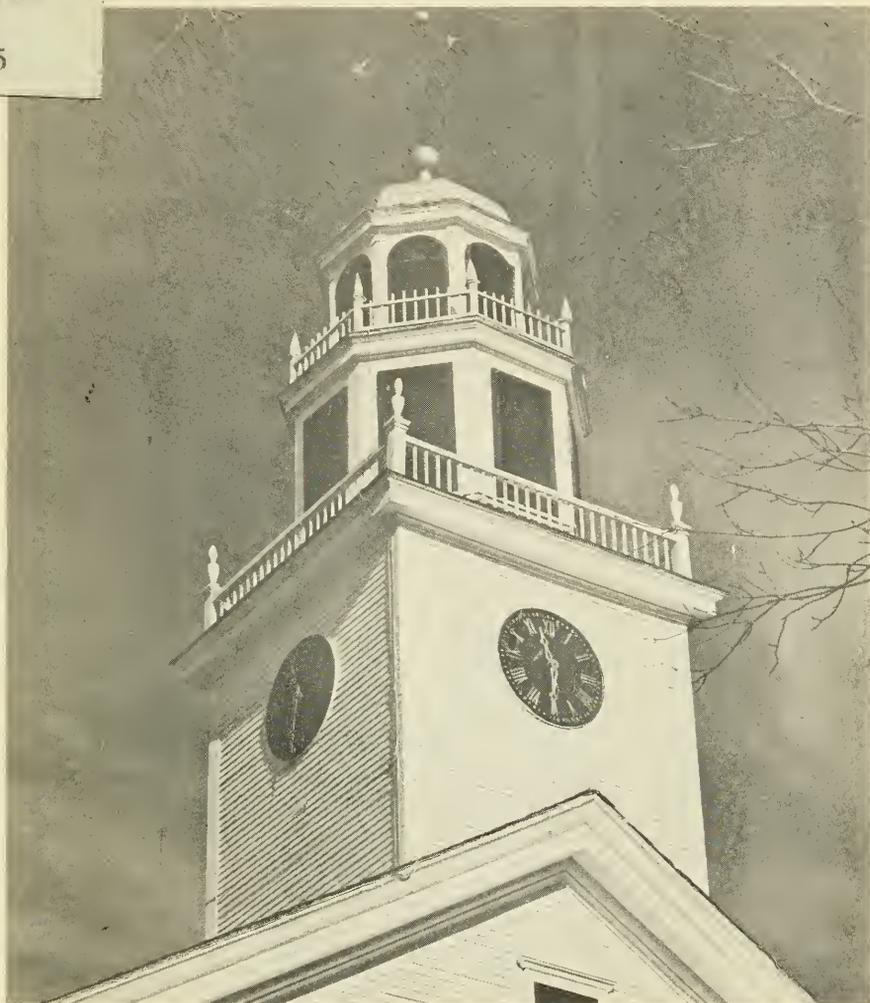

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## TOWN JOURNAL

This year – 1975 has seen the successful completion of many programs in celebration of our Bicentennial bringing together, both young and older generation, townfolk in fellowship.

First event of our year-long Bicentennial Celebration scheduled – Valentine Box Social sponsored by the Library Trustees – found both young and old, vying for box suppers – John Brodie, auctioneer – good fun, good food, good fellowship ending with an old-fashioned sing-a-long with most of the participants in costumes of days of yore.

The first annual Blue and Gold Dinner for the Boy Scouts in Greenfield was held February 24th with an attendance of 100 and the presentation of the essay awards of “What Scouting Means to Me” to 1st, Larry Fox; 2nd, Steve Phelps, and 3rd, Darryl Ouellette.

Peter Hopkins, new Greenfield moderator, succeeded his uncle, Frank Hopkins, who had served 23 years and was presented a certificate of appreciation.

The March Bicentennial Event was the Square Dance arranged by Camp Union with caller, Charles Webster of Bedford, Mass., who brought his own music – was well attended and enjoyed.

In April the Greenfield Woman’s Club offered a Turkey Dinner and a play reading of “1776” as their 1975 Bicentennial gift to the town.

Jarvis Adams IV and Jeffrey Sieben, both Conval Freshmen, represented Greenfield in the Manchester Bunker Hill Day Parade.

