On the cover is the Maple Villa which was located on Rte. 16A in the Intervale area of Bartlett and more recently known as the Hampshire House. According to author Aileen Carroll in her book The Latchstring Was Always Out, the Maple Villa was built on the site of an earlier farm, had moderate rates at that time of \$7 to \$12 per week and remained open from May to November. Its attractions included a view of twenty mountains from the piazza, pine woods and nearby trout stream, and guests were assured that if they visited early or late in the season, that they had furnace heat and amusement in the form of a piano and the Boston and New York newspapers. Through the years as ownership changed, it eventually became part of the New England Inn complex and remains so today. The years took their toll on the inn and although attempts were made at renovation, in 2000 it was torn down to be replaced by a modern log-style lodge building.

2000 TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, March 13, 2001 at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1-2 will be by official ballot at the Town Hall and the polls shall open for balloting at eight o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening. The following articles (Articles 3-26) in the warrant will be acted upon on Thursday, March 15, 2001 at six thirty o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of AMENDMENT No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To add a Ridgeline and Hillside Overlay District (RHOD) to Article III Zoning Districts, Sections A-C and its accompanying regulations whose goal is to minimize site disturbance and maintain the appearance of natural unbroken forest cover on land within the town with high visual impact through restrictions that may affect such things as building location, height, landscaping, and access and utility location on properties within this district? (Planning Board favors 3-2)

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$85,000 as provided in NH RSA 231:28 (the Betterment Assessment law) to construct North Ledge Road to an acceptable town road standard and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$85,000.00 in bonds or notes for up to a 5 year term in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the interest thereon. All costs incurred by said construction would be borne by the abutting landowners through a betterment assessment and, therefore, there would be no effect on the tax rate. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000.00 for the purchase of a new marked police cruiser and related communication/safety equipment. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,995.00 for a new stainless steel sander body which was ordered last fall to replace an unusable sander body. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a pull behind road sweeper for the highway department. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000.00 for a new highway truck and mounted equipment (plows, sander, etc.). Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for town road improvements. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,700.00 for its 70% share of the purchase of a roll-off truck at the Transfer Station, the balance to be paid by the Town of Jackson. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for a new computer system (hardware and software) for the purposes of assessing, installation of the 911 system, and other general office work. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 as its share of the operation of the town/school recreation department, said sum representing the salary and benefits for the director. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 for improvements at the Transfer Station. Said improvements concern the possible purchase and installation of a glass crusher and/or a materials baler in conjunction with the Town of Jackson. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute to Valley Vision, 25% of the franchise fee the town receives from Adelphia Cable. The Town received \$34,847.54 for the year 2000. This expenditure not to exceed \$8,700.00 and to be paid in 3 payments of \$2,900.00. If approved these funds will be used for the betterment of Valley Vision tele-

vision programming. Valley Vision is a non-profit organization and an educational governmental cable television station. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Glines and others. Chandler favors \$3,000/ Garland favors up to \$6,000.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed for 4,700 feet of road that serves the Woodland Pines, East Branch and Birchlea development. The road starts at Rte. 16 adjacent to the FX Lyons Building, proceeds through the East Branch and Woodland Pines developments and continues across the Stateowned railroad tracks to the Birchlea development where it terminates as a loop back/circle. All construction and surfacing to be completed to current town standards prior to final acceptance by the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by George Howard and others.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed for the 4/10 of a mile of West Side Woods Road. This road begins at the intersection of West Side Road and West Side Woods Road 3/10 of a mile north of the parking entrance to Diana's Bath and the road continues around to form a U-shape and intersects again with West Side Road 4/10 of a mile north of Diana's Bath. All construction and surfacing to be completed to current town standards prior to final acceptance by the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Duane Mark and others.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,260.00 to help defray the costs of Service Delivery of the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert Boynton and others. Chandler opposes - not a proper use of town funds for national organizations; people should have an individual choice concerning donations to charitable organizations/ Garland favors.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for support of operating expenses of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport Authority. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,780.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,769.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Yvonne Kinsman and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,835.00 for the White Mt. Community Health Center (Children's Health Center & Family Health Centre). Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Chandler opposes/Garland favors.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for support of the Tri-County Community Action Program for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Evelyn Bailey and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of Starting Point for providing crisis services to victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Karen Hebert and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,326.00 for the Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Doris L. Kirk and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Early Support and Services Program (birth to 3 years) of Children Unlimited, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kimberly Perley and others. Selectmen favor.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Faced with the impact of being a "donor" town and the fact that Bartlett will be sending an additional \$200,299 to the State in Education Taxes for a total of \$1,052,814, the Selectmen have tried extremely hard to keep costs down but a few areas make that task very difficult.

Costs of employee health insurance have risen over \$30,000 and with the new payment of interest and principle for the fire truck increasing that line by \$63,000, that results in an increase of \$93,000 to the budget in just those two areas. Due to the huge increases in these areas, the Selectmen worked diligently to craft a budget that provides essential services, but does not break the backs of the taxpayer. The overall budget shows an increase of \$134,600 over last year and this year's proposed budget has an increase of \$106,513 over what we actually spent last year. Taking into account the health insurance and debt service increases, the remainder of this year's proposed budget represents an increase of \$39,600 over last year and approximately \$16,000 over last year's actual expenditures.

In these times of tough financial predicaments, we need to make absolutely sure that school, county, and town budgets are providing basic essential services but not trying to reach a new level with a myriad of new programs. Our tax rate situation in Bartlett is verging on perilous and if we are not careful, will become a burden to many people especially those that can least afford it. Bartlett has always prided itself on being a place where its older citizens and those on low and moderate incomes could live, work and raise a family.

The road improvement program as described in the outline presented last year met with success in the year 2000 as all of the projects earmarked were done. Major projects this past year included Town Hall Road, for which we would like to thank the US Forest Service and the NH Department of Transportation for their outstanding cooperation and commitment. Also, Spring Hill Road was reconstructed and major improvements done at Cobb Farm Road, Chandler Mountain Road, and East Branch Road. Somewhat minor improvements were also made in a number of other areas that needed corrective action. Additionally, two other major projects that had been pegged for this year and next were also done. These additional projects were the Meadows Road and, with the tremendous cooperation

of the North Conway Water Precinct, the road in Kearsarge Estates was revamped. Our new experiment with the road reclamation project on Spring Hill Road seems to have worked very nicely but it will take a couple of winters to see if it is a program that we can use in other areas.

