RULES OF PROCEDURE

According to RSA 40, the Town Moderator determines the procedures to be used in Town Meetings. The Moderator determines the rules without regard to parliamentary or other procedural rules. The voters can overturn the Moderator's rules at any time, however. A motion to overturn the Moderator's rules, or establish new rules, will always take precedence to other business which is already "on the floor".

So that you will know the ground rules by which we are maintaining order, these procedural rules are announced to you ahead of time.

- The Moderator will read each <u>article</u> in its entirety before that article is considered.
- There can be no discussion until there has been a <u>motion</u> under the article. (usually the first motion is to approve the article as it appears on the warrant)
- All motions must be seconded by a different individual.
- <u>Discussion</u> will only take place after a motion has been moved and seconded.
- All discussion must take place only when called upon by the <u>Moderator</u>. You must have permission from the Moderator before you can speak.
- When the Moderator recognizes you, <u>standup</u>, <u>speak out</u> loudly and <u>announce your name</u> before proceeding with your comments.
- If you want to change a portion of a motion, you can do so by making an <u>amendment</u>. We will consider only one move to amend at any given time. When discussion regarding an amendment comes to a conclusion, the amendment will be voted upon. If the amendment <u>passes</u> we will then continue considering the original motion as it has now been amended. If the amendment <u>fails</u>, we will return to considering the motion in its form prior to the motion to amend.
- A secret written ballot will be used on any article when requested by any 5 voters in writing (RSA 40:4-a).
- A vote will be re-tabulated by secret written ballot when requested in writing or orally by only 7 voters (RSA 40:40b). This action must be requested before we have already moved onto the next item of business.

One final word of advice from your Moderator: If you want to get action from the Town Meeting, you have to make a motion. It's okay to get up and ask a question or make a comment (as long as it's relevant to what's on the table), but if you want the Town Meeting to discuss and vote on your idea, you have to get it on the table with a motion. Let's work together to have a successful and efficient meeting.

TOWN MEETING - MARCH 14, 2006 WARRANT - MINUTES

Town meeting and the election of officers were both held on Tuesday, March 14, 2006, commencing at 9:00 a.m. at the Freedom Town Hall.

The Moderator, Donald Johnson, reviewed procedures with the election workers downstairs at the Town Hall and then opened the polls for voting at 9:00 a.m. Election workers present were: Donald Johnson, the Moderator, Libby Priebe, Town Clerk, Alice Haslett and Rochelle Brooks, ballot clerks, James Brown, gatekeeper and Beth Earle, Assistant Moderator, and Ralph Kazanjian. The Supervisors of the Checklist were also present: Daniel Brooks, Albert Godfrey and Patricia McCov.

Mr. Johnson then went upstairs and opened the deliberative portion of the Town Meeting by explaining the rules of procedure, introducing the officials seated at the table on stage: Donna Cupka, Les Babb and Jim Breslin, Selectmen; Peter Malia, Town Counsel and Libby Priebe, Town Clerk. After the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, Mr. Johnson commenced the meeting with the reading of the warrant:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Freedom in the County of Carroll in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified that the Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Freedom will be held at the Freedom Town Hall on Tuesday, the 14th day of March 2006 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

There will be voting by Official Ballot for the election of Town Officers and all other articles requiring vote by Official Ballot. The polls open at 9:00am and close at 7:00pm unless there is a vote to keep the polls open to a later hour. The ballots will be counted after the polls close at 7:00pm.

All other articles will be presented, discussed and acted upon beginning at 9:00am at the Freedom Town Hall.

Mr. Johnson read Article 1 and noted that it was being voted on downstairs by official ballot. For the purposes of these minutes, the results are included herewith.

ARTICLE 2: (To vote by Official Ballot)

To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment #1 as proposed by the Freedom Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which redefines the Village Residential District as a distinct area with the Town with no part thereof having a dual zoning district definition: the new Village Residential District shall be limited to the length of the Freedom Village Road from Lots 4

and 7 on Tax Map 3 and further as described under Appendix A, Village District Boundaries of the Zoning Ordinance, deleting the description therein only up to the first semi-colon and inserting only a new description therefore.

