All dogs have to have their rabies shots before getting a license. Then the owner should take their rabies shot certificates to the town clerk and get the license through the months of April and May. After July 1, all dogs without a license will have to be done away with.

466:31 Dogs as a Menance.

1. Any person who considers a dog to be causing a nuisance or to be a menance to persons or property may make complaint to any law enforcement officer or to the selectmen of the town in which such dog is kept, and such officers shall, within three days after the receipt of such complaint, investigate the case, and if the complaint is sustained, shall forthwith order the owner or keeper of such dog to abate the nuisance. Service of such order shall be made upon the owner or keeper of such dog by causing a certified copy of such order to be delivered to him. Any owner or keeper upon whom notice of such order has been served, may, within ten days thereafter, bring a petition in the municipal or district court for the town or city, as the case may be, praying that the order be reviewed by the court. After notice to the investigating officers, and upon hearing the court shall affirm, modify or dismiss such order, as justice may require. During the pendency of such action and the order of the justice of the court, the owner or keeper of such dog shall restrain such dog from running at large. Any person who neglects to restrain such dog from running at large, in compliance with orders hereunder shall be fined not more than twenty-five dollars, the dog taken into custody by the police of the city or constable of the town and such disposition made of the dog as the court may order.

II. Under this section, a dog is causing a nuisance or is a menace to persons or property under any of the following condition: (a) if it barks continuosly for sustained periods of time; (b) while it runs at large on the streets or on property other than its owner's, it turns over garbage cans or waste containers, or otherwise causes garbage or waste to be scattered in yards or on streets or sidewalks; (c) while it runs at large it barks at or snaps at or runs after persons walking on sidewalks or streets, or at persons riding bicycles on sidewalks or streets; (d) while it runs at large it barks at or runs after motor vehicles being driven along the streets; (e) while it runs at large it gathers in packs with other dogs and runs with the pack after game, domestic animals, or human beings; (f) while running at large it digs or scratches in gardens or around cultivated areas, so as to uproot or destroy the growing plants, shrubs, or trees; (g) while in heat is unconfined.

466:36 Killing Dogs.

Any conservation officer may kill any dog found in the act of maiming or in close pursuit of deer, moose, caribou, sheep, cattle, swine or poultry. No civil action for recovery of damages shall lie against any conservation officer while acting under authority granted herein. The owner or owners of any dog or dogs caught in the act of maiming or in close pursuit of deer, moose, caribou, sheep, cattle, swine or poultry, may be fined not more than three hundred dollars.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The reappraisal of the Town was finally completed this year by the Tax Commission appraisers. The reappraisal showed a considerable increase in values and particularly in land values; the total net valuation on which the tax rate is computed being brought up from \$3,442,721.00 to \$7,737,760.00. The cost of reappraisal was somewhat more than had been estimated and there was an overdraft on this item in the budget.

We wish to thank Arthur and Peg Densmore and all the others who had a hand in redecorating and improving the inside of the Town Hall, also the PTA for their donation of \$100.00 towards this work.

Heavy rains during the summer caused extensive washouts in various parts of town. Some of the roads being completely washed out. This together with the rising cost of parts and maintenance accounts for the large overdraft in the Highway Department.

The bridge at the Mills has been completed and has the same load limit as that on State Highways.

Duncan Fund money was used to prepare the road bed on the Jackson Road for tarring and the tarring was done with TRA funds.

Last year a new roof was put on one side of the Little Town Hall and this year the other side was reroofed.

A building was rented this winter for keeping a supply of salt on hand for highway use and for housing some of the Highway supplies and equipment. Having the salt on hand this way has made it easier and more efficient to service the roads. Expense of rental, however, is high and an article has been placed in the Warrant for the voters to consider the building of a Town owned shed. The Butman lot was opened up this year for the stockpiling of sand for the roads in winter.

