

### TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM TEN A. M. TO SIX P. M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sanbornville on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the purpose of preparing a Facilities Plan on sewerage and sewerage treatment of the Town of Wakefield, in accordance with the requirements contained in PL 92-500, which will qualify the Town for Federal Funds. Said study and plan will include the low lying areas of Union and Sanbornville. The total cost of the study and plan is estimated at \$20,000.00. The Federal Government contributes 75% and the State reimburses the Town with 20%. The eventual cost to the Town is estimated at \$1,000.00. (Approved by Budget Committee)

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Wakefield on Saturday, the nineteenth day of March, next, at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 3. To see if the Town will vote on the following. "Do you favor adoption of the town manager plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated?" (By petition) (Without recommendation of Budget Committee)
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to rescind Article #10 of the Town Warrant of 1976, which authorized the Selectmen to sell a lot of land described as being the former site of the Town Garage on Meadow Street. Said parcel shown on Tax Map #30, Lots #176 and 176A. (Approved by Budget Committee)

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,116.07 as a contribution to the Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc. (Approved by Budget Committee)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165.38 to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages, as well as preservation of the natural resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. (Disapproved by Budget Committee)
- 8. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to support the Public Health Nursing Association. (Approved by Budget Committee)
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 as a contribution to Huggins Hospital. (By petition) (Approved by Budget Committee)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the widening, grading and reconstruction of Bonnyman Road as a gravel road from the junction of Route 153 to the Effingham Town Line or as far as the appropriated funds will allow. Gravel to grade said Bonnyman Road to be donated free from the Ames Pit. (By Petition) (Disapproved by Budget Committee)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote not to expend any more money on expenses incurred by the Dearborn Road Committee.
  (By petition) (Approved by Budget Committee)
- 12. To see if the Town will deed to the Parks and Recreation Department fifteen acres of land from a tract where the Town Highway Department building is now located for use as a Town Recreation area. Donations and volunteer work parties will be used to complete most of the recreation area over a period of years. (By petition) (Approved by Budget Committee)
- 13. To see if the Town will accept as a Class V highway White-birch Road (approximately 1500 feet in length). This road was built to meet all Town specifications at time of construction and has received an additional coat of oil in summer of 1976. (By petition) (Approved by Budget Committee)

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the oiling of Pickpocket Rd. from Rt. 153 to the Ossipee town line being 1 and 5/10 of a miles or as far as the appropriated funds will do. (By petition) (Disapproved by Budget Committee)
- 15. That the Town of Wakefield, New Hampshire plow private camp roads on which reside year-round residents.

That year round residents include those legal residents who utilize their property on a year-round basis. (By petition) (Disapproved by Budget Committee)

- 16. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 31:43-a; RSA 31:43-c; RSA 31:43-d RSA 31:43-e; RSA 31:43-f and RSA 31:43-g relating to the imposition and enforcement of curfew regulations upon Minors under the age of sixteen years.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$297,135.00 to defray Town charges as submitted by the Budget Committee.

# REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

# REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ASSOCIATION

As in past years the Nursing service has continued to expand this year.

In addition to the six towns already being served by our Agency, Sandwich has joined us in a pilot program.

The service has also expanded to offer Homemaker and Home Health Services by contract with Carroll County Health and Home Care Services.

We now employ two full time and three part time Nurses and one Physiotherapist continues on contract basis.

The regular monthly immunization clinics have been held as usual and the Swine flu clinics had a good response. This was the first year that we had a table in the Rescue Squad tent at the Huggins Hospital Street Fair where many people stopped to have their Blood Pressure checked.

Approximately 2,850 home visits were made by our nurses and 450 by our Physiotherapist.

We would like to gratefuly acknowledge all donations and contributions to our fund drive. Without your support, it would be difficult for us to continue our services.

It has been pleasant knowing and serving everyone in our area and we are looking forward to another year of providing home health care.

### ZONING AND LAND USE ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF WAKEFIELD, NEW HAMPSHIRE

An Ordinance to promote the Health, Safety, Convenience, and General Welfare of the Community by regulating the use of land and the construction of buildings in the Town of Wakefield.

#### ARTICLE I Preamble

In pursuance of the authority conferred by Chapter 31, Section 60-89, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, prosperity and general welfare of the inhabitants, as well as efficiency and economy in the development of property in the Incorporated Town of Wakefield, Carroll County, New Hampshire, by providing regulations governing the use of land and the erection and use of buildings, in order to assist in the promotion of good civic design and arrangements, the wise and efficient expenditure of public funds, the adequate provision of public utilities, and other public requirements, and by other lawful means: now therefore the following Ordinance hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of Wakefield, New Hampshire, in official Town Meeting convened.