Recommended by the Freedom Planning Board 5-0-0 160 Yes 50 No The article passed.

ARTICLE 3:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money:

The major subsection totals were read out loud by the Moderator: Total Town Office - \$158,983.00; Total Planning & Zoning Boards: \$5,800.00; Total Public Buildings - \$26,099; Total General Government - \$284,363.00; total police department - \$200,595; total fire department - \$69,250; total public safety - \$323,007; Total highways and streets - \$582,581; Total sanitation - \$181,446; total health (agencies) - \$10,518; total welfare - \$2,400; total culture and recreation: \$57,285; total conservation - \$4,500; total debt service - \$165,194, for an article total of \$1,611,294.00.

MOTION: Les Babb SECONDED: Jim Breslin

Les Babb made a MOTION TO AMEND two sections of Article 3 - and the Moderator requested that the amendments be made separately.

Les Babb made a MOTION TO AMEND the "Legal Expenses" line on Page 16 from \$15,500.00 up by \$30,000.00 to \$45,500.00; SECONDED by Jim Breslin.

Town Counsel, Peter Malia, spoke to the Amendment, explaining that this increase was due to the retirement of the Police Chief, Charles Pearson, and in accordance with RSA 91A, the Right to Know Law, this is a disclosure of the payment made to Chief Pearson over and above his normal pay - \$30,000.00 severance pay and three months health insurance. It was further explained by Attorney Malia and also by Selectman Babb that the Department of Revenue Administration had been consulted and the DRA recommended the placement of this amount of money on this line, rather than adding it in to the police budget.

Discussion. Many questions were asked and it was repeatedly explained that due to the confidentiality of personnel files nothing further could be answered or discussed.

VOTE ON MOTION TO AMEND: Yes, unanimous.

Les Babb made a MOTION TO FURTHER AMEND ARTICLE 3 under Public Buildings the line which currently reads expenses - \$20,150.00 - by adding \$17,000.00 to this line for a total of \$37,150.00; SECONDED by Jim Breslin.

Selectmen Babb explained that a recent wind storm had peeled shingles off the roof of the town office building. The roof has been repaired temporarily with a weather shield; the roof was last done in 1962.

VOTE ON MOTION TO AMEND: Yes, unanimous.

Discussion on Article 3 as twice amended.

Betty Godfrey made a motion to amend the Cemetery Budget from \$2,000 to \$25,000, an increase of \$23,000.00; seconded by Rick Zecher.

After a brief discussion it was determined that this was the wrong place for this amendment - there is a special article coming up that deals with this issue. Betty and Rick both agreed to withdraw the amendment.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 3 as twice amended - bringing the total bottom line to \$1,658,294.00:

YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 4:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,460 for this year's contract with Brett S. Purvis & Associates, Inc. to complete the necessary new construction assessing and all other assessing duties required for the year.

MOTION: Donna Cupka SECONDED: Jim Breslin

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 4: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 5:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$17,000 to implement Statement #34 of the governmental Accounting Standards Board which will bring the town into compliance with generally accepted accounting principals which will allow for more concise audit reporting. See Appendix A (which follows at the end of these minutes).

ARTICLE 6:

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under RSA CH 35 et seq. for the purpose of acquiring land and building a municipal building thereon and to raise and appropriate \$50,000 to be placed in this fund with the Selectboard authorized to expend monies from said fund in compliance with said statute for purposes including but not limited to site reviews, engineer and architectural studies, preparing acquisition and construction costs, option agreement costs and all other planning expenses as the Selectboard shall deem appropriate from time to time.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Les Babb

SECONDED: Donna Cupka

Selectman Babb spoke to the article - explaining that space is very limited and parking is a problem. The Selectmen are putting together a board consisting of members of the community to review the needs and to make recommendations. The Selectmen would like to find property that would accommodate the town offices, the police department and the fire department. The \$50,000.00 amount was chosen as a starting amount to get the project going but not to impact the tax rate too much

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 6: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 7:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,400 to sealcoat on Town Roads.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 8: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 9:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,400 for the necessary line work on the Bennett and Ossipee Lake Roads.