Ed and Ann Conley’s Thrift Shop opened in April.

At noon, April 19th, the bell in our Meetinghouse Tower was tolled along with others in community centers across the land to announce the official beginning of the Bicentennial. Mac Atherton, Gordon Carpenter, Ann and Danny Carpenter, Herbert Anderson, Joe and Crissy Naylor did the honors here.

The 10th consecutive year of wheelchair-bound athletes coming to Crotched Mt. for Athletic competition was an honor, but the real honor this year was that it was the New England qualifying round for the national wheelchair games held later at the University of Illinois.

Not only have the Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts been active this year, but there has also been a Brownie Troop, a Girl Scout Troop, and 4-H Clubs which have been busy with horses and cooking. For their Bicentennial contribution the 4-H Club sponsored a Strawberry Festival at the Crotched Mt. Antique Auto Show.

The elementary school children presented a patriotic program as their gift to the town Bicentennial celebration – each of the 63 children were costumed and participated in musical numbers, dances and tableaux.

Tri-Town Kindergarten graduated 18 in June, but did not open in September due to lack of children in 5-year age group.

Our Volunteer Fire Department gathers accolades in whatever they do – but

it was especially recognized when they brought home the trophy for the best appearing unit (apparatus and personnel) in the Golden Anniversary Muster and Parade sponsored by the Rindge Fire Department in June.

Three – 40th Anniversary Celebrations – Congratulations and Best Wishes to Mr. & Mrs. George F. Russell, who celebrated in March; Mr. & Mrs. Wayland Russell, who celebrated in May; and Mr. & Mrs. Ralph Russell, whose party in June was a real surprise.

The Library has had an outstanding year. Regular film programs for all; establishment of community calendar of dates; early crafts displays and courses offered; Bicentennial Fashions display; Librarian Ann Geisel accepted an achievement recognition, one of 109 given by the State Library Commission, in which Chairman Porter stated:

“This certificate is a small token of appreciation for your efforts on behalf of the reading public in your community, and also for the success of the Statewide Library Development Program since its establishment in 1965.”

The Library now has a telephone -2790. Mrs. Remus McAllister was appointed Librarian as Ann Geisel resigned to accept a new position.

The 19th annual July 4th Whing Ding was once again arranged by the Recreation Committee, and spearheaded by Mrs. Ruth Russell. The Webelos painted all the booths for a bright, fresh look to open the midway. Miss New Hampshire – Miss Katherine Burnham reigned over the event, with an impressive parade of original floats and antique cars filling Forest Road.

A Soil survey was taken by the Soil Conservation Service in Milford. Their data will be useful in determining town planning and proper land use.

The Yankee Tunsmiths presented a selection of early American songs and instruments as the Bicentennial Committee's August event.

An “attitude survey” was sent out to determine the townspeople's likes, dislikes, hopes and directions for Greenfield. Such information will be collated and passed on to the proper town authorities through the efforts of Ted Bonner and his ad hoc committee.

Fire Chief Dale Russell exchanged marriage vows with Edith Hall in a candlelit ceremony at the Crotched Mountain chapel.

Greenfield celebrated its designation as an official American Revolution Bicentennial Community on Sunday, September 14, 1975. There was a parade to the fire station where ceremonies attended the raising of the Bicentennial flag. A fire muster followed at Crotched Mountain.

The annual Harvest Fair sponsored by the Greenfield Woman's Club was bigger and better than ever. An added attraction was the transformation of the Town Hall stage into an old-fashioned kitchen. From “farmer's market” to “attic treasures” the day was a success.

A large elm tree on Forest Road was designated as an Historic Elm by the Elm Research Institute. Thirteen feet in circumference, the tree is thought to have dated from the 1700's. A copper plaque attests to its age and historic interest.

The Crotched Mountain Ridge Runners began their season early this year by sponsoring October's Bicentennial event. The club cooked turkey with all the fixings for a crowd of two hundred. A talent show organized by Mr. & Mrs. Dan Paro and Mr. & Mrs. Ralph Russell followed the sumptuous meal.

November 1st saw the Town House transformed to yesteryear. "Our Country's Heritage" featured a display of antiques from 1900 and earlier. The stage was set for an early American Thanksgiving, while other parts of the Town Hall were sectioned off as rooms and decoratively arranged. Tea was served by hostesses Edythe Atherton and Mary Sleeper.

