TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring forward your ballots for the necessary town officers for the ensuing year and the ensuing three years. Polls are to open at 10:00 A.M. and are not to close before 6 P.M. At 8 P.M. action will be taken on the following Articles in the Warrant:

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, up to the sum of \$50,000.00 if needed, and raise and appropriate the sum \$300.00 for interest thereon.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,114.00 for the operation and maintenance of the Bed-ford Public Library.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to gravel Class V Highways within the town.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Civil Defense. (Not recommended by Budget Committe).

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,301.34 for Construction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$8,675.60.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for the tarring of Class V Highways under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the Town.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for damages and legal expense including dog damages.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$775.00 for the care of the New Cemetery; \$25.00 for pumping water for the same; \$125.00 for care of Joppa Cemetery; \$50.00 for care of the Old Cemetery on Back River Road; and \$25.00 for the care of the Beals Cemetery.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for maintenance of power equipment used in Town Cemeteries. Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Grader.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Tractor Loader.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new fire truck.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the Planning Board.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 to operate and maintain the Police Department.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the construction of a hard top driveway in that part of the New Cemetery just opened.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,046.25 to purchase new banquet tables to be used in the Town Hall. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept Caron Road from a point beginning at Liberty Hill Road, Easterly for a distance of 1822 ft. by 50 ft. wide including a turn-around having a 75 foot radius at the Easterly dead end of said Caron Road.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 in Trust from Mrs. Robert A. Hanham, the interest to be expended for care of lot No. 91 in the name of Robert A. Hanham located in the New Bedford Center Cemetery.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 in Trust from Mrs. Alice L. Clark, the interest to be expended for the care of the lot under the name of Augustus W. Clark located in the New Bedford Center Cemetery.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the first and second Saturdays next preceding any election, as the dates for the first and final closing dates, respectively, for correction of the check list by the Supervisors thereof, for such election.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Planning Board to select a Committee of five members to assist them in investigating the possibility of some means of sewage disposal in areas in Town served by City Water and render a report at a future Town Meeting.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance adopted December 8th, 1953, and subsequently amended, by reclassifying land belonging to Wildy McMahon along New Boston and McAllister Road, herein described, from Agricultural to Commercial. This land comprises approximately 18 acres together with pond and building bounded by New Boston Road and land of Herbert Allen on the North, and land owned by Wildy McMahon and McAllister Road on the East, and land of Herbert Allen on the West, and land owned by Wildy McMahon and Marcel Gendron on the South. This tract of land does not include the approximately 3 acres upon which the McMahon homestead is located.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance adopted December 8th, 1953 and subsequently amended, by reclassifying a parcel of land owned by Fred W. Wolf and Mary A. Wolf, on Meetinghouse Road, formerly owned by Fred A. Wiggin, which is now agricultural, to commercial.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance adopted December 8th, 1953 and subsequently amended, by reclassifying a parcel of land and building on Wallace Road, herein described, from Residential Agricultural to Commercial. This land comprises approximately 1 acre, (on which is a building presently housing a saw mill and cider mill owned by Richard Ramig and Robert Ramig), bounded by land formerly owned by Winship on the North and the land presently owned by Burroughs on the South.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance adopted December 8, 1953 and as subsequently amended, by deleting sub-paragraph D of Article XII of the Zoning Ordinance and substituting therefor Article XVIII containing the following language:

"ARTICLE XVIII. Regulating the parking and location of trailers and licensing location erection, maintenance and conduct of automobile trailer camps.

1. Definitions:

The word "trailer" when used in this ordinance shall include "trailer coach", "mobile home" and "semi-dependent mobile home" as defined in the State Department of Health's Sanitary Laws and Regulations, Section B, Regulation 1-57. The word "trailer camp" or "camp" when used in this ordinance shall include "trailer park" and "mobile home park" as defined in the State Department of Health's Sanitary Laws and Regulations, Section B, Regulations 1-57.