While the money asked for in this year's warrant article for roads is less than the previous year, it should accomplish this year's projected goals and since a lot of this year's work involves sealing of the past couple of years' work areas, the crew will have plenty to do. As always, the Selectmen are trying to balance the needs of our road system with the effect on the tax burden.

The E-911 system is virtually ready to go 100% on line and if the funds for the new computer are approved at Town Meeting, the new data can be entered and by summer everything will be in full operation. We do remind everyone that 911 should still be used as the true emergency number as all departments are in sync with the statewide system.

The Transfer Station arrangement with the Town of Jackson has always been split as a 60% share for Bartlett and 40% share for Jackson for operating expenses and a 50/50 split for capital expenses. The contract between the towns calls for the cost sharing to be based on equalized valuation which means the shares need to be adjusted based on current valuations in each town. Even though the contract calls for this procedure for both operations and capital costs, since day one all capital expenses have been shared on a 50/50 basis. Jackson does not want to continue with this arrangement and wishes to revert to what the language in the original contract called for. Based on current property values in each town, the current split would be 70% Bartlett and 30% Jackson. While we hope we can move ahead with improvements at the facility, ongoing discussions will be held to discuss the capital expense part of the contract.

Another first for our annual report has a picture of Bartlett Fire Department personnel along with the newly (1999) purchased fire apparatus. We plan on printing a picture of various town departments each year in an effort to show our appreciation to our volunteers and employees. The Fire Department is always in need of volunteers so if you have an interest in serving your community, please contact Fire Chief Roger Labbe at 383-9555.

The Selectmen always try to budget very close to the vest and also estimate our revenues low to make sure we don't get caught in the trap of having an artificially derived tax rate in one direction or the other. While it is difficult to develop a bare bones budget in January and February and have it work for the next 10 months, this method seems to work pretty well. While last year's budget was overspent by some \$28,000, careful spending in the warrant articles resulted in a savings of \$12,000, and coupled with an increase of approximately \$8,000 in revenues, left us with a minuscule overspending of \$8,000.

As always, we would like to thank all of the employees, volunteer board members and the other volunteers that make the town function as a close knit community where its citizens can be proud to live. The ideals of civic-mindedness, community support, and concern for the preservation of the character of the Town of Bartlett are alive and well.

The new century has begun. The Town Clerk/Tax Collector's office has seen a lot of new faces with this year's steady turnover of properties. We welcome our new homeowners.

Our presidential election process ran smoothly. You could say that the basic #2 pencil and hand counting that we use here in Bartlett served us well this year. We offer a thank-you to the Supervisors of the Checklist and our Moderator for a well run day that saw a voter turnout of over 1200. Many thanks to the 20 or so ballot counters that staved late into the evening to help. Over 100 new voters registered to vote on Election Day, thanks to NH's same day voter registration law. We were especially pleased to see that many of our young people, who just turned 18, came in to vote. Our office hosted the Bartlett Elementary School the week prior to Election Day for a mock election. Grades K-8 came in during the morning, complete with their own checklist, clerks, moderators and supervisors and voted for the current candidates. They were all well informed and excited to follow the process. Little did they know that this would be such an historic election. They also had voted on-line through a national process at the school. The general consensus with most of the children was that voting on-line was easier and convenient but voting in person was more exciting.

Division of Motor Vehicles approved and started the issue of the new Conservation plates as of December 1, 2000. The plates feature a Moose and the revenue benefits five different conservation and historical agencies throughout the state. The plates may be obtained at the time of renewal or on a new registration for an additional \$30.00 per year. As always, my office is here to serve. My deputy, Bill Lepis has served you during tax time and my vacation time for three years now. Between the two of us, we hope we know most of you personally, and look forward to meeting our new residents during the coming year.

2000 PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The number of subdivision applications for 2000 was just slightly up from last year, a pattern consistent with nationwide trends in the economy and real estate markets. Although it's too early to rely on predictions for 2001, growth and development are expected to parallel those of the national economy.

As a terminus for the Conway By-pass, the town is positioned, only too well, for significant development along the Route 16 and 302 corridors. In an effort to evaluate the effectiveness of our existing ordinances and to solicit community response to the issues and concerns associated with growth along those access corridors, the Planning Board and Ad Hoc committee combined efforts to compile a Land Use Survey, which was distributed at Town Hall on Election Day. The survey response was terrific!

Consistent with the primary focus of our present ordinance, maintaining the 'rural character' of our communities was a priority for most of those responding to the survey. Many felt that without significant growth management restrictions, we would some day follow in the footprints of Conway, (perceived by many as unable to deal effectively with traffic congestion, and overwhelming demands on infrastructure). Of equal importance were the unavoidable effects development has had on our natural resources, (such as air and groundwater), as well as the visual degradation of our scenic vistas and ridgelines. Taking a pro-active approach to problem solving was a consistent theme throughout the survey responses. Most believe if we are to prosper as a community, we must act pro-actively and not reactively to facilitate growth in areas that are compatible with a destination resort area but that offer salaries and benefits at a level sufficient enough to raise a family.

The voices behind the survey results are clear. We must continue to evaluate our present land use directives for effectiveness, particularly as they relate to preserving and protecting our New England character and our serene resources. And we must take an active role to facilitate a diverse blend of compatible industries and financial sustainability within our business communities.

The Board has worked effectively with the Ad Hoc committee to develop the basis of a Ridgeline Overlay District the purpose of which is to address the adverse effects development has had on sensitive ridgelines, and scenic vistas and viewpoints along Routes 16 and 302. That work will continue throughout the upcoming year. Thanks to the many contributions of David Publicover, the Board has had the opportunity to work with what can only be described as 'high tech' maps created from various State and Federal topographical information and the town's own statistical data from actual assessing and zoning files. The maps are displayed in the Meeting Room at Town Hall, for anyone wanting to review them.