- 3. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the State Highway Department pay scale of Division No. 4, or make other arrangements; and to raise and appropriate the necessary amount of money to carry out whatever plan is adopted.
 - 4. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to raise the hourly rate of pay of all Town officials from \$1.60 per hour to \$2.00 per hour.
- 5. To see if the Town (or precinct) wishes to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00.
 - 6. To see if the Town will vote to require that vaults be used in all burials in Town excepting cremations.
- 6a. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tract of land adjoining the Edminster Cemetery for the purpose of enlarging the cemetery, and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.
- 7. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be put in a savings fund toward the purchase of a fire truck, deposit to be made by April 1, 1970.
 - 8. To vote by ballot on the new Zoning Ordinance proposed by the Planning Board.
 - 9. To see if the Town will vote to build a storage shed for the Highway Department and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for use in the operation and development of the Lebanon Regional Airport.
 - 11. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to widen the Tandy Brook Road from the Paget Bridge to the Town House Road.
- 12. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the fork in the Paget and Haunted House roads to the point where the Paget Road was last discontinued. The distance to be discontinued being approximately 400 feet.
 - 13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of Taxes.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or otherwise adminsiter property acquired through tax sales, and liens.
- 15. To hear the reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

During 1969 the fire department was called to 4 chimney fires, I building fire, I rubbish fire, I truck fire, I pot oil burner blew up, I car that the gasoline tank fell off and 5 small brush and grass fires.

I have tried to keep cost of running the fire department down. Telephone and insurance cost about \$450.00 a year; fires or no fires.

During the past year the fire department purchased three radios with money which the firemen earned.

The ladies auxiliary have purchased a resuscitator for the department.

The town should raise a sum of money each year for a capital reserve fund, for fire equipment, when needed.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1969 fire season was a quiet one in this area. Frequent rains kept the danger to a minimum and there were few violations. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

Fire Permit:

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be **prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.**

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Penalties

- 1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
- 4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland maximum fine of \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board has held seven meetings during the year. Attendance by the Board members has been supplemented by representatives of the Board of Selectmen, the Town Moderator and members of the Board of Adjustment.

The Board's attention has been directed principally toward a continuing study of the need for an improved zoning ordinance in order to reflect changes in State statute and conditions and to assure a more orderly future development of the Town. A modification of the new ordinance presented last year has been prepared for action by the voters at Town Meeting. As required by State statutes, two public hearings were scheduled for January 26 and February 16.

Noting the general concern in New Hampshire about the problems which result from the subdivision of land, the Board has begun a study to determine the need for and the nature of subdivision regulations so that Cornish might be prepared better to meet such problems should they arise in this community.

Board members have also tried to keep informed about the proposed Federal Connecticut River Valley Project and its possible effects upon our Town.

SCHOOL WARRANT

Cornish School District

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said District, on the 7th day of March, 1970, at 10:00 A.M. to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant.

Articles 1, 2, 3, and 4 of the Warrant will be acted upon at 10:00 A.M. and voting will be by official ballot and checklist, and the polls will remain open for this purpose from 10:00 A.M. until 7:00 P.M., at which time polls will close.

At 2:00 P.M. Articles 5 through 13 will be acted upon.

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Auditors for the ensuing year and a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 2. Shall \$127,000.00 be appropriated for constructing, originally equipping, and furnishing an addition to the Cornish elementary school and the school board be authorized to borrow said sum under the Municipal Finance Act, to expend for this project any income derived from the temporary investment of bond proceeds and to take all action necessary to carry out the project.
- Article 3. Shall \$8,890.00 be raised and appropriated for the purpose of paying interest on notes or bonds authorized under Article 2 which may fall due in the next fiscal year.
- Article 4. Shall \$8,400.00 be raised and appropriated for the purpose of making the first principal payment on notes or bonds authorized under Article 2 which may fall due in the next fiscal year.
- Article 5. To determine and fix the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

- Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of District officals and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- Article 9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U.S. Government and/or state agencies. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.
- Article 10.To see if the District will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources in addition to the original appropriation for 1970-1, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.
- Article 11.To see if the District will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the tuition of children enrolled in public school classes for the retarded.
- Article 12.To see if the District desires to establish a policy relative to the tuition payments of pupils attending high school, when in the absence of a contract, the tuition rate exceeds the state average costs for New Hampshire schools.
- Article 13.To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The Cornish School Board has continued to maintain close contact and attention to all phases of our local education, our school, our teachers and staff.

We have been fortunate in having personnel who are devoted to our children and to their good education. Results are evident in above average achievement tests, high school grades and honor rolls; and on into positions in business and industry.

This year and last year better instruction would have been possible if classes had not been overcrowded. We are threatened with loss of teachers if we do not soon allow for expansion.