MOTION: Les Babb

SECONDED: Scott Brooks

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 9: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 10:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,200 for road crack sealing on Bennett and Ossipee Lake Roads.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Jim Breslin SECONDED: Scott Brooks

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 10: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 11:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,800 to purchase a new Ford Crown Victoria police package cruiser and authorize the Selectboard to sell or trade the 2000 cruiser with sales price or trade-in value received therefore to inure to the surplus of the Town with the Selectboard to authorize, arrange all terms and conditions necessary to effectuate this vote.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Jim Breslin SECONDED: Donna Cupka

Selectman Babb explained that this was the normal rotation.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 11: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 12:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for repairs to the fire station and upgrade of the driveway.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Les Babb SECONDED: Jim Breslin

Selectman Babb spoke to the article, explaining that the driveway is crumbling and that there is a need to improve the entrance.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 12: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 13:

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Non-Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of R.S.A. 35:1-c for the purpose of use in remediation of milfoil or other invasive weed infestations or pollution that may occur from time to time in lakes, ponds and streams which are in whole or part within the borders of the Town and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be placed in this fund with the Selectboard authorized from time to time to expend monies from said funds for its stated purpose.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Les Babb SECONDED: Jim Breslin Selectman Babb explained that this is the third year on this project and that there have been private donations.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 13: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 14:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to hire a licensed forester to oversee the cutting operations of the Town Forest for the ensuing year.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Les Babb SECONDED: Jim Breslin

Katie Gove, Chairman of the Conservation Commission, spoke to the Article.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 14: YES, by a majority.

ARTICLE 15:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 to be paid into the Highway Department Equipment Capital Reserve Fund of the Town.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Donna Cupka SECONDED: Jim Breslin

Selectman Cupka spoke to the article, explaining that they are trying to plan ahead and in three years the backhoe will need replacing, so they are placing one-third of the money into the reserve fund now, noting that the backhoe has been moved to the transfer station because the transfer station needs a loader. The backhoe can be shared by the road crew and the transfer station, per Scott Brooks recommendation.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 15: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 16:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,000.00 to be paid into the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund of the Town.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Les Babb SECONDED: Jim Breslin

Selectman Breslin spoke to the Article, noting that fire department is going to be needing a new pump truck and the review committee did not recommend the purchase at this time.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 16: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 17:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to repair retaining wall at the Cushing Corner Cemetery.

Recommended by the Selectboard 3-0

MOTION: Les Babb SECONDED: Jim Breslin

Selectman Babb spoke to the Article, stating that the back walls have fallen on the Cushing Corner Cemetery. The amount of \$5,000 was put in this article as a starting point, waiting for actual numbers to come in.

Betty Godfrey, one of the cemetery trustees, spoke to the article and explained that two sections of the granite wall have fallen and one has broken and that many of the graves have sunk in 2-3 feet and need to be filled. She has been working on getting estimates and it has been difficult because special equipment and special talents are required. She has one written estimate for \$21,000.00.

Betty Godfrey MADE A MOTION TO AMEND this article by increasing it by \$16,000.00 to bring the total to \$21,000.00.... and she tried to add an additional \$2000.00 to begin repairs and upkeep of the other cemeteries.

The Moderator informed her that the first part of her amendment was okay, but the second part is not because this Article specifically deals with the Cushing Corner Cemetery and that the other portion of her amendment would involve reconsidering Article 3, which can be done under the "any other business" article at the end of the meeting.

The initial MOTION TO AMEND this article to \$21,000.00 was seconded by Rick Zecher.

Discussion on the amendment.

Tom Kondrat raised the question of the legality of the town working on private cemeteries. He noted that there is a specific procedure for the town to take over abandoned and neglected cemeteries and he wondered if that procedure had been followed.

