TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

No recommendation necessary

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

No recommendation necessary

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (five hundred dollars) \$500 for the Town History Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 for the Fire Hose Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one thousand dollars) \$1000 to replace one of the existing garage doors in the firehouse with a larger one and to relocate the existing entrance door, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

6. To see if the Town will appropriate from the Delia Thacher Park Fund (six hundred dollars) \$600 to purchase approximately 33 acres of land bordering Juggernaut Reservoir as an extension to the Park, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable, and further recommendation that the selectmen purchase additional land bordering the Juggernaut Reservoir whenever possible.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (three hundred and ninety-two dollars and ten cents) \$392.10 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation limited to two hundred dollars. (\$200.00)

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 for White Pine Blister Rust Control, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (seven hundred and eighty-eight dollars and forty-one cents) \$788.41 as our share of the Town Road Aid Program, or taken any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (four hundred dollars) \$400 for Old Home Day, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

11. To see if the Town will vote the following changes relative to the "Regulations for the Organization and Government of the Hancock Water Department", adopted by the Town in 1963:

That paragraph 5, section a shall read as follows: There shall be a tap-on charge of seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars for every new service connection, whether on a new extension or not. This seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars shall not be considered as income from water rents in computing five (5%) per cent of cost of a new line extension as provided in paragraph 6 part c. This fee must be paid before the service is turned on.

That paragraph 6, section c shall read as follows:

There must be a guarantee in writing that the annual total water rents from the requested line extension in each of the first ten (10) years of service, will constitute no less than five (5%) per

cent of the gross cost to the department of installing said line extension.

Recommend disapproval, and further recommend that the Water Dept. Regulations be revised to require written guaranty of total costs to be returned to the Department with a twenty (20) year period.

12. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to dispose of the High School Building in a manner most beneficial to the Town, retaining all land pertaining thereto, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (eight hundred dollars) \$800 as the Town's share of painting the outside of the Town Hall and Church buildings, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

14. To see if the Town will borrow money to extend the water main three thousand feet along the Bennington Road to the James Newcomb residence and according to the Regulations of the Hancock Water Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend disapproval

15. To see if the Town will borrow money to extend the water main one thousand feet along the Old Antrim Road from the Walter Harrington residence according to the regulations of the Hancock Water Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend disapproval

16. To see if the Town will borrow money for the installation of six (6) new hydrants by the Hancock Water Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of (four hundred dollars) \$400 to be made available to the Trustees of the Library to meet anticipated costs of repairs to the Library roof and the redecoration of the so-called Middle Room, regular library funds to be used to share these costs insofar as the budget allows, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 1% on property taxes if paid within 30 days after date of bill, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

20. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommendation favorable

21. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy – both industrial and recreational – is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area - 4,350,000 acres – is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.

2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire

record in 1965.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT, 1964

'This year we renovated the vestibule and the two front rooms, installed fluorescent lights in the Adult Reading Room and the Middle Room, and put in an electric hot water heater to supply hot water for the powder room. These improvements brought us many favorable comments. Apparently the attractive appearance and greater comfort have brought more people to the Library. All these changes would not have been possible without the appropriation from the Town.

Mrs. McGreal helped us celebrate Library Week by reading aloud to all the Elementary School children on April 13. This proved so successful that Mrs. Garland then volunteered to read aloud regularly to the children of the first four grades. They now come in two groups once a week while school is in session. We are greatly indebted to both of these ladies for the increased interest in reading they have aroused in many of the children.

Between October and the end of the year we have hung two exhibitions of paintings, one by David Bott and one by Rebecca Hill. Both were much appreciated and drew additional visitors to the Library. We expect to continue these exhibitions, inviting eventually artists from the whole Monadnock Area.

Miss Frank as Librarian and Mrs. Hampson as Children's Librarian have rendered excellent service to all. Much of the credit for our steadily increasing circulation is due to the personal interest they have shown in greeting people and meeting their needs. Further evidence of their enthusiasm is the fact that they contributed most of the cost of a greatly needed new desk for the middle. Our group of modest, but very useful volunteers has continued to relieve them of many time-consuming chores.

