able to link those in need with the services available to them.

The services provided by our staff, together with the programs provided by our agency, have a direct and significant effect on Candia's welfare budget. If our services were decreased due to lack of funding, the town would experience a resulting increase in requests for local welfare assistance.

Since the services we provide greatly relieve the towns we serve of the full financial burden of providing for the needs of their low-income residents, we ask every community we serve to make a financial contribution to our agency based upon the level of service we have provided to its residents.

The Town of Candia has contributed to our agency for many years, and we extend our appreciation to you for your continued support. We are asking for your continued support in the amount of \$6,129.00.

Since opening our doors in January 2000, we have served over 400 children and their families in Rockingham County. We have provided Candia with services for three children and their families.

The mission of the Seacoast Child Advocacy Center is to protect children. We do this by providing a safe environment for the evaluation of child abuse and exploitation, coordinating services to victims and families and preventing future abuse through community education. Our goals are to:

- ◆ To create a neutral place where interviews and services for abused children is provided.

Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Candia has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Candia as of December 31, 2000, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Candia taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Candia. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

In planning and performing our audit of the Town of Candia for the year ended December 31, 2000, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We are pleased to report that, during the course of our review of internal controls, no material weaknesses in the Town's accounting systems and records were identified. Minor weaknesses or other considerations coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or recordkeeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to applicable individuals during the course of our audit fieldwork.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

The Annual Town Meeting was declared to be in session at 9:05 AM. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, Moderator Ronald Thomas discussed the basic ground rules to those assembled. Town Officers at the table were introduced: Christine Dupere, Town Clerk, Ken Goekjian , Selectman, Brien Brock, Selectman, Carolyn Emerson, Budget and Finance Officer, Mark Hardy, Selectman, and Dawn Brasley, Selectmen's Secretary. Ingrid Byrd was recognized for a presentation, on behalf of the School Board, thanking Sis Richter for Twenty Five years of service as School District Treasurer. Brien Brock was also recognized for several presentations. Mark Laliberte was presented with a plaque for his service as Director of the Summer Recreation Program, as well as a plaque for Patrick Simpson for his service to Summer Recreation. Cheryl Stevens was presented with a plaque for her years of service as Treasurer. Ron Caswell was presented with a plaque for his eleven plus years of service as Town Building Inspector. Mark Hardy and Ken Goekjian presented a plaque to outgoing Selectman Brien Brock for ten years of service to the Town.

Selectman Brock was recognized for a point of order. He wished to move articles 3 through 11 together. There was no objection from the floor. Chief McPherson was recognized to explain what Article 11 contained, since this was a new addition to the warrant this year.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Two Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$200.00)** in continuation of its support of the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Four Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars and no cents (\$422.00)** in continuation of its support of the Greater Manchester Chapter of the American Red Cross.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$500.00)** in continuation of its support of the Child and Family Services of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Five Hundred and Thirty-two Dollars and no cents (\$532.00)** in continuation of its support of the Rockingham Nutrition & Meals on Wheels Program.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,400.00)** in continuation of its support of the Area Homemaker Home Health Aide Service.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand, Three Hundred, Forty-six Dollars and no cents (\$3,346.00)** in continuation of its support of Rockingham Community Action.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$3,500.00)** in continuation of its support of Lamprey Health Care.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand, Eight Hundred and Twenty-eight Dollars and no cents (\$3,828.00)** in continuation of its support of the Visiting Nurse Association of Greater Manchester & Southern New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$1,000.00)** in support of the Seacoast Child Advocacy Center.

There was no objection to move all the articles at once. Motion was made by Mr. Brock, seconded by Mr. Goekjian. Vote was by a show of ballots. **ARTICLES 3 THROUGH 11 WERE ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$3,500.00)** to support perpetual care of the Town's cemeteries. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Superintendent of Cemeteries. Motion was made by Brien Brock, seconded by Mark Hardy. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 12 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00)** for the Fitts Museum. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. Motion was made by Brien Brock, seconded by Mark Hardy. There was no discussion on the article. Vote was by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 13 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to increase the percent of land use change tax which is allocated to the Conservation Commission Fund, created pursuant to RSA 36-A:5 by the 1990 Town Meeting, from 25% to 50%. Motion was made by Mark Hardy, seconded by Ken Goekjian. Ed Fowler was recognized to speak to the article. The land use change tax states that 10% of the current market value will go to the Town. This fund is to help protect open space, with the cost of land rising dramatically. The Conservation Commission and Planning Board are working on the Natural Resource Inventory and Master Plan, and are asking that the assembly vote for this article to help protect open space and preserve the rural character of the Town. Jon Godfrey wished to offer the following amendment: To see if the Town will vote to increase the percent of land use change tax which is allocated to the Conservation Commission Fund, created pursuant to RSA 36-A:5 by the 1990 Town Meeting from 50% to 100%. The amendment was seconded by Judy Szot. Rick Mitchell stated that open land saves a lot of money, and strongly advocates this amendment. All lands which are Town owned, under the care of the Conservation Commission are available for public use. There was no further discussion. The assembly moved to a vote on the amendment. Vote was by a show of ballots. Article 14 is Amended. There was no further discussion on the amended article. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 14 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Five Hundred dollars and no cents (\$500.00)**, and to place said funds in the expendable general fund trust fund known as the Playground Maintenance Fund, established pursuant to RSA 31:19-a at the March, 1998 Town Meeting. The purpose of this fund is for replacement of the surface of the playground and upkeep of equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. Motion was made by Brien Brock, seconded by Ken Goekjian. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 15 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Fifteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$15,000.00)** for the replacement of Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). To be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Fireman's Association, Inc. Motion was made by Mr. Goekjian, seconded by Mr. Brock to accept the article as read. Chief Les Cartier, demonstrated the new self-contained pack. These packs help reduce the stress to the firefighters, improves their capabilities and increases their safety. The money will purchase approximately six units. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 16 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Fifty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$50,000.00)** to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1991 Town Meeting, for the future purchase of fire apparatus and equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Ken Goekjian, seconded by Brien Brock. Rick Swain, President of the Firefighter's Association spoke to the article, explaining this is an ongoing request every year, to spread the cost of large ticket items over several years. There was no additional discussion. Vote was taken by secret ballot. YES; 231 NO; 33 **ARTICLE 17 WAS ADOPTED.**

