## DEDICATION



ARNOLD B. CONWAY

Arnold B. Conway has lived in Winchester ever since he was born, near the close of World War I. A graduate of Thayer High School, he attended Bay Path Business College and saw active duty in the European Theater during World War II. Soon after his return to Winchester, his career in banking began, with the Winchester National Bank, as teller. Later, the bank was merged with the Cheshire National Bank and in due course, Arnold became Branch Manager in Winchester. From here, he advanced to the Main Office in Keene as Internal Auditor - his position at retirement.

But he didn't just "live" in Winchester in the sense of existing here - he has always, and continues, to live here in the sense of serving. His long service to the Town began in 1947 with his election to the Budget Committee, where he served until 1956. Meanwhile, he was elected Town Auditor in 1949. This was before the Town employed outside, professional auditors. Arnold brought a full measure of professionalism to the town auditing and served with distinction until 1961. He also audited the School District accounts for many years. His expertise in auditing was so well recognized that the Town of Richmond employed him as Auditor for several years.


In 1962, Arnold was elected Town Treasurer and he has served continuously since then. Two of the biggest changes he has seen in that time were the adoption of the alternate fiscal year, July-June; and the semi-annual billing and collection of taxes. Arnold strongly supported these changes as being forward steps in the management of Town finances.

Many citizens fondly recall that at every Town Meeting, Arnold sits near the front, left, keeping close tally on all appropriations as they are voted. He seldom addresses the Meeting, but always has information right at hand to answer any questions posed to him about Town finances.


From 1947 to 1991 is 44 years. In recognition of this outstanding continuous service to our Town; and

with sincere pleasure in knowing a truly loyal public servant;



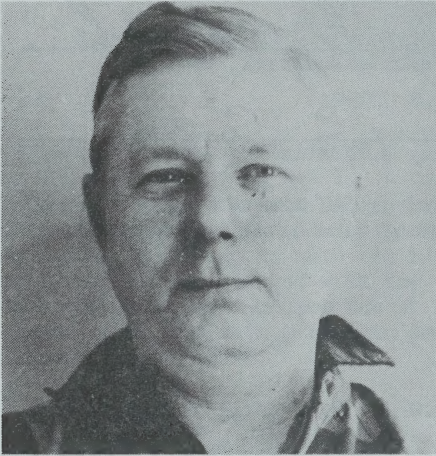
A SALUTE TO ALL WHO SERVE THE TOWN OF WINCHESTER

## SELECTMEN'S MESSAGE

As we enter into yet another Town Meeting, we are faced with the issues of the budget, issues of amending zoning, and adoption of new Town regulations. Some of these issues like the tax bills will affect us directly, and some, like the new regulations may not have a visible consequence on our lives. All of these issues are important, and underscore our rights of choice provided to us through the Constitution of the United States of America.

As we look through the pages of the 1990 Town Report being readied for the printer, we see reflections of the year that has passed. We must review, and then plan, and carefully formulate our ideas for the year ahead.

We've had some very positive accomplishments in this past year. The Winchester Solid Waste Management Plan has finally been approved by the State of New Hampshire. Only one other community in the State had had this type of permit granted when we received approval. This had been in the planning stage for more than one year. We feel proud that the Town is in such a good position to be able to set goals for our future waste disposal so as not to be thrust at the mercy of large conglomerates that might charge tremendous prices to dispose of the Town's solid waste.

Two positive changes at the administrative level that have occurred this year are the formulation of an updated Personnel Policy and the complete computerization of the town offices. The personnel policy was updated to benefit both the employee and the Town. The extensive use of the computers enable all departments to access quickly, easily and accurately the Town records at all times.

The Police Department continues to successfully work on projects that are greatly enhanced by the recent Drug Enforcement Grant. There has been success in this area and progress continues.

The Landfill is just not a landfill any more; it has become a recycling center as well. Implementation of mandatory recycling of aluminum and newspapers has been the invitation to many townspeople to continue to sort other types of trash; many are sorting glass, plastic, and tin as well. This reduces the amount of trash going into our landfill and, therefore, extends its life. In the long run, this will save the Town money, and is a positive step towards preserving our environment.

The Schools, Highway Safety Committee, and the Town road crew worked together to enlarge the school parking lot. We have all been caught off guard by this change, but it has created a 'safe zone' for the school children as they unload from the busses and their family vehicles. We hope to see this paved soon.

The sewer project has been quite consuming for those who live and drive through Ashuelot. The heavy construction is complete and the entire project, to this date, is 99% complete. For those of us who enjoy the beauty of the Ashuelot River we can be confident that Winchester and Ashuelot have helped in cleaning it up for the generations to come.

The bridges are a constant concern to us in the Town. While we are graced with the beauty that the rivers provide, we are also faced with the fact that if our bridges are in disrepair and closed, our community is divided. In September of 1990, we were forced to close and barricade two bridges that pass over the Ashuelot River. Today the Ashuelot Covered Bridge is open. The New England charm that the covered bridge brings and its functional design affords us with an ability to maintain it ourselves. We wish the Elm Street bridge could be repaired as easily. Through many meetings and planning sessions, we have worked with the State and have now received assurances that there will be two-thirds funding paid for through the State of New Hampshire Department of Transportation bridge funds. It will be up to the townspeople at this Town Meeting to raise and appropriate the necessary funds to match the two-thirds contribution from the State.

This year you will notice in the Warrant, a series of articles asking to raise monies to be put into capital reserve accounts. We feel that budgeting monies over a period of years is a responsible way of planning for future expensive purchases.

We were sorry to have Irene Ethridge resign from her position of five years as Administrative Assistant in August of 1990. Irene continues her service to the Town as our new Accounting Supervisor. We are happy that she is still with us as her knowledge of the inner workings of the Town of Winchester's government is irreplaceable.

Lastly, and most importantly, in the past few months we have been actively seeking small industries and businesses. Landowners and developers in the community have been completing questionnaires for the State of New Hampshire Office of Industrial Development. By listing with the State of New Hampshire, potential business sites are getting state and national attention through their index of potential sites. We have, also, been

meeting with various developers and A.C. Lawerance Company in an effort to utilize the Tannery structure for the purpose of small industries.


This has been a good year. Our plan for next year, will be to continue to look at potential industrial sites; to begin to implement the plans set forth by the Solid Waste Management Plan; to repair the Elm Street Bridge if the Town so votes to raise the funds; and to continue to run a smooth and equitable town government for its' citizens.

We, as others in the community, have hope for the next year as well. We hope to see our economy stabilize and to have our troops come back from the Middle East quickly, safely and with pride.



## SELECTMEN'S REPORT - 1991

The Board of Selectmen wish to thank all the taxpayers and town officers for their cooperation during the past year. Selectmen meet every Wednesday at 7:00 P.M. Other times may be arranged by calling 239-4951 if these hours are not convenient. The Selectmen's Office is now open Monday through Friday from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M.

We again call your attention to the numerous forms available in the Selectmen's Office to be used by the taxpayers for property taxation. The only form that is mailed out is the Inventory of Taxable Property. All other forms must be obtained at the Selectmen's Office. The law states that an Inventory Form must be filled in, signed and returned to the Selectmen's Office on or before April 15th. If an Inventory Form is not filed, there is no legal basis for the Board of Land and Tax Appeals or the Court to consider an application for abatement. Also, a late return of the Inventory Form will be assessed a penalty.

### VETERAN'S EXEMPTION

Permanent applications are available in the Selectmen's Office. We call to your attention that, if a person eligible for exemption changes his domicile, or a veteran's wife becomes a widow during the year, a new permanent application must be filed with the assessing official.

### EXEMPTIONS FOR CERTAIN ELDERLY PEOPLE (C.E.P.)

These forms are for persons who qualify for reduction in their tax bills. These forms must be completed and in the Selectmen's Office on or before April 15, 1991. If there is no completed form on file, we cannot grant the Elderly Exemption. As of April 1, 1991, the three categories of exemption are from ages 65 to 75, 75 to 79, and age 80 and over. It is your responsibility to complete a new exemption form if you change categories.

### INTENT TO CUT TIMBER

Every owner, including state, county or municipality or public agency, shall prior to each cutting operation, file with the Selectmen, a Notice of Intent to Cut.

### ASSESSMENT OF OPEN SPACE

No owner of land shall be entitled to have a particular parcel of his land classified for any tax year under the provision of this chapter unless he shall have applied to the assessing officials on the form approved by the Board and provided by the Tax Commission.

### PERMITS

Any person, firm, corporation, municipality, public agency, or institution desiring to operate, maintain, offer for rent, lease or tenancy any site, lot, field, tract of ground for location of any building trailer or manufactured housing, or other similar conveyance, place or abode for shelter, or any other form of development, (as defined in this Ordinance), shall obtain a written operating (building) permit from the Board of Selectmen. A fee to be set annually by the Board of Selectmen and payable to the Town of Winchester is required with the issuance of each permit. When permits are not used within one (1) year from the date of issuance, application for renewal of permit must be made, and, if granted, will not entail the payment of a new fee. Where applicable, it would be necessary to have received and to show proof of having received, an "Approval of Construction", granted by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, Water Supply and Pollution Control Division for the construction of any septic tank system (or, where applicable, a Certificate of Availability from the Winchester Board of Sewer Commissioners) before a building permit or permit to park a trailer or manufactured housing shall be issued.

