



TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lyme in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Church Hall in said Lyme on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, including two selectmen, road agent, sexton, constable; and two police officers.
- Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as prepared by the Budget Committee
- Art. 3. To see what compensation the Town will allow its officers for the ensuing year, also what price per day will be paid for labor, trucks and tractors on Town Highways for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to allow bank discount on all taxes paid on or before November 1, 1948.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to hold tax deeded property for three years from date of deed.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for control of White Pine Blister Rust disease.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Tax Collector to deed all property where Tax Deeds are due.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting the ensuing year and raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$130.00) to pay for said audit.

- Art. 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for band concerts.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to pay members of the Fire Department and raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for this purpose.
- Art. 12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the repair, replacement or disposal of the Legion Hall and what sums, if any, will be raised for this purpose.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will elect a group of nine persons to work with the Sexton as a Cemetery Improvement Committee. Three to serve for three years, three to serve for two years and three to serve for one year and to see if the Town will grant said Improvement Committee the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be used toward any improvement that they see fit.
- Art. 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Board of Selectmen Lyme, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the vote of the town the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Lyme has been made by this Division. This audit covered the period from the date of the previous audit, August 10, 1946, to August 28, 1947. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is submitted herewith. The report is made up in two sections as follows:

Section I - Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1946 Section II - Period from January 1st to August 28th, 1947

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Library Treasurer, Volunteer Fire Department and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements Comparative Balance Sheets

December 31, 1945 - December 31, 1946: (Exh. A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1945, and December 31, 1946, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein a decrease in Net Debt of \$548.00 took place during the year.

Analysis of Change in Net Debt: (Exhibit B)

The factors which affected the change in the financial condition of the town during the year were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exh. C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D) a net revenue surplus of \$1,676.48, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$841.31, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$835.17.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit F)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit F.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1946, and August 28, 1947, is indicated in Exhibits G and P, respectively.

Tax Accounts

The tax warrant accounts of Collector Claffin for the levies of 1946 and prior years were audited. Summaries of these accounts as of December 31, 1946, are included in Exhibits H, I and J, and as of August 28, 1947, in Exhibits Q, R and S.

Examination of the tax sales accounts was likewise made. A summary showing the activity in the tax sales accounts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, is presented in Exhibit K, and for the period from January 1st to August 28th, 1947, in Exhibit T.

Town Clerk

The accounts of the Town Clerk were examined and audited. All funds received by the Clerk on account of the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses were properly accounted for through remittances to the Treasurer, fees retained or cash on hand. Summaries of these accounts appear in Schedules L and U.

Trust Funds

The trust fund accounts were examined and the total amount of principal and unexpended income, as of December 31, 1946, was verified as being on deposit in the Dartmouth Savings Bank and the Dartmouth National Bank. (Exhibit O)

Library Treasurer

The receipts and expenditures of the Treasurer of the Library were checked and the Treasurer's bank balance reconciled as of December 31, 1946. (Exhibit M)

Surety Bonds

The surety bonds of the town officers, who are required by law to furnish bonds, were examined and found to be correct in form and sufficient in amount. A list of the officials, the amounts of their bonds and the surety companies, will be found in Exhibit V.

General Comments

Closing Accounts:

Attention is called to the matter of closing accounts at the end of the fiscal year, December 31st. All funds received by the Collector, Town Clerk or any other fiscal agent of the Town on or before that date should be promptly remitted to the Treasurer. If the Treasurer's books remain open for two or three days subsequent to December 31st, that should provide sufficient time for all such remittances to be made. The Treasurer should then deposit all funds on hand in the bank as soon as possible thereafter. It was noted that deposits of 1946 funds were not made until January 16th and 23rd, 1947, and that there still remained after that a balance of \$102.83 which presumably was subsequently deposited with 1947 funds.

Conclusion:

With minor exceptions, the accounts and records of all town officials which were examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lyme for their assistance during the course of the audit.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

As you will see, we have overrun our money for Winter Maintenance, which I think was due mostly to the big snow storm in March. This storm alone cost over seven hundred dollars. It would seem, with the rise in wages and other things, that we should appropriate a little more money for Winter Maintenance.

