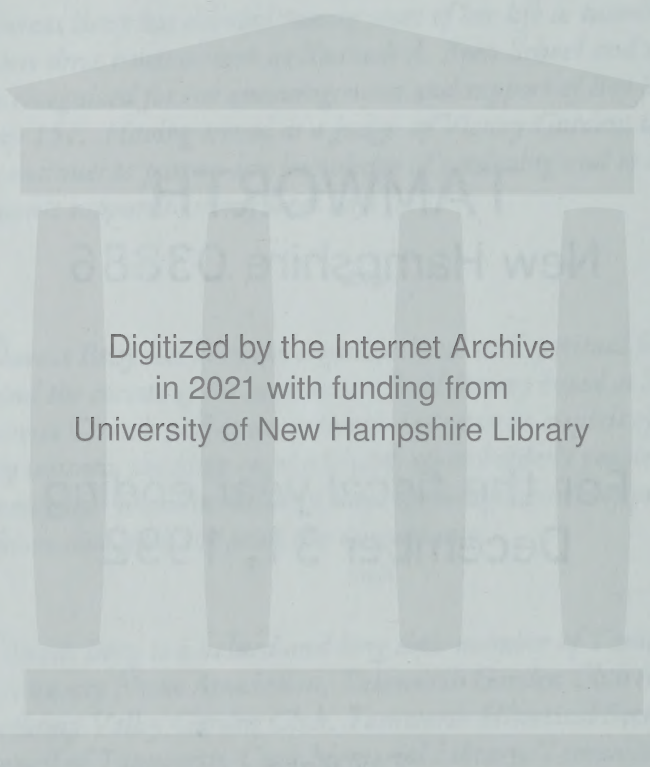

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tamworth Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the ninth of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE No.1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

The meeting will be in two parts.

1. In order that the preceding article may be legally voted on by Non-Partisan ballot, you are hereby notified that the polls will be open for this purpose at 10:00 of the clock on said Tuesday, March 9th. Polls shall not close earlier than 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE No.2: To see what time the polls shall be closed. Following action on Article 2 the meeting will be recessed until 7:00 p.m. on March 10th next at the Kenneth A. Brett School to see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes and to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ARTICLE No. 53:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) to be added to the Town Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of future revaluation of the Town.

ARTICLE No. 54:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and seventy-three thousand dollars (\$173,000.00) to cover the cost of the Town Revaluation this year (1993) and to authorize the withdrawal of one hundred and seventy-three thousand dollars (\$173,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. (Amount is the total of the CRF balance and the 1993 appropriation.)

ARTICLE No. 55:

To vote to see if the Town shall adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from the assessed valuation of residential real estate for property tax purposes. This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year for property tax purposes from the assessed valuation on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00

ARTICLE No. 56:

To see if the Town will vote to name the park land from Dr. Remick (accepted at Town Meeting 1992) one of the following three names:

- 1.) Edwin Remick Park
- 2.) Tamworth Town Common
- 3.) Tamworth Village Green

ARTICLE No. 57:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to temporarily gate or allow to be gated any Class VI road for the purpose of limiting vehicular travel during excessive mud conditions where travel on the road would cause severe rutting and serious erosion. The purpose is to prevent damage to Town property and thereby maximize the long-term use of the roads for Town residents on dry and frozen conditions. All non-motorized travel will not be affected by this article.

ARTICLE No. 58:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Cook Library Trustees to apply for, and accept and expend funds from the State, Federal, or any other governmental unit; or any private source which might become available during the year in accordance with RSA 202A:4-C.

ARTICLE No. 59:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept donations of personal property in accordance with RSA 31:95-E.

ARTICLE No. 60:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.

ARTICLE No. 61:

To see if the Town will vote (in accordance with RSA 80:80) to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds as justice may require.

ARTICLE No. 62:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE No. 63:

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD

1992 ANNUAL REPORT

In 1992 the Planning Board conducted 12 regular monthly meetings. At those meetings, 6 Boundary Line Adjustments, 4 Scenic Road Hearings, 1 Wetlands Ordinance Waiver request for septic and 7 Subdivisions were approved. Five Subdivision consultations were also reviewed. Presently, administrative work continues on six uncompleted subdivision projects.