### MANUFACTURED HOUSING

Whenever a person moves manufactured housing into a city or town for the purpose of establishing a residence in said city or town, or whenever a person purchases existing manufactured housing with the intent of residing in the same at the existing location, he shall within fifteen (15) days of the placement of the manufactured housing or within fifteen (15) days of the purchase of same register with the assessors of the city or the Selectmen of the town where he intends to reside. Whoever fails to comply with the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a violation. (RSA 72: 7-b).

### STREET NUMBERING

In 1987 all streets and roads in the Town of Winchester were assigned names, and street numbers were issued to each home. Prior to this project, many streets and roads were known by several names, which caused problems for emergency personnel as well as other people looking for a certain address. Our Postmaster, Richard E. Whippie, put in many hours of work to design and put this numbering system into effect. We would appreciate having every house marked with the assigned number, as well as all mailboxes. If you are not sure of your number, please call the Selectmen's Office. Your cooperation in this endeavor will help everyone.

NOTICE FROM TAX OFFICE

The State Department of Revenue Administration has issued the warning to all real estate tax payers that the State Law - RSA 76:16 - says in part that ..."a tax payer .... may, within 60 days after notice of tax and not afterwards, apply in writing to the Selectmen ... for an abatement of the tax ...". This law supercedes the one that allowed the tax payer 4 months in which to appeal the assessment. Your inventory form must have been filed by April 15, 1990. The law also stated that this notice should have been printed on the bill IF the property tax bill forms have not already been printed. Because the forms had already been printed, this notice is being supplied with the bill. Taxes will be due by December 31st. After that, interest at the rate of 12% will be charged.

INFORMATION ON CHAPTER 91-A

ACCESS TO PUBLIC RECORDS AND MEETINGS

91-A:1 PREAMBLE. Openness in the conduct of public business is essential to a democratic society. The purpose of this chapter is to ensure both the greatest possible public access to the actions, discussions and records of all public bodies, and their accountability to the people.

91-A:1-a DEFINITION OF PUBLIC PROCEEDINGS. The term "public proceedings" as used in this chapter means the transaction of any functions affecting any or all citizens of the state by any of the following:

- I. The general court including executive sessions of committees.
- II. The governor's council and the governor with the governor's council;
- III. Any board or commission of any state agency or authority, including the board of trustees of the university system of New Hampshire;
- IV. Any board, commission, agency or authority, of any county, town, municipal corporation, school district, or other political subdivision or any committee, subcommittee or subordinate body thereof, or advisory committee thereto.

91-A:2 MEETINGS OPEN TO PUBLIC.

I. For the purpose of this section, a "meeting" shall mean the convening of a quorum of the membership of a public body, as provided in section 91-A:1-a, to discuss or act upon a matter or matters over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction or advisory power.

"Meeting" shall not include:

(a) Any chance meeting or a social meeting neither planned nor intended for the purpose of discussing matters relating to official business and at which no decisions are made; however, no such chance or social meeting shall be used to circumvent the spirit of this chapter;

(b) Strategy or negotiations with respect to collective bargaining;

or

(c) Consultation with legal counsel.

II. All public proceedings shall be open to the public, and all persons shall be permitted to attend any meetings of those bodies or agencies. Except for town meetings, school district meetings and elections, no vote while in open session may be taken by secret ballot. Any person shall be permitted to use recording devices, including but not limited to, tape recorders, cameras and videotape equipment, at such meetings. Minutes of all such meetings, including names of members, persons appearing before the bodies or agencies, and a brief description of the subject matter discussed and final decisions, shall be promptly recorded and open to public inspection within 144 hours of the public meeting, except as provided in RSA 91-A:6 and shall be treated as permanent records of any body or agency, or any subordinate body thereof, without exception. Except in an emergency or when there is a meeting of a legislative committee, a notice of the time and place of each such meeting, including an executive session, shall be posted in 2 appropriate places or shall be printed in a newspaper of general circulation in the city or town at least 24 hours, excluding Sundays and legal holidays, prior to such meetings. An emergency shall mean a situation where immediate undelayed action is deemed to be imperative by the chairman or presiding officer or the body or agency who shall employ whatever means are available to inform the public that a meeting is to be held. The minutes of the meeting shall clearly spell out the need for the emergency meeting. When a meeting of a legislative committee is held, publication made pursuant to the rules of the house or representatives or the senate, whichever rules are appropriate, shall be sufficient notice. If the charter of any city or guidelines or rules of order of any body or agency described in RSA 91-A:1a require a broader public access to official meetings and records than herein described, such charter provisions or guidelines or rules of order shall take precedence over the requirements of this chapter.

### 91-A:3 EXECUTIVE SESSIONS:

I. Bodies or agencies may meet in executive session for deliberations only after a majority vote of members present, which shall be recorded in the minutes of the meeting. All sessions at which information, evidence or testimony in any form is received, except as provided in paragraph II, shall be open to the public. No ordinances, orders, rules, resolutions, regulations, contracts, appointments or other official actions shall be finally approved in executive session except as provided in paragraph II. The record of all actions shall be available for public inspection promptly, except as provided in paragraph II.

II. A body or agency may exclude the public only if a recorded roll call vote is taken to go into executive session. A motion to go into executive session stating which exemption under this paragraph is claimed shall be made only when the body or agency is considering or acting upon the following matters.

(a) The dismissal, promotion or compensation of any public employee or the disciplining of such employee, or the investigation of any charges against him, unless the employee affected requests an open meeting.

(b) The hiring of any person as a public employee.

(c) Matters which, if discussed in public, likely would affect adversely the reputation of any person, other than a member of the body or agency itself, unless such person requests an open meeting.

(d) Consideration of the acquisition, sale or lease of property which, if discussed in public, likely would benefit a party or parties whose interests are adverse to those of the general community.

(e) Consideration or negotiation of pending claims or litigation which has been threatened in writing or filed against the body or agency or any subdivision thereof, or against any member thereof because of his membership in such body or agency, until the claim or litigation has been full adjudicated or otherwise settled.

(f) Consideration of applications by the adult parole board under RSA 651-A.

III, Minutes of Executive Sessions. Minutes of proceedings in executive session shall be kept, at least to the extent of recording any decisions made therein. Decisions reached in executive session must be publicly disclosed within 72 hours of the meeting, unless, in the opinion of 2/3 of the members present, divulgence of the information likely would affect adversely the reputation of any person other than a member of the body or agency itself or render the proposed action ineffective. In event of such a circumstances, information may be withheld until, in the opinion of a majority of members, the aforesaid circumstances no longer apply.

91-A:4 Minutes and records Available for Public Inspection.

I. Every citizen during the regular or business hours of all such bodies or agencies, and on the regular premises of such bodies or agencies, has the right to inspect all public records, including minutes of meetings of the bodies or agencies, and to make memoranda, abstracts, photographic or photostatic copies of the records or minutes so inspected, except as otherwise prohibited by statute or RSA 91-a:5.

II. After the completion of a meeting of such bodies or agencies, every citizen, during the regular or business hours of all such bodies or agencies, and on the regular business premises of such bodies or agencies, has the right to inspect all notes, materials, tapes or other sources used for compiling the minutes of such meetings, and to make memoranda, abstracts, photographic or photostatic copies, or tape record such notes, materials, tapes or sources inspected, except as otherwise prohibited by statute or RSA 91-A:5.

III. Each body or agency shall keep and maintain all public records in its custody at its regular office or place of business in an accessible place and, if there is no such office or place of business, the public records pertaining to such body or agency shall be kept in an office of the political subdivision in which such body or agency is located or, in the case of a state agency, in an office designated by the secretary of state.

IV. Each public body or agency shall, upon request for any public record reasonably described, make available for inspection and copying any such public record within its files when such records are immediately available for such release. If a public body or agency is unable to make a public record available for immediate inspection and copying, it shall, within 5 business days of request, make such record available, deny the request in writing with reasons, or furnish written acknowledgment of the receipt of the request and a statement of the time reasonably necessary to determine whether the request shall be granted or denied. If a photocopying machine or other device maintained for use by a body or agency is used by the body or agency to copy the public record or document requested, the person requesting the copy may be charged the actual cost of providing the copy, which cost may be collected by the body or agency. Nothing in this section shall exempt any person from paying fees otherwise established by law for obtaining copies of public records or documents, but if such fee is established for the copy, no additional costs or fees shall be charged.

V. In the same manner as set forth in RSA 91-A:4 IV, any body or agency which maintains its records in a computer storage system may, in lieu of providing original documents, provide a printout of any record reasonably described and which the agency has the capacity to produce in a manner that does not reveal information which is confidential under this chapter or any law. Access to work papers, personnel data and other confidential information under RSA 91-A:5, IV shall not be provided.

91-A:5 EXEMPTIONS. The records of the following bodies are exempted from the provisions of this chapter:

- I. Grand and petit juries.
- II. Parole and pardon boards.
- III. Personal school records of pupils.

IV. Records pertaining to internal personnel practices, confidential, commercial, or financial information; test questions, scoring keys, and other examination data used to administer a licensing examination, examination for employment, or academic examinations; and personnel, medical, welfare, library user, and other files whose disclosure would constitute invasion of privacy. Without otherwise compromising the confidentiality of the files, nothing in this paragraph shall prohibit a body or agency from releasing information relative to health or safety from investigative files on a limited basis to persons whose health or safety may be affected.