Rick Swain was recognized for a few announcements on behalf of the Firefighters. He recognized Adam Warshaw who won a silver and a bronze medal at the world Special Olympics world competition in Alaska. Les Cartier also received a special award from the Governor.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Sixty-Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$68,500.00)** for Fire Suppression, Prevention, and Emergency Medical Service to the Town of Candia. The monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Fireman's Association, Inc., and to be received as follows: Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$35,000.00) on or before April 30, 2001, and the balance on or before July 10, 2001. Motion was made by Mr. Goekjian, seconded by Mr. Brock to accept the article as read. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 18 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum **not to exceed One Thousand, One Hundred, Ninety-nine dollars and no cents (\$1,199.00)**, the amount being the balance of funds which were received by donation for the DARE Car, and to place said funds in the expendable general fund trust fund known as the DARE Car Maintenance Fund, established pursuant to RSA 31:19-a at the March, 1999 Town Meeting. The purpose of this fund is to provide for the repair and maintenance of the DARE car with the Selectmen appointed as agents. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Mark Hardy, seconded by Brien Brock. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 19 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Thirty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$30,000.00)** to cover the reimbursable costs associated with Police activities, including but not limited to Police Special Details and grant programs. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. The motion was made by Mark Hardy, seconded by Ken Goekjian. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 20 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$12,500.00)** for the purpose of upgrading the radio communications for the Police Department. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. Motion to accept the article as read was made by Mark Hardy, seconded by Brien Brock. Chief Tom McPherson spoke to the article. The system will enable the officers to talk to all the agencies in the State of New Hampshire. With the grant monies it gives the town a significant savings. If an officer is down, after 3 minutes, it will emit a signal to alert the department. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 21 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Hundred Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$100,000.00)** for the third phase of reconstruction on North and New Boston Roads beginning at the intersection of North and New Boston Road going east approximately 3/10 mile and westerly on North Road approximately 4/10 mile. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. The motion was made by Brien Brock, seconded by Ken Goekjian. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 22 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Eighty-Four Thousand, One Hundred, Five Dollars and no cents (\$84,105.00)** for the operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library. Said funds are to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Smyth Public Library Association. Motion was made by Ken Goekjian and seconded by Brien Brock to accept the article as read. There was no discussion. Vote was by Secret Ballot. YES: 270 NO: 30 **ARTICLE 23 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Four Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$425,000.00)** for the construction and original equipping of a new Smyth Public Library and to authorize the withdrawal of **Two Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$225,000.00)** from the Smyth Public Library Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose under RSA 35:1 at the March 1995 Town Meeting. The balance of **Two Hundred Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$200,000.00)** is to come from general taxation. Motion was made by Brien

Brock, seconded by Ken Goekjian. Rick Mitchell spoke to the article, explaining the library would truly have something for everyone. The majority of the money has been acquired from fund raising and donations. There will be a separate meeting room available to residents. The location of the building will be at 55 High Street. The library will be taking a minimum area at the front corner of the lot. The old library would be deeded to the Town, with a stipulation that the building may not be disposed of without a vote of the Town Meeting. Brien Brock asked for the authority of the Board of Selectmen to rent the building out for income purposes. When the question if this article also includes the accumulated interest of the reserve fund, and the reply was it did not, Richard Snow moved that the article be amended to include the accumulated interest. The amendment was seconded by Charles Bowman. Following a brief discussion, the amendment was put to a vote by a show of ballots. **THE AMENDMENT WAS ADOPTED.** Discussion of the article as amended continued. The State fire code now requires a storage tank as well as sprinkler system. The interest will probably be used for the fire suppression system. Following the discussion on the amended article, Vote was taken by Secret Ballot. YES: 266 NO: 61 **ARTICLE 24 WAS ADOPTED.** Motion to block reconsideration of the article was made by Polly Rounds, seconded by Richard Snow., with the vote taken by a show of ballots. Reconsideration of the article was restricted.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$75,000.00)** to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1995 Town Meeting for the future expansion of the Smyth Public Library. **This article to be withdrawn if Article #24 passes. ARTICLE 25 FAILED FOR LACK OF A MOTION.**

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$25,000.00)** for continued construction of baseball field fencing and soccer field lighting at the CYAA Raymond Road complex. Motion to accept the article was made by Brien Brock, seconded by Ken Goekjian. Steve Cogswell was recognized to speak to the article. Mr. Cogswell displayed plans of the completed work as well as work in progress. Following the presentation, a brief discussion ensued. Larry Stacy explained the CYAA is in process of subdividing a piece of land to help pay off the mortgage debt. However, the debt now will include a field house which will be able to support sports year round such as indoor soccer. The CYAA is also raising money from corporate donations, selling of topsoil, sale of land, and food sales at the concession stand. There was no additional discussion on the article. Vote was by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 26 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Fifteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$15,000.00)** for the purpose of updating the Master Plan and the Capital Improvement Plan. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Planning Board for that purpose. Motion was made by Ken Goekjian, seconded by Brien Brock to accept the article as read. Our current Master Plan was formulated in 1986. With the growth of the Town, the Planning Board is looking to hire professionals to help update the Master Plan. Chris Closs was recognized for additional discussion. He stated the Master Plan and Capital Improvement Plans are important policy and working documents for communities to use, to manage and accommodate future development, while at the same time conserving and protecting natural and historic resources. No work has been done on the plan since 1996. The Planning Board is charged by RSA to compile this document. The subcommittee decided it was in the best interest of the town to enlist professional help to formulate the plan, with Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission and the university of New Hampshire to assist. These documents are needed to support our local land use regulations and zoning ordinances. Under state law, we have an obligation to provide a range of housing opportunities for all income levels. A consultant would be hired to help the planning board for approx. 12,000.00 for the master plan, and approx. 4,000.00 to be used for the capital improvement plan. Mr. Sieminski added that on Tuesday, the town voted to adopt impact fees, under state law, this cannot be done without a Capital Improvement Plan. There was no further discussion. The vote was taken by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 27 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of constructing a community center and to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00)** to be placed in this fund. Further, to appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend said funds. Motion was made by Brien Brock, seconded by Ken

Goekjian. Mr. Brock stated this center is something the Town needs, since we already have approximately \$50,000.00 invested in plans, he urged support of the article. John Messler proposed to amend the article by reducing the amount to \$25,000.00, seconded by Richard Snow. Vote on the amendment was by secret ballot. YES: 160 NO: 70 The amended article was adopted. Several citizens expressed concern over the expenditure at this time, including Mr. Plausky, who asked " What else do we need? " There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by secret ballot. YES: 58 NO: 148 **THE AMENDED ARTICLE 28 FAILED. A motion to restrict reconsideration was made by Ingrid Byrd, seconded by Barbara Bowman. Vote was taken by a show of hands. Reconsideration of the article is restricted**

