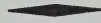

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**TOWN OF LINCOLN**  
**TOWN MEETING**  
**March 11, 1969**

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George McGee, moderator, opened the meeting at 9:00 a. m. Roland Bourassa lead the Flag Salute. A five minute recess was declared for voting purposes. The meeting was recalled to order at 9:05. They passed over Article I as it was voting for town officers, which was already in process. Article II was read by the moderator and Henry Waldo, Chairman of the Budget Committee, explained the uses of the \$14,400. A motion was made by James MacDonald that \$14,400 be used for town expenses. William Mayhew seconded it. The vote was affirmative. Robert Russell moved to dispense with the reading of the warrant, and take each Article as it appears. Ralph Foley seconded it, and the vote was affirmative. William Mayhew moved to recess the meeting until 7:00 this evening. George McGee said it wouldn't be possible because of insufficient time to notify the voters in town. Discussion was held relative to the legality of the recess. Mr. Mayhew changed his motion to having it Thursday, March 13, at 7:30 p. m. The motion was seconded by Ralph Foley. Discussion was held. Mr. Waldo explained that he could not be available Thursday. A short recess was then called by the moderator for the motion to be prepared for rereading. Mr. Mayhew reread his motion for the meeting to be in recess until 7:30 p. m., Thursday, March 13, 1969. Discussion relative to the motion then continued. Mr. Sargent wanted to know how many people will be here Thursday who are not here now. Ralph Foley stated that there were 300 people in the mill now. George Hooker said that the town budget was tripled and that other working tax payers should be able to attend Town Meeting and voice their opinion. The question was raised if the polls would remain open today. The moderator explained that by State Law they would remain open from 9:00 a. m.



to 6:00 p. m., and could be voted to remain open an hour longer. A voice vote was taken of the above motion, and it was voted in the affirmative, but a standing vote was taken for the record. Those in favor of the motion were 49, and those opposed numbered 17. The meeting was adjourned at 9:30 a. m.; the voting to continue to 6:00 p. m. The Town Meeting was adjourned at 6:00 p. m.

**TOWN OF LINCOLN****TOWN MEETING****March 13, 1969**

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The Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator at 7:30 p. m. at the Lin-Wood High School Auditorium.

Articles 1 and 2 were disposed of at the Town Meeting of March 11, 1969.

**ARTICLE 3** — How much money will be raised for the Police Department.

Budget Committee recommended \$18,443.00 be raised and appropriated for the Police Department. The motion was made by James MacDonald and seconded by Leslie Sargent that the town raise and appropriate \$18,443.00. The vote was in the affirmative.

**ARTICLE 4** — How much money will be raised for the Fire Department.

Budget Committee recommended \$4,400.00 be raised and appropriated for the Fire Department. The motion was made by Kenneth McInnis and seconded by William Mayhew that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,400.00 for the Fire Department. The vote was in the affirmative.

**ARTICLE 5** — How much money will be raised for the Lin-Wood Home Health Agency.

Budget Committee recommended a sum of \$6,400.00 be raised and appropriated for the Lin-Wood Home Health Agency. George Boyle made the motion the town appropriate \$6,400.00 for the Lin-Wood Home Health Agency, of this amount \$4,200.00 to be appropriated for Lin-Wood Home Health Agency; \$1,000.00 to be appropriated for the Support of the Town Ambulance; \$800.00 to be appropriated for the White Mountain Community Service; \$100.00 to be appro-



appropriated for the Plymouth Hospital; and \$300.00 to be appropriated to the Littleton Hospital. The motion was seconded by James MacDonald. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6 — How much money will be raised and appropriated for Town Maintenance.

Budget Committee recommended the sum of \$35,000.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Maintenance. James MacDonald made the motion \$35,000.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Maintenance. The motion was seconded by George Boyle. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7 — How much money will be raised for Street Lighting.

Budget Committee recommended \$7,400.00 be raised and appropriated for Street Lighting. Motion made by George Boyle and seconded by Gilman Bossie that the town raise and appropriate \$7,400.00 for Street Lighting. Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8 — How much money will be raised for Cemeteries.