91-A:6 EMPLOYMENT SECURITY. This chapter shall apply to RSA 282-A, relative to employment security; however, in addition to the exemptions under RSA 91-A:5, the provisions of RSA 282-A:117-123 shall also apply, this provision shall be administered and construed in the spirit of that section, and the exemptions from the provisions of this chapter shall include anything exempt from public inspection under RSA 282-A:117-123 together with all records and data developed from RSA 282-A:117-123.

91-A:7 VIOLATION. Any person aggrieved by a violation of this chapter may petition the superior court for injunctive relief. The courts shall give proceedings under this chapter priority on the court calendar. Such a petitioner may appear with or without counsel. The petition shall be deemed sufficient if it states facts constituting a violation of this chapter, and may be filed by the petitioner or his counsel with the clerk of court or any justice thereof. Thereupon the clerk of court or any justice shall order service by copy of the petition on the person or persons charged. When any justice shall find that time probably is of the essence, he may order notice by any reasonable means, and he shall have authority to issue an order ex parte when he shall reasonably deem such an order necessary to insure compliance with the provisions of this chapter.

91-A:8 REMEDIES. If any body or agency or employee or member thereof, in violation of the provisions of this chapter, refuses to provide a public record or refuses access to a public proceeding to a person who reasonably requests the same, such body, agency, or person may be liable for reasonable attorney's fees and costs incurred in a lawsuit under this chapter provided that the court finds that such lawsuit was necessary in order to make the information available or the proceeding open to the public. Fees shall not be awarded unless the court finds that the body, agency or person knew or should have known that the conduct engaged in was a violation of this chapter or where the parties, by agreement, provide that no such fees shall be paid. In any case where fees are awarded under this chapter, upon a finding that an officer, employee, or other official of a public body or agency has acted in bad faith in refusing to allow access to a public proceeding or to provide a public record, the court may award such fees personally against such officer, employee, or other official.

II. The court may invalidate an action of a public body or agency taken at a meeting held in violation of the provisions of this chapter, if the circumstances justify such invalidation.

III. In addition to any other relief awarded pursuant to this chapter, the court may issue an order to enjoin future violations of this chapter.



TOWN OF WINCHESTER

WATER DEPARTMENT POLICY

WINCHESTER, NEW HAMPSHIRE

LARGE CONSUMERS

Including hotels, motels, stores, markets, barber shops, restaurants, laundries, greenhouses, manufacturers, commercial industries, car wash services, farms, and building purposes, etc., rates by meter or special written agreement.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Service pipes will be introduced into the premises of all persons making written application therefore to the Selectmen, providing said premises are located on some main, or distribution main of the system. The entire expense of a water line, including all pipes, curb boxes and other necessary materials and all expense of laying the water line shall be paid for by the applicant. The Water Department shall be responsible for any repairs made from the main line to the curb box, all repairs made after the curb box shall be the responsibility of the property owner. All valves are to be of rubber compression type.
2. All applications for the use of the water must be made in writing to the Selectmen (or their authorized agents) by the owner of the premises or authorized agents, and the various uses to which the water is to be applied must be fully stated. It shall not be used for any other purpose without previous notice to the Selectmen.
3. All persons taking water must keep their pipes and fixtures in good repair and protect them from frost to the service box at their own expense. They will be held liable for all damage resulting from their failure to do so.
4. They shall prevent all unnecessary waste, and water shall not be left running to prevent freezing without prior authorization from the Town.
5. The Selectmen and their authorized agents shall have free access to all premises supplied with water to ascertain the quantity of water used, the manner of its use, and whether there is any unnecessary waste; also to examine the apparatus. If any pipes or fixtures are not found in good order they will be immediately repaired at the expense of the owner. If repairs are not made within two days after notice, the water will be shut off until such repairs are made.
6. The water rents shall be due and payable quarterly in advance and payable at the office of the tax collector on the fifteenth day of February, May, August and November of each year, and pro rata to those dates. In all cases of nonpayment of the water rents within fifteen days after the same are due, the water shall be shut off until all charges are paid. The property owner will in all cases be held liable for water rents.

7. All parties using water in stables will be charged schedule rates for the same whether it is carried by hand or through hose:
8. The Selectmen reserve the right to put in a meter at the expense of the water user, in any case, and charge for water rates corresponding to meter rates charged by works of a similar class. When water passes through a meter it may be used for any and all purposes. No person except an employee of the Water Department will be allowed to take off water meters, or tap the mains.
9. No abatement of water rents will be made by reason of disuse or diminished use unless the water has been turned off at the curb stop by the Water Department. No abatements can be made without written authority of the Board of Selectmen.
10. Owners of water takers shall also promptly give notice when the use of fixtures has been resumed or tenement re-occupied.
11. SHUTTING OFF WATER: The Selectmen reserve the right to shut off the water for the purpose of making alterations or necessary repairs; and they will also restrict the use of water in case of shortage, especially in the case of large consumers and garden hose; also they will shut off the water from any person who will disregard these rules or neglect to pay the water rents when due.
12. When a water use ban is in effect, violators will have their water turned off and the water will not be turned back on until the sum of \$20.00 has been paid (\$10.00 turn-off, \$10.00 turn-on).
13. No person shall be entitled to damages, nor to have any portion of a payment refunded for any stoppage of water for the purpose of additions or repairs, nor any stoppage for violation of these rules, nor for any purpose whatever, which in the opinion of the Selectmen may be deemed necessary.
14. LETTING ON WATER: When the water has been shut off for violation of any of these rules, for nonpayment of rents, or for repairs for consumer, it shall not be turned on again until the Selectmen are satisfied that there will be no further cause for complaint, and the sum of \$10.00 shall have been paid for shutting off and \$10.00 for turning on the water. There shall be a \$10.00 turn-on and \$10.00 turn-off fee for seasonal usage.
15. The Selectmen reserve the right to establish such rules, regulations and rates from time to time, as they may think expedient for the introduction and use of water. Water will be supplied only to such parties as conform to the rules and regulations of the Selectmen.
16. If in any case it becomes necessary to shut off water from any distribution main or branch pipe, reasonable notice will be given whenever possible and in such manner as practicable. However, in the cases of emergency, notice of water stoppage will not necessarily be given.
17. No person shall in any case be allowed to open a fire hydrant except by a written permit from the Selectmen, but the engineers of the Fire Department shall in all cases have control of hydrants at fires.

18. ANY person, corporation, or other entity, who damages any part of the water system will be held liable for all costs of repair.
19. Water takers shall not allow persons not taking water to obtain water from their fixtures without a written permit from the Selectmen.  
  
If any water taker permits another, not a patron of the water works, to obtain a supply of water, the taker so permitting shall be charged double the regular rate for a full quarter and longer if said person continues to furnish water contrary to this rule.
20. No person shall park a vehicle so as to obstruct a fire hydrant or place or cause to be placed, any building material, earth, snow or other obstruction in the way of it's free use by the firemen (within four feet of hydrant on all sides).
21. Consumers leaving their premises unoccupied for any length of time are especially warned to close the main house shutoff, as water is liable to escape by accident or otherwise.
22. We recommend service pipe to be three quarter inch copper K water pipe and brass or copper pipe fittings. Any non-conforming pipe, such as plastic or PVC, shall be laid on a base of six inches of fine, stone free sand, and with a minimum of twelve inches of stone free sand placed over and above the pipe. All water lines shall be inspected by the Selectmen or their authorized agent, during installation. Standards for plastic or PVC pipe and fittings must conform to a minimum of one-hundred sixty pounds per square inch test or 200 lb PSI copper tube size.
23. All new mains installed by applicants must be of ductile iron type pipe (class 52) and accessories. No asbestos cement or transite lines shall be connected to the water system. All new mains installed by land developers must be shown on a map drawn to scale and supply necessary information such as location of mains, hydrants, corporations and curb boxes, with detailed measurements of curb boxes and corporations. A copy of scale drawings shall be submitted to the Selectmen. All new water systems will be subject to inspection by the Selectmen or their authorized agent during installation. All gate valves shall be resilient seat type and mechanical joints.
24. All new fire hydrants shall be installed with a shut off which will be located four feet from the hydrant. All new hydrants shall be Dresser 929. Installation of hydrants shall be inspected by the Selectmen or their authorized agent during installation.
25. No person shall turn on, turn off or otherwise tamper with curb boxes without the written consent of the Selectmen or their authorized agent.
26. Each individual dwelling, business, etc., must have a separate connection to the main and separate curb boxes.
27. All connections to the water system are to be done by the Water Department with proper notice given to the Selectmen.

28. No connections will be made by the Water Department after the month of October, through the month of April, unless authorized by the Selectmen.
29. No person shall fill a swimming pool from a hydrant, unless authorized and supervised by the Selectmen or their authorized agent.

Water line repairs will be charged to consumer.

Prior to the water being turned on at a use, all requirements of the Town of Winchester must be met, (i.e., septic approval, permit to move, driveway permits, etc.).

Each application is considered on its own merits. The Selectmen reserve the right to deny any application for use that they determine will jeopardize the safety or health of current municipal water users, or will create unsafe demand on the municipal water system.

Subject to review and change by the Winchester Board of Selectmen.

LANDFILL - RECYCLING FACILITY

ORDINANCE

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Pursuant to the authority of RSA 31:39 and RSA 147 the Town of Winchester hereby adopts the following ordinance for the operation of its public disposal facility to be known as the Landfill-Recycling Facility.