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to donate the building and a portion of the Town-owned land located on High Street, identified as Tax Map 404, Lot 064, to the Candia American Legion Post 91 for their use as their post home on such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen may prescribe. If the Candia American Legion Post 91 was to dissolve, this property would revert back to the Town. Joseph Silveira was recognized by the chair to withdraw this article. The Moderator declared **THE ARTICLE FAILED FOR LACK OF A MOTION.**

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will designate Flint Road from the intersection of Libbee Road to the intersection of Route 101 a Scenic Road in accordance with the provisions of RSA 231:157. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.) Mr. Torrey moved the article, seconded by Mr. Bowman. Mrs. Torrey explained this article would protect the large trees and the stone walls. There was no further discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 30 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town wishes to amend the existing agreement under Section 218 of the Social Security Act by excluding the services performed by election workers for a calendar year in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$1,100. The \$1,100 limit on the excludable amount of remuneration paid in a calendar year for the services specified in this modification will be subject to adjustment for calendar years after 2001 to reflect changes in wages in the economy without further modification of the agreement, with respect to such services performed during such calendar years, in accordance with Section 218(c) (8)(B) of the Social Security Act. Motion was made by Mark Hardy, seconded by Brien Brock. It was explained this article, if enacted, would help with paperwork reduction. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 31 WAS ADOPTED.**

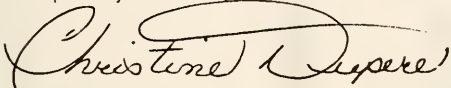
ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Million, Two Hundred Seventy-Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$1,278,000.00)** which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include articles previously addressed. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. Mr Hardy moved the article to One Million Three Hundred Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,316,500.00), seconded by Brien Brock. The Selectmen then explained budget increases to those assembled. Ingrid Byrd presented an amendment to fund the budget at \$1,278,000.00, seconded by Judy Szot. Following a lengthy discussion, Mrs. Byrd requested that the question be moved, seconded by Frank Albert. Vote on moving the question was accepted by a show of ballots. Vote on the amendment was taken by a standing vote. YES: 74 NO: 82 **THE AMENDMENT FAILED.** There was no further discussion, vote was taken by a show of ballots. **ARTICLE 32 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 33: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Given under our hands and seal, this seventeenth day of March in the year of our Lord, Two Thousand One. The following traditional posts and officers were chosen by voice vote:

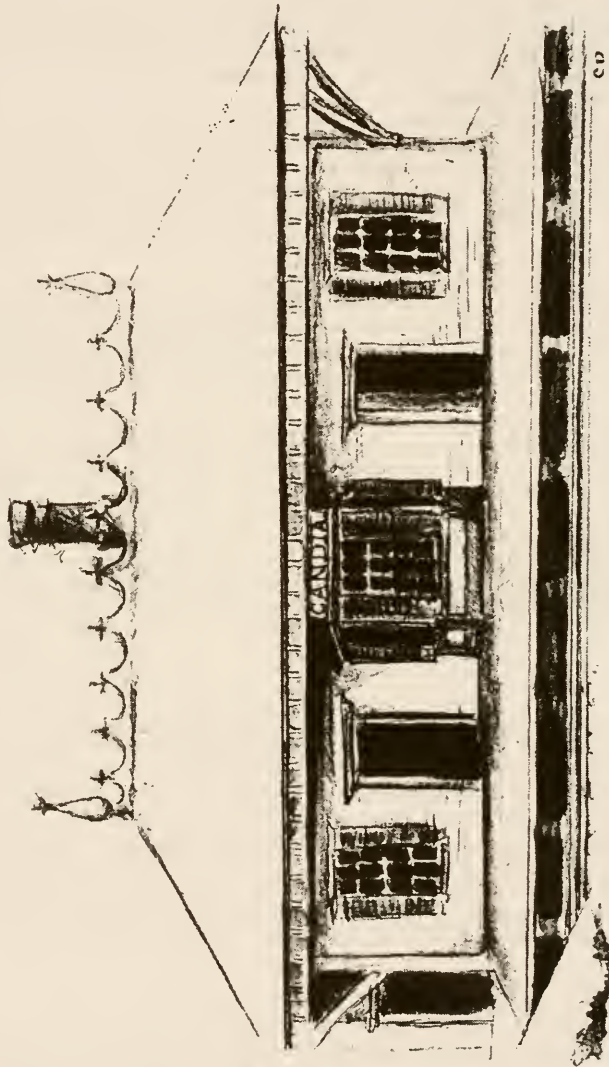

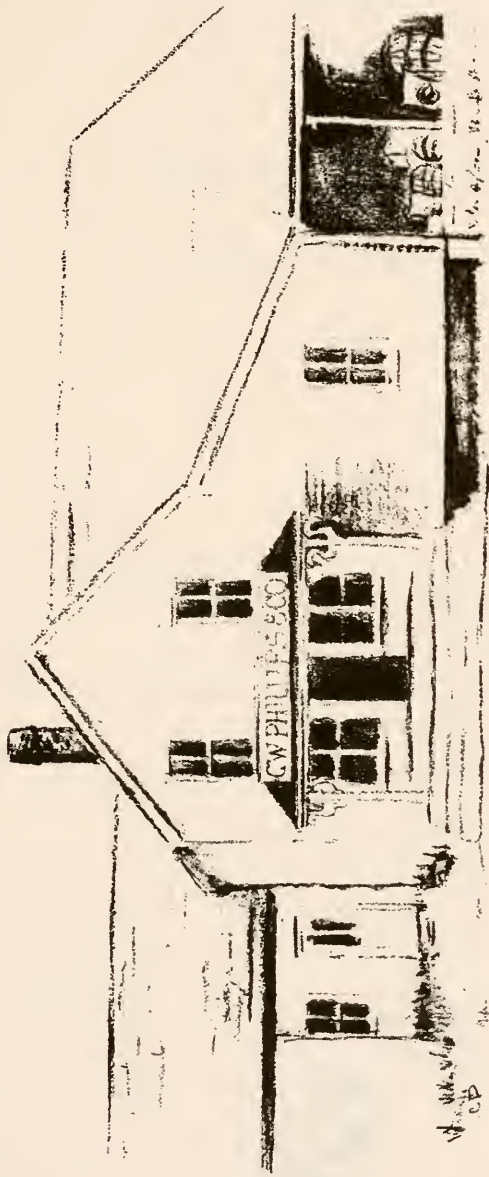

**ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
TOWN OF CANDIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE
MARCH 24, 2001**