Budget Committee recommended \$1,300.00 be raised and appropriated for Cemeteries. Motion made by Joseph Asselin and seconded by Germaine Garceau that the town raise and appropriate \$1,300.00 for the Cemeteries. Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 9 — How much money will be raised for the Public Library.

The Budget Committee recommended \$4,800.00 be raised and appropriated for the Public Library. The motion was made by Lawrence Woodward and seconded by Germaine Garceau that \$4,800.00 be raised and appropriated for the Public Library. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 10 — How much money will be raised for the support of Town Poor.

Budget Committee recommended \$3,500.00 be raised and appropriate for support of the Town Poor. The motion was made by James MacDonald and seconded by Herbert LaBrecque that the town raise and appropriate \$3,500.00 for the support of the Town Poor. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 11 — How much money will be raised for Old Age Assistance.

Budget Committee recommended \$2,000.00 be raised and appropriated for Old Age Assistance. The motion was made by James MacDonald and seconded by Murdock Mayhew that the town raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for Old Age Assistance. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 12 — How much money will be raised for maintenance of Water Department.

Budget Committee recommended \$4,000.00 be raised and appropriated for maintenance of the Water Department. The motion was made by George Boyle and seconded by Kenneth McInnis that the town raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for maintenance of Water Department. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 13 — How much money will be raised for White Mts. Region Association.

Budget Committee recommended \$395.00 be raised and appropriated for the White Mts. Region Association. The motion was made by Murdock Mayhew and seconded by Germaine Garceau that the town raise and appropriate \$395.00 for the White Mts. Region Association. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 14 — How much money will be raised for the Lincoln-Woodstock Chamber of Commerce.

Budget Committee recommended \$400.00 be raised and appropriated for the Lincoln-Woodstock Chamber of Commerce. Laurence Woodward made the motion \$400.00 be raised and appropriated for Article 14. Motion was seconded by James McLaughlin. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15 — How much money will be raised for the Ski 93 Association.

Budget Committee recommended \$500.00 be raised and appropriated for the Ski 93 Association. The motion was made by Raymond O'Rourke and seconded by Jimmie McLaughlin that the town raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the Ski 93 Association. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 16 — To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 and interest to take up Fire Truck note due March 1, 1970.

The motion was made by Kenneth McInnis and seconded by William McGee that the town raise and appropriate \$1,200.00 to take up Fire Truck note due March 1, 1970 plus interest. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 17 — To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 and interest to take up Town Road Construction note due October 1, 1969.

James MacDonald made the motion and amended it to read that the town raise and appropriate \$2,850.00 plus interest to take up Town Road Construction notes due; one on October 1, 1969 and one due March 1, 1970. The motion was seconded by George Boyle. The vote was in the affirmative for the Article as amended.

ARTICLE 18 — To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

The motion was made by Arthur Asselin and seconded by Germaine Garceau to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 19 — To see how much money the town will raise for Civil Defense.

Budget Committee recommended \$300.00 be raised and appropriated for Civil Defense. The motion was made by William Mayhew and seconded by Lawrence



Woodward that \$300.00 be raised and appropriated for Civil Defense. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 20 — To see how much money the town will raise for Town Dump.

The motion was made by Kenneth McInnis and seconded by James Walsh that the town take the recommendation of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate \$1,700.00 for the Town Dump. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 21 — To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 for rent of the Lincoln garage building.

Budget Committee recommended \$3,000.00 for Article 21. The motion was made by James MacDonald and seconded by Robert Chase that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for rent of the Lincoln garage building. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 22 — To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the Lincoln Day Camp.

Budget Committee recommended \$2,900.00 be raised and appropriated for the Lincoln Day Camp. Roland Bourassa made the motion the town raise and appropriate \$2,900.00 for the Lincoln Day Camp. The motion was seconded by George Boyle. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 23 — To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$107.72, the State to contribute \$718.13 for T.R.A.

It was explained that a total of \$825.85 must be appropriated; it being the sum the town raises \$107.72 and the State's contribution \$718.13. The motion was made by George Boyle and seconded by James MacDonald that the town raise and appropriate \$825.85 for T.R.A. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 24 — To see if the town will vote to create a Planning Board pursuant to the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter

36, and make available to it the powers and duties therein prescribed.