The Board expects to propose some Performance Standards to be incorporated into the Subdivision Regulations later this year, the purpose of which is to provide guidelines for both the applicant and the Board. Those standards would contain directives to promote certain goals such as (1) minimizing site disturbance and the retention of native topsoil, (2) facilitating vehicular and pedestrian traffic patterns and (3) whenever possible preserving and protecting the rural character and scenic beauty of our community. Hearings will be held on these Performance Standards for your comment. As always, if you are unable to attend a meeting, please consider writing the Board a letter with your comments. Our work cannot be effective if it fails to represent the will of the community.

Finally, I would like to thank those members of the Ad Hoc Committee who continue to support this long and tedious planning effort, in particular, George Howard, Frank Suprenard, Sr., David Publicover and planning board member, Jim Landgon. I would also like to thank Doug Garland, as the ex-officio member of the Board of Selectmen for his outstanding participation and willingness to get involved. His personal commitment, both as a selectman and a member of the Planning Board has bridged the communication gap between the 'planners' and the 'enforcers' that is necessary if we are to work cooperatively for the betterment of our community.

BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT 2000

The 2000 library circulation of books, periodicals and audiovisual materials was 11,575. 1,299 books and materials were added to the collection with 389 being gift books and audiovisual materials. The librarian attended 3 Carroll County Library Cooperative meetings, 1 CHILIS (children's services) meeting, 2 workshops, 1 Five Rivers (NHAIS) meeting and 1 book display meeting.

The library hosted three adult programs that included one humanities program, "Midwives Tale", one workshop on E-Bay and a meeting on how to get started on genealogy. The library also hosted a CliF (Children's Literacy Foundation) celebration for the children in May. At that time our library was the recipient of 80 new children's books funded through a CliF grant. This grant provided two-thirds of the funding for these books. Our library patrons generously provided the other one third of the grant. These books are a wonderful addition to our children's books collection, and are almost always out in circulation.

The library also conducted a summertime reading incentive program, "Reading Cats and Dogs", which included story hours held at Will's Park Tuesday mornings; and a bulletin board in the library entry charting the children's reading progress with kitty and dog prints by their names. This program was kicked off with a presentation, "Animal Mania" by the Little Red Wagon from UNH on July 5th. Volunteers doing the Tuesday story hours were Gloria Brennan, Patrice Mutchnick, Kathy Van Deursen, Janice Mudgett and Ellen Gordon.

The library is a member of the BearCamp Library Video Cooperative, a group of ten libraries which provides a rotating video/audio collection of approximately 80 titles every three months. This collection has videos for all ages.

The library also belongs to the NHAIS system and borrows and circulates materials from libraries throughout the state. During this year the library circulated 426 items to New Hampshire libraries and borrowed 52 books from other libraries.

The library now has a corner for the adults with a computer and computer furniture purchased with funds from the Howard Nichols bequest. This computer has Internet access, and a scanner available to the adult public. In this corner we have genealogy programs and books for those interested in working on their genealogies.

The Public Library hours are listed below. The school library also continues to welcome public library patrons whenever the school is open. Do remember the Bartlett Public Library is <u>your</u> library and is here to serve <u>you</u>.

THE BARTLETT HISTORY FUND

The Bartlett History Fund was established by the Bartlett Library Trustees following the Town's bicentennial in 1990. The purpose of the History Fund is to further the recording of the history of Bartlett and its vicinity. Profits from the sale of the local history, *Bartlett, New Hampshire, In the Valley of the Saco*, and the sale of bicentennial memorabilia were set aside to establish the Bartlett History Fund.

The following guidelines for the Bartlett History Fund have been established:

- All monies received from future sales of the Bartlett History books, bicentennial memorabilia, and any other project undertaken by the Trustees for the History Fund will go into the History Fund.
- This money is put into a separate account under the name "Bartlett History Fund."
- This fund may not be used for the Library budget. The Library may, however, use this fund to purchase books and material relating to the history of the town. These materials will then become a part of the Bartlett History Collection that is being maintained in special fireproof file cabinets.
- The money in the History Fund may be expended for historical projects, pictures, postcards, and other types of historical materials.
- The Bartlett Library Trustees must approve the above expenditures. Donations of materials and monetary gifts may be made to the Fund.

Cash on hand as of December 31, 2000 is \$12,961.02. This fund received a donation from the Bartlett Reunion 2000, of \$1,009.00.

The Library has copies of its two histories: *Bartlett, New Hampshire, In the Valley of the Saco*, and *The Latchstring was Always Out: a History of Lodging Hospitality and Tourism in Bartlett, New Hampshire*, by Aileen Carroll, for sale. These books are also on sale in the local bookstores.

BARTLETT POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Department faced significant challenges in 2000, particularly in the area of coverage. With Corporal Frank Suprenard still recuperating from injuries he received in the November 1999 accident on Hurricane Mountain Road, and Officer R. David Meyers' move to the Carroll County Sheriff's Department, maintaining coverage was difficult. All of the officers, including myself, would be required to cover extra shifts to maintain our present quality of service. As the year continued, staffing problems were unrelenting, we dealt with the loss of Officer Karl Meyers from the duty roster for the 12 weeks he spent at the NH Police Academy and unexpectedly in June, with my extended absence from the department, as I battled with serious health consequences following what was supposed to be routine back surgery.

The offers for coverage from local law enforcement agencies, and the hundreds of cards and letters of support I received were a great comfort. Perhaps, the greatest contribution and the one I am most proud of, is the one hundred and ten percent that Officer Terrence Spittler, and Special Officers Cheryl Price and Sol Rosman continued to give in service to their community and the remarkable, Brenda Bowley, who is always willing and able to step up to the plate whenever she's needed. Her ability to manage the myriad of challenges she faced in my absence at the department and still act as a secretary, confidant, publicist, taxi service and friend to me and my family, is testimony to the importance of her 15 years of service with the Bartlett Police Department and the Town of Bartlett.