Moderator A. Ronald Thomas declared the Annual School District Meeting for the Town of Candia in session at 10:01 a.m. Moderator Thomas mentioned that last year the legislature in its wisdom passed an RSA, which allowed the moderator the power to, in case of bad weather, postpone the meeting to a time and place certain. He further mentioned that obviously this was not March 10, 2001, but legally it was. The March 10, 2001 meeting was postponed to March 24, 2001 at 10:00 a.m.; therefore being at the appointed place at the appointed time, he declared the meeting in session. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, led by Chairman Margolin, Moderator Thomas reviewed the rules of order. He introduced the School District Officers and Staff as follows: School District Clerk, Aline Hammerstrom; Chairperson of the School Board, Barry Margolin; Vice Chair of the School Board, Kevin Farley; Dr. Richard A. Zang, Clerk of the Board; Ingrid Byrd, School Board Member; William Zarges, School Board Member; Edward Caito, School Board Member Elect, out in the audience. He mentioned other District Officers as: Sis Richter, School District Treasurer; John P. Foss, Principal of the Henry W. Moore School; Andy Bilodeau, Assistant Principal; Robert A. Suprenant, Superintendent of Schools; Eric H. Wigode, Assistant Superintendent of Schools; Sally D. Waterhouse, Business Administrator; Maria Suprenant, Director of Special Education; and, Mr. Robert Leslie, Attorney for the Candia School District. Mr. George Comptois was serving as Assistant Moderator for the day. The Ballot Clerks were: Mildred Farrell, Alice Kenney, Rita Goekjian, Mary Girard, Judy Szot, Dave Ramsey, Linda Thomas, Carla Penfield, Al Hall and Kathy Binns.

Moderator Thomas mentioned that unless there was an objection from the floor, persons: Wigode, Suprenant, Foss, Suprenant, Waterhouse and Leslie (all non-registered voters) would be recognized to speak for informational purposes.

Chairman Margolin was recognized. He presented a plaque to Mr. Farley in gratitude for his distinguished service to the School Board. Mr. Farley said that it was a pleasure to serve on the Board.

Consideration of the Warrant was begun:

ARTICLE 1: Mr. Zarges **Moved** that the District vote to accept the factfinder's recommendations dated January 30, 2001 for a collective bargaining agreement between the Candia School Board and the Candia Education Association, and approve the cost items associated therewith, which call for the following increases in salaries and benefits in the years indicated:

<u>Year</u>	<u>Estimated Increase</u>
2001-02	\$ 92,909
2002-03	\$111,468
2003-04	\$110,627
2004-05	\$107,265

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of ninety-two thousand nine hundred and nine dollars (\$92,909) for the 2001-02 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increases in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. (Not Recommended by School Board) Mr. Farley **Seconded**.

Lengthy discussion ensued.

The School Board and the Factfinders reached an impasse over money. The School Board did not recommend this proposal, which was why they were bringing it to the voters. This was the result of hard work by negotiations and teachers and input by disinterested parties, the mediator and the Factfinder.

One board member had a problem that some of the things that needed to be considered were not. An effort to combine the salary ranges was considered outrageous. The salary ranges were from \$1,500 to \$4,000. Members had hoped that the union would have picked up more of the insurance costs. There was disappointment with the state achievement tests.

Another board member mentioned that dollar goal amounts had been overrun. The School Board did not want to go over five percent (5%). Starting salary for new teachers is low and they need competitive salary to attract new teachers. All five (5) school board members wanted to increase the starting teacher's pay. It was mentioned that it is well known that Candia has good teachers.

One voter mentioned that his children had done quite well in the schools in Candia. One of his children was on the honor roll and the other on the dean's list.

A voter raised concern regarding the \$20,000 figure for negotiations. He was told that about \$5,800 of that money had been expended so far.

They basically seemed to want to get rid of longevity, which they did with the Factfinder's Report and they wanted to bring up the bottom end of the teacher's salaries and still remain fiscally responsible.

Lengthy discussion both pro and con continued.

Mr. Plausk **Moved** the question. There was a show of ballots to vote on the question. The **Ayes** had it.

Moderator Thomas explained that if you voted yes, you adopt the Factfinder's Report, if you voted no, you go back to negotiations. The polls were declared open.

Results of Article 1, by secret ballot, Yes – 58, No – 104, the Article was Defeated.

Mrs. Byrd was recognized for a point of order to restrict reconsideration of Article 1. Mrs. Richter **Seconded**.

Moderator Thomas asked if anyone wished to speak to restrict reconsideration of Article 1. The Vote was taken by a **SHOW OF BALLOTS**. The **Ayes** had it. Reconsideration is **RESTRICTED**.

ARTICLE 2: Mr. Margolin **Moved** that the District accept the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers as published in the annual school district report and placed on file. (Recommended by the School Board) Mrs. Byrd **Seconded**.

Results of Article 2: The Vote was taken by a **SHOW OF BALLOTS**. Article 2 was **Adopted**.

ARTICLE 3: Mrs. Byrd **Moved** that the District raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be added to the Building Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund and to authorize use/transfer in that amount from the June 30, 2001 fund balance. (Recommended by the School Board) Mr. Farley **Seconded**.

Results of Article 3: The Vote was taken by a **SHOW OF BALLOTS**. Article 3 was **Adopted**.

ARTICLE 4: Dr. Zang **Moved** that the District raise and appropriate the sum of one million, one hundred and one thousand five hundred eighty-four dollars (\$1,101,584) for the payment of Regular Education High School Tuition. If this warrant article is accepted a like sum will be reduced from the budget in Article 8. (Recommended by the School Board) Mr. Margolin **Seconded**.

Results of Article 4: The Vote was taken by a **SHOW OF BALLOTS**. Article 4 was **Adopted**.

ARTICLE 5: Mr. Farley **Moved** that the District vote to purchase a security alarm system and to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand three hundred forty-four dollars (\$10,344) for this purpose. (Recommended by the School Board) Mr. Zarges **Seconded**.

Results of Article 5: The Vote was taken by a **SHOW OF BALLOTS**. Article 5 was **Adopted**.

ARTICLE 6: Moderator Thomas read that the District authorize the Candia School Board to negotiate a sixth-to-eighth grade tuition agreement with the intent to transition into a cooperative arrangement with the Auburn School District.