Over 150 townspeople honored Rick and Delza Weir with a farewell party. Reverend Weir has been the minister of the Greenfield Congregational Church. They leave so that Dr. Weir may accept a new pastorate in Rehoboth, Massachusetts.

The children of the Greenfield Elementary School, assisted by their teachers, served a complete Thanksgiving dinner to Greenfield's Senior Citizens and other select guests. All the food was prepared by the students. About 80 people enjoyed the feast.

A meeting of concerned citizens was held November 29th to discuss the future of the Town House. A study committee reported that the 180 year old structure was in fine shape. Plans were discussed for a general beautification program for both the Town House and the common.

The final Bicentennial event of the year was the Bicentennial Ball. Held on December 5th, it was a gala affair, with most of the participants in period costume. Those who saved their tickets will be admitted to Greenfield's Tricentennial Ball – with a hundred years to look forward to it!

There were three new houses built in town this year, belonging to: Mr. & Mrs. Daniel Sullivan on the Mountain Road, Mr. & Mrs. James Sullivan on Slip Road and Mr. and Mrs. Edward Holt. Seven hundred and sixty cars were registered. The checklist for registered voters shows 473 names. Good news for '75 – the tax rate dropped 90 cents.

As midnight drew near, several townsmen journeyed to the Town House. Jerry Adams, Gordon Carpenter, Bob Geisel, Fay Jennings, George Rainier, and Don Winslow rang out the old year, and rang in the new. Two hundred tolls for a Happy Birthday, America!

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# TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Greenfield in the County of Hillsborough in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Greenfield on Tuesday the ~~second~~<sup>EIGHTH</sup> day of March at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

The first article of the Town Warrant will be to choose Town Officers and to act on a proposal to expand exemptions on real estate taxes. The polls will be open at 10:00 a.m. and close at 6:00 p.m. unless otherwise voted at the meeting. Recess until Friday, March 5 at 7:00 p.m. when Article 2 and remaining articles of the Warrant will be acted upon.

Article 1-a: To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 1-b: To vote by ballot on whether to expand exemptions on real estate taxes for persons 65 and older as provided by RSA 72: 43-b and 43-c.

Article 2: To raise and appropriate such sums of money for the operation and maintenance of Town Property, Old Age Assistance, Social Security, Town Officers' Salaries, Town Officers' Expenses, Legal Expenses, Debt Service, Insurance, Planning Board Expenses, Community Services and any other charges arising within the Town as proposed under "Appropriations which Comprise Town Charges" printed elsewhere in this report.

Article 3: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums as are necessary to defray Town charges in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 4: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, standing committees or other officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 5: To see if the Town will appropriate \$4,500 of Revenue Sharing Funds for tarring Town roads or take any action relative thereto.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,437.93 for the care of Town roads allocated:

\$ 8,523.90 to Summer Maintenance

\$25,914.03 to Winter Maintenance

or take any action relative thereto.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$11,042.32 of Highway Subsidy Funds for maintenance of Town roads, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$727.75 provided the State will contribute \$4,851.65 for the construction and betterment of Class IV and V highways, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,776.00 as final payment of principal on the grader.

Article 10: To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate from Revenue Sharing Funds for purchase of a new truck for the Highway Department. (Proposed by the Highway Study Committee.)

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400.00 for the support of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto. (Proposed by the Fire Department.)

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate not over \$1,000.00 for personnel protection equipment for the Fire Department to match a grant of the same amount from the Federal Title Four Program. (Proposed by the Fire Department.)

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the support of the Police Department, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 toward a highway safety patrol project, provided the N.H. Highway Safety Agency grants an equal amount. (Proposed by the Highway Safety Committee.)

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate not over \$4,400.00 for the purchase of a fully equipped police cruiser, provided 40% of the purchase price is reimbursed out of Federal Highway Safety Funds, leaving the cost to the Town at \$2,640. (Proposed by the Highway Safety Committee.)

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,800.00 of Revenue Sharing Funds to purchase and install a traffic signal on Forest Road in front of the Fire Station as requested by the State Highway Department, or take any action relative thereto. (Proposed by the Selectmen.)

