

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 9th of March next, at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other town officers.
- Article 2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following town charges for the ensuing year:
 - a. town officers salaries
 - b. town officers expenses
 - c. election and registration
 - d. expenses of Town Hall and other buildings
 - e. parks and playgrounds
 - f. legal fees, and misc.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to increase the wages of Highway employees or take any other action relating thereto.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow removal and sanding.
- Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for oiling and general maintenance of highways and bridges.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction and maintenance of Class 5 roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.53 for same, to which the State will contribute \$1,402.10 if raised.
- Article 7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor and old age assistance.

- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the installation and maintenance of one street light on School Street extension, opposite the residence of Robert Cheever.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the police department.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the water system.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the reconstruction and extension of the water main on South Street. This involves 400 feet of 6 inch pipe.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to be used by the water department.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to take the balance of \$830.50 of the Russell Avenue sidewalk appropriation of 1946 and place it in the Capitol Reserve Fund of the water department.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of shade trees.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for maintenance of our sidewalks.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used on Dort Street for drainage.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a power mower.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the following health activities:

- a, employment of a district nurse. '
- b. maintenance of town dump.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion the use of the town hall one night each month without pay.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the public library.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to recommend to the members of the cemetery committee that the price of burial lots be increased.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$130.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money to pay Town charges.

Article 29. To hear the reports of agents, officers, or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second

proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Troy:

I herein submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The general demand for better educational opportunities is a serious problem in our public schools. In order to meet the common needs of pupils the modern school has many new responsibilities. The facilities for these new objectives will be limited in many schools during the present period of shortages and high costs. The crisis in public school education is basically an economic one with many implications.

The maintenance of well qualified teachers in village elementary schools is almost an impossibility unless nearby resident teachers become available. At the present time 70,000 teaching positions are vacant in the United States. More than 350,000 teachers have left our public schools since 1941. Over 2,000,000 school age children are not in school and millions of those in school are receiving inferior education due to the fact that about 110,000 teachers, or one out of every eight, are serving on substandard permits. This problem is enhanced by increased enrollments in schools and fewer students preparing to teach.

The Troy School District is fortunate to retain the services of well qualified teachers. The substantial increase in state aid has been helpful. The general purpose of this appropriation was to provide better educational services and facilities in the New Hampshire schools. The intended benefits to the school program have been somewhat limited everywhere due to the recent advance in prices. In spite of inflated costs the Troy School District has been able to make the following important improvements in instruction since my last report.

- 1. Better textbooks.
- 2. A new set of Compton's pictured Encyclopedias, 1947 Edition.
- 3. A complete set of Rand McNally Maps with Beginners Maps in Global Geography and World Maps for the Air Age.
 - 4. New equipment for the high school class in typewriting.
- 5. An additional elementary teacher, thus providing for increased enrollments with one teacher for each grade.

Cooperative attitudes of obedience and respect for authority should start in the home. The mutual help of parents and teachers is needed by all youth at the present time. More frequent school visits by the parents might also prove helpful in many cases.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF THE TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my second annual report as Headmaster of Troy High School.

For the first time, the Troy High School offered a course in typewriting at the beginning of the school year in September, 1947. The pupil demand was so great that the members of the upper classes were given preference. The results of this additional course are so gratifying that I think more commercial subjects might be offered if the present courses in domestic arts and woodworking can also be maintained.

Four classrooms were completely redecorated during the summer vacation in the modern color scheme recommended for attractiveness and service. Several other parts of the building were also reconditioned.

The Home Economics Department has acquired, through federal aid, a new sink and gas range. It also received a new electric stove at no cost to the local school district. These funds were made available to improve the school lunch program.

The Home Economics Department, together with the Woodworking Department, have modern facilities which are much better than commonly found in schools of this size.

The Troy High School, through its program and constant efforts to improve the curriculum and facilities, is recognized as a Class "A" school by the New Hampshire State Department of Education.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herein submit my first report as Music Supervisor in the Troy schools.

The fundamental aim in our public school music program has been to develop the desire to share musical experiences with one another in the following ways: Singing, listening to various types of music, playing musical games, and learning about the mechanics in the "World of Music".

We are endeavoring to make the local school a "singing school" since it is through the medium of music that many children find contentment in daily life. Music study, when it develops self-expression creates many different moods. Too, it may satisfy desires for rhythmic expression; or it may bring about a clearer understanding of social relationships. No matter what the temporary environment is, music can play a large part in the life of the pupil. The singing boy or girl generally has a fine personality.

In the lower grades, the removal of "low voices" and the teaching of many songs, together with rhythmic exercises such as singing games and skipping are common practices. The study of note reading, syllable reading, measure and key signatures combined with pitch and rhythmic discrimination also find place in the program.

A two-part chorus made up of all the pupils in grades five and six is gradually developing. Speech and vocal tone production are emphasized in this class.

The Junior High School classes have new books which are constructed on the theory of close correlation with the other classroom subjects. It is through this method that music be-

comes more vivid in the everyday life of the pupil whether it be integrated with subjects in the classroom or with other aspects of life at home or in the community.

The Senior High School has spent much time on the theory of music as introduced in Creative Work—that of setting a given lyric to an original melody. This, of course, brings in the study of notes, their numerical valuation, time signature, and especially the analysis of poetry scansion and musical accent. Ear training, both through verbal and tonal dictation augmented with unison and part singing finds its way into the class period each week.

Our production of "The Christmas Thieves" served in many ways to enrich the musical lives of our pupils, and no doubt left a clear impression upon the minds of its performers that the production of an operetta means hard work, constant cooperation and—a good deal of singing!

In conclusion, let me thank the Superintendent of Schools, the Board of Education, the Headmaster and the Teachers for their efforts in carrying out the music program.