Of course, the snow fence has to be put up and taken down with Winter money. We have 117 rolls of fence, which I think helps a lot to hold the snow out of the road.

In the spring the tractor was in the garage for quite some time before we could get it fixed, so we didn't get to work on the road as quickly as we would otherwise, but it rained so much that maybe it was just as well we didn't do too much at that time.

We bought 300 feet of cement culvert pipe and about 50 feet of metal pipe. This was all laid, replacing about 20 plank culverts. This, I think, will be a great saving over a period of years from putting in plank. We also had to rebuild and plank several larger bridges, as you will see by the amount of plank bought, which costs six cents a foot.

I would say we should buy some metal or cement pipe each year and replace these plank culverts as they come to repair. This would be a saving in labor in years to come. We cut quite a lot of bushes, which was a much needed job, as there hadn't been many cut in the last few vears. There are some more that ought to be cut. The bridge near the George Pushee place will have to be planked this coming spring. This will cost around \$100.00, labor and all. And one of the abutments on this same bridge will have to be faced up before many years, which will be quite a costly job. Also a bridge up near George Tattersall's, one or both of the abutments should be faced up with cement and steel stringers put in. We have the stringers on hand now. And another bridge down the Cross road by Russell Gamage's should have new stringers. The North Thetford bridge was to have been fixed last summer to keep the planks from making so much noise, but I had some difficulty in getting the

clips to do the job. I have them now, as they came December 12, so that job should be done early this spring. The Edgell bridge needs the approaches repaired very badly. There is a bridge on the Canaan Turnpike road that is not passable. If we were to buy a 4 ft. metal pipe which has been talked about, it would cost \$9.00 a foot. I would say it should be 16 or 20 feet long and then the cost of putting it in. And it would cost, I would say, from \$100.00 to \$200.00 to make the road passable.

T.R.A. Gravel Job

We put 4,000 yards of gravel on the road with the money we had, \$3,952.23.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels, and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools

to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both

damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 per cent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires, in or near woodland.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyme:

School Board

Mrs. Hazel Park has given the Lyme Schools a great deal of her time and energy as a member of the School Board. It is regrettable that she felt it necessary to resign in November. Mr. Rexford Moulton has replaced her, and it is a pleasure to have a man with his interest and ability on the Board.

State Aid

Lyme recently received a check from the State for its share of State Aid for Education. This amounted to \$12,511.21. The major portion of this is earmarked as follows: \$2,600.00 was given to the Selectmen to repay a deficit from last year; a substantial amount will be used to pay the increased tuition costs to Plymouth Teachers College and to the Hanover school district. At the former, the tuition was raised from \$85.00 to \$138.89 per pupil and at the latter from \$90.00 to \$125.00 per pupil. The new fire escapes at the Plain and Center schools will cost approximately \$1,150.00

Achievements

It is gratifying to have Mrs. Katherine Bryant back as a teacher at the Chesley School. The new fire escapes are worth noting by all concerned. The new bubbler on the second floor of the Plain School is a welcome addition. Finally, new furniture has been ordered for Cheslay, Center, and one room at the Plain School. Additional playground equipment is also on order for all three schools.

Future Needs

Looking ahead, I should like to mention the follow-

ing for your consideration:

(a) There should be more interest in housing for teachers. At the present time, four teachers live at home in Lyme and Lyme Center, and two teachers live at home in Hanover. We may not always be able to attract wives of Dartmouth students to Lyme. Local housing for teachers is, therefore, serious.

(b) We lost some good teachers last June. It is hoped that teaching in Lyme can be made more

attractive to capable teachers.

(c) Classroom lights and attractiveness should be improved. The Chesley, Center, and at least one room at the Plain School should be newly painted and lighted before September, 1948.

(d) Better classroom equipment, especially visual aids, should be added as soon as practicable.

(e) The program for furniture replacement might well be continued until every boy and girl has the best seating available.

(f) The curriculum should be expanded with more assistance in music, art, and physical education.

(g) The amount of insurance should be substantially increased on both buildings and contents.

(h) An extra teacher should be employed and the extra room at the Center School should be opened. Grades 1, 2, 3, and 4 could use one room, and Grades 5, 6, 7, and 8 could use the other. This would relieve the large classes in Grades 7 and 8 at the Plain School.