I. USE OF LANDFILL-RECYCLING FACILITY:

The Landfill-Recycling Facility will be open for use by Winchester residents and non-resident property owners, and resident and non-resident property owners of such other towns as approved by the Board of Selectmen during the following days and hours and under the following conditions:

- A. Admission to the facility will be only by numbered permit issued annually by the Board of Selectmen upon application to the Selectmen by an appropriate person, business, or institution. All permits must be attached to a motor vehicle and be plainly visible.
  
- B. The facility will be open on the following days and hours:
  - 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Tuesday, Thursday
  - 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Saturday
  - 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M. Sunday
  
  - CLOSED Monday, Wednesday, Friday and  
Holidays

(The Board of Selectmen, after conducting a Public Hearing, may adjust the hours of operation).

C. Regulation for Use

1. Trash and recyclables will be accepted only during scheduled hours.
2. All trash and recyclables shall be placed in designated areas.
3. Everyone using the facility shall observe posted rules and procedures.
4. Everyone using the facility shall obey attendants and comply with their direction.
5. All drivers shall obey the speed limits and traffic signs.
6. All solid waste and recyclables shall be transported and delivered in vehicles acceptable to the Town of Winchester. Vehicles shall deposit loads safely and not to exceed design or cause overflow in the areas.
7. All vehicles shall cover their loads beginning April 1, 1989 so the material is secure. Trash may be considered covered by the utilization of plastic bags or similar cover. Uncovered loads after April 1, 1989 shall be refused admittance.
8. Any vehicle losing material at the site in an area other than the designated areas whether it be by wind, unsecured load, vehicle or driver error, the owner is responsible for a cleanup charge.
9. All vehicles and drivers entering the facility do so at their own risk and are liable for any and all damages they may cause the facilities and/or personnel.

II. SEPARATION: "RECYCLING"

All material brought to the facility for disposal shall be separated into the following categories to be deposited in designated containers or locations as the Landfill-Recycling attendant directs:

A. CLEAR GLASS

SHALL MEAN EMPTY CLEAR GLASS CONTAINERS. NO CERAMICS, WINDOW GLASS OR LIGHT BULBS. LABELS DO NOT HAVE TO BE REMOVED.

- B. GREEN OR BLUE GLASS SHALL MEAN EMPTY GREEN OR BLUE GLASS CONTAINERS. NO CERAMICS, LABELS DO NOT HAVE TO BE REMOVED.
- C. BROWN GLASS SHALL MEAN EMPTY BROWN GLASS CONTAINERS. NO CERAMICS. LABELS DO NOT HAVE TO BE REMOVED.
- D. METAL CANS AND CONTAINERS SHALL MEAN EMPTY TIN OR STEEL CONTAINERS OF A SIZE ONE GALLON OR SMALLER. LABELS DO NOT HAVE TO BE REMOVED.
- E. ALUMINUM CANS SHALL MEAN EMPTY ALUMINUM CANS.
- F. PAPER SHALL MEAN ALL CLEAN, DRY, PAPER SEPARATED INTO THE FOLLOWING THREE CATEGORIES:
1. Newspapers
  2. Corrugated paper, cardboard, and brown paper bags.
  3. All other paper products such as junk mail, catalogs, and magazines.
- G. PLASTICS SHALL MEAN ALL CLEAR AND COLORED PLASTIC SODA BOTTLES, MILK, CIDER, JUICE, AND WATER CONTAINERS. THEY SHALL BE SEPARATED INTO THE FOLLOWING CATEGORIES:
1. Clear soda bottles, etc.(P.E.T.).
  2. Colored soda bottles, etc.(P.E.T.).
  3. Mixed milk, cider, juice and water containers, etc.(H.D.P.E.).
- H. LARGE METAL OBJECTS SHALL MEAN SCRAP METAL OF ALL KINDS, i.e., PIPE, WIRE, APPLIANCES, SHEET METAL, MOTORS, TOOLS, BED SPRINGS, ETC. NO RUBBER, PLASTIC OR WOOD.

### III. UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS:

These materials shall not be disposed of at the Winchester Solid Waste Transfer Station.

1. Explosives, such as dynamite and ammunition.
2. Gas, turpentine, paints, liquid asphalt, pesticides, herbicides or their products.
3. Stumps and lot clearing materials.
4. Highly volatile products.
5. Motor vehicles, boats and parts thereof.  
(Cars, trucks, motorcycles, busses, trailers, etc.).
6. Asbestos waste.
7. Batteries other than vehicle batteries.  
(Flashlight and game).
8. Hazardous waste - Residential, Commercial and Industrial.



9. Any material, which in the opinion of the Town personnel constitutes a serious hazard to other users, to the property of the Town or to the employees, will not be accepted.
10. Hospital, nursing home and veterinarian materials and waste. These materials will not be received unless prior permission and arrangements have been made.
11. Any material listed in the New Hampshire RSAs or the Solid Waste Division Administrative Rules.
12. Any material listed on the Transfer Station operation permit.  
A hazardous waste drop-off center may be established by the Town of Winchester where materials listed in Items #2, 4, 7, and 8 can be collected.

Anyone wanting to dispose of the materials listed above should seek guidance from the State Department of Environmental Services.

#### IV. SUPERVISION:

The Landfill-Recycling Attendant shall have the right to refuse the use of the Facility to any person, corporation, or other user who is misusing the Facility, or is violating this Ordinance, or who does not have the proper permit, or the necessary tickets to cover the costs incurred under the Unrecycled Waste Option. Any such user who refuses to obey the legitimate orders of the Attendant shall be guilty of a violation of this Ordinance.

#### V. BURNING:

No burning shall be allowed at the facility except at the direction and supervision of the District Fire Warden and the Town Selectmen.

#### VI. FIREARMS:

The discharge of firearms is prohibited at the Facility.

#### VII. ORIGIN OF MATERIAL DISPOSED OF AT FACILITY:

Only material collected within the limits of the Town of Winchester or such other Towns as approved by the Selectmen, shall be disposed of at the Landfill-Recycling Facility.

VIII. COMMERCIAL HAULERS:

A commercial hauler shall mean anyone who hauls materials to the disposal facility for others for a fee. All persons or corporations engaged in the commercial hauling of rubbish materials, etc., must first obtain a permit from the Board of Selectmen after payment of a permit fee of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per year and also furnish to the Town of Winchester a Five Thousand Dollar (\$5,000.00) Surety Bond or a deposit of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) cash to ensure the compliance with the terms of this Ordinance. A copy of the permit shall be kept in the commercial vehicles at all times.

IX. TRESPASS:

The gate will be locked at all times when the Landfill-Recycling Facility is not open to the public. Anyone entering the Landfill-Recycling Facility when the gate is locked is guilty of trespass and shall be charged with violating the terms of this Ordinance.

X. UNRECYCLED WASTE:

The Town is aware that some persons and businesses will find it difficult, if not impossible, to recycle waste material.

A. Taking the above fact into consideration, together with the evidence that such unrecycled waste material will create additional expense to the Town in recycling or removing said material from the Landfill-Recycling Facility, the following fees will be assessed by the Town against the registered holder of the numbered permit attached to the motor vehicle at the facility, for unsorted material brought to the facility in that vehicle.

1. \$10.00 per trip for any passenger vehicles, (Sedans, convertibles, station wagons).
2. \$20.00 per trip for any trucks, vans, and trailers to two and one-half tons capacity.
3. \$50.00 per trip for any trucks, vans and trailers of over two and one-half tons capacity (excluding commercial packers).
4. \$12.00 per cubic yard for commercial packers and roll off containers based on rated unit capacity.

- B. The Board of Selectmen, after conducting a public hearing, may adjust said Landfill fees to reasonably reflect the actual cost to the Town of handling and disposing of unrecycled waste material.

XI. COLLECTION OF LANDFILL FEES:

- A. Landfill Permits - All Landfill Permits will be numbered by the Board of Selectmen and issued to a specific individual, company or institution. Each permit be attached to a motor vehicle and must be plainly visible.
- B. Landfill Tickets (1) The registered holder of the Landfill Permit agrees to purchase the necessary tickets from the Selectmen's Office to cover the costs incurred by the Town if said holder chooses the "Unrecycled Waste Option" over the "Recycling Option". The Landfill Attendant shall collect the tickets from said registered holder equal to the fee schedule in Section 10 of this Ordinance. (2) Tickets shall be purchased for the following items. The fees shall be as shown and subject to revision by the Town Selectmen.

SEPARATION OF GOODS:

1. White Goods (household goods must be kept separate from all other waste. An additional fee of \$10.00 per large appliance will be charged.
2. Hard Metals (steel shafting, castings, etc.) must be kept separate from all other waste. An additional fee of \$10.00 per truck load will be charged.
3. Tires and Heavy Rubber Goods must be kept separate from all other waste. An additional fee of \$2.00 per car tire and \$5.00 per truck tire will be charged.

XII. EXEMPTION:

In special circumstances the fees may be waived by the Board of Selectmen.

XIII. PENALTY:

Any person or corporation convicted of violating any provision of this Ordinance or the directives of the Landfill-Recycling Attendant may have their privilege of Landfill-Recycling use revoked, as determined by special hearing with the Town Selectmen.

