Sullivan County Home, Unity March 6, 1962

In the morning members of the delegation toured the buildings and at noon were entertained at dinner along with the County Commissioners, Stanley Colby, Zella Eastman LaForge, Bernice M. Sawyer MacWilliams, Sen. Marion Phillips.

At 1:30 p. m. Chairman Glenn Bascom called the business meeting to order in the chapel. Rev. Fr. LaCroix and Supt. Ahern spoke briefly on the spiritual work at the Home. The new worship center in the chapel gave the room an atmosphere more conducive to worship.

Commission Chairman Richard Duncan explained the budget and answered questions, after which the delegation went into executive session.

June 4, 1962

Following due legal notice the delegation met at the County Com-

missioners' Office in Claremont. Chairman Glenn Bascom called the meeting to order at $7:30\ p.\ m.$

Present: Bascom, Frizzell, Cann, Gaffney, Angus, Nahil, Barrows, Desnoyer, Guest, Weber, Williamson, Bailey, Downing, DeLude, Crane, Wirkkala, Philbrick, Smith. Merrifield came at the close of the meeting.

Commission Chairman Richard Duncan presented the problem of contamination at the County Home water supply, Marshall Pond, and suggested that the County purchase the Mills property to protect the watershed.

Desnoyer moved, Williamson seconded: That the Commissioners be authorized to purchase the Mills property at a price not to exceed \$8,900.00 and that they be allowed to exceed their budget by the purchase price. Voted unanimously.

Downing moved, DeLude seconded: That the Commissioners be empowered to take an option on the Davis and Simonds property in the Marshall Pond watershed when it may be for sale. Voted unanimously.

Adjourned 8 p. m.

COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

In accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Sullivan County herewith respectfully present the Annual Report of the Commissioners, Attorney, Clerk of the Superior Court, Sheriff, Chaplains and Physician of the County Home, County Agent and the County Auditors for the year ending December 31, 1962.

It is felt by the Commissioners that 1962 was a year of continued progress with respect to the services provided by your County Government. These services were provided for within the budget as approved by the County Delegation with a small net unexpended balance remaining at the end of the year.

The facilities at the County Home received their normal maintenance in an endeavor to keep these facilities at the high level we believe the residents of Sullivan County have come to expect. New equipment was purchased for the Hospital in order to continue to provide the type of services our elderly citizens deserve.

During the year it became possible for the County to purchase a substantial piece of land in Unity which forms a part of the watershed of Marshall Pond, which in turn is the water supply for the County Home. The County Convention at a special meeting deemed this a wise expenditure and authorized the Commissioners to purchase this property for a sum not to exceed \$8,200.00 The Commissioners were able to acquire the property for a total cost of \$8,161.31 and

as a result the County now owns almost all of the watershed property. The small portion not owned is unoccupied timber land and at the present time creates no problem with respect to the water supply. Due to increased revenues received during the year the Commissioners were able to repay during 1962 the short term loan obtained for the purchase price of this property, making it unnecessary to include any appropriation for this purpose in the 1963 budget.

Another good year was experienced on the Farm and the dairy herd continues to produce milk in an excellent quantity and quality. The County terminated its pasteurizing process during the year and now has its milk processed elsewhere and sells the surplus milk produced to the processor. It is felt that experience will show that this methhod will prove satisfactory.

The Commissioners wish to express their sincerest thanks and appreciation to all County Officials, Delegation members, employees and staff of the County Home, and especially our Superintendent and Matron, who have made 1962 a successful year. Additionally, many private citizens and organizations have contributed greatly to the County Hospital and our thanks are extended to them.

An invitation is again extended to all citizens of Sullivan County to visit their County Institution at any time.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To The Commissioners of Sullivan County

Gentlemen:

It is a pleasure to present our annual report after a year of many and varied activities. Though it would seem that a period of relaxed activity would be reached, each passing year seems to bring its problems and need of improvements.

The County Hospital is still filled to capacity but has been limited; its bed capacity reduced by the State Department of Hospital Services from 100 to 93 beds which will mean a substantial reduction in revenue. At the same time increased service is necessary as our ambulatory patients are fast becoming bed patients, thus requiring full time nursing care. There is a considerable waiting list and we feel that some thought should be given to expansion.

With the increase in patients needing intensive nursing care, other problems developed and it has been necessary to add equipment to our laundry. We feel that it is also necessary to equip the hospital with two utility rooms.

We are always striving to upgrade the institution and as of the 1st of August the hospital has been licensed as a Nursing Hospital, with two more doctors added to our staff.

Our Occupational Therapy Department was reactivated in September of the past year with the return of Mrs. Mary Lou Spofford, our Occupational Therapist. We feel that this department warrants future consideration.

We are extremely appreciative of the fine work carried on by Mrs. Lucile Waldo, our Director of Nurses, and her efficient nursing staff. Our sincere thanks to all of them for their untiring efforts and loyalty.

Our dairy is showing marked improvement. The new dairy equipment has been installed and is proving very satisfactory. The dairy herd is increasing in production and a number of the animals have set production records of which we can be justly proud.

Our food production, including vegetables, pork, beef and maple syrup was very good and has given us an ample supply for the year.

Repairs have been made to many of the buildings including the annex, the piggery, and the carpenter shop. It seems that it is a never ending battle to keep these buildings in proper repair.