# ARTICLE II Establishment of Districts

For the purpose of this Ordinance the Town of Wakefield is zoned in the following Districts, as shown on the Official Zoning Map of the Town, which map is hereby made and declared to be a part of the Ordinance:

- A. Residential Agricultural District
- B. Residential Recreational District
- C. Commercial District
- D. Industrial District

# ARTICLE III General Provisions

- A. No junk yard or place of storage of discarded machinery, vehicles, glass, paper, cordage, garbage, refuse or other waste matter or discarded material shall be maintained in the Town except for such public dumping areas as may be provided by the Town.
- B. No owner or occupant of the land shall permit any building or structure thereon to be left in a badly damaged, dilapidated unusable condition, whether caused by fire, the elements, or from any other cause. Property so damaged, dilapidated, or unusable shall be repaired or rebuilt, or the ruins shall be removed to ground level within one year of the time of the damage.
- C. If clay, sod, loam, sand, or gravel for either private use or for sale is removed within 100 feet of a main highway, when the supply is

depleted the area shall be regraded to assure that the premises will be left in a sightly condition and protected against erosion. No bank shall be left steeper than the natural angle of repose of the soil.

- D. Any commercial uses that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or emission of odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise, vibration, or similar conditions, or that are dangerous to the comfort, peace, enjoyment, health, or safety of the community, or lending to its disturbance or annoyance are prohibited.
- E. Property owners of business, professional, or service enterprises shall be allowed a maximum of two advertising signs which may advertise only the activities conducted on the premises. A maximum of two signs pertaining to the lease, sale, or use of a lot or building shall be permitted on each place. No sign shall be greater than four by eight feet in area. No neon signs and no signs illuminated with flashing lights shall be permitted. However, a permitted sign may be lighted by incandescent or fluorescent bulbs suitably placed to illuminate the sign and adequately shaded to prevent glare, particularly glare to highway traffic.
- F. Sanitary Protection: No privy, cesspool, septic tank, or sewage disposal area shall be constructed or maintained less than 75 feet from the edge of any public water body or stream flowing into same, from a well, or from a dwelling other than that to which it is appurtenant, as set forth by the New Hampshire State Law annotated 1955.
- G. No waste matter or sewage shall be permited to run free into a public water body or be discharged in any way that may be offensive, or detrimental to the health of others. All such waste shall be conveyed a way underground through the use of an accepted sanitary system subject to the approval of the Board of Health.
- H. All dwellings and sanitary systems shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with any and all standards set forth and enforced by the New Hampshire Department of Health, and by the Water Pollution Commission.

# ARTICLE IV RESIDENTIAL - AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT

A building may be erected, altered, or used, and a lot may be used or occupied, only for the following purposes and in accordance with the following provisions:

#### A. Uses Permitted

- 1. Single and two family dwellings with private garages and accessory buildings.
- 2. Residences may be used to house such customary uses by the owner or tenant as offices for recognized professions and or work shops for recognized trades, except that the number of persons at any one location shall not number more than three in addition to the owner or tenant and immediate family. The employment of more than three persons for business or trade constitutes a commercial enterprise.

- 3. Home food and garden produce may be offered for sale in this District.
- 4. Garden and farm activities are permitted within the scope customary to the area.

#### B. New Buildings and Alterations

1. No new building shall be erected or moved in, or the bulk of an existing building changed, or the use of a building changed from residential to other use without first obtaining a building permit.

#### C. Lot Areas Required

- 1. For any new construction each lot shall be not less than 40,000 square feet in area and the frontage not less than 150 feet, provided, however, that a lot of less frontage or area, which is recorded and taxed as a lot of record at the time of the passage of this Ordinance shall be deemed a conforming use.
- 2. Front Yard: There shall be a minimum of thirty feet between the extreme front of any new building and the boundary of the nearest street, road or right of way.
- 3. Side and Back Yards: No new building shall be located nearer than ten feet from the property line of any abuttor, except that in a case of urgent necessity, and then only with the written consent of the owner of the abutting property and the formal approval of the Board of Adjustment, a building may be placed not less than three feet from the property line.
- 4. The size and contour of the lot must such that the sanitary requirements of the State of New Hampshire can be complied with.

