REPORT OF THE PLAISTOW FIRE DEPARTMENT

The following is the report of the Plaistow Fire Department from January 1, 1943, to December 31, 1943:

Sixty-five calls were answered by the department in the above twelve-month period. There were seven fires in homes, fifteen chimney fires, one brooder-house fire, one factory building fire, two airplane fires, one auto fire, one railroad station fire, five air-raid alarms, one false alarm and thirty-one grass and brush fires.

We answered seven out-of-town alarms-two in Atkinson, two in Danville, two in Hampstead, and one in South Kingston.

We called help on one fire from the Newton Fire Department.

The estimated fire loss was \$9275.00.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

I take pleasure in submitting my annual report as Superintendent of Schools. This report is concerned with the Plaistow Schools for the year July 1, 1942 to June 30, 1943 and for the current year up to the present date. As usual I am including a Statistical table. This, together with the reports of the Supervisor of Music and the School Nurse, give much valuable information in regard to the daily life of our schools.

It is a pleasure to report that there have been no changes in the teaching staff since my last report. We are very fortunate in retaining the services of experienced and competent teachers. Many schools are at times handicapped due to shortage of substitute teachers. Up to the present time this has not been a problem here.

On account of the extra duties placed both this year and last on all Superintendents of Schools by government requirements, there has not been time for the usual amount of class room supervision. Since we have in Plaistow, experienced and dependable teachers, it is probable that our Schools will attain almost, if not entirely the fine results of normal times.

I wish to express my appreciation and commendation to the teaching staff for their willing and painstaking efforts.

The enrollment for the year covered by this report was two hundred and thirteen which shows an increase of seven from the previous year. The school attendance averaged 92.32 percent of the membership as compared with the state average of 92.94 percent.

Twenty two boys and girls completed the work of the eighth grade last June. All but two of these have entered a high school this year. The Good Citizenship Award was given to Donald Stevens. Defense Stamps have been purchased by the children of the Pollard School. This has afforded a fine form of training in thrift and character development and gives the children a feeling of having a part in the War Effort. The total stamps and bonds bought by the children from January 1943 to January 1944 totals \$1897.50. This record is commendable both for the teachers and children.

Milk has been available for the children who wished to buy it either at recess or noon time. Approximately 700 bottles have been purchased each week. When it was necessary, the milk has been paid for by funds furnished by The Parent Teachers Association.

A fine collection of tin cans has been made through the cooperation of the children, and turned over to the Salvage Committee. All the rooms have joined the Junior Red Cross and several Christmas boxes were packed to be sent to Childrens' hospitals. Special emphasis has been placed on careful use of all supplies and especially paper.

Funds made available by a vote at the annual Town Meeting made it possible for the Parent Teachers Association to establish a supervised playground at the Pollard School for a month last Summer. It is certain that the benefits derived by the children were greater than the money expended. We hope that this fine project can be continued.

The Otis Mental Tests have been given again in the fourth grade. With the assistance of the teachers we hope to be able to give a Standardized Achievement test before the end of the year to each pupil in grades two to eight inclusive. These tests serve as a check on the work done and furnish a picture of progress made during the year both by the individual and the class as a whole.

Two hundred thousand teachers in the United States have left teaching since Pearl Harbor. Teachers College enrollments have dropped 60 percent below 1940-1941. Fifty Thousand emergency teaching certificates have been issued this year. Living costs have risen 26 percent since August 1939. Fairness dictates that teachers' salaries should have been increased at least 25 percent over September 1939. The increases planned for next year would approximately do that.

During these difficult times we must resolve that in spite of the difficulties and the extra work that we find the operation of our schools on account of the war, there shall be no let down of effort. We must strive as never before, to play our part in the training of good American Citizens. We who are concerned with the daily operation of the schools wish to thank the School Board and the Citizens for their loyal support.