I was able to return to work in late July, and Officer Karl Meyers graduated from the 123rd Police Academy, which helped with coverage. Staffing problems continue into 2001, primarily as a result of the vacancy created by Corporal Suprenard's accident and the continuing demand for part-time specials. This year I have proposed improvements to the salary and benefit package of our officers, in part to insure financial parity, but more importantly to recognize the standard of excellence achieved by the members of this department and to insure we are able to attract qualified officers capable of meeting that same standard of excellence in the future.

As we evaluate the statistical information from 2000 and look toward 2001, one can predict a proportional increase in the numbers of "incidents" consistent with the growth patterns of the area and the ever-changing national economy. If we are to maintain the present level of service throughout the next decade, we can expect a heightened demand for coverage, physical space and greater technological capability. With adequate planning, I believe we can meet those challenges in a manner that is both first rate and fiscally responsible.

We are very appreciative of the donations received. We recently purchased a new defibrillator that has state of the art capabilities. The support of the communities that we serve is an important aspect of our success and we thank you! Thank you to the Town crew, the Fire Department and the Police Department for all of the assistance that you give us during the year. Many local businesses have donated food and drinks during the structure fires that we covered and to them we say Thanks a million!

BARTLETT FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT 2000

This past year the department responded to 200 calls for services, an increase of 16 calls over 1999. In the last 10 years our calls for services have more than doubled with 90 calls in 1990 and increasing every year since.

Most of the new homes that are being built now are installing fire alarm systems, consequently this is increasing our calls for alarm activations, one third of our alarms are from alarm activations.

The new fire engine that was delivered last town meeting day has seen lots of action this past year. This engine is an extremely valuable asset to the department and is working out much better than we anticipated.

Our firemen are a dedicated group of individuals that want to make Bartlett a safer place to live in to the best of their ability. One of the ways this is done is through training.

Training is an ongoing process within the department, we train twice monthly from 2 to 4 hours per training, on different aspects of fire fighting and emergency operations.

I would like to say thank you to the families of these individuals for sharing them with us and letting them be a very important part of this community.

As always I would like to say thank you to our elected officials, Chief Snow and his department, the ambulance service, and all the mutual services that we call on for assistance and support.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER ANNUAL REPORT 2000

There are 2,200 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The number of fires reported during the 2000 fire season was below average as referenced in the statistics below. Despite this, our network of fire towers and detection patrols were still quite busy with the fire towers being first to report over 135 fires. These fires were quickly and accurately reported to the local fire department for their prompt and effective suppression efforts. Wildland fires occurring in areas where homes are situated in the woodlands are a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Please contact the Forest Protection Bureau to request a brochure to assist you in assessing fire safety around your home and woodlands.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ALL outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forest and Lands, Forests Protection Bureau. Forest Rangers have investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217, or for general information visit our website at www.dred.state.nh.us.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection sys-

tem and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. These factors are critical in controlling the size of wildland fires, keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible. Due to permitting and fire safety concerns, please contact your local fire department BEFORE using portable outdoor fireplaces and vessels including those constructed of clay, concrete or wire mesh.

Please contact your local fire department before doing \underline{ANY} outside burning.

BARTLETT RECREATION DEPARTMENT 2000 ANNUAL REPORT

It has been an exciting first nine months of operation for the Bartlett Recreation Department. It has been my pleasure as Director of the department to support the department's mission of providing quality recreation programs and services to the community. Promoting participation by all citizens in diverse, interesting and high-quality recreational and educational opportunities in safe, modern and enriching environments has become a major responsibility of recreation departments across the country. It is now our responsibility to provide these opportunities to people of all ages here in Bartlett, NH and enhance the quality of life of all the Bartlett citizens we serve.

The creation of the Bartlett Recreation Department was a huge step forward for the Bartlett community. The Department has taken official membership into the Carroll County Recreation Association and the New Hampshire Recreation and Parks Association, providing other town recreation departments with a consistent source of contact. In order to operate at our potential, it is important that we are visible within our community as well as surrounding communities. This year we have taken the first steps which are necessary to establish the Bartlett Recreation Department as a valuable community driven organization. During the year 2000 more than 20 press releases were issued by the department. We have also begun to promote our services through the recent creations of a weekly newsletter, a quarterly publication called Bear Tracks, and initial development of a web site.

Youth sports continue to be the backbone of our department. We are proud to provide a variety of athletic activities at no cost to the participants. As the number of participants in our sports programs continues to increase, there is rising pressure to provide adequate space for all. Over 130 children have participated in Fall Soccer, Fall Field Hockey, Winter Basketball and Spirit Squad programs.

After School Enrichment programs for the children of Bartlett also took a leap forward in the year 2000. The addition of the Jump Start Arts after school arts program provides the community with a consistent enriching after school program each week of the school year. In addition to Jump Start Arts, the department has offered numerous other after school programs including rock climbing clinics, mountain bike rides, a Harry Potter activity series, Christmas crafts, and also various after school clubs like the Technology Club, Writing Club, Guitar Club, and Outing Club. However, a need still exists for more enrichment activities, and especially those which can be offered at little or no cost to the underprivileged children of the community.

The Bartlett Community enjoyed one of the most comprehensive Adult Education programs in recent memory in the year 2000. The pro-

gram was an overwhelming success, and serviced over 120 adults in the community. We are very excited by the potential of this program.

Adults in Bartlett enjoyed participation in weekly Adult Basketball and Volleyball in the year 2000 as well. The number of participants continues to increase, and we hope to expand the programs in 2001 to operate as Basketball and Volleyball leagues. Despite the success of Adult programming, there is a need to service more of the Adult community, and especially senior citizens.

The Bartlett Recreation Department's summer program, B.E.A.R. Camp 2000, was one of the most successful programs provided by the recreation department this year. Major organizational improvements were made to provide a more structured camp atmosphere for the campers in attendance, and the program averaged more than 50 children at camp per week. The campers enjoyed a variety of activities, from rock climbing to summer dog sledding, and culminating in a final week of Olympic style competition between the campers and counselors where everyone received a medal. Despite the program's overwhelming success, there is much room for improvement. The sheer numbers of children involved sometimes made activities difficult, and perhaps a more structured registration process could alleviate these challenges. Other challenges facing the program include transportation and the hiring of quality personnel on a limited budget.