The motion was made by George Boyle and seconded by James MacDonald that the town create a Planning Board as put forth in Article 24. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 25 — To see if the town will vote to become a member of the Pemi-Baker Regional Planning Agency pursuant to the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 36:38. This agency will have membership of at least two of the municipalities in the Pemi-Baker River area. The objective of this agency will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide concensus on major problems of regional concern and assist in the effectuation of projects which extend beyond the boundaries of any particular town. The agency will have no jurisdiction over any matter of local affairs, will be primarily advisory, and two members of the Regional Planning Agency shall be from the town of Lincoln at the appointment by the Selectmen.

The motion was made by George Boyle and seconded by George Hooker to vote and accept Article 25 as read. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 26 — In the event of an affirmative vote on the immediately previous Article, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1.00 per capita, the aggregate not to exceed \$1,305.00, to finance studies to be conducted by the Regional Planning Agency. These monies will be used for financing studies which must be approved by the Regional Planning Agency. These funds may be used in conjunction with other state and federal funds available for planning purposes.

The motion was made by George Boyle and seconded by William Mayhew to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,305.00 for the Regional Planning Agency as put forth in the Article 26. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 27 — To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, expend and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be necessary for the financing of such projects as may be voted in this Warrant.

The motion was made by George Boyle and seconded by James MacDonald to give the authorization as set forth in the above Article 27. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 28 — To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$285,000.00 for the purpose of financing and constructing an addition to the existing municipal interceptor line on Main Street in the town at the Dodge place, so-called, and extending in a general Easterly direction a distance of 10,000 feet, more or less, to the property line of Loon Mountain Recreation Association, inclusive of easements and rights of way as may be required therefor, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes in a sum not to exceed \$145,000.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuance negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote relating there to.

An amendment to Article 28 was put forth by Herman Schlaefer; the article to now read as follows:

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$285,000.000 for the purpose of financing and constructing an addition to the existing municipal interceptor line on Main Street in the town at the Dodge place, so-called, and extending in a general Easterly direction a distance of 10,000 feet, more



or less, to the property line of Loon Mountain Recreation Association, inclusive of easements and rights of way as may be required therefor, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes in a sum not to exceed \$145,000.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act), "The amount the Lin-Wood Development Corp. receives from the sale of the old high school building to be used to reduce the town's share to be raised by serial bonds or notes. In the event the building is not sold the said building to revert to the Town of Lincoln prior to the acquisition of said bonds or notes," and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiations, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote relating thereto.

The amendment was voted on by secret ballot. The result of the vote was 99 in favor of the amendment; 66 nays.

The motion was made by Arthur Asselin and seconded by George Hooker to appropriate the sum as stated in the main question of Article 28 The vote by secret ballot on the main question was 161 Yes—5 No.

ARTICLE 29 — To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$125,000.00 for the purpose of financing and constructing a water main and related facilities, including but not limited to an underground storage reservoir and pumping station, from the newly constructed water line adjacent to the Indian Head Motel and extending in a northerly direction along the Daniel Webster Highway a distance of 5,500 feet, more or less, to provide additional water service, inclusive of easements and rights of way as may be required, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Sta-

tutes Annotated Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote or votes relating thereto.

The motion was made by Roger Stewart and seconded by Fred Branscombe to appropriate and raise the amount as stated in Article 29. The vote was 116 Yes — No 2 by secret ballot.

ARTICLE 30 — To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$25,000.00 for the purpose of improving and repaving town roads, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote or votes relating thereto.

The motion was made by James Custeau and seconded by Henry Garceau to accept Article 30 as read. The vote by standing on this Article was Yes 110 — No 0.

ARTICLE 31 — To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$24,000.00 for the purpose of financing and constructing water, sewer and related facilities on the Maltais Farm Road and Bog Road in said town, inclusive of easements and rights of way as may be necessary thereof, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate

such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote or votes relating thereto.

The motion was made by Floyd Ramsey and seconded by John Ellsworth to raise and appropriate the sum as stated in Article 31. By standing vote the count was 99 Yes — 0 No.

ARTICLE 32 — To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for the purpose of making repairs to the Boyce Brook and Loon Pond reservoirs, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote or votes relating thereto.

