SNOW DISPOSAL ORDINANCE

Any person found shoveling snow into a town road or plowing snow across the road, so as to impede normal plowing operations, will be subject to a penalty not to exceed \$25.00 for each offense.

To Report A Fire Dial 911

The State of New Hampshire requires that written permits be obtained for all open fires at all times when the ground is not snow covered.

Permits may be obtained from the Auburn Fire Department for grass, brush, campfires, etc.

Permits must be obtained on the day burning is to be accomplished. Burn when there is no wind, on rainy days, in a safe place and in accordance with the term of the permit. Burn before 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m. Keep some buckets of water close by; if wind develops, promptly extinguish the fire. All fires must be extinguished before you depart the scene.

PARKING DURING SNOW STORMS

- A. From November 2 to April 1 of each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public highway between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. or at any time in such manner as to impede snow removal operations
- B. Any vehicle parking in violation of Section A hereof may be towed by the road agent, the chief of police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or the chief of police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing and storage by the owner.
- C. Any person violating Section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty no to exceed twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense.

DOG ORDINANCE

- A. Restraint: All dogs shall be restrained from running at large within the limits of the town, except when they are on the owner's or keeper's property or being used for hunting or training purposes.
- **B. Penalty:** Any person or persons, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than fifteen (\$15.00) dollars for each offense.

TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the gymnasium in the Auburn Village School in Auburn New Hampshire on Tuesday, March 13, 2001 at 7 am. to act upon the following subjects:

To bring your ballots for:

First: Selectman for three years

Treasurer for one year

Library Trustee for three years

Cemetery Trustee Auburn Village for three years Cemetery Trustee Longmeadow for three years

Trustee of Trust Funds for three years

Auditor for two years

Police Commission for three years

Second: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed and recommended by the Auburn Planning Board, in conformance with NH RSA 675:1, et seq. and include the following:

1. Amend 2.02 <u>Words and Terms</u>, 87. <u>Structure</u>, to further clarify the definition of a structure to read as follows:

A combination of materials for occupancy or use, such as a building, bridge, trestle, tower, framework, antenna, retaining wall, tank, tunnel, tent, stadium, reviewing stand, shed, in ground pool, above ground pool, gazebo, platform, greenhouse, deck, pier, wharf, bin, fence, sign, temporary storage facility or the like, said term to be interpreted in its broadest sense and meaning.

2. Amend 3.01 <u>Nuisance Provision</u> to add the following sentence to the first paragraph:

The accumulation of junk, as defined in NH RSA 236:112, et seq., without a permit from the Selectmen and the State, or in nonconformity with the State Statutes pertaining to junk yards, is hereby deemed a nuisance in the Town of Auburn.

- 3. Amend 4.04 <u>District Regulations -- General</u>, paragraph 4 to clarify the general yard setback requirements to add the following text:

 No dwelling, structure, or use shall be constructed within the yard setbacks, except for lawful fences, sheds with an area of 100 square feet or less, gazebo, above ground pools, green house with an area of 100 square feet or less, or a permitted sign.
- 4. Amend Section 4.08 <u>"I" Industrial, 3. Lot Size, Frontage, Yards and Height</u> to increase the maximum building height in the Industrial Zone from 35 feet to 42 feet.

- 5. Amend 5.02 <u>Standards Applicable to all Special Exceptions</u> to clarify the criteria for a special exception by rewriting the section to read as follows:

 The Zoning Board of Adjustment shall grant an application for a special exception provided the applicant proves by a preponderance of the evidence that the following criteria are met:
 - 1. The requested use is specifically authorized in this ordinance for the zone;
 - 2. The requested use will not create undue traffic congestion or unduly impair pedestrian safety;
 - 3. The requested use will not overload any public or private water, drainage or sewage system, or any other municipal system, nor will there be any significant increase in storm water runoff onto adjacent property or streets;
 - 4. The requested use will not create excessive demand for municipal services, including but not limited to, police, fire protection, or schools;
 - 5. The requested use will not create hazards to the health, safety, or general welfare of the public, nor be detrimental to the use of, or out of character with the adjacent neighborhood in that the location, nature and height of buildings and structures, will neither discourage the permitted use of adjacent land and buildings nor impair the value thereof;
 - 6. The proposed location, with due consideration to the size of the use, the nature and intensity of the operations involved and the size of the site, is appropriate for the requested use;
 - 7. The intensity of the use will be of no greater intensity than the operation of any permitted use; and
 - 8. The requested use is consistent with the spirit and intent of this Ordinance and the Master Plan.
- 6. Amend Section 5.06 Limits of Special Exception to provide for additional limitations on special exception to read as follows:

 Section 5.06 Limits of Special Exception as to Use and Duration.

 Special exceptions shall be deemed to authorize only one particular use. If there is an alteration in use, a request for a new special exception is required. If the use or construction authorized by the granting of a special exception has not commenced within a one (1) year period from the date of the decision of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, or in the event of an appeal to the courts of the special exception or the project to which it relates, within a one (1) year period from the date of the final judgment of the court, then the special exception shall be deemed to have expired and the Zoning Board's decision rendered null and void. Upon request, submitted prior to the date of expiration, the ZBA may extend the period of validity of a special exception for one (1) additional year provided that the applicant presents evidence of:

- 1. A good faith effort to commence the use or construction so authorized by special exception;
- 2. That the delay in commencement of the use or construction was beyond the applicant's control; and
- 3. That the circumstances relating to the property and surrounding neighborhood have not changed substantially since the date of the original decision.
- 7. Amend Article 5 Special Exceptions, to add a new Section 5.08 entitled Abandonment or Discontinuance of a Special Exception, to read as follows: 5.08 Abandonment or Discontinuance of a Special Exception. If after commencement, a special exception is abandoned or discontinued for a period of one (1) year, or it is supplanted by another use, then the special exception shall be deemed to have expired and shall not be re-established without a new application to the Zoning Board of Adjustment and an affirmative decision thereon.
- Amend 6.12 <u>Variances</u>, to specify the criteria for a variance, by adding the following new paragraph:
 The Zoning Board of Adjustment may authorize a variance from this ordinance only where the applicant proves all of the following:
 - 1. Special conditions exist such that an unnecessary hardship would be imposed by a literal application and enforcement of this Ordinance and the relief sought is the minimum relief necessary to permit a reasonable use of the property;
 - The circumstances creating the hardship are unique to the land under appeal and are not substantially duplicated on adjoining property or within the same district;
 - 3. Granting of a variance will not be contrary to the public interest;
 - The granting of a variance will be in keeping with the spirit and intent of the Ordinance and will result in substantial justice being done; and
 - 5. There will be no diminution in the value of surrounding properties as a result of granting the variance.
- 9. Amend Article 6.00 Administration and Enforcement, to add a new section, Section 6.13, Abandonment or Discontinuance of a Variance, to provide for the circumstances under which a variance will be deemed to have been abandoned or discontinued, by adding and inserting the following new section, and by renumbering each of the successive sections, to read as follows:
 6.13 Abandonment or discontinuance of a Variance. If after commencement, a variance is abandoned for a period of one (1) year, or otherwise replaced by a conforming use, then the variance shall be deemed to have expired and cannot

be reestablished without a new application process and affirmative decision by the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

- 10. Amend the Town of Auburn Zoning Ordinance Section 7.01 <u>General</u> to adopt certain new building codes by amending paragraph number 1. to read as follows:
 - 1. All construction shall be in compliance with the International Building Code, 2000 Edition, International Residence Code, 2000 Edition, International Mechanical Code, 2000 Edition, International Plumbing Code, 2000 Edition, and International Fire Code, 2000 Edition.
- 11. Amend Section 7.04 <u>Application</u> to condition the issuance of a permit on compliance with all Town regulations, as well as Ordinances, to read as follows:

 ... 3. No permit shall be issued, or be considered valid, if it is violation of any portion of this Ordinance, or *any* other Town Ordinance *or Regulation*.
- 12. Amend 7.05 <u>Enforcement</u> to affirm the Building Inspector's duty to enforce the Subdivision Regulations and the Site Plan regulations, and to extend the Inspector's authority to assist in enforcing the Health Codes of the Town when the violation rises to the level of a nuisance, to read as follows:
 - ... 2. It shall be the further duty of the Building Inspector to maintain consistent surveillance of the Town to ensure that the provisions of this Ordinance, the Subdivision Regulations and the Site Plan Regulations are not being violated. The Building Inspector is also authorized to join the Town Health Officer in enforcing health code violations when, in her opinion, the violation rises to the level of a nuisance.
- 13. Amend 7.06 Certificates of Occupancy to clarify that the building inspector may withhold a certificate of occupancy for failure to comply with the Subdivision Regulations and/or Site Plan Regulations, to read as follows:

 ... 2. A Certificate of Occupancy shall be applied for at the same time application is made for a Building Permit and shall be issued following an inspection of the premises by the Building Inspector and his finding that all provisions of this Ordinance, the Subdivision Regulations, and the Site Plan

The polls will be open at 7 am. and close at 7 pm.

Regulations have been met.