A community based organization can often be judged by the quality of the special events it provides to the community. The Recreation Department's first year of events was a successful one. The 4th of July Celebration received rave reviews from community members and visiting tourists, and the event including a live concert for the first time ever. The department continued to bring the community together and develop a base of volunteers throughout the summer through events like the Equine Festival, the Bartlett Rec Soccer Camp, and a trip for Foxboro, MA where the Recreation Department was recognized on the stadium scoreboard. The year's events culminated in the spirit of the holidays with the very successful Annual Tree Lighting ceremony, and an evening of caroling with the Parks Committee. We look forward to providing an entire year's worth of special events for the community in 2001.

This past summer we have had some changes in the Highway Department. First of all, Pat Roberts went on to better things for him. He now works with his Dad, Lynn Roberts, and seems quite content with his new position. Vin Bailey was asked to become the Road Agent and, after much thought, did accept the position. Earle Fernald was hired to fill the vacancy and is working out very well.

We rebuilt 1800 feet of Cobb Farm Road with the help of A. E. Eastman and his crew. We spent a considerable amount of money on much needed shim (hot top) material on some of our roads. We also did some sealing on other roads.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Bartlett Conservation Commission has a new member, Julia King. We welcome her aboard.

Our major activity this past year has been site visits for NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) Wetlands applications. The purpose of these site visits is to help DES make more informed decisions about granting permits for these projects and under what conditions. Such project visits have included: culverts on seasonal streams, an area prone to flooding, an area prone to erosion, and a construction project along the Saco. In several instances, the Bartlett Board of Selectmen have written DES supporting our recommendations. We thank them for that support.

The Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) passed the NH State Legislature. Its purpose is to preserve New Hampshire's special places such as barns, bridges, and natural areas. A substantial part of the preservation costs must be borne locally by private and/or governmental sources. Scholarship Fund

This year's golf tournament was another great success, thanks to all those who participated. With the promise of good weather and the tournament's growing popularity both here in the Mt. Washington Valley and throughout New England, a full roster of eager players, weighted down with welcome bags and reams of raffle tickets, were off.

The distinctive list of auction items highlighted by some very special signed sports memorabilia, (an over-night stay at the Mt. Washington Observatory on the Summit of Mt. Washington, and a 7 night RCI vacation package) brought in record bids. Raffle sales soared this year with prizes like, Season Passes at Black Mountain and Attitash Bear Peak, a weekend's lodging for 2 at the award-winning Old Field House on Route 16A, and tons of gift certificates to local stores and restaurants. No one won the 2000 Chevy offered by Crest Chevrolet & Palmer Insurance for a hole-in-one but stand by, next year's prize is a brand new Harley Davidson Motorcycle from Meredith-Conway Harley Davidson in Conway!

Proceeds from the tournament benefit the Attitash Bartlett Aspirations Compact (ABAC) Scholarship Program, which was first established in 1994 to provide a source of veritable funding for all graduating Bartlett high school students in their pursuit of post secondary education or training. Consistent with their pledge to the community in 1994 (to match funds up to \$15,000) Attitash Bear Peak Resort presented to the ABAC Scholarship Fund, a check in the amount of \$12,335.00 in matching funds for the money raised in 1999.

The annual tournament, under the direction of Norman Head and the Tournament Committee, is our primary fund raising effort. The nearly non-stop year-a-round effort of the committee, combined with the generous support from our sponsors and players and the significant Attitash Bear Peak Resort contribution of matching funds have enabled us to raise nearly \$70,000 since 1994, with our first class eligible for funding in 2003.

To insure a high rate of return over the long term, a portion of the funds have been invested in Mutual Funds under the direction of Lasker Financial Services and in long term investment programs through the Berlin City Bank. In addition, professional accounting services (at a significantly reduced rate) have been procured from Richard Goss of Conway.

In addition to the outstanding contributions of the tournament committee, the fourth grade students of the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School and their parents are responsible for organizing the volunteer component for the annual golf tournament. 2000 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

Moderator Robert Clark opened Town Meeting by opening the polls at the Town Hall on Tuesday, March 14, 2000 at 8:00 AM by reading the following:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, March 14, 2000 at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1-5 will be by official ballot at the Town Hall and the polls shall open for balloting at eight o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening. The following articles (Articles 6 - 31) in the warrant will be acted upon on Thursday, March 16, 2000 at six thirty o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

We hereby certify that we posted a like copy of said Town Warrant and Budget on February 28, 2000 at the Post Offices in Glen and Bartlett; at the Town Hall in Intervale (Bartlett) and the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School (the places of meeting), all being public places within the said Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire. Board of Selectmen: Gene G. Chandler, David W. Roode, Richard F. Patch, Sr.

Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Gail Paine to open the polls to vote on Articles 1-5 and then to recess the meeting at 7:00 PM until Thursday, March 16, 2000 at 6:30 PM at the Bartlett School for the deliberative portion. Vote = PASSED and the polls were opened on the following Articles 1-5:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article IX Green Areas Section A to allow for exceptions to the green area requirements as they apply to ski trails, golf course fairways, or other such limited uses; to include a provision waiving green area requirements on common boundaries of contiguous lots under control of the same entity or person through a Special Use Permit from the US Forest Service; and to provide for side

and rear green areas for pre-existing, non-conforming commercial uses in the Town Residential District A. (Planning Board favors, Selectmen Patch/Chandler oppose, Roode favors)

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article XIII Permitted Uses Section C to allow for a Multifunction Research, Education, and/or Cultural Facility and add the definition to Article XIX. (Planning Board favors, Selectmen favor)

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article XIII Permitted Uses Section C to allow for a Research Facility and add the definition to Article XIX. (Planning Board favors, Selectmen favor)

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article XI Setbacks Section A-1 to exempt structures from setback requirements on common boundaries of contiguous lots under control of the same entity or person through a Special Use Permit from the US Forest Service. (Planning Board favors, Selectmen oppose)

The meeting was recessed until Thursday, March 16, 2000 at 6:30 PM at the Bartlett School.