Discussion. Peter Malia, Town Counsel, indicated that it wasn't clear if the town had followed this procedure and that the matter would need further investigation.

Discussion.

Rick Zecher recommended that the amendment be amended by adding: "following Selectboard's determination that this is a legal action". This was SECONDED by Betty Godfrey - and she agreed to withdraw her initial amendment.

Scott Brooks spoke to the article and noted that there was a need to respect the dead, to look past the legal issues and asked to MOVE THE QUESTION.

The Moderator did not initially hear the "move the question" motion. Further discussion ensued and Rick Zecher asked the Moderator for a point of order - and it was confirmed that Scott had asked that the question be moved.

The Moderator apologized to Scott.

VOTE TO MOVE THE QUESTION: YES, unanimous.

VOTE TO AMEND ARTICLE 17: YES, by a majority.

Discussion on Article 17 as amended.

After much discussion, the Moderator noted that he was under the impression that we had given the Selectmen the authority to take care of the cemetery that he felt that was the spirit of the amendment.

Jim Breslin noted that he felt the point had been made and there was no misunderstanding - that the Selectmen were bound by the spirit of the amendment to do whatever is reasonable and equitable and to take care of the problem.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 17 AS AMENDED: YES, unanimous.

ARTICLE 18:

To see if the Town will appropriate 50% of the revenue annually collected pursuant RSA 79-A:7 (the land use change tax) into a conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III to be held and used in a continuing fund pursuant to RSA 79-A:25 II and RSA 36-A:5 allowing for expenditures therefrom in accordance with the purposes defined in statute with this authorization to be continuing until later revoked by the Town.

MOTION: Katie Gove SECOND: Jim Breslin

Katie Gove, Chairman of the Conservation Commission, spoke to the Article.

Discussion.

Les Babb made a MOTION TO AMEND the article by inserting after "50% of the revenue annually collected - not to exceed \$15,000.00 \dots "; SECONDED by Jim Breslin.

Discussion.

VOTE TO AMEND: too close to call for a voice vote, so the Moderator called for a hand count. Results: 29 YES; 17 NO. The Amendment carries.

Discussion on Article 18 as amended.

Jim Breslin made an AMENDMENT TO THE AMENDMENT:

"To see if the Town will appropriate 50% of the revenue collected this year, but not to exceed \$15,000.00.00 pursuant RSA 79-A:7 (the land use change tax) into a conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III to be held and used in a continuing fund pursuant to RSA 79-A:25 II and RSA 36-A:5 allowing for expenditures therefrom in accordance with the purposes defined in statute."

SECONDED: Les Babb.

Peter Malia, Town Counsel, explained that by striking that wording the article would have to come back every year.

Karen Hatch asked for a point of order. She said she was under the impression that a petitioned article could not be amended. Peter Malia, Town Counsel, explained that that was not correct and noted that was a town meeting myth.

VOTE TO AMEND ARTICLE 18: YES, by a majority.

Discussion

Chuck Brooks made a MOTION TO MOVE THE OUESTION.

VOTE ON MOTION TO MOVE: YES, unanimous.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 18 as twice amended: YES, by a majority.

ARTICLE 19:

To review real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collectors deed since the last Annual Town Meeting to consider whether or not to sell any or all such properties and the appropriate terms and conditions regarding their sale.

Tom Kondrat noted that there were no properties.

Betty Godfrey made a motion to pass over this Article.

VOTE: Yes, to pass over - unanimous.

ARTICLE 20:

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The Moderator, Donald Johnson, asked for a moment of silence in honor of Donald Banks, after which he noted: "May he rest in peace.".

Betty Godfrey made a MOTION TO RECONSIDER Article #3; seconded by Rick Zecher.

Discussion.

VOTE ON MOTION TO RECONSIDER: YES, by a majority.

Betty started to make a motion to amend a line item regarding cemeteries on Page 16, but once she realized that it wasn't necessary to do so, she withdrew her motion off the table.