XIV. SEPARABILITY:

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision nor the validity of the Ordinance as a whole.

XV. This Ordinance shall automatically repeal any other Ordinance that is in conflict with this Ordinance.

XVI. EFFECTIVE DATE:



ARTICLE #29: To see if the Town will vote to accept the Covered Bridge Trust Fund to be used for the purposes of maintenance and beautification of the Coombs and Ashuelot Covered Bridges and further to appoint the Board of Selectmen as the agents to carry out the purposes of this fund pursuant to RSA 31:19.

ARTICLE #30: To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict revenues from the Recycling Program and Landfill Permit Program, to expenditures for the purpose of landfill maintenance and operation. Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Recycling/Landfill fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of the revenue.

POSSESSION OF OPEN CONTAINERS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES PROHIBITED

1. OPEN CONTAINERS: No person shall be in possession of glass, can or open container containing alcoholic liquor on any thoroughfare, street, sidewalk, alley, parking lots or any other public way, including on any public body of water.

2. OPEN CONTAINER IN MOTOR VEHICLES: No person shall have in his or her possession an open container containing alcoholic liquor within or on a motor vehicle, including motorcycles, while parked or standing on a public street or parking lot in the Town, or while such vehicle is in motion.

3. PENALTIES: Any person convicted of violation of any section of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a violation, the maximum fine for such shall be One-Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

INSERTED BY BOARD OF SELECTMEN

ARTICLE #33: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

ORDINANCE RELATED TO ALARM SYSTEMS

I. The purpose of this Ordinance is to regulate by permit and set rules to control the alarm systems used within the Town of Winchester, New Hampshire. This Ordinance is intended to reimburse the Town of Winchester for unnecessary responses to False Alarms within the Town and place the responsibility for insuring alarms are kept in proper working order on the owner of the premises in which the alarm is installed.

ALARM SYSTEMS

DEFINITIONS:

Section (1) - The following words and phrases, as used in this section, shall have the meaning given in this section:

ALARM INSTALLATION: The design, installation, repair, alteration and maintenance of systems causing an alarm to be sounded in the event of a burglary or robbery.

ALARM USER: Any person on whose premises an alarm system is maintained within, except for alarm systems on motor vehicles or proprietary alarm systems.

ANSWERING SERVICE: A telephone answering service which provides the service of receiving emergency signals from alarm system, and thereafter, immediately relaying the message by live voice to the Police Department.

CENTRAL ALARM STATION: Any facility which is privately owned, that owns or leases alarm systems, whose facility is staffed by employees who receive, record or validate alarm signals, and relay the information of such signals to the Police Department by any means.

DIAL ALARM: An alarm system which automatically selects a telephone line connected to the Police Department and reproduces a pre-recorded voice message or coded signal indicating the existence of an emergency situation that the alarm system is designed to detect.

DIRECT ALARM: Any alarm system which is directly connected to the alarm processing unit within the Police or direct monitoring facility.

EMERGENCY ALARM SYSTEM: An assembly of equipment and devices, or a single device, arranged to signal a hazard or intrusion requiring urgent attention and to which Police are expected to respond. The terms "emergency alarm system" shall include terms, "dial alarm", "direct alarm" and "local alarm" as those terms are defined in this section.

FALSE ALARM: Any activation of an alarm system to which the Police respond which is not the result of a robbery, burglary, attempted robbery or attempted burglary. Such terminology shall not apply to those alarms caused by electrical storms, floods or other violent events of nature.

LOCAL ALARM: Any alarm system not connected to the police monitoring facility or to a central station or answering service, which when activated causes an audible and/or visual signaling device at the premises within which the alarm system is installed.

MANUAL ALARM: Any alarm in which the activation of the alarm is initiated by the direct action of the alarm user, their agents or employees, and is installed to elicit a police response to a burglary, attempted burglary, robbery or attempted robbery.

POLICE ALARM MONITORING FACILITY: The facility located within the Police Department that is monitored by employees who receive, record and validate alarm signals transmitted from private alarm systems.

PROPRIETARY SYSTEM: All alarm systems sounding and/or recording alarm and supervisory signals at a control center located within the protected premises; the control center being under the 24 hour supervision of the proprietor of the protected premises or the employees or agents. If a proprietary alarm system includes a signal line connected directly, or by means of a dialing device, to the police communication center, a central station or answering service, it thereby becomes an emergency alarm system as defined in this section.

DISTRICT ALARM MONITORING FACILITY: The SWNHFDMA  
(Southwest New Hampshire Fire District Mutual Aid)  
Center.

Section (2) - STANDARDS

2.1 All alarms installed in the Town of Winchester, N.H. pursuant to this section shall conform to the standards set forth in State Law, NFPA publications, the National Electrical Code and the BOCA Codes.

Section (3) - PERMIT REQUIRED

3.1 The Chief of Police, or the designee, is hereby authorized to issue a permit to any owner of property located within the Town or the lessee thereof, to maintain, install and modify a burglary, hold up or intrusion alarm system upon application to them, subject to the following provisions:

The alarm user applying for the permit shall state on the application the name, address, and telephone number, and in the case of a corporation or legal entity, the name, address and the telephone number of the person responsible for the upkeep, maintenance, and operation of the alarm system, and any other information that the Chief of Police, or the designee, may deem necessary.

Dialer type alarms that are operated by a tape machine are not authorized to be used at the Winchester Police Department. Alarms which monitor temperature, humidity and any other condition not directly related to the detection or notification of emergency personnel are specifically excluded from the provisions of this article.

Section (4) - PERMIT FEES

4.1 There shall be no fee for the installation permit issued by the Police Department.

Section (5) - OPERATING WITHOUT A PERMIT

5.1 It shall be unlawful for any person or alarm user to maintain or operate an alarm system, as defined by the terms of this section, without first obtaining a permit as provided. Any person or alarm user who does maintain or operate an alarm system without a permit shall be guilty of a violation.

Section (6) - DENIAL, SUSPENSION, REVOCATION OF PERMIT

6.1 Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this article may constitute grounds for the Chief of Police, or the designee, to deny the issuance of a permit.

6.2 Upon receipt of a notice of intent to revoke or suspend an alarm user's permit, pursuant to this article, the alarm user may, within five (5) days of such receipt, submit a written request for a hearing before the Board of Selectmen, or the designee, setting forth the reasons why the user's permit should not be revoked or suspended.

6.3 At the hearing before the Board of Selectmen, or the designee, the holder of the permit shall have the right to present evidence, to cross-examine witnesses, and to be represented by counsel. Such a hearing shall be informal and shall not be subject to the rules of evidence or formal courtroom procedure. After the hearing, the Board of Selectmen, or the designee, may either issue an order of revocation, withdraw the notice of revocation, or suspend the permit until such time that the Chief of Police, or the designee, is satisfied that the permit has been obtained or the cause of the false alarms has been eliminated.

6.4 An alarm user whose permit has been revoked is not precluded under this article from applying for a new permit. The Chief of Police, or the designee, however, shall not be required to issue a new permit unless the Chief of Police, or the designee, is satisfied that the user's alarm has been properly serviced and its deficiencies corrected. The Chief of Police, or the designee, may also impose reasonable restrictions and conditions upon the user before issuing a new permit. These restrictions and/or conditions shall appear on the permit and shall provide for automatic revocation on the occurrence of four (4) false alarms in the remaining permit year.

Section (7) - FALSE ALARMS, PREVENTION, PAYMENT OF COSTS

7.1 Any owner or lessee of property having an alarm system on their premises, and any user of alarm services or equipment designed and installed with the intent of eliciting an emergency response, shall pay to the Town of Winchester, N.H. a Twenty-Five Dollar (\$25.00) service charge for each and every false alarm to which emergency services respond in excess of the initial four (4) alarms in a calendar year. Should more than ten (10) alarms be

received in a calendar year, the service charge shall be Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for each and every alarm in excess of ten (10). Should more than twenty (20) alarms be received, the fine shall be One-Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for each and every alarm received.

7.2 Any central station, answering service or proprietary system that in any manner notifies the Police Department of an alarm signal from an alarm system of an alarm user who does not possess an alarm user's permit, or whose permit has been suspended, revoked or denied, shall be charged One-Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for each notification made to the Town.

7.3 For use in this section, a calendar year shall be the Town Fiscal Year (July 1st to June 30th).

#### Section (8) - TOWN POLICE ALARM MONITORING FACILITY

8.1 The Town encourages all alarm users within the geographic confines of the Town to use the Monitoring Facility at the SWNHFDMA Center.

#### Section (9) - APPEALS

9.1 Any alarm user, owner or lessee who possess an alarm user's permit may appeal false alarm service charges in writing to the Board of Selectmen within ten (10) days after receipt of the notice of penalty.

9.2 The Board of Selectmen or the designee, may waive assessment of the service charge when, in the Chief of Police or the designee's judgment, reasonable attempts are being taken to discover and eliminate the cause of the false alarms.

#### Section (10) - LIABILITY OF TOWN LIMITED

10.1 The Police Department of the Town shall take every reasonable precaution to ensure that the alarm signals received by the Police Department are given appropriate attention and are acted upon with dispatch. Nevertheless, the Police Department shall not be liable for any defects in the operation of alarm devices, for any failure or neglect to respond appropriately upon receipt of an alarm from such source, nor for the failure or neglect of any person in connection with the installation and operation of alarm systems or their components, the transmission of alarm signals or the relaying of such signals and messages. If the Police Department finds it necessary to disconnect an alarm device after exhausting all other provisions of this article, the Town shall incur no liability by such action.