The school lunch again shows a slight increase in meals served, but increased costs and changing support in State and Federal subsidies, have made it almost impossible to operate without loss. This is one of a very few school lunches in N.H. that has so far operated without using a local district appropriation; and yet continued to serve the very highest quality meals.

The School Board thanks all teachers and staff who have served so faithfully in difficult situations, the Supervisory Union personnel for extra hours of helpful consideration to our needs, the PTA and parents whose cooperation and suggestions are absolutely essential to a good public school.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

The the School Board of Cornish and Citizens of the Town, I herewith submit my report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

INSTRUCTIONAL STAFF

Three new staff members were welcomed to the teaching roster when school reopened this past September.

Miss Amy Loomis of Wynnewood, Pa., replaced Mrs. Lois George, resigned, in grade 4. Miss Loomis was graduated from Curry College in Milton, Mass., in 1969 with a B.A. degree, has done graduate work at Villanova University College, and has studied abroad.

Michael G. Thompson of Cambridge, Mass., succeeded Mrs. Frances Kelsey as social Studies Teacher in grades 6–8. He was graduated cum laude from Harvard College in June, 1969, with a B.A. degree, and had a summer of teaching experience in 1967 with the Hurricane Outward Bound School.

Music classes are being taught by Mrs. George W. Lawrence of White River Junction. Mrs. Lawrence holds a Bachelor of Music degree from the Boston University College of Music and has done graduate work at Castleton Teachers College and the University of Vermont. She has taught in Plainfield, Meriden, Lyme and Orford, N. H., and several Vermont and Massachusetts communities.

Qualified candidates with strong undergraduate credentials remain scarce in New Hampshire. We were indeed fortunate to attract the above teachers to our school.

THE PROPOSED ADDITION

As this report is being written, your Building Committee and School Board are preparing the final modifications on a proposed addition to the school, to be voted upon at the annual district meeting.

Past proposals have not been received with favor by the community. Reasons for rejection, we are told, were twofold: (1) The total cost was too high; and (2) some features included in the building were not considered essential for functional education.

The proposal to be voted on now was planned methodically with your wishes considered. It adds to the school basic classroom space, with the added provision of a library. This library may very easily be converted to a classroom.

This addition is vital if Cornish children are to receive the educational opportunities they need and deserve. One could cite many advantages of this proposed addition. The basic one is a smaller student/teacher ratio in some classrooms, thereby providing a teacher adequate time to spend with each child. Children instructed in a grade 2 classroom of 40 or a grade 5 classroom of 39, as is the case at this writing, over a period of years are not receiving the indepth education that, in all fairness, Cornish should provide for them.

The addition corrects this "impossible teaching load."

STATE SUPPORT OF EDUCATION

The proposed budget reflects a decrease of \$6,839 in Foundation Aid, the State's basic program for assisting communities with their educational needs.

The Foundation Aid Formula is a complicated one. Oversimplified, the equation has three factors: the number of students attending school, the amount of local financial support to our schools, and the equalized valuation of the town. The reduction in funds to Cornish next year is basically attributable to the third factor, the town's equalized valuation, which increased considerably during the past two years, according to the State Tax Commission.

The formula states now that the Cornish valuation is higher, we can well afford to underwrite the costs of our educational program to a greater extent.

Costs for quality education increase annually for both personnel and materials. Greater demands are made on the schools, more is expected in programs and achievement. However, with rising costs and greater demands, the local taxpayer still continues almost alone to shoulder more than he can rightfully bear.

Locally, we can economize within our school to a certain point. Beyond that, we are at the mercy of others. The Legislature can no longer afford the luxury of ignoring this situation! The State must come to the assistance of its school districts. The legislative body, with its diversity, expertise, and accessibility to financial consultants, must devise a method of pumping more state monies back to the local districts for the support of schools.

Individually and collectively, we must make our voices heard; no longer can we allow them to turn us away, for we will have to account not only to ourselves, but especially to our children.

MINIMUM STANDARDS

All elementary schools in New Hampshire should now plan for implementation of the Minimum Standards which become formally effective in September of 1972, just two years away. These standards, under discussion and study for many years, were hastened by the 1967 legislature which directed the State Board to formulate standards for elementary schools, and to require State School Board approval in order to qualify for financial aid.

To implement all in any one year would be prohibitive from a financial point of view. Good planning, with emphasis on established priorities, is the logical approach.