On another issue, Betty Godfrey wondered why Old Home Week - which is a state holiday - has gotten so much earlier than it used to be. She noted that it used to be the 2nd or 3rd week of August. She wanted to make a motion that it go back to the traditional Old Home Week in August and asked people to keep that in mind.

Discussion

Pam Fortin MADE A MOTION TO ADJOURN; SECONDED by many.

The Moderator noted that the total voted for today's warrant articles is \$1,970.394.00.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 12:15 p.m.

Please note that this article will not allow any acquisition of land but will only allow the Selectmen to have Funds to make studies and obtain possible option agreements which must be acted on by the entire town before any land acquisition may occur.

ARTICLE 19: (By Petition of Jack Middleton and others)

To see if the Town of Freedom will accept as a public road in the Town of Freedom the Freedom Shore Road so-called, extending from Route 25 to land now or formerly of Henry and Jacqueline Kucera.

ARTICLE 20: (By Petition of John Shipman and others)

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Freedom as of and for the year ended December 31, 2005 which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

As discussed in Note 1-B to the financial statements, management has not recorded its capital assets in governmental activities and, accordingly, has not recorded depreciation expense on those assets. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that those assets be capitalized and depreciated, which would increase the assets, net assets, and expenses of the governmental activities. The amount by which this departure would affect the assets, net assets, and expenses of the governmental activities is not reasonably determinable.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matter discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the governmental activities of the Town of Freedom, as of December 31, 2005, and the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended.

In addition, in our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the town of Freedom as of December 31, 2005, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for

the year then ended in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

As described in Note 2, as of January 1, 2005, the Town has implemented a new financial reporting model, as required by the provisions of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements - and Management Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments*.

The management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information are not a required part of the basic financial statements, but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurements and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Freedom's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. They have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements take as a whole.

FREEDOM PUBLIC LIBRARY'S REPORT

The Freedom Public Library has had another busy year, providing services to a growing number of library users. There were 19.6% more patron visits in 2006, an 18.7% increase in computer users, and circulation of library materials was up 12.5%. We are proud that the library is reaching more people and providing an environment that is warm and welcoming for patrons of all ages. Our downstairs meeting room has been used heavily for movie and lecture events and is now regularly hung with the work of local artists.

Wednesday morning story hour is a popular time for children ages 2-5 to come together to hear stories, sing songs, play rhythm instruments and create crafts. The library continues to enjoy a close relationship with the elementary school including collaboration on projects and events. Some of the elementary classes walk from the school to visit the library. The students learn about the responsibilities of having a library card and enjoy the pleasure of making their own choices about what to read, as well as get help in choosing books for book reports. Many students get off the school bus at the library to hang out with friends, work on homework and use the computers.

The library hosted two teen programs in 2006 including an after school beading workshop followed by pizza and movie which was attended by 8 teens, and a summer pizza and movie series over 6 Fridays which was extremely popular.

In summer, the library was buzzing with activity. There were three hot August days when over 100 patrons came in. The summer reading program was another rousing success with 51 children aged 2-13 reading a total of 88,260 minutes! There were pizza & movie nights, writing workshop series, puppet making workshops, and more to keep kids active and engaged at the library. The library also added a summer reading program for adults, which attracted 79 participants reading 339 books.

The library is working hard to keep up to date with technology. This year we replaced two older computers, installed a server, and implemented new circulation software. Our wireless router is especially popular in the summer with summer residents who have their own laptops. The library has acquired a projector, screen, and speaker system for a terrific theatre-like experience in the downstairs meeting area. The projector can also be used for PowerPoint presentations and computer classes. The library's website at www.freedompubliclibrary.org is an attractive and informative way to keep the public informed of library happenings.

The Friends of the Library again raised a significant amount of money to support the library's programs, services and technology. They sponsored two lectures of the New Hampshire Humanities Council, two professional performances for children, and paid the expenses of the summer reading program. The Friends also paid for the theatre equipment as well as other technology purchases.