Article 18: To see if the Town will require that comparative budgets be published in the Annual Report by the Fire, Highway and Police Departments and the Library. (Proposed by the Selectmen.)

Article 19: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 to make a gravel-packed parking lot, approximately 24' x 40' on town land for use of the Library, or take any other action relative thereto. (Proposed by Town Building Committee.)

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to embark on a five-year program, coinciding with our Nation's Bicentennial celebration, to restore and renovate the interior and exterior appointments and decor of our historic Town House as well as to rehabilitate its landscaping and to restructure parking facilities, or to take any other action relative thereto. (Proposed by Town House Committee.)

Article 21: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate for the rehabilitation of the landscaping and the restructuring of parking facilities of the Town House or to take any action relative thereto. (Proposed by Town House Committee.)

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 to match \$2,500.00 from the Recreation Committee for the purpose of completing and fencing the tennis court as Stage 1 of the improvement of town recreational facilities now being planned with the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, and to grant permission to the Selectmen to add the total (\$5,000.00) to the sum for which matching funds are sought from the B.O.R., or take any action relative thereto. (Proposed by the Recreation Committee.)

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$25,000.00 to remodel the downstairs part of the old firehouse into complete town offices. The sum to be raised as follows: Allocate \$4,600.00 plus interest from sale of the old Highway Garage property; raise \$5,000.00 at this meeting and balance over a four-year period; authorize the Selectmen to borrow the balance of \$15,400 unless the Town votes to appropriate Revenue Sharing monies for the balance, or take any action relative thereto. (Proposed by Town Buildings Committee.)

Article 25: To see whether the Town will vote to apply the proceeds from the sale of the Old Highway Garage, amounting to \$4,600.00 plus interest to the reconstruction of the old Firehouse for Town Offices; or to establish a Town Equipment Fund for the Fire, Highway and Police Departments; or toward the retirement of the Town Building debt; or for some other purpose. (Proposed by the Selectmen.)

✓ Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts given the Town in trust or otherwise by any individual or group of individuals or take any action relative thereto.

? X Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,200.00 to purchase 12.6 acres more or less of wild land adjacent to the George Proctor Recreational Area from Mrs. Richard Fleck for conservation use by the Town. (Application is in process for B.O.R. funding to reimburse the Town for this expenditure.) (Proposed by the Selectmen.)

? Article 28: To see if the Town will direct the Tax Collector to send out early tax bills based on one half the previous year's taxes, and to credit payments received by August 1st at 4% per year. (Proposed by the Selectmen.)

Article 29: To see if the Town will vote to elect members of the Planning Board (now appointed.)

Article 30: To see if the Town will vote to change the title of Road Agent to

Superintendent of Public Works, and to give him such responsibilities for the good order of town roads and other facilities as the Selectmen shall from time to time determine. (Proposed by Selectmen.)

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,000.00 for a new appraisal of all town real estate by the State of New Hampshire. (Proposed by the Selectmen.)

✓ Article 32: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of Town property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 33: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$5,500.00 for the Historical Society toward the cost of printing the new town history, provided the financial record of this amount is audited by the Town Auditors annually, said appropriation to be repaid from the proceeds of sales.

✓ Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Southwestern, New Hampshire Planning Commission, and to raise and appropriate ~~\$400.00~~ <sup>\$550.00</sup> as the Town's share of operational expenses. (Submitted by the Southwestern N.H. Regional Planning Commission.)

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application, and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

Article 36: To see if the Town will adopt the following resolution "A" pertaining to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 and Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973.

Resolution No. "A"

WHEREAS, certain areas of Greenfield are subject to periodic flooding from streams and rivers causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 and the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA Chapters 31, 36, 156 and 156-a.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that this Town Meeting hereby:

1) Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in full force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

2) Vests the Board of Selectmen with the responsibility, authority and means to:

(a) Delineate or assist the administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

(b) Provide such information as the administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain.

(c) Cooperate with Federal, State and Local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map and identify flood plain areas and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community and the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.

3) Appoints the Board of Selectmen to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation on the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

4) Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program."

Article 36: To see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulations pursuant to RSA 156 as follows: "The Board of Selectmen shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (1) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse or a lateral movement of the structure (2) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (3) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage."