2. Location Outside Camps.

No person shall park or occupy any trailer on the premises of any occupied dwelling or on any lot which is not a part of the premises of any occupied dwelling either of which is situated outside an approved trailer camp; except as provided in the following sub-paragraphs of this section.

a. The parking of one trailer in a private garage building or in a rear yard is permitted providing said trailer is not occupied and the trailer belongs to the owner or lessee of the land it occupies.

b. The temporary use of a trailer by a person engaged in adjoining construction work, or for whom a residence is being built, provided that such use is shown to be a temporary expedient, may be permitted by the Board of Selectmen. The Selectmen shall grant such permission for a period not to exceed three months excepting that they may renew in their discretion such permission at the expiration of said three months period.

c. Any property owner or lessee may accomodate one trailer of a non-paying guest in his rear yard for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days in any one year.

d. In the event that there is no approved trailer camp in existence in the Town of Bedford, the Board of Adjustment shall issue permits to any person applying, who desires to park, use and occupy as a residence a single trailer on a lot of land which is located in the Agricultural District provided that said trailer and its erection shall conform to the requirements set forth for single family dwellings as contained in the Town's Zoning Ordinance. Said permit shall not include permission or authority to make any additions or extensions to the trailer other than foundations for the trailer itself or awnings attached to the trailer.

3. Prohibition of Trailer Camps.

It shall be unlawful for any person to establish, operate or maintain or permit to be established, operated or maintained upon any property owned or controlled by him, a trailer camp within the limits of the Town of Bedford.

4. Power of Board of Adjustment to Grant Exceptions to

Prohibition of Trailer Camps.

The Board of Adjustment, after a public hearing, may grant a special exception to the general prohibition of trailer camps and permit the establishment of one or more trailer camps provided the following conditions and standards are met.

a. That the exception will not be detrimental to the neighborhood.

b. That the exception will not violate the spirit and purpose of the ordinance.

c. That the location of the proposed trailer camp is in either an Agricultural District or a Commercial District.

d. That a written application for such exception has been filed with the Board of Adjustment containing the name and address of the owner in fee of the tract of land and such a legal description of the premises upon which the trailer camp will be located as will readily identify and definitely locate the premises. The application shall be accompanied by two copies of the camp plan showing the following, either existing or as proposed: (1) The extent and area used for camp purposes; (2) Roadways and driveways; (3) Location of sites or units for trailer coaches; (4) Location and number of sanitary conveniences, including toilets, washrooms, laundries and utility rooms to be used by occupants of units; (5) Method and plan of sewage disposal; (6) Method and plan of garbage removal; (7) Plan for water supply; (8) Plan for electrical lighting of units.

e. That the trailer camp shall comply with the regulations and requirements pertaining to trailer parks or camps set forth in the State Department of Health's "Sanitary Laws and Regulations", and any subsequent amendments thereto.

5. Issuance and Revocation of Permits.

Upon the granting of an exception by the Board of Adjustment, allowing the establishment of a trailer camp, the Board of Selectmen shall issue renewable one year permits upon payment of a fee of \$5.00 per unit per annum to the Town Clerk and after the Board of Selectmen has made a finding that the trailer camp is then in compliance with the terms of this ordinance and the camp plan filed with the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Selectmen is authorized to revoke any permit issued, upon finding that the permit holder has violated any provisions of this ordinance or that his trailer camp is being maintained in such a manner as to constitute a public nuisance.

6. Court Review.

Any person aggrieved by the decision of the Board of Adjustment may appeal such decision to the Superior Court in conformity with the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, 1955, Chapter 31, as amended.

7. Separability and Conflict.

a. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

b. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with or contrary hereto are hereby repealed.

8. Application To Existing Uses.

The terms of this amendment shall not apply to any trailer camps which are already in existence and in operation except that if there be a subsequent addition or expansion of such a trailer camp, the whole camp shall then comply with this amendment. Single trailers which are presently located on land in Bedford and are presently occupied and in use shall be considered a non-conforming use and may continue in their present use.

