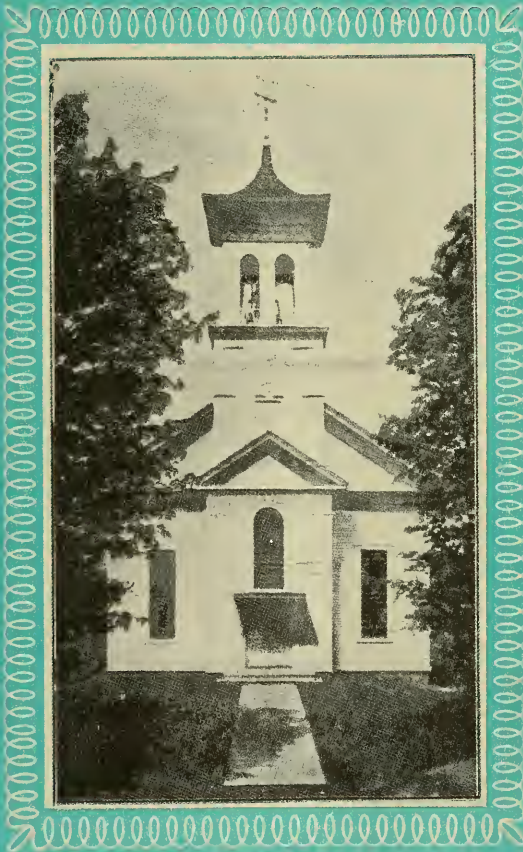

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

What can we do to help reduce the real estate tax in our town?

The obvious answer would be to secure more revenue from as many sources as possible.

The year 1971 was a banner year for town-obtained revenue. Mrs. Vetter, our Town Clerk, was able to increase the motor vehicle permit income by more than \$2,000 over the previous year. Some of the other sources of income resulted from the revenue received for the rental of the Town Hall (\$1819 for 1971 as compared to \$480 for 1970). Building permits and license fees produced \$505 for 1971 as compared to \$170 for 1970.

These are a few of the methods and means by which a town can generate more revenue and thereby reduce the total figure required to be raised by taxes.

In spite of the fact that the 1971 revenue exceeded the 1970 revenue by almost \$10,000, we had to spend \$50,000 more for education in 1971 over the cost for education during the year 1970.

The Selectmen would like to take this opportunity to personally thank the following people who assisted in the preparation and the laying of the cement floor in the Town Hall basement:

Lester Blackwell, Alvin Rislove, Ralph Hackley, Bill Butler, Danny McKay, Roland Schreiber, Dick Heselton, Jessie Bolduc.

The generous assistance of these men created a saving of more than \$600 for the Town of Fremont.

The Town of Fremont lost the services of Mr. Charles Crommett, Town Treasurer, when he suffered a "stroke" in June, 1971. Charlie has served as Town Treasurer and School Treasurer for the past ten years and deserves the gratitude of all of us for the dedication and service he gave to these duties. Not long ago Charlie's daughter informed us that he is now residing at the Union Printer's Home in Colorado City, Colorado. We are all sure that he would like to hear from the people of his town, so don't hesitate to drop him a line.

The Selectmen have received an Article from Dwight and Dorothy Killam which was signed by ten voters asking the Town to vote on whether or not the Selectmen should deed back the land taken by Eminent Domain in September of 1971.

The Selectmen would like to advise the Fremont voters that this land had to be taken since the Town Shed is situated thereon. We also feel that the town needs this land for parking facilities and since we strongly feel that the taking of this land was necessary in the "best interests of