Moderator Clark then opened the deliberative portion of Town Meeting on Thursday, March 16, 2000 at 6:35 PM at the Bartlett School. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Ashley Stancik. Clark then read the results of the voting held on Tuesday, March 14, 2000, explained Bartlett's rules of order that would be followed for this meeting and stated that Valley Vision was videotaping this meeting. Clark also announced that the new fire truck, approved at least year's meeting, arrived 2 hours ago and was on display out front for those who would like to view it. Fire Chief Roger Labbe stated that there would be an

open house of sorts in the future for people to come see it. (Approximately 90 people were present) Clark continued and addressed the rest of the warrant as follows:

ARTICLE 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Selectman Gene Chandler, seconded by Selectman David Roode to accept the article in the amount of \$1,154,400. Chandler spoke to the article going through the budget in detail by department. A few questions were asked and answered. Peter Villaume, a member of the fire department, asked when would be the appropriate time to add \$3,000 to the fire dept. budget for computers. Chandler responded that back during the budget preparation time would have been the best time to do it but anyone could amend the budget. Chandler asked Fire Chief Roger Labbe if he knew about this and Chief Labbe stated he just found out about this a few nights ago. After consulting with his fellow Selectmen. Chandler stated that the Selectmen would not be in favor of this at this time, although it may be a good idea, that there was a process that these types of items go through during the budget preparation, the Fire Chief had not requested it, and since we didn't know anything about it until now, there may be some programs or grants available for such things or a better way to do it which could have been looked at. Villaume made a motion, which was seconded, to amend the fire dept. budget to add \$3,000 to purchase two computers. Jeanne Forrest asked how much the software cost would be and Villaume answered about \$1,500 but that the dept. planned to fund raise and ask for donations to get this program. John Murphy (Dundee Rd.) stated that the dept, should get the donations for the computers and let the town pay for the software. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment = PASSED (+\$3,000). Chandler continued explaining the rest of the budget. Tom Caughey asked whether anything had been done about the problem of the salt shed at the highway garage and its killing the trees along the river. Chandler responded no. Chandler went on to explain that he was going to make a motion to amend the police and highway dept. budgets due to the proposed increases in fuel prices, that the Selectmen had already accounted for increases in heating costs, but now that fuel prices were predicted to go even higher, we needed to provide for this. He also went on to say that there may be some changes done at the Transfer Station as a result of a visit two

weeks ago from NE Resource Recovery giving us suggestions on the handling of some of the re-cyclables, such as using a baler. and some extra funds would be needed to do this. Tom Caughey made a motion, which was seconded, to move \$1,000 from the treeplanting budget item and put it in General Government Buildings to address a study of the salt shed on the Town Hall property. No further discussion. Vote was taken = PASSED. Clark pointed out this would have no effect on the bottom line of the budget. Motion was made by Chandler, seconded by Roode to add \$2,000 to the police budget, \$2,000 to the highway budget for potential increased costs for gasoline, and \$4,000 to the Solid Waste budget for possible changes in handling items at the Transfer Station (for a total of \$8,000). Vote was taken on the amendment = PASSED (+\$8,000). Vote was taken on the article as amended = PASSED (\$1.154.400 + \$3.000 + \$8.000 =\$1,165,400 total amended budget).

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125,000 for town road improvements. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article and referenced the road outline provided on voting day and at this meeting. Bob "Homer" Holmes questioned how much was spent on last year's road article, whether the balance would be spent on roads or is it in surplus, and demanding a guarantee that it won't be put in surplus. Chandler stated that approximately \$53,000 was left over and was committed to a contract with LA Drew Inc. to do the Alpendorf road in the spring, however, the money is sitting in surplus right now but will be paid out when the job is complete. Bill Fabrizio stated that there appears to be a shortfall in the roads not completed last year and some appear to be in the outline twice, are they in this article again? Chandler responded giving the priority in which roads are done and stating that funding is not in there twice. Bill Duggan stated that he has asked for a plan for the last 3 years and while this outline is a start, the town needs to spend some money in planning and bring in some professionals to come up with a plan of road reconstruction. Motion was made and seconded to move the question. Vote on moving the question - PASSED. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$125,000).

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,000 for the purchase of a new marked police cruiser and related communication/safety equipment. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the

article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining that we are replacing the 1996 Crown Victoria that has 170,000 miles on it. Homer Holmes asked whether this cruiser would have roof lights and requested that all cruisers on patrol have roof lights. Chandler explained that he was not sure where in the rotation it would go, if it becomes the Chief's car it would have a low profile light package but if it ended up on patrol, it would have roof lights. Selectman Richard Patch, Sr. further explained the breakdown of the cruisers and their roof lights and markings. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$22.000).

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for maintenance and repairs at the Bartlett Village Fire Station. Specific projects may include replacement of overhead doors, installation of a new furnace and painting the building. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining the proposed repairs. The question was asked whether there was any money to install sanitary facilities. Chandler replied no and that there probably wasn't enough land there for a septic system anyway. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$15,000).

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,900 for a new stainless steel sander body which was ordered last fall to replace an unusable sander body. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. Homer Holmes asked how many stainless sanders we have now. Chandler responded there were 5 including the one on the one-ton truck. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$9,900).

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 as the town's 20% share as part of the State Bridge Aid program for repairs on the bridge on Town Hall Road that crosses the East Branch River. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining that this was one of those opportunities we are trying to take advantage of its timing (like we do with road projects mentioned in the road outline) and we tried to get the Forest Service to pay for this, however, they indicated they couldn't but offered other suggestions on getting money from the user fee fund. No discussion. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$15,000).

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,900 as its share of final closure of the septage lagoons. The Town of Jackson and the landowner shared in the total cost of closure which was completed in 1999. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article stating that although the town was not accepting responsibility for closing the lagoons, due to the State ready to file legal action, it was cheaper to have this agreement with the owner and get it cleaned up under a less stringent guideline than it was to fight it in court. No discussion. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$4.900).

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for a new 4 wheel drive, extended cab pickup truck for the Fire Department, replacing the existing pickup truck. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining that we have had the current truck as long as we have had a full time fire chief which is since 1989. No discussion. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$25,000).