The paid staff includes Elizabeth Rhymer, Library Director, Pat Parker,

Assistant Librarian, and Judy Johnson, Library Assistant. In addition, the library's services are supported by a large corps of dedicated volunteers who worked 1027 hours in the library and countless additional hours on special projects and programs. It would cost the town a great deal more to provide the same level of service without these wonderful volunteers. Thanks to the staff, volunteers, and the Friends of the Library, the Freedom Public Library continues to grow and find new ways to meet the community's needs.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN REPORT

With a change in attitude and slight change in demographics and mandates the expectation and demand for services has continued to increase. We have worked with and encouraged department heads and employees to seek alternatives to meet these needs without just adding to the tax burden.

Justin Brooks has implemented recycling at the transfer station which has not only saved the towns people a great deal of money and helped to off set the increase in disposal fees it has allowed us to become environmentally responsible.

The Police Department has also sought and received several grants, which will allow them to perform additional speed patrols, DWI patrols, and ATV patrols on the Trout Pond Property. Equipment grants have also been received to purchase new equipment and update cruisers with the latest technologies, which will allow officers to be safer and more efficient.

While being burdened with increased mandates and inspection requirements. The Fire Chief and members have also sought and received multiple equipment grants, which allowed them to operate more efficiently in providing emergency services to the town. Fire Chief Doe and Assistant Fire Chief Brooks have also taken over the increasingly demanding position of Emergency Management Directors.

Many projects were completed this year. To provide a better shelter for residents in the case of emergency or power outages the installation of an automatic generator in the Town Hall is complete. The roof has been replaced on the Town Offices.

The Building Committee was formed and worked very hard researching needs and meeting with department heads to come up with a recommendation of square footage for a new municipal and/or public safety building. The Land Committee has met (with limited attendance) and identified appropriate areas for the location(s). Landowners in these areas will be contacted regarding availability.

It has become apparent that there are many individuals that have taken much interest in several of the issues before the town boards this year. Now is the opportunity to become educated on the issues by being appointed to one of these boards, have your voice heard and make Freedom even more of a positive community in which to live. Conservation Commission- 3; Cemetery Trustee -1; Zoning Board of Adjustments - 2, and the Municipal Land Committee.

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
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FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Fire activity was very high during the first several weeks of the 2006 fire season, with red-flag conditions issued by the National Weather Service and extreme fire danger in many sections of the state. The largest forest fire during this period occurred in late April and burned 98 acres. The extremely dry conditions in spring resulted in over twice the amount of acreage burned than in all of 2005. Our statewide system of fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Fires in the wildland urban interface damaged 6 structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

It is difficult to believe that another year has already past. Once again the year proved very busy for Medstar crews as they responded to nearly 2000 calls for assistance. Their responses included everything from standing by at fire scenes to homicide. I commend them for their diligence and dedication.

As demand for service continues to grow we strive to improve our capabilities. Currently, we have one EMT-I enrolled in a paramedic program and three EMT's who are preparing to sit for the National Registry EMT Intermediate exams. We have just placed a 2006 AEV Custom Ambulance into service. This brings our fleet to five front line ambulances and one in reserve.

I would like to take this opportunity to express our sincere appreciation to the people of Freedom for their tremendous support. A very special THANK YOU goes out to the members of The Freedom Fire & Rescue Department, The Freedom Police Department and The Freedom Highway Department. As always, their dedication only makes the work we do easier, and the people of Freedom safer.

Frank Suprenard who brings with him fifteen years of police experience. We currently have four part time patrolmen; at some points we have had as many as seven part time patrolmen. All of these part time officers have a full time job elsewhere which makes covering every shift very difficult. This is why I am asking the Town this year for a third full time officer eliminating all of the part time patrolmen. A third full time officer will bring the continuity and better police coverage to the Town.

The police department has applied for and received Federal Grant money to put extra officers on the road during busy times of the year, to patrol for speeding violations and people driving while intoxicated. We have also received a grant for a radar trailer that can be placed any where in town. This year I hired Joanne Gayer as the Animal Control Officer; she has done an outstanding job.

