

## SCHOOL REPORT.

#### DISTRICT NO. 1.

Prudential Committee, { John H. Cutler, Ezra M. Smith, John H. Steele.

### FIRST DEPARTMENT.

Summer and Fall terms. Teacher, Charles H. Knight. This school made excellent progress under the charge of this experienced and most efficient teacher. The discipline was healthy, the instruction thorough, and the school presented most satisfactory results at its close.

Winter term. Teacher, Miss Hattie A. French. This teacher labored with great enthusiasm, and met with her usual success. Having taught the school a former term, she was prepared to take up the work Mr. Knight left and carry it forward to completion. In aptness, discipline and the ability to awaken interest in her scholars, Miss French has few superiors. The scholars were well drilled in study and made good progress.

The school in this department has done finely the past year, and the scholarship of former terms has been well sustained.

#### SECOND DEPARTMENT.

Summer term. Teacher, Mrs. M. J. Knight. The teacher for this term was a thorough scholar and experienced in her work. Her discipline of the school was healthy and her success most gratifying.

Fall and Winter terms. Teacher, Miss M. F. Knowlton. This school was well conducted and most excellent instruction

given. Miss Knowlton is a natural disciplinarian and a thorough teacher. Admirable results appeared at the examination.

### THIRD DEPARTMENT.

Teacher for the year, Miss Emma R. Smith. This teacher's success in gaining the affection and awakening interest in her scholars is simply wonderful. It is somewhat of a surprise to many a parent, who is completely tried with her two or three children at home, to see how easily this teacher handles her school of sixty scholars. Her labors in and out of school are incessant for the good of her little ones. The school was well taught and much valuable information imparted to it.

### DISTRICT NO. 2.

Prudential Committee, C. W. Hunter.

Summer and Winter terms. Teacher, Miss M. E. Buckminster. The teacher of this school has had great experience in teaching. She is a thorough scholar and excellent disciplinarian. Her school made good progress and sustained its previous reputation. There are some advanced and excellent scholars in this district.

### DISTRICT NO. 3.

Prudential Committee, H. K. French.

Summer and Winter terms. Miss Hattie A. French, teacher. This school was admirably conducted in matter and manner of instruction. The progress was very good and the presence of some advanced scholars promoted a most favorable appearance of the school at examination. Miss French excels as a teacher of youth. She enlists the sympathies and awakens an interest in study in the most natural way. While she holds her school in excellent restraint, she is at the same time very much beloved.

#### DISTRICT NO. 4.

Prudential Committee, Eugene Rielle.

Teacher Summer and Winter terms, Miss Mary A. Hamill. Miss Hamill is a good scholar and most devoted to her work in the schoolroom. The school in this district is small, but it was well instructed and made very good progress in study.

#### DISTRICT NO. 5.

Prudential Committee, Emery W. Alexander.

Summer term. Teacher, Miss Cora A. Marden. Miss Marden (Mrs. Albion P. Howe) in this, her first school, succeeded in awakening a good degree of interest in her scholars in study. She governed the school well and the closing examination showed progress had been made.

The Winter term was not as great a success, because of the disposition on the part of some of the larger boys to be disorderly. Perhaps it would be better for this district to have a male teacher for the Winter term, since good discipline is as important as good instruction. The school appeared well at the examination.

#### DISTRICT NO. 6.

Prudential Committee, M. A. Wilder.

Summer and Fall terms. Teacher, Miss Isa M. Ramsey. This was Miss Ramsey's first school. She is a bright young lady, and possessed in a good degree of the elements which with experience will make her a first class teacher. In the Summer term she met with commendable success. She is orderly and accurate in all she does, and her school appeared like clock work. She devoted herself with much energy to her work, and her school showed a good degree of progress. There are many bright scholars in this school, and the district feel a great interest in it, as the purchase of apparatus for the schoolroom evinces.

#### DISTRICT NO. 7.

Prudential Committee, George A. Hamilton.

Summer and Winter terms. Teacher, Miss Mattie J. Hamilton. This teacher is a graduate of our High School, a most thorough scholar, and possessed of some qualities that fit her to be a teacher of youth. But she also labors under some disadvantages that unfit her to be a teacher of small children.

Teacher, Winter term, Miss Emma N. Smiley. This teacher had charge of this same school the former year, and carried it on with the same success. Her discipline was good. She created much interest in study, and the progress was satisfactory.

#### DISTRICT NO. 8.

Prudential Committee, Conrad Naglie.

Summer and Winter terms. Teacher, Miss Mary A. Willey. Miss Willey is also a graduate of the High School and an excellent scholar. Her school was small and this was her first term; but it was well conducted and made good progress. The discipline was excellent, and much interest appeared in the examinations.

### DISTRICT NO. 9.

Prudential Committee, Frank J. Robbins.

Summer term. Teacher, Dana M. Dustan. This teacher—a graduate of Dartmouth College and a teacher of experience—being at liberty, was engaged to take charge of this school. His care of the school and methods of instruction were a success.

Fall and Winter terms. Teacher, Miss Adelia A. Nichols. This teacher is a graduate of the schools of Chicago—an excellent scholar and disciplinarian. Although her first school, yet so thoroughly was she qualified for her work that her scholars made good progress, and the school was successfully conducted.

#### DISTRICT NO. 10.

Prudential Committee, R. R. Stearns.

Winter term. Teacher, Will C. Hamill. This was a very good school though small. It has but one term in the year and that a very long one. Mr. Hamill gives the promise of becoming an excellent teacher. The order was good and the examination showed advancement. There are some promising scholars in this school.

#### DISTRICT NO. 11.

Prudential Committee, J. P. Sweatt.