9. Effective Date.

This amendment shall take effect from and after its passage.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore, chosen and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

The members of the Budget Committee have had various meetings with the Town officers and the members of the School Board concerning the budgets both for the Town and the School District. During these meetings, the Committee has gone over in great detail all of the various items in the budgets. The committee is grateful for the assistance that the Selectmen and the School Board have given and wishes to express its appreciation for their cooperation in supplying the Budget Committee with all the information necessary to properly consider the two budgets. The Budget Committee held a public hearing on these budgets on February 21, 1961, and was disappointed in the small attendance at that hearing. The committee has the following comments to make upon certain appropriations which have been submitted for action at the town meeting without recommendation by the Budget Committee. Both the budget for the Town of Bedford and the Bedford School District appear elsewhere in the annual report.

ARTICLE 6

(Civil Defense)

Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee because the Committee feels that the voters should be allowed to consider and act upon this Article.

All other appropriations are reflected in the budgets as recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 19

(New Tables For Town Hall)

Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee because the Committee feels that the voters should be allowed to consider and determine whether the amount requested for the new tables is appropriate and whether the expenditure is necessary for the Town as a whole.



CIVIL DEFENSE

The Civil Defense Organization of Bedford is reorganizing for better efficiency. The Heads of the Services form the Executive Committee, which in the absence of the Director, would function in her place. This committee will formulate all policy and initiate all procedures to be followed.

Communications, Peter Freedman, Chief has now not only established County and State Communications net, but is about to complete a local net, manned by his crew, will be able to offer local communications through portable equipment built by our Service. Portable Antennae are needed.

Radef Service has a new Chief, Cecil Nickolls, with this new leadership the corp will have Refresher Training, and will have the opportunity to use the Bedford instruments working with the State Department of Health. Dosimiters and other instruments are needed.

The Fire Department, Walter Melendy Chief, and the Police Department, Bruno Vincent Chief, have been able to procure material through the C. D. matching Funds program.

The Welfare Service, Ray Starita Chief, is being reorganized, the different Departments of this Service are, Information and Registration, Housing and billeting, Mass Feeding, Clothing, and Financial Assistance. This Service is to meet any local need or that of refugees in any Disaster. Mass Feeding equipment, as well as office equipment, files, desks, etc., are needed. We hope to be able to use Matching Funds to obtain this equipment.


Engineering Service, and Light Rescue, Richard Ramig Chief, needs a generator, which if obtained through Matching Funds is practically a gift to the town, our expense is expected to be merely token.

Medical Service, Chief, Dr. Walter Rahmanop, Dora Bostwick, R. N. Asst., needs more material to equip a First Aid room.

Storage facilities are needed to care for CD equipment, and we hope to be able to provide such storage with some of the appropriation requested.

Floods tollow; stream flow is affected; timber, buildings, grazing and wildlife are destroyed - all because MANY are CARELESS with fire in and near woodland. This can be remedied. YOU can put an end to this shameful waste! PREVENTION is YOUR business!

YOU, whether YOU be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First - by setting a good example YOURSELF - being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second - by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise. The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for YOU and for them.

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles - make sure they are out - use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

First, we should like to call attention to the reports of the treasurer and librarian of the Bedford Public Library. These reports offer taxpayers the facts of receipts and expenditures; of books placed on accession, of pieces of literature circulated, and of library activities during the year. We trustees hope you will study both reports carefully, noting especially the sizeable increase in circulation; we hope, too, you will approve our service to the town, for it has been steady and conscientious.

All regular, and several special meetings of trustees and librarians have been held with NO absences.

Librarians and trustees operate under a self-formulated set of rules and policies, which was revised this year. Increase in salaries were made to the librarian and assistant librarian. New "open" hours were established, so the library is now open on Tuesday and Friday from 2-5 and 7-9 p.m.. An ambitious week-long program for National Library Week, April 2-8, was carried out with very successful response from townspeople. All library books are now identified by a special seal stamp. The children's summer reading program and contest drew about 70 entries. Final reports on September 1st showed the young people had read and written reviews of 891 books!

