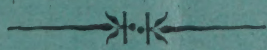

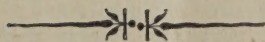

REPORT OF SCHOOLS.

DIVISION 1.

Spring and fall terms taught by Miss Jennie F. Rand, who came with a good recommend from the school board of Danbury, both in ability and character, and at the examination we felt warranted in employing her. And we feel that we made no mistake in doing so for at the close of the spring term we thought the school had been very successful, and we decided to employ her for the fall term, although we were well aware that some were opposed to it for some reason which we think they would be unable to explain. It seems there are those that readily give a decision in regard to a school either for or against, before they know anything about it, taking what some enemy to the teacher or to the school board may have to offer in regard to the school. To such we would say try and make the school a success by encouraging the scholars and upholding the teacher, until you know some fault that is a fault in the teacher. If there is a feeling against the school board say so, and not try and put down the teacher or the school for any pique against the school board. Our opinion is that both terms were full an average of previous terms in this Division.

DIVISION 4.

Summer term under the instruction of Miss Ethel E. Dubia. She having never taught before and being quite young, we felt she would need the encouragement of not only the school board but also the parents. And we are happy to be able to report that the order was A No. 1, and the advancement made such as to command our approval. We think she possesses the qualifications that will with practice make her a first class teacher, for her mode of instruction was such as many teachers much older than she would do well to pattern after.

Fall term taught by Luella M. Huse, a teacher well known to us all as a young lady of good moral character and one who easily wins the good will of her scholars. And we are glad to be able to report this as a very successful term both in discipline and in the improvement made.

DIVISION 6.

Mabel M. Clark, teacher, who came to this school without any experience as an instructor in the school room, but she fully met our expectations. This school like most of our schools in town, failed to come up to the standard that it ought through irregular attendance, but we think the teacher did all in her power to make the term a success and of advantage to the scholars.

DIVISION 7.

This term of school was under the charge of Harry A. Powers, a student of Dartmouth College. It is with pleasure that we are able to report this as a model school in every respect. Thoroughness coupled with ability made this one of the best terms of school our scholars ever have had the privilege to attend.

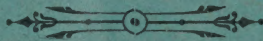
