



TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred and Sixteen Dollars and Twenty-Three Cents (\$216.23) against the State's Eight Hundred and Sixty-Four Dollars and Ninety-Two Cents (\$864.82) for state aid construction.

4. To see if the town will vote 1 percent discount on such part of the taxes as are paid on or before August 15th.

5. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for Stratham Hill Park ball field.

7. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Trustees of the Trust Funds to turn over to the School Board all

monies in their hands amounting to One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and interest thereon, the same having been raised by the Town for the purpose of creating a Capital Reserve fund for the construction of a central school building.

8. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of Willowbrook Avenue beginning at High street and running northerly to its intersection with the new road running from High Sreet to Willowbrook Avenue.

9. To see if the town will vote to paint the inside of the Town Hall, raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Stratham qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 15th day of March, 1950, at 7 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.

9. To see what sums of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of

school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

10. To see if the district will vote to form a co-operative elementary school district for grades up to and including the sixth grade with the Exeter school district, and any other neighboring districts, effective July 1, 1950, as provided in Chapter 199, Laws of 1947, in accordance with a plan of organization as presented at this meeting.

11. On petition of Rodney Sanderson and 13 others, to see if the district will vote to construct a new four room elementary school in Stratham.

12. On petition of Rodney Sanderson and 13 others, to see if the district will authorize the School Board to bond the town up to \$60,000.00 for construction of a new four room elementary school in Stratham.

13. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip an elementary school building.

14. To see if the district will appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 for the construction and to equip an elementary school house, said sum to be raised by the sale of the district's notes or bonds, and to delegate to the School Board all matters of form, rates of interest, dates of paymen and the sale of said notes or bonds, and to appoint any committees or pass any other votes necessary in relation thereto.

15. To see if the district will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 to be applied to the Capital Reserve fund, said sum to be raised by an application of that amount

from surplus funds now in the hands of the district Treasurer.

16. To see if the District will vote to apply all or any part of the funds in the Capital Reserve Fund to the construction and equipment of an elementary school house.

To the School Board of Stratham, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1949-1950 opened with two changes in personnel. Mrs. Eleanor Henry of Kensington replaced Mrs. Leona Foster, who moved away from this area, as music instructor, and Miss Nancy Carnegie started her work as school nurse for Supervisory Union No. 16. She replaced Mrs. Eloise Sheehy who had rendered excellent service for several years, but who felt she should retire from her work as school nurse.

Miss Edna Crane has returned as teacher of grades 5 and 6 along with Mrs. Elizabeth Merrill, teacher of grades 3 and 4 and Mrs. Hilda Barker, teacher of grades 1 and 2. This staff gives Stratham competent teachers who are endeavoring to work for the best interests of the boys and girls in the various phases of their school life.

Some badly needed repairs were made during the summer to all of the school fences and to the steps at the Ridge School. These provide for greater safety for the children and add to the general appearance of the school grounds.

The school district voted at its school meeting in March, 1949, to appoint a committee to study the possibility of forming a cooperative elementary school district for the area. The school districts of Exeter, Newfields, and East Kingston voted to do the same. Kensington was invited to participate in the study unofficially because that town is faced with the same problems in elementary education as the other towns. The committee of the several towns were united into one large committee to carry on the

study. The results of the study have been publicized through the distribution of printed copies and the holding of public meetings.

The problem facing all of us is to decide how our children can have the best education possible within the means of each of the towns. There are two avenues of approach to the issue:

1.) Each town can face its own problems independently.

2.) The towns can combine their resources by forming a cooperative elementary school district and by building a centralized school for the children of all the towns. If a cooperative district is to be formed, the decision should be made soon before the ilndividual towns invest money in their own independent districts.

As I see it, the people of Stratham have two alternatives. They can vote to build their own central school for Stratham or they can vote to join a cooperative school district for the area. The decision the citizens must make is of major importance and will determine the educational future of the boys and girls for years to come. It is my sincere hope that you, the citizens, will give serious thought to the pros and cons of each of the two possibilities and that you will make every effort to provide the best possible education for the boys and girls of the town.

I wish to congratulate the Parent-Teacher Association for purchasing a new 16 mm. moving picture projector for use in the schools. This provides equipment for the beginning of an audio-visual program of instruction which is a very desirable addition to the school life of the children.

I call your attention to the reports and table which follow. I trust that these will be of interest to you.

Again I wish to thank the citizens of Stratham, the

members of the School Board, and the teachers for their fine cooperation and support.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Following is the report of the school nurse from September 7, 1949 to January 1, 1950.

Bi-weekly visits have been made to the schools at which times the first aid kit was checked and fresh supplies added, children have been weighed and measured — a weight and growth chart is kept in the schools which is of great interest to the children and of value to the nurse; vision and hearing have been tested, teeth and tonsils have been checked, skin and hair examined frequently. If time permitted little health talks were given in the classroom. All defects found were reported to the parents. If the defect was not corrected in a reasonable length of time, home visits were made to determine the cause of delay.

This year the Maico Individual Audiometer, a recent gift of the Exeter Kiwanis Club to the schools of this Union, was used. This made it possible to test the hearing of the children in the first and second grades as well as the other children.

There is yet much that can be done in planning and carrying out a health program for school children. Ideas and theories have changed in this field, as in other fields, and it is hoped that as time and opportunity avail themselves these will be put into effect.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest Fires - Our Most Shameful Waste

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fire in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects farreaching. Such fires destroy raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public — YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- 1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- 2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.