#### D. Size and Type of Building

Every new dwelling unit to be used as a single family home shall have a minimum ground floor area of six hundred square feet, excluding porches and garage, and shall be of such design and construction as to have a minimum completed value of not less than \$7,500.

#### E. Mobile Homes

Trailer or Mobile Homes shall not be located within the District covered by this Article, and existing non-conforming usages, if once removed, shall not be re-established.

#### ARTICLE V

#### **RESIDENTIAL - RECREATIONAL DISTRICT**

A building may be erected, altered, or used, and a lot may be used or occupied, only for the following purposes and in accordance with the following provisions:

- A. Uses Permitted: The same as Article IV, Section A.
- B. New Buildings and Alterations: The same as Article IV, Section B.

#### C. Lot Areas Required

Same as Article IV, Section C., except that for new construction on lake front and closely neighboring recreational areas the minimum size lot shall be 10,000 square feet, and the minimum width and minimum depth shall each be seventy-five feet, and the front yard limit may be reduced to twenty-five feet. The size and contour of the lot must be such that the sanitary requirements of the State of New Hampshire can be complied with.

#### D. Size and Type of Building

Any building erected or moved in for residential use shall have a first floor area of not less than 400 square feet, and shall be of such design and construction as to have a completed value of not less than \$2,000 if intended for seasonal use, and a completed value of not less than \$3,500 if intended for year round occupancy.

#### E. Mobile Homes

A singly sited trailer or mobile home may locate within the District covered by this Article provided that the owner or occupant complies with the lot area requirements and the sanitary requirements for permanent dwellings, and that the trailer or mobile home is placed upon a permanent foundation within sixty days of the date it is placed on the property, and further that the property is not restricted by terms of deed or other similar manner.

#### ARTICLE VI COMMERCIAL DISTRICT

The Commercial District shall consist of those areas so designated on the Official Zoning Map of the Town, and shall include those areas in which business has been long established, but shall not be expanded into, or encroach upon, existing residential areas without due process of re-zoning, and with due consideration for abutting and closely neighboring property owner whose property values might be adversely affected thereby.

The usages permited in the Commercial District shall be those customarily applicable to retail business and trades, professional services, motels, garages and service stations, and public utilities. Buildings erected or converted for commercial use shall be of suitable design for the purpose intended, in accordance with customary good standards for safety, fire protection, sanitary requirements, etc. Set backs shall be in conformity with the practice of the neighborhood, with adequate allowance for customer parking, and shall not encroach upon the boundaries of residential property closer than the limits set forth in Article IV.

#### ARTICLE VII INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT

Recognizing the possible need for industrial usage, it shall be the duty of the Planning and Zoning Commission to consider any requests for such use, and under such cicumstances to seek suitable areas which will not be detrimental to residential and commercial areas, and to recommend the re-zoning of such areas for industrial use when occasion arises.

Recognition is hereby given to existing industrial plants in the Village of Union, to a sawmill in Sanbornville, and to utility sub-stations and structures in various locations in the Town.

#### ARTICLE VIII TRAILER PARKS

Trailer Parks may be established in the recreational areas of this Town provided that no trailer shall be located closer than 150 feet from any highway and not closer than 500 feet from any established residence, and that such trailer park comply fully with all rules and regulations established by the State of New Hampshire.

# ARTICLE IX TENT CAMPS

No new tent camps shall be established in this Town, and those now existing shall not be enlarged or expanded. All such camps shall be maintained and operated in strict conformity with all the rules and regulations of the State of New Hampshire, pertaining to such camps. Failure to comply with the above regulations shall be deemed sufficient cause to enforce the vacation of such camps, and such camps as are once vacated for any reason may not be re-established.

# ARTICLE X ROADSIDE ADVERTISING

Advertising signs of any and all kinds shall be prohibited on all public highways of this Town, and likewise prohibited on private property adjacent to such highways for a distance of seventy-five feet from the border of such highways. This does not prohibit within the limits set forth in Article III, nor does it apply to traffic and directional signs.

Non-conforming roadside advertising signs shall be removed or the persons responsible for the same within one year of the passage of this ordinance; or if not so removed, they may be removed and destroyed by the Town, and the expense of such removal collected from the owner or advertiser, or placed as a lien against the property of the owner or advertiser.