Trustees and librarians attended all area meetings; Mrs. Wiggin and Mrs. Peck the annual state librarians meeting, at which Mrs. Wiggin was elected a vice-president and chairman of scholarship; Mrs. Nickolls served on the program committee and acted as a registrar for the annual meeting of the State Library Trustees Association.

Trustees and librarians wish to express their deep appreciation for the gifts of many and valuable books from individuals and organizations, and to the State Library Extension Service for the loan of thousands of books annually and for its consultation service. Without all this, we would have been very limited, due to the modest budget. Of tremendous value, also, have been the many, many hours given by Mrs. Herbert Farrar and Mrs. Charles Lessard in helping with the permanent cataloging of the book collection.

As you study these reports, please give thought to our rapidly approaching need for a larger book collection and physical quarters, that your library continue to meet the town's cultural needs. This will require a considerable expenditure, but the time is coming soon when it will be necessary. Nothing would help more than to have some public-spirited citizens remember us in their wills by generous donations, or to set up memorial trust funds.

Quoting from last year's report "You may be assured trustees and librarians will protect your appropriation in every possible way."

The Bedford Library has just completed another year of service to the community. Our circulation continues to increase, new patrons are added weekly to our files and our large undertaking of cataloging the collection is reaching completion.

In addition to our routine services, these are some of the extra activities your librarians and trustees have undertaken to promote further interest in your library.

- 1. National Library Week was observed from April 2nd through 8th. One of the highlights of our week's activities was the presentation of a film on current events to the young peoples Fellowship of the Bedford Church. The film, incidentally, was borrowed from the state library film pool, one of the many free services made available for small libraries. To correlate the film showing, we displayed books on the same subjects which are available in our book collection.
- 2. Also during that week we held an open house for the teachers of our public schools. Mrs. Margery Hopkins, Public Library consultant of the State Library, spoke to the group on the services available to them at our local library from the state. We are anxious to serve our teachers and school children and by holding this open house hoped to introduce our services to the teachers of Bedford.
- 3. The annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association was held on May 6th in Winchester and was attended by both librarians. At that meeting it was my privilege to be elected Second Vice-President.
- 4. Our first summer reading program in 1959 proved so successful we felt it worthy of repetition. Seventy boys and girls entered the program and a total of 891 books were read.
- 5. Children's Book Week was observed in November with special displays of books throughout the library. It was fun being invited to tell a story to the children of the Stevens-Buswell School one afternoon that week and to show the children some of the wonderful books available to them.
- 6. We attended the Winter Neighborhood library meetings in Mason and the Fall Meeting in Wilton.

Your librarians and trustees are eager to make the library meaningful to the community and have worked together closely during the past year and will continue to do so in the years ahead, to bring this about.

We take this means of expressing our thanks to our interested friends from whom we have received gifts of books and magazines. Our special thanks goes to the Bedford Garden Club and the Bedford P.T.A. for their gifts of magazine subscriptions and to the Bedford Mothers' Club, the Bedford Women's Club for their gifts of books.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 21st day of March, 1961, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to vote for Officers under Articles 1, 2, 3, 3a and 4. Polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 6:30 P.M. Action on the remaining Articles will begin at 8:00 P.M.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

3a. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. 9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to hire an independent educational consultant at a cost not to exceed \$2,000.00 for the purpose of advising the District about the best method of solving the future education problems in the District, such advice to be in the form of a formal written report.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD TO THE RESIDENTS OF BEDFORD

For the past three years it has been my pleasure to serve on the School Board, the past year as it's chairman. And it truly has been a pleasure. From our Superintendent, Mr. Louis Ramsay, down through our principals, teachers, school nurse, cooks, janitors and bus drivers - all have cooperated and done their best to make the Bedford school system a system of which the people of Bedford can well be proud.

