TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Belmont in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Community Hall, in said Belmont, on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray all expenditures as listed in the Budget and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, and one for one year, and three Trustees of the Public Library, one for one, one for two, and one for three years.
- 4. To see what the Town will vote to do with its Parsonage Fund.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid on or before July 5th.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for Blister Rust control.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the Laconia Hospital Association.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money to meet the requirements of the State for the construction of the Province Road and bridge thereon, provided the State shall appropriate a sum for the same purpose.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept state aid for construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$726.87 for same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Water Committee to continue in its capacity whenever necessary.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot at its annual March meeting.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire a truck, or use the town truck one day a week, to collect refuse about town.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to build and maintain a Town Highway between Union Road and the B. & M. R. R. crossing, through land now owned by Mr. Hanson.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to permit the Selectmen to take such action as may be necessary to make available the necessary town funds, provided a proposal is submitted to the Works Progress Administration for a project.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 17. To see what the Town will vote to do in regard to its unfunded indebtedness.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading past Sargent Dam, from a point at the northerly bank of the brook to the Gilmanton road near Levi Clairmont's.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading past the Hunt farm, from a point at the northerly side of the entrance to John Dodge's camp at the top of the hill, to the entrance to Mr. Hunt's garage at the foot of the hill.
- 20. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION

The eighth annual graduation exercises of the Belmont High School were held on Wednesday Evening, June 19, 1935. Heretofore the program presented at these exer-

cises has been entirely by the students but on this occasion an innovation was introduced. The principal feature of the exercises was an address on Tomorrow's Adventure by Mr. Howard P. Davis, a friend of Mr. Brown, the headmaster. This type of program is now quite generally used by high schools.

TEACHERS AND ENROLLMENT

There have been four changes in our teaching force within the year. Miss Helena Lacheta and Miss Lenore Roberts resigned in June. These vacancies were filled by the selection of Miss Elsie Peckman for grades three and four, and Miss Ena True for grades five and six at the Gale School, Both Miss Beckman and Miss True are proving to be very satisfactory teachers and we are fortunate in having them as members of our teaching force. Mr. Ernest Brown resigned as headmaster of the high school just before the opening of school in September. We regretted to have Mr. Brown leave us but were pleased that he secured a much more lucrative position in Massachusetts. We were also pleased to be able to secure Mr. Eldon Dustin to fill this vacancy. Mr. Dustin is a graduate of Bates College and had had two years experience in teaching before coming to us. Mr. Dustin is an excellent instructor and under his guidance the High School is making commendable progress.

We were all shocked and grieved by the untimely death of Miss Isabel Meader early in November. During the year and a little more Miss Meader was with us she grew in strength as a teacher and endeared herself to the pupils in the high school and grades seven and eight with whom she worked. Her fine scholarship, her interest in her work and her happy disposition were an inspiration to us all. We all miss her.

Miss Elizabeth Prime of Laconia, a graduate of Wheaton College, was chosen to fill the vacancy. The work is progressing well.

We have in addition eleven pupils enrolled in the Laconia High School, thirteen in the Laconia Elementary Schools, and six in the Tilton Elementary Schools.

IMPROVEMENTS

Some much needed improvements have been made at the Gale building. New valves have been placed in the radiators, new front doors installed, and the much worn treads on the stairs replaced. Much could be done to this building to improve its appearance and make it more serviceable. The Plummer building still needs remodeling. It does not meet standard requirements for lighting.

HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

The committee authorized by the school meeting of March 12, 1935, to act jointly with the School Board in studying the high school problem, consisted of Fred H. Piper, Guy L. Hamel, Rev. F. W. Fitzpatric, Joseph Boutin and Fred W. Friend. This joint committee gave much thought and study to the problem.

The committee finally recommended that a building be erected on a lot adjoining the Gale School lot, adequate in size for the accommodation of both the seventh and eighth grade pupils and the high school pupils, and that an application be made to the federal government for a grant to aid in financing the constructing and equipment of such a building. An adjourned school meeting authorized such an application and voted to raise the school district's part of the cost of such construction and equipment.

The Washington authorities approved the application for a grant with the understanding that the project should be a \$25,000 one, the grant to be 45% of the total cost.

At a special meeting held in October the School Board was authorized to accept the grant in the name of the district, and to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary proper or advisable in connection with the construction and equipment of a high school building at a total cost not in excess of \$25,000. The School Board was also authorized to borrow on the credit of the district a sum not to exceed 55% of the total cost of the project.

As a result of the action taken there is now in the process of construction a high school building which should meet the school needs of the community and in which the community should take just pride.

The continued cooperation which I have received from the School Board, the teachers and many others is sincerely appreciated.