# ARTICLE XI NON-CONFORMING USES OF LAND AND BUILDINGS

- A. Any non-conforming use of land and/or buildings (other than junk yards and non-conforming signs) may continue in their present use, except that any non-conforming use may not be:
  - 1. Changed to another non-conforming use.
- 2. Re-established after discontinuance for one year, except to a use conforming to this Ordinance. In event of fire or other damage destroying 50 per cent of value it may not be re-established.
  - 3. It may not be extended or enlarged.

B. No junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use for more than one year after the effective date of this Ordinance, except that a junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use if within that period it is completely enclosed within a continuous solid fence of such height, not less than eight (8) feet high in any case, as to screen completely the operations of the junk yard; this, so as to conform to New Hampshire State Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, Chapter 267, Sections I-IV. Plans of such building or fence shall be approved by the Board of Selectmen before it is erected.

# ARTICLE XII RE-ZONING

Any request for re-zoning any particular plot from one District classification to another shall be referred to the Planning and Zoning Commission, who shall hold a public hearing on the question, the same to be advertised at least 15 days in advance by posting a notice of same in at least three public places in the Town. Upon hearing the evidence, the Commission shall decide whether or not the change shall be made.

### ARTICLE XIII ENFORCEMENT

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and Board of Selectmen is hereby given the power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 2. The Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Building Inspector who shall be vested with the duties and authority prescribed in Chapter 156:1-5, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, as amended by Chapter 205 and Chapter 215, Laws of New Hampshire 1959. It shall be the duty of the Building Inspector to issue any and all Building Permits for work or construction in accordance with this Ordinance, upon proper application and upon receipt of the specified fees for the same.
- 3. After passage of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful to erect any new structure or building, to alter the bulk of any building, to change the essential use of any structure or building, to relocate any building, to remove any building, or to convert the essential usage of any building, plot of land, or stream or body of water without first obtaining a Building Permit as herein provided.
- 4. No permit shall be required for repairing, remodeling, or renovating an existing building or structure where the bulk of the same or the essential use of the same is not to be changed.
- 5. Upon the advice of the Building Inspector, or upon any other well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, The Board of Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court, or by any other legal action.
  - Fees for Building Permits shall be:\$1.00 for work not exceeding \$1,000 in completed value,

\$2.00 for work over \$1,000 and not exceeding \$2,500, \$3.00 for work over \$2,500 and not exceeding \$5,000, \$5.00 for work exceeding \$5,000 in completed value.

The estimated completed value shall include all material and labor at fair market prices.

- 7. All monies received for Building Permits shall be forwarded to the Town Treasurer for deposit in the Town Treasury. Such monies may be allocated to defray the expenses incidental to Ordinance upon approval of the Selectmen.
- 8. Any person aggreived by a decision of the Building Inspector under the Provisions of this Ordinance may make an appeal to the Board of Adjustment.

## ARTICLE XIV BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Within thirty days after the adoption of this Ordinance, and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to the Board of Adjustment of five members, conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31, of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. Thereafter, as the terms expire or vacancies occur, the appointing authority shall be responsible for the filling of vacancies and maintaining full membership on the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment here provided shall conform in membership and term of office to the provisions of Section 67, Chapter 31, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955. In addition to the general powers granted said Board of Adjustment by said Chapter 31, it may in harmony with the subject to its provisions:

- A. Permit a non-conforming temporary use for an initial period of not more than one year. Permits may be renewed by the Board of Adjustment for not more than one additional year provided due need is shown.
- B. Waive the residential and agricultural frontage requirements where there are unusual conditions of street curvature, topography or sub-surface conditions. In such cases, however, the average width of the lot shall be equal to or greater than the frontage requirements.
- C. Permit in the Town a commercial use which at a public hearing proves it can meet the following requirements:
  - 1. Be located at least fifty feet (50) from the center of a public right of way, and not less than 40 feet from each side and rear boundary.
  - 2. Provide adequate parking facilities on the premises to accommodate vehicles attracted by the business.
  - 3. See that the location is such as to provide proper access and egress without causing a traffic hazard.
  - 4. Building shall be acceptable in every way to all in the immediate area and to the Town in general.
  - D. Act as a Board of Appeal as provided for in Article XIII above.

### ARTICLE XV AMENDMENTS

This Ordinance may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the Warrant calling for the meeting, and when such amendment has previously received a public hearing, which public hearing has been advertised by fifteen days advance notice posted in at least three public places in the Town.

### ARTICLE XVI PENALTIES

Every person, persons, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than five dollars (\$5.00), upon conviction, for each day such a violation may exist, plus all legal costs in connection with settling the issue.

