A short Executive Committee meeting was held at the Woodsville Courthouse Monday morning at 10:30, March 5th when upon a motion of George McGee and seconded by Mrs. Hayward the County Commissioners were unanimously authorized to borrow the sum of \$100,000 in anticipation of taxes.

In further action the Committee voted to rescind the motion made at its previous meeting concerning a recommendation to the forthcoming meeting of the Delegation relative to action in connection with the Federal Area Redevelopment Administration. Instead the following motion was passed unanimously, moved by Mr. Haskins and seconded by Mr. McGee — It is recommended by the Executive Committee that we appropriate \$2,000.00 to be expended subject to the approval of the Exective Committee as to the time of expenditure in connection with the Federal Area Redevelopment Administration. It was further voted that in case of necessity the Commissioners may bor-

row, with the approval of the Executive Committee, an additional \$3,000.00 which also is to be expended with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Present for the meeting were Chairman Larty, Mrs. Hayward, Mr. Haskins, Mrs. Martin, Mr. McGee, Mr. Plummer and Miss Loizeaux, Clerk.

COUNTY DELEGATION MEETING Monday, March 5, 1962

A County delegation meeting to act upon the annual budget was held at the County Farm in Haverhill, Monday, March 5. The meeting was preceded by a fine dinner attended by the representatives and delegates, and hosted by the three County Commissioners. Many availed themselves of the opportunity to inspect the various buildings at the Farm.

When the meeting was called to order by the Chairman, W. J. Larty of Haverhill, the flag salute was led by Mrs. Martin of Littleton. Mr. Larty then introduced James Rowe of Haverhill who answered questions regarding a fire at his property in Woodsville in 1958 which allegedly was the result of a break at the barn by two escapees of the House of Correction.

William Houle of Littleton, Chairman of the Grafton County Civil Defense set-up was then introduced by the Chairman and gave a resume of civil defense work in the County. He briefly outlined the county organization and survival program. Barry Mines, Executive Secretary of the New Hampshire Taxpayers

Association, spoke briefly on the County Budget. Commissioner George Clement was introduced and explained the background and present shortcomings of the County Hospital at the Farm mentioning its forthcoming needs in order to meet State specifications.

Harold Haskins, for the past six years a member of the Executive Committee was given a rising vote of thanks for his conscientious work in behalf of the County. For sometime a resident of Lyme and a Representative to the General Court from that town, Mr. Haskins has now moved to the town of Bradford in Vermont which precludes a further session in Concord and as a member of the Grafton County Delegation. He will be sadly missed in the group.

The Delegation members then went into Executive session on the 1962 Budget which was presented by Commissioner Kenneth G. Bell. He explained the individual items. The budget was accepted in entirety with the sum of \$3,000 added and divided as follows—Upon a motion by Mr. Coutermarsh of Lebanon and seconded by Mr. McGee of Lincoln it was voted to appropriate \$1,000 to aid in the refurbishing and repainting at the Lebanon Courthouse. A standing vote was requested with 19 in favor and 15 against.

The sum of \$2,000.00 was added to the County Extension Service item under the following motion made by Mr. McGee and seconded by Mr. Coutermarsh — That the recommendation of the Executive Committee be accepted whereby we appropriate \$2,000 to be expended subject to the approval of the Executive Committee as to the time of expenditure in connection with the Federal Area Redevelopment Administration. Further voted that in case of necessity the Com-

missioners may borrow, with the approval of the Executive Committee an additional \$3,000 which also is to be expended with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Following acceptance of the Budget as amended, Mr. Coutermarsh moved and Mr. DeWolf seconded that the James Rowe complaint be left in the hands of the Executive Committee to seek legal advice as to the position of the County. Unanimously voted. It was further voted to discharge the committee which worked on the changes at the Register of Deeds office and fire escape at the Farm. This was voted and then the Chairman appointed the same committee to investigate any work to be done at the hospital at the County Farm which is composed of Reps. Fletcher Low, Eda Martin, Gladys Whipple and George McGee with the Chairman, W. J. Larty, to serve ex officio.

The meeting adjourned at 3:50 p.m.

Rep. Fletcher Low of Hanover, chairman of the special committee on investigating the possible increase of beds at the County Hospital gave a brief report of his committee's work and announced that the

group would meet within a fortnight to settle on definite recommendations to be made to the Delegation. Following the meeting the members of the Executive Committee adjourned to the Farm to inspect possible changes for an enlargement of the hospital.

Rep. George McGee reported on OEDP (ARA) and made the following motion — That the Commissioners be authorized to borrow and expend the \$3,000 authorized at the March 5, 1962 Executive Committee meeting, to be used in conjunction with the \$2,000 previously appropriated, for the purpose of Grafton County's participation in the Urban Planning 702 Assistance Program.

The above motion was seconded by Rep. Gladys Whipple of Lebanon and passed unanimously.