Section (11) - PENALTIES

11.1 Operating an alarm without a valid permit \$100.00

Operating an alarm when a permit has been suspended or revoked \$100.00

11.2 FALSE ALARM PENALTIES

5th to 10th Alarm in Year \$ 25.00

11th to 20th Alarm in Year \$ 50.00


21st and Successive Alarms \$100.00

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL STRUCTURE RELATED MATTERS NOTED IN A FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT CONDUCTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENTAL AUDITING STANDARDS

To the Board of Selectmen  
Town of Winchester, New Hampshire

We have audited the financial statements of the Town of Winchester, New Hampshire for the year ended June 30, 1990, and have issued our report thereon dated October 10, 1990.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and Governmental Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Winchester, New Hampshire for the year ended June 30, 1990, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

The management of the Town of Winchester, New Hampshire is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objective of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of polices and procedures may deteriorate.

For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal control structure policies and procedures in the following categories.

- Expenditures and accounts payable
- Payroll and payroll liabilities
- Debt and debt service payments

## SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

- Types of services
- Matching, level of effort or earmarking
- Reporting
- Special requirements:
  - Timing of expenditures
  - Performance of environmental reviews
  - Accounting for program income

For all of the control categories listed above, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk.

Our consideration of internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of the specific internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

However, we noted other matters involving internal control structure and its operations that we have reported to the management of the Town of Winchester, New Hampshire in a separate letter dated October 10, 1990.

This report is intended for the information of management, and the Board of Selectmen. This restriction is not intended to limit the distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

Three years ago, as a rewarding climax to all of these years of service and for its unique architectural construction, the building was entered into the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Then at the 1990 Town Meeting the voters showed their support by voting \$25,000.00 for the restoration of the exterior of the building. The bid of Mr. Al Fauteux of Keene was accepted and work began in late June. Mr Fauteux had, earlier on the year, repaired and waterproofed the fourteen brick columns in the basement which support the library. We also sought bids for redecorating the interior. The bid of Mr. Martin Grover was accepted and work began in December. The walls were done in a soft golden yellow which gives a warm and cheerful feeling. Lastly, Clifford Struthers resurfaced the floors. Ken Harvey built a pair of wooden storm doors for our front entrance. These have removable glass and screen panels. A handicapped access door was also installed on the south entrance by the ramp.

Six informative meetings, each under the direction of a staff member, were scheduled. The subjects covered computers, astrology, genealogy, crafts, crime fiction and Christmas decorations. These were all held at the library and open to the public.

A video collection was started this year and so far has been very popular. Many new large-print titles have been added for those with eyesight problems.

Our annual book sale in July was held, and as usual was very successful. Our many thanks to all who contributed their time and gifts of books and magazines.

My faithful assistant of twenty-three years, Mrs. Dorothy Collette, retired from our staff in December. We all miss her very friendly smile and her never-ending capabilities. My present staff consists of Louise Reason, Assistant, Sherry Blair, Christy Menard and Carol Glabach, aides. Mary Weiner, who worked with us for several years, will remain on call.

Lastly, I would like to dedicate this report to Mr. Martin Grover, whose life ended so suddenly. I wish he could have lived longer to appreciate his handiwork, which all of us enjoy daily.

It is a good feeling to be able to look back at all of the activities going on at the Community Center, and be able to say: "The Community Center is really being used."

One new activity this year was the Remote Controlled Car Racing being held on the ice rink, later moving inside as it got colder. It was a great feeling to see 40 or more people racing and/or watching this activity.

In January of this year, the Scout Room was renovated by the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Walls and floor were washed and painted. Skip Avery installed booths in one corner, and made repairs to the walls and ceiling. Dugas Music Service installed 8 - 9 video games, repaired our pool table and brought in one of theirs. Add a ping-pong table and table games and soda machine, along with two sofas, and you have an attractive, supervised place for the teens to "hang out." The "Arcades" are open on Monday and Tuesday from 7 - 9 p.m. and Friday and Saturday from 7 - 10 p.m. Attendance has improved since Paul Reason brought in his Boom-Box. (The Boy Scouts use the room on Wednesday; the Brownies meet there on Thursday.)

Early in the year, after much planning, our After School Program got underway. However, due to lack of support from the community, the program had to be dropped.

The Girl Scouts are responsible for the new Sand Box next to the merry-go-round. Thanks go to the Highway Department for the truck load of sand! The sand box saw lots of use during the warm days. The swing set has three new rubber infant seats and three new strap seats for the older children. The Basket-ball court sees a group on it each day, it seems. New nets were installed here, also.

The Tennis Courts are not as busy, but do see their share of activity. The cracks are returning on the courts. Two dead trees were removed from outside court area.

"THE CENTER OF ATTRACTIONS"

School Vacation Weeks continue to draw young people to the Center. Popular activities include field trips, craft programs, bowling and the Arcades.

The summer vacation brings on the start of Day Camp, our biggest time of the year. There were 80 campers who went to Route 10 Pizza for their swim lessons and free swim. This was our first experience with going to the "pool" for swimming, and it did turn out to be most successful and rewarding for the campers and the staff. We had many good comments from parents regarding the swim program. It was a gratifying feeling to see the progress made by the campers, under the direction of George Pappas' crew and our own Henry Parkhurst.

Having a dedicated staff working with your children really paid off at the end of the six week program. Chris Leveille was a "Super Mom" to all the campers in her role as Assistant Camp Director. Each group leader worked with Henry Parkhurst and crew at Route 10 Pizza as their group arrived for their swim. Group Leaders were: Grade 1, June Corless; Grade 2, Danielle Roy; Grade 3 & 4, Linda Hodgman; Grade 5 & 6, Denise Rurka; L.I.T.s Neal Stetson, Derek Cornish, Ruth Drew, and Louisa Rurka.

New this year was a great program coordinated by Karen Marsh. Her Pre-School Day Camp (ages 4 & 5) was the "Hit of the Town" as her group walked to the library or down the isles at Kulicks, holding onto their "Walking Rope." Karen's program was most welcomed to the Day Camp. She was assisted by Tori Bonnett and Marlee Leveille.

Also new this year was having an Arts/Crafts person to run that part of Day Camp. Keron Ainsworth and Maggie Cannon shared the job of putting together a project for the campers to take home. Eughene Davis came back to do the creamics program. Becky Merchant did a Super Job keeping the books in the office.

Dan Melanson returned as a clown to entertain the campers during the Carnival Day. We had a Magic Show, field trips, and Onkwe Tase returned to share his knowledge of the American Indians. Many other people gave their time, talent and material to the Day Camp to make this a most rewarding summer for all. Many "Thanks, to all."

Mike Prentice directs the Bowling Alleys and the leagues. There are leagues on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday with room for more to join the fun. 

For 1991, we recommend an appropriation of \$31,070.00 to continue home care and \$3511.00 for the Meals-On-Wheels Program to continue services at the current level.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1990

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1990 was a good year for our law enforcement effort within our community. Our rate of serious crime is down below last year's level and below national averages. This did not happen by accident, it was the result of aggressive police work and total community support. When a citizen of Winchester sees a crime being committed, or just something that looks suspicious, he or she has enough confidence in the local police to call and that is the best and most cost effective way to prevent, control and solve crime.

This year and each year, as it becomes more important to get as much law enforcement out of tighter budgets as possible, I am asking the citizens of Winchester to support your Emergency Services and call whenever you feel something is happening that needs to be investigated. I guarantee that you will get a timely, professional response to your call.

In 1991, we must continue our efforts which has lead to a low crime rate, no fatal accidents and the safest homes and businesses in the area. At the same time, we have to increase our efforts and put our resources into other areas which need our immediate attention.


Over the years the elderly have been neglected due to emphasis being placed on other more obvious areas needing attention. Last year I responded to three calls where an elderly citizen had passed away and was not found until the police or a friend were called in a couple of days later. This should not happen in Winchester and will not happen again. The Police Department, working with the Board of Selectmen and all available resources, is going to ensure that each elderly citizen or couple is contacted, and assistance provided when necessary, on a daily basis. We must place a high priority on ensuring the elderly and disabled receive their share of services within our Town. This is the entire community's responsibility.

Another problem that needs to be dealt with this year is teenage crime. We have too many teens in our community that are not going to school, committing crimes, being disruptive at school when made to go, and at the same time, creating turmoil at home. Working closely with the schools and parents, I hope we can get these individuals the services they need before the criminal offenses are committed and before the hope of a diploma and chance for a good future is thrown away. We must reach these individuals in a positive way sooner.

Alcohol coupled with other dangerous drugs require more attention this year. While beer and liquor are still the most damaging drugs in our community, we must increase our efforts in fighting the sale and use of all illegal drugs. Marijuana and Cocaine are being sold and used daily by some people in our community. We have to get the message out that we will identify, investigate and prosecute violators. At the same time, we must assist those who seek help for their alcohol or chemical dependency in obtaining the necessary services.

With your help the 1990's will be years we can make headway in further improving the quality of life in our Town and make Winchester a model community we can all be part and proud of.



Update on Ashuelot:

The construction phase of the Ashuelot Sewer Line is finished at last. We appreciated your patience during that upheaval period.