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for site work regarding possible ground contamination resulting from the removal of underground tanks at the Town Garage. Revenue from the State Oil Fund will offset this expenditure. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article and explained there would be no net cost to the town due to the Oil Fund reimbursement. Tom Caughey stated that since the Town Hall property is located in the protective well radius of the Lower Bartlett Water Precinct that this cleanup is important and that it occur in a timely fashion. John Murphy (Dundee Rd.) asked people to look on p. 18-19 of the Town Report paragraph 3-4 and what the Selectmen mean. Moderator Clark asked whether this was pertinent to Art. 14 and Murphy stated no, it was getting ready for the next article. Moderator ruled him out of order and moved on. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$15.000).

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 as its share of the establishment and operation of a town/school recreation department. (This sum represents 8 months of the town's share). If approved, these funds will be combined with funds raised at School Meeting to

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provide for the establishment and operation of a town-wide recreation department as tentatively approved at the 1999 Town Meeting Article 13, Selectmen favor, Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article giving the history of last year's article then stated he would recognize Leslie Mallett, Chairman of the Recreation Study Committee, to address the article, John Murphy (Dundee Rd.) again asked that people turn to p. 18-19 paragraphs 3-4 and asked what do the Selectmen mean by this and they're not doing what they say in the paragraphs. Homer Holmes called for a point of order in that this had nothing to do with the article at hand and should be addressed under the last article of any other business. Moderator Clark agreed and ruled Murphy out of order. Murphy commented that the spenders win again. Mallett then spoke to the article citing the handout of the proposed budget and report in the Town Report for reference. Frank Graham spoke in support of the article stating the importance of spending money on the kids to prevent them from turning to crime as in the cities. John Murphy (Dundee Rd.) directed voters to look in the school budget also and see that the money is all going to salaries. Homer Holmes stated he wanted to get the \$15,000 leftover from last year's article back in the recreation budget and defeat this article, but that he supports the recreation department. Chandler explained the procedures concerning the carrying forward of balances of appropriations and how surplus works. Paula and Frank Graham and Bob Boynton spoke in favor of the article. Motion was made and seconded to move the question. Vote was taken on moving the question = PASSED. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$12.000).

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to send the following resolution to the New Hampshire General Court: Resolved, New Hampshire's natural, cultural and historic resources in this town and throughout the state are worthy of protection and, therefore, the State of New Hampshire should establish and fund a permanent public/private partnership for the voluntary conservation of these important resources. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Publicover and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. David Armington spoke to the article at the request of David Publicover, lead petitioner, as he had to be out of town, stating the importance of the article. Chandler explained why the Selectmen were opposed due to the inappropriateness of the

article appearing on the town warrant when it was a State legislative issue, the precedence it would set, and then the matter of the funding of it, preferring any increase in funding go to the State Education Property Tax issue. Motion was made to move the question but Moderator Clark overruled it because the next speaker was up and at the microphone prior to the motion. Richard Chrenko spoke to the article stating he also felt it was inappropriate for a town meeting warrant and that the funding issue was a problem, suggesting that each visitor contribute funding in an amount which represents spending one day in NH participating in the activity they would normally do while visiting the State and that clubs send a letter to all out of state members asking for this type of contribution. No further discussion. Vote was taken = FAILED.

David Shedd asked about procedure for reconsideration of the article. Chandler explained through the Moderator that it had to be someone who voted in the majority (which would be "No") on Article 16 who could bring a motion for reconsideration. Since no one did, the meeting went forward to the next article.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, at their discretion, to distribute to Valley Vision up to 20 percent of the franchise fee the town receives from Adelphia Cable. The town receives approximately \$30,000. This expenditure not to exceed \$6,000 and is for the betterment of Valley Vision television programming. Valley Vision is a nonprofit organization and an educational governmental cable television station. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Glines and others. Patch opposes, Chandler/Roode support lesser amount. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Clark pointed out that they are here taping tonight. Homer Holmes spoke to the article explaining the source of the franchise fee and claimed that the Selectmen have never asked in the last 11 years' Town Reports that he looked in, what the people wanted to do with the franchise fee, and that he wanted to amend the article to read \$31,199.11, that it be put in a trust fund and the trustees of the trust funds would issue a check once a month to Valley Vision. He went on to state the programs he would like to see taped including school events, Selectmen, Planning Board and School Board meetings and indicated the Selectmen changed their vote on their support of this article. Clark asked for the exact wording of Holmes'

amendment. Holmes repeated it. Chandler called for a point of order and Clark stated that you can not change the article to form a trust fund because it was not the original intent of the article as warned but you can change the dollar amount. Scott Grant called for a point of order to vote on the amended motion and asked to call the question. Moderator Clark ruled that we hadn't gotten a second on the amendment and we would need to get the actual motion before we could vote on it and then we could call the question if they wanted. Holmes asked to amend the article to \$31,199,11 and assured the voters that he would come back next year with a warrant article written and passed by Conway that should pass all federal regulations concerning trusts. Clark asked for second to the motion to raise the amount to \$31,199,11 and received one. Richard Glines, Bartlett's representative to the Board of Directors of Valley Vision, spoke to the article explaining that Holmes has some facts right and some facts wrong but he (Glines) opposes the amendment because he would prefer to crawl, then walk, then run, that Valley Vision has made some changes and would like to see what they can do before giving them all the money.

Chandler explained the Selectmen's position on the article. that the issue of asking to use the franchise fee was addressed years ago at a Town Meeting when we asked if the town wanted to extend service to areas that did not meet the criteria of the contract for no. of homes/mile and use the franchise fee for expansion into those areas which was passed. The other years it was used to reduce taxes as a revenue. Scott Grant asked to call the question again but Moderator Clark stated that a speaker was at the microphone ready to speak and that he will call for a vote after that speaker. Bob Boynton asked about the status of RSN in relation to Valley Vision and how solvent Valley Vision is? Glines responded that they were doing pretty good and that people ask him how to explain the difference between Valley Vision and RSN and he tells them that RSN has all the pretty girls and Valley Vision has all the wanna-bes that want to be be's, Moderator Clark recognized the call for the question on the amendment to \$31,199.11. Vote was taken on the amendment = FAILED. The question was also called on Art. 17 as written. Vote was taken = PASSED (not to exceed \$6,000).

