Abutments on the West Pass Gate Bridge were strengthened, also the steep part of Skyline Drive was eliminated and the road was rerouted on an easier grade.

We wish to thank Mr. Kallinich for his donation of \$25.00 toward painting the Town Hall. It is now about fifteen years since it was painted and is badly in need of painting again.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Cornish on Tuesday, the 9th of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon Article 1. The remaining articles will be acted upon at 1 p.m. in the afternoon.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will adopt the pay scale for Permanent Highway Department Employees as recommended by the committee appointed for this purpose.

4. (By request) to see if the Town will vote to raise the penalty on delinquent dog taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept a tract of land and pond from Mrs. Davidson and raise and appropriate the necessary amount for surveys and making out of deeds.

6. To see if the Town will vote to deepen the pond referred to in Article 5, and install two hydrants and to raise and appropriate the necessary amount for this purpose.

7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a police radio and raise and appropriate the necessary amounts.

8. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the purchase of land & buildings on the east side of Parsonage Road., known as the Fuller Land, and to see what sum of money they wish to raise and appropriate for the purpose.

9. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary amount to renovate the Selectmen's Office.

10. To see what action the Town will take on replacing Pagent Bridge on the Tandy Brook Road and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.

11. To vote by ballot on the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. To vote by ballot on the adoption of the amendments to the existing Building Regulations as proposed by the Planning Board.

12. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to give the George H. Stowell Free Library \$1,600.00 to help pay the expenses of cataloguing the entire contents of the library, and to raise and appropriate the same.

13. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to require itemized reports of all repairs and expenditures of all Departments to be included in the annual Town Report.

14. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to make the term of Constable two years starting in 1972, and the person receiving the greater number of votes being elected for two years and the runnerup being elected for one year.

15. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to have the Town Dump open all Saturdays and Sundays throughout the year.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to trading the 1965 Diamond T truck and the 1951 Plow Equipment on same, and raising and appropriating the necessary amount.

17. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non-Partisan Ballot System for the Election of Town Officials as provided in the revised law of New Hampshire. Vote by ballot.

18. To see what the Town wants to do about having the Town House painted and to see if it wants to.

19. In connection with the road program for this year for the St. Gaudens Road and accepting a deed to a new right-of-way from Nicolaas Leyd's, the Town is asked to vote to discontinue and release all claims to the stretch of road in front of the Nicolaas Leyd's residence after completion of the new road.

20. In connection with improving the road by the Peter Burling place and the difficulties with the blind corner at its approach to the Lang Road, Peter Burling has offered to deed land for a new right-of-way and pay all costs for the construction by the town of a new improved road. The Town is asked to vote to discontinue and release all claims to the old right-of-way on completion and acceptance.

21. (By request) To see if the Town will vote to place the Civil Defense Department under the direction of the Cornish Fire Department and that the Assistant Fire Chief be appointed Civil Defense Director.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Association.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for use in the operation and development of the Lebanon Regional Airport.

24. To see what the Town wants to do about ambulance service for Cornish. (a) Ambulance service from Windsor, (b) Ambulance service from Claremont

25. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer property acquired through tax sales.

26. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

27. To hear the reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.

28. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

FIRE CHIEF REPORT

1970 was a very bad year for fires. Two sets of barns were totally destroyed and another was damaged by fire. Two house fires, one totally destroyed and the other badly damaged, and three chimney fires. Most of the fires were caused by careless persons. One of the set of barns appeared to be of incendiary nature.

New tires and tubes were purchased for the fire truck and a 1500 gallon canvas tank was also purchased.

There were two false alarms and several inspections and investigations.

Some of the firemen gave part or all of their pay to the town toward the fire truck fund which was started last year at town meeting. The amount donated by the firemen was \$409.20

There are some people in town that think we should have a new fire truck. If we really need another truck, I believe the town cannot afford a new truck at this time. There are a lot of good used fire trucks on the market that can be purchased at \$4000 to \$8000 dollars, that would answer the purpose.

The people in town should see to it that we have more water holes or ponds built. Fire truck pumpers are of little use without a good water supply.

Captain Richard George from the Claremont Fire Department and Myron Cummings of Hanover conducted a training school for the Cornish firemen, Sixteen men took the training.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN & DISTRICT CHIEF

During this past year, the public has shown a great deal of cooperation in the prevention of fires. We wish to express our thanks for a job well done.

Your forest fire warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires, a synopsis of these laws follow.

Fire Permits

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning (SUCH BURNING IS RESTRICTED BY REGULATION TO BE PRIOR TO 9:00 A.M. and AFTER 5:00 P.M.).