You are also notified to meet on Saturday, March 17, 2001 at 1 pm. at the Auburn Village School to consider the following articles:

Third: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a lot line adjustment with the Frank W. Seavey heirs occasioned by the relocation of Eaton Hill Road wherein the Frank W. Seavey heirs convey a .1072 triangular parcel from Auburn Tax Map #26, Tax Lot #7 to Auburn Tax Map #10, Tax Lot #3-2 (land owned by the Town) in exchange for which the Selectmen are hereby authorized to convey a certain .2051 acre strip of land located between the newly created right of way for the relocated Eaton Hill Road and the Easterly boundary of property owned by the Frank W. Seavey hairs known as Tax Map #26, Tax Lot #7 further, to affirm the new layout and relocation of Eaton Hill Road for a distance of approximately 570 feet more or less along

the Westerly bound of Tax Map #10, Lot #3-2, being certain land owned by the Town of Auburn on which is located the Town of Auburn Safety Complex, all as depicted on a survey and plat of a lot line adjustment between the Town of Auburn and the Frank W. Seavey heirs, Everett W. Seavey, Administrator, dated April 26, 2000 and recorded in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds on or about June 27, 2000, Plan D-28164. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Fourth: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of up to \$320,000.00, but not more than the appraised value, for the purchase of real property located on Eaton Hill and Raymond Roads identified as Lot 7 on Tax Map 26 and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, reject and tender such offers of sale pertaining to said properties as they deem appropriate, as well as enter into all contracts necessary to purchase said land. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Fifth: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95c to restrict One Hundred, Five thousand, three hundred, thirty seven dollars and twenty three cents (\$105,337.23) of revenues from State Highway Block Grant Aid for the purpose of road reconstruction. Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund and added to the existing Highway Construction Capital Reserve Fund, separate from the General Fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the General Fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of the revenue. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee).

Sixth: To see if the Town of Auburn will raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred, ninety four thousand, six hundred sixty two dollars and seventy seven cents (\$194,662.77) to be added to the Highway Construction Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Seventh: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to add to the existing Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA 31:1 for the closure of the Solid Waste/Incinerator site. This sum will come from the Unexpended Fund Balance and will have no effect on the tax rate. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Eighth: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to establish the position of Town Administrator with a salary and benefits cost of Sixty-three Thousand Four Hundred Ninety-Two Dollars (\$63,492.00). The administrator's duties will include, but not be limited to, administering contracts, budget management, managing the bidding and purchasing process, completing grant applications, administering personnel, and performing such other duties as are required by the Board of Selectmen. The Town Administrator shall not have the authority granted a Town Manager under NH RSA 37:1 et seq., but instead shall be limited in authority to performing such duties as may be required of him/her by the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Ninth: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty One Thousand (\$21,000.00) Dollars for the purchase of (7) new technology Digital Radios for the use in the Police Department. These are to be matched up with

the (9) Digital Mobile Units that are being donated by Rockingham County through grants. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Tenth: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to appropriate up to Seventy Five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars for 'police outside duty detail'. Such appropriations to be self-funded by the organizations and businesses using the service. Passage of this article will have no effect on the tax rate because any actual expenses will be offset or exceeded by the revenue. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee).

Eleventh: In conjunction with the warrant article proposed for the property known as the Cohas/Nutt Road Project if it is passed that the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollard (\$250,000.00) be appropriated for the upgrading of Nutt Road from Wilson's Crossing Road to Pingree Hill Road. This road is presently a class six (U.L.) road, which will be needed if the warrant article for a combination of a middle school and senior high school is passed.

It is also hoped that we will have enough left over to make a footbridge over the narrow section of the pond at the end of Cohas. (Petition Warrant Article submitted by Richard Shackelton, signed by twenty-five petitioners). (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

Twelth: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges and legal obligations for the ensuing year.

Thirteenth: To transact any other business that may legally come before the Town meeting.

AUBURN TOWN MEETING - March 2000

The Annual Meeting for the Town of Auburn, N.H. was called to order by the Moderator, C. Donald Stritch, at 7:00 A.M. on March 14, 2000. Voting proceeded until 7:00 P.M.

The business meeting was adjourned to Saturday, March 18, 2000 at 1:00 P.M. to take up Articles Four through Twenty-two.

Articles One, Two and Three were decided on the written ballot on March 14th with the following results. 628 voted (6 absentee). 15 registered on election day, making the total number of registered voters 3030.

SECOND: Shall we modify the Elderly Exemption qualifications for Elderly Exemptions from property taxes in the Town of Auburn to provide that: "To qualify a person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married at least five years. In addition the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$25,000.00 (increased from \$20,000.00); or if married, a combined net income of less than \$37,500.00 (increased from \$30,000.00); and own net assets not in excess of \$50,000.00 (increased from \$35,000.00) excluding the value of the persons residence: (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

THIRD: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed and recommended by the Auburn Planning Board

1. Amend Section 3.14 Watershed Protection Regulations, to clarify the standards for Watershed Protection, and to further clarify the standard for relief from the Wetland setback, to read as follows:

3.14 Watershed Protection Regulations

In the interest of public health, convenience, safety and welfare, the following regulations are intended to guide the use of watershed areas, to control building and land uses which would contribute to pollution of surface and ground water by sewage, to prevent the destruction of watershed areas which provide flood protection, recharge of ground water supply, and augmentation of stream flow during dry periods, to prevent unnecessary or excessive expenses to the Town, to provide and maintain essential services and utilities which arise because of inharmonious use of watershed areas, to prevent the destruction of habitats for plants, fish and wildlife of importance, and to encourage those uses that can be appropriately and safety located in this area.

- 1. Jurisdiction. The Planning Board shall exercise jurisdiction over this section in those matters which require Site Plan Review or Subdivision Approval, except with regard to an application under subsection 6 for relief within a seventy five (75) foot wetlands setback. The Zoning Board shall exercise jurisdiction over this section as it applies to all other lots. Any decision of the Planning Board granting relief from the one hundred twenty-five foot (125 foot) setback shall be noted on the recorded plan. An aggrieved party may appeal the decision of the Planning Board to the Zoning Board of Adjustment in accord with NH RSA 676:5 (III).
- 2. Watershed Protection Area. For the purpose of these regulations the Watershed Protection Area shall be defined as a buffer zone of one hundred twenty five feet (125 feet) set back from the edge of bodies of water, brooks, streams and wetlands. No septic system, lawn, yard, parking lot or landscaping shall be constructed within the Watershed Protection Area and no structure shall be constructed within the Watershed Protection Area except for structures which are normally associated with use in or near water or relate to transportation over

water. This section shall not limit the authority of the Planning Board to require an applicant to construct improvements within the Watershed Protection Area when the Planning Board deems such improvements to be both beneficial to the Town and without adverse impact to the Watershed Protection Area.

3. Limited Activities.

- a. Timber Harvesting and Brush Clearing. Except to the extent necessary to prevent imminent personal injury or property damage, no cutting or removal of living trees or shrubs shall be permitted in the Watershed Protection Area without permission for the same having been obtained from the Town Forester of the Town of Auburn, New Hampshire, who shall grant such permission after having ascertained the proposed cutting or removal is to be conducted in a fashion that is consistent with the purpose of this Section and will have as limited an effect on the Watershed Protection Area as is reasonably possible.
- b. Road, Driveway, and Accessway Construction. In the event that it shall be necessary or beneficial to construct a road, driveway or accessway through a Watershed Protection Area then such road, driveway or accessway shall be constructed under the supervision of the designated Town Engineer, and the Board of Selectmen, and shall be constructed in such a way as to minimize the environmental impact that such construction shall have on the Watershed Protection Area.
- 4. Allowable Activities, Subject to Board Review. Any of the following activities that do not result in the deterioration of the water quality in the protected area shall be permitted within the Watershed Protection Area by the Board with jurisdiction, provided the applicant submits conclusive evidence at a duly noticed public hearing showing the proposed activity will provide increased protection of the Watershed.
 - a. Miscellaneous trimming and pruning of forestry stock according to good forestry practices.
 - b. Tree farming and forestry according to practices approved by the Town and/or County Forester.
 - c. Agriculture.
 - d. Ponds planned and executed under the direction of the USDA-SCS.
 - e. Wildlife refuge and/or conservation area.
 - f. Wharves, boathouses, and bridges.

- g. Wetlands mitigation, remediation, restoration and protection activities.
- h. Fire ponds, cisterns and dry hydrants.
- i. Retention basins and drainage systems.

This conclusive evidence may include a functional analysis prepared by a person or firm experienced in evaluating water shed protection areas. The proposed activity will be evaluated by the Board with jurisdiction to determine how it impacts the various beneficial functions of the Watershed Protection Area, area including: biological, hydrologic, ground water, flood storage, erosion protection, water quality, economic values, recreational values, aesthetic values, educational values and aquifer control. Any activity allowed by the Board shall be conditioned on conformity with the Regulations of the State of New Hampshire relating to protection of Lake Massabesic and its tributary areas, including but not limited to, the Shoreland Protection Act (NH RSA 483-B).

An application for relief from the Wetlands Protection Area for other than an allowable activity contained in this subsection shall be governed by the criteria set forth in subsections 5 and 6.