the Town" we would urge you to vote against returning this land to the Killams. So far, this project represents over \$6500 of cost to the taxpayers of Fremont. If we are forced to return this land to the Killams, we would be required to tear down the Town Shed and be further required to re-erect a new one at a different location. This would be additional cost to the taxpayer so that the total cost would exceed \$15000 which represents about \$2.50 per thousand on the tax rate.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Fremont in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Fremont on Tuesday, the seventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to take such action as the Town deems necessary.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for the continuation of the Memorial Park.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at Public Auction, property acquired by Tax Collector Deed.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 to be deposited to the Waste Disposal Capital Reserve Fund.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
8. To see what action the Town will take by ballot on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171 A of the Revised Laws relating to Beano be adopted in Town.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2.00 to acquire all the rights, title and interest in and to the concrete dam situated across the Exeter River in the Town of Brentwood, County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, immediately down river from the residential development known as "Duston Shores" and the water rights connected therein.
10. On petition of Dwight L. Killam and ten (10) others: "To see whether the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to convey to Dwight L. Killam and Dorothy D.P. Killam the same parcel of real estate taken from them by eminent domain proceedings in 1971 and remove therefrom the so-called Town Shed."
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the additional sum of \$450.00 for the acquisition of the Killam property taken by Eminent Domain in September 1971.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to install lights on the Town Hall flag pole and the Traffic Officer spot in front of the Town Hall.

13. To see what action the Town will take to instruct the Selectmen to cancel the town's membership in the New Hampshire Municipal Association.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the painting of the Hearse House.

15. To see what action the Town will take to dispose of the Old Town Shed and the land situated thereunder.

16. Upon application of ten voters: "Do you approve of having two sessions for the annual town meeting in this town, the first session for choice of town officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business?"

17. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

NOTE:

Due to the lengthy tasks that face the election officials on this election day, it is suggested that a motion be presented to the Moderator to postpone the town meeting for the purpose of voting on the remaining articles, to Friday, March 10, 1972 at 8 P.M. rather than the evening of March 7, 1972.

At the legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Fremont in the County of Rockingham in said State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, held on the ninth day of March, 1971, at the Town Hall, the following business was transacted:

Moderator Louis J. Balestra declared the meeting open at 10 A.M., and proceeded to read the Town Warrant.

A motion was made, seconded and carried that the polls remain open until 6:30 P.M.

The business meeting was called to order at 8:35 P.M. All elected officers were sworn in by the Moderator, except Helen P. Seavey. The new Oath of Office was used. Mr. Louis Balestra was sworn in by Selectman Philip E. Peterson. Mrs. Helen Seavey was sworn in on March 12, 1971 by the Town Clerk.

Articles 1, 7 and 5a had been voted on by ballot.

Article 2: Motion made and duly seconded to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Passed by voice vote.

Article 3: Joseph J. O'Brien read the Budget. Motion made and duly seconded to accept same as read. Passed by voice vote.

Article 4: Motion made and duly seconded that the Town vote to authorize the use of Town Land (formerly John Ellis Land) for use as a Little League Field and Town Park for Town Recreation purposes, and to appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for initial development of a Little League Field. Passed by voice vote.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collectors Deed solely at Public Auction and to give Public Notice of same by advertising the time and place of such auction in a local paper two weeks beforehand. An amendment to add, Advertise, also, by posting notice at the Town Hall, Post Office and one other Public Place. Motion made and duly seconded to accept the Article with amendment. Passed by voice vote.

Article 18: To transact any other business which locally comes before this meeting. Motion made and duly seconded for the following resolution to be read: "Be it resolved that this Town Meeting go on record as being opposed to any State Sales and/or Income taxes and that any future action regarding same be the subject of a Special State Referendum held not later than 15, March, 1972." Passed by voice vote.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

LEST WE FORGET – IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar-holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947. Nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand – a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them dead out when leaving.
4. Most important – Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted

match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year — 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

The Selectmen of Fremont are proud to publicly state that the police officers of Fremont are indeed sensitive to the needs of the townspeople and are quite often disposed to neglect their own needs in order to accommodate others. A good example of this is taken from a letter received from a Fremont mother who wanted to express her appreciation for the help she received when her very young child had wandered too far from home. The mother stated that she wanted us to be aware that Officer Fred O'Brien very selflessly interrupted his contracting business to rush to her aid. Officer Fred O'Brien responded to this call immediately and unselfishly even though his contract work received a full days' setback.

EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

ANNUAL REPORT 1971

1971 has been a year of expansion and growth for the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association. At present, there are three full-time and four part-time registered nurses, one physical therapist and one secretary-bookkeeper.

A total of 4,591 nursing visits and 1,264 physical therapy visits were made in the ten towns covered by the service.

The Agency provides the services of a Home Health Coordinator to the Exeter Hospital on a part-time basis, thus ensuring the continuity of care for patients requiring extended care when discharged from the hospital to their home.

A new Well Child Conference has been initiated and will be held monthly to provide immunizations and physicals to infants and pre-school children of eligible families.

The Exeter Area VNA is a service interested and involved in the prevention as well as the treatment of disease.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
Fremont, New Hampshire
March 8, 1971

The annual School District Meeting opened at 8 P.M. with the reading of the Warrant by Moderator Timothy Louis.

ARTICLE I: To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Mrs. Ruth Anderson made a motion that this Article be considered under Article V.

Seconded by Mr. Robert Louis.

The Moderator called for a voice vote and the motion was passed.

ARTICLE II: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

The Moderator asked if there was a report from the Educational Needs Committee. Mr. George Baker, Chairman of the Committee replied that there was no report at this time.

Mr. James O'Connell rose to speak. The School Board wanted an idea of how those present felt about the 7th and 8th grade students at Sanborn. A count of hands showed 39 people wanted the students brought back to Fremont and 17 people wanted them to stay at Sanborn. No count was taken of those who abstained from voting.

Discussion followed. The point was made by the School Board that if any classes were brought back to Fremont, it would be both classes — 7th and 8th — not just one. The cost of tuition and transportation to Sanborn were brought out. One person's opinion as stated was that if we brought our pupils back to Ellis School and built two or three rooms on to the School, we would be short-changing our students as compared to the education they are now receiving at Sanborn. In one opinion from the floor four or five rooms would be needed to compare to Sanborn.

Mrs. Ruth Anderson disagreed heartily and felt the students were short-changed by the double sessions at Sanborn.

ARTICLE IV: To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$5,200.00) for the purpose of paying unanticipated transportation for the 1970-1971 school year, which sum is a deficit appropriation.

Mr. Robert Louis explained that this was caused by double sessions which made necessary double bus runs and then made the motion that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$5,200.00) for the purpose of paying unanticipated transportation for the 1970-71 school year, which sum is a deficit appropriation.

Seconded by Mr. Philip Peterson.

The Moderator called for a voice vote and the motion was carried.

ARTICLE V: To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

Mr. Robert Louis moved that the budget be considered item by item as listed.

Seconded by Mr. Philip Peterson.

The Moderator called for a voice vote, the motion is carried, and the budget is read item by item.

The item \$2,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund caused discussion.

Mr. Philip Peterson made a motion to borrow \$10,000 from a bank to put in a building fund if we started building onto Ellis School.

Mr. James O'Connell stated that this money must be raised by taxes.

Mr. Robert Louis replied in answer to what the Capital Reserve Fund was that we have \$12,263 in the Capital Reserve Fund, \$754 was added from interest, making a total of \$13,017. If we voted to add \$2,000 this year we would have over \$16,000 in the fund. Discussion followed on types of loans — long term or short term — for future building. The point was brought out that we must bear in mind what we as a town can afford.

Mr. Louis Balestra rose to speak about raising \$10,000 for the Capital Reserve Fund for future building. If we voted to raise this amount, by next year we would have approximately \$40,000 in the Fund. This amount would raise the tax rate approximately \$1.00. The State would pay one-third of future building costs.

Mr. Philip Peterson withdrew his former motion and made a motion that we raise \$10,000 through taxes to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund for future building purposes.

The motion was seconded.

The Moderator called for a voice vote and the motion was carried.

Mr. Louis continued on line by line reading of the budget.