Both the Ashuelot and Broad Brook Pump Stations are on line, and are pumping to the Main Facility in Winchester. The flows at the Main Facility are rising as expected as houses are connecting on to the system. Out of 117 units, 66 units are connected to the system. The State of New Hampshire has given the town a deadline of May 30, 1991 to have ALL units connected to the system. The May 30, 1991 over-rides the previous deadline of August 31, 1991 given.

Improving Productivity:

We have put a roof over the Holding Tank at the Main Facility, which will prevent sludge from freezing, so we are able to waste to it during the winter months.

The drying beds are now heated on certain days during the winter months to keep up with the sludge now coming into the facility.

Evergreen Cemetery  
1990-1991

Work at the cemetery was very much the usual, mowing daily, repairing stones when time allowed, and even doing some landscaping. Sink-ins were filled in as needed, several of the small trees next to stones were pulled this year because they had turned brown and did not grow.

When time allowed, being caught up, or a rainy day, the time was spent in rebuilding the archway at the entrance to the cemetery on the Richmond Road. Looking back into history we think the original archway predated 1859, and was taken down in the early 1960's. The first part of November, Keene Tree Service assisted in the removal of four very large pine trees in the older section of the cemetery. Lightning and blight had destroyed these trees. In time, with the deterioration of the trees, many stones would have been crumbled from the falling branches.

## REPORT OF THE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Throughout 1990, the Industrial Development Committee continued to meet regularly. Currently the members of the Committee are Robert MacFarland, Charles Gratton, Chris Thompson, Bruce Lawrence, Ronald Maynard and Carolyn Nicholson. Paul Greenleaf and Robert Ellis were active members of the committee until mid-year when other commitments forced them to resign.

Last year the committee was awarded a \$6,000 economic feasibility study grant from the Office of State Planning. We interviewed and selected a consultant to conduct the study which we hoped would be completed by the Fall of 1990. Delays early in the project have slowed the process, but we are looking forward to having a better idea about the marketing of commercial/industrial property in Winchester as a result of the study. We will be expending one-half of the committee's 1990-1991 appropriation to the committee on administration of this grant, an expense which had not been anticipated.

In June the committee hosted a forum, attended by several representatives of area businesses. Among the topics discussed were the vision of the future of Route 10 North to Swanzey; the A.C. Lawrence Tannery property, its future and how it might be redeveloped into a site for tax and job producing enterprises; the need for better cooperation among town boards; and the need for sewage treatment for industrial sites in order for us to successfully compete with other towns for new development.

The committee pursued several of these areas in the summer and fall of 1990.

We met with a representative of the Selectmen's Office about the future of the Tannery property and learned that there is a tax lien by the Town on the property, but nothing will be done until the lien is more than two-thirds the value of the property. There very likely could be grant assistance available to the town for the clean up and development of the property.

We met with the Sewer Commission to stress the need to make sewage treatment available to industrial sites. The Commissioners reported on a study in process of the capacity and expansion of the present plant and the Selectmen have taken steps to keep Winchester on a list for state financial assistance for a future sewer project.

Finally, the committee has asked to be included in the updating of the Master Plan and has suggested a merger of this committee with the Community Development Advisory Committee (CDAC). Both the Industrial Development Committee and the CDAC struggle to recruit and retain members. With a broadening of the definition of "community development" the two groups could work well together. Volunteer resources in a small town such as Winchester are valuable and should be used effectively. We need to stimulate discourse across all segments of the community to create a vision of Winchester's economic future.

WINCHESTER CONSERVATION COMMISSION  
Report - July 1989-June 1990

The Winchester Conservation Commission began the year by drawing up by-laws for the conduct of its business, and joining the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions.

It was decided that Water Resources would be given top priority as we embarked on a Natural Resource Inventory for the Town. Consultants were contacted and interviewed. A Wetlands Ordinance was drawn up by the WCC, reviewed by SWRPC which added a wetlands map and approved by the Planning Board. This ordinance was approved by the voters in March.\* A Study of the water quality of Forest Lake will be done next summer by Graduate Student at Antioch College under the supervision of Rick Van De Poll. The Forest Lake Association and the Town Beach Committee will be asked to cooperate in this effort.

In article 34 of the 1990 Town warrant five parcels of town land were designated as town forests and in article 35 the WCC was authorized to manage the Forests. The commission will engage a forester to draw up the Management plans.

- Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to establish as town forests, as authorized by RSA 31:110 the following parcels of town owned land:
- A. Map 9, Parcel 59 - Approximately 150 acres of town land north of Forest Lake and east of Route 10. Surrounding and protecting town wells.
  - B. Map 5, Parcel 106 - Approximately 65 acres of land known as the Town Forest which extends from the west side of Forest Lake Road over the hill with some frontage on Michigan Street.
  - C. Map 6, Parcels 10-1, 10-2 and 11 - Approximately 46 acres south of Richmond Road surrounding the end of Pump Road and the town well.
  - D. Map 6, Parcel 19 - Approximately 6.6 acres of the north side of Richmond Road known as Musterfield Park.
  - E. Map 9, Parcel 53 - Approximately 33 acres. A triangle at the edge of town bounded on one side by the Swanzy border and on the other, the Richmond town line. Rabbit Hollow Road traverses this parcel.

- Article 35. To authorize the Conservation Commission to manage the town forests under provisions of RSA 31-112:11, and to authorize that any proceeds which may accrue from said forest management be placed in the conservation fund pursuant to RSA 36 - A:5.

The WCC routinely reviews applications for wetland permits.

With the help of the Soil Conservation Service we checked the terrain in an area where a large development was being proposed..

In addition to attending the regular meetings of the Commission members have attended the annual meeting of the NHACC and various workshops and conferences to help them better serve our community. Members have also made some field trips around the town to better acquaint themselves with to resources we must conserve.

## WETLANDS ORDINANCE

### 1. Authority

This ordinance is adopted under the provisions of RSA 674:21 as an innovative land use control in addition to the powers conferred under RSA 674:16 and 17. As part of the adoption process, the Planning Board finds that the wetland areas within the Town of Winchester are in need of protection from certain activities, the impact of which results in the alteration or destruction of the wetlands.

### 3. Purpose

By the authority granted in NH RSA 674:16-17 and 674:20-21, and in the interest of public health, safety and general welfare, the Winchester Wetlands Conservation District is hereby enacted to regulate the uses of lands subject to standing water or extended periods of high water table. It is intended that this ordinance will:

1. Prevent the development of structures and land uses on naturally occurring wetlands which will contribute to pollution of surface and groundwater by sewage or toxic substances, sedimentation, and/or erosion.
2. Prevent destruction of, or significant changes to natural wetlands which provide flood protection; provide filtration of water flowing into ponds and streams, augment stream flow during dry periods and are connected to the ground or surface water supply;
3. Protect unique and unusual natural areas;
4. Protect wildlife habitats, maintain ecological balances and enhance ecological values such as those cited in RSA 483-A:1-b;
5. Protect potential water supplies and existing aquifers (water bearing stratum) and aquifer recharge areas;
6. Prevent unnecessary or excessive expense to the Town for the purpose of providing and/or maintaining essential services which might be required as a result of misuse or abuse of wetlands;
7. Encourage those low-intensity uses that can be harmoniously, appropriately and safely located in wetlands;
8. Preserve and enhance the aesthetic values associated with wetlands in the Town of Winchester;
9. Prevent damage to structures and properties caused by inappropriate development in wetlands.

### C. Definitions

High Intensity Soils Map = A soils map of a parcel of land being considered for development on a perimeter survey, with a scale of one inch (1") not to exceed one hundred feet (100'), where soils are identified and mapped in accordance with the high intensity soils mapping standards as adopted by the Cheshire County Conservation District.

Poorly Drained Soils = As defined by the USDA Soil Conservation Service in its 1984 Soils Survey of Cheshire County. (On file with the Cheshire County Conservation District.)

Qualified Soil Scientist = A person qualified in soil evaluation and mapping, whose education and experience meet the the qualification requirements of the Cheshire County Conservation District.

Very Poorly Drained Soils = As defined by the USDA Soil Conservation Service in its 1984 Soils Survey of Cheshire County Conservation District.)

Wetlands = Areas of submerged land enclosed by the normal high water mark, including, but not limited to, any marsh, swamp, bog or meadow subject to permanent or periodic flooding including the shore and abutting soils designated as poorly or very poorly drained soils by the USDA Soil Conservation Service and the Cheshire County Conservation District, and those poorly drained and very poorly drained soils as designated by a High Intensity Soils Survey (HISS) as performed by a qualified soil scientist.

#### D. Relation to Other Districts

Where the Wetlands Conservation District is superimposed over another zoning district, the more restrictive regulations shall apply.

#### E. Permitted Uses

1. Poorly Drained Soils: Permitted uses in areas of poorly drained soils are as follows:
  - a. Any use otherwise permitted by the Zoning Ordinance and state and federal laws that does not involve the erection of a structure or that does not alter the surface configuration of the land by the addition of fill or by dredging except as a common treatment associated with a non-residential permitted use.
  - b. Agriculture, including grazing, hay production, truck gardening and silage production provided that such use is shown not to cause significant increases in surface or groundwater contamination by pesticides or other toxic or hazardous substances and that such use will not cause or contribute to soil erosion.