We have been fortunate in the past to have such well-qualified and conscientious teachers. The past year has been no exception and the adoption of a salary schedule last year should go a long way toward insuring the continuance of this condition.

As far as the physical plant is concerned, our buildings are in good repair. A plan was inaugurated several years ago whereby some painting is done each year. Each board since then has continued this practice. Last year, the kitchen and the bookcases and shelves in two rooms at the Stevens-Buswell School were painted; the teachers' lounge and lavatory painted at the Peter Woodbury School and the dining room and entry floors painted also; coat racks at the Bedford Memorial were painted and tile put around the wash stands and in the shower in the new addition. A great deal of the credit for the upkeep of our schools must go to the janitors who have always kept our buildings in such good condition.

However, our system continues to show symptoms of growing pains. The hiring of an additional janitor at the Bedford Memorial School, the rearranging of bus routes, two shifts for lunch at the Memorial School have all been relatively minor symptoms which we have been able to take care of during the year. On the other hand, the greater problems of over-crowding and new building needs which will demand action from the townspeople are rapidly approaching the moment of decision. The School Needs Committee has been studying this problem and has made its population projections. We hope that everyone will read this report and study its recommendations.

I wish to express my sincere thanks to Mrs. Dora Bostwick and Mr. Richard Fairchild, who have served with me this past year, for their cooperation and assistance. In closing, may I say again that School Board business is public business and the public is invited to attend the meetings of the Board. Their attendance and suggestions are always welcome. It is through such exchange of ideas that we will reach understanding and a solution to our mutual problems.

SCHOOL NEEDS COMMITTEE

The School Needs Committee has re-studied the Bedford preschool and school population trends. They then compared these figures with previous projections and found no significant differences. Based on these studies and comparisons, the following classroom requirements are indicated:

1961-62	18	1966-67	23
1962-63	20	1967-68	24
1963-64	21	1968-69	24
1964-65	22	1969-70	24
1965-66	24	1970-71	25

At this time, Bedford has 17 regular classrooms available, with two more rooms at the Donald Street School (which is now closed), and a third room in the basement of the Stevens-Buswell School.

These classroom requirements indicate that we should begin immediately to plan how we will provide enough space. However, providing the proper number of classrooms is only one of the problems to be faced. There are a number of other areas that must be studied in order to make sure that a major expenditure such as this is planned as wisely as possible. Some of these are: the most efficient use of our present school buildings; the relationship of present and future school facilities to the educational program; centralized versus neighborhood schools. These problems are very complex and indicate the need for professional guidance to insure the best possible use of our tax dollars.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford, I submit with pleasure my sixth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

After a full year of occupancy in the new four room addition I am happy to report that it is accomplishing all that we had hoped for and more. The new addition housing grades 7 and 8 with each classroom geared to a specific subject matter area has aided materially in implementing the whole Junior High program. One has only to study the Honor Roll of Manchester West to realize that boys and girls from Bedford are making transition to high school subjects in a manner that is complimentary to themselves and to their school. In our pride for the work done by our Junior High teachers we should not forget the fine work done by the teachers in the lower grades. As with a house, education must have a solid foundation upon which to build, and that foundation is built up as the child progresses from grade one through each successive grade.

Bedford's educational system is enriched by the presence of many extra curricula activities that have only one aim; that is to broaden the horizons of every child in your schools.

Following is a list of teachers new to Bedford for the year 1960-61. Note that of the three teachers lost only one vacancy was due to a teacher leaving for another position. I believe three important factors are evident here, (1) your support of the new salary schedule, (2) the professional interest you take in your schools, (3) the professional leadership as provided by your Principals. These with the reputation of being a friendly town add up to a good teaching situation.

NEW TEACHERS

Mrs. Sylvia D. Edmunds, Hockerill College, England - 1938. Mrs. Edmunds comes to us with extensive experience in English schools and those of Londonderry and Hooksett, N. H. She replaces Mrs. Kay Crosby, grade 5, who retired July 1, 1960.