An Air Pollution regulation forbids the burning of household waste in towns where such rubbish is collected by the town.

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed under normal conditions with permission of the District Fire Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

During the year the Planning Board has held eight meetings and has conducted one public hearing.

At the first meeting of the year the Board was organized with Miss Evelyn Lear elected Chairman and Stephen Tracy Secretary.

On May 28, 1970, the Town Moderator and the members of the Planning Board appointed Mrs. Norris Weld to fill a vacancy on the Board of Adjustment.

The first half of the year was devoted largely to the drafting of a Subdivision Regulation. This regulation was presented at a public hearing held at the Town Hall on October 1, 1970, after the required notices had been posted and published. At the conclusion of the hearing this Subdivision Regulation became effective, and the Town Clerk and the Register of Deeds for Sullivan County were both so advised.

The latter part of the year was spent in a review of the deficiencies of the existing Zoning Ordinance, and it was voted to prepare a revision of this ordinance in order to correct those deficiencies. This revised Zoning Ordinance will not establish districts within the Town but will seek to make the present ordinance more workable. The new ordinance will be proposed for enactment at the next town meeting after the two public hearings required by State statutes have been held.

The Board is eager to take any steps which are needed to protect the community from threats which might change its character and might affect the welfare of its citizens. The members of the Board would be glad at all times to hear from Cornish voters regarding their concerns and interests in matters relating to planning for the future of our Town.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE TOWN'S RECREATIONAL NEEDS

This committee was appointed at the 1970 Town Meeting, after townspeople expressed the feeling that Cornish was not offering as many recreational pastimes and facilities as it might — especially for our school children, and most especially during school vacations. Last spring we polled the children in grades 4 through 8, in an attempt to find out what recreational pursuits they felt were most desirable. Some of the replies — swimming and skiing, for instance — were unfeasible because of cost. But other requests for better baseball and basketball facilities, for instance, and for an ice-skating rink, seemed more practical, and to the limit of our resources we pushed forward on these.

The Fair Association gave us \$500. and the PTA, \$100.00 both sorely needed and gratefully appreciated. We would also like to thank E. J. Hodgdon Jr. for his efforts at our auction last summer, which raised over \$300. This year we hope to do better.

Our thanks to Don Macleay and Jim McSwain Jr., for the use of their equipment, which helped us roll and flatten the playing fields near the Town Hall and the baseball field in Cornish Flat. A black-top basketball court at the rear of the Town Hall would have been completed by now, but when seeking favors and discount prices one must wait until cash customers are taken care of. We have been promised an early spring job and are looking forward to green grass. We tried to flood the fair-grounds horse-show rink for ice skating, but the rink wasn't level enough. With the cooperation of the Fair Committee, we hope to grade the rink next fall, so that the town will have ice-skating facilities day and night next winter.

We helped out in the summer baseball program and ran a basketball program in the town hall during Christmas vacation. The current school situation makes the use of the town hall for any recreational purposes difficult. We hope when the school addition is completed the town hall will once again be generally available for supervised recreation. Also, we are now paying for the school sports awards, picking up where the YAK Club left off. and we secured some equipment for the school soccer and baseball teams — thanks mainly to donations from Dartmouth College.

At this point, we don't feel we need to ask the Town for money. But would like to urge townspeople to support our efforts, by saving useable items for our auction this summer, and by volunteering what time and energy they can. We also urge that this meeting appoint a permanent Recreation Committee, so that what has begun unofficially can continue on an official basis.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CORNISH FAIR ASSOCIATION, INC.

In 1948 the fair was born, through the P.T.A. putting on a penny jamboree in the town hall to get funds to pay an architect to draw up plans for a new school. \$300. was netted. In 1949 for lack of space the jamboree was moved outside, and was put on for the same purpose. The Cornish Fair, as such, was started in 1950, with 25% of the profits going to be the school fund. Industrial and agricultural exhibits were added in 1951. It became an annual affair in 1950, and was incorporated on September 28, 1952. 50% of the profits from concessions went to the fair. A three-day fair was held in 1954 with first admission being charged, and the 4-H joined, with \$50. given in premium money. In 1955 a flat rate was started for booth space. Since then Cornish Fair continued a healthy growth to its present standing in the community, county and state.

The voting members are all the legal registered voters of the town of Cornish. Directors may also be elected from other towns in Sullivan County, and have voting rights in the meetings of the directors.

The purposes of the Fair are to provide an activity of education and recreation; to raise money for educational or charitable purposes for the community; and to encourage an interest in agriculture and the arts and crafts.