Article 37: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the support of the Stephenson Memorial Library, or take any action relative thereto. (Submitted by Library Trustees.)

✓ Article 38: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting, or take any action relative thereto.

## TOWN MEETING – GREENFIELD, N.H.

March 4, 1975

Meeting opened at 10:30 a.m. with salute to the flag lead by Gardner Glover. Rev. Richard Weir lead the Lord's prayer, Moderator Peter Hopkins read the warrant through article one. Ann Geisel, supervisor of the checklist, read checklist with 495 names thereon. Polls opened and closed at 6 p.m.

### Art. 1. ZONING VOTE:

No. 1. Amend section 3, paragraph A., of the Zoning Ordinance, as follows:  
Following Sub-paragraph 9, add:

A resident may personally conduct upon his property a yard sale, garage sale, barn sale, tag sale, or similar sale by any other name, of personal property; provided same does not cause traffic congestion and does not interfere with the safety, convenience and general welfare of surrounding property owners, upon receipt of written permit following application to the Board of Selectmen. Such permit shall be limited to one such sale not to exceed three continuous days. A maximum of three permits per residence may be granted in any one calendar year.

VOTE: Yes (180) – No (77)

Therefore voted in the affirmative and I so declare it.

No. 2. Amend Section 3, Paragraph B, of the Zoning Ordinance, as follows:  
Following sub-paragraph 8, add:

A resident may personally conduct upon his property a yard sale, garage sale, barn sale, tag sale, or similar sale by any other name, of personal property; provided same does not cause traffic congestion and does not interfere with the safety, convenience and general welfare of surrounding property owners, upon receipt of written permit following application to the Board of Selectmen. Such permit shall be limited to one such sale not to exceed three continuous days. A maximum of three permits per residence may be granted in any one calendar year.

VOTE: Yes (148) – No (79)

Therefore voted in the affirmative and I so declare it.

No. 3. Amend Section 4, Paragraph F, of the Land subdivision regulations (to conform with RSA 36:23) as follows:

Add at the end of thereof:

Before the final plat shall have been approved or disapproved, the Board shall hold a Public Hearing on the plan. Notice thereof shall be sent to the subdivider by certified or registered mail, with return receipt requested, stating the time and place of such hearing, not less than five (5) days before the date fixed therefor and posted in at least one public place in the Town. All abutters shall be mailed similar notice of said hearing.

VOTE: Yes (173) – No (49)

Therefore voted in the affirmative and I so declare it.

## Ballot vote of officers:

Selectman for three years: Lloyd R. Cochran, Jr. had 213 votes. Write-ins, Amie Metivier, two votes; Steve Atherton, three votes; Steve Payne, two votes; Anna Chute, one vote; Arthur Gagnon, three votes; Chester Soule, one vote; Jane Kellogge, twelve votes; Robert Geisel, four votes and Leon Hanson, one vote. Lloyd R. Cochran, Jr. having 213 votes therefore elected for the ensuing three years.

Town Clerk for one year: Anna M. Chute had 259 votes; write-ins, Ann Geisel, two votes and Dorothy Pacheco, one vote. Anna M. Chute having 259 votes elected for the ensuing year.

Tax Collector for one year: Anna M. Chute had 260 votes; write-in votes, Ann Geisel had two votes, Dorothy Pacheco, one vote. Anna M. Chute having 260 votes elected for the ensuing year.

Town Treasurer for one year: Jacquelyn Whiton had 247 votes; write-ins, Helen Lambert, one vote; Sue Bonner, one vote. Jacquelyn Whiton having 247 votes elected for the ensuing year.

Mrs. Hopkins suggested that the General fund show a list of all spent and unexpended monies in the future.

The Selectmen stated the Tax Map was nearly completed and people are to come to the Selectmen's office and check their plots of land and make any suggestions before the final print.

Mr. Peter Hopkins, our new moderator, was given a rising vote of thanks for his excellent job done.

## ABOUT GREENFIELD

Our 40 miles of roads include 30 which the town has designated as scenic roads. No substantial alteration or cutting may take place along them without a public hearing.

Greenfield's zoning ordinance, enacted in 1936, was one of the first in Southern New Hampshire.

It is estimated that town population in 1975 is 770.

Our tax rate, one of the few in the State to drop this year, is \$33.40 per thousand.