Mrs. Byrd **Moved** that Article 6 be **Tabled**. Auburn voted down the school. There is nothing to discuss. Mr. Zarges **Seconded**.

Results of Tabling Article 6: The Vote was taken by a **SHOW OF BALLOTS**. Article 6 was **Tabled**.

Under a point of order, Mr. Sargent proposed removing Article 6 from the Table and Amend Article 6 to eliminate Auburn.

Mr. Sargent **Removed Article 6** from the Table for purposes of amendment. Mr. Robidoux **Seconded**. The Article is **Removed** from the Table for the purposes of Amendment. (Originally, Mr. Sargent attempted to Amend Article 7 with the following amendment. **Seconded** by Mr. Robidoux. The amendment was withdrawn and Mr. Robidoux withdrew his Second, since it was better suited here.)

Amendment to Article 6, Mr. Sargent **Moved** that the District direct the Board to consider long range plans for the district's high school and middle school needs. This activity would compliment and become part of the current facility committee efforts to address space and program needs. Among the items considered would be collaborative or cooperative efforts with similar sized towns, with the view of creating strategic alliances that will effectively serve the students and citizens of Candia. Mr. Hammerstrom **Seconded**.

Dr. Zang mentioned that Mr. Margolin said that we do not need this, the group is already working on this. Mr. Sargent is trying to be resolutely sure of it, going to vote for it.

The Amendment to Article 6 was taken by a **SHOW OF BALLOTS**. Article 6 is **Adopted** as Amended.

ARTICLE 7: Mr. Zarges **Moved** that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-three thousand dollars (\$53,000) for the set up and for the lease of one double-wide modular classroom unit, for the purpose of providing classroom space for foreign language instruction and one fourth grade classroom. (Recommended by the School Board) Mr. Farley **Seconded**.

Discussion followed. Secret Ballot was requested.

Mr. Snow **Moved** to Amend to say lease or purchase. Add such other means as the Board deems appropriate. Mr. St. Martin **Seconded**.

Mr. Zarges urged the community to vote no on the Amendment.

The Amendment **Failed**.

Lengthy discussion on the original Article 7 followed.

Paula Kiley suggested **Moving** to a Vote. The polls were declared open on Article 7. The polls were declared closed. The meeting was called back to order.

Results of Article 7: The Vote was taken by secret ballot, **12 – yes, 112 – no**. The Article is **Defeated**.

ARTICLE 8: Moderator Thomas read Article 8, as follows: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five million three hundred seventy-eight thousand four hundred sixty-one dollars and forty-six cents (\$5,378,461.46) for the support of schools, payment of salaries and benefits of district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. If Article 4 is accepted, a like sum will be reduced from the budget in this article. (Recommended by the School Board)

Mr. Farley **Moved** the Article as read with the new number of **four million two hundred and seventy-six thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven dollars and forty-six cents (\$4,276,877.46)** Mr. Zarges **Seconded**.

Discussion followed.

Article 8 Discussion: Mr. St. Martin spoke. The budget as presented has nothing for further negotiation, but looking to the future because we voted that way if there is nothing for negotiation and there are going to be negotiations, something will have to be taken out of line item. Mr. Margolin mentioned that we have \$14,000 left over for negotiations at the current time. Mr. Zarges interjected that if that money is not expended by June 30, 2001, it needs to be turned over to the town. Last year it was \$20,000.

Mr. St. Martin offered to **Amend** to increase the amount from \$4,276,877.46 plus \$20,000 to \$4,296,877.46. Mr. Ducharme **Seconded**.

Discussion followed.

Results of the Amendment to Article 8: The Vote was taken by a **SHOW OF BALLOTS**. The Amendment **Fails**.

Move to Vote on the original amount of \$4,276,877.46.

Results of the voting on Article 8: Almost unanimous, the Article is **Adopted**.

Dr. Zang **Moved to Adjourn**. Mrs. Byrd **Seconded**. A voice vote was taken. All were in **Favor**. The School District Meeting of the Town of Candia was **Adjourned** at 1:46 p.m.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 2001–2002

The Henry W. Moore School welcomed the students and staff with anticipation and much excitement this fall. New teachers and additional personnel have joined the staff this school year – Ms. Joanna Aleksy, Mrs. Joyce Igo, Ms. Danielle Sylvain, Mrs. Eileen Suckley, Mrs. Lisa Werner, Mrs. Brenda Anderson, Mrs. Tricia Stout, Ms. Beth Droziak, Ms. Karena Allen, Mr. Joseph Grise and Mr. Ernest LaRoche. We formally welcome them to our school community!

Each new school year brings with it an opportunity to set district and school goals to assist us in our continuous improvement of the school district's mission. The school district identified goals for the 2001-2002 school year that focus on curriculum, instruction, programs, practices, and procedures that enable us to pursue our mission. Outlined below are the Candia School District Goals (Priority LEIP Goals) and the Henry W. Moore Building Goals:

1) Grade level content standards will be identified and student progress toward those standards will be effectively communicated. (LEIP Goal #2)

Henry W. Moore Building Goals

- Building Literacy Across the Curriculum
 - Continuing focus on English Language Arts and utilization of the ELA Curriculum Guide
 - Develop common program agreements (ie: rubrics, focus correction areas, technology, Performance Standards and grade level expectations)
 - Coordinate existing materials and resources (ie: reading/language arts books and materials, John Collins Writing Program)
 - Identify grade level content standards in Math
 - Review, evaluate, and connect to materials and resources
- Improve reporting of student progress towards standards

2) The School District will provide a personalized education for all students. (LEIP Goal #7)

- Meet the needs of individual learners through appropriate instructional programs and practices
- Develop and utilize a program of assessments to identify student strengths and weaknesses and to inform instructional practices

3) Faculty and staff will participate in professional development activities that are focused around local goals and in which the emphasis is placed on student learning outcomes. (LEIP Goal #8)

- Link established goals to a focused professional development plan and to teacher evaluation procedures

4) Students will use technology effectively as tools for the advancement of learning throughout their lives. (LEIP Goal #9)

- Improve and increase the integration of technology (aligning with grade level curriculum standards and proficiencies) into all aspects of learning

Much has been accomplished to date with respect to the above district and building goals. Last year the teachers identified English Language Arts grade level content standards and proficiencies aligned to the state standards and are currently involved in the implementation of this curriculum through instruction and assessment, incorporating technology as an instructional tool to enhance and support student learning. A standards-based Math curriculum and program description was developed this year and a process for analyzing materials and resources to implement the revised curriculum has begun. A revision of the drafted Science standards and proficiencies is scheduled to begin this spring.