Moderator Clark jokingly stated that just because he stated earlier that he had been reading up on all the parliamentary procedure didn't mean the people had to push him on it all night. ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Cynthia Cini and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No speaker for the article and no discussion. Vote was taken on the article = FAILED.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for dues to the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council. Selectmen oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Kathy Nealley, Bartlett's Representative to the Council, spoke to the article stating this was a reduction in the usual appropriation due to a restructuring of the dues which is now based on number of Town employees. No discussion. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$100).

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,707 to help defray the costs of Service Delivery of the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert Boynton, Jr. and others. Chandler/Patch oppose - not a proper use of town funds for national organizations; people should have an individual choice concerning donations to charitable organizations/Roode favors. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Bob Boynton spoke to the article, explaining that expenses had gone down, and then made the motion, which was seconded, to reduce the amount to \$1,200. No discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment = PASSED \$1,200. Vote was taken on the article as amended = PASSED (\$1,200).

Motion was made and seconded to address Articles 21-29 as a block. Chandler asked (jokingly) whether any of the other representatives for the agencies were going to ask for a reduction in their amounts as the Red Cross did. No one spoke up. No further discussion. Vote was taken on addressing Articles 21-29 as a block. Vote was taken = PASSED. Vote was then taken on Articles 21-29 = PASSED (Total of all articles = \$24,130).

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,755 for the Children's Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Steve Miller and others. Selectmen oppose. (PASSED).

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for support of the Tri-County Community Action Program for the purpose of continuing ser-

vices of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert Burcaw and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED).

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,275 to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen oppose. (PASSED).

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for support of operating expenses of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport Authority. Selectmen favor. (PASSED).

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the support of Starting Point for providing crisis services to victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Karen Hebert and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED).

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,326 for the Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED).

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,780 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED).

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,769 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Yvonne Kinsman and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED).

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum \$1,725 for the Early Support and Services Program (birth to 3 years) of Children Unlimited, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kimberly Perley and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED).

Moderator Clark then continued with the rest of the warrant articles.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75,000 as provided in NH RSA 231:28 (the Betterment Assessment law) to construct North Ledge Road to an acceptable town road standard. All costs incurred by said construction would be borne by the abutting landowners through a betterment assessment and, therefore, there would be no effect on the

tax rate. Selectmen favor, Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. explained the betterment assessment process and due to the lateness of the filing of the petition, we were unable to hold a hearing in order to bond it over a period of 3-5 years, therefore, the abutters may not want to go forward with this knowing they have to pay for it in one year. Scott Moffett, a resident of the road, asked if this meant they couldn't bond it in the future if they pass this tonight. Chandler stated it wouldn't make a difference what they did tonight, but if they wanted to bond it over time, that it would have to wait a year so that the proper hearings could be held next year. Tom Caughey stated he wanted to amend the article to read that unless 100% of the people on the road agree to participate in it, that the Selectmen not proceed. Chandler stated that he didn't think the Selectmen could abide by that amendment as the Betterment Assessment law is written so that you don't have to get 100% agreement from the abutters. Caughey withdrew his amendment but stated he doesn't think it is fair to the property owners to have to pay in one year just because of bad timing of the petition submission. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (Moderator asked for a hand vote).

ARTICLE 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Moderator Clark reminded voters that the Annual School District Meeting would be held on Tuesday, March 21, 2000 at 7 PM at the School. Clark also recognized outgoing Selectman David Roode for his 6 years of service to the town. Roode thanked the people and the community for their support over the years, it was a great experience, a learning experience, and that Doug (Garland) would do a good job. He went on to say (jokingly) that his one regret was that the guy he wanted to thank the most was his self-appointed campaign manager, Norman Head, who is not here tonight, he did a good job and his timing was impeccable. Roger Labbe then addressed the audience on behalf of the Roberts family thanking the Selectmen for dedicating the Town Report this year to the late Michael Roberts, John Murphy (Dundee Rd.) stated that people should raise the percent taken from the cable TV franchise fee to pay for stuff from 3% to 30% because he doesn't get cable TV. Jeanne Forrest asked the Selectmen how they were going to determine what Valley Vision got. Chandler stated they had discussed \$2,000 (the Selectmen that supported it) but that the dynamics of the Board may have changed now as a result of the election, so that may change the Board's position and they would consult the town's rep. to the Valley Vision Board of Directors.

Motion was made and seconded to adjourn. Vote = ADJOURNED at 9:20 PM.

TOWN OF BARTLETT REGULATIONS

The Town of Bartlett Officials closely monitor compliance with the following ordinances, regulations, and by-laws. This list is provided to make people aware that these regulations exist and a summary of each regulation appears here. Complete descriptions may be obtained from the Selectmen's Office and any questions should be directed to that office.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1 (24 hours a day). Violation = fine of up to \$50.00 plus towing charges.

SNOW PLOWING REGULATION: prohibits the plowing of snow into or across any town road.

EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: requires permits to be acquired 24 hours prior to excavation in a town road. Violation - fine of \$100.00.

ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized areas at the Transfer Station. Violation - fine of \$100.00.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places. Violation - fine of \$25.00.

TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for State septic design approval. Fee of \$20.00 per pit dug.

SEPTIC SYSTEM DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION ORDINANCE: governs the design and construction of septic systems and requires all septic system designs, prior to submission to the State, to be reviewed by the Selectmen's Office. Fee of \$50.00 per design.

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction valued at \$1,000 or more, AND/OR which would affect the assessed value of a property, AND/OR to which zoning requirements apply. Violation = fine of up to \$100/day.

PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation = fine of up to \$100 and/or \$10/day each day of violation.

ZONING ORDINANCE: requires compliance with such items as signs, setbacks, density, green areas, frontage, permitted uses, etc.

FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE: governs activity in the floodplain.

GRAVEL PIT ORDINANCE: governs excavation of gravel pits.

DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation - fine of up to \$100 plus board reimbursement.

SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events. Violation = fine of up to \$300.

ELECTIONEERING ORDINANCE: eliminates all electioneering or signature gathering on Town or School owned property at any meetings or elections held within the Town of Bartlett.