The motion was made by Lawrence Woodward and seconded by Leslie Sargent to raise and appropriate the sum as stated in Article 32. By standing vote the results were: 117 Yes — 0 No.

ARTICLE 33 — To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$18,000.00 for the purpose of financing and constructing sewer line and water line sleeves from Route 3 in said town to the westerly O. P. M. property line to provide water and sewer service to said property, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act), and



to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote or votes relating thereto.

The motion was made by Jimmie McLaughlin and seconded by Edmond Gionet to raise and appropriate the sum as stated in Article 33. By standing vote the results were: 60 Yes — 35 No. The vote lacked a two-thirds majority; the motion did not carry.

ARTICLE 34 — To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$8,500.00 for the purpose of financing capital improvements to the Public Library in said town, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Statutes Annotated Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote or votes relating thereto.

The motion was made by Laurence Woodward and seconded by Earl Burt to raise and appropriate the sum as stated in Article 34. By standing vote the results were: 94 Yes — 0 No.

ARTICLE 35 — To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appropriate and expend for the projects voted in this warrant any interest earned on proceeds of any sale of serial bonds or notes in connection with said projects.

The motion was made by Leslie Sargent and seconded by Roland Bourassa to give the authorization as stated in Article 35. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 36 — To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend in connection with the anti-pollution facilities to be constructed by the town, such interest as may from time to time be earned on any monies received from the sale of bonds relating to such project.

The motion was made by Leslie Sargent and seconded by Robert Chase to give the authorization as stated in Article 36. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 37 — To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate obtained by Tax Collector's deed and execute any deed or deeds thereof in the name of the town.

The motion was made by James Walsh and seconded by Leo Savoy to authorize the Selectmen as stated in Article 37. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 38 — To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for and receive in the name of the town and expend for library purposes all such sums as may be acquired from either the State or Federal Government for Library Aid.

The motion was made by Irene Sargent and seconded by Lawrence Woodward to give the authorization to the Selectmen as stated in Article 38. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 39 — To see if the town will vote to hold all future Town Meetings at 7 P. M. commencing with the year 1970. Polls to be open for balloting between 9 A. M. to 6 P. M.

The motion was made by William Mayhew and seconded by Leo Savoy to hold future Town Meetings as stated in Article 39. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 40 — To see if the town will vote to adopt the Curfew Law as provided in RSA 571:8.

The motion was made by John Weeden and seconded by James MacDonald to adopt the Curfew Law as

provided in RSA 571:8. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 41 — To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$15,160.00 to pay for new Payloader on four long term notes.

James MacDonald amended the Article as follows: I move that the town raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand, One Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$20,160.00) for the purchase of the new Payloader, \$5,000.00 to be raised by taxes and \$15,160.00 to be raised by the issuance of four long term notes of \$3,790.00 each. The motion was seconded by George Boyle. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 42 — Under Article 42 Leslie Sargent moved for the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas: The unprecedented increase in the rate of activity in various forms of land development, both for seasonal and year around homes, as well as industrial and recreational uses has resulted in serious problems in town government and,

Whereas: The foregoing activity as described creates additional tax burdens upon the taxpayers of Lincoln, therefore,

Be It Resolved: That:

1. The Selectmen of Lincoln are hereby instructed to thoroughly investigate the need for the adoption of suitable subdivision regulations for the town and report their findings in writing to the next annual meeting or to such special meeting as may be called.

2. In the interim the Selectmen are further instructed to prepare a written policy statement relative to the responsibility of the Town of Lincoln to furnish water, sewer, street, sidewalk, street lighting and other such municipal services, to developers of land in Lincoln. Such statements to contain engineering specifications for acceptance and a timetable for acceptance of any services installed by the developer at



his expense, by the town and whether or not the town will reimburse the developer and at what rate.

3. The above policy statement shall be brought before the voters at the next annual meeting for their acceptance or if such policy is adopted as a town ordinance by the Selectmen then it shall be properly publicized in at least one newspaper as circulated within the Town of Lincoln, prior to the next annual meeting or any special meeting which may be called for consideration of this subject.

The above motion was seconded by Herman Schlaefer. The vote was in the affirmative.