Mr. O'Connell made the motion that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$216,384.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

Seconded by Marie Vetter.

A voice vote was taken and Article V, including Article I, was passed.

ARTICLE VI: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Balestra made the motion to have the School Moderator appoint a five man committee to act as a School Building Committee. This

Committee will be designed to study the costs of school construction, develop plans for school construction and report their findings to the Fremont citizens at the March 1972 School District Meeting for their consideration.

Seconded by Philip Peterson.

The Moderator called for a voice vote and the motion was carried.

Mr. George Baker made a motion that the Educational Needs Committee be abolished.

Seconded by Marie Vetter.

The Moderator called for a voice vote and the motion was carried.

Mr. Charles Hutchins stated that we should study also the program we now have at Sanborn and future plans at Sanborn, not just the possibility of bringing the 7th and 8th grades back to Fremont and building on to the Ellis School.

Mr. Laurence Pettingill made a motion to adjourn.

Seconded by Marie Vetter.

The Moderator called for a voice vote, the motion was carried, and the meeting adjourned at 8:50 P.M.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To The Citizens of Fremont:

In the Superintendent's Report last year it was stated that in March 1972, you would, once again, be called upon to make another major educational decision in Fremont — whether or not to continue tuitioning your junior high pupils (approximately 50) to Sanborn Regional or to build the additional facilities necessary to return these two grades to Ellis School. This is much the same choice you had to make some five years ago.

As everyone knows, soon after this report was published last year, you voted to replace the Educational Planning Committee with a Building Committee. Under the leadership of Chairman Robert Louis, the committee has been most active, holding meetings almost monthly with various people, such as your superintendent, his assistant, personnel from the State Department of Education and with representatives of the architectural firm of Dennis and Tambling from Portsmouth, N.H. All agree that if you choose to build this year, the best plan would be the addition of four classrooms and an all-purpose room.

However, before you cast your vote on March 6, let's review certain aspects of this proposal—

Comparative costs are certainly most important. Will it cost more to build and to bring these junior high school children home? Or, will the cost, including annual tuition increases, be greater if these same children remain at Sanborn Regional? The annual cost of the building itself is relatively easy to figure since most banks determine interest and principal rates in advance. It is equally easy to deduct from this amount any local capital reserve funds and also anticipated state building aid (until this year it has been 30% of annual principal payment, but now it is only 16%). However, these costs are only the beginning. What about the "hidden costs", i.e., heat, lights, repairs, custodial services, equipment, supplies, emergency expenses, staffing and the like? Who could have predicted a few years ago that in 1972 several teachers in this area would be earning in excess of \$10,000.00 a year; or that the cost of school supplies would be up approximately 250%; or that full-time school custodians would be making between \$6,000.00 and \$8,000.00 annually? And yet these are the very same costs that are used to determine tuition rates. In other words, whether your junior high children attend Sanborn Regional, or whether they attend Ellis School the annual "hidden cost" of providing the same education for them will probably not be far different. If, on the other hand, Fremont chooses to build and REDUCE the educational program for these junior high children, some savings would naturally be realized.

Incidentally, while on the subject of tuition, you may be interested

to learn how Sanborn Regional determines this charge. By its school board policy Sanborn Regional sets this rate at \$50 above the state average junior high cost per pupil. This is rather unique because its own cost has always exceeded the state average. For example, Sanborn Regional is charging Fremont \$19.00 less per pupil this year than it actually cost to educate a junior high pupil at Sanborn Regional last year. Yet Sanborn Regional feels that even by setting this low tuition rate the money received from Fremont helps to provide a more comprehensive educational program for all seventh and eighth graders.

In the specific area of transportation you would definitely be able to save some money by returning these two grades. Again, the exact amount is questionable. Some estimate that an entire bus could be cut — a savings of approximately \$5,000. per year. A savings of approximately \$1,000 per year seems more realistic as these same 7th and 8th graders will still have to be transported to Ellis School.

