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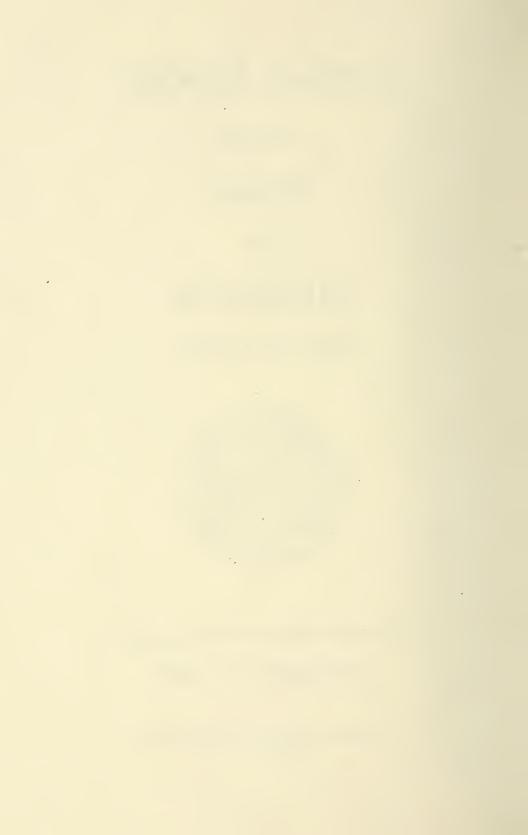

### **TOWN WARRANT**

### The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hebron, in Grafton County, in the State of New Hampshire, you who are qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Hall in Hebron on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at five o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. The polls will be open at 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and the business meeting will commence at 7:00 p.m.

The Village Cooperative Kindergarten will prepare and serve a roast beef dinner from 5:00 to 6:15 p.m. The cost will be \$4.75 for adults and \$2.75 for children under ten years of age.

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of any committee.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize a two percent cash discount on property taxes paid within thirty days of the date of the tax bill.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,000.00 to seal portions of Town roads and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund of \$1,000.00 for this purpose with the balance to be raised by taxation.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,600.00 for the purpose of purchasing a police radio and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund of \$1,500.00 for this purpose with the balance to be raised by taxation.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the support of the Village Cooperative Kindergarten. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation, and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Hebron and State of New Hampshire; to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the U.S. Department of Energy's (D.O.E.) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste, and into the D.O.E.'s competence to carry out such a plan. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50,000.00 to enlarge the Hebron Fire Station to include paving and landscaping the surrounding area; to raise \$10,000.00 by taxes in 1986; to authorize the Selectmen to borrow an amount not to exceed \$40,000.00 by long-term notes under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to approve, by ballot vote of yes or no, the following amendment to the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board:

# Amend Article IV by adding:

### S. FLOOD HAZARD AREAS:

Flood Hazard Areas is defined as those areas which are delineated by the Federal Emergency Management agency in its Flood Hazard Boundary Map of the Town of Hebron, dated January 3, 1975, and becomes a part of this Ordinance, where the bounds, as delineated, are in doubt or dispute, the burden of proof shall be upon the owner(s) of the land in question to show where they should properly be located.

1. All proposed development in any special flood hazard area shall require a building permit. The term "development" is defined to mean "any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, ex-

cavation or drilling operations."

2. The Board of Selectmen or its designee shall be responsible for

the following:

A. Review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements (meaning any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either (a) before the improvement or repair is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged and is being restored, before the damage occurred) to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably siafe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improve-(including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

The term "substantial improvement" does not include:

- a. any project for improvement of a structure in order to comply with existing State or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions, or
- b. any alteration of a structure listed on the National Register of Historic Places or a State Inventory of Historic Places.
- B. Mobile homes shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement by providing over-the-top frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (i) over-the-top ties can be provided at each of the four corners with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long shall require one additional tie per side; (ii) frame ties be provided at each corner with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long shall require four additional ties per side.
- C. Require that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor level (including basement) elevated to or above the 100 year flood level, and (ii) that all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or flood-proofed to or above the 100 year flood level.
- D.Maintain for public inspection and furnish upon request any certification of flood-proofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and, if the structure has been flood-proofed, the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was flood-proofed. This information must be furnished by the applicant.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint or hire the Highway Supervisor under the provisions of RSA 231:62. (Recommended by the Highway Committee).