You might be asking yourself, “What does a Standards-Based Curriculum mean and how does this impact my child’s education?” It means...

- The focus of instruction shifts to the learner and what we want each student to know and be able to do.
- The curriculum is aligned with established standards, proficiencies, and grade level expectations for **all** learners.
- It sets the stage and direction of instruction for all programs.
- **ALL** children will be supported to reach/EACH child will achieve desired outcomes.

The K-8 teachers have also worked individually, in grade level teams, and in grade level clusters to comprehensively implement the John Collins Writing Program. The Collins Writing Program is an approach to writing instruction that incorporates a variety of writing and thinking strategies to improve student writing from initiating writing to revising writing. Part of this process involved the identification of grade level focus correction areas (FCA’s) for student writing which were completed this year. FCA’s provide a focused and strategic approach that asks students to pay special attention to a few critical aspects of a given writing project. Teachers have participated and will continue to participate in professional development to support the implementation of this writing approach throughout the grade levels and across content areas.

The goal-setting process the school has been involved in is instrumental in making changes in the direction that fit the long-range plan for our school district. The staff will continue with this important work throughout the school year and the next. It is an immensely challenging and significant time in education and we embrace the opportunity to learn, grow and positively impact student learning in our school.

Emergency Management planning and preparedness has been an additional focus of the students and staff this school year. As a school we have worked to become more informed, more active, and more involved with local community services and state agencies to develop and implement a comprehensive emergency management plan. In addition to the regularly practiced ‘traditional’ emergency evacuation drills, the students and staff participated in a ‘non-traditional’ drill — a lockdown. The fire, police, and town representatives assisted the school staff in developing procedures for this drill. Our meetings also resulted in the discussion and evaluation of our traditional drill procedures and in the preparation and organization of other non-traditional drills. We view all of our emergency drills as a learning opportunity and a necessary practice in our continued effort to maintain the security of the building and safety of our students and staff.

As a part of our school security measures, we would like to take this time to commend the parents and visitors to our school for their cooperation in the use of visitor’s passes and with our revised parent pick-up dismissal procedures. We continue to strive to make our school secure and safe for all of the students, staff, and community volunteers.

It is with sincere pleasure that I have had the opportunity to join the Moore School and Candia community. The staff has been a tremendous support and I look forward to continued collaboration in providing our students the highest quality education possible. Moore School is also very fortunate to have a dedicated and committed group of parents, volunteers, and community members helping the students, teachers, and school in any way they can. Thank you!

**CANDIA SCHOOL DISTRICT
REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
2001-2002**

It is my pleasure to submit this annual report as your Superintendent of Schools to the citizens of Candia. It truly has been an interesting school year.

Long before our school doors opened in August, the Candia School Board and administration were developing plans for the education of our students. In June, we welcomed new Principal Michelle Carvalho to the Moore School, replacing John Foss. Ms. Carvalho brings a strong background in curriculum development and school leadership to our school community. The School Board and administration held a full day retreat on June 20th and established the following goals: 1) identification of curriculum content standards, 2) continued efforts to provide a personalized education for all students, 3) continued faculty participation in professional development activities that emphasize student learning outcomes, and 4) expand our efforts to insure that students will make effective use of technology as a learning tool. These objectives, based on our Local Education Improvement Plan (LEIP), serve to guide our 2001-2002 school activities.

Two major issues, beyond our LEIP goals, have highlighted the school year. The first is the termination of the tuition agreement between the Manchester School District and the sending communities. While we continue to negotiate for a contract with Manchester, the termination has sparked Candia's interest in the study of a cooperative school district. The work of Candia's Cooperative Planning Committee, comprised of Ed Caito, Karen Smith, and Dick Snow, has been tireless. These three individuals are to be highly commended for their work in presenting an alternative to an agreement with Manchester. The second issue relates to efforts to provide a personalized education for all our students. As such, the School Board has formed a committee comprised of teachers and administrators to study alternatives to our Readiness program. This committee will respond to the following three focus questions; 1) What are we asking children to be ready for? 2) What alternative screening instruments are available? 3) What do we need to do to support students so that they can remain with their peers? The committee will report their findings to the School Board in November of 2002.

As we conclude the budgetary process with our annual district meeting, it is clear that there are unique and critical school issues facing our school community. These issues cannot be resolved without a spirit of respect and genuine collaboration from all involved as we seek to provide a quality education at an affordable cost for our youth. Thank you.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Candia School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2001 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Candia School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Candia School District as of June 30, 2001, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Candia School District taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Candia School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

SCHOOL BOARD CHAIR'S REPORT

To the Residents of Candia:

As always seems to be the case, this past year has been extremely busy and full of challenges and changes at the local and SAU level.

The March 2001 meeting saw the approval of the 2001-2002 operating budget by a healthy majority. Voters rejected the fact finders report for a new three-year contract with the teachers.

We began the new School Board year with one newly elected board member and a full agenda including but not limited to; contract negotiations with the teachers, the city of Manchester concerning the high school tuition, the recommendation from the Facilities Committee, the full evaluation of our readiness program and a new principal.

In October, at a special school district meeting, we saw the creation of a Cooperative Committee to study the feasibility of partnering up with other towns concerning high school. Also, the special school district meeting allowed the board to present a one-year contract to the community, which passed with a healthy majority.

In December, the school board discussed the readiness program at the Moore School. The board endorsed the recommendation of the Superintendent to study the best way to meet the needs of our children. The committee is to make their recommendations by May 2002.

In February the School Board and the teachers reached an agreement on a new three-year contract that will be presented at the annual School District Meeting, while negotiations with the city of Manchester continue to reach a new high school tuition agreement.

The coming year will be very challenging for the Board and all those concerned with continuing our efforts to improve as an educational community. The budget presented this year shows a small increase in spending after much work to present a responsible request to you, the voters. Our request for increased spending reflects very long and hard choices about the areas, which we, as a Board, believe will benefit our students the most. We ask you to support our budget, and to continue your commitment of time and energy to our school to make it the best it can within our means.

