- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$975.00 to reimburse the Campton Village Precinct for hydrant rental.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.

- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
- 11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Campton Volunteer Fire Dept.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The following is a report of the activities conducted by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the children of Campton for 1958.

There were no clinics held in the town for 1958 but the children of Campton were invited to attend the immunization clinics held at Plymouth during the year. Many parents took advantage and a good number of children received Salk Vaccine and Triple Toxoid Immunizations.

Home visits were made on infants and pre-school age children, appointments made for children to attend diagnostic clinics at Hanover and follow-up calls as necessary.

You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five per cent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from carlessly burning debris—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost, annually, of extinguishing these fires runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc., cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning, yourself. It will be easier for you, personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

- 1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.



THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Campton, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March, 1959, at eight o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds

for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to build and equip an eight room school to centralize the existing schools.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one hundred and seven thousand dollars (\$107,000.00) for the construction of a central elementary school, including the cost of site and preparation thereof, architect's fees, and furniture, furnishings and equipment, and in order to provide such funds, to authorize the School Board to borrow the amount voted and to issue serial notes or bonds in the name and on the credit of the district, and to fix the time and place of payment, rate of interest, terms, maturities, and provide for the sale thereof, all in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, known as the "Municipal Finance Act," and any amendments applicable thereto. (Requires two-thirds vote by ballot).
- 12. To see if the district will vote to build and equip a four room school, to be four rooms of an eightroom school building plan.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding seventy-two thousand dollars (\$72,000.00) for the construction of a four room elementary school, including the cost of site and preparation thereof, architect's fees, and furniture, furnishings and equipment, and in order to provide such funds, to authorize the school board to borrow the amount voted and to issue serial notes or bonds in the name and on the credit of the district and to fix the time and place of payment, rate of interest, terms, maturities, and provide for the sale thereof, all in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, known as the "Municipal Finance Act," and any amendments applicable thereto. (Requires two-thirds vote by ballot).

- 14. If the district votes to construct a new school, to see if the district will elect a building committee consisting of five voters of the Campton School District authorized to select a site for the construction of the school, and to assist the school board in the planning and construction of such school, provided that the selection of the site for the new school and plans and specifications therefor shall finally be approved by the school board acting alone as required by law, and to formally authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with the construction and equipping of such school.
- 15. To see if the district will vote to elect at this meeting a special committee consisting of the School Board, one member of the Board of Selectmen, and four other voters of the Campton School District to study the advisability of new school construction to replace all or part of the existing schools; to recommend a suitable site or sites, to select an architect for preliminary studies; to have sketches drawn of such proposed building; to report back to a minimum of two public meetings, and finally to the next Campton School district meeting making such recommendations with respect to the above matters as the committee may determine; and to see if the district will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the use of the committee in meeting its expenses.
- 16. To see if the district will vote to build and equip one two room school on the West side of the Pemigewasset River, at a suitable site, in the South part of the Town, and to install running water, modern plumbing and heating at the Livermore Falls School.
- 17. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$30,000.00) thirty thousand dollars to carry out any vote taken under Art. (above) and to authorize the School Board to borrow the amount voted and to issue serial notes or bonds in the name and on the credit of the district; and to fix the

time and place of payment, rate of interest, terms and maturities and provide for the sale thereof, all in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chap. 33; known as the Municipal Finance Act and any amendments applicable thereto.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT TO THE CAMPTON SCHOOL BOARD

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

The Campton School District this year has been fortunate to secure three capable teachers to replace the ones we lost last year. Mrs. Beryle Currier, a teacher with a good deal of experience here and in Connecticut, replaced Miss Baston at Blair School, Mrs. Alice Willard replaced Mrs. Grey in the lower grades in the Village School and we were able to secure Mr. George Radcliffe, a 1958 June graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, on short notice to complete the year in the upper grades at Beebe River. All three are good teachers and are doing a very creditable job. It is too early to predict what our situation will be for next year but I do know that if we need teachers they are going to be hard to obtain, especially so, for the positions we have to offer.

At the moment we are well supplied with text books and supplies. The new Science books that I mentioned in my last report have been purchased and are in use which now makes new text books adopted in all areas except spelling. We are now using a 1943 edition and it should be replaced with a more modern series that is now available.

The Music Department in our schools is still very good and we are fortunate in being able to retain the services of Mrs. Wilson. She understands the theory of modern school music and has the unique ability of teaching the children and at the same time maintain a high level of interest. We also continue to have excellent health supervision with Mrs. Fisher, who is a most capable school nurse.

As a future matter of interest perhaps you should know that Plymouth is completing a new \$130,000.00 Vocational Building which will be completed and ready for occupancy in September. Plymouth has felt for some time that we are not able through our present facilities, to fully meet the needs of boys and girls who do not go on to college. At this writing it is not definite as to exactly what courses will be offered but in addition to the present Manual Arts program, Auto Mechanics, Sheet Metal Work, Agriculture, Wood Working, Cabinet Making and Metal Lathe Work are some of the courses that might be offered to the boys. Girls might be offered courses in Sewing, beginning and advanced, Home Making, Commercial Cooking and Baking, Consumer Buying, etc. A survey will be taken shortly and on the results of it courses for next year will be organized, where possible.

The school building situation in Campton will arise again this year I am sure. My views on this matter have not changed and I would still like to see the school children of Campton have modern, up-to-date facilities. How much money we can or should put into this is a matter for the voters to decide but I think that no one could disagree that something needs to be and should be done. I am willing to help any group or groups in any way I can.

In passing, I would like to mention the thinking behind the closing of the Center School. With the number of pupils involved it was felt that they could be absorbed by Beebe River, Livermore and Branch Schools without creating an undue hardship on the teachers, and thus eliminate one teaching position. To date this has worked out satisfactorily although none of the schools mentioned could take many more children without being overcrowded. Most of the money saved by so doing however, has been used to supply the necessary transportation.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the teachers and School Board members in Campton for their help and cooperation during the past year.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "REPORTS. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1957-58 received a salary of \$6,550 which was made up as follows: \$2,500 paid from the per capita tax and \$4,050 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$900 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

Superintendent's salary for 1957-1958 based on the above figure is reconciled as follows: \$4,050 paid by the various districts, plus \$2,500 from State per capita tax, equals \$6,550 superintendent's basic salary. This, plus \$900 travel allowance as indicated above totals \$7,450 — amount received from State Treasurer for salary and travel of the Superintendent of schools.

This School Calendar allows for 178 days actually in school. According to Law, teachers convention and institute days count as school days and the school year must be 180 days duration. Therefore, 178 plus 3 days (convention and institute) equals 181 school days. One day may be lost because of storms or other factors before any time has to be made up.

THE MUSIC PROGRAM IN CAMPTON

The children in Campton have benefitted greatly from increased interest in the music program. We now have in use, one new record player plus a variety of new records given by the Parent-Teacher Association, and many record albums donated by a resident of Campton. The records have been distributed to the various schools according to the age level for which they will be most useful. A piano was also received by the lower grade room at Beebe River. The music books purchased for Center School last year were placed in the upper grade room at Beebe River in September because of the need for material suitable to the age group.

The classroom teachers have done a great deal to promote the musical growth of the students by using songs, rhythmic activities, and/or recordings to enhance the scholastic program. In many cases, the youngsters have been stimulated by the obvious interest of their own classroom teacher.