In addition to our regular meetings, 19 work meetings were also held, as well as, numerous subcommittee sessions. Administrative matters were dealt with along with the following projects outlined below.

RULES OF PROCEDURES AND SUBDIVISION

Progress has been made on the revision and updating of the Subdivision Regulations. We hope to have our Rules of Procedures regarding all Planning Board matters completed by March - April. Several years ago, the Town voted to designate all Town roads as Scenic Roads. As a follow-up measure, the Board needs to adopt Scenic Road Regulations. The same should be done for State mandated 155E Excavation Regulations. All these measures are being done to make the whole process regarding application, filing and hearings more understandable and less cumbersome to users and town officials alike.

EDUCATIONAL:

This year the Planning Board members again took advantage of all that was offered regionally for seminars and workshops. Members knowledge was broadened in land use matters by attending the following workshops and seminars.

Law Lecture Series was sponsored by the N.H. Municipal Association and the Lakes Regional Planning Commission. The three lectures offered were attended by most of the members. These lectures are essential for keeping abreast of ever changing legal issues.

Shore Line Protection Workshop was sponsored by the Lakes Region Planning Commission. This workshop was important due to a new State Law designed to protect certain public water in the State (Town). The Law affects development and certain uses along designated public waters.

Master Plan Workshop was sponsored by the Lakes Region Planning Commission. This workshop was designed to assist Planning Board members in the technical aspects and techniques for updating a Town Master Plan. This was especially helpful as we are currently updating the Town's Master Plan.

Rules, Procedures and Regulations Workshop was sponsored by the Lakes Region Planning Commission and the Wolfeboro Planning Board. Members gained valuable knowledge on these issues.

Road Construction and Maintenance Workshop was sponsored by the Lakes Region Planning Commission, the University of New Hampshire, the Soil Conservation Service and the N.H. Department of Fish and Game. This all day seminar, with a field demonstration, provided expertise on proper construction and maintenance techniques for new and old roads.

N.H. Wetlands Board - Speaker Dr. Ken Kettering - was sponsored by the Tamworth Conservation Commission. Executive Director Dr. Kettering spoke on dredge & fill permits, other state jurisdictional wetland issues and how Towns and the Wetlands Board can work in cooperation.

MASTER PLAN REVISION

As a result of the support of the voters at the 1992 Town Meeting, the Lakes Region Planning Commission was the successful low bidder and was contracted to help the Planning Board update the 1980 Master Plan. We have formed an active sub-committee of 2 Planning Board members and 2 Conservation Commission members, along with several citizen volunteers to work with the Lakes Region Planning Commission.

The Committee has nearly completed a community self-survey questionnaire which we plan to distribute door to door in March, provided enough man power can be obtained. In all, Board Members and volunteers have invested in excess of 500 hours of valuable time this past year.

Agency Information

Tamworth Community Nurse Association received renewal of licensure for another year of service as a Community Health Agency after annual inspection on July 21, 1992 by Anne Lance, R.N., B.S. of New Hampshire Department of Public Health. Patient records, supplies and equipment, protocols and procedures were examined and found to be in compliance with state regulations for home health care. Tamworth Community Nurse Association has become licensed this year as well under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendment (CLIA), U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services, Public Health Practice Program for testing of blood sugar and urinalysis specimens.

Dr. John Patten continues to serve as the medical advisor to T.C.N.A.. We are appreciative of his efforts and time donated in assisting with T.C.N.A. community health programs.