Summer term. Teacher, Miss Jennie E. Hadley. This teacher possesses rare qualifications for an instructor of youth. Both by scholarship and natural qualities she is fitted for a high position as a teacher.

Winter term. Teacher, Miss Ida H. Hannaford. Miss Hannaford is an excellent scholar and well fitted to become an emi-

nent teacher of youth. She governs easily and imparts instruction readily. Owing to imperfect notice, but without fault, there was no examination at the close of the term.

The Common Schools in town have as a whole done admirably the past year. The instruction has been of a high order in many of the schools, and the committee are pleased to note the increasing interest of parents in the different schools. Although very much more might be accomplished, still we feel that the district schools are in a very healthy condition. We must look facts in the face and not expect too much, and rejoice that there are any signs of progress.

Upon the parents and guardians of the young largely rests the responsibility of increasing the usefulness of our schools. We trust they may become more and more endeared to those who look with interest upon the education of the rising generation. However great our advancement in material interests as a town, yet we cannot hope to take a first rank among the towns of the State, except we cherish the most liberal and thorough instruction of our youth.

#### HIGH SCHOOL.

Teachers, H. B. Rich and E. H. Taylor.

Mr. Taylor succeeded to the care of this school with the commencement of the Fall term. The first term was a success, and the Winter term would have been an equal success had he carried a firmer hand in governing the young men of his charge. Mr. Taylor came to us with the highest recommendations as an experienced teacher, and the committee hoped to place this school once more on the high basis it had formerly occupied for scholarship and order. We are assured that had the teacher exhibited as firm a hand the first weeks of the term as the last, his success would have been much greater. There are excellent scholars in this school, and the examination showed good progress had been made.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

We herewith respectfully submit a report of the several departments under our charge, and of the disbursements made by our orders during the past year. We have drawn 277 orders on the Treasurer, amounting to \$9,158.02, against 179 orders amounting to \$9,755.01 last year. The increased number of orders drawn this year has made a proportionate increase of clerical labor, and was caused largely by the highway surveyor system of keeping the roads and bridges in repair, having more agents to settle with, and the settlements of the three different accounts, Highways, Bridges and Breaking Roads, being made separately.

#### COLLECTION OF TAXES.

This department of the business of the town done under our direction has been performed with very gratifying results to us, and we are glad to be able to report to the town that all the tax lists are settled, and that there is no uncollected tax to report. Samuel N. Porter was first appointed Tax Collector and served until September, when he resigned, and Charles H. Knight was appointed in his place.

#### ABATEMENTS.

The amount of the abatements is larger than we could have wished it. We have made some abatements on real estate that could have been collected, but we were convinced in every case either that it was an unjust tax or that the enforcement of the collection would cause serious inconvenience if not distress to those unable to bear it. A large amount of the abatements of poll taxes are made necessary by the practice of keeping men's

names on the check list, who, when they are asked to pay their taxes claim that they are not residents of Peterboro', and were not on the first of April when the tax was assessed.

This ought to be corrected, for "rights and duties cannot be separated, and the home of a person for voting is his home for taxation."

#### HIGHWAYS.

The various systems of keeping the roads and bridges in repair have been so many times discussed that no comment seems necessary from us. If, however, the highway surveyor system is continued we would recommend that the town be redistricted, and the number of districts reduced at least one-half.

The balance against the account for breaking roads was caused by having quite a large amount to pay for bills incurred last winter, and further from the fact that the spring of 1881 required an unusual amount of labor and expense in this department.

#### Poor Farm.

In accordance with the vote of the town at the annual meeting in March, 1881, we advertised the Town Farm property, and sold the same at auction on the 20th day of April last. Although the sale did not amount to the appraisal, according to the last report, nevertheless we are of the opinion that the property in most cases brought fair prices and the town has no reason to commplain of the result. With one exception the entire sale of the personal property has been collected. In that one case the circumstances have been such that it could not be collected before this report was made, but we do not regard it as worthless.

#### WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

In accordance with a vote of the town, we have purchased of Messrs. Fairbanks, Brown & Co., such articles as were necessary to make a complete outfit for the Sealer of Weights and Measures, and there is no reason now why the law in relation to the duties of the Sealer of Weights and Measures cannot be complied with.

#### REPORTS.

It is the opinion of this board that the town reports, as printed, ought to contain a full and complete report of every matter in which the town is interested, or which relates to any department of the town, so that every citizen shall have an opportunity to know all about the business of the town. We again call attention to the fact that there has *never* been a report of any kind to the town by the trustees of the Smith and the Weston funds for the benefit of the library, and even the conditions of the gifts are nowhere upon the records of the town, and are known to but few. if any.

The business of the town has been completed to the present time, and as far as we can learn nearly every bill has been paid. We have settled with every Highway Surveyor, except the snow bill of one who was away, and we think there can be very little outstanding against the town, except as reported in the detailed report which follows.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Peterboro' qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers and Agents for the year ensuing.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools; for the maintenance of the poor; for laying out and repairing highways, and building and repairing bridges; and for other necessary charges arising within the town, and appropriate the same.
- 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the fire department, public library and street lamps,
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate towards paying the town debt.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enforce the law relating to the sale of spirituous liquors, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action in relation to the same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to put in three sewers in the village of West Peterboro'; one near the counting room of the Union Manufacturing Company, one near J. Fisher's store, and one near Mrs. Asa Gowing's dwelling, and raise money for the same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to give J. D. Diamond and Charles M. Moor, their taxes to keep their road in repair, or take any other action thereon.
- 10. To see if the town will choose a committee to take charge of all the cemeteries owned by the town; also, to see if the town will vote to concrete the walk from the highway to the tomb in the village cemetery, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action in relation to cemeteries.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to alter the gallery in the town hall, or take any other action for the improvement of said hall, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