- 5. Chemical Distribution. No chemical fertilizers, pesticides, insecticides, or herbicides shall be used within the Watershed Protection Area. If any reduction of the designated Watershed Protection Area is granted, this limitation shall be stated on the Site Plan or Subdivision Plan and referenced in the deed for any property within the Watershed Protection Area.
- 6. Application for a Reduction of the Designated Watershed Protection: One Hundred Twenty Five (125) Feet to Seventy Five (75) Feet. Any lot owner seeking to engage in an activity other than the allowable activities set forth in subsection 3, may apply to the Zoning Board of Adjustment for a reduction of the Watershed Protection Area from 125 feet to a minimum setback of 75 feet. An applicant for Site Plan Approval or Subdivision Approval, seeking to engage in an activity other than the allowable activities set forth in subsection 3, may apply to the Planning Board for a reduction of the Watershed Protection Area from 125 feet to a minimum setback of 75 feet. Any relief granted by the respective Boards shall be for the minimum amount of relief required by the Applicant and shall be treated as a request for a special exception from the terms of this section.

Construction proposed by the applicant to take place within the 125 foot Watershed Protection Area, but no closer than seventy five (75) feet from the protected Watershed, may be permitted by the Board by special exception from the terms of this section, provided the applicant meets the criteria for a permitted use, and shows conclusively that the proposed construction will not adversely impact the protected Watershed.

Construction shall be defined broadly and shall include proposed landscaping, lawns, yards, and parking.

The conclusive evidence may include a functional analysis prepared by a person or firm experienced in evaluating watershed protection areas. The Board shall consider the following functions of the Watershed Protection Area: biological, hydrologic, ground water, flood storage, erosion protection, water quality, economic values, recreational values, aesthetic values, educational values and aquifer control. The Board may only vote to reduce the Watershed Protection Area if it concludes that the proposed reduction of the Watershed Protection Area will not adversely impact the protected Watershed.

7. Application for Construction within Seventy Five (75) feet of a Protected Watershed. Except for the allowable activities set forth in subsection 3, all construction, lawns, landscaping, yards, or parking shall be prohibited within seventy five feet (75 feet) of the protected area. No bodies of water, streams or wetlands may be filled to achieve any minimum setback requirements.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment shall have exclusive jurisdiction over an application for construction within seventy five (75) feet of a protected Watershed. An applicant may request relief in order to permit construction within seventy five (75) feet of a protected Watershed, but may only be granted relief if they provide conclusive evidence that:

- a. The proposed activity will not have any adverse impact on the protected Watershed; and
- b. The proposed use and construction meets the criteria for a variance from the terms of this Ordinance.

The conclusive evidence of a lack of adverse impact may include a functional analysis prepared by a person or firm experienced in evaluating watershed protection areas. In addition to considering the criteria for a variance, the Zoning Board shall consider the following functions of the Watershed Protection Area: biological, hydrologic, ground water, flood storage, erosion protection, water quality, economic values, recreational values, aesthetic values, educational values and aquifer control in determining whether or not the proposed construction will adversely impact the protected watershed. (Recommended by the Planning Board) YES 416 NO 162

2. Amend the Town of Auburn Zoning Ordinance Section 7.01 General to adopt certain new building codes by amending paragraph number 1 to read as follows:

- All construction shall be in compliance with BOCA National Building Code,
 1999 edition, and the CABO Single Family and Two Family Residential Code,
 (Recommended by the Planning Board)

- 3. Amend the Town of Auburn Zoning Ordinance, Section 7.06 Certificates of Occupancy, to add a sentence to the first paragraph, requiring the filing of a certified plot plan prior to the receipt of a certificate of occupancy, to read as follows:
 - 1. No land or building shall be occupied, used, or changed in use until a Certificate of Occupancy shall have been issued by the Building Inspector stating that the proposed use of such land or building complies with all the provisions of this Ordinance. In the case of construction on a new foundation, a certified plot plan shall be submitted to the Building Inspector at the time of the foundation inspection showing the location of the new foundation on the lot, and delineating the edge of any wetland within 150 feet of the construction. The submission of the certified plot plan shall be a precondition to receipt of a Certificate of Occupancy.

- 4. To readopt the provisions of the Town of Auburn's Growth Management Ordinance set forth in Section 3.09 Growth Management and to reaccept the recommended limits on growth set by the Ordinance. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

- 5. Amend the Town of Auburn Zoning Ordinance, Section 7.03 Building Permits in its entirety to read as follows:

7.03 Building Permits

The Building Inspector is authorized to charge and collect for the Town, the fees for building permits, inspections, and certificates of occupancy. The Building Inspector shall receive applications and issue Building Permits under the fee schedule set forth in Appendix E. Amend the Town of Auburn Zoning Ordinance to add an Appendix E, setting forth a Fee Schedule for Building Permits and Inspection Fees to read as follows: (Recommended by Planning Board)

APPENDIX E

FEE SCHEDULE FOR BUILDING PERMITS AND INSPECTIONS

The following Fee Schedule shall be in effect until such time as amended by the Planning Board.

1. New Construction

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- a. Residential Construction: The following fee schedule shall apply to the construction of all new dwellings and other structures for residential use.
 - (i). Building Permit Fee: The building permit fee shall be determined by a cumulative assessment of seven cents (\$.07) per square foot of non-living space [unfinished floor(s) and unfinished basement area) plus ten cents (\$.10) per square foot of living space (finished living area).
 - (ii). Driveway Permit Fee: The driveway permit fee shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) per curb cut.
 - (iii). Septic Permit Fee: The septic permit fee shall be thirty dollars (\$30.00).
 - (iv). Sprinkler Permit Fee (Two-family dwelling): \$50.00
 - (v). Inspection Fees: The inspection fees shall be as follows:

-Septic Test Pits and Design Review: \$30.00; -Electrical Inspection: \$25.00; -Plumbing Inspection: \$25.00; -Heating Inspection: \$25.00; and -Fireplace Inspection: \$25.00

(vi). Permit Renewal Fees: Permit renewal fees shall be based on a determination by the building inspector as to the percentage of completion of construction. Fees shall be charged as follows:

-25% Completion: \$100.00; -50% Completion: \$75.00; and -75% Completion: \$50.00

- b. Commercial and Industrial construction: The following fee schedule shall apply to construction of all new commercial and industrial buildings and structures:
 - (i). Building Permit Fee: A building permit fee shall be assessed at a cumulative rate of fifteen cents (\$.15) per square foot of total floor space, with the basement and all floors included.
 - (ii). Driveway Permit Fee: The driveway permit fee shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) per curb cut.
 - (iii). Septic Permit Fee: The septic permit fee shall be thirty dollars (\$30.00).

(iv). Sprinkler Permit Fee: \$50.00

(v). Inspection Fees: The inspection fees shall be as follows:

-Septic Test Pits and Design Review: \$30.00;
-Electrical Inspection: \$50.00;
-Plumbing Inspection: \$50.00;
-Heating Inspection: \$50.00; and
-Fireplace Inspection: \$25.00

(vi). Permit Renewal Fees: Permit renewal fees shall be based on a determination by the building inspector as to the percentage of completion of construction. Fees shall be charged as follows:

-25% Completion: \$100.00; -50% Completion: \$75.00; and -75% Completion: \$50.00

2. Remodeling

- a. Residential Remodeling: All renovations, additions and remodeling to existing residential buildings and structures shall be assessed the following fees:
- (i). Building Permit Fee: The building permit fee shall be determined by an assessment of six cents (\$.06) per square foot, including all renovated, remodeled or added square footage, whether finished or unfinished.
- (ii). Inspection Fees: The inspection fees shall be the same as for new residential construction.
- b. Commercial and Industrial Remodeling: All commercial and industrial renovation, additions, or remodeling shall be assessed the following fees:
- (i). Building Permit Fee: The building permit fee shall be assessed at the same rate as charged for new commercial or industrial construction and shall be based on the square footage of all renovated, added, or remodeled area, whether finished or unfinished.
- (ii) Inspection Fees: The inspection fees shall be the same as for new commercial or industrial construction.

3. Detached Accessory Structures

a. Detached Structures Accessory to Residential dwellings: The following fee schedule shall apply to the construction of detached structures which are accessory to residential dwellings:

- (i). Building Permit Fees: A building permit fee shall be assessed at a cumulative rate of six cents (\$.06) per square foot, whether finished or unfinished floor space.
- (ii). Inspection Fees: Inspection fees for detached structures accessory to residential dwellings shall be the same as for inspection of new residential construction.
 - b. Detached Structures Accessory to Commercial or Industrial buildings: The following fee schedule shall apply to the construction of detached structures which are accessory to commercial or industrial buildings:
- (i). Building Permit Fee: The building permit fee shall be assessed at the same rate as charged for new commercial or industrial construction and shall be based on the square footage of the detached structure, whether finished or unfinished.
- (ii). Inspection Fees: Inspection fees for detached structures accessory to commercial or industrial buildings shall be the same as for inspection of new commercial or industrial construction.

4. Relocated Structures

The fees for relocated structures shall be the same as new structures whether residential, commercial or industrial.

5. Reinspection fees

There shall be no fee for the first reinspection. However, the fee for any second or subsequent reinspection system shall be charged at 50% of the fee for the initial inspection. (Recommended by Planning Board)

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On Saturday, March 18th, the moderator opened the reconvened meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of our Country at 1:00 P.M. There were 186 registered voters in attendance. Each voter was checked in on the checklist and given a voter ID card to be used when a hand vote was called. The moderator gave the rules for the meeting and read the results of the ballot voting on Tuesday, March 14th.