Supplemental services of physical, speech, occupational and intravenous therapies, nursing assistants, homemakers and "back up" registered nurses for skilled care visits T.C.N.A. is unable to render have been provided to Tamworth residents through professionals of Heritage Home Health, Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Deaconess Home Health and Carroll County Home Health Care. We remain particularly grateful for the cooperative efforts extended to us by Heritage Home Health; they have assisted T.C.N.A., whenever called upon, with great skill, compassion and a sense of genuine concern for the patient; these facts all noted by many Tamworth recipients of

service. Some Tamworth residents, receiving medical care through Memorial Hospital physicians have been notably pleased with the realm of services obtained through Visiting Nurse Service of Northern Carroll County. Many seniors in Tamworth give daily heartfelt thanks for assistance of Carroll County Home Health Care homemakers and aides enabling them to remain alone in their homes longer than otherwise possible. Optimal homecare continues to be realized when all necessary services and assistance programs are integrated; In many instances, T.C.N.A. has been able to assist the Tamworth resident by facilitating successful utilization and communication with all that is required and available for safe and comfortable, quality home care.

AGENCY FUNCTIONS/ PROGRAMS

The Board of Directors of T.C.N.A. continues to meet on a monthly basis to direct agency functions and operations and to handle financial matters. The Board Members and the Friends of T.C.N.A. have been actively and directly involved in board activities such as clinics and screenings, special programs (such as our Tamworth Christmas program and our August panel meeting open to the public concerning Health Care Issues), and fund raising events (such as summer yard sale and annual appeal letters). They have also facilitated yard work around the office and special projects (such as our ramp and handrails outside the office). This dedicated group of directors continues to represent the community in guiding the agency in meeting the needs of the people it serves.

Barbara Anderson, RN continues to serve as our Associate Nurse. She sees patients three days a week and assists in our clinics and screenings as well as back-up for the full time nurse. She has become a tremendous asset to T.C.N.A.. Our monthly Blood Pressure screening at the Congregate Meal Site (held on Mondays at the Town House), as well as our monthly Blood Pressure Clinic in the office (held the last Wednesday of each month from 12-1PM) have been utilized by 195 people this year. Of course, many other Tamworth residents have checked their blood pressures during morning office hours weekdays, or through home visits when they are unable to come to our office.

Our "skilled" nursing care services, offered in the office and at home, as needed, continue to be directed by the patient's physician. Much time has been spent in assessment of problems, medical status and environmental needs of a patient with patient or with family and then directing that patient or family toward the means to meet those needs. This type of service remains an integral component of safe homecare in affording the most comfort and the best quality of life possible at home for as long as possible.

The general public was welcomed at our semi annual cholesterol screenings held this year in April and November. Testing was offered, for a nominal fee, by laboratory personnel from Memorial Hospital. Many have taken advantage of this service each time it is offered, as a "baseline" or "follow-up" reading of their cholesterol levels.

Again this year in the spring, T.C.N.A. teamed up with the Ossipee Valley Lioness to offer, to the general public, a comprehensive health screening package, valued at over \$200.00. These screenings were available totally free to the public, except for a nominal fee for blood testing. Many people, from all over the valley, took advantage of this opportunity to check their own health in areas of glaucoma and vision, blood pressure, podiatry, dentistry, hearing, nutrition, pulmonary function; Living Wills with Advanced Directives and Power of Attorney for Health Care were also available.

This past November, over 300 took advantage of our Flu shot Clinic. It appears that this has been an especially good year to be afforded the protection of this immunization.

T.C.N.A. continues to look to the needs of the community and focus on programs beneficial in meeting those needs. Programs on first aide, drug and alcohol awareness, health maintenance, insurances, financial planning, living wills and Power of Attorney's for health care are among the programs presented, or sponsored by T.C.N.A. throughout last year.

Dental program concluded last spring with Dr. Robert LeCroy of Fryeburg and resumed this fall with the support and contributions of Dr. Eric Herschfeld of Conway. This year over 100 children from the Kenneth A. Brett School, grades K-8 qualified for the dental program; hopefully most of them will take advantage of this valuable service. We appreciate the support of the Tamworth Foundation in funding this vitally necessary program.

Once again, T.C.N.A. received food stuffs from the annual Boy Scout Food Drive in November. Foods were distributed after arrival to T.C.N.A. office throughout November and December to Tamworth residents. T.C.N.A. also worked with the Community Food Pantry at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church to deliver holiday baskets to area families. We continue to work with the food pantry to provide support, information and assistance to families in need of other services, programs and resource available to them.

