# TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 7:30 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline in the County of Hills-borough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Brookline on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 2% discount for payment of property taxes within thirty (30) days of the date of the billing, or take any action relative thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to advertise for bids and to enter into a contract for snow plowing. Duration of the contract to be negotiated in the best interest of the Town, or take any action relative thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Land Acquisition Fund. (Recommends 2-0)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-B; provided that no additional Town monies be spent. (Recommends 2-0)
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$522.54 to secure state aid for Class IV and V Construction, Reconstruction or Betterment Aid (Chapter 241, Section 2, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended). (Recommends 2-0)

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith: (Recommends 2-0)

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 to be used for renovations and improvements to the Town Hall, or take any action thereon. (Recommends 2-0)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to upgrade Cleveland Hill Road, or take any action thereon. (Recommends 2-0)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be granted to St. Joseph Community Services, Inc. to help defray the cost of services rendered to persons from Brookline. (Not Recommended 2-0)
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Fire Department Capital Equipment Reserve Fund, or take any action thereon. (Not Recommended 2-0)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in an Ambulance Capital Equipment Reserve Fund, or take any action thereon. (Not Recommended 2-0)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to charge \$35.00 per ambulance call, said charge to be used exclusively to defray town expenses relating to ambulance service.
- 17. To see if the Town will revoke the power granted to the Planning Board pursuing to RSA 36:19 A to review non residential site plans. Power was granted in 1977. (By Petition)
- 18. (By Ballot) Are you in favor of eliminating the board of assessors as elected officers, in accordance with RSA 59:12-a?
- 19. (At Meeting) To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual

increase in both taxes and spending by the state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent unless approved by a 2/3 vote of those present and voting of such taxing or spending authority. (by petition)

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following legacies:

- Article 1. We elected Town Officers.
- Article 2. We raised \$211,293. to defray Town expenses.
- Article 3. We accepted all reports printed and oral.
- **Article 4.** We authorized the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5. We authorized a 2% discount for payment of property taxes within 30 days of billing.
- Article 6. We raised \$500.00 to be placed in the Land Acquisition Fund for Conservation Purposes.
- Article 7. We passed over the article regarding Brookline's Master Plan.
- Article 8. We voted to accept and apply for any state, federal, or private money in accordance with RSA 31:95-b.
- Article 9. We raised \$528.03 for state aid for Class IV and V road construction.
- **Article 10.** We authorized the appropriations of Revenue Sharing Funds.
- Article 11. We authorized the Selectmen to negotiate a contract for rental of the Town Hall to the Brookline Grange.
- Article 12. We raised \$7000. for lower Town Hall renovations.
- Article 13. We authorized withdrawal for \$2475.54 plus interest from the Capital Reserve Fund for basement remodeling for further improvements to lower Town Hall.
- Article 14. We authorized the Selectmen to use the unexpended balance of the Heating System appropriation for improvements or repairs to the Town Hall.

#### Recessed to Wednesday, March 12 at 8:00 P.M.

- Article 15. We passed over the article regarding conveying Tax Map #c-003.
- Article 16. We authorized the sale of premises at 47 Pepperell Road to such of previous owners who paid back taxes, interest and penalties within 35 days; and in default of payment to sell by advertised sealed bid.
- Article 17. We passed over the article regarding conveyance of Tax Map #B-055-11D, owned by the Town by Tax Collector's deed, by advertised sealed bid.
- Article 18. We raised \$20,000. to upgrade Cleveland Hill Road.
- Article 19. We authorized withdrawal of \$4332.23 plus interest from Capital Reserve for Road Improvements to use as set-off.
- Article 20. We raised \$10,000. for Fire Dept. Capital Equipment Reserve Fund.

- Article 21. We voted to allow the Fire Dept. to put an addition on the rear of the Fire Station: to selectively cut timber from Town property (Tax Map #J-035) and appropriate \$8000. for additional supplies.
- Article 22. We voted to have the Fire Steward appointed by the Fire Engineers.
- Article 23. We voted to permit party affiliation changes to be made with the Town Clerk.
- Article 24. We voted not to change the term of the Tax Collector from one year to three years.
- Article 25. We voted not to have the Police Chief appointed by the Selectmen.
- Article 26. We voted not to change the term of the Town Treasurer from one year to three years.
- Article 27. We voted to accept the legacies as printed.
- Article 28. We passed over the Article regarding naming the intersection of Steam Mill Hill and Main St. "Lawrence E. Corey Square". It was discussed there must be a more appropriate way to commemorate the contributions of Lawrence Corey.

# REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

## REPORT OF THE FIRE ENGINEERS

The Brookline Fire Department enjoyed a very active year in 1980. The construction of the addition to the fire station has been a year long project. Hundreds of hours were put into felling trees, digging out for foundations, pouring concrete and finally building the structure. In addition to the money raised by the town, thousands of dollars were earned by the cutting of trees, donations by the fire company and earned in a raffle. Interior finishing remains to be done with some of the latter monies.

The department responded to sixty seven incidents ranging from overheated ballasts to structure fires with losses in the thousands of dollars. The number of chimney related fires rose to fourteen and is an increasing cause of concern with the numerous new installations of solid fuel stoves and furnaces. Inspections of at least twenty such installations were made this year. Again we urge the townspeople to inspect their stoves for proper clearances and their chimneys for faults and cleanliness.

In addition we logged thirteen brush fires, four gas washdowns, seven responses to automatic alarms, five structure fires and several others in different categories.

We also responded to fourteen calls for Mutual Aid to surrounding towns and wish to call to your attention the increasing cooperation of the area towns. It is appropriate at this time to thank the towns of Hollis, Mason, Milford and Townsend for their efforts in our behalf this past year.

The Souhegan Mutual Fire Aid Association is at present conducting a study which it is believed will lead to a communication center for all the member communities. This should be a first step leading to lower insurance rates and lower overall costs of fire suppression in future years.

In the meantime, we in Brookline must improve our water delivery capacity and intend to purchase four inch hose each year over the next few years.

We also have placed an article in the warrant to raise \$10,000 to add to our Capital Reserve Fund to help ease the shock when soon we shall replace our 1950 vehicle.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1980

## Chief Earl W. Bosquet

The year of 1980 has been a very active year for the Police Department. Increases in burglaries, motor-vehicle accidents and investigations, assaults, arrests, juvenile problems and all types of complaints are on the increase, as they are in all towns and cities. As in other areas, alcohol and drugs are also on the increase, this particularly in many juvenile cases and complaints.

The use of the cruiser which the Town purchased has proven a great asset to the Department.

In respect to my officers, with their able assistance and their time involved as part-time officers, I wish to express my gratitude for making it possible, because of their efforts in working with me, to have successfully achieved over 90% coverage on the increase of activity required by the Dept. during the past year.

Each year finds it more difficult to find new officers for the Dept. The requirements for training, such as police educational courses in Court-Procedures, Report-writing, Investigations and knowledge of State and Town laws require many hours of study before an officer is qualfiled to serve as a police-officer. Each year the training requirements for qualified police-officers is getting greater. These requirements no longer allow untrained, unqualified police-officers to serve in this capacity. At the present time the State of New Hampshire is working on a plan to certify all full and part-time officers. This plan calls for all police officers to be certified before or in July of 1982.

At this time I would like to thank the many citizens in their effort to make Brookline a safer place to live by their co-operation and support to the Police Department.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March, 1981, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 2. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, the Cooperative School District Planning Committee, other Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire, or from any other source.

## **BROOKLINE SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING**

## March 6, 1980

The Annual School District Meeting for Brookline was held at the Town Hall on Thursday, March 6, 1980, at 8:00 p.m. Moderator Thomas Arnold opened the meeting at 8:00 p.m. with the reading of the warrant.

Article 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Fred Loskamp moved that this article be passed over and acted upon under Article 8, seconded by Richard Maghakian. So voted.

Article 2. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Marcia Farwell moved that all reports, including the Secondary School Building Study Committee Report printed in The Brookliner, be accepted as printed, seconded by Fred Loskamp. Motion carried.

Article 3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Donald Smith moved that the moderator appoint a five member Salary Review Committee. At least one member should be from the School Board, one from the Board of Selectmen, one from the Finance Committee and two from the public.

Each elected official and each department head or committee chairperson shall before May 15, 1980, supply the Salary Review Committee with a list of the tasks he or his personnel perform.

The Salary Review Committee shall, before September 1, 1980, prepare a job description for all School District Personnel. They may utilize Municipal Association data as well as local data and other town's experience when preparing these job descriptions.

