Meeting of Belknap County Delegation was called to order by chairman Page in room 145, Thursday, May 11 at 1 P. M.

Rep. Neal appointed clerk protem.

Roll call showed the following members present; Little, O. P. Smith, Guay, Simoneau, Piper, Rollins, Hoyt, Stafford, Merrill, Young, Davis, Neal, Newell, Prescott, Harvey and Smith of Tilton.

House bill 435 was taken up.

Mr. Little spoke in favor of the bill. Moved by Mr. Guay and supported by Mr. Prescott that delegation re-

commend the bill ought to pass. Discussed by Rollins, Young, Newell, Hoyt, Piper, O. P. Smith and Harvey.

Moved by Mr. Young that the motion of Mr. Guay be amended and that the delegation recommend that the bill ought to pass with amendment fixing the salaries at \$900 and fees for the sheriff, \$810 for the solicitor, \$270 for the treasurer, and \$810 for each of the three commissioners. Amendment accepted, and motion carried by voice vote.

Budget for 1933 taken up.

Voted \$12,000 for County Farm.

Voted \$1,000 for County Farm repairs.

Voted to raise \$700 for Court House equipment.

Voted to appropriate \$2,200.00 for Court House care and equipment. It was suggested that the salary of janitor be reduced by the commissioners.

Voted to raise \$18,000 for courts.

Voted we raise \$4,410 for officers' salaries.

Voted we raise \$1,000 for miscellaneous expenses.

Voted we raise \$60,000 for outside poor reliefs, \$10,000 for dependent children, \$6,500 for soldiers, \$600 for blind, and \$5,000 for old age assistance, all under one motion.

Voted on motion of Mr. Young that, beginning with July 1, 1933 the employees of the county farm as far as practical and convenient be citizens of Belknap county, and that as far as possible all machinery and equipment be purchased of Belknap county dealers.

Upon motion of Mr. Young it was voted that the clerk of the meeting in writing request the county commissioners to make a written report at the next meeting of the delegation of the action taken by them under the resolution of Rep. Young which was passed at the meeting of the delegation held on Feb. 6, 1932. The resolution referred to was as follows, "Whereas, the Belknap County Convention, being duly assembled in re-

sponse to a call from the county commissioners, to consider the financial matters of the county of Belknap, and whereas, it appearing that a certain article of furniture commonly known as a 'high boy' the same being the property of said county, has been removed from the court House by persons unknown to said convention. Therefore, be it resolved that the county commissioners who are the legal constodians of said property, be requested to forthwith take means and legal action as may be necessary to locate said article of furniture and have it returned to the said Court House at once."

Motion made by Rep. Guay that the county convention appoint a committee of 5 under article 7 of Chapter 35, of the Public Laws of 1926. Motion carried and the following nominations were made; Young, Guay, Hoyt, Page, Neal. The convention confirmed nominations.

The report of the County Commissioners, showing the amounts expended up to June 1 for outside poor relief, was read, and an estimate of the amount needed for the year 1933, based on those figures and the provisions of House Bill No. 417, was submitted by the Chairman.

Chairman Page presented a proposition in regard to counting absentee votes if presented in writing. Mr. Wallis moved that we accept proposition. Discussion ensued. Upon vote, motion was lost.

Chairman called upon L. K. Perley to present the plan and proposition of the new almshouse and cow barn at the County Farm. Mr. Owen also helped in the presentation of the plans. Arthur Nighswander of the firm of Jewett and Jewett explained the legal phrases

of the proposition. Commissioner Weeks spoke of the proposed barn.

Report of special committee was called for and Chairman Page reported for the committee. Mr. Hoyt asked what the cost of furnishing the new building would be. Chairman Page then read the formal proposition as prepared by County Solicitor.

Rep. Prescott moved that the matter be indefinitely postponed. Motion supported by Rep. Wallis. Roll-call showed yes 14, no 5. Those voted in the affirmative were Guay, Simoneau, Rollins, Hoyt, Stafford, Merrill, Young, Davis, Newell, Prescott, Harvey, Wallis, O. J. Smith, Neal. Those in the negative were Varney, Piper, O. P. Smith, Hammond and Beane,.