Wetland impacts may be minimized by :

    - 1) Utilizing minimum tillage farming techniques.
    - 2) Avoiding drainage and diking.
    - 3) Adopting soil conservation measures to control erosion and agricultural runoff.
    - 4) Maintaining wetland buffer zones.
    - 5) Fencing streamside wetlands and contributing streams to reduce erosion and direct pollution by livestock.
    - 6) Reducing application of manure to frozen soils during the winter.
    - 7) Controlling pesticides, herbicides, fungicides, and fertilizer applications.
    - 8) Increasing wild crop harvesting and agriculture consistent with natural wetland characteristics.
  - c. Forestry and tree farming to include the construction of access roads for said purpose.
  - d. Wildlife habitat development and management.
  - e. Recreational uses consistent with the purpose and the intent of this Article as defined in Section B.
  - f. Conservation areas and nature trails.
  - g. Water impoundment and the construction of well water supplies.
  - n. Drainageways to include streams, creeks, or other paths of normal runoff water and common agricultural land drainage.

2. Very Poorly Drained Soils: Permitted use in areas containing very poorly drained soils, marshes, bogs, open water and major streams are as follows:
  - a. Uses specified under Section E.1 (a. through h.) shall be permitted except that no alteration of the surface configuration of the land by filling or dredging and no use which results in the erection of a structure, except and provided for in Section J, shall be permitted.
  - b. The construction of fences, footbridge, catwalks and wharves only, provided: (1) said structures are built on posts or piling so as to permit the unobstructed flow of water; (2) the natural contour of the wetland is preserved; and, (3) the Conservation Commission has reviewed and recommended the proposed construction.

- F. Lot Size Determination: Areas designated as having poorly drained soils may be used to fulfill 25% of the minimum lot size required by town ordinances and subdivision regulations, provided that the non-wetland area is sufficient in size and configuration to adequately accommodate all required utilities such as sewage disposal and water supply, including primary and auxiliary leach field locations, and that placement of such utilities must comply with all applicable setbacks as defined in the Zoning and Wetlands Ordinance.

Areas designated as having very poorly drained soils, or bodies of water, may not be used to satisfy minimum lot size.

1. No septic system, leach field or other waste disposal facility shall be installed within 125 feet of the edge of any wetland.
2. A failed septic system within 125 feet of any wetland must be replaced on land outside of the 125 foot buffer zone, unless the Planning Board makes a determination that such placement is not physically possible.
3. All construction, forestry and agriculture activities within 125 feet of any wetland shall be undertaken with special care to avoid erosion and siltation into the wetlands. The Planning Board, pursuant to its site plan review authority, may require an erosion control plan approved by the Cheshire County Conservation District for any project undertaken. No building activity (building does not include septic systems) shall be permitted within 125 feet of any very poorly drained soils and within 100 feet of any poorly drained soil except as provided in subsection 3 of this section. Where required, permits from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, under RSA 149:8-a and the Wetlands Board under RSA 483-A shall be obtained prior to construction.
4. Where an existing building within the buffer zone is destroyed or in need of extensive repair, it may be rebuilt provided that such rebuilding is completed within one year of the event causing destruction. The new or rebuilt structure shall not extend further into the wetland or buffer area than the original foundation.
5. All land included in the Wetlands Conservation District shall be appraised for tax purposes at its full and true value in money, based on its market value as undevelopable land required to remain in open space.

H. Boundary Appeals

In the event that the Conservation Commission questions the validity of the boundaries of a wetland area on a specific parcel of land, or upon the written petition of the owner or abuttor of said parcel to the Planning Board, the Board may call upon the services of a qualified soil scientist to examine said area and report his/her findings to the Planning Board for its determination of the boundary.

Any necessary soil testing procedures shall be conducted at the expense of the landowner or developer. Any costs incurred through such appeals shall be borne by the landowner or developer.

I. Filled Lands and Pre-existing Uses

1. Lands, which may have been wetlands but were filled under properly issued state and town permits granted prior to the adoption of this ordinance, shall be judged according to the soils and flora existing at the site at the time application for building permit or subdivision is made.
2. Structures and uses existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance may be continued provided that such use shall not be expanded to further encroach upon the wetlands or designated buffer areas.

J. Exemption for Residential Structures

Notwithstanding other provisions of this Article, the construction of additions and expansions to one and two-family dwellings shall be permitted within the Wetlands Conservation District provided that: (1) the dwelling lawfully existed prior to the effective date of this Article; (2) that the proposed construction conforms with all other applicable ordinances and regulations of the Town of Winchester; and (3) that the area of any proposed new construction does not exceed 25% of the area of the footprint of the principal existing structure.

This provision will also apply to accessory buildings.

K. Conditional Uses

1. A Conditional Use Permit may be granted by the Planning Board (RSA 674:21 11) for the construction of roads and other access ways and for pipelines, powerlines, and other transmission lines provided that all of the following conditions are found to exist:



- a. The proposed construction is essential to the productive use of land not within the Wetlands Conservation District.
  - b. Design and construction and maintenance methods will be such as to minimize detrimental impact on the wetland and will include restoration of the site as nearly as possible to its original grade and condition within one (1) years from the date the construction began.
  - c. The Planning Board reserves the right to require the applicant to submit both a temporary erosion and sediment control plan (for the construction period), and a permanent erosion and sediment control plan (for anticipated on-going erosion problems.)
  - d. No alternative route which does not cross a wetland or has less detrimental impact on the wetland is allowed.
  - e. Applicants are required to obtain a dredge and fill permit from the NH Wetlands Board before the Planning Board grants a Conditional Use Permit.
  - f. Economic advantage alone is not reason for the proposed construction.
2. Prior to the granting of a Conditional Use Permit under this Section, the applicant shall agree to submit a performance security to ensure that all construction is carried out in accordance with an approved design. The Security shall be submitted in a form and amount, with surety and conditions satisfactory to 1) the Planning Board for site plan and subdivision applications and 2) the Board of Selectmen in all other cases. In addition, Town Counsel approval must be acquired. The Security shall be submitted and approved prior to issuance of any permit authorizing construction.
3. The Planning Board, with concurrence of the Conservation Commission, may require the applicant to submit an environmental impact assessment when necessary to evaluate an application made under this Section. The cost of this assessment will be borne by the applicant. The Planning may also assess the applicant reasonable fees to cover the costs of other special investigative studies and for the review of documents required by particular applicants.

L. Special Exceptions

The Zoning Board of Adjustment grants special exceptions:

- 1. Water impoundments for the enhancement of a wetland area with a permit from N.H. Water Resources Board.

Where required, permits shall be obtained from the N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission under RSA 149:8-a, the Wetlands Board under RSA 483-A, and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

- 2. Non-Conforming Lots

Special exception to this ordinance shall be permitted only upon authorization by the Board of Adjustment. In order to permit the erection of a structure within the Wetlands Conservation District on vacant lots, the Board shall find that such exceptions comply with the following requirements and other applicable requirements as set forth in this ordinance:

- a. That the lot upon which an exception is sought was an official lot of record, as recorded in the Cheshire County Registry of Deed, prior to the date on which this amendment was posted and published in the Town.
- b. That the use for which the exception is sought cannot feasibly be carried out on a portion or portions of the lot which are outside the Wetlands Conservation District.
- c. That due to the provisions of the Wetlands Conservation District, no reasonable and economically viable use of the lot can be made without the exception.
- d. That the design and construction of the proposed use will, to the extent practical, be consistent with the purpose and intent of this Article.

- e. That the proposed use will not create a hazard to individual or public health, safety and general welfare due to the loss of wetland, the contamination of groundwater, or other reason.

The Board of Adjustment will themselves, or upon the petition from the Conservation Commission or abutters, hire a qualified consultant or consultants to prepare such studies as are necessary to determine whether the conditions set forth above have been met. The cost of such studies will be borne by the applicant.

M. Procedure

To obtain a Special Exception from the Zoning Board of Adjustment,

1. Required NH Water Supply and Pollution Control Board and Wetlands Board approval shall be obtained prior to granting of special exceptions under this section.
2. Special exceptions shall require a public hearing with notice of hearing as provided in RSA 675:7. The Winchester Planning Board, and the Conservation Commission shall be referred to for review and comment at least 20 days prior to the hearing.

N. Other Provisions

1. The Board of Selectmen will not issue any permit for construction within the Wetlands Conservation District unless such activity conforms with the provisions of this Article. The Board of Selectmen will have the power to enforce this Article and violations may be punishable by fines as provided by RSA 676:17.
2. Any wetlands altered in violation of this ordinance will be restored at the expense of the violator(s) as provided by RSA 483-A:5.

O. Separability

Should any provision of this ordinance be declared invalid by a final court decision, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or part thereof, other than the part declared invalid.

REPORT OF TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

The duties of the Health Officer have increased many times in the past eighteen years.

I have had many problems which systematically have been solved.

The Selectmen have taken a more active roll the past few years which is very helpful.

I correspond with the State Health Department frequently, and also the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. Each year old septic systems are going bad. Some have to be completely redesigned.

People are much more concerned about the quality of ground water and pollution. The interest is very much appreciated.

I find the housing stands greatly improved. There are still some isolated cases. We still have some septic systems needing repair. Owners have been notified. Financing is a big factor. In some cases, patience is the answer.

The Health Officer is appointed for a three year term upon recommendation of the Selectmen.

I have recently started my seventh term.