The cost of schools represents 78% of this cost, county government 6%, town government 16%. Of the Town's 16% share of your tax dollar, roughly half is needed for maintenance of our roads.

Greenfield is not alone in spending a very large fraction of its tax dollar on education. High costs are general throughout the State. Indeed, many school districts have higher costs. Recent figures show that of 18 school districts in Southern New Hampshire, our district, Conval, had the lowest per capita tax burden.

The heavy load of school expense carried by local real estate taxes is due to State policy. The government of New Hampshire does less for schools than the government of any other state.

A further irritant of Town, State relationships is the habit of the Legislature of imposing financial burdens on towns without provision for funding.

Current use assessments reduced taxes of landowners last year by nearly \$5,000.00 and transferred this tax load to buildings.

The Town Clerk and the Selectmen hold regular office hours as stated in public notices at the Post Office, the Greenfield Industries, and the Town House.

## NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN, 1975

“The Board of Selectmen  
Greenfield, New Hampshire

Dear Sirs:

“Revenue Sharing, Community Improvement, Water Quality Requirements, Zoning Difficulties, Subdivision Impacts, Environmental Assessments . . . all these complex problems and more are creating new and increasing demands.

“You are bearing the brunt of the intricate requirements of many new Federal programs while a broad variety of technical developments challenge your time and patience.”

These words addressed to the Selectmen in a routine letter last December were sweet to have. They brought us assurance that we are not alone in feeling overwhelmed at times by new legislation, new requirements (some dubious and controversial), new opportunities that flood out of Concord and Washington.

Ideally, Selectmen should make themselves instant authorities on complex and unfamiliar business as it comes along. We claim no such competence. A wide gap has existed between our aspirations and what we have, with voter support, been able to achieve. We do not offer this as an excuse. It is simply a fact of life of which voters should be aware.

While we have accomplished less for Greenfield this year than its people deserve, we have also made progress. Our list of achievements in 1975 has been the work of many citizens:

—the completion of Greenfield’s tax map and its soil survey four years before State legislation requires.

—the initiation of our first Community Attitudes Survey.

—the improved operation of the Dump and the extension of open burning to July 1, 1977.

—active citizen participation in Bicentennial and other important committee service and high attendance at town hearings.

—initiation of a Federal-State program to help with police problems.

—settlement in the courts of a long drawn-out controversy about a zoning violation.

—a \$1.50 reduction in the tax rate.

In a year when costs have soared on all sides, a sharp drop in a town's tax rate deserves special attention. The Governor, noting Greenfield's results, sent his congratulations. But we wonder: Did he praise us for the wrong reasons? We admit to working hard, to being thrifty with tax dollars. But so have the Selectmen of other years.

It seems clear that the principal reason why the Town has a lower 1975 tax rate is that valuations have risen. We believe that the implications of this benefit and its promise for the future cannot be too strongly stated.

We believe that Greenfield can count on further gain if there is wide and active citizen recognition that:

1. Good business management pays off.
2. The best way to reduce taxes, other things being equal, is to increase the tax base.
3. Whatever protects and improves the quality of life adds values from which everyone in Greenfield benefits.
4. There is no better way to honor the men and women of 200 years ago who laid the foundations for America and for our town than to restore to their full usefulness and beauty the Common, the Town House, and the Playing Field we have inherited from them.

The benefits should be great and lasting, the costs, by comparison, very low. Several articles in the warrant will test voters' responses to this great Bicentennial challenge.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

## SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE

The 30th of June of this year was originally to have been the final date for allowing open burning at the Town Dump but, the State has granted us a one year extension. This suggests that we must find an alternate means of disposal for our solid waste — bottles, cans, paper trash, garbage, etc. Among these alternatives are either our own sanitary landfill or an incinerator; a cooperative effort with a neighboring town in a sanitary landfill or incinerator, or the engaging of a private trash collecting contractor who will remove the material from the town.

All these possibilities have been rather thoroughly studied over the past three years. A cooperative effort with any of our neighboring towns must be set aside either through their declining to share facilities or because of the high cost and the attendant uncertainties involved in such an undertaking; a sanitary landfill of our own would be prohibitive in its initial costs (land acquisition, site preparation, heavy equipment purchase) as well as having very high operating costs. Economics force us to choose either a private trash collector or our own incinerator. Incineration coupled with recycling should hopefully keep our total costs within acceptable limits. More specific information about our present situation and the possible remedies will be provided from the floor of the Town Meeting.