A motion was made by George Hooker and seconded by Leo Savoy to instruct the Library Building Committee not to build the proposed new library on the open lot east of the U. S. Post Office on Main Street; being mindful of the dangers to children crossing Main Street to make use of the library.

The vote on this motion was in the affirmative.

Nominations for four members to be chosen for the three-year term on the budget committee were open. The following were nominated: Henry Waldo, James Walsh, George Hooker and Herman Schlaefer. It was then voted to close the nominations. The four nominated were unanimously voted to serve the three year term on the Budget Committee.

The motion to adjourn the Town Meeting was made at 12:25 A. M. by Roger Stewart and seconded by George Boyle. Vote was in the affirmative.

**SPECIAL TOWN MEETING****TOWN OF LINCOLN****June 25, 1969**

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A Special Town Meeting of the town of Lincoln, N. H., was held Wednesday evening at 8:00 P. M. on June 25, 1969 at the Lin-Wood High School.

The Moderator, George M. McGee, Sr., opened the meeting with a flag salute by all and instructions on voting. It will be a secret ballot with a YES or NO written on the slips of paper handed out to the legal voters. He asked that no amendments be tacked on to the motion. He also stated that everyone who wanted to be heard, during the discussion, could do so by standing and being acknowledged by the Moderator.

The Moderator read the Warrant, the Authorization and the Decree of Justice Martin F. Loughlin which enabled the town to hold a special town meeting. Henry Waldo, Chairman of the Budget Committee, sanctioned.

**ARTICLE I:**

Motion by Ralph Foley: "I offer the following motion and move its adoption:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$285,000.00 for the purpose of financing and constructing an addition to the existing municipal interceptor line on Main Street in the town at the Dodge place so-called and extending in a general easterly direction of 10,000 feet, more or less, to the property line of Loon Mountain Recreation Association inclusive of easements and rights of way as may be required therefor, the whole of said sum to be raised by the issuance or sale of bonds or notes not to exceed said sum under and in compliance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 33

and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and pass any vote or votes relative thereto.”

Motion seconded by Emery Houle.

Discussion: A full discussion followed. Questions were answered by the Moderator. Governor Adams was asked by the Moderator to answer some of the questions, which he did quite fully. Mr. Waldo, Chairman of the Budget Committee, explained that the Budget Committee was called into a special meeting to discuss this Article 1 in the forthcoming warrant of the Special Town Meeting. It was fully approved by the Budget Committee, as had been previously done before the regular Town Meeting. The reason for the Special Town Meeting was due to an amendment being added to the motion which the bonding company after due course refused to accept. The amendment was pertaining to the old high school building which was to be sold and for the proceeds to go to the town, which were the plans formerly.

The Moderator explained that the Federal and State funds would still be forthcoming but in the next fiscal year, 1971, which starts July first, 1970. The town will have to borrow and pay interest on these monies which they will contract for until the Federal and State funds are available. Otherwise, if the amendment, at the regular Town Meeting, had not been added to the motion, the town would have been spared this interest charge.

A vote by secret ballot was taken: 102 yes — 13 nos. The motion carried.

#### ARTICLE II:

This article was pertaining to the dire need of men to volunteer as ambulance helpers or drivers. George



Boyle, a Selectman, asked all those who would be willing to aid in this necessary program to be at the next meeting, Monday evening following, of the Selectmen at their office.

A motion to adjourn by Henry Waldo, seconded by May Tardiff that the meeting adjourn. All in agreement (standing vote).

Total home visits: 613, consisting of the following categories; Medical and Injury 229, Mental Health 73, Chronically Ill 150, Communicable Disease 72, Maternal and Child Health 37, Orthopedic 9, Non-illness connected 207.

Number of pre-schoolers to Orthopedic Clinic 4.

Visits made to schools, 220. Number includes visits to homes in behalf of students.

Athletic physicals were carried out on all pupils in the Junior and Senior High School by Dr. Charles Althoff and Dr. Ralph Parker. Nurse examinations were done in the Elementary Schools.

The Tine Tuberculin Test was done on the pupils in grade one. This program is through the New Hampshire Tuberculosis and Health Association.