Meeting of Committee on Grafton County Hospital Review at Woodsville. Nov. 15, 1962.

Present: Low, McGee, Whipple, County Commissioners.

Based on information furnished in enclosed report or report furnished you at above meeting, the Committee on Grafton County Hospital Review for increased bed use makes the following statements and recommendations:

- 1. There is no question concerning the necessity of increased bed space. Need is critical.
- 2. Rejection of any and all plans proposed for the remodeling of the present County Hospital building, because:
 - a) Remodeling would be only a makeshift.
 - b) Loss of rooms for Mr. and Mrs. Little, for relatives of patients and for workers.
 - c) No Federal Aid. Cost borne entirely by the County. Estimated cost: \$35,000 \$45,000.
 - d) Confusion and dirt caused by the remodeling would be detrimental to the work of the hospital.
- 3. Recommend the building of a new wing as recommended in letter of Nov. 8, 1962, from Lester K. Billings, Director Hospital Services, Department of Health and Welfare, Division of Public Health. This will give 20 new beds or 40 new beds depending on whether a one story or a two story wing is built.
- 4. Cost of new wing is estimated at \$200,000 of which the Federal Aid would amount to \$100,000. The County share (\$100,000) to be financed by a bond issue.
- 5. Further information and recommendations relative to construction of new wing to be the responsibility of the County Commissioners, since they are the only legal authorities qualified to negotiate loans and sign legal commitments.

- a) Preliminary drawings of proposed new wing for both a one story addition and a two story addition.
- b) Costs, estimated as accurately as possible, for the two proposed plans.
- c) Further negotiation with Lester K. Billings, Director Hospital Services, Dep't. of Health and Welfare.
- d) Determination of all details necessary to qualify for Federal Aid.
- e) Recommendations for and details of bond issue to cover County costs.
- f) The above to be ready for Grafton County delegation meeting when called after the convening of the 1963 legislature.

This subject will be taken up later at the meeting of the entire delegation. The Executive group favored a 2-story addition to be financed by a bond issue.

With no other business to be discussed the meeting adjourned at 11 a.m.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, the biennial examination and audit of the accounts of Grafton County has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission. The audit covered the fiscal years ended December 31, 1960 and December 31, 1961. Submitted herewith is the report of this audit including Exhibits as hereafter listed. The report is made in three sections as follows:

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Farm.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets:

December 31, 1960—December 31, 1961

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1959 - 1960 and December 31, 1960 - 1961 are represented in Exhibits A and J, respectively. As indicated therein, the Surplus decreased by \$2,947.40 in 1960. In 1961, the financial condition of the County changed from a Surplus of \$9,151.12 to a Net Debt of \$10.292.61.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

Statements presenting an analysis of the factors which caused the change in financial condition of the County during the fiscal years ended December 31, 1960 and December 31, 1961, are included in Exhibits B and K, respectively.

In 1960, the Surplus decreased by \$2,947.40. The factors which caused this were as follows:

In the fiscal year ended December 31, 1960, a net overdraft of appropriations of \$36,823.33, less a revenue surplus of \$29,598.93, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$7,224.40.

A net overdraft of appropriations of \$24,168.10, less a revenue surplus of \$16,935.66, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$7,232.44, in 1961.

Summary statements of the receipts and expenditures of the County, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1960 and 1961, are presented in Exhibits E and N, respectively.

Accounts of Commissioners and Treasurer

All orders issued by the Commissioners and Clerk of the Superior Court during the fiscal year were examined and compared with corresponding entries in the Treasurer's records. Supporting invoices and payrolls were also examined and the classification of expenditures noted. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1961, is shown in Exhibit O.

Clerk of the Superior Court

The financial accounts and records of the Clerk of Court of Grafton County were examined. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

County Farm

The accounts and records of the Superintendent of the County Farm were examined. Receipts of the Farm were checked by source through the triplicate receipt forms. All receipts, as recorded in the cash book, were properly accounted for by the Superintendent through deposits to the credit of the County Treasurer's account in the Woodsville National Bank.

Statements of receipts and expenditures of the

County Farm for the years 1960 and 1961 are presented in Exhibits G and P, respectively.

General Comments

Net Overdraft of Appropriations — Application of Chapter 24, Section 15, of the Revised Statutes Annotated:

It is noted that in the years 1960 and 1961, there were net overdrafts of budgetary appropriations in the following amounts:

1960—\$ 36,823.33 (Exhibit D)

1961—\$ 24,168.10 (Exhibit M)

In accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. Chapter 24, Section 15, the Executive Committee of the Grafton County Convention at a meeting held on December 19, 1960, granted authority to the County Commissioners to exceed 1960 budgetary appropriations for County Farm and Court purposes by the amount of any unexpended balance in the treasury.

Similar authority to exceed 1961 budgetary appropriations was granted by the Executive Committee at a meeting held on December 18, 1961.

Conclusion:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, a copy of this report or a summary of its findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the County. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the publication of Exhibits is optional.

The appreciation and thanks of this Division is hereby expressed to the officials of Grafton County and their office staffs for the assistance rendered during the course of the audit.

New machinery purchased this past year was a hay conditioner, wheel rake, hydraulic loader for the John Deere tractor, manure spreader and hay conveyor. A rake and manure spreader were exchanged for two pieces of the above equipment.

The hay crop was below normal so more corn was planted to help make up for this shortage. All other crops were about normal. The usual canning and freezing of vegetables was done.

At the beginning of the year a general increase in wages was given to the employees. Unseen expenses of the institution were the leaking of the steam return line from the boiler to the main building and replacing part of the sewerage system.

The usual amount of painting was done in the building.

New bedside stands, an air mattress, and Ophlhalnoscope were purchased for the hospital. A steam cart from which hot meals can be served to the patients has been used in the hospital since the first of the year. The Maternity room, no longer used in our hospital, was equipped with new furniture, thus adding three much needed beds to our use. Our hospital has been filled to capacity at all times and most of the time we have a waiting list.

In October, Harry Hatch, who has been Farm Manager for fourteen years, died of a heart attack. He is greatly missed by all who worked or were associated with him, for he was a man who was ever faithful and at all times worked for the interest of Grafton County Farm.

The annual Christmas party was very successful. As in years past many organizations, clubs and individuals gave most generously so all of the residents were well remembered. For the gifts, visits and many groups of carolers we say a most sincere thank you.

It certainly is a pleasure to have such a willing and cooperative staff working with us. We appreciate their every effort and kindness. We are indeed fortunate to have our hospital under the able direction of Dr. C. D. Eastman and Evelyn Bigelow, R. N., and their fine staff.

Rev. Ralph Bruce came as Chaplain in July. He has held services here on the first and third Sundays of each month, the Groton group of young people the second and fourth Sundays. Father Regan has attended his people here. Several other ministers have made calls on the residents and all of these have brought comfort to many.

We received many books and magazines throughout the year for which we are most grateful.

Occupational Therapy was taken over in March by Mrs. Marjorie Jamback of Woodsville. Classes are held once a week in the Chapel and once a week she spends time in our hospital. Many worthwhile projects were completed and several articles were sold to the general public. A group of ladies from Woodsville assist her one day a month. Many thanks to these ladies for their work and time in such a worthwhile program.

We wish to thank the Commissioners, Mrs. Madeline Kirk, Mrs. Doris Hobbs, Dr. Eastman, the Chaplains and staff for their fine cooperation and help during this past year.

FINANCIAL REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1962

The Grafton County Cooperative Extension Service is financed through the cooperative efforts of County, State and Federal Governments.

Grafton County Extension Service is made up of four separate lines of educational work, which are: Agricultural, Home Economics, 4-H Club and Forestry.

The governing body for Cooperative Extension Work is the Grafton County Extension Service Council, which is composed of 13 members. This Council has the job of guiding the Extension Program and Agents. Chairman of this Council is Walter B. Knight, of Monroe.

Extension Agents are available to work with anyone in the County. Prior to 1962 both Agricultural Agents spent most of their time with commercial farmers. In March of this year the organization and educational parts of Rural Area Development, and subsequently Area Redevelopment were assigned to County Agent Richard Rutherford. This involves land and other natural resource use in all phases of the county economy. Other agents spend a large percentage of their time with rural non-farm and urban groups and individuals. REPORT OF COUNTY PHYSICIAN

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I hereby submit my report for 1961.

A few changes were made this year, the main one being the addition of another three bed room. This was done by changing our old delivery room, which was used last year for storage and X-Ray, into a three bed patient's room. This necessitated moving the X-Ray machine into the operating room, which is not good because the operating room walls are not lead lined. We have used the corridors for storage of wheel chairs and other equipment. This is not a satisfactory permanent arrangement. Another change was the addition of another sink in the kitchen for rinsing of dishes to conform with State regulations.

Three new modern beds and thirty-three bedside tables have been added to our hospital equipment.

The hospital has been very busy with an average of 30.9 patients which is almost 100% capacity because the raise from thirty to thirty-three beds was not accomplished until June 1962. We have one locked room with a barred window which we try to keep for prisoners or psychiatric emergencies. This bed has been full, too, most of the time.

At the present time we are not allowed to do major operations or deliveries in our institution and I do not think a major operating room or delivery room should be a part of future plans.

All patients in the institution who are on medications are counted in our outpatient census. I do not see each of them, but their medicines are put up and dispensed from our dispensary daily and I see them at varying intervals.

This past year the working conditions at the County Hospital have been very pleasant and I appreciate the cooperation from all concerned.