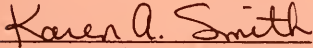

Rockingham Cooperative School District Planning Board

On Wednesday night, December 5, 2001, the towns of Auburn, Candia, Deerfield and Fremont formally joined to form the Rockingham Cooperative School District Planning Board. This action was the first joint step by the four towns in the legal process of establishing a cooperative school district. The enthusiasm shared that night, by this board, about the opportunities that this partnership represents, is even stronger now than it was then. This combination of four neighboring small towns will allow us to equitably share the costs of providing a superior level of education in a cost-effective manner. We will be able to provide facilities that will be under our control, large enough to offer a comprehensive curriculum, while still maintaining the atmosphere of a small school.

Each of the four communities come to the table with a rich history of active support of their local schools. Each town is now paying tuition costs for its high school students and sending them out of town. Each town faces a tuition agreement that ends in 2003. Each town owns and operates an elementary school servicing either grades K-8 or 1-8. Auburn, Deerfield and Fremont are currently using modular classrooms to deal with overcrowded buildings. While Candia has not yet had to resort to modular classrooms, they are using modulators for storage and have had proposals before their school district meeting for modular classrooms and for tuitioning their middle school students to Auburn.

Each town is primarily a bedroom community with no public water or sewer, minimal commercial/industrial tax base and each town uses the town and school district meeting form of local government. None of them come under the SB2 law. They share a sense of urgency based on the current overcrowding in their schools and the termination of current high school tuition contracts. Each town overwhelmingly supported the investigation of a cooperative proposal.

Our first job as your RCSD Planning Board was to produce Articles of Agreement for your approval at your annual school district meeting this March. The Articles of Agreement document is the contract that establishes the terms and conditions for governance when the district is formed. Your vote this March, approving the Articles of Agreement, will legally establish your Rockingham Cooperative School District, servicing grades 6-8 and 9-12. Your next step will be to elect school board members to your Rockingham Cooperative School Board sometime in April or May of 2002. That cooperative school board's first action should be to formulate the budget, for your approval as a voter in the newly formed cooperative school district, that will allow them to develop the formal plans and specifications for building the facilities necessary to educate the children in grades 6-8 and 9-12 within the RCSD. Each individual preexisting school district's school board will remain active and in governance over their budget and their facilities until the July 1 of the year that RCSD facilities are built to accommodate our 6-8 and 9-12 students.

The Articles that we are presenting for your approval were unanimously approved by your cooperative planning board. They were then formally approved by the NH Board of Education. We are confident that they will serve all of us well. We have also worked to develop recommendations for the cooperative district's master plan, estimates of capital costs for the building of facilities, and operational costs for those facilities, based on averages within the state. We have held Public Hearings and informational forums in each of the four towns, with the goal of giving you the clearest picture that we can of our recommendations for the future of education in our towns. Your vote, approving the Articles of Agreement, will give us the opportunity to move forward and form the Rockingham Cooperative School Board that can take our recommendations and cost estimates and your suggestions to formulate a building proposal. Your support for that future proposal will make our shared dream of enhanced educational opportunities for all our children a reality.

The members of your Rockingham Cooperative Planning Board team has spent many hours over the last several months gathering, deciphering and reformatting an enormous amount of information for your review. We understand that you will have a great deal of information presented to you on a variety of options. We hope that we have provided information that is clear, concise and comprehensive so that you may make an informed decision about our proposal. We ask for your support at your school district meeting.

1. To see if the School District will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 195 (as amended) providing for the establishment of a cooperative school district, together with the school districts of Auburn, Deerfield, and Fremont, in accordance with the provisions of the proposed articles of agreement filed with the school district clerk. (Recommended by the School Board)
2. To see if the District will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Candia School Board and the Candia Education Association which calls for the following increase in salaries and benefits:

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty thousand two hundred thirty-six dollars (\$60,236) for the 2002-2003 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increases in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. (Recommended by the School Board)

3. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-seven thousand four hundred dollars (\$57,400) for the design and construction of the Smyth Public Library access road, from the school property through to 55 High Street. (Recommended by the School Board)
4. To see if the District will accept the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers as published in the annual school district report and placed on file. (Recommended by the School Board)
5. To see if the District will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be added to the Building Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund and to authorize use/transfer in that amount from the June 30, 2002 fund balance. (Recommended by the School Board)
6. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of one million ninety-six thousand one hundred sixty dollars (\$1,096,160) for the payment of Regular Education High School Tuition. If this warrant article is accepted a like sum will be reduced from the budget in Article 7. (Recommended by the School Board)
7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five million, five hundred seven thousand, five hundred sixty-eight dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,507,568.25) for the support of schools, payment of salaries and benefits of district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. 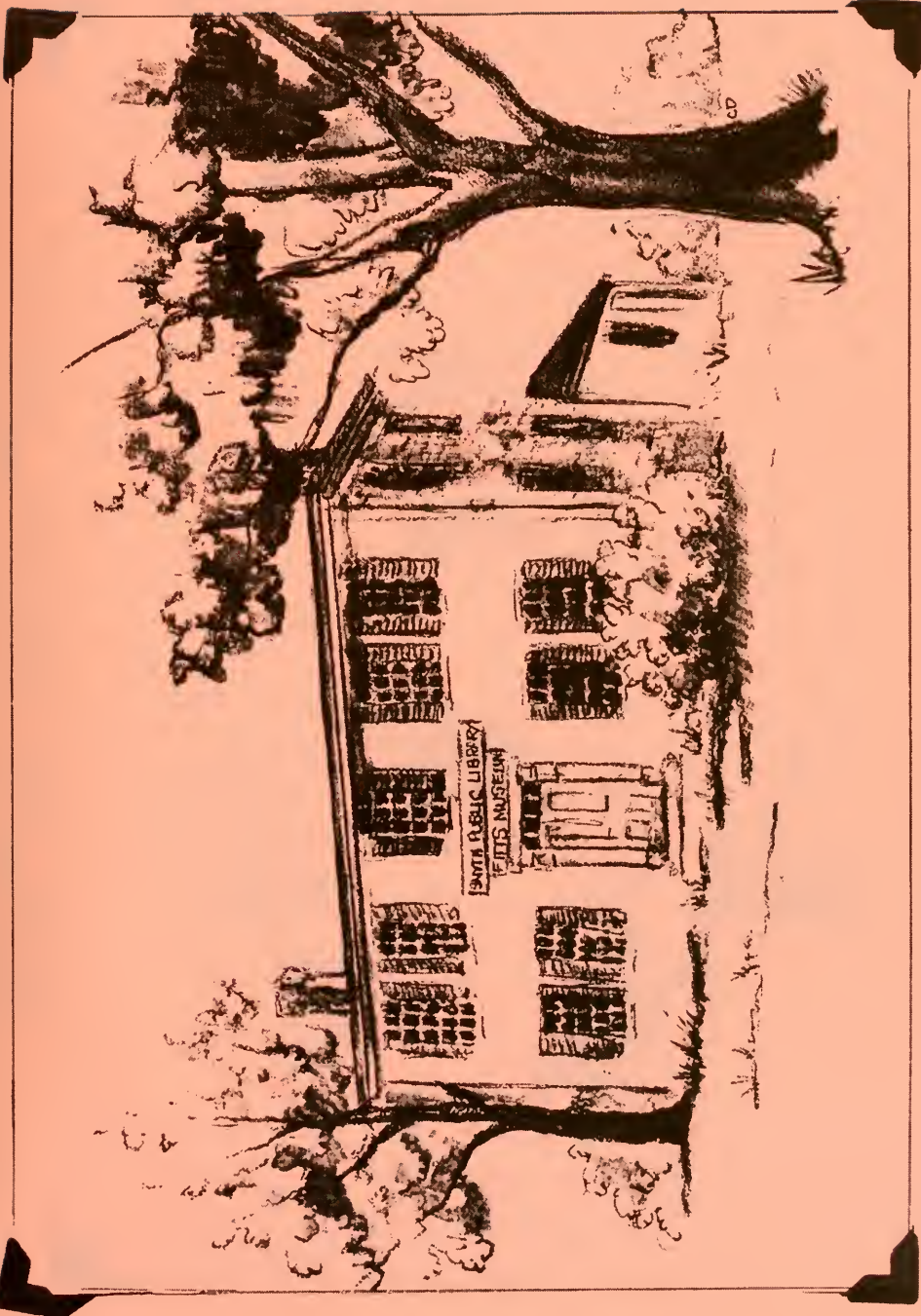