FOURTH: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict Ninety-seven thousand, Eight-hundred, Twelve Dollars (\$97,812.00) of revenues from State Highway Block Grant Aid for the purpose of road reconstruction. Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund and added to the existing Highway Reconstruction Fund Expenditures, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose

of the fund or source of the revenue. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article Four was moved by Harland Eaton and seconded by Gail Clark. No discussion. **Article Four passed.**

FIFTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will raise and appropriate the sum of Two hundred, two thousand, One-hundred, Eighty-eight Dollars (\$202,188.00) to be added to the Highway Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article Five was moved by Harland Eaton and seconded by Albert Samson. It was explained by Al Samson that this is the continuation of a five year plan.

Article Five passed.

SIXTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will appropriate \$30,000.00 to come out of the Unexpended Fund balance to cover the cost of a wage study by MRI (Municipal Resources Inc.), no part of such amount to be raised by taxes. Said study to include wage classification, job description clarification and to examine the town with respect to its growth and what type of management system it needs. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Albert Samson moved Article Six, seconded by Gail Clark. Al Samson explained that a portion of the unexpended fund balance is used to offset the tax rate set in October in order to stabilize the rate. The estimated unexpended fund balance at the end of 1999 is 1.5 million. The selectmen feel this study is necessary to look at wages and answer questions regarding our future need for town administrator or town manager or public works director, etc.

Vincent Galvin moved the question, seconded by Leonard Bienvenue. Hand count to limit debate of Article Six was: Yes 96, No 77. Discussion ceased and vote was taken on Article Six: Yes 87, No 92. Article Six was defeated.

At this time, the 2000 Annual Service Award was presented to Carl Mayland by last year's honoree, Pat Foskitt. Carl is active in Longmeadow Church, scouts, library, school and town affairs and committees.

SEVENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to create a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA 35:1 for closure of the former Solid Waste/Incinerator site and to appropriate, from the Unexpended Fund Balance, the sum of \$50,000.00 to be deposited into this newly created fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Gail Clark moved and Harland Eaton seconded Article Seven. After limited discussion vote was taken and Article Seven passed.

EIGHTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to appropriate the sum of up to \$18,000.00 which is the amount of interest earned and any additional interest to be earned from the Safety Complex Bond investment, up to \$14,000.00 in revenue generated from the sale of Timber on the site, towards the Safety Complex and its' associated costs. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article Eight was moved by James Headd and seconded by Gail Clark. After limited discussion vote was taken and Article Eight passed.

NINTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$25,000.00 to compensate police officers for outside duty. Such sum to come from revenue earned from outside duty details, and no part of such amount is to be raised by taxation. Passage of this article will have no effect on the tax rate. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Mark Gosselin moved Article Nine and Harland Eaton seconded. There being no discussion, vote was taken and Article Nine passed.

TENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to appropriate \$25,000.00 from the Unexpended Fund Balance for architectural costs associated with the construction of the Town Hall. A committee of up to seven people, appointed by the Selectmen will head this project. Passage of this article will not affect the tax rate. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article Ten moved by Albert Samson, seconded by Gail Clark. A lengthy discussion followed regarding needs for a town hall. Vincent Galvin moved the question, seconded by Leonard Bienvenue. Vote to restrict discussion was in the affirmative, and vote was taken on Article Ten. Article Ten was defeated.

ELEVENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to create a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA 35:1, towards the construction of a Town Hall and to appropriate, from the Unexpended Fund Balance \$300,000.00, to be deposited into this Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Albert Samson moved Article Eleven, seconded by Gail Clark. The general mood of the meeting regarding Article Ten and Eleven was to keep the unexpended fund balance for emergency use. After very limited discussion, Richard Vecchione moved to table Article Eleven. Leonard Bienvenue seconded the motion. Motion to table passed and Article Eleven was tabled.

TWELFTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will authorize the Selectmen to sell an existing town owned Right of Way leading to Map 4, Lot 25 Rockwood Terrace to the owner of Map 4, Lot 25 Rockwood Terrace, the price to be determined by appraisal. (By Petition)

Orrin Chase moved Article Twelve. Bernardine Donelson seconded the motion..

Dean Eggert, town council, stated that the town could give a quick claim deed to whatever legal interest the town has in the right of way. There is no deed. The right of way is only shown on a map. After some further discussion, Orrin Chase moved to vote on the question. Seconded by Bertrand Ouellette. Vote to cease discussion passed and vote was taken on Article Thirteen. Article Twelve failed.

THIRTEEN: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to send the following resolution to the New Hampshire General Court: "Resolved, New Hampshire's natural, cultural and historic resources in this town and throughout the state are worthy of protection and, therefore, the State of New Hampshire should establish and fund a permanent public/private partnership for the voluntary conservation of these important resources." (By Petition)

Noman Milne moved Article Thirteen and Earle Wingate seconded. Mr. Milne explained the article. Vote was taken and Article Thirteen passed.

FOURTEENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to authorize indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year and which has not been previously accepted. (Majority vote required)

Gail Clark moved and Albert Samson seconded Article Fourteen. Article Fourteen passed.

FIFTEENTH: Shall the Town of Auburn accept the provision of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes. (Majority vote required)

Gail Clark moved and Harland Eaton seconded Article Fifteen. Article Fifteen passed.

SIXTEENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to accept, indefinitely, such Trust Funds as may come in during the year and Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.

Article Sixteen moved by Albert Samson, seconded by Gail Clark. **Article Sixteen passed.**

SEVENTEENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to use the income from the H.B. Burnham Fund for the schools or library until such time as this authorization is specifically rescinded.

David Griffin moved the income from the H.B. Burnham Fund be used for the library. Motion seconded by Faye Hanscomb. Article Seventeen passed as moved.

EIGHTEENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, on behalf of the Town, for any public purposes. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-e shall remain in effect until rescinded by the voters at Town Meeting. (Majority vote required)

Article Eighteen moved by Harland Eaton. Gail Clark seconded the motion. Article Eighteen passed.

NINETEENTH: Shall the Town of Auburn accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year? (Majority vote required)

David Griffin moved Article Nineteen. Bernardine Donelson seconded the motion. Article Nineteen passed.

TWENTIETH: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any or all property acquired by tax deed, through public auction or sealed bid, with right to reject all bids.

Article Twenty moved by Albert Samson and seconded by Gail Clark. **Article Twenty** passed.

TWENTY-FIRST: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges and legal obligations for the ensuing year.

Bertrand Ouellette, Chairman of the Budget Committee moved to raise and appropriate \$2,637,887.00 (Two million, six hundred thirty-seven thousand, eight hundred eighty-seven dollars) to defray town charges and legal obligations for the ensuing year. Motion seconded by Nancy Mayland.

Nancy Mayland moved to amend Article Twenty-one to add \$4,134.00 to the library appropriation. Faye Hanscomb seconded the motion to amend. Vote was taken on amendment to add \$4,134.00 to the library appropriation and amendment passed adding \$4,134.00 to appropriation.

Vincent Galvin moved to amend Article Twenty-one to appropriate the third installment of the funds necessary (\$35,000.00) to be added to the funds previously voted and being held in an escrow account for the cost of reassessing the real estate of the town. Paula Marzloff seconded the amendment. After limited discussion vote was taken and motion to amend the article in the amount of \$35,000.00 failed.

Carl Mayland moved to remove Article Eleven from the table and bring it back to the floor. Wil Drolet seconded the motion. The moderator explained that if the legislative meeting wished to suspend discussion of Article Twenty One the motion could be discussed and voted on. Vote to suspend discussion of Article Twenty One was taken and hand vote was Yes 63, and No 73. Discussion on Article Twenty One was not suspended.

Bertrand Ouellette moved to amend amount to be appropriated to \$2,312,021.00. Seconded by Susan Jenkins. (This removes amounts from defeated Articles Six and Eleven, and includes the added amended amount of \$4,134.00 for the library. Defeated Article Ten not in budget.) Vote to amend appropriation to \$2,312,021.00 passed.

Moderator called for a vote to raise and appropriate \$2,312,021.00. Vote was in the affirmative, and \$2,312,021.00 (Two million, three hundred and twelve thousand, twenty one dollars) was raised and appropriated to defray town charges and legal obligations for the ensuing year. This is all inclusive.

TWENTY-SECOND: To transact any other business that may legally come before the Town meeting.

Vincent Galvin moved that Article Eleven for the town hall at a cost of \$300,000.00 be subjected to RSA 40:10 limited reconsideration, seconded by Carl Mayland. After discussion, Bruce Phillips moved the question, seconded by Bernardine Donelson. Motion to cease discussion and vote on motion was in the affirmative, and vote was taken. Hand count on motion was Yes 67, No 53. Motion passed.

James Headd, Auburn Development Authority, reported that the sale of the Rifle Range property had been finalized this week at a price of \$1,000,000.00, and first payment check was in hand. He gave an overview of the proposed industrial use of the property to be called Wellington Business Park which will eventually include 11 buildings, adding considerably to our tax base.

