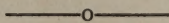

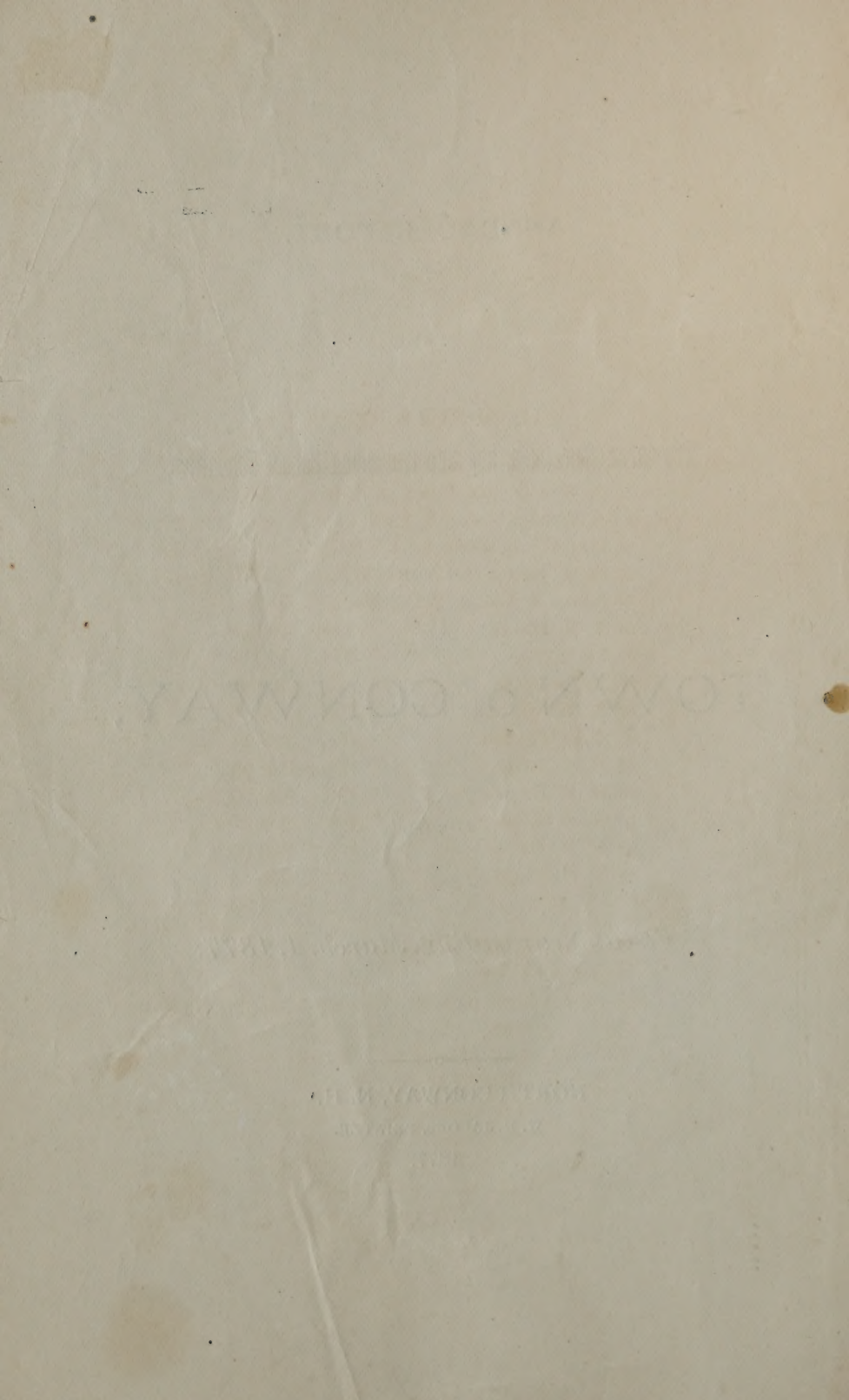

REPORT OF

Superintending School Committee.

DISTRICT NO. 1.

First term of 6 and four fifths weeks was taught by Ellen M. Peary, but closed unexpectedly by sickness of teacher.

Miss Peary has many excellent qualities as a teacher, and some of the classes in this School made excellent progress, but the term as a whole was injured by lack of thorough discipline.

Whole No. of Scholars, 31; average 25; wages of Teacher \$5. per week. Board given.

Second term of 11 weeks taught by Fred W. Powers. This term seemed to be very successful and was, as far as the teaching was concerned, but grew rather small towards the close.

Whole No. 27; average 21; wages \$5. Board given.

DISTRICT. NO. 2.

One term of 11 weeks taught by Laura A. Rounds. I was well satisfied with the appearance of this School at each visit.

Good progress was made in nearly every class. Whole No. 15; average 13; wages including board \$5 74.

DISTRICT. NO. 3.

One term of 13 weeks taught by Nellie S. Buswell. An excellent School, progress very fine. Partial burning of the School-house caused some interruption, but the school was immediately started in a private house. It could not be as successful as is taught in a suitable building.

Whole No. 17; average 14; wages including board \$5 66.