To comply with these standards and assure ourselves that no financial aid will be lost, we must begin to incorporate the following:

- a. Teacher/student ratio not exceeding 25/1 in grades 1 and 2
- b. Teacher/student ratio not exceeding 30/1 in grades 3-8
- c. Principal released one-half day or supervision/administration

- d. Additional nursing services
- e. Art teacher, part-time
- f. Physical education teacher, part-time
- g. Guidance counselor, part-time
- h. Library facility and aide
- i. Minimum expenditure of \$5/student for library resources

There are other areas to consider; however, the above require additional funding. The proposed addition, if approved, would not only correct immediate deficiencies, but would also get us well under way toward fulfilling the requirements for Minimum Standards.

CURRICULUM

Our program of curriculum upgrading is being continued in the District under the direct supervision of Mr. Anthony Amari, teacher consultant.

The still new reading program has been responsible for marked gains in reading ability as evidenced by recent reading and general achievement testing.

The multi-text approach in history and geography is being continued and expanded. Progress of the students in gaining a better insight into our culture and the culture of other countries has been noted.

Our survey of Cornish sophomores and freshmen attending local high schools resulted in an almost unanimous response. Through this device, we are able to get additional suggestions on ways in which to strengthen our programs.

We are planning a review of our present math program with the idea of assessing its strengths and weaknesses.

IN SUMMARY

The School Board, elected by you to represent the citizens of Cornish, has done so admirably. Its members have striven to achieve a quality program within the physical limitations of the school.

Spending of monies is authorized only after very careful study of the needs. The curriculum is continuously being evaluated. Student achievement in standardized tests is closely followed, and all are proud of the performance of Cornish children on the Stanford Achievement Tests and the Gates-MacGinitie Reading examinations.

This year has been a busy one for all associated with the Cornish School.It has been a year of progress. Now, another plateau is before us, representing other goals to be reached. With the support and guidance of the staff, Board, and community, Supt. George Disnard, Mr. Amari and I will continue to strive to make a Cornish education a truly adequate preparation for the challenges these youngsters will face in the years ahead.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The school year 1969-70 has been an extremely busy one. The defeat of the bond issue last spring and again in October created several problems of adjustment here at the school.

The most immediate and pressing problem is that of overcrowding. At this writing, there are 39 students in grade 2, 39 in grade 5, 36 in grade 4 and 35 in grade 8. It is therefore safe to say that four of our nine classrooms are drastically overloaded.

The library, which is essential to the educational development of any student, poses another problem. Projects and research which are most valuable tools in helping students develop individual skills cannot be utilized to any great degree. A library is a most urgent need for these youngsters.

Our reading program continues to work effectively and as a result the able readers are being exposed to a high grade of literature which would not have been available under the old system.

The multi-text system in history and geography seems to be working out well. While the system does require much more effort on the part of the teacher, it, at the same time, shifts much more responsibility to the student. Its major shortcoming is the inaccessibility of a library. Much of the work done by the student in this type of approach has to be done where there is an abundant supply of reference materials; therefore, a library would increase the value of this program tremendously.

In keeping with our policy of curriculum revision, we have added, on an experimental basis, three foreign languages, Spanish, German and French. A continuation of this program depends, of course upon finding teachers who have background in these languages. We were indeed fortunate this year in having three teachers who are familiar with these languages.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Board of Education, the Superintendent's Office and all the staff without whose support the efficient operation of the school would have been impossible.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

To the Cornish School Board and the Citizens of Cornish, I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

The following examinations were given during the school year 1968-69: Vision tests to all students of which nine were referred for further examinations and eight of these got glasses; hearing tests to 183 students of which two were referred and received treatment.

Tuberculin Heaf tests were given to 41 students of which none showed a positivite reaction.

Color perception tests were given to 49 students.

Periodic head and skin checks were made on all students throughout the school year. All students were weighed and measured.

Very few contagious diseases were reported to the school. No serious health problems occurred during the year.

Short conferences were held with 14 parents at preschool registration. This is an excellent opportunity to obtain a more complete health background of students entering school and an opportune time to explain to parents the school health program.

It is always a pleasure to work with all the school personnel: School Board members, teachers, secretary, custodian and lunchroom program ladies. All are always cooperative and helpful to me in the carrying out of my program. Please accept my sincere appreciation.