The Freedom Police Department is still located on the second floor of the town office and I am usually in the office on Monday nights. However, I urge you to call anytime that you have any questions or complaints. To reach an officer you should contact dispatch at the Carroll County Sheriff's Office at 539-2284.

I would like to thank the citizens of the Town of Freedom for their continued support of the police department. I look forward to serving the Town of Freedom for many years to come.

TRANSFER STATION

Hard to believe another year has come and gone. This year changes were made to help reduce the cost and help the environment. The question was where to start, remembering the old recycling program we had years ago. I didn't know how receptive users would be, but to my surprise they were thrilled with the idea.

I got in contact with Karen McNaughton of Pine Tree Waste and we came up with a program to fit the Town of Freedom. Now there were some costs to get started. We had to buy two recycling dumpsters at \$7,500.00 per dumpster. So, in August, the recycling dumpsters arrived and we began recycling. In short time we saved enough money not only to buy the two recycling dumpsters, but also a snow pusher for the Case backhoe and still turn money back to the town.

A few changes have been made to the program. We went from two stream sorting to single stream sorting, allowing us to compact our recyclables. If this works out we can sell the two recycling dumpsters we purchased in August.

Many asked the question; How much money will we make? We don't make money, we save money. Regular trash cost us \$70 per ton, plus a trucking fee to dispose of it. On an average a dumpster of trash is about \$1,000.00 to \$1,2000.00. On the recyclables all we pay for is trucking on average of \$250.00 per dumpster. The recyclables get disposed of for nothing. In order for us to keep getting these savings we must recycle. Remember, it is mandatory.

I have looked at pay as you throw programs and what that is you pay a fee per bag to throw away your trash, but all recyclables were free. This is not the program for Freedom, I have faith in my users and they will do the right thing. But with that, I will be conducting spot checks on bags to make sure we have full compliance for the benefit of all the Freedom taxpayers and our commitment to the environment.

I would like to thank George Stone who puts up with me on a daily basis, Karen Hatch and her staff, Gene Doe and members of the Fire Department, Scott Brooks and his road crew, Josh Shackford and members of the Police Department and the Selectmen, Les, Donna and Jim. With a team like ours it is no surprise the Town of Freedom is a very well managed Town.

My special thanks to the taxpayers and users of the Transfer Station for your much needed support.Remember, each man has two ends, the sitting end and the thinking end. Success depends on which end is used harder. Heads we win, tails we lose.

BUILDING CODE REPORT

2006 was not a banner year for construction in the Town of Freedom. However, permit applications were strong and new housing starts numbered 15. Other permits for new garages, additions and remodel work was steady. These permits numbered over 100 with others falling into other categories.

The year 2006 brought changes in the State of New Hampshire building code. The Governor signed into law in May 2006 the International Residential One and Two Family Building Code. It is recommended that all communities in the state adopt this building code giving the state a uniform set of standards for one and two family homes.

I continue to keep active within the New Hampshire Building Officials. The Association continues to meet on a monthly basis for training and education. These meetings keep me up to speed with code issues and State Law. It is also a tool I use as a resource to other inspectors in the state.

I have extended my office hours on Thursday's from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm. There has been a need to be more available and these hours help make this happen. I trust as we start a new year all will go well.

FREEDOM CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Freedom Conservation Commission meets on the third Tuesday of the month whose primary role is to make recommendations to other boards regarding natural resource utilization and protection. The FCC reviews and provides feedback upon ZBA applications and DES permits and addresses any environmentally related concerns brought to the board from the general public.