Gail Clark presented Al Samson with a gift of thank you from the town for his service as a member of the Board of Selectmen.

Bruce Phillips moved to adjourn the meeting. Bertrand Ouellette seconded. Motion passed and meeting adjourned at 4:40 P.M.

AUBURN SPECIAL TOWN MEETING – July 2000

A special town meeting was called to order by moderator, C. Donald Stritch, at 7:00 PM on July 14, 2000. In order to allow for the remainder of the people to be checked in, the beginning of the meeting was postponed until 7:20 PM.

The moderator gave the rules for the meeting and stated that there would be a secret ballot vote on the final question. The warrant for the meeting was read.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the additional sum of Four Hundred, Seven Thousand, Three Hundred Nine Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$407,309.50) or any other sum from the Town's Unexpended Fund Balance, interest earned on the Safety Complex Bond, and revenue from the sale of timber for the purchase of lands and the construction of a Safety Complex Facility consisting of the Police and Fire; and for purchasing equipment and furnishings in connection therewith. The sum to be raised may be reduced as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would benefit the Town. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount included in the Budget)

Gail Clark moved the article as read. Seconded by Bert Ouellette.

Mitchell Henley moved to amend the article by striking out the words "or any other sum". Seconded by Lewis Theos. Mitch explained that this was merely to set a cap on the amount. Vote on the amendment was in the affirmative and the words "or any other sum" were struck from the article.

Discussion began on original article as amended. In answer to a question regarding the unexpended fund balance, Gail Clark responded that the state requires that we retain approximately \$550,000 in this fund and we have 1.4 million, therefore, we would not need to replace this amount.

After further discussion, Mitchell Henley moved the question. Seconded by Elaine Hobbs. Vote was in the affirmative and discussion ceased.

There was a secret ballot vote on the article as amended. Yes 171. No 67. Blank 2. Article passed.

Donald Dollard moved to adjourn, seconded by Emerson Heald. Meeting adjourned at 8:30PM.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Auburn Auburn, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Auburn as of and for the year ended December 31, 1999 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Auburn has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Auburn as of December 31, 1999, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Auburn taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Auburn. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

AUBURN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

The Auburn Development Authority, ADA, was established by vote at the Town Meeting of March 1999. The purpose of the ADA is to foster and encourage industrial development within the Town of Auburn.

On March 16, 2000, the ADA successfully entered into a purchase and sales agreement with PD Associates in the amount of one million dollars for the sale of the property affectionately known as the Rifle Range (Map 6 Lot 18). The Town received a down payment of \$176,500, with the balance to be paid on a lot release basis. In other words, as PD Associates develop the property, the Town will be paid. A time limit of five years has been established for the completion of the entire project.

In December 2000, a second parcel was sold and a third is under agreement as of this writing.

The ADA is working with the Board of Selectmen, and they are actively in the process of inventorying suitable industrial and commercial land within the Auburn town limits. It is the intent of the ADA to actively promote and seek potential buyers to enlarge the industrial commercial base in the town and to hopefully bring these properties on line as tax-paying neighbors. The ADA will engage the services of an industrial/commercial realty company to assist us in this promotion. It is our goal to maximize potential industrial development and minimize the environmental impact of this development.

RECREATION COMMITTEE YEAR "2000" REVIEW

The Recreation Committee had a lot of personnel changes during the year 2000. We saw Tom Skeffington and Phil Jurson leave the committee. In addition, we lost Chairman, Linda Breault, and our longtime secretary Yvonne Crocker retired. We welcomed Gary Schmittchen to our commission and Joanne Foley as our new secretary.

In January, the Recreation Committee hosted an open house at the Auburn Audubon Center, which was well received with about 80 folks showing up just from Auburn. In the Spring, we supported efforts to modify the parking lot at Sandy Acres to allow for better drainage and added additional fencing around the lot so cars could not enter the fields other than through the main gates. The farm field (beyond the soccer field) was completed this year with more dirt brought in and graded and some stone dust was added to the infield. In a show of appreciation for our generous sharing of the soccer field, the Derry Soccer Club donated two professional sized goals with nets to the Sandy Acres Field in September. They are safer than the ones that had been previously located there and really add to the kids enthusiasm on the field.

The overall fall soccer program run by the Manchester YMCA and supported by the Recreation Committee had over 130 children sign up. This year the soccer program expanded to add 4-5 year olds and was a huge success.

The Recreation Committee supported a fall clean-up day at Sandy Acres for field work and building repairs. The cost of paint, wood, and other materials was paid for by the Recreation Committee. The labor was provided by Auburn volunteers. There was a well dug in November for irrigation purposes during the summer season. The Recreation Committee working with the Little League will add the capability to have running water in the Emery building next year.

The Recreation Committee also took full responsibility of the PLAY area which includes maintenance, and upkeep of the area as well as future budgeting. The Recreation Committee also had a hand in supporting the Auburn Babe Ruth, Auburn Receation Basketball, Pat's Peak Ski Program, and the Senior trips.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

The Town had an increase from 885 registered dogs in 1999 to 921 in 2000. The new registration for 2001 begins on April 30th and requires you to have rabies shots within the last three years.

The spaying of the feral cat colony next to the Town Hall was a great success. We captured sixteen kittens and five adult females during the summer. All of the kittens were adopted and the adult females were spayed, vaccinated, and released to live out their lives in their own environment. They will have food, shelter, and the freedom from future litters of kittens. I want to thank Denise Zogopoulas for financing the project, David Smiley, DVM for his veterinarian services, Ginger McGee for her care, and Beckys Place in Manchester for it's help in placing the kittens.

One of our resident black bear decided not to hibernate until after Christmas and was seen around Rattlesnake Hill Road, Pingree Hill Road, Calef Road, Chester Road, and Dearborn Road. He emptied several bird feeders and a few beehives during his eating spree before settling down for the rest of the winter. Fish and Game had advised that the residents take down their birdfeeders by April 1st and leave no available food around to entice the bears or other wildlife. We had a moose killed on Route 101 and Hooksett Road this last year. I am sure most of you are well aware of the increase in deer, raccoon and other wildlife in our town, and it speaks well of our giving them the space and respect they require to live among us.

I want to thank everyone who donated cat food for the feral cats and dog food for the animals who are held here until the owners are found. Hopefully, in the coming year we can create a non-profit fund to cover the expense of placing abandoned or feral cats. Animals in Auburn deserve the very best care, and we must try to fill that need.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT 2000

The town of Auburn Health officials took part in the following activities during the past year:

- Scheduled inspections of Children Day Care facilities for State of NH License renewals.
- Investigation of failed septic systems.
- Witnessed test pits for the siting of new/replacement septic systems.
- Assisted the State Department of Environmental Services in the testing of private wells for possible volatile organic compound (VOCs) contamination.
- Investigated tenant/landlord complaints relative to RSA48-A Minimum Rental Housing requirements.
- Submitted three dead birds to the State Lab for possible West Nile Virus disease. (All 3 birds tested negative for WNV)

In September we attended the annual NH Health Officer's Association sponsored conference. Some of the topics discussed were "Crime and Death Scene Cleaning", "Emerging Pathogens" such as West Nile Virus; "Septic System Effluent Filters", and "Risk Management and Environmental Safety".

Again this year the Department of Environmental Services (DES) has been dealing with reports of private wells being contaminated with the gasoline additive methyl-tertiary butyl-ether (MtBE) a suspected carcinogen. Some wells in Auburn have been found to contain low amounts of this volatile organic compound (VOC). Attempts to remove this compound from the fuel supply are still being discussed at the State and Federal levels. On the subject of private water well contamination here is part of a letter we received recently from the Department of Environmental Services:

"As you know, some well water in New Hampshire may contain contaminants, such as radon and arsenic, which can occur naturally in our state's bedrock. To help address this, the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) recently initiated a strategy to encourage homeowners with private wells to have their well water periodically tested." (see the enclosed public service announcement that accompanies this report)

We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their continued cooperation during our inspections/investigations, as this will help the town of Auburn remain a healthy place to live, work and play. SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

To Auburn Residents

We have made some progress toward the closure of our old Solid Waste Facility. The State of NH required that we put in five monitoring wells. Those wells were placed on site in the spring. The first test had some questionable results, so another test was conducted. The second test was well within normal.

Based on that information, our engineering firm, Hoyle, Tanner, and Associates is getting ready to prepare a final closure plan for the State. The hope is that we will be able to do a minimum closure, with most of the material remaining on site. The estimates ranged from about \$400,000 to well over \$1,000,000. Until a plan is accepted, a final closure cost cannot be determined. Since the test results were good, it is expected that the final costs will be on the lower end of the range.

As standard procedure on closures, the State requires that the wells be monitored into the future. The usual requirement is for 30 years. Those costs will be included as part of the final closure plan. The goal is to get the Town of Auburn and the State of New Hampshire to agree on a closure plan within the year 2001, and to finalize the closure by the year 2002.

Based on current information, we are well on the way to having set aside a good portion of the funds needed for the closure. By accepting this year's warrant article for \$50,000, it is projected, that we will have about \$300,000 toward the cost of closure. It is important that we support this graduated approach to the final cost.

