### WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Meriden Town Hall in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the nineth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

**Article 1.** To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Tax Collector, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, two Auditors and any other necessary Town Officers. The Polls shall remain open from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

You are hereby further notified to meet at Meriden Town Hall in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the nineth day of March, next at one-thirty of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes, to be paid on or before one year's time, pursuant to the N. H. Laws of 1917.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 and instruct the Selectmen to borrow \$4,500.00, payable \$1,500.00 yearly beginning in 1955, to apply on construction of the co-called Will French bridge. This money to replace the \$6,000.00 voted last year under article 3 of last year's warrant, as that money was not actually borrowed last year.
- **Article 4.** To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue subject to gates and bars that portion of the Plainfield-Meriden stage road which has been replaced by new construction, said portion described as follows: beginning at the point where the new construction commences approximately one-fourth mile above the house occupied by H. W. Hendrick and continuing across Blow-Me-Down brook and along the southerly side of said brook to Roy Dean's driveway.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following sections of the old road that were formerly a part of State Highway 12 A, described as follows: Sec. 1. A piece of the old road beginning on land of Blancha L. Daniels and extending northeasterly along land of Blancha L. Daniels and Lucy F. Bishop (replaced by new construction.) Sec. 2. A piece of the old road beginning just north of the Frog Pond on land of Blancha L. Daniels and extending northerly along lands of Blancha L. Daniels

and Maxfield Parish to the present traveled highway (replaced by new construction.) Sec. 3. A piece of the old road on the westerly side of State Highway 12 A beginning just north of Angus Allan's house and continuing northerly along the westerly side of State Highway 12 A adjacent to lands of Angus Allan, Raymond Tolbert and the Heirs of D. C. Westgate to where said old road joins the present highway just south of the bridge across Beaver Brook in Puckerpod, (replaced by new construction in 1941.) Sec. 4. The piece of old road lying easterly of State Highway 12 A near the top of the hill in Ward's Woods, (replaced by new construction in 1940.) Sec. 5 The piece of old road easterly of State Highway 12 A adjacent to lands of Edward M. Pierce and Victor Hewes, (replaced by new construction in 1936.)

Article 7. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair, paint and improve the Town Hall at Plainfield Plain.

**Article 8.** To see if the Town will vote to allow a 2% discount on 1954 property taxes paid within 20 days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

**Article 9.** To see what action the Town will take with regard to the reports of Town Officers.

**Article 10.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the snow-plow that was formerly used on the tractor owned by the Town.

Article 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.





During the year January 1, 1953 through December 31, 1953 the Plainfield Free Bed Fund in the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, Hanover, New Hampshire rendered 22 days' service to 3 residents of the town of Plainfield, New Hampshire.

The portion of Free Bed Funds allotted by the Trustees to the Town of Plainfield was \$400.00.

The charges at the minimum hospital rates for service rendered to these patients during the period amounted to \$265.00. Subtracting this figure from the total allotment of \$400.00, left an unused balance of \$135.00 for the year 1953 which will be brought forward in 1954.

We are attaching the usual summary, showing the various charges to this Fund.

Please accept my personal, as well as official, thanks for the fine manner in which this Fund was handled during the past year.

#### REPORT ON MERIDEN TOWN HALL

To the Citizens of Plainfield:

Your selectmen appointed a committee of three persons, viz.; Mrs. Edna DuBois, Morris Penniman and Harold Pringle as an advisory board to work with them in determining what was the best and wisest course to persue in fixing up the Meriden Town Hall. We examined the building and found that it required much more than painting to fix it as it should be. It was concluded to obtain estimates on costs of making some structural changes, rewiring and painting.

We received several bids on the proposed work, and after serious consideration it was the decision that we should make the improvements that have been done, in order to make the best use of the money that was made available by the town.

The people of Meriden had long felt that "their" town hall was much neglected, and they were ready and willing to help on the project. As a group and as individuals they have done themselves proud in cooperating. The members of the Meriden Community Club have raised money and made definite plans to improve the driveway and grounds about the hall next spring. They also worked as a group and got the interior of the hall ready for the paint job. The members of Meriden Grange cleaned up the inside of the building after the workmen had finished. The School Board had protective screens made and installed over the windows on the westerly side of the building.





