## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Marlow, in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall, in said Marlow on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at 7 o'clock in the evening to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To elect all necessary Town Officers, for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Poor.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Library.

Article 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to install adequate lighting in the Town Library.

Article 6. To see if the Town will apply for Class V money, known as TRA, and raise the sum of \$399.57, to be matched with \$2,663.82, contributed by the State.

Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 9. To see if the Town will raise such sums of money as may be necessary to improve Town cemeteries.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.88, to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote, and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperation with other 37 towns of the Monadnock Region.

Article 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be matched by the State, for brush removal on back roads.

Article 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust Program.

Article 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$211.00 for the year 1965 in support of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1965.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$150.00 for the purpose of increasing each of the Selectmen's salaries \$50.00.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,100.00, for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V roads within the Town: ASHUELOT POND ROAD #65; such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended by Laws of 1957, Chapter 273:3 and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interest of the Town of Marlow.

Article 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the so-called Mill Street Bridge.

Article 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for temporary loans, in anticipation of taxes.



Article 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and administer all real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector deeds.

Article 19. To see if the Town will authorize the tax collector to give two per cent cash discount on all property and personal taxes, for the payment made within thirty days after date of bill and empower the collector to appoint a deputy collector.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to return to the use of Non-Partisan Ballot.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the new two-way radio installed in the Tank Truck.

Article 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a fire truck at a price not to exceed \$12,000.00.

Article 23. If article 22 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$12,000.00 for the purposes stated in Article 22, such sums to be raised through the issuance of serial notes, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes, and determine the time and place of payment thereof under such terms and conditions as they deem to be in the best interests of the Town.

Article 24. To see if the Town will authorize the discontinuance of certain sections of the old Route 10, to wit, (a) Between Station 250 + 00 and Station 261 + 50. (b) Between Station 263 + 50 and station 288 + 50 (c) Between Station 303 + 00 and Station 4 + 50, such discontinuance to be subject to gates and bars.

Article 25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to install 2 additional street lights at such locations as they shall deem advisable.

Article 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a furnace for the Town Garage.

Article 27. If article 26 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$1,600.00 for the purpose stated in article 26, such sums to be raised through the issuance of serial notes, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes, and determine the time and place of payment thereof under such terms and conditions as they deem to be in the best interests of the Town.

Article 28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to abandon and dispose of the Symondsville Bridge, so-called.

Article 29. If article 28 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money sufficient to purchase a tract of land which would become necessary for turn around purposes if the Bridge is abandoned.

Article 30. If article 28 is not adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to repair said Bridge.

Article 31. If article 30 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$13,400.00 for the purposes stated in article 30, such sums to be raised through the issuance of serial notes and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes, and determine the time and place of payment thereof under such terms and conditions as they deem to be in the best interests of the town.

Article 32. To see what action the Town will take in regard to those items in the budget not covered in the preceding articles.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept any trust funds left to it during the ensuing year.

Article 34. To hear reports of officers, agents and committees, theretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board and Citizens of Marlow:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The average daily membership reduced from 43 in 1962-63 to 37.2 during 1963-64. This is the primary reason for an increase in per pupil cost from \$277.97 to \$366.22 which is approximately \$38.00 more than the state average.

The budget foundation aid estimate was \$2,096. Due to insufficient funds appropriated at the state level, this amount was reduced to \$1,488.02, a reduction of \$798. However, the estimated June 30th balance increased \$1,676 and the income from sweepstakes funds was estimated to be \$1,027 which gave an increase of \$1,905 to be used to lower the amount to be raised by local taxes. The budget estimate of the amount to be raised by taxes was \$20,222.20; however, the actual amount raised by taxes was \$18,126.05.

The amount received from sweepstakes was \$1,422.86, an increase of \$395.05 above the estimated income. This amount will be included in the June 30, 1965 balance to be used to reduce the 1965-66 local appropriation.

Mrs. Margaret S. Stevens replaced Mrs. Dorothy Wilson as teacher for grades 5-8. Mrs. Stevens holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Bryn Mawr College, a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of New Hampshire and has taken several courses at Keene State College in elementary education. She did her practice teaching at the Gilsun Elementary School.

The Fall Mountain Cooperative School District was accepted as being in existence during this past year. The date of

operating responsibility is July 1, 1966. There is a possibility that Marlow will become a part of a Supervisory Union with the Fall Mountain School District as of July 1, 1966. As I mentioned in last year's report, Marlow should consider arranging a long-term contract with the Fall Mountain School District, the Keene School District or consider becoming a part of the new Fall Mountain School District.

At a meeting held December 15th, Supervisory Union #60 voted to approve the State Department of Education's suggestion to enlarge Supervisory Union #60 by annexing the school districts of Acworth, Charlestown and Langdon effective October 1, 1965. This action was confirmed by the State Board of Education at their January 4th meeting.

A new spirit duplicator was purchased this past summer and recently a tape recorder has been purchased with National Defense Education Act funds. Each of these pieces of equipment has been of considerable assistance to the teaching process.

The limited playground space as a part of the school site creates a problem of safety in that play activities extend into the road at times in spite of efforts to prevent it. There is also the additional hazard of injury because of limited play space. Marlow youngsters do not have many of the playground experiences that are available to other New Hampshire youngsters.

P. T. A. equipment and service contributions are very much appreciated.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE FOR MARLOW

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The following is my report for the year ending June 30, 1964.

Work of the School Nurse:

- 41 Pupils had vision screening tests
- 41 Pupils had hearing screening tests
- 42 Pupils were weighed and measured
- 40 Pupils were inspected
- 39 Pupils participated in Sabin Vaccine Clinic—3 types
  - 7 Students with parents attended Pre-Registration Clinic
  - 7 Students were checked for vaccination and follow-up
  - 7 Pupils participated in the Urine Screening Program
- Grs. 1-8 were given direct classroom teaching in Dental Health

The concern for the physical, social, and emotional well-being of the child stems from the desire that the child, both now and in the future, shall function as an effective individual. Interest of the school in health expresses itself in various ways. Providing a clean, comfortable environment is an accepted responsibility. Final expression of school concern is the employment of school nurses, and sometimes school doctors to direct and coordinate the program.

None of this would mean that school people are trying to usurp the rights and responsibilities of parents or doctors. Far from it. You might say that we serve as a supplementary detective service. We have the child a good share of his waking hours, and we have him under a different set of circumstances from those at home or elsewhere. Therefore, it is completely reasonable to believe that we might make some significant observation not likely to be made by anyone else.

Many of these observations will be made in the course of regular screening tests in such areas as vision, hearing, teeth, and other screening programs. These tests draw on the special training and equipment of the school nurse.

Through the continued cooperation of administrators, school boards, teachers, parents, and students the health service program continues to be challenging and rewarding.

I wish to thank all who helped make the school year a successful one.

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## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.