The highly energetic and enthusiastic board participated in the update of the natural resource chapter of the master plan. This charge is to identify and acknowledge the impact of natural resources on the rural character of Freedom and provide strategies to sustain the integrity of this landscape. The goal of the natural resource chapter is to gain harmony among development and the ecological resources of Freedom. This productive incentive is imperative due to the fast growing population in this community. Following are some interesting statistics in approximation that have come out of the master plan:

- Freedom is comprised of 34.5 square miles of land mass (91%).
- 3.4 square miles or 2181 acres are surface water (9%).
- 4131 acres are in conservation (18.7%).
- 2261 acres are town forest in Freedom under conservation easement.
- 12,666 acres of land account for either prime farmland or farmland of local or statewide importance (57%).
- 498 acres of wetland area. Wetlands can account for habitat for around 140 wildlife species.
- 9.3 square miles or 26% of Freedom is underlain by the Ossipee aquifer.

The LRPC annual meeting was held in the summer. The town received an award of excellence from the LRPC regarding the acquisition of the town forest and significance of the conservation value of this land. Board members also attended the NH Conservation Commission Association's annual meeting where upon the new and dynamic Wildlife Action Plan was introduced. In short, the Wildlife Action Plan is the most comprehensive wildlife assessment to date in the state and was developed to ensure the livelihood of wildlife in the state for future generations. Authored by 34 wildlife experts from various conservation backgrounds, the WAP aims a focus on the vulnerability of wildlife relative to human development and pressure trends. Identified were 123 wildlife species and 27 habitat types in greatest need of conservation. Through the use of maps provided by the WAP, and with the assistance of wildlife experts and others, the FCC looks forward to making its recommendations toward conservation minded planning that will

assist to enable this overall effort.

The town celebrated its first anniversary in the acquisition of the Trout Pond town forest. This new, exciting and noteworthy achievement grants the town with the opportunity to become familiar with this land through observation and education in the magnificence of biological diversity. The monumental protection of this property, while garnering the largest undeveloped land mass in Freedom, can only encourage us to respect and enjoy the reverence and nobility of this significant town forest.

Management endeavors led by the town forester and BH Keith Associates have been suitably following the guidelines of the stewardship plan. The town forest began its season with an initial timber harvest of nearly 100 acres. This cut was an improvement thinning with the end product being whole tree chips and lower grade pulp. The property is now formally registered as a tree farm in the American Tree Farm System. Three kiosks have been installed at the Pequawket gate, Jackman Ridge Road and the Shawtown Road. Management for early successional habitat with brontosaurus equipment has been completed. In this case, the brush cutting consisted of multiple one acre patch cuts to promote the release of pitch pine, aspen and birch. Some old log landing sites were also cut as well as sections along the Jackman Ridge Road. This management tool provides for an early successional forest habitat type appropriate for a number of wildlife species. The plans for a hiking trail network have been presented. As indicated as a primary objective within the stewardship plan, this interpretive trail system will encourage low impact activities for residents and visitors. Interpretive trail maps will eventually accompany this plan that will be made available at the kiosks. A degree of road improvement and erosion curtailment has also been established while in the process of this forest management.

The Forest Advisory Committee or FAC acts as an advisory committee to the FCC relative to town forest property activities and management. The FAC also reviews recreational and land use incentives proposed to the FCC while regarding the guidelines of the conservation easement. The FCC acknowledges the hard work and dedication that the advisory committee has provided this year.

The enthusiastic energy and productivity of fellow board members has led to many accomplishments this year. I would like to especially acknowledge Katie Gove and her extreme commitment to the conservation commission as former chair person. Her positive attitude and dedication in conservation has proven many rewards for the town. I also thank Karen Hatch and Linda Farinella for their insight and experience of the town and in their assistance to this board.

This will be Freedom's 109th Old Home Week. We should be proud that after all these years, we still put on an Old Home Week. It's not an Old Home Day or an Old Home Weekend. Freedom's 175th Celebration June 16, 2006

Freedom was known as Ossipee Gore until it was annexed to Effingham in 1820. Effingham was too large to provide needed services, such as schooling to the entire area. Also, townspeople could not get to social events, such as town meeting because they were being held so far away. To get there with horses and be back for dinner was difficult. In 1831 we were incorporated as a separate town and called North Effingham. The following year the citizens named it Freedom as it was "free from Effingham".