U.S.D.A. surplus foods were delivered throughout the year to Tamworth residents unable to get to the stations for distribution.

The Tamworth Christmas effort has continued to grow, (largely due to the economy creating greater needs on the local, state and regional levels) to try to ensure Christmas cheer to local families in need, as well as to elderly, those alone or with ill health this holiday season.

Networking, conferences, seminars and various other meetings have remained crucial in updating knowledge, sharing information and remaining informed to best serve the agency and people of Tamworth. Topics this past year have included ethical issues, euthanasia and assisted suicide, intravenous therapy (at home), home health in the rural setting, drug therapy, pharmacology, documentation and other legal issues, pain management and interagency referrals, plus a host of other subjects relating to all aspects of the home care field.

Our medical supply closet continues to loan without charge to Tamworth residents, walkers, canes, beds, wheelchairs, commodes, lifts and other medical supplies as available. Thank you to all who have donated items for this purpose.

There are few words that can satisfactorily express my gratitude to June Donovan for her continued dedication and service for Tamworth Community Nurse Association and the people of Tamworth, Her approach is warm and friendly, sincere and concerned, yet skilled, confidential and knowledgeable. She coordinates the Meals on Wheels program and secures it's drivers, handles the phone, maintains statistical data and organizes the scores of paperwork and records necessary in the day to day practice of T.C.N.A..

Home health care has evolved and grown dramatically over the past decade. All indications point to continued growth and expansion in the future. With your support and encouragement, T.C.N.A. hopes to continue to meet the home health needs of the people of Tamworth. We look forward with enthusiasm to that endeavor.

Report to the Town from the Tamworth Community Nurse Association Board

The Nurse's report outlines the valuable services rendered to the Town by our community nurses and the office in the Village. The T.C.N.A. Board appreciates the fact that the Town warrant includes substantial Support for the Community Nurse services and feels Taxpayers should know how the T.C.N.A. is financed and the benefit to the community, as well as the cost to the Town if these services were not available.

The T.C.N.A. operates on a budget of approximately \$61,500 per annum:

- 33% of this comes from the Whittemore Fund as T.C.N.A. is one of the designated beneficiaries;
- 20% comes from donations, principally from the annual summer appeal & memorial gifts;
- 20% comes from savings & investments, a declining source of income at current low interest rates;
- 5% comes from designated grants & Trusts
- 5% comes from clinic receipts
- 17% therefore must come from the Town as a warrant article, to cover which we are requesting the sum of \$10,000 (16%).

Office space and utilities, as well as copy services, are provided by the Town and gratefully acknowledged.

The fact that our nursing services are free to recipients helps keep costs low by reducing administrative expenditures, but donations from many grateful patients are received with gratitude.

The directory of available local services prepared by the nurse and printed by the Town has been widely acclaimed. The public clinics and the fact that the nurses's office is itself sometimes used as a walk-in clinic are of great benefit to the community at large. Were these not available, costs to the Town in other categories would rise and the welfare budget would have to be augmented. The Christmas assistance has grown so fast as to become a problem of space and time, so if possible a community committee will be formed to assist with this program in the future.

Other nursing services are available as needed, but costs of these are handled through Medicare and Medicaid and therefore subject to their regulations regarding the nature and extent of nursing services. The nurse's insights into the home needs of patients have frequently enabled a level of service which has allowed patients to remain at home and not become dependent on Town support.

We are proud of the fact that our nurse, Nancy Wiggin, has been appointed to the Governor's Advisory Board for Children, Youth and Family.

1992 was a very busy year. Programs from pre-school age children to adults were well attended.

Children's programs included; street hockey, soccer, flag football, basketball, softball, tennis, track and field day, and ice hockey.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

1992 was a year of celebration—the 100th year the Cook Memorial Library has served the people of Tamworth. On August 9th with approximately 125 guests in attendance, the Trustees held a Centennial celebration with the Boy Scouts of Troop 151 as the Color Guard, the Tamworth Family Band supplying the music, Rev. G. Majka giving a timely Invocation and short but witty talks from three great speakers, Tamworth's own Peg King and Francis Cleveland, and Shirley Adamovich, recently retired State Commissioner of Cultural Affairs and former State Librarian. On display were books by local authors and library memorabilia.