It is also estimated that three additional teachers will be needed at Ellis School if these two grades return. The cost of three beginning teachers would probably be about eighteen to twenty thousand dollars the first year — supply and demand will determine this cost in future years. These three teachers would simply be teaching the fundamentals. No provision, whatsoever, is being made at this time to duplicate Sanborn Regional's comprehensive junior high program. In fact, not only money, but numbers of pupils alone would make any such achievement impossible in Fremont. The following educational programs would no longer be available to your junior high pupils: Physical Education, Art and Music, Shop, Home Economics, Guidance, Health Services and Special Reading Programs.

In conclusion, after all the necessary financial additions and subtractions are made, the overall annual cost to build and staff these 5 additional rooms, rather than continuing to send the junior high to Sanborn Regional, would prove to be surprisingly small. Certainly not enough difference to cause anyone to make his final choice on this cost factor alone.

Since the issue today is not far different than it was some five years ago, the Superintendent will close by simply repeating his recommendation of March 1967. "The issue, however, is not simply whether to build or not to build, or whether to increase or decrease your staff; but rather, whether you should relinquish local control over your seventh and eighth grade pupils and provide them, once and for all, with a comprehensive education. I would be remiss as an educator if I did not recommend the more comprehensive educational approach. However, the choice is yours and you will be called upon to express this choice on March 13, 1967. Therefore, I certainly hope that every voting citizen in the Town of Fremont will be available at this most

important meeting. Time will be devoted to reviewing the various aspects of these two proposals, especially as they relate to finances, before anyone will be asked to cast his vote.”

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

TO:

Townspeople of Fremont, New Hampshire
 Fremont School Board
 The School District Superintendent

PURPOSE:

This Committee was designed to:

1. Study the cost of school construction.
2. Develop plans for school construction.
3. Report their findings to the citizens of Fremont at the March 6, 1972 School District Meeting for their consideration.

GENERAL:

In the report of the Study Committee of 1969, it was stated by the committee that two or three architects should be contacted for new construction proposals. This was done — four architects being interviewed — their suggestions and proposals considered. The Committee then engaged Dennis and Tambling of Portsmouth, N.H. to prepare preliminary drawings and cost estimates.

The portable classrooms, such as Pinkerton Academy and Epping have, were ruled out by the committee as not being in keeping with a permanent building program.

The steel school construction at Deerfield was visited. The report shows that this construction is cold, that maintenance costs will be high, and adequate insulation is doubtful. There has not been enough experience with this type of construction to prove its adequacy.

Prestressed slab construction as is being used in East Kingston and Manchester was not recommended by 3 of the 4 architects interviewed.

After much preliminary discussion by the committee it was agreed that they should instruct the architects to proceed with preliminary plans for 4 classrooms and a multipurpose room and the necessary facilities for heating, sewage, storage, toilet facilities, and administrative space.

The architects report that their estimates show that this area of 12,000 square feet can be built for \$25.00 per square foot. It will be constructed as planned of cement blocks, faced with brick and pitched roof, as shown in the architects' rendering.

The cost to Fremont taxpayer for the new building addition will be approximately \$1.62 per \$1,000 of valuation.

Fremont will meet State Minimum Standards for Elementary School, grades one through eight.

It will do away with double sessions for 7th and 8th grade. Bus now leaves 10:45 a.m. and returns at 7:15 p.m. for the 7th and 8th graders.

Fremont will provide for future classroom expansion.

It will build equity in school plant instead of tuition payments.

It will provide for physical education needs for the youth of the

community.

It will provide space for gatherings of 350 people as an auditorium.

It was not the purpose of this committee to recommend, rather for the School Committee and the Budget Committee to present the figures in the Budget to the Townspeople for their consideration.

As chairman of this committee, I wish to express my gratitude and thanks for their cooperation. This committee and its advisor consisted of Richard Stanley, Meredith Bolduc, Ruth Anderson, and George Bassett, Jr.