The Salary Review Committee shall recommend salaries or salary ranges for each job description and shall forward a copy of the job descriptions and salary recommendations to the School Board before October 1, 1980.

The School Board shall consider the recommendations of the

Salary Review Committee when preparing next year's budget and cause a copy of the Salary Review Committee's proposals to be printed in the next annual report.

The motion was seconded by Doris Jensen. Mr. Smith explained that the intent of the motion was to try to equalize the salary scale for comparable positions within the school district and the town. Carl Anderson moved the motion. The motion carried by a hand vote.

Fred Loskamp summarized the Secondary School Building Study Committee Report stating its recommendation to build a Middle or Junior High School in Brookline, and to continue sending Brookline Senior High students to Hollis.

Article 4. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire, or from any other source.

Miriam Jepson moved that this article be approved as read, seconded by Carl Anderson. The motion passed without dissent.

Article 5. To see if the district will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,500 to install fencing, poles, lines, and a net on the paved play court at the Elementary School in order to permit the court to be used for tennis.

Allan Fessenden moved that this article be passed over, seconded by Michael Thomas. Voted in the affirmative.

**Article 6.** To see if the district will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,200 to patch the leaks in the Elementary School roof.

Richard Maghakian moved to raise the sum of \$1,200, seconded by Michael Foley.

Marcia Farwell reported that this is the new section of roof and is not covered by warranty.

Motion passed without dissent.

Article 7. To see if the district will vote to reimburse the parents/guardians for transportation expenses of private school students, grades one through twelve, at a rate equivalent to the cost of two gallons of gasoline per faimly per school day. (By petition)

Allan Fessenden moved to pass over the article, seconded by Michael Foley. The moderator announced the voice vote to be in the affirmative. When challenged, he asked for a hand count, resulting in a 55 yes, 22 no vote. Motion carried.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

Marcia Farwell moved that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$793,049 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, seconded by Don Smith.

Fred Loskamp explained that this figure includes \$10,000 for energy conservation measures. These include installing a suspended ceiling in the old section of the school and insulating with 6" of fiberglass, adding insulation to the existing ceiling in the new section, installing storm windows and weatherstripping, and replacing some doors.

Marcia Farwell explained the major increases in the budget. The Board is beginning a replacement program for desks and chairs which have been in use since the school was built. The teachers will be given an \$800 across-the-board increase in salary.

There was considerable discussion on the costs for sending pupils to Hollis. Marcia Farwell pointed out that while the Junior High figure (\$2,299) is above the state average (\$1753), the Senior High figure (\$1666) is lower than the state average (\$1854).

Mrs. Farwell informed the meeting that the proposed budget will increase the tax rate approximately \$6.50 per thousand.

The motion was put to a vote and the sum of \$793,049 was approved unanimously.

**Article 9.** To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Gerry Michaud explained the reasons for submitting Article 7 which was passed over. He cited RSA 189:9 which allows private school students the same bus privileges as public school students. Allan Fessenden expressed the feeling that interpretation of that law should be made by counsel. No action was taken.

The meeting was adjourned by the Moderator at 9:34 p.m.

## REPORT OF COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE

The Cooperative School Study Committee is composed of the Superintendent of School Administrative Unit 41 (Philip Dahlinger), one school board member and two citizens from each of the towns of Brookline and Hollis (Brookline: Fred Loskamp, Terry Baum, Mike Bujnowski; Hollis: Winifred Hall, Bill Roberts, Roger Saunders). This report describes the activities of the past year and details the events that are expected to occur during the coming year.

The meetings held over the past year were primarily devoted to discussions which attempted to understand the scope of and differences between AREA agreements and COOPERATIVE school districts. This was expanded to include the effect such arrangements have on both the educational programs and financial requirements on both towns.

As a result of the discussions, the committee requested of each school board the authority to act, on behalf of the school boards, as a formal Cooperative School Study Committee, recognized under existing RSA's and charged with the responsibility to present to the voters for consideration in 1982, articles of agreement for the formation of a Hollis-Brookline Cooperative School District. This request was granted by majority vote of the Hollis School Board and by unanimous vote of the Brookline School Board. As a result of this approval, the Cooperative School Committee anticipates accomplishing the following tasks during the coming year.