Also in honor of our 100th year, the Trustees sponsored the re-issue of the popular and long out of print 1978 cookbook, "A Cook's Tour of Tamworth Kitchens" with a new section of 60 "Lean & Mean" recipes, a new title, cover and introductions. On November 15, the Trustees held a Tasting Party at the Town House with a variety of dishes from the Cookbook available for sampling and a supply of the new books on sale for the first time.

The Trustees and Librarian were involved with many activities and meetings— participating in the 4th of July parade, meeting the public in conjunction with Chocorua Library to discuss the effects of the Disability Act, holding our annual Book and Bake Sale on August 22, sponsoring the well attended Summer Story Hour run by Frumie Selchen, offering Slides of Morocco Program with Peg King, Marge Mather and Ginny Damon on June 19, participating in the Tamworth Historical Society's guided tour of Historical Buildings on July 20 and attending meetings of the Library Board, Forum I, Bearcamp Valley Cooperative, Bearcamp Valley Libraries Video Association, Northern Carroll County Cooperative, Five Rivers Users, Five Rivers Membership as well as many meetings relative to the search for a new librarian.

1992 also brought sadness. Pat Trask, my substitute for all these many years and so active with Friends of Library, died in February. I have missed her very much as a friend and as a helper.

Our circulation of books and materials for 1992 reached a new high of 10,629 with an attendance of 7,388. We purchased or were given 691 books, received 195 books on Inter-Library Loan, borrowed 68 films from Conway Library for Day Care, borrowed 94 Large Print books for our visually handicapped patrons, received 121 videos on loan from the state. We are a member of the Bearcamp Libraries Video Association and are joint owners of 167 videos that circulate among eight neighboring libraries. Our library also offers 62 videos from our own collection.

I want to thank the volunteers who have faithfully given of their time and labor in helping me this year—Bertha Eastwich, Martha Sylvia, Arlene Farnum, & Sally Zink, Priscilla Murray, Jean Greene, Peg Cavalier and Martha Alt. I am also grateful to the Garden Club in the person of Minda Streeter for the loving care of the plants and the window boxes, to Angie and Dick Stearns for the lovely flowers all season long, to Bob Eastwick for transporting our July 4th float, to Howard Nordeen for his help so many times in so many different ways. We also appreciate the exhibits displayed in our hall throughout the year by local artists and the Brett School.

We thank the Tamworth Foundation for the generous donation for books and for the updating of our bathroom for the use of the disabled. We are grateful to those who gave donations in memory of Pat Trask and Esther Mersfelder as well as for the Memorial Trusts (Gregg, Bearpaw, Mason, Ulitz, Carter & Finley)—all of which enable us to purchase books and at the same time honor the memory of a neighbor and friend.

We appreciate the gifts of books, paperbacks, magazines, newspapers and monetary donations. Any material we cannot use is placed in our annual book sale. Year-round we do have paperbacks and other items for sale and the proceeds go toward library expenses.

Available for our patrons to borrow are: Movie projector (maintenance fee of \$1.00), speakers and screen, cassette players, 1976 Tamworth Bicentennial slides, 1976 U.S. Bicentennial slides and oral history tapes. For the genealogist, we have genealogy card file, notebook of vital statistics, an alphabetically arranged record of early Tamworth families, cemetery book, town reports and 40 volumes of the New Hampshire State Papers.

Cook Memorial Library was used as a meeting room 81 times by 20 different organizations. Community groups may reserve by contacting the Librarian.