Mrs. Elaine A. Ostergren, B. A. Hunter College - 1940; M. A. New York University - 1942. Mrs. Ostergren replaces Mrs. Phyllis O'Neil grade 2, who resigned to move with her family to California.

Mrs. Penelope D. Skeer, B. A. Antioch College - 1960. Mrs. Skeer replaces Mrs. Charlotte Saxe who resigned to accept a teaching position elsewhere.

INSTRUCTION

The success or failure in an elementary program is reflected to a degree in the accomplishments of the pupils in their secondary program. A study of the scholastic records of B e d f o r d pupils enrolled in a high school program can't help but reflect credit on what your schools are doing for your children. This does not mean that we can rest upon our l a u r e l s for today's complex society demands an ever broadening of the educational opportunities presented to our children. Mr. O'Neil's report follows with a more detailed explanation of what is being done in our instructional program.

SCHOOL LUNCH

The School Lunch directors and helpers in all three schools are to be congratulated on the programs they are carrying on in their respective schools. It is becoming increasingly difficult for a Lunch Program to operate without some financial help from the School District. Bedford's contribution has aided materially in helping to maintain good quality meals within the scope of the School Lunch Budget. This in itself is no small accomplishment.

MAINTENANCE

Your School Board has made every effort to keep maintenance costs at a minimum. Items small and large are corrected as soon as possible. Painting and repair schedules have been followed and immediate attention has been given to mechanical failures. Custodians have taken their usual pride in keeping their buildings clean and comfortable. Their cooperation has been most appreciated.

I would recommend that serious thought be given to a full time Custodian for Bedford Memorial. A building the size of Memorial with an enrollment of over 300 pupils should have a custodian on duty during the school day. There are countless tasks that could be accomplished during the day that now either fall upon the Principal and/or teachers or just aren't done due to lack of time. A summer program of painting and general maintenance could be carried out that could well save the difference between the cost of our present set-up and a full time person. In my mind this would be economic.

LOOKING AHEAD

Your Building Committee has been working closely with the School Board and Superintendent in making a survey of future school needs. Your budget includes recommendations for the acquiring of the services of Englehardt, Englehardt and Leggett, Educational Consultants.

Bedford has reached the point in its growth where any additional building program should be thought of in terms of not only immediate needs but the needs five, ten or even fifteen years away. This can best be done through the services of men who have had many years of experience in helping School Districts with just such problems as Bedford's.

Too, we should be thinking in terms of the instructional program you will want to meet future needs. A full time French program? Seventh and eighth grade Shop and Home Economic? A full time Guidance person grades 1 - 8? Special instruction for the exceptional child? All of these and more are areas needing our attention when we consider our buildings program, which makes it obvious as to why we should keep away from making our decisions too hurriedly. To say the least its quite a challenge.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to all school personnel and to the School Board for their cooperation in working for the educational advantages in Bedford's schools. It has made my work in Bedford a continued pleasure.

REPORT OF THE HELPING TEACHER

Supervisory Union No. 27 Office of the Superintendent School Street Hudson, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Ramsay:

The following paragraphs will constitute my annual report of the instructional programs in Supervisory Union No. 27—Bedford, New Hampshire, January, 1961. At the outset, I will borrow a few words from Peter F. Drucker who, in *Landmarks of Tomorrow*, sheds light upon the complexities facing society today:

"... We are in the midstream today ... but one thing is certain:

The past is going fast. If there is one thing we can predict, it is change. The coming years will be years of rapid change in our vision, the direction of our efforts, the tasks we tackle and their priorities, and the yardsticks by which we measure success or failure."

Social change affects the values and purposes of education; to say that there is need for structural changes in education is putting it mildly.