Finally we thank those whose contributions have enabled us to purchase a number of books of lasting interest in memory of Daniel O. Devens, Helen Duncan and Frederic A. Gleason.

HANCOCK, 1964

As to what went on in Hancock in 1964, of course, depends on your viewpoint. Most would agree that "dry, dry, dry" would be a word to be repeated and the next word would be "Politics" with a capital P. We'll pick up some more intimate matters as we go along.

When the November rains failed to come and the ground froze early in December, the only happy thought (and it was a happy one) was that the feared fall forest fires didn't break out. Then came Christmas — a dreary 45° fogged-in day; then, with the ground mercifully thawed, came $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches of rain which penetrated to the water table. Wells filled. It had been too close to abandonment of some places for comfort.

Even with Bob Fish and others of the Fire Department using the tank truck to fill wells, some wondered where they could go. With friends on the water line to Juggernaut who had a sure supply? Maybe a room at the Inn?

Speaking of the Inn, the Town wishes the best of good fortune to Faith and David Regemey who in the closing months of the year are hosting. Quite a few like the welcome they receive when they drop in for coffee as they pick up their morning mail.

Some writers on the national scene describe the fall elections as a death knell of the Republican Party. LBJ who, when the history books are written, will be referred to as Lyndon B. Johnson, President of the USA, swept the country. Hancock, a Republican town if there ever was one, (there were two Republican caucuses if that proves anything) was one of the few towns in the area to favor Goldwater. It gave him 220 to 218, a two-vote margin. The whole state deserted the GOP; the only survivor in the Congressional delegation was popular Jimmy Cleveland — and he had to face a recount, it was that sweeping.

Let's go back to Town Meeting Day and the Presidential Preference Primary. Nelson Rockefeller, Barry Goldwater, and others wooed New Hampshire voters, practically on bended knee. Then, lo and behold, Cabot Lodge (who never came to our state) grabbed up most of the votes. The reasons are worth exploring, but this is not the place to do it.

Articles in the Warrant included matters of only passing interest, but a discussion of the tax status of

Nature Conservancy brought to light the fact that this non-profit organization as a result of private subscription now has acquired all 400 acres of the so-called island in Nubanusit. It was acquired from Dr. Lloyd Briggs, will be known as the Louis Cabot Preserve, and will be used for charitable, educational, and scientific purposes. Incidentally, not far away, a small plane lost for some days was found close to Jack Pond.

I suppose it should be added that at the School Meeting \$67,000 was appropriated hopefully to prepare our children for the rapidly changing world they will have to live in. We also voted a 20-year contract with Peterborough for our high school children.

This year England's Christine Keeler who set tongues awagging a year ago is already forgotten, but the Beatles out of Liverpool set feet a-tapping with a new type of music. Will they, too, be forgotten in a year's time? The fact that China exploded her first A-bomb certainly won't.

No one has thought particularly of Prospect Hill in recent years. Now we do. A housing development is projected, backed by Ken Whiton and others from Peterborough. Thelma Babbitt who lives on the road says that the building of homes has not yet started. In other parts of town John/Aino Kulish, Otis/Betty Wilder, Ken/Frances Tripp, and Bud/Nancy Adams built this year.

Alden and Karen Blake have settled gracefully into the Rectory as they have into our lives. Starting with the well-attended reception for them in June, they have built up church attendance by their youthful zest and deep interest in the people of our town. Even the choir, often composed of Kay Moore, Susan and Ruth Tarr, Jim and Candy Newcomb, Luana, Luella and Linda Dunbar, Phyllis Garand, Ann Ware, Ralph Tailby, Ellen Robertson, Frank MacFarlane, and Robert Strombeck has new eagerness. Eleanor Amidon directs and Sylvia St. John is the soloist of the group.

One year we mentioned several citizens who worked some miles out of town. It is interesting to record that in 1964 Bud and Lillian Wilbur instructed for a while at the University in Beirut, Lebanon, Cecil and Elsie Lyon were at the Embassy at Ceylon, Peter Moffat at the Embassy in Paris and Hugh and Dorothy Palmer returned from teaching in India. Foreign influences leading to and from Hancock included the receipt (somewhat delayed) of a medal Soldat de la Marne from the French Government by Warren Pierce. Frank Haas is way ahead as the proud possessor of the most wartime decorations.

This year, Hancock got its second beauty shop when Hilda Pierce opened up on Depot Street. Florence Wallace has long helped our ladies look their best.

To record all could fill our Town Report cover-tocover but there is just space to mention that our champion cake maker, Louisa Fairfield, received recognition in Yankee magazine for her hand-carved figures in a Christmas creche and the whole Town was described in Holiday magazine by Alden Todd as a "gem of a New Hampshire village".

D. REPORT OF DISTRICT CLERK HANCOCK SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Hancock, New Hampshire March 7, 1964

On March 7, 1964, the annual School District Meeting was opened at 4 p.m. by Robert English, Moderator. The polls were declared open for voting on the first four Articles of the Warrant, namely to choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Member of the School Board for three years.

After the Moderator read the first four Articles of the Warrant, Mr. George Hampson moved "that the polls be now opened and remain open until 8 p.m. to consider Articles 1 through 4 and that Articles 5 through 12 be taken up at 8 p.m." The motion passed and voting began.

Mrs. Alice Brown and Mrs. Gladys H. Bullard were ballot clerks.

At 8 p.m. the Moderator declared the polls closed and read Articles 5 through 12 of the Warrant; also the certification. Voting was as follows:

Article 5. Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay, member of the School Board:

I move that the salaries of the district officers for the ensuing year be as follows: Chairman of the School Board, \$75.00; each other Member, \$50.00; Treasurer, \$50.00; Clerk, \$15.00; Moderator, \$10.00; Ballot Clerks, \$1.50 per hour each; Auditors, \$1.50 per hour each.

There was no discussion and the motion passed.

Article 6. Motion by Mrs. Mary Garland, member of the School Board:

I move that the reports as printed be accepted and placed on file with the clerk.

The motion passed.

Article 7. Mr. Alfred Dillon moved that this Article be postponed for consideration later. The motion carried.

Article 8. Mr. Paul Daly moved that Article 12 be substituted for Article 8 at this time. The Moderator asked the desires of the meeting, i.e., whether or not to postpone action on Article 8 and consider Article 12 at this time. After some discussion, on a standing vote this motion was defeated and the meeting proceeded with Article 8.

Mr. George Hampson, Chairman of the School Board, moved: That the school district raise and appropriate \$67,052.89 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year. to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

Mr. Arthur Tremblay explained that the cost of transporting 7th and 8th grade students to Peterborough was not included in the current budget in answer to a question on this subject.

The motion passed.

Article 9. Motion by Mrs. Mary Garland of the School Board:

I move that the school board be authorized to make application for and accept on behalf of the district, any or all grants forthcoming under Title III, V, or VIII, or any combination thereof, of the National Defense Education Act. Public Law 85-864 or any or all grants of other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

The motion passed.

Article 10. Motion by Mr. George Hampson of the School Board:

I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 as a deficiency appropriation to be made available for current expenses prior to June 30, 1964.

After some discussion regarding expenses in connection with repairs to the school and additional transportation costs, this motion passed.

Article 11. Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay of the School Board:

I move that the school board be authorized to enter into a long-term tuition contract with the Peterborough School District for the education of certain of its pupils in the Peterborough Junior-Senior High School, such contract (s) not to exceed a term of 20 years from the date of the contract.

There followed a discussion and explanation of the contract. Asked for a clarification of this Article, Mr. George Hampson read the attached two-page report prepared by the School Board. Mr. Hampson also explained that Hancock is under no obligation to fulfill the promise of the estimated number of students to be sent to Peterborough. Invited to speak by the Moderator, Mr. Lewis Foote, Superintendent of Schools, further clarified the issue by answering questions from the floor. He spoke of the advantages to Hancock of such a contract. He explained that there would be no obligation on the part of the town. Mrs. Mary Garland further explained the report of the School Board.

The motion passed.

Article 12. Motion by Mr. Paul Daly:

I move that the School Board be instructed to arrange for use of the school premises for voluntary prayers, just previous to the opening of the school session each day.

There was much discussion for and against the motion.

Proponents of the motion argued that it was important for the welfare of the community and for the proper development of children to have voluntary prayers in the school.

Opponents pointed out that the Supreme Court recognized that there are all shades of religious opinions and allowing each religious group to struggle for control would not be proper in the schools.

There followed a discussion and criticism of the wording of the motion and Mrs. Dorothy Clark moved to amend it as follows: "I move that the School Board be instructed to allow the use of the school building for voluntary prayers by school children and their leaders just previous to the opening of the school session each day.

After more discussion the motion passed as amended by a voice vote.

Article 7. Mr. William Brown and Mr. Nelson Gay were elected School District auditors. The Moderator administered the oath of office.

At 10:20 p.m. a recess was declared by the Moderator so that the ballots could be counted. At 10:45 p.m. the results were announced as follows:

There were 126 ballots cast.

Moderator: Robert English, 77 votes.

Clerk: Dorothee English, 72 votes.

Treasurer: Mary E. Wilder, 117 votes.

School Board Member for 3 years: Arthur Tremblay, 77 votes.

The Moderator administered oaths of office. At 10:50 p.m. the meeting was adjourned.

TO THE VOTERS OF THE HANCOCK SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Hancock School Board wishes to call to your attention an article appearing in the school warrant pertaining to a contract with the Peterborough School District. We have been asked by Peterborough for an expression of willingness to send tuition students to them on a contract basis, so they will be able to have some indication of their future space needs when they embark upon a building program this spring.

The Hancock School Board is asking for a vote on sending the 7th and 8th grades (starting the school year 1965-1966) to Peterborough as well as approving a contract for grades 9-12.

We have given considerable thought to this proposal and studied the pros and cons of it for the last two years. There are many advantages to be gained from the intimate atmosphere and close personal contact to be found in a 7th-8th grade arrangement such as ours. And probably all of us would prefer to have grades 1-12 right here in Hancock if we felt it were possible to offer as good a program as in a larger school, and if it were economically feasible.

The Jr. High years are becoming much more important as a preparation for High School, and the student who has had a high school education that we, as students, had, will no longer be able to hold his own in a country more and more dominated by automation. The mathematics and science courses alone are being drastically revised all through the high school level, and the student who is not able to keep up with the increasingly demanding work will be placed at a serious disadvantage. Across the country there are millions of young people who are unable to get any decent job because their education hasn't even given them the basic tools for understanding the technology of today's automated machines. (A child not adequately educated today may well be among the unemployed tomorrow.) We think we would be shirking our responsibility to the children of Hancock if we did not recommend a program which, in our opinion, offers the best educational opportunity.

At the Peterborough Jr. High there are currently three divisions of the 7th grade and four divisions of the 8th, based on student ability. There is a separate teacher especially qualified in the field for each of the following

subjects: English, Social Studies, Mathematics, Science. For those students in the 7th grade who can qualify, French is now being offered. In addition to the music and art programs which we have here in Hancock, there are also two periods a week of Home Economics, two periods of Manual Arts, and two periods of Physical Education. The sports program for the Jr. High is currently limited to boys though the girls can participate in cheerleading.

Both 7th and 8th grades have one separate self-contained class apiece under a home room teacher to take care of children who would benefit more from the close personal relationship with one teacher who knows them well than from the departmentalized system. These classes have proved of great assistance to the chronic failers, and the special help provided has enabled several children to join in some of the regular courses with their classmates.

Peterborough has the only school system in the area large enough to provide the number of courses and teachers necessary for the curriculum we believe the children of Hancock should be getting. It would be financially impossible to offer anything like these educational opportunities here in Hancock.

We feel it important that we make an expression of opinion at this time. In the near future, Hancock will be forced to take some steps to meet the growing demand for a more specialized educational program for collegeoriented and technically-oriented students. Also, while we are not currently pressed with too many students in Hancock, it would be unrealistic not to expect that within the next five or ten years the Hancock School will be inadequate in size. If we do not think to the future and make provisions for that time, there is no reason to expect Peterborough to build space for our students and accept them at a future date, when we are pressed. It is definitely to our advantage on a cost basis to think in terms of sending tuition students to Peterborough, for if the needs of space force us to consider a building program of our own, the financial burden to the townspeople of Hancock would be crushing. It appears to us to be wiser to act with foresight now than to be forced into a much more expensive and less convenient solution later.

The financial increase to the town of Hancock, as best as we are able to project at this time, is based on a current Jr. High tuition of \$427.50. From this would be subtracted the salary of one teacher, making an increase of approximately \$2000. in appropriations. In addition, the transportation would have to be increased by approx. \$1500 since state law requires the transportation of all students up to the 9th grade. There is no doubt in our minds that the change will have to come eventually and we think to make provisions for it now, rather than later when there might not be room for our students, when we might be forced into solutions which would cost the town a great deal of money, and when our students might have to settle for a 2nd class education, would be both tragic and irresponsible.

We have not reached this decision without considerable thought and study and we urge you to give this matter your close attention.

We hope that all voters interested in the excellence of education, in making a sensible financial provision for the future, and in assuring that every Hancock boy and girl stepping out into the world will have had the best education we could provide for them, will come to the School District meeting at 8:00 P.M. on Saturday, March 7th, and express his opinions on this matter.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Hancock qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 6th day of March, 1965, at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon, (Polls close at 8:00 P.M., unless otherwise voted), to act on Articles 1-4, and you are further notified to meet at the same place on the same day at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act on Articles 5-12 hereof:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.
- 9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants forthcoming under Titles III, V, or VIII, or any combination thereof, of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864 or any or all

grants of other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

- 10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to fully implement its contractual agreement with the Peterborough School District and educate Grades 7 and 8 in the Peterborough Junior-Senior High School.
- 11. To see if the school district will vote to create an area school district planning committee, as prescribed in R.S.A. 195-A:3, and elect three members, one of whom must come from the school board or determine that they be appointed by the moderator.

Article 12. To see if the district will accept the provisions of Chapter 197, Section 1a, of the New Hampshire Revised Statues Annotated and elect its district officers at the annual tow meeting.

B. School Program

The school staff has three new members this year: Mrs. Metivier, who replaced Mrs. Whippie during the fall, Miss Carter, music supervisor for the Supervisory Union, and Mrs. Coombs, school nurse.

Miss Elizabeth Morin, a student teacher from Keene State College, did her cadet training in grades 1 and 2 under the direction of Mrs. Deschenes.

The mathematics program, now in its third year, is being used in grades 1 through 6. Mrs. Clark and Mr. Capon have lent much to the success of this program with the use of departmentalized teaching in grades 5 through 8.

Our phonics program in grades 1 through 6 continues to prove most effective. Grades 7 and 8 have recently procured a literary sampler for an expanded reading program at this level. Under the direction of Mr. Capon, the history program in grades 7 and 8 has taken on new dimensions, with emphasis on the problem approach and relationships of present happenings to past events being used as a vehicle for greater knowledge and understanding.

Through the expanded music program, supervised by Miss Barbara Carter and Mr. Charles Edgerly, the school is now able to offer vocal music to all grades along with instrumental groups in grades 5 through 8.

A Supervisory Union in-service program in the "Improvement of Reading" was attended by members of the faculty last spring. Other members of our staff have continued to receive graduate credits and work on advanced degrees during the past year.

This year, as in the past, many happenings and

events have added to a better, more comprehensive school climate.

The P.T.A. continues to be a worthwhile organization forwarding the good relations between the parent and the teacher and meeting various needs of the school.

The new movie projector which the school district purchased this year, with the aid of the National Defense Education Act, has been used quite extensively and with great success.

This year the annual school Christmas program was put on through the efforts of the Woman's Club. The result was most satisfactory and the school wishes to thank Mrs. Amidon for her time and effort.

The School Board has authorized the construction of a snow roof over the fire escape on the back of the building, to keep dangerous accumulations of snow and ice from forming on the fire escape steps.