Board of Trustees meets on the 2nd Monday of each month at 4:00 P.M. at the library and the public is always welcome. Again we stress that Tamworth residents may use both libraries and that either Chocorua or Cook Memorial Library is open part of each day of the week except Friday:

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION

REPORT FOR 1992

DREDGE AND FILL - Tamworth Conservation Commission (TCC) has checked thirteen dredge and fill applications and reported to the State Wetlands Board. Of these, all but one have been approved by the Board, though some with restrictions on how the work should be done. There have been eight minimum impact applications for dredge and fill, in which approval is not needed unless TCC reports inaccuracies to the Wetlands Board. There have been four complaints related to dredge and fill and four violations which have been checked and reported to the Board. In one of the latter extensive work was done over a period of time, including a special meeting and a trip by three TCC members to a Wetlands Board meeting in Concord, which resulted in a solution to the problem and final approval by the Wetlands Board.

There has been discussion as to how to expedite decisions on dredge and fill applications both by TCC and the Wetlands Board. One proposal, made at the annual meeting of N. H. Association of Conservation Commissions, was to request legislation to give responsibility to Conservation Commissions to make the decision as to dredge and fill in wetlands, rather than to the state Wetlands Board. There are advantages and disadvantages to this and no consensus was reached.

In September TCC held a meeting for regional Conservation Commissions, planning Boards and Selectmen with Ken Kettenring, chief of staff of the Wetlands Board, which was attended by officials from seven towns. Mr. Kettenring explained much about the working of the Board, which was helpful as all towns work with the state in Wetlands matters.

SEPTICS - TCC has worked with the planning Board on one application involving a wetland for which a waiver was requested. This was granted after a site visit and discussion with landowner showed there would be no damage to the wetland.

EASEMENTS - Work on documenting easements held by the Town, begun last year, was continued this year; it included an aerial photography flight, a field trip to walk the borders of one large easement, and a plan for signs on easements, that is, if owners wish it. There has been one request for an amendment to an easement already granted, but it was felt this would defeat the purposes for which an easement was given by a donor and accepted by the Town. The Selectmen were opposed to granting such a request. On the Perkins Easement along the Bearcamp, on land now owned by the Community School, there were problems with material dumped there before the easement was written. The Commission contributed to the cost of having an old bus removed.

Great HILL TOWER - This past year the steps were replaced. TCC manages the Tower at the request of the selectmen.

MASTER PLAN - The Commission 18 cooperating with the Planning Board on updating the Master Plan. Members have attended several meetings with the Planning Board and its committee for this.

EDUCATION - May Bird Walks. TCC held five bird walks on Wednesday mornings the end of April and through May. Peggy Damon has led these for the past fifteen years, but has now moved to Concord. The Commission is grateful to her for her work. Ned Beecher will now take over to plan and lead these walks which are for beginners and advanced birders.

COMMITTEE - TCC committees are: Surface and Groundwater Committee Peter Cooperdock, Loralie Gerard, Ned Beecher and Chris Conrod (with what time he has to spare from work on easements); and Easement Documentation and Monitoring - Chris Conrod and Ned Beecher. At the request of the selectmen a TCC member will serve on the Flood Plain Zoning Board of adjustment. Ned Beecher has accepted appointment to this position.

TOWN ORDINANCES - TCC has updated its list of town conservation ordinances, which is available from the Town Clerk. Anyone unfamiliar with these should check before planning any project which might be subject to ordinance. Public Service of N H wrote for information as to the scenic roads ordinance before undertaking its recent tree cutting and trimming project. The Planning Board has held hour hearings on power company cutting on Fowlers Mills, Philbrick Neighborhood and other roads, hearings which were well attended by power company and other professionals but by few landowners.

TIME CAPSULE, TAMWORTH CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH - The Commission furnished material for this capsule which is not to be opened until 2092 - aerial photos of easement areas and photos of Great Hill Tower along with a write up by John Mersfelder about the Conservation Commission

SCHOLARSHIP - Again this year the Commission has contributed toward a scholarship for a student at the Community Conservation Camp.