This year we were unable to have the services of the Dental Hygienist due to illness. This program, through the Bureau of Dental Health, consists of instructions and films on care of the teeth.

Sponsored by the Rehabilitation Center in Portsmouth, Speech and Hearing tests were carried out on pupils in each school who were referred by their classroom teacher. Number of children tested: North Woodstock Elementary 24, Lincoln Elementary 27, Kindergarten 2, Junior and Senior High 7. Total 60. The testing was done by personnel from the Center.

Nurse In-service Education sessions were offered by the White Mt. Community Service in Littleton. Sessions attended, 3. Conferences held in Concord relative to Public Health Nursing. Number attended by nurse, 3.

Again this year, through Rev. Harry Flad, the Youth Fellowship of the Pemi-Valley Cooperative Par-

ish collected groceries for both the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

The children of both towns greatly enjoyed the Christmas party given for them by the American Legion.

The Christmas baskets donated by Littleton Lodge of Elks were much appreciated.

For their Christmas project this year, the personnel and students of Junior and Senior High School donated a generous sum of money to an orphanage in Vietnam that the children might have a real Christmas. The personnel and students are to be congratulated.

For all cooperation during the year I extend my sincere thanks.

### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

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The Lincoln Public Library saw a few changes in 1969. Mrs. Ione Norcott, who had been librarian for the town for many years, resigned. Mrs. Thelma Branscombe was appointed librarian and Mrs. Avalve Avery accepted the position of assistant librarian.

Work was started on weeding the collection, adding a new card catalogue and a complete inventory of the books on hand begun. A new book shelf of classics was added to supplement our collection. Work on all these projects is continuing at this time. In the Spring, Mrs. Branscombe and Mrs. Avery attended the Library Technique Course, Adult Services given at Plymouth State College and presented by the University of N. H. in cooperation with the New Hampshire State Library. They also attended several book buying meetings held at the District Office of the State Library in Littleton.

The Trustees opened bids on the proposed building and found them too high for the money available. At the present time, plans to remodel the existing building to meet specifications required by the State Library Development Program are being considered. Among measures necessary to meet the standards are a telephone on the premises and toilet facilities available by 1972. It is hoped that the minimum requirements at least may be completed in the time allotted.

The Bookmobile made four visits to Lincoln during the year. The librarians were ably assisted by Mrs. Ruth Burbank and Mrs. Dolores Hobin in selecting books to borrow.

We thank the Trustees for their assistance and cooperation and Mrs. Martha Patterson for her help as bookkeeper during the year.

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## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

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The 1969 fire season was a quiet one in this area. Frequent rains kept the danger to a minimum and there were few violations. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follows:

### FIRE PERMIT

A *fire permit* is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be *prior to 9:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m.*

### EXCEPTIONS

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

### PENALTIES

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.



2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland maximum fine of \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

**DIRECT SERVICES**

- A. Psychiatrists, Psychologists, Psychiatric Social Workers and our Community Service Workers were involved directly with 273 new referrals, in addition to the caseloads carried over from the previous year of service. In cost cases, interviews and evaluation involved members of families and other as well as the client, amounting to many hours of staff time.

- B. Our clinical staff was consulted for advice and recommendations by resident professionals on numerous occasions. These included problems of behavior symptoms, medication and dosage, referrals to other agencies, family and social relationships, treatment plans, public assistance, and drug abuse.
- C. General Hospital Consultation. Each week a staff psychiatrist has made a regular visit to the Cottage Hospital in Woodsville and the Weeks Memorial Hospital in Lancaster. In addition, the clinical staff has been available on an as-needed basis to the physicians serving patients in the Morrison Hospital in Whitefield and the Littleton Hospital in Littleton. During these consultations the clinical staff has been available to physicians and hospital personnel for conferences concerning individual treatment plans.

#### SCHOOL CONSULTATION

- A. The Staff Psychologist and Child Psychiatrist with other staff personnel rendered assistance with individual cases of children having difficulty. They worked with school administrators, guidance counselors, and teachers.
- B. Agency personnel presented seminars and programs relating to the psychiatric aspects of learning to school teachers and others.
- C. The Agency has presented programs on Drug Abuse, Special Learning Disabilities, and the Exceptional Child.
- D. A pilot experimental school for Exceptional Children is being operated by the Agency in Lisbon in cooperation with Supervisory Union No. 35, the State Department of Education (Special Education), and the New Hampshire Department of Mental Retardation. (A special report follows.)