Since the Cornish Fair started, premium money to the children of Sullivan County has been increased from around \$50.00 to last year's sum of \$1,850.10. One year \$25.00 was given to a 4-H boy to assist in his attending a 4-H conference.

Since the Association has failed to have a report of their progress in the Town Report each year, we are herewith submitting a resume of how some of the profits were spent; to show some other attempts to carry out our primary purposes as a fair and to help Cornish as a town:

A new ceiling in the town hall was installed in 1953. \$50.00 was given in '54 toward a new entranceway, or storm door, to the hall. \$350.00 went to grounds improvement for school children's play area in '55, and also the men painted the outside of the town hall and the little town hall, and repaired some of the chairs. In 1956 the Fair gave \$150.00 toward filling of the swamp. The following year it paid one-half of the cost of an entrance box, wire and labor, from power line to service box. Then in 1958 Cornish Fair gave the School District \$100.00 to use as was needed, and in '59 gave \$45.00 to the hot lunch program at the school.

From 1960 to 1963 \$1,699.66 was spent making a fire pond for the area and a good parking area for the fair's use. In '64 the Fair gave \$10.00 to safe-driving Jamboree held May 23rd. In 1961 the Fair put the fence in, between the playground and the Parsonage Road. 1965 found a permanent cattle shed constructed, and in '67 a second, and larger one, for which was paid \$4,076.60. The town can use these, as the Fair does, during the year for storage.

The Fair gave \$1,500.00 toward the addition to town hall in 1966, and in '68 and '69 the Fair put new lights with guards in the town hall, spending \$290.60 and doing the work themselves.

In 1970 Cornish Fair purchased land across the road, and built a permanent horse and cattle pull area, and horse-show ring, making the regular fair grounds safer for children. It also gave \$400.00 to the Cornish Recreation Committee.

To witness results of our efforts, and in the wonderful exhibits of our 4-H youth as well as adults in the various departments, come to Cornish Fair on August 20th and 21st.

SCHOOL WARRANT
Cornish School District
State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said District, on the 6th day of March, 1971, at 10:00 A.M. to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant.

Article 1 of the Warrant will be acted upon at 10:00 A.M. and voting will be by official ballot and checklist, and the polls will remain open for this purpose from 10 A.M. until 6:00 P.M., at which time polls will close.

At 1:00 P.M. Articles 2 through 10 will be acted upon.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Auditors for the ensuing year and a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 2. To determine and fix the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Article 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

Article 5. To see if the District will vote to accept a total of \$13,500.00 as gifts toward the cost of constructing the Cornish Elementary School addition, as an off-set against funds heretofore appropriated for such construction, and too authorize the School Board to expend the same for such construction.

Article 6. (a) to see if the District will authorize the School Board to negotiate for the purchase of additional land, or to take an option thereon.

(b) To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate therefore.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 8. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or state agencies, and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

Article 9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources in addition to the original appropriation for 1971-72, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

Article 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE CORNISH SCHOOL BOARD

Since the last annual district meeting in March 1970 there have been more than 40 regular and special meetings of the Cornish School Board to conduct the usual business of school operation, to locate, interview, and employ 7 new teachers, and to fulfill the extraordinary requirements of the building addition.

With the construction well along, and the new rooms expected to be ready for use in about two months we trust that the worst of the "growing pains" are past. Much credit must go to the School Building Committee who labored long hours for three years on plans and proposals; and the Concerned Citizens and PTA whose energy and efforts helped acquaint the voters with the urgent needs of the district. Especially we wish to thank Jack MacMillan for his devoted hard work and help in bringing about a solution to our building problems.

A visit to the New Hampshire Commissioner of Labor by Selectman Myron Quimby with Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Densmore resulted in a cost saving of \$1,070.00. The district received further substantial encouragement by gifts; one of \$1,000.00 from Peter Burling, a new resident who has shown a great deal of interest in town affairs, and another gift of \$12,500.00 from Margery Palmer Trumbull of Hanover, a former resident who received her early education in the Cornish schools. This gift, in memory of her parents, Ernest and Irene Palmer of Cornish was designated toward the realization of the School Library.

Likewise we have been fortunate in our financial transactions, borrowing funds at an unusually low rate of interest; in this connection the officials of the First National Bank of Boston commended our Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Richard F. Waldo for his careful and prompt handling of the negotiations. We look forward to the benefits our children will receive from all these efforts, and trust that the high standards of service and scholarship at Cornish School will be maintained and raised as a result.

A building program and many more students, both elementary and high school must necessarily mean bigger budgets and increased taxes, therefor, the School Board will endeavor to exercise strict economy, and to eliminate unnecessary expenditures and waste. However, the children are now in even greater need of more play and recreation area, and the facilities for games and exercise. We recommend immediate expansion of playground and equipment.

We would call your attention to the fact that while our minimum teacher salaries are above most districts in the state, our per pupil cost of education in the Cornish Elementary School is among the lowest in New Hampshire. Since our achievement tests and high school records are above average, we wish to express our appreciation and sincere gratitude to all who make this record possible.

We do not need again to praise the school lunch program. It is one of a very few in N.H. not receiving a considerable district appropriation, and the cost per lunch is below the state average. Every month sets a new record of meals served, and that is the best recommendation.

We would particularly thank the Supervisory Union personnel, our teachers, and local staff for the patient helpful spirit with which they have endured the unavoidable disruption and discomfort of the past few months, and we look forward with them to the improved facilities nearing completion.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Cornish and Citizens of the Town, I herewith submit my report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

FACULTY:

Seven new staff members joined the faculty when classes resumed this past September.

Richard W. LaPlant succeeded Norman Stowell as principal and teacher of grades 6-7-8. Mr. LaPlant is a graduate of Plymouth State College, and has taught for two years in Lincoln and Ashland, N.H.

Serving as assistant principal and teacher of grades 6-8 is Charles L. Child of Charlestown. He succeeded Michael G. Thompson. Mr. Child was graduated from Charlestown High School and from UNH this past June.

Miss Alice Wise of Needham, Mass., has been employed to teach English in the upper grades, formerly taught by Miss Virginia Novak. She is a graduate of Plymouth State College this past June.

Miss Linda Agan of Claremont replaces Mrs. Marion Stone in Grade 5. Miss Agan was graduated from Stevens High School and Stonehill College last year with an A.B. degree.

Mrs. Karen Mills of Cornish teaches grade 4, replacing Miss Amy Loomis. Mrs. Mills is a graduate of the University of Vermont with a B.S. degree, and formerly taught in Burlington, Vt.

Mrs. Mavourneen MacLyman of Lexington, Mass., joined the faculty as teacher of the Opportunity Class, replacing Mrs. Lillian Symons. Mrs. MacLyman has a B.A. degree from California State College, and has five years of teaching experience in California.

Miss Diana Weidenbacker of Darien, Conn., was to instruct reading, but was reassigned to the combination grade 1 and 3 at the town hall because of enrollment needs. A graduate of William Penn College with a B.A. Degree, she has taught two years in Iowa and Indiana.

Mr. LaPlant and the entire teaching staff are complimented for the work accomplished by them during the course of this year. Under his leadership, an esprit de corps has developed to carry forth a sound educational program under the severe handicap of school construction and very full classrooms.

THE ADDITION:

The addition, under construction as of this writing, is progressing well on schedule. In spite of the hardships of building during the winter season, the contractor, Mr. Neil Daniels, and our architect, Mr. Brooke Fleck, have worked very closely with all of us and have completely cooperated so as to keep the disruption of the school day at a minimum. We acknowledge this with gratitude. The patience and understanding of the staff, parents, and students will be rewarded in the not too distant future.

This addition, besides correcting the situation of overcrowded classrooms that has plagued us for a number of years, will also assist Cornish in the implementation of state minimum standards for elementary schools. These standards were reviewed in detail in my report last year; you are referred to them.

Just how the new space will be used for classes next fall has yet to be determined. This decision will be made by the Board after a thorough study of the possibilities, and after consultation with the teachers and administration. A decision will be reached before classes and this June.

The Board has previously acknowledged gifts for the addition, totaling \$13,500. I want at this time to thank publicly the donors for such a moving act of generosity.

CURRICULUM:

New staff and the large enrollment have necessitated additional faculty meetings in order to plan and improve our curriculum offerings. This phase is under the able direction of Mr. Anthony Amari, Teacher Consultant.

The principal reports on the study of the mathematics program.

In order to give children extra help in both the functional and creative aspects (writing, drama) of English, a larger block of time for grade 6 English has been scheduled this year. We feel that this additional time will give those students more help on an individualized basis and result in better preparation for junior and senior high.

At faculty meetings more attention has been given to helping newer teachers in their specific areas of teaching. These meetings have covered such topics as motivation and planning, reporting pupil progress and promotion, teacher observation and evaluation, the music program, and some techniques to use in teaching history and geography.

As always we look forward to our survey of Cornish sophomores and freshmen attending local high schools. These youngsters have offered many positive suggestions to their "alma mater".

THE PROPOSED BUDGET:

The proposed budget shows an actual increase of \$42,189.93 over the current year, excluding the \$125,000 bond issue. Your Board and I are very aware of and sensitive to the impact of this increase on the tax rate. Cooperatively, we have worked together to keep this increase down.

Analyzed briefly, tuition alone increases by \$21,295.00. The number of students from Cornish attending high school jumps considerably this year; this is compounded by tuition increases for both Windsor High School and Stevens High School.

The principal payment and interest obligations are up by \$13,865.00. Increases for insurance, lights, and heat are estimated to call for another \$2,033.00. The federal regulations increase Social Security from 4.8% to 5.2%. These are all built-in increases over which we have little, if any, control.

The above mentioned expenses total \$37,746.00, thus leaving only \$4,443.07 for all the other portions of the school budget, a small amount in light of the cost increase for every product or service for the District must contract.

Teachers' salaries are always of interest and concern. With this budget, the average salary in Cornish for 1971-72 will be \$6,700.00; of the ten full-time staff four would be above this amount, six below. Area news articles graphically point out the salary picture around us; further explanation is not necessary.

IN CONCLUSION:

There never appears to be appropriate time to thank all who have assisted us in Cornish by coming forth – as individuals or a group – at the time they're needed most. But this is an opportunity:

A phone call to the School Board brings them together for a meeting at most any time during the day or evening, and during this year of the "addition" they have met very often.

To those individuals and groups who helped so much in our successful bond issues, who have chaperoned many school activities and trips, who have assisted in the school sports endeavors, and in so many other ways, thank you for your time, talents and energies.

To Mrs. Marjerie Kidder, who has told us of her intent to retire this June, words to recognize her work have yet to be created. She is a person of warmth, compassion and talent who will have given 43 years of her life to teaching, 38 of them to the children of Cornish. All of us are richer for having known her; we have gained by working with her. We salute you, Mrs. Kidder.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The 1970-'71 academic year opened with seven new teachers, three veterans, and an enrollment of 278 students. The efforts of the entire staff of the school have helped to make this year a success.

The entire school population is appreciative of the sacrifices made by all the taxpayers of the community in order that an addition to the school may be completed. This is a considerable step toward meeting minimum requirements for schools as established by the state of New Hampshire.

We believe that in order for a school to serve the community which supports it, an alliance must be formed between parents and teachers. Since the beginning of the year, regular attendance at P.T.A. meetings has aided many of the instructional personnel on our staff in understanding the community's desires regarding the education of their children.

In the area of curriculum revision, Mr. Child, math teacher in grades 6, 7, 8, is co-ordinating a study of the math program throughout the school. He is working very closely with all teachers concerned. Mr. Anthony Amari, Teacher Consultant for the district, has given his professional considerations whenever called upon to do so. No program has or ever will be instituted without a thorough study taking place and approval of the Cornish School Board.

In summation, I wish to take this opportunity to express my thanks to the School Board of Cornish, the Superintendent's Office and the entire staff who have made the efficient operation of this school possible.

We also would like to extend our sincere appreciation for the work done by the P.T.A. in providing funds for educational trips, encyclopedias and other important services which tend to promote a healthy educational climate within the community.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

To the Cornish School Board and the Citizens of Cornish, I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

The following examinations were given during the school year 1969-1970: Vision tests were given to all students of which ten were referred for further examinations and ten of these got glasses; hearing tests were given to 168 students of which five were referred and received treatment. Color perception tests were given to 35 students.

Head and skin checks periodically were made of all students throughout the school year. All students were weighed and measured. Sport's Physicals were given to 26 students by Dr. Robert Lanzer.

Immunization Vaccine for Rubella (German Measles) was given to 95 Cornish students at the Claremont Clinic.

No serious outbreak of contagious diseases was reported to the school.

School conferences were held with 21 parents at pre-school registration. At this time a report of the health background of students entering first grade was obtained from the parents and they were informed of the school health program.

As the enrollment of the Cornish school is rapidly growing, it becomes increasingly difficult to contact parents in time of their child's illness or injury at school. We would appreciate parental cooperation in this matter in informing the school of their wishes as to transportation and where their child is to go in the event of this need.

My association with all the personnel and School Board members at Cornish has been most pleasant and I shall miss those that will not be with us next year. Mrs. Bean and Mrs. Ackerman continue to have excellent and well patronized school lunch program. I wish to express my appreciation to all the personnel for their generous cooperation with me and the health program.