ANNUAL MEETING - Three TCC members attended the Annual Meeting of N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions in Concord in November

ANIMAL CONTROL 1992

The year 1992 required traveling 1,372 miles and responding to 223 complaints. Twenty-four dogs had to be impounded but most of them were claimed by their owners in time to be returned to their homes. Two dogs were reported killed on the highways, one dog had to be euthanized and one dog had to be killed and the head taken to concord to be checked for rabies. The result was negative. There were eight incidents of dog bites and one incident of a cat bite. One of the dog bite cases required impounding the dog for ten days since he had not had his rabies vaccine. This was also true of the cat bite incident and since the cat had inflicted several serious bites on its owner, after the ten days the cat was euthanised. Neither of these animals was rabid but the legal procedures had to be followed. This year only one animal complaint necessitated a Court Procedure.

Most of the complaints this year were in reference either to dogs running at large and causing problems, or dogs barking for sustained periods of time thus disturbing the peace and quiet of a neighborhood area. This year too there were many more stray cat calls than has ever been so before. There were also two rather unique animal problems. Domestic rabbits were getting loose from their cages and travelling across a highway where they devoured expensive plants purchased by the property owners and one evening a pet cockatoo from Jackson escaped from his cage while in a car by the Chocorua Lake Bridge and spent two hours flying from tree to tree enjoying such spacious freedom. Several people stopped and tried to coax him down using tidbits of favorite food. He responded best to the children who tried to entice him but still stayed out of reach. Finally after two hours his owner was able to catch him just before dark and it was a happy ending for both the bird and his owner. There were three complaints about loose horses and two complaints of possible cruelty to horses and cattle.

A Rabies clinic was held on March 28 at the Tamworth Town House. Dr. Tevis Kraft vaccinated 22 dogs and 14 cats. Scott Hale and his mother Ann Hale assisted with the paper work and Terry Woodward issued 22 Tamworth Dog Licenses. Another Rabies Clinic will be held this spring for your convenience. The rabies vaccine is considerably less expensive at the Clinic that it is at an office visit with your veterinarian. As of JANUARY 1, 1993 THE LAW NOW REQUIRES THAT ALL CATS MUST ALSO BE GIVEN THE RABIES VACCINE. Cases of rabies continue to be reported ever closer to this area spreading from southern New England into Northern New England and because of this impending rabies epidemic it is really crucial that you COMPLY WITH THIS LAW AND PROTECT YOUR DOGS AND CATS. Notice of time, date, and location of this spring rabies clinic will be in your local newspaper and also broadcast on WBNC. Any dog or cat that has not had a rabies vaccine and that bites any individual must be confined at your local DOG HOLDING FACILITY for ten days at your expense and then examined by your

veterinarian. Local veterinarians are expecting cases of rabies to be diagnosed in this area. PLEASE PROTECT YOURSELVES AND YOUR ANIMALS. I attended a Rabies Seminar at the University of New Hampshire in July 1992 and learned a great deal about this deadly disease. It is caused by a virus that can infect ALL WARMBLOODED ANIMALS, including your farm animals. Only mammals get rabies. Birds, fish, reptiles and amphibians do not. Rabies is transmitted through a bite or by introducing infected saliva into a wound or in the eye or mouth. "BE A RESPONSIBLE PET OWNER. DISCOURAGE WILD ANIMALS FROM HAVING LUNCH WITH YOU. CLEAN UP UNKEMPT AREAS AROUND YOUR HOME. DO NOT LEAVE PET FOOD OR TABLE SCRAPS OUTSIDE AND SECURE GARBAGE CAN LIDS. DO NOT ADOPT WILD ANIMALS AS PETS. DOGS AND CATS SHOULD NOT ROAM AT WILL BUT SHOULD BE CONFINED TO THE OWNER'S PROPERTY." All animal bites must be reported to your Animal control Officer. Rabies is a VERY serious potential problem.

Your dog must be licensed at the age of three months and every year thereafter. Your dog may not be licensed without an up to date rabies vaccine and both tags must be affixed to the collar of your dog.

I really do enjoy being your Animal control Officer and I continue to try to do my best for both you and your animals. My job requires that I respond to any and all complaints and I am responsible for investigating the legitimacy of the complaints and based on the results of an investigation deciding upon the correct action to take. If you do not agree with the results of an investigation the next step would be to follow through with the due process of the law in a Court proceeding. All complaints that I receive are confidential. So please if you are having problems with a dog that is not yours or you are concerned about the health and welfare of an animal please let me know. Your name, as the complainant is strictly between you and me.

