**WARRANT FOR THE ONE HUNDRED
AND NINETY-FIFTH ANNUAL
TOWN MEETING**

(L.S.)

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Northfield, in the
County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote
in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Northfield
Town Hall, the fourth day of March next at ten of the
clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers and School
District officers for the coming year. And on the eighth
day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to
act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the with-
drawal from Revenue Sharing Fund, established under
the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of
1972, for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations
for the following priority purposes, and in amounts in-
dicated, or take any action hereon:

Sanitary Landfill	\$10,000.00
Oiling	9,000.00

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-
priate a sum of \$41,042.00, for the purpose of recon-
struction of the bridge over the Winnepesaukee River,
such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or
Notes not to exceed \$41,042.00 under, and in compli-
ance with, the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act,
and to authorize the selectmen to issue and negotiate
such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of in-
terest thereon, and to take such other action as may be
necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale, and
delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the interest
of the Town of Northfield.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$21,250.00, for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et. seq., 6 Stat. 16 et. seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$21,250.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H.R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Northfield, and to allow the selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et. seq., 6 stat. 16 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,654.39 for the purpose of updating the report on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities, completing an infiltration/inflow analysis or any other requirements contained in P.L. 92-500 which will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be appropriated under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of

the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Northfield, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$12,000.00 for rubbish pick-up per year, for a three-year contract.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be set aside for the Bicentennial of the Town of Northfield in the year 1980; a Bicentennial Committee to be appointed by the selectmen. (by request)

8. To see if the Town will vote to participate in the United States Bicentennial; a committee to be appointed by the selectmen. (by request)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,067.00 for surface treatment of Woodlawn Drive in the Parker-Plummer Development. (by petition — not recommended by the Budget Committee)

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain the following described roads: Parts of Winnepesaukee, Highlands, and Greenwood Drive, known to some as the "Loop," which consists of a distance of about seven-tenths of a mile. (by petition)

10a. If 10 is defeated — to see if the Town will vote to accept winter maintenance of the following roads: Winnepesaukee, Highlands, and Greenwood Drive located off Hidden Lane — total length approximately seven-tenths of a mile. (by petition)

11. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to make the lower level of the Northfield Town Hall available for use as a public kindergarten facility. The

selectmen are authorized, by this article, to negotiate an amount of rental with the Superintendent of Schools. (by petition)

12. To see if the Town of Northfield will vote to accept the budget submitted by the Budget Committee and pass any vote in relation thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to allow the selectment to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that may be acquired through the Tax Collector's deeds.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of Officers as printed.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Polls shall be closed not earlier than six of the clock in the evening.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION STUDY COMMITTEE

The Recreation Study Committee was appointed during 1974 by the Selectmen to study ways to improve and expand recreation in Northfield and to report our findings to them.

The committee met with Richard A. Tapply, Director of the State Office of Community Recreation Service. He informed us of possible grant money which might be available to towns which cooperate in their recreation programs, providing each town has some recreation programs of its own. He told us the source of the grant might be particularly attracted to towns cooperating across county lines. We think Northfield and Tilton might, therefore, qualify for grant money for recreation and recommend that this be investigated further.

Mr. Tapply offered to analyze the town's recreation resources and make suggestions, to come and show slides to those interested of innovative playgrounds around the world, and to take interested persons on a tour of communities similar in size to ours which have excellent recreation programs in New Hampshire. We hope advantage will be taken of these offers in the near future.

We learned, through Mr. Tapply's office, of a program in Plymouth involving strong cooperation between the recreation department and the school department. We recommend that a meeting be held in Northfield between Plymouth recreation and education officials and local interested parties to learn more about this concept and its potential for us.

The committee suggests the possibility of developing for recreational use the several acres owned by the town adjacent to the town beach.

We have learned of areas in town which have strong potential to be used for public skating and sliding. This might involve some flooding, packing snow down, and plowing for parking. We hope this might be done.

We urge townspeople to support efforts which will be made to provide recreation programs to our senior citizens.

The committee offers the idea of a unique, annual town event stressing community involvement along with increased community spirit and pride in Northfield. One suggestion involves a traveling fair with buses touring the town, making stops at exhibits, demonstrations, open houses, and displays by townspeople and local organizations. We solicit other ideas for such an event and hope that something of this sort becomes a reality.

Suggestions made to the committee include having a Northfield recreation building, various athletic leagues, and an annual Easter egg hunt.

Our committee has met with representatives of the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council. We appreciate the fine work the council is doing and offer its members our suggestions and our full support.

We have informed the Selectmen in specific detail about our findings and suggestions.

REPORT TO TOWNS

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanston and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

1974 Annual Report

The end of '74 completes 19 years of organized activities provided by the citizens of Tilton and Northfield. The accomplishments this year include:

A. Center Activities:

The Center under the supervision of David Petelle, Recreation Director is open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings from 6:00 P.M. — 9:00 P.M. and Saturday afternoons from 1:00 P.M. — 4:00 P.M. Ping-pong, pool, tumbling, weight lifting, bumper pool, chess, checkers, and assorted games are available.

The Teen Council sponsored movies and dances January thru June but because adult advisors were unavailable the Teen Council has not been active since June. If there are any adults in the Tilton-Northfield area who might be interested in activating the Teen Council please contact one of the officers.