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the purchase of a second-hand police cruiser.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into a tentative agreement with area towns for police despatching. Formal membership and the appropriation of funds for our support of this organization, to be known as the Pemi Valley Regional Dispatch

Center, may be proposed at a later Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

### HEBRON FIRE DEPARTMENT Annual Report for 1985

During 1985 the Hebron Fire Department handled a total of 86 calls. This compares with 39 calls in 1982, 43 calls in 1983, and 38 calls in 1984. The breakdown of the 86 calls proves to be interesting, Twelve were requests for mutual aid to neighboring towns. This is the same as last year. Therefore, the dramatic increase in activity has come in our our community. The calls break down this way: 29 fire, 12 mutual aid

(fire), 5 car/truck accidents, and 40 medical emergency/rescue.

It is clear that the dramatic increase has come in requests for medical aid. In 1981 as part of the Fire Department's operations a F.A.S.T. Squad was formed to fulfill the town ordinance establishing the department that says, "The Chief shall conduct suitable drills or instruction in . . . first aid and rescue work." In 1982 the department responded to 4 medical emergencies. What constitutes the medical emergencies/ rescues that the department has been called upon to assist with? There are two general categories. About half are injury induced trama. Such injuries result from motor vehicle accidents (of the 5 reported above all included personal injury as well as a fire hazard). Others have run the gamut from trees and chainsaws to falls, dog bites, boating accidents, and various lacerations. The second category is composed of organic medical problems such as heart attack, seizures, breathing difficulties and sudden illness. In all such emergencies the department's F.A.S.T. Squad works in conjunction with the Newfound and Plymouth Ambulance Services. But the key to success is that our department can put trained personnel on the scene of the emergency in our town much faster than the ambulance coming from Bristol or Plymouth. In one instance this past year those precious minutes saved the life of a young girl.

Last year at town meeting it was voted to join Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Association. As per their policy, the first year's dues are kept by the local department and used to upgrade communications equipment to become compatable with Lakes Region Disptach. This was done, and on April 1, 1985 we turned over our dispatching to Lakes Region. As of this 1986 town meeting we will have been with Lakes Region almost a year and we have been more than pleased with the quality of the service provided and the peace of mind that when someone in the community has an emergency and calls for assistance that

call will be answered!

In the area of training six members of the department are currently enrolled in New Hampshire certified firefighter programs. Four are working on Level I and two are working on Level II. In addition, there is another person in the community enrolled in an Emergency Medical Technician Course who will upon completion be eligible for member-

ship in the department as part of the F.A.S.T. Squad. Other's have also

had specialized training.

As Chief officer of the department I would like to give a special thanks this year to The Friends of the Fire Department. This small community group has made a big difference to the Fire Department through their fund raising efforts. In 1985 they donated over \$1,600 which enabled the department to buy a new air pac and 500 feet of 3 inch hose.

I also want to thank the Hebron Women's Group for their continued support enabling us to purchase much of the specialized medical equipment that is used for basic life support.

Finally, I want to thank the families and friends of Larry and Millie Jewel, and Brady Henderson who gave so generously in their memory.

Remember, now there is one emergency number for fire and emergency ambulance: 524-1545.

# REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN and STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1984 and June 1985, we experienced more forest fires throughout our state than in any year in the last 50. Two of the leading causes of the 1,605 fires were children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with YOUR help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulations is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest

law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

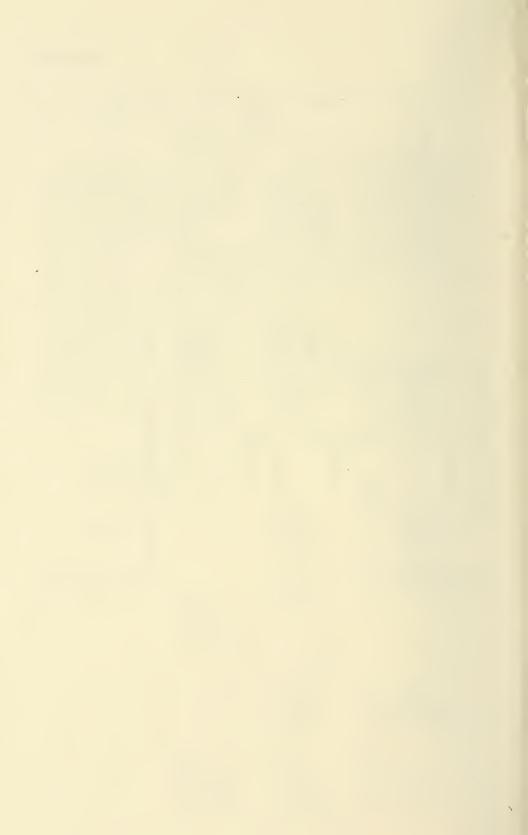