- 1. With support from the State Board of Education, the Superintendent of SAU 41, and guided by existing RSA's, define in general terms Articles of Agreement for the formation of a Cooperative School District composed of the towns of Hollis and Brookline.
- 2. Prepare a series of three informational releases during the months of October, 1981 through January, 1982, the first document to describe the structure of both AREA and COOPERATIVE agreements, outlining in general terms the advantages or disadvantages of each. The second document will describe in some detail the advantages and disadvantages as applied to the two towns of Hollis and Brookline. The third document will attempt to determine the costs associated with a Cooperative School District, as applicable to both towns, as well as an assessment of the effect such an agreement will have on the educational program of both towns.

- 3. Prepare and present for approval by both school boards, a final set of Articles of Agreement to be submitted to the State Board of Education for approval.
- 4. After State approval, make such Articles of Agreement available to the general public of both towns and hold those public meetings as required by the RSA's for the purpose of acquainting voters with the content and responding to the questions of the public.
- 5. Present the Articles of Agreement, to form a Cooperative School District between the towns of Hollis and Brookline, to the voters of each town at the annual School District Meeting of the town in 1982.

If both Brookline and Hollis voters accept the Articles of Agreement, a Cooperative School District will have been formed and the AREA agreement dissolved. If either town rejects the Articles, no Cooperative District will exist and the AREA Agreement remains in effect.

We, once again, express our sincere appreciation to Barbara Coon and the Volunteers for their efforts and devotion.

Under the direction of Sue Foley, School Librarian, a Career Education program has been developed. Each month individual classes research a chosen career and present their findings by means of reports, bulletin boards, collages, displays, guest speakers, etc. We are attempting to have children become aware, even at this young level, of the many and various careers open to them.

Through a Title IV grant, the school has purchased an Apple Computer. Computers are now and will be a way of life. To have our students aware of computer terminology and exposed to its uses, will be an unlimited advantage. We will continue to learn ourselves how best to utilize this beneficial educational tool. We would welcome any suggestions from the community in relationship to the computer.

In conclusion, we would like to express our sincere appreciation to the citizens of Brookline for their continued interest and support for the combined effort towards a successful school system.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Since this report is published in the Brookline Town Report, it is expected that the focus should be on the Brookline School District. We do address a number of local concerns in this report, but will begin by referring to the Hollis AREA High School Building Project which has occupied a major portion of the time and effort of the district office staff during 1980-81.

All of that effort will culminate in a Warrant Article which will ask the Hollis voters for approval to issue bonds and borrow funds to proceed with the necessary construction. Following a public hearing on March 25, 1981 and a number of meetings prior to that date, the Hollis voters will be asked to support the bond issue at the Annual School District Meeting to be held on April 13, 1981.

If the Bond Issue is approved in Hollis, the Brookline School Board will schedule a special meeting (within 45 days of the date of approval) to ask the Brookline School District to decide whether or not to support the bond issue in Hollis. At present, under the AREA agreement, Brookline supports the existing secondary school bond issues through tuition payments. In 1980-81 there are 196 Brookline students attending the Hollis schools.

One year ago, the annual report focused on the accountability project, a cooperative school district planning study, and the new federal accounting system (Handbook II), and it can be reported that there has been considerable progress in all three areas.

## **ACCOUNTABILITY:**

The competency testing was accomplished in May, 1980, and during the summer months an accountability sub-committee worked to assess both the results and the testing instruments. In coordination with the state it was determined that more work was needed to finalize the tests and that process is under way.

## **COOPERATIVE SCHOOL DISTRICT STUDY:**

The Brookline and Hollis Boards appointed a committee to study the feasibility of the foundation of such a district. Both Boards have heard reports from the committee and have agreed to place the question before the voters in both town during the annual meetings in March, 1982. This will permit the committee to do further research on the advantages and to prepare a proposed set of Articles of Agreement.

## HANDBOOK II:

Because of the complete conversion to the new system during last year, the proposed 1981-82 budget can be easily compared to the 1979-80 and 1980-81 budgets. Those budgets may be found elsewhere in this report booklet.

It should also be reported that during the current year we have spent a great deal of time on efforts to cut energy costs in our building, and are still proceeding with a grant application which will help fund a ceiling insulation project at the school. When installed the insulation will save up to 1500 gallons of fuel oil per year.

We extend our thanks to the citizens of Brookline for their cooperation, support, and understanding.