I am sure that the townspeople of Bedford want me to deal in specifics when I discuss their schools, (and let's not forget that the schools of Bedford *are* yours!) and the educational programs contained therein. Moreover, the people want to know if our curricular offerings maintain a healthy balance between what we know about the teaching and learning processes. Bedford folk want to know if their schools are keeping a watchful eye upon newer educational trends and developments. What is more, readers of this report will want proof that only those innovations which fit the needs of Bedford s c h o o l children are considered, and ultimately put into operation. Lastly, friends of Bedford schools will enjoy a review of the philosophy around which our schools are functioning, for it is a sound philosophy, one that tends to keep our feet on the ground while our esprit-de-corps is high up on cloud seven.

A HEALTHY BALANCE

Critics of late have caused considerable unrest amongst educator groups. "Not enough of the three R's;" "Too many frills;" "More emphasis should be placed on this, or upon that;" "Schools cost too much;" "There's too little discipline in the schools;" these and many more have come to your attention. I am of the opinion that much good has come from some sincere criticism-based upon fact not fiction, unfortunately, though, many critics have not bothered to learn the truth. Since Bedford engages a professional staff consisting of a superintendent of schools, and office of assistance called a helping teacher, and school principals, it is up to these school administrators to keep the curriculum in balance. The mainstay in the nomenclature of any school system however is the teaching force-who are directly on the firing line. Naturally there needs to be created a comfortable teaching climate. An atmosphere wherein every teacher, principal, and administrator are team participants in the overall pattern.

There are several common-sense avenues of approach to the creation of a healthy working atmosphere, the best ones I know of are, (1) to give the schools proper and sufficient supervision; (2) frequent conferences with teachers pointing out strengths and weaknesses noted through such supervision; (3) planning in-service meetings or work-sessions whereby teachers become aware of newer techniques, skills, and devices; and, (4) kindle a continuous two-way communication through which there is a steady flow of information relative to the job expectancies. These media are used most advantageously in Union 27 schools.

There is a well-balanced program of studies being taught. Wellestablished skills and techniques are introduced through the use of time-tested methods, the latter may be called traditional in a sense, but let's not forget that there are many, many good features in some older methods—yes, even in this the New Frontier!

We are blessed with a conscientious staff of teachers who are anxious to do their utmost for the cause of education. There is a balance in the staff—a balance which makes the whole scheme run like clock-work—with your children the profiteers.

THE NEW LOOK: EDUCATION FOR THE SIXTIES:

I am happy to report that there are new developments and giant strides being inculcated into the curriculum. These new trends were not imposed upon your school staff from the hierarchy in the central office. These trends and new directions as well as improved methods of instruction have come from the teachers and principals themselves. Careful and thoughtful as well as time-consuming research has gone into putting these newer developments into practice. If you were to take a tour of your schools these days here are a few observations you would undoubtedly make:

- a. children speaking French
- b. reading foreign newspapers
- c. using such audio-visual devices as tape recorders, television sets, bioscopes, film-strip projectors, slide-rules, supplemental and multi-textbook use
- d. adequate standardized testing programs
- e. growing school libraries
- f. children using the school as well as adults after school hours
- g. more teachers and administrators taking extension course to better equip them for the job
- h. reading programs aimed at providing skill, variety, and speed
- i. children learning algebra in grade 8, more difficult arithmetic in grades 4 6

j. teachers doing more *teaching*, better planning of lessons These and many more have pleased me no end, I know you will be pleased to hear of them.

There was a Polio Clinic at school December 16, 1959, at which time 325 children received Salk vaccine. There were 293 fourth shots given, 15 fifth, 7 third, 2 second and 8 first.

In February and March 1960 there were 13 children taken to the Town Hall for polio shots.

A Pre-school Clinic was held at the Peter Woodbury School in April, 1960. At that time 50 children were given a physical examination by Dr. Manning. All the children were weighed and measured, and had their eyes tested. A Dental Hygienist was present for the purpose of checking all the children's teeth.

There were 528 home calls made by the school nurse during the school vear.