AUBURN PLANNING BOARD

The Auburn Planning Board was busy during 2000 with a full agenda at every meeting. A number of projects commenced during the previous year are now approved and well underway, including the new industrial park off Rockingham Road and the gas station/convenience store at Route 101, exit 2.

Beginning in the fall of 1999, the Board became involved in the design of the safety complex site, as well as the layout and design of Eaton Hill Road. The Board spent a lot of time finding a design that provided safe access to the driveway of the safety complex, a safe intersection at Raymond Road, and improved traffic flow near the school.

The final design, accepted by the Board, sited the complex in a fashion that met the needs of the Fire and Police Departments and provided an attractive setting. Eaton Hill Road was redesigned so that a sidewalk extends from Hooksett Road to the Complex. The area at the school was widened to allow pick-up of students to occur without impeding traffic flow. Drainage was controlled and funneled into a detention area near Hooksett Road for treatment prior to discharge into the brook.

The Library worked with the Planning Board, on a smaller scale, to obtain acceptance of the addition and parking. Construction is well underway. Many applications for site plan amendments and home occupations were approved by the Board.

During most of the year, the Board worked with the developer of the "Rifle Range" to approve his subdivision plan. The subdivision included eleven industrial lots with city water, gas, underground utilities, and future sewer. Rockingham Road was rebuilt as part of the project. After the subdivision was approved, the Board also approved several site plans, one of which is nearing completion.

The Board started working with Gerald Coogan and Dufresne-Henry to revise the Master Plan. The Master Plan is updated every five years and is intended to create some policy guidelines for the Planning Board to use over the next five years.

In November the Board adopted new Site Plan Regulations. The revisions are designed to maintain the highest level of safety and environmental protection for the residents of Auburn.

During regular business meetings, the Board approved several subdivisions on Dearborn Road, Hooksett Road, Spofford Road, and Pingree Hill Road.

AUBURN POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

During the year 2000 the Auburn Police Department experienced an extremely busy year handling more than seven thousand incidents. Also, during the year 2000 the Auburn Police Department was able to slow down the exodus for other police departments and create some stability within it's ranks. Oh, there was some turn over, but only four members left in 2000, compared to the nine members exited during 1999. And most importantly, we once again learned how much the residents of Auburn, New Hampshire support it's officers and the professional service we try to provide.

The entire police staff remained busy with a variety of activities ranging from motor vehicle stops, to DWI arrests, sexual assault investigations, domestic violence cases, and a heart stopping situation at the Auburn Village School. In each case, our members handled themselves professionally, and satisfactorily brought each case to a successful close.

In an effort to keep the streets of Auburn safe for the motoring public, over one hundred Driving While Intoxicated breath test were conducted here at the Auburn Police Station. This far surpasses the results in any of the surrounding communities with the possible exception of Manchester and Derry. The motor vehicle enforcement efforts have created a low accident rate in Auburn of only 147 crashes during 2000.

Criminally, the most disturbing event of the year was an investigation into the sexual assault of a six year old boy while at a prayer meeting in Auburn. Although the case is still pending further court action, the perpetartor has been in jail since the time he was first identified as the suspect.

The lock down at the Auburn Village School started as a terrifying event for the staff at the school, but the staff displayed a remarkable professionalism during the crisis, and cooperated with the efforts of law enforcement to bring the situation to a successful end. The school, the police department, the students, and the parents all learned a lot from the case. Although this was the result of a misunderstanding created by another event being played out in town not related to the school, the lock down tested everyone, and garnered valuable lessons. On the positive side, we again learned about the relationship our police department maintains with the Aubrn Village School and other law enforcement agencies. In this one case we worked hand in hand with the New Hampshire State Police, New Hampshire Fish and Game Officers, and the Manchester Water Works water shed patrol.

The previous staffing problems of 1999 have slowed down during the year of 2000. Unfortunately the department lost it's version of Mr. Auburn, Michael McGillen. There's no replacing a police officer like Mike. Anyone reading this paragraph right now, knows exactly what I'm saying. McGillen will always be a standard to hold future officers up to. When McGillen left Auburn to go to Candia he took one other officer with him, Richard Langlois. Rick accepted a full time position in Candia, and has since proved himself an asset to Candia, thanks to the training he received while in Auburn. Later in the year 2000 we lost Jerome Blanchard and Daniel Jones. Blanchard is putting his law degree to use, and Jones has returned to the medical field. We have two new full time officers now as a result of the resignations of Blanchard and Jones. Michael Bolduc, who was a part time officer here, and in Salem, is now a full timer, and waiting to go to the Police Academy. What a find this kid was! On Holloween Sunday. Mike bought a bunch of candy and started handing the candy out to the young people he encountered during the day. That's community policing at it's best. The other new officer is Ray Pelton, an Auburn resident, and a former sergeant with the Hooksett Police Department. Ray brings a lot of experience to our police department.

Also, as the year 2001 is about to start, we have filled two vacant part time officer positions. The new officers are Laie Butland and Willie Scurry. They are entering the part time academy as this report is being written, but should be well trained and eager to go by May, 2001.

We are grateful for the support exhibited during 2000 by the towns people. Budget problems concerning the new safety complex were discovered, and almost put a halt to the construction of the complex. A special meeting was scheduled, and a large number of town residents attended to approve additional funding for the complex. Now it looks like the project will be completed in early 2001. Hopefully, we'll be moved in by the time this report is read by the people of Auburn at Town Meeting. The members of the police department can't express their gratitude enough for the generosity of the Auburn voters. You're all invited to stop by and see what your support has created.

Again, thank you to all the people of Auburn, New Hampshire. We will continue to serve all of you in the highly professional manner you expect and deserve.

Highway Safety Committee

Year 2000 Review

The Highway Safety Committee had a busy and successful year. Over the last year, Mr. Mike Di Pietro joined the committee and Mr. Carl Mayland resigned. Mrs. Yvonne Crocker resigned as secretary when she moved to Concord and Mrs. Joanne Foley replaced her.

This past year, Auburn's street lights were upgraded to high pressure sodium. Lower utility bills will pay off the initial investment by the town in three years.

Residents of Hooksett Road were concerned about truck traffic. The Town of Hooksett eliminated this problem by posting their end of the road to "No Thru Trucking". As the population of our region grows, traffic is rapidly increasing. Our roads are old, windy and narrow. Please watch your speed and pay close attention.

The Auburn Police Department applied for a federal grant of \$2,150.00 to cover the cost of overtime for local highway safety. The Highway Safety Committee supported this grant unanimously.

Negotiations between the N.H. State Historical Society, the N.H. Department of Transportation and the Town of Auburn delayed the work on Coleman Bridge. All sides now agree and work will begin on the bridge this year. In the future, the bridges on Dearborn and Depot Roads will need work.

Eaton Hill Road was upgraded to accommodate the new Safety Complex. The intersection of Raymond Road and Eaton Hill is now ninety degrees with stop signs regulating traffic. Last year's project on Pingree Hill Road received a top coat of asphalt. Rockingham Road, between King Street and the Manchester line, was rebuilt as part of the Rifle Range industrial development. Maple Farm Road drainage and road base were improved.

The Highway Safety Committee recommends an increase in funding for road reconstruction. Auburn is building better roads, which will last longer. The cost of material and labor continues to increase. To rebuild the same square footage of roadway, more money is needed.

The Highway Safety Committee meets at the Auburn Town Hall the third Tuesday of the month at 7:00 P.M. All meetings are open to the public. Auburn residents with any concerns for road safety, road and street signs and road hazard concerns may appear before the Committee or may make their concerns known in writing for consideration at the next meeting.

The committee is looking forward to another active and successful year for 2001.

The Committee would also like to thank the residents of Auburn who brought forward their concerns and suggestions and have made the Town of Auburn a safer and better place for all.

Auburn School District Meeting March 17, 2000

The Auburn School District Meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. on Friday, March 17, 2000, by C. Donald Stritch, Moderator. Mr. Stritch called for a fifteen minute recess to accommodate those residents still entering. The meeting was reconvened.

The Moderator read the call of the meeting. He announced that TV cameras had been set up in the cafeteria and the music room to accommodate those who could not find seats in the auditorium. He also announced the rules of the meeting. Mr. Stritch explained that the Public Service Co. of NH had planned on shutting off the power at 11:00 P.M. to do work on the electric lines. Public Service was very cooperative and agrees to postpone the date until the following Friday.

Mr. Stritch introduced the following guests: Dr. Lyonel B. Tracy, Superintendent, Robert A. Suprenant, Assistant Superintendent, Ronald C. Chapman, Business Administrator and Pamela Shepard, Principal. He also introduced Joseph Leverone, Brenda Beer and Elaine Hobbs, School Board Members, and Mary Griffin, School District Clerk and Nancy Gagnon, Town Clerk.

Article 1: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven million hundred eighty thousand (\$7,180,000) for the construction and original equipping of a new school building and renovations to the existing Village School and to authorize the issuance of not more than seven million one hundred eighty thousand dollars (\$7,180,000) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33): to authorize the school board to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon. And to raise and appropriate the additional sum of two hundred twenty-three thousand, two hundred sixty-seven dollars (\$223,267) for the first year payment of interest due on the bond with that amount to come from the interest earned on the investment of the aforesaid bond proceeds. (Recommended by the School (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Elaine Hobbs made a motion to accept the article as read. Seconded by Joseph Leverone. A presentation was made by Elaine Hobbs and David DiNatale. Discussion followed. Robert Hayes spoke to the article and thanked those who have given hours of volunteer time for this cause. Richard Shackelton also made a presentation. Questions were raised and answers were given. Alan Cote moved the question and it was seconded.