Mr. Prescott then moved adjournment, but on roll-call the vote was lost 7 to 12, yes, Guay, Simoneau, Rollins, Merrill, Newell, Neal, and Prescott. No, Varney, Piper, O. P. Smith, Hammond, Beane, Hoyt, Stafford, Young, Davis, Harvey, Wallis, O. J. Smith.

Belknap County Delegation met for supper in Virginia Tea Room, as guests for supper of Chairman C. H. Page. All members present except Wiley of Laconia, and Harvey of New Hampton. H. J. Lockwood, Jay Corliss of Concord, and Lewis Wilkinson, Ch. Laconia Chamber of Commerce, also were in attendance.

Business session was called to order at 8:00 E. S. T.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the question of applying for aid from the Federal Government to build new buildings at the County Farm. The Chairman, Mr. Corliss, and Mr. Lockwood, all gave information as to the project, and it was discussed fully by several members.

Representative Beane made the following motion: "The County Commissioners be authorized to submit application for federal aid, not to exceed \$110,000 for the total expense of the project, under the National Industrial Recovery Act for the construction of new buildings at the County Farm, and to submit plans under the direction of the State Engineer". After further discussion the motion was seconded and a roll-call demanded. The vote stood: Yes—Varney, Little, Piper, O. P. Smith, Hammond, Page, Beane, Simoneau, Hoyt, Stafford, Newell, O. J. Smith, Wallis, Young. No—Guay, Rollins, Merrill, Prescott, Davis, Neal.

It was voted that a committee of four be appointed from the delegation, the delegation chairman to be chairman of the committee, said committee to work with the County Commissioners in respect to project under discussion. Committee—Page, Varney, Prescott, Hoyt.

Standing votes of thanks were given to Chairman

Page for his hospitality, and to Mr. Lockwood and Mr. Corliss for their presence and assistance.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

Laconia, New Hampshire

TO THE CITIZENS OF BELKNAP COUNTY:

In compliance with the Laws of the State, your Commissioners herewith present their report, together with the report of the Treasurer, Superintendent of the Farm and House of Correction, Clerk of the Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Farm Physician, Chaplain and Auditors for the year ending December 31, 1933.

In the past year several improvements have been made at the Farm. The men's attic has been made into a large dormitory equipped with new furniture and a convenient bathroom. The safety of the occupants is secured by the installation of a fire escape. A portable Knight oven has been installed in the kitchen. The milk room has a new refrigerator of capacity sufficient to handle the milk, which is sold to the State and delivered daily to customers, at present 231 quarts.

The heating plant has been made more efficient on less fuel, radiators throughout the institution have been equipped with the Dode Vacuum Valves, with a new pump and tank to take care of the condensed water, which formerly was wasted.

A new electric motor has been installed to handle the sawing of wood in a more efficient manner, which wood is delivered to the State Relief Supervisor.

A new twelve-stanchion tie-up has been provided, now filled with registered Holsteins.

The Court House has been equipped with a new boiler, the court room redecorated, floors refinished, and a new carpet laid, and the most of this labor has been performed by those on the County Relief list.

The Commissioners wish to express at this time their appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. William J. Hartford for the faithful and painstaking manner in which they have performed the duties imposed upon them as Superintendent and Matron at the Farm.

The Commissioners also wish to extend their thanks to the County, City and Town Officers, and all others for their cooperation in carrying out the work of the County.

All bills contracted for outside relief after June 30, 1933, were paid by the State. County to pay one-quarter of said sum, not determinable by Commissioners at this date.

During the past year the Department of the County Solicitor has attended to the prosecution of many criminal cases both in the Superior Court and before the various Municipal Courts of the County. There has been no outstanding prosecution as the bulk of the work has been confined to burglary and theft cases. Two statutory rape cases were tried at the October 1933 Term of the Superior Court one respondent being acquitted and one convicted. In another similar case the respondent entered a plea and was sentenced to States Prison. The number of complaints for non-support is rapidly on the increase, they being the most difficult cases for the Courts to handle due to the scarcity of employment. Correspondence in relation to bad

check cases and minor complaints have been exceedingly heavy. Several prosecutions in bad check cases have been attended to. Liquor prosecutions are somewhat less at the present time. The records of both the Superior Court and the municipal Courts of the County will show the record of my Department.

I wish to compliment the Sheriff's Department for its courteous treatment and assistance during the year.