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## RESOURCES FOR PROFESSIONAL WORKERS

Public Health Nurses, New Hampshire Department of Social Welfare Workers and others have used the agency for consultation and assistance with individual cases and general information.

The Agency has:

- A) Discussed the handling of individual cases and has accepted referrals for treatment.
- B) Provided programs centering around common problems through case presentations. It has made available a bi-monthly telephone conference with Tufts University Medical School, Department of Psychiatry.
- C) Enlisted the support of other professionals in working out the details of treatment plans, the meeting of crisis situations, and the return of individuals to productive community life and the labor force.
- D) Provided field work training for students from the University of Vermont Medical College and the University of New Hampshire School of Nursing.



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**DAY CAMP REPORT FOR 1969**

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January 29, 1970

Day Camp was held from July 7 to August 15, 1969, with an enrollment of 96 children from the Lincoln-Woodstock areas. In spite of adverse weather which flooded out the swimming area, and other conflicting summer programs, the camp season went well. 36 children passed their respective swimming courses. The program included several hikes away from camp, features such as a Smoky Bear demonstration, Fire Engine demonstration and performances by the Opera House cast, as well as the usual program of games, crafts and swimming. The Day Camp Committee was increased this year to six, which greatly helped in the planning and assistance of camp this past year. With the committee's continued efforts in 1970, camp should be aided even more. The jurisdiction of the Little League was assumed last year, for insurance protection.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

**Scope of Audit**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court, Public Library, Trustees of Trust Funds and Lin-Wood Home Health Agency.

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-5), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$24,982.76, less a revenue deficit of \$11,613.13, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$13,369.63.

**AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.



### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### Current Surplus

The Current Surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$11,982.63 in 1969, from \$35,153.88 to \$47,136.51, as shown herewith:

#### Uncollected Taxes:

The Tax Collector should take necessary measures to enforce collection of the delinquent taxes which are deemed collectible and obtain abatements from the Board of Selectmen for those taxes which have become uncollectible.

#### District Court:

It is noted that the District Court had not remitted to the Town Treasurer at December 31, 1969, the balance of the Town's share of the fines assessed by the Court during the year.

**Unauthorized Expenditures and Application of  
Municipal Budget Law & Municipal Finance Act:**

It is noted that the following expenditures made during the year were not authorized by the voters at the 1969 annual Town Meeting.

In connection with the aforementioned expenditures, attention is directed to the provisions of R.S.A. 32:10 of the Municipal Budget Law, which prohibit the expenditures of town funds by the Selectmen of a Town operating under the Municipal Budget Laws, for the purposes for which an appropriation has not been made.

In cases of emergencies of other contingencies, R.S.A. 32:10-a provides as follows:

“32:10-a Emergencies. When an unusual circumstance arises during the year which makes it necessary to expend money in excess of an appropriation which may result in over expenditures of the total amount appropriated, for all purposes, at the meeting or when no appropriation had been made, the selectmen or village district commissioners upon application to the tax commission and the school board upon application to the state board of education, may be given authority to make such expenditure. Such application shall be made prior to the making of such expenditure provided however that the tax commission or the board of education may accept and approve an application after an expenditure if caused by a sudden or unexpected emergency. No such authority shall be granted until a majority of the budget committee had approved the application in writing.”

The selectmen confirmed that the procedures required by R.S.A. 32:10-a were not followed with respect to the above expenditures.

Furthermore, inasmuch as \$11,068.93 of the expenditures made on account of the School Street sewer construction project were paid from the unexpended balance of 1968 sewer bond proceeds, the provisions of R.S.A. 33:3-a of the Municipal Finance Act should have been complied with before those funds were expended.

R.S.A. 33:3-a requires that unexpended bond balances may be used for purposes other than those originally intended, only if approved by a two-thirds vote of the voters present and voting at an annual town meeting. Otherwise, unexpended proceeds of bond issues must be used to pay the principal of the bonds outstanding.

**Conclusion:**

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of the audit.