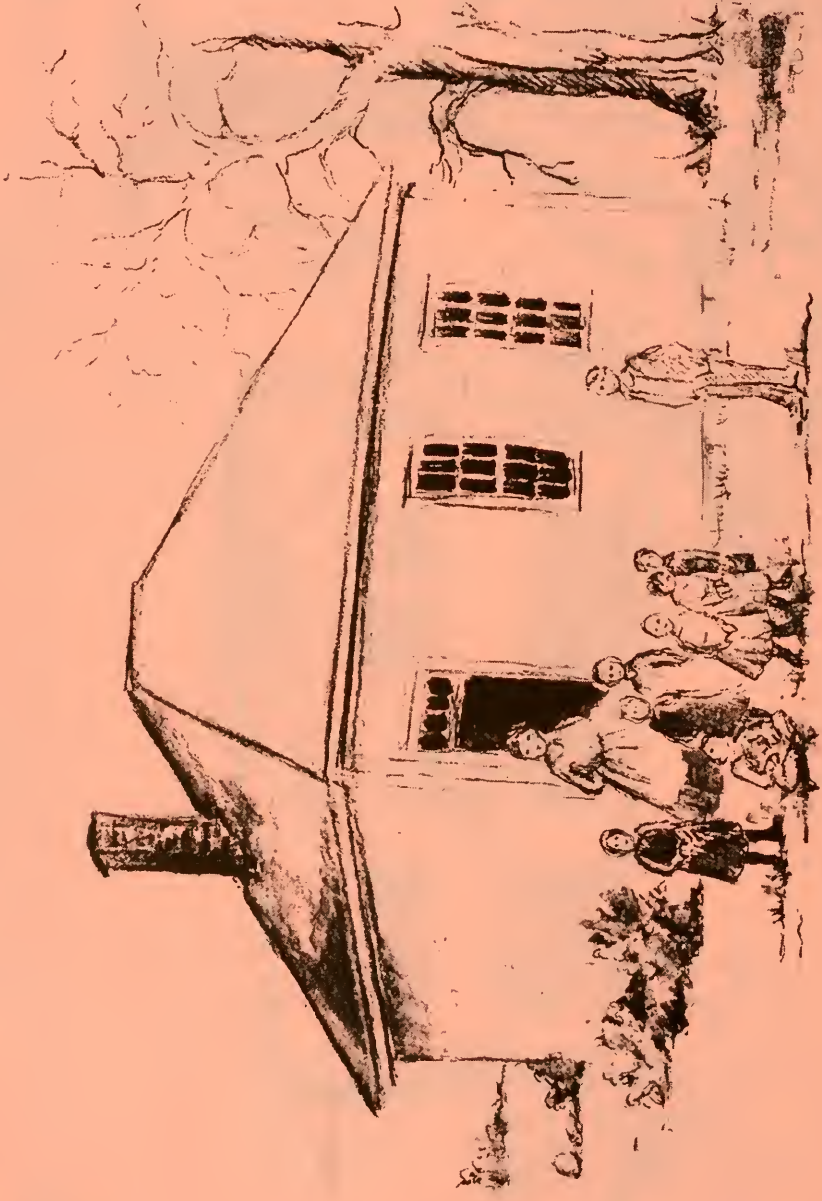

BURNING REGULATIONS

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times, except when the ground is not completely covered with snow.

Permits will not be issued for the kindling of open fires between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining and the Forest Fire Warden is notified and grants permission to burn in the rain. Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc..., must be obtained on the day the burning is to be done. Permits for properly-constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from the Candia Forest Fire Warden or a Deputy Forest Fire Warden by calling, toll free, 639-7179 and leaving a voice message with your call back number, or you may reach them at the phone numbers listed below. Permits may be obtained between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day the burning is to be done.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.00. Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.00.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Department and the Town of Candia Forest Fire Department.

Notice to the citizens of the Town of Candia. Please be advised that effective immediately, the State of New Hampshire no longer allows the Forestry Departments within the state to issue individual "incinerator" permits for the purpose of disposing of or burning of household refuse or trash. Presently the Forestry Department is allowed to issue "burn barrel" permits for this purpose for the year 2002 only. January 01, 2003 a new state law takes effect that does not allow any type of permit be issued for the disposal or burning of household refuse or trash except by DES licensed facilities. "Burn Barrel Permits" will be allowed, for the disposal of by burning, only the following items: clean paper, clean untreated lumber, brush up to five inches in diameter, grass and leaves. Some of the common items that will not be allowed to be burned in "Permitted Burn Barrels" or any "outside fire" are, but not limited to, cardboard, plywood, magazines, furniture, carpet, wood that has paint on it or is treated, plastics, general household trash or refuse.