Several persons gave fixtures and materials for additional improvements that have greatly enhanced the appearance and usefulness of this town hall. We wish to note here what they gave. Mr. and Mrs. John Cowles gave the new lighting fixtures; Miss Marion Carter, Harold Pringle and Joseph Zea gave the Venetian blinds for the main auditorium. John F. McNamara gave the fan for the furnace and installed it, and paint for the furnace and for the porch roof. Mr. and Mrs. Carl DuBois, Howard Zea and K.U.A. gave the materials for refinishing the floor. Howard Zea and Raymond Cutts donated their time to refinish it, using equipment loaned by K.U.A. Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Chivers, William Bergholz and Vernon Hood gave the Venetian blinds for the offices and the shades for the upstairs windows. Mr. and Mrs. Chivers also gave the paint and paid for painting the outside of the south end of the building. A new velvet curtain for the stage has also been given by: Mrs. James Scott, Henry Penniman, Meriden Grange, Meriden Community Club and the Ladies of the Congregational Church. Mrs. Ira Townsend has made the arrangements to have it made and installed. Mrs. Bertha Porter assisted the committee by choosing the colour scheme for the interior.

The total costs of these gifts to those who gave them was over \$800.00 in addition to the value of the time and labor given.

In behalf of the Town the selectmen wish to thank the committee who worked with them, and each and every person or organization who have so generously helped to complete the project. The cooperative efforts of the Town and all others concerned has made the Meriden Town Hall a public building of which all the townspeople can well be proud.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Plainfield, in the county of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Meriden in said District on Saturday, March 6, 1954 at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects.

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To choose auditors or other agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of said District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxation by the district.

- Article 8. To see if the District will vote to build and equip an addition to the Meriden Village School, provide the necessary equipment and furnishings and to take any other action relating thereto.
- Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed \$15,000 for the construction, equipment and furnishings for the said addition to the Meriden Village School; and whether the district will vote to authorize the issue of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the District for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the School Board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale, the time and place of payment of principal and interest in accordance with the municipal bond statue. N. H. Revised Laws Chapter 72, as amended.
- Article 10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to supervise the construction of said addition and to execute any and all contracts, agreements and instruments necessary in connection with the construction of said addition.
- Article 11. To see if the District will vote to sell the Methodist Hill school house at public auction.
- Article 12. To see if the District will vote to elect its officers by an official ballot, and to adopt the non partisan ballot system as provided in Sections 112 and 120, Chapter 34 of the Revised Laws.
- Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Plainfield:

A new reading program is gradually being made available for each grade. Additional emphasis is being placed on a sensible program in phonetics. Up-to-date arithmetic and language books are being introduced. There is a definite need for new books for spelling, handwriting, science and health. These will be purchased as money is available.

Financially the District benefitted by the \$11,100 received from the State for School Aid for this year. This was a substantial increase over the amount received for 1952-53. The cost for high school tuition is 29 percent of

the total budget for 1954-55.

The increased enrollment in the Plainfield village School necessitates too many pupils for each teacher. It is undesirable to have more than 30 pupils in a mixed graded room, but it appears that all 3 rooms will have approximately 35 next year. Better education would be possible if a fourth teacher were hired for next year. This would also make possible the desirable arrangement of only 2 grades per teacher.

The additional rooms have continued to prove very satisfactory in Plainfield and I hope that sometime Meriden will have as fine school building facilities. A four room building with two grades per teacher would be, I believe, a very satisfactory solution to the building needs

in Meriden Village.

The last Legislature established the position of Helping Teacher for several Supervisory Unions, and this Union has been notified that the State will pay \$2500 toward the salary of such a person. A Helping Teacher will work with the pupils referred to her by teachers, will give special tests to individual pupils and will occasionally make home visits. She will work for the general advancement of sound education for boys and girls by cooperating with and helping pupils, parents, teachers, School Boards, and administrators.

My sincere thanks are extended to the School Board, Teachers, Nurse, Bus Drivers, Janitors, P.T.A.'s, Lunch Workers and others who have helped in carrying out the

educational program during the past year.