The Moderator called for a vote as to whether or not to limit further debate. The motion was passed.

Mr. Stritch announced that the polls would be open for one hour. Voting proceeded and the polls were closed at the end of the hour. The ballots were counted and the following results were announced:

Number of ballots cast was 555.

Yes - 240

No - 312

Article I was defeated.

Article 2: To accept the reports of agents, auditors and committees or officers chosen, and place them on file.

The Moderator called on Brenda Beer.

Mrs. Beer made a motion that the article be accepted as printed. Seconded by Elaine Hobbs.

Vote was taken and Article 2 was passed.

Article 3: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of one hundred sixty-eight thousand nine hundred eighty dollars (\$168,980) and to raise by general taxation forty-two thousand two hundred forty-five dollars (\$42,245) of that figure, for the purpose of renovation to the Auburn Village School for kindergarten classrooms and establishing a public kindergarten program for all eligible children of the Auburn School District. The balance of this appropriation is to be funded by a state kindergarten grant; and to authorize the

school board to accept and expend the kindergarten grant money. Projected cost to the Auburn School District is:

<u>YEAR</u> <u>EST. AMOUNT</u> <u>TAX IMPACT</u> In 2000-2001 \$42,245 \$.18

The cost is eligible for 30% Building Aid. No cost in the ensuing year for construction. (Recommended by the School Board) (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion was made by Joseph Leverone to postpone the article. Seconded by Elaine Hobbs.

Vote was taken and Article 3 was postponed.

Article 4: To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

The Moderator called on Bert Ouellette, Chairman of the Budget Committee. Mr. Ouellette made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,918,807. Seconded by Brenda Beer.

Discussion followed.

Vote was taken and Article 4 passed.

Article 5: To see if the District will vote to increase the school board membership from three (3) to five (5) members effective with the annual election in March 2001. At that time, two (2) additional members will be elected, one for a three-year term and one for a two-year term. Thereafter, all members will be elected for a three-year term. (Recommended by the School Board)

Motion was made by Brenda Beer that the article be accepted as read. Seconded by Elaine Hobbs.

Explanations were given by the School Board members.

The Moderator called for the vote.

Vote was taken and Article 5 passed.

Article 6: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Motion to adjourn was made by Al Samson. Seconded.

Principal's Report 1999-2000

On September I, 1999, Auburn Village School greeted 633 smiling faces as teachers and staff members welcomed students back from their summer vacation. The months of July and August were busy ones for our maintenance staff as they began to clean our building in preparation for another new school year. As always, teachers and staff members were frequent visitors during the summer months preparing new lessons for their students and getting their classrooms ready.

We bid farewell to Assistant Principal Steven Tullar who decided to return to the classroom in the Oyster River School District. Jody Coughlin, who taught middle school for twenty-six years in the Manchester School District, joined the administrative staff as our new Assistant Principal. The following staff members joined the team of teachers at AVS: Cynthia Hursh and Winston Leong, eighth grade teachers; Andrea O'Neil, Technology Coordinator; Leanne Ryan, fourth grade teacher; and Holly Laretta, physical education teacher as a substitute for Pamela Blampied who was on an extended leave.

One of our primary goals at AVS is to ensure that each of our students receives a challenging, productive education in a safe and secure environment. It is important to us that parents take an active role in their child's education. We encourage a child specific education and use a personalized profile to assess individual learning and thinking styles. Many parents wrote to us about their children helping us to successfully place each child in a learning environment that would best suit that child's needs.

With the addition of our own Technology Coordinator, Mrs. Andrea O'Neil, our school began to meet the fundamental technology needs of our students. In addition to setting up a new class size computer lab, we have established e-mail accounts and developed acceptable use policies and procedures to access the Internet. The use of our new computer lab was integrated into the weekly class routines. Teachers and coordinator worked together to provide learning experiences that integrated the use of

technology with mastery of the basic curriculum. We feel that we have made tremendous strides in promoting computer literacy in our school for students, teachers, and administrators.

Mrs. Andrea O'Neil and Mrs. Jill Greeley successfully applied for a grant through the Technology Literacy Grant Fund. They were awarded with funding for staff members at AVS to develop their technology skills through workshops and college courses offered on the Internet. With such tremendous growth in this area, the need for pervasive computer literacy is becoming more important everyday. If we are to prepare our children for success in the 21st century, we need to keep abreast of the ever changing world of technology.

We have always marveled at the significant contributions of our PTA and this year was a year to remember. The Auburn Village School PTA received the state's top award "PTA Unit of the Year" for 1999-2000 at the PTA State Convention held on November 4, 2000. Their contributions helped to defray expenses and provide our students and teachers with opportunities to experience exciting learning experiences. The donation of a new sound system that worked both inside and outside was beneficial during assemblies and graduation exercises. Bringing in noted basket weaver Alice Ogden, to share her expertise with students and community members, provided a serious commitment to the arts. The countless hours that members put in as volunteers once again achieved Blue Ribbon recognition. Our PTA maintains a membership that is truly devoted to the children of AVS. We are fortunate to have such a dedicated group of members.

Our students in grades 6-8 were actively involved in many rigorous sports over the year. Cheerleading, volleyball, basketball, soccer, and softball proved to be challenging interscholastic sports teams. The boys' basketball team, coached by Winston Leong, won the Class S Championship and remained undefeated in league play. Our sports program provided our students with the opportunities to enhance their physical abilities while learning how to play the game respectfully — two very important components of a successful interscholastic sports program.

Many staff members and school programs were honored or celebrated during the school year. Second grade teacher, Mrs. Gail Boucher was nominated for Teacher of the Year. Seventh grade teacher, Mary Johnson received a letter of congratulations for her nomination as a Disney teacher. The Auburn Village School D.A.R.E. partnership with the Auburn Police Department was recognized by the State Department of Education at the Gold Circle Award Ceremony held in Concord, New Hampshire. Our volunteer program won the Blue Ribbon Award for the countless hours they put in helping out in our school. Red Ribbon Week, a week designed to raise awareness of the destruction caused by substance abuse, was celebrated with students and faculty who wore red ribbons for an entire week to signify a commitment to living a healthy, drug free life. Ten faculty members participated in a year-long course entitled, "Learning through Teaching." Gifted and Talented teacher, Mrs. Jill Greeley organized the Invention Convention on March 22, which drew a large crowd of student inventors and scientists. Our annual Grandparents' Luncheon was well attended this year. The delicious repast, prepared by Food Service Director Melissa McCarthy, always welcomes many members of the Auburn community.

Our students continued to participate in programs that enhanced their learning capabilities, challenged their potential, and brought them fun. Through the combined efforts of our students, staff and thirteen volunteer coaches, AVS fielded five teams in the creative problem-solving program, Destination Imagination. Three of our teams placed in their division at the regional competition and moved on to the state level. One of our teams, "If Music be the Food of Life," placed first at the state level and earned the privilege of representing the State of New Hampshire in the Global Competition held at Iowa State University. Fire Prevention Week was a huge success in grades R-4 with a visit from several volunteer firefighters who visited classrooms to talk about safety measures. Classes were encouraged to submit posters that addressed the theme, "The Great Escape" — a poster contest that required escape routes from a typical home. Students and teachers received trophies and t-shirts, while the winning poster, from Mrs. Fortier's second grade class, was treated to a pizza lunch served by the Auburn Fire Department.

Sara Murray, a fourth grade student, entered and won the Talk-of-the-Table writing contest sponsored by Storyworks. A monetary award donated by Jiff and Smuckers was presented to Sara. She chose to use her \$1,000.00 award to fund an author's visit to our school with the intent of encouraging writing for all of our students. The author is scheduled to visit AVS during the 2000-2001 school year. We would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Sara on her talent and thank her for her generosity.

Mrs. Roggenbuck, advisor to the AVS Student Council, worked very hard guiding her council members to provide community service and social events for our students. Again, the Granite State Middle School Council recognized them for excellence. The following officers: President Karlene Linxweiler, Vice President Kelsey Skeffington, Secretary Emilie Lavoie and Treasurer Kara Verryt set good examples for the student body and encouraged our students to become active members of our school community.

Once again, results of the NHEIAP (New Hampshire Educational Improvement Assessment Program) at AVS indicate that our third and sixth graders are doing well. Our teachers remain extremely effective in providing a comprehensive, challenging curriculum that follows the standards established by the NH State Frameworks. As educators, we constantly strive for excellence, and we take the mission of educating the children in our community very seriously.

Graduation ceremonies were held on June 18, 2000 for 81 eighth grade students. As our graduates and their families gathered in the AVS gymnasium for the last time, we celebrated their accomplishments. It was also a time to reflect on the countless educational possibilities that Pinkerton Academy and Manchester Memorial would be able to offer our students. We are confident that our students have become actively involved in the process of learning and have the capabilities to work towards a successful future.

