MINUTES OF THE NOTTINGHAM

TOWN MEETING

MARCH 8, 1955

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing:

The following were chosen:

Selectman — James Kelsey
 Town Clerk — Richard L. Friend
 Treasurer — Edna Glover
 Tax Collector — Donald Perkins
 Library Trustees—3 years, Ann Friend
 2 years, Marion Sanborn
 1 year, Florence Kelsey
 Road Agent—Philip Fernald
 Auditor—Mildred Jones
 Chief of Police—Benjamin De Butts

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

John Clark moved that the sum of \$19,817.39 be raised to defray town charges. Passed in the affirmative.

Frederick Fernald moved that \$1,000 of summer maintenance money be used to tar section of town road to be determined by selectmen. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$300 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust in 1955.

Albert Demeritt moved that Article 3 be adopted—passed in the affirmative.

Article 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for fire equipment.

Frederick Fernald moved that Article 4 be adopted. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$731.39, the state to contribute \$4,875.95, for Town Road Aid.

Donald Perkins moved that Article 5 be adopted—passed in the affirmative.

Article 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for snow fence.

Frederick Fernald moved that Article 6 be dispensed with—passed in the affirmative.

Article 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to improve the new Northside Cemetery and grade the Southside Cemetery driveways.

Albert Demeritt moved that Article 7 be adopted—passed in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25 for Civil Defense operation and equipment.

Joseph Cook moved that Article 8 be adopted—passed in the affirmative.

Article 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 to purchase a dump and maintain weekly hours by an attendant according to State direction.

Philip Fernald moved that Article 9 be adopted. Discussion by Philip Fernald, Albert Demeritt and Frederick Fernald—passed in the affirmative.

Article 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for partial maintenance of road way into Patuccoway Pond and North River Pond according to assessed valuation.

Frederick Fernald moved that Article 10 be adopted—passed in affirmative.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to reopen

Mountain Road to Pattuccaway reservation providing the state appropriates money to rebuild for fire protection on request of District Fire Warden.

Frederick Fernald moved that Article 11 be dispensed with—passed in the affirmative.

Article 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for our share in rebuilding Mountain Road to Patuccaway Reservation if the state passes the project.

Donald Perkins moved that Article 12 be dispensed with—Passed in the affirmative.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$70 (less than 1/100th of one per cent of the Town's assessed valuation) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association as the Town's proportionate share in publicizing and promoting all interests in this region, or act in relation thereto.

Philip Fernald moved that Article 13 be dispensed with. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Gile Road so-called, from Route 152 at Nottingham School to Kelsey Town Road at Al Fernald's bridge.

Donald Perkins moved that Article 14 be adopted. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue River Road so-called from Smoke Street to Kelsey's Road passing through land of James Kelsey.

Albert Demeritt moved that Article 15 be adopted. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to sell real estate and property as listed in the Town Report, acquired through the Tax Collectors sales, and all other surplus equipment, at public auction.

Donald Perkins moved that the action of last year be

continued. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Albert Demeritt moved that the selectmen be authorized to appoint all officers not elected. Passed in the affirmative.

Donald Perkins moved that Polls be closed at 6:30 P. M. Passed in the affirmative.

Arthur MacDaniels moved that the selectmen be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Passed in the affirmative.

Kenneth Cooper moved that \$200 be taken from the treasury to survey land in South Side Cemetery. Passed in the affirmative.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nottingham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Nottingham on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$300.00 for the Control of White Pine Blister Rust in 1956.

4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250. for repair of water reservoir near Andrew Stevens', for fire department.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$731.25, the State to contribute \$4,875.01, for Town Road Aid.

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to fence and grade roadways in the new Northside Cemetery.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Civil Defense operation and equipment.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the

sum of \$700.00 to fence and provide roadway to and maintain weekly hours by an attendant according to State direction at the Town dump.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for partial maintenance of main roadways from public roads to developed lake shore frontage and in accordance with assessed valuation.

10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell real estate and property as listed in the Town report acquired through Tax Collector's sales, and all other surplus equipment at public auction.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for hard-surfacing roads, the road or portion of roads so treated to be designated by the Selectmen.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to restore the fallen east abutment of Marston's bridge on the Lee Hill Road, or otherwise repair as the Road Agent may find necessary.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The work of reactivating the Nottingham Library began immediately after the 1955 Town Meeting. The following statement from Miss Pratt, Assistant State Librarian, helps to explain the work undertaken

“At the request of the trustees of the library (who by New Hampshire law are in charge of the property of the town relating to the library.) Miss Pratt and Miss Stroud of the State Library staff, assisted by library trustees, weeded the shelves of worn out and obsolete books. This weeding process is in line with general library policy of clearing shelves of books no longer of general interest, to make way for new titles, and was especially necessary in Nottingham since the new quarters did not provide comparable space. Some state documents were designated as of value to the State Library and are to be brought back to the State Library, as they originally came from the state. The so-called “state-aid” books all are among the ones to be moved to the new quarters.”

The next step was to list and number all of the remaining books and to put pockets in each and make out a card for each book. In this work the trustees received a great deal of help from Betty Fernald, Theresa Batchelder, Lisa Batchelder, Lida Fernald, Velma Demeritt, Dorothy Travis, and others. When this was done the shelves in the library room of the new school were varnished and the school board arranged to have the floor sanded and finished.

The books were moved to the new quarters in time for reopening the library August 6. The library is open on Saturday from two to four p.m. Up to the end of December borrowers have taken out 349 books, an average of 20 per Saturday.

On October 6, Mrs. Dorothy Fownes began opening the library from 9:00 to 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday mornings for the pupils of the four upper grades. On Wednesdays 502 books have been loaned, an average of over 50 per Wednesday.; or a total of 851 books borrowed, & a total average of 70 books per week.

The State Bookmobile visits the library every ten weeks and has loaned an average of 65 books for each period.

Since the library has been open there has been no paid librarian but a number of people, in addition to the trustees, have donated their time. Betty Fernald, Elinor Fernald, Dorothy Travis have served as librarian, and Deanna Perkins has assisted.

Due to the thoughtful efforts of Mrs. Royal Cutler and with the help of Mrs. George Fletcher, the Beverley Library of Beverley, Massachusetts, gave the Nottingham Library about 250 books, all fairly recent and in good condition. The Nottingham Library also received about 100 books from the estate of Mrs. John D. Perkins. Betty Fernald has given the library several volumes of history of New Hampshire regiments. Various other people have donated smaller numbers of books. These include, Elinor Fernald, Helen Gfroerer, Janet Spurr, Sally Mears, Ann Friend and Florence Kelsey. 72 new books have been purchased.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the thirteenth day of March, 1956, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects;

1. To choose all necessary District Officers for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,825.00 for interest (\$825.00) and retirement of debt (\$3,000.00).