## TOWN BUILDINGS COMMITTEE REPORT

The committee appointed by the Moderator to look into town office space has met several times since last Town Meeting.

It was the consensus of this committee that there should be no alterations of the Town House for this purpose and that the room now used by the Town Clerk should be returned to its original purpose, that of a small kitchen for use of organizations renting the Town Hall. A plan has been proposed for the old fire house which will be described by this committee.

The front of the building changed to a colonial front, removing the overhead doors. New windows to conform. Ceilings lowered, insulation in walls and cement floor to level.

Offices for Selectmen, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Secretary and Town Treasurer, as well as a walk-in vault for town papers and safe. We have planned two toilets, to be tied into the present septic system. We have also planned a room for the Police Chief, if, as and when this is necessary.

These rooms would be heated by electric heat, since the spaces would only be used periodically and it would not be necessary to heat all the time.

The upstairs of this building should be turned over to organizations who need meeting rooms and the present heating system, by minor changes, could be used to heat the upstairs.

The area north of the building, toward Russells, to be bulldozed level for parking area for this building, and by doing this the hazard of traffic on route 136 would be eliminated.

This will be quite costly, but the committee believes this is a must for the town and should be done as soon as possible. To use existing town-owned buildings should save the town from expending more monies for a new office building.

**REPORT GREENFIELD**  
**AMERICAN REVOLUTION BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE**  
**1776 GREENFIELD, NEW HAMPSHIRE 1976**

On September 26, 1974, a letter was sent to all town organizations asking that a representative from their organization be present at a general meeting to plan for the celebration of 200 years of freedom. Sent by the Greenfield Historical Society, for the purpose of coordinating all organizations and to provide continuity in events, the letter prompted more than a dozen persons to the Stephenson Memorial Library on October 15, 1974. At this time, a core committee of five persons, Pam Carpenter, Frank Hopkins, Barbara Fraser, Anna Chute and Wally Stone were appointed to plan for another meeting and to nominate officers. Nominated and voted into office were: Co-chairpersons, Malcolm and Edythe Atherton; Secretary, Anne P. Carpenter; Treasurer, Anna M. Chute; and Liaison, Waldo Stone.

In a series of meetings, a program of events for the following 18 months was scheduled. It was the plan of the ARBC to have an event each month culminating in an "all out" celebration on July 4, 1976. Each event would be sponsored by a different town organization with help from the ARBC.

The first event scheduled was a Valentine's Day Box Supper and Sing Along held on February 14, 1975 at the Meeting House and sponsored by the Library Trustees.

On March 15, 1975, the ARBC held a square dance at the Meeting House with caller, Charles Webster.

April saw a colonial dinner and a playreading "1776" held at the Meeting House and sponsored by the Greenfield Woman's Club.

Under the guidance of Eva Gagnon, the teachers at Greenfield Elementary School and many cooperative parents, the school children, all in colonial dress performed in a Bicentennial pageant. For their performance, each child was presented a Bicentennial pin by Mac and Edythe Atherton. Also in May, Jarvis Adams IV and Jeff Sieben marched in the "Bunker Hill Day" celebration parade in Manchester. These young men were winners of an essay contest sponsored by the ARBC.

The festivities in June included the annual Antique Auto Show at Crotched Mountain Foundation and the 4-H girls in colonial costume serving shortcakes at a Strawberry Festival at the auto show, under the guidance of Mrs. Judy Ierlen.

July – the annual "Whing Ding" with a huge parade – as wonderful as ever and sponsored by the Greenfield Recreation Department.

Tony and Irene Saleton with Paul Cole, comprised the "Yankee Tunsmiths." This group of musicologists appeared to a capacity crowd in the Meeting House on August 9, 1975 singing a history of America in colonial ballads and folksongs. The Greenfield ARBC sponsored this event.

September, 1975 was a special month as on September 14, Greenfield received their Bicentennial flag thereby designating Greenfield as an official Bicentennial community. Preceding the flag ceremony was a parade of firetrucks from neighboring towns who all participated in a Firemans Muster at Crotched Mountain following the ceremonies. Dignitaries present at the ceremony were: Alf Jacobsen, president of the N.H. Senate and acting governor of the state in the absence of Mr. Thomson who was in Colorado, Mr. William Bittenbender, head of the N.H. Board of Education who was the official representative of Governor Thomson, and Mrs. Isabella Streeter, president of the Keene ARBC and a member of the N.H. ARBC. Following the ceremony, all adjourned to Crotched Mountain for the Firemans Muster organized by Fire chief, Dale Russell and his men.

Crotched Mountain Ridge Runners put on a sumptuous Harvest Supper in October followed by a talent show in the town hall.

Your Country Side Heritage was presented by the ARBC in November. The main hall in the Meeting House was transformed into an Early American setting with an old-fashioned kitchen, country store, schoolhouse, dollhouse and many other antiques on display for all to see and enjoy. Tea and gingerbread were served and as you left the hall, the village blacksmith was busy with his forge and anvil making hooks and latches, just as his forefathers did.

The Colonial Christmas Ball was held on December 6, 1975 in a beautifully decorated Meeting House. Over thirty-five couples danced to the music of the Ray Leach orchestra and enjoyed a Christmas punch served with assorted breads and cookies.

A Chowder party and Sleigh Ride was held on January 24, 1976 at Camp Union with over 60 persons braving the cold, but who were warmed up with "Wally's chowder." Tobogganing sliding and riding in a horse-drawn sleigh were enjoyed by all.

A calendar of events for the next six months is as follows:

February 22, 1976—Youth Winter Fun Festival for grades 1–12, at Camp Union from 2–5 p.m. under the direction of Gordon Carpenter.

March 20, 1976—An old-fashioned chicken pie supper sponsored by the Womens Fellowship of the Congregational Church.

April 17, 1976—A costume square dance at Camp Union.

May, 1976—The school children will celebrate May Day with a May Pole and then will deliver May baskets to shut-ins. On Memorial Day, there will be a town picnic with a band concert on the Meeting House lawn.

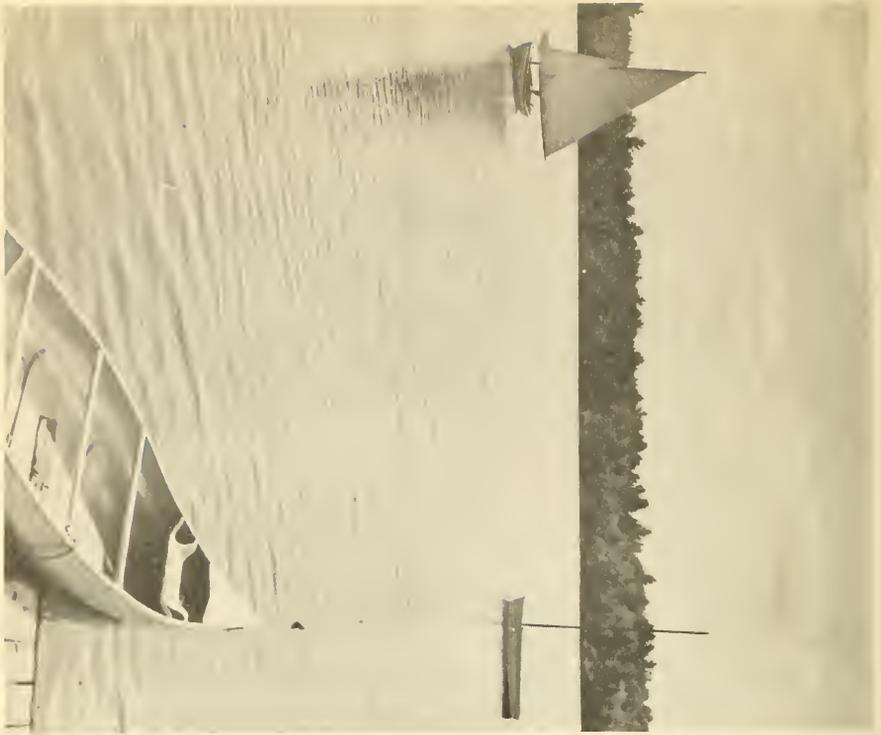