We value the relationship we have established between home and school and fully recognize how fortunate our students are to have a community of parents who remain committed to the long range planning of their child's education. With the continued support of the community of Auburn, our School Board, SAU staff, PTA, Police and Fire Departments we are proud to have successfully completed another school year at AVS.

On behalf of the Auburn School Board, it is my pleasure to issue this annual school district report. Over the past year, there have been many challenges facing the Auburn School District, yet our Auburn Village School has maintained its excellence in educating our children.

We extend a warm welcome to our new Superintendent, Bob Suprenant, our new Assistant Superintendent, Eric Wigode, and our new Business Administrator, Sally Waterhouse. They settled in very nicely at the SAU. Also, welcome back to Pam Shepard, our Principal, Jody Coughlin, our Assistant Principal, and Chris Farrah, our Special Education Director. All these people are a tremendous asset to our district. They use their leadership skills to maintain the excellent climate of the Auburn Village School.

Our students continue to score well on the statewide assessment program. Our dedicated teachers deserve much credit for making student learning their highest priority.

In September, the School Board, with assistance from SAU administration and building-level administrators, drafted annual goals. These goals guided our governance of the Auburn School District. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board Auburn School District Hooksett, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Auburn School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2000 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Auburn School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Auburn School District as of June 30, 2000, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Auburn School District taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Auburn School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

Auburn School District Superintendent's Report

As we approach a new and challenging 21st century, I am pleased to be part of the Auburn School District, serving as Superintendent of School Administrative Unit #15. The Auburn School District has a great deal to be proud of. The dedication of the administration and faculty members of Auburn Village School to their students, coupled with the parental involvement of the Auburn community in maintaining a close relationship between home and school are paramount in maintaining a productive, progressive school system.

Clearly, the success of this school district is a reflection of the best that is within its educational community. Consequently, our students continue to score quite high on the New Hampshire State Assessment Tests. We continue to be extremely proud of this accomplishment. Our teachers encourage their students to be active participants in their learning, using innovative activities and a hands on approach in disseminating information.

With the formation of the Facilities Committee in May of 1999, space needs moved to the forefront with major emphasis on building a new middle school to accommodate the growth of the Auburn community and provide a comprehensive school program. Although the article was defeated at the District Meeting in March of 2000, the committee continues to meet on a regular basis to address the needs of our students.

The provision of a child-centered, personalized education is one of our greatest accomplishments. To know and understand each child as an individual learner and be able to address specific needs provides our teachers with the insight they need to furnish effective teaching strategies. Parents in our community are extremely supportive of this endeavor. Student performance is monitored through the use of many different types of assessment, which provide a myriad of opportunities to reach the learning styles of all of our children.

Our middle school practices continue to grow and flourish with in-school workshops that address the needs of the child in the middle. Our teachers attended workshops, which focused on middle level practices and set professional goals for themselves, as well. Auburn Volunteer Fire Department

The Auburn Fire Department and Auburn Fireman's Association has once again logged yet another successful year. In the past 12 months our volunteer department has showed to the community of Auburn how much they are dedicated to the towns people. We have provided great service and enjoyment for young and old and in working with the Historical Society we gave the Town the largest bon fire this town has ever seen. With over 6500 pallets, which took our volunteers 3 days to stack, we overwhelmed the hundreds of people who showed up to enjoy the show. The Blues band that was also provided capped off a great night.

During our fire prevention open house the Towns people got the opportunity to see what their tax dollar goes for. They watched live demonstrations by our membership, which showed how well trained our fire fighters are. There were many positive comments on the live room fire and auto extrication demonstrations and the people were given previews of equipment we were looking to purchase. The live smoke house search & rescue demonstration was the kick off to the year 2000 fundraiser. Town's people were allowed to use the Thermal Imaging Camera to find their missing child. This demonstration showed only a portion of what this tool can do. Because the camera works off of heat it can also be used to find hidden fire in walls, missing people in the outside etc: This fundraiser turned out to be the most successful fundraiser in the Fireman's Associations history. Because of the generosity of the Towns people, business owners and an out of Town donation, we are pleased to report that the new state of the art Thermal Imaging camera has been bought and placed in service. The Thermal Imaging Camera will be on hand at the Town Meeting for everyone to view. The below grade / underwater camera was also on display for viewing. This camera can be used to locate missing people in the lake or ponds, or lowered into a confined area to locate victims. This piece of equipment has also been bought and placed in service.

Our EMS personal have been working hard to keep Town residence up to date on their CPR certifications. This past year we held 2 CPR classes for interested Towns people. Also on the agenda, The Auburn Fire Department, Parkland Medical Center and the Auburn Village School will be hosting a series of babysitting clinics. Please keep an eye on the Town Crier and School newsletter for dates & times.

Fire officials have worked continuously sense 1995 to put together what is now the Auburn Safety complex. Chief Phillips & Deputy Chief McCarthy was on the original fact finding committee and have stayed with the process to the final completion of a facility that will take both fire & police well into the future. With the completion of the new safety complex, fire apparatus will be moved around to better protect the town. Also included in the in the building will be the Office of Emergency Management. The building is designed as a stand-alone facility and will act as a command center in the event of a disaster or major incident. To better serve the residence of Auburn the phone system for the building will have the capability to page our fire officers in the event you need answers to your questions. It will also aid the residences on obtaining burning permits and other forms of inspections.

In the age of dwindling volunteers, the Towns people of Auburn should be pleased with what our department has done for our community. With 95% of our membership Auburn residence, it should not be a surprise why we are so dedicated to our town and our department. We will always strive to do the best for the community, from flooding the Town skating rink on sub-zero nights to giving a tour to the smallest of groups. Our Fireman's Association will continue to support local youth baseball, dollars for scholars and any other organization that may need a helping hand.

As always, we at the fire department have enjoyed and will continue to give the Town clean dependable service at a reasonable cost.

Dave was a very close friend and was deeply respected by all who had the pleasure to work with him. After a six month search, the Town of Chester has hired a replacement for Mr. Jore. I look forward to maintaining a good working relationship between our two communities

In October I assumed the position of part time Building Inspector / Code Enforcement Officer. My office hours are Tuesday, Thursday and Friday mornings, 8:30 a.m. – 12 noon. Inspections are conducted during afternoons on those days.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has a wide range of services and resources available to help the dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants who are selected for their specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of your appointed representatives, the Commission staff designs and carries out programs of area-wide significance that are mandated under New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local or site specific projects which would pertain more exclusively to your community.

Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of your Planning Board and Board of Selectmen. The commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects that are of common interest and benefit to all member communities, keeps your officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation, and offers training workshops for Planning and Zoning Board members on an annual basis.

Services that were performed for the Town of Auburn during the past year 2000 are as follows:

- 1. Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series. These meetings were attended by Auburn officials.
- 2. Conducted traffic counts at thirteen (13) locations in the Town of Auburn. Data was forwarded to the town's Planning Board Chairman.
- 3. Provided a copy of "Housing Needs Assessment for the SNHPC Region", prepared by the Commission staff.
- 4. Provided a copy of the Regional Transportation Plan update (August 2000) and the TIP FY 2001-2003 to the Planning Board. A copy of this document has also been forwarded to the town's library.
- 5. Provided five (5) copies of the road base maps for the Town of Auburn.
- 6. Prepared two (2) GIS maps which were forwarded to the town's consultant, engaged in updating the town's Master Plan.

MORE THAN A MEAL: SERVICES - In support of, and through the meals service:

Transportation, home visits, referrals, information, activities, outreach, service time, distribution of menus, Home Hearth Newsletters & nutrition education; and importantly

<u>DAILY SAFETY CHECK:</u> Through the frequent home delivery, the older person is seen and helped, if needed, in small ways: bringing in the mail, taking out the garbage, opening a jar, and in big ways: accidents, falls, health crises.

Plus a link to many homebound persons: distribution of surplus food, distribution of Salvation Army goods, holiday treats and the like.

PEOPLE BEING HELPED: *older adults needing support to stay at home— *families who require help caring for older relatives— *middle aged & older adults with a chronic debilitating disease— *adults recuperating from surgery or medical treatment (e.g. chemotherapy)— *others as need justifies.

CERTIFIED NEED: We have age, disability, and/or income criteria for meals service that is adhered to before service begins, and is re-evaluated during service. Before service, the site manager will do a home visit and assess the need of the potential client for meals services, and other services as well. If meals are appropriate; service begins, and the driver lets the manager know of any changes, better or worse, in the person's condition. The manager also goes out on the route to check on service, do redeterminations and assess the clients' ongoing needs.

Requirements range from short term service for recuperation from a hip operation, to long term service for someone with advance age and frailty. Our <u>clients' needs are monitored on a continuing basis and changes in meal service are made accordingly.</u>

AGENCY WIDE: Approximately 179 older people eat at the RNMOW congregate centers daily. The profile of a typical congregate meal participant is a female living alone (63%) or with and elderly spouse (26%), over 70 (72%) with a monthly income under \$600 (25% under \$400). About 690 meals are delivered daily to persons who are homebound. The profile of a typical MOW client is a woman 80 years of age or older (49%) most likely living alone or with an elderly spouse, with an income of \$599 a month or less (69% below \$400 a month).

Our budgets are straight forward. Overall:
