TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilmanton in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Gilmanton Corner, in Academy Hall in said Gilmanton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads the present winter season.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for state highway construction.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for state highway maintenance.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of replacing with cement the larger wooden bridges that may become unsafe for travel.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to buy one or more road machines and make appropriation for same.
- 9. to see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of Town Library above the amount required by law.
- 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for decorating soldiers' graves.

- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the state in control of the white pine blister rust. (By request.)
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of Laconia Hospital. (By request.)
- 13. To see if the town will vote to purchase one or more snow plows and to see how much money the town will vote to raise for this purpose. (By petition of J. Frank McClary and others.)
- 14. To see if the town will vote to purchase 500 ft., more or less, of winter fence, and to see how much money the town will vote to raise for this purpose. (By petition of J. Frank McClary and others.)
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the observance of Old Home Day celebration to be held at Smith Meeting House, it being the 200th anniversary of the charter of the town. (By request.)
- 16. To see if the town will vote to make a special appropriation to be laid out on the road leading from corner of road above the residence of Henry S. Page to the Middle Route road. (By request.)
- 17. To see if the town will vote to buy the horse sheds adjoining the Town Hall and make appropriation for same.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the Snowshoe Hill road leading from the highway near the residence of Guy Dickey to the Canterbury line.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Gilmanton School Board:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

TEACHING FORCE.

Again last year as the year before the school work during the year was unbroken by changes in the teaching force. At the end of the year, however, the loss was heavy, but not so great as usual, only three vacancies existing: Kelley's Corner, Iron Works, and Jones' Mills. As the two schools at the Corner were combined this year, the number of teachers was reduced by one. The following table indicates the schools now open, the teachers, salaries, and enrollments.

Miss Goodhue is a graduate of the Keene Normal School, three-year course. Miss Thompson, who replaced Miss Marie Lupien after the first month, is a graduate of the Truro Normal School in Nova Scotia and has had several years highly successful experience. Mrs. Carroll has taught successfully for a number of years and is now working for a state certificate by attending summer schools.

TEACHERS' MEETINGS.

Three teachers' meetings were held during the fall term of this year. The daily time table, pupils' marks, and methods of instruction in seventh and eighth grade geography were the chief topics discussed.

The State Board of Education held an institute for rural teachers at the Iron Works on September 30. It was attended by all the Gilmanton teachers and they found it exceedingly helpful. Teachers' meetings and institutes are highly important means of improving the quality of instruction in the schools and it is regrettable that more cannot be held.

ATTENDANCE.

The attendance for last year was better than ever before. The per cents of attendance for the past five years have been as follows: 89.4%; 89.9%; 90.04%; 91.89%, and 93.24%, respectively. The numbers of tardinesses per pupil for the same period have been 3.5, 2.7, 3.4, 3.9, and 2.6, respectively, a decided improvement.

HEALTH SUPERVISION.

During the year three school nurses were engaged to do health work in the Gilmanton schools, but for reasons best known to herself each nurse notified the superintendent that she could not do the work as she had agreed. Efforts have been continued this year and at the time of writing this report an agreement exists with Miss Katherine A. O'Donnell to begin work in the spring. Miss O'Donnell has been doing excellent work for the past

year in the Pembroke supervisory union. The following report of the medical examiners shows the need of her services.

At the end of the year eight pupils were promoted to Grade II, twelve to Grade III, nine to Grade IV, twelve to Grade V, eleven to Grade VI, seven to Grade VIII, twelve to Grade VIIII, two to Grade IX (high school), three to Grade X.

GENERAL REMARKS

I believe the progress of the Gilmanton schools is excellent; the teachers are working conscientiously and intelligently for the good of the boys and girls; modern methods of instruction are being used, and modern text books have been adopted. The health of the pupils has been considered in the furnishing of sanitary water coolers, paper drinking cups and paper towels, in the improvement of toilets, of seating, lighting, heating, and ventilating conditions, and in the adopting of the policy of employing a school nurse. Money used for such purposes is not spent but invested, and an investment in children's education and health is the best investment that a community can make. The future administration of the Gilmanton schools should provide for the continued improvement of buildings and equipment and for the maintenance of the present policy of employing only well trained and capable teachers.

It may be seen by a comparison of these figures with those given in my last report that the total number of children in Gilmanton last fall was slightly greater than it has been for the last three previous years.

Buildings.

During the past year several improvements have been made in the schoolrooms. In the large room in the academy now being used the walls and ceiling have been painted and new shades have been put up. At Jones' Mills the lighting has been somewhat improved by the removal of the window in the front of the room and new blackboards have been installed. When the repairs already planned are made, this will be a much more attractive building. When it became necessary last fall to open the Sanborn school, because of the change in pupil population, it was found that considerable repairing had to be done there. The walls and ceiling were painted, much glass had to be set, and the toilets had to be rebuilt. I hope that sufficient funds will be available next year to make the repairs at the Iron Works school that are so badly needed.

IN CONCLUSION.

The people of Gilmanton should be congratulated for having a school board that gives so unstintingly of its time and energies in working for the best interests of the boys and girls of Gilmanton and the future of the community and state. It is with a sincere appreciation of the willing cooperation you have given me that this report is made for your consideration.