The House of Correction and Jail population has decreased much below the previous year, making it necessary for us to hire additional help to operate our laundry and farm.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the many groups, organizations, clubs, etc., for their many acts of kindness and gifts given to the residents. It would be almost impossible to mention them all by name. We do feel that we should mention the Claremont Quota Club for the attractive furniture purchased for the men's sun porch, and the two Aquamatic K Pads which were given for the purpose of hot and cold pack treatments. The Accounting Department of the Joy Manufacturing Co. has continued to acknowledge the various holidays during the year by the many gifts and projects carried on by the group.

Our County Home Auxiliary again this year has been very active and we wish to add our thanks to them for their friendly visiting and for the many activities carried on by them for the welfare of our residents.

We only wish we could name all the groups, as we are most appreciative of the wonderful work carried on by so many of them, especially during the Christmas Season with the programs, gifts, etc.

At this time we would like to extend our appreciation to Mr. Richard Duncan, our retired commissioner, for his cooperation and assistance in years passed. We are happy to welcome Mr. Remington Woodhull, our newly elected commissioner from Newport, who has succeeded Mr. Duncan. To Mr. Vincent Perkins and Mr. Charles Bailey we extend our appreciation for their help and continued cooperation.

Our thanks to Dr. Carl Stearns and his medical staff for their support and fine work; our Chaplains, Rev. Father Albert Boulanger and Mr. Alvin Barrus; to all members of the clergy of various faiths; to our County Extension Service; to our Sheriff's Department and to our County Attorney; and to all others too numerous to mention, who have done so much for the welfare of the residents at the hospital and home.

Without the complete cooperation of all our employees it would not be possible to maintain the clean, wholesome, congenial atmosphere we now enjoy. To them we give our sincere thanks.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT

To the Sullivan County Commissioners:

During the past year, the Sullivan County Home has become the Sullivan County Nursing Hospital. This new designation has been earned by keeping our services to our patients on a high level, and by providing consultant services in various fields. We have arranged consultant services in Surgery, Skin, Ophthalmology, Dentistry and Chiropody whenever required.

Influenza Vaccine injections have been given to all employees and patients willing to have them. Blood tests have been taken for checking on Diabetes and Anemia through the courtesy of the Claremont General Hospital Pathology Department, which sent a laboratory technician to our hospital on several occasions. I have recommended that routine Chest X-Rays be taken annually on all hospital employees. This will be done at a nominal charge at the Claremont General Hospital.

For a long time, we have been filled to our bed capacity of 93, with a waiting list averaging 12 applicants. It has been difficult for a Doctor in this county to procure a bed for a patient with a chronic illness, and now it has become quite apparent that there is a definite need for more beds. This means that some new type of construction should be planned in the near future.

I appreciate the high quality of nursing care provided by our staff, so capably supervised by Mrs. Lucile Waldo, our Chief Nurse.

The Supervision given the County Nursing Hospital by Mr. and Mrs. Omer C. Ahern has been very comprehensive and forward-looking, resulting in a very well-run and clean hospital facility.

It has been a pleasure to serve as the attending Physician for the Sullivan County Nursing Hospital under the able direction and courteous cooperation of the County Commissioners.

This past year has been the busiest year since I became Sheriff in 1943. Each year we are faced with an ever increasing number of complaints which have to be investigated, requiring more time and assistance. This, of course, necessitates an increase in expenses, although we keep a careful check on all expenditures so as to keep our department within its budget.

I want to thank the citizens of Sullivan County for their wonderful cooperation given by department, and I also want to thank all law enforcement officers for their assistance in the past and look forward to their continued help and assistance. I thank the County Commissioners with whom we closely work and regret the retirement of Attorney Richard Duncan from that board to which he gave so much of his valuable time.

I especially want to thank our able County Attorney George Zopf for his untiring assistance given to the Sheriff's Department over the past years.

REPORT OF COUNTY ATTORNEY

February 1, 1963

The Commissioners of Sullivan County Newport, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my report as County Attorney for the year ending December 31, 1962.

As I reflect upon the past year, I find that it could well be characterized as a usual year so far as law enforcement activities for the County were concerned. During the year the Grand Jury returned six indictments, and in addition many accused persons availed themselves of the statute permitting them to waive indictment and have their cases speedily considered by the Superior Court. The cases involved major crimes such as forgery, aggravated assault, reckless driving death resulting, larceny, false pretenses, and breaking, entering and larceny.

Particular effort was made to have the husband or father shoulder his responsibility for family support in those cases where the county or state was required to render assistance to destitute wives and children. In those cases where the delinquent father or husband was not within our state, resort was frequently had to the machinery of the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act. In cases where all parties concerned were within our boundaries, I have vigorously enforced our so-called non-support statute with good result in most cases.

Our four Municipal Courts handled hundreds of criminal cases during the year, and your County Attorney prosecuted cases in those courts when the respondent entered a plea of not guilty and desired a trial

I wish to publicly acknowledge the excellent assistance and cooperation I received during 1962 from our capable and industrious Sheriff, James F. McCusker, and his deputies, and from the State Police and local Police Officers. Because of their fine spirit and willingness to cooperate with me to the fullest, my office functioned smoothly and efficiently. I am also indebted to the County Commissioners and the personnel of their offices for the kind consideration they accorded me throughout the year.