B. Swimming Program:

Two 4 week periods were provided during the summer months under the direction of Ms. Vicki Marshall. Three 2 hour sessions were held daily Monday-Friday and included courses from beginners to junior life-saving. 7 local youngsters were employed in this program. 123 children participated in this program. The program was concluded with a picnic, contests were held and prizes were awarded.

C. Playground Program:

For 8 weeks under the direction of the Recreation Council, and Playground Co-ordinator Ms. Patricia Laliberte with the help of 8 local youngsters various arts and crafts, indoor and outdoor games were pro-

vided for 3 hours in the morning daily Monday-Friday. Approximately 65 children attended this program. Special events included trips to Tilton 500, Dairy Queen Minature Golf, Daniel Webster Birthplace, Upside down Covered Bridge, Squam Lake Science Center, Mt. Washington Boat Ride, Wellington State Park, and the Tilton Animal Village. These trips were made possible by a carnival which was sponsored by the children and donations from local citizens.

The youngsters of the playground and swimming program built a float and participated in the Franklin Hospital Lawn Party parade.

D. Ski Program:

The Council sponsored two 5 week programs at the Highland Ski Area on Saturday mornings. Approximately 25 youngsters participated in this program. The Council co-ordinates the Ski Program with the Highland Ski Area thereby obtaining a low cost group rate which the participants pay for themselves.

E. Babe Ruth Baseball:

The Council sponsored a ball team playing in the Twin Rivers League. The boys had an opportunity to play against good competition, some also had the opportunity to play on the All Star Team. Our congratulations to this fine team and their Coaches, Donald Stevens and Clyde Vittum. At the end of the season the Council hosted a banquet for the team members and their parents at which time trophies were awarded.

F. Special Events:

1. Teen Council Bike-A-Thon. In May the Teen Council held a 20 mile Bike-A-Thon. The returned pledges amounted to \$800.00 which the Teen Council donated to the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council Building Fund.

2. Red Sox Baseball. Approximately 100 youngsters attended a Red Sox Baseball game in June. Prior to

attending the game they were given a tour of the Boston Coast Guard Station.

3. Halloween Party. This was initiated by the Tilton-Northfield Police Departments, the Selectmen, Recreation Council, the Tilton-Northfield Fire Department and co-ordinated by Paul Paquette. All took part on this night of spooks and goblins. A parade with sirens and lights and a walk through Main Street brought the youngsters to the Recreation Center. Beverages, apples, cookies, and candies were distributed to all. Later in the evening a live band at the Winnisquam Regional High School played to a large group of teenagers, who also had free beverages and foodstuffs.

Many thanks to the many merchants, companies, individuals, and organizations who donated funds or provided goods to make this evening possible.

“Thank you” to those individuals and groups who have helped the Council provide activities throughout the year. Special thanks to the taxpayers of our communities whose support continues to make recreation programs available.

All interested citizens are welcome to attend our regular monthly meeting, the first Tuesday of every month. We meet at 7:30 P.M. at the Recreation Center at the Tilton Town Hall.

HALL MEMORIAL LIBRARY**Tilton-Northfield, N. H.****Report of the Librarian — 1974**

Better service to a greater number in the community continues to be the rule at Hall Memorial. All areas — circulation, patron registration, new books and records — have grown rapidly, and the exact figures for the year are given below. We have been particularly fortunate in the gift of children's books by the Woman's Club of Tilton-Northfield, as well as in gifts, either directly or as Memorial Books, by individuals. Had it not been for these very generous donations, particularly in the field of books for the children (an area where Hall Memorial has circulated more books than Franklin Public Library), the rising cost of new materials would have prevented the purchase of many new additions currently on our shelves.

As well as being active, the library's interior has been refurbished by the installation of wall-to-wall carpeting, new chairs, and a display case for the front lobby, purchased with special funding appropriated at Tilton's 1974 Town Meeting. The Friends of the Library (who provided our Christmas decorations, as well as holding their booksale, annual tea, and sponsoring speakers) provided continuing evidence of community involvement as well as additional funds for refurbishing and other projects. Many of the Friends helped with summer programs for the young people, including Mystery Question and Local Landmark contests, a Half-a-Story-hour, and the taping of cassette versions of children's books, enabling young readers to look and listen — a feature which will become a permanent part of the library's offerings in the year ahead. To help beginning readers, we are now marking books for their level with special identifying tape on the binding. For parents and teachers of children with learning disabilities, we were

privileged to have a wide selection of materials on a three-month loan from the Laconia chapter of the New Hampshire Association for Children with Learning Disabilities. The library also continues to provide both books and basic library skills for primary school children who come with their classes.

Hall Memorial has joined with neighboring public and school libraries to form a book purchasing cooperative. Scrooge and Marley (Service Center Region Organized to Overcome Growing Expenses and Multiply Available Revenues for Libraries by Enlarging their Yield) is an association of libraries in Sanbornton, Franklin, Hill, Andover and East Andover, Tilton School, Bristol, New Hampton and Tilton-Northfield. The combined purchasing power of these libraries enables us all to share in an increased discount from the cooperative's jobber, and is one way of fighting the increasing cost of books.