### ARTICLE XVII SAVING CLAUSE

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provisions.

# ARTICLE XVIII EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE

This Ordinance shall take effect upon the day which it is voted upon and passed.

# ARTICLE XIX DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this Ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section:

- A. Home Produce and Products include everything of an agricultural nature grown or otherwise carried on the property of the owner or resident.
- B. Right of Way means and includes all Town, State, and Federal Highways, and the land on either side of same covered by Statutes to determine the width of the right of way.
- C. Tourist Home, a residence where tourists or transient guests are regularly accommodated.
- D. Accessory Building, a building subordinate to the main building on the lot, used for purposes customarily incidental to those of the main building.
- E. Trailer Park, a Trailer Park means a plot of ground upon which two or more trailer coaches, occupied for dwelling or sleeping purposes, are located, regardless of whether or not a charge is made for such accommodations.
- F. Mobile Home, a Mobile Home is a home which is mobile, a unit similar to a trailer, it is equipped with running water and sanitary facilities, bath facilities and toilet.

- G. Front Yard, space extending from front of house or porch to edge of highway or street.
- H. Frontage is that area which may border on a street, highway, or lake, pond, or stream.
- I. Tent Camping Site, an area maintained for the renting of more than one tent or tent site, and said area complies with the rules and regulations of the State of New Hampshire regarding same. (See State Regulations on Tent Camps).
- J. Junk, meaning any and all debris, consisting of paper, rags, tin cans, used parts of any machinery, old cars which have been junked, anything of a kind which is detrimental to the looks and appearance of any section of the Town.
- K. Non-conforming Building or Structure, a building or structure in whole or in part, which does not conform to the use and regulations of the District in which the building or structure is located, such as a partially finished building, one that has had a section removed, or a building which has been left to the mercy of the elements.
- L. Non-conforming Use, a non-conforming use is a use which does not conform to the use regulations of the District in which such use exists, and which was in existence prior to the enactment of these regulations.
- M. A Trailer Park or Mobile Home Park is land upon which two or more mobile homes or trailers are parked and occupied for living purposes, regardless of whether or not a charge is made for such accommodations.
- N. A Tent Camp means a plot of ground upon which two or more temporary or permanent tents are located, established, or maintained, and operated as living quarters for children or adults or both, for a period of five days or more, for recreation, education, or vacation purposes, either free or by payment of a fee.
- 1. SHORE FRONT AND GENERAL RESIDENCE All islands and all lake or pond shore front property to a depth of 500 feet and from mean high water, with the exception of the business district.

That area on Route 16B extending northerly of the northerlymost boundary line of the present Sanbornville Village District and proceeding in a northerly direction along Route 16B to the Boston and Maine Railroad crossing, and extending 1,000 feet easterly of the center line of Route 16B and 1,000 feet westerly of the center line of Route 16 B and along the entire length of Route 16B as limited herein, said area shall not extend, however, northerly or westerly of the Boston and Maine Railroad.

Also that additional area extending northeasterly from the junction of Prospect Street and Route 153, and extending laterally 1,000 feet from each side of the highway but not extending northeasterly past the course of Copp brook.

2. BUSINESS — All property encompassed by the present Sanborn-ville Village District.

Also all that area extending southerly of the present Sanbornville Village District and lying between Route 16B and Route 16 and extending southerly to the new road connecting said two Routes southerly of the Governor's Road.

Also that area extending westerly of Route 16 to the Brookfield Town line and being bounded on the south by a line 500 feet northerly of and parallel to the Governor's Road and being bounded on the north by the Boston and Maine Railroad tracks.

Also the business district to include the Village District of Union. Also that area northerly of the junction of Route 16 and 16B in Union, easterly of Route 16, westerly of the Boston and Maine Railroad tracks and northerly to the proposed business district.

Also that area opposite Palmer's Motel on the easterly side of Route 16, westerly of the Boston and Maine Railroad tracks 2500 feet northerly of the junction of Route 153 and Route 16 at the village of Wakefield.

3. AGRICULTURAL — All that land in Wakefield not included in the preceding two zones or boundaries.

### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Meetings were held the last Wednesday of each month. After two Public Hearings on Zoning in Town was held, it was decided by the Board to use the Zoning Ordinance of 1955, which was adopted by the Town at that time. A copy of the Ordinance appears elsewhere in this book.

There have been 17 Sub-divisions approved by the Board for 1976.

Permits for 74 new buildings and 34 alterations were issued.