Please keep your animals on your property and please make sure there are identification tags on their collars so that they can be returned to you, the owner, if by mistake they do get loose as can happen to anyone's pet at some time or other. Stray dogs are impounded for a period of seven days at the end of which they are available for adoption.

My continued thanks to the Selectmen, Troop E, the Carroll County Sheriff's Office, the Tamworth Police Dept., the Town and State Highway Crews, Pets for People in Wolfeboro, the Town Clerk and the town Secretary. Without the help of all these people it would be impossible for me to do a good job as your Animal Control Officer.

TAMWORTH RED CROSS WATER SAFETY PROGRAM

In 1992, 160 individuals from Preschool age through high school were involved in swimming classes. They were enrolled from the Preshool to the Advanced Swimmer level. The registration fees charged non-residents continues to be at a higher rate to help to fund our program. Tamworth residents paid \$4.00 for an individual and \$10.00 for a family; non-residents paid \$15.00 for an individual and \$25.00 for a family. \$3.00 of each fee goes to the Mt. Washington Valley Red Cross to cover administrative costs.

In 1993, we will be increasing the registration fees, modestly, to try and meet increased expenses in running the program. The Tamworth rate will increase by \$1.00 for an individual and \$2.00 for a family. The out of town rate will increase by \$5.00 for an individual and also a family.

The program was pleased to welcome back the Bearcamp Valley Preschool to our swimming lessons. These children are offered lessons at 9:00 a.m. The staff in 1992 was Ellen Hamilton, Martha Chandler, Tammy Johnson and Brenda Robinson.

This year, as in the past two, the Tamworth Swim Program is requesting \$2,800.00 from the Town of Tamworth. We understand that people continue to have difficult economic times, and would like our request to remain level.

The Tamworth Foundation and the Town of Tamworth have continued to be most generous in their support of the Swim Program. We would like to say "Thank You." Thank You also to our parent volunteers and the management of the White Lake State park for the use of their facilities. We were fortunate to have Ellen Hamilton become a certified CPR Instructor. This had been a most valuable asset to our program. All of our staff continues to constantly retrain in new teaching methods and to keep updated int the new technology.

REPORT OF THE "NEW PARK" COMMITTEE

At last year's March Town Meeting, Tamworth voters accepted a parcel of land donated by Dr. Edwin C. Remick for a town park. Neighboring the Congregational Church, this park is neatly delineated by the main street and a curving white fence. Dr. Remick, whose pastures extend picturesquely behind the new park, is a life-long resident of Tamworth. As a doctor, he followed in his father's footsteps; together they provided medical care to the community for over 100 years.

During the past year the lawn has been kept mowed, a split rail fence installed, the planting design completed and planting beds prepared. This spring a water source will be provided, the trees and shrubs purchased and planted.

Fund-raising has been an ongoing project. Some money for plant materials has been donated in the memory of family or friends and carnations were sold on Family Day. Donations have also been received toward general park expenses such as mowing the lawn, the watering system, the fence, plants and planting labor. For those wishing to donate to the park in the name of someone special, a card designed by Sam'l Newsom, was given to them to indicate the gift. These cards are still available at the Selectmen's Office and can be used for birthdays and holidays. In 1992 we have received \$2,796.94 from all these sources. The Tamworth Foundation, at its annual meeting, made a grant of \$5,000.00 toward park expenses and we are in the process of applying to the U. S. Small Business Administration Tree Planting program through the State of New Hampshire for a small grant.

The Board of Selectmen has been very cooperative in our efforts to facilitate and implement the park plan. John Roberts has been especially generous in donating equipment, manpower, and granite for the park. Committee members have worked very hard on the early stages of the park development.

In 1993 the committee will continue in its fund-raising efforts. Donations will be accepted at the Selectmen's Office on an ongoing basis. It is the committee's fondest hope that the majority of the work on the planting of the park will be completed by Family Day 1993.