DISTRICT. NO. 4.

First term of 8 weeks taught by Ida W. Baker. School very satisfactory especially methods of teaching and governing. Noted several classes as having done good work. Whole No. 31; average 28; wages including board \$6

Second term of ten and one fifth weeks taught by Mr. R. N. Moulton, a very well qualified teacher, and good progress was noted in several classes especially in Reading and Spelling. Some lack in discipline. Perhaps the dilapidated condition of the School-house had something to do with this, as well as outside influences. Whole No. 37; average 27; wages \$5. Board given.

DISTRICT. NO. 5.

Two terms of School, both taught by Annie E. Seavey. One of 5, the other of 12 weeks. First term was interrupted by sickness of both Teacher and Scholars. Second term seemed to be profitable. Noted improvement in Reading, Arithmetic and Spelling. Whole No. 22; average 15; wages \$3 50. Board given.

DISTRICT. NO 6.

Two terms of School: one of 8, the other of 9 weeks taught by Mary A. Lancaster. This school was on the whole the best in town for two consecutive terms. Special improvement noted in Reading, Grammer, Arithmetic and Geography. Whole No. 21; average 17; wages including board \$6 50.

DISTRICT. NO. 7.

First term of 5 weeks taught by Nellie S. Gurney. Noted some improvement on the part of a few scholars. Attendance small and very irregular. Whole No. 11; average 6 wages \$3 50. Board given. Second term of 13 weeks taught by Abbie E. Cate. A very satisfactory school. Reading, Spelling, and Geography specially noted. Whole No. 13; average 9; wages \$4. Board given.

DISTRICT. NO. 8.

First term of 6 weeks taught by Lotta P. Binford. School very much crowded averaging more scholars than seats. Noted Spelling, Grammer, and Geography, a very good school.

Whole No. 47; average 39; wages including board \$6 50.
Second term of 10 weeks taught by Addie W. Dow. A very successful term, nearly every class doing well. School still crowded. Whole No. 51; average 39; wages including board \$7.
Third term of 8 weeks taught by George W. Blaisdell, a member of Dartmouth College, and a very excellent teacher. This term was arranged specially for older scholars, but very few of them attended. Noted Book-keeping, Reading, Grammar as showing marked improvement. Whole No. 20; average 13; wages including board \$10.

DISTRICT. NO. 9.

One term of 9 weeks taught by Ella S. Dearborn. Interrupted by burning of School-house, term continued in a private house with a very small attendance, otherwise school appeared well. Attendance for more than ten days only 3 scholars. Wages including board \$4.

DISTRICT. NO. 10.

Two terms 1, of 5; the other of 10 and 2 fifths weeks taught by Lydia R. Robertson. This school seemed to be in every way very successful, except in the fact that some children in the district did not attend sufficiently long to be counted as Scholars. Very good progress made in all the classes. Whole No. 14; average 11, wages including board \$5 50.

DISTRICT. NO. 11.

One term of 13 weeks taught by Emma A. Peary. A very good school attended by 4 Scholars from No. 9. and 4 from Brownfield. Reading, Spelling and Arithmetic very well taught. Whole No. 13; average 9; wages including board \$4 25.

DISTRICT. NO. 12.

First term of 6 weeks taught by Mattie A. Plummer. Very few Scholars attending at first, but several came in the last two weeks. School appeared very well. Whole No. 10; average 6; wages including board \$5.
Second term of 6 weeks by same teacher. This term begun very well, but closed for lack of Scholars. Whole No. 11; average 8;

wages including board \$4 50.

Third term of 3 weeks taught by Granville Smart. A very good school but short. Whole No. 12; average 10; wages \$5. board given. This District has been engaged in what appears to an outsider to be a very absurd quarrell.

DISTRICT. NO. 13.

First term of 6 weeks taught by Susie S. Evans. Various causes combined to prevent this term from being as successful as could have been desired. Whole No. 31; average 23.

Second term of 14 weeks taught by Lettie A. Hatch. An excellent school. I noted improvment in Reading, Arithmetic, Algebra, and several other classes. Attendance small towards the close. Whole No. 41; average 30; wages including board \$8.

DISTRICT. NO. 14.

Two terms one of 11 the other of 13 weeks, both taught by Annie E. Eastman. Noted good progress in Arithmetic, Reading and Spelling. In most respects a very good school. Whole No. 25; average 18; wages \$4. Board given.

DISTRICT. NO. 15.

Two terms of ten weeks each both taught by Miss L. G. Wentworth. This school accomplished a great deal, not only in the ordinary branches of study but in little extras and in deportment. School somewhat interrupted by sickness. Whole No. 22; average 16; wages \$4. Board given.

DISTRICT. NO. 16.

One term of 9 and two fifth weeks taught by Geo. F. Nason. Nearly the same pupils attended as had been attending a previous term in District No. 18, taught by the same teacher. Except for the falling off in scholars towards the last this might have ranked first in town. Whole No. 24; average 16; wages including board \$7 79.

DISTRICT. NO. 17.

One term of 8 weeks taught by Susan A. Weeks. A very small, but very good school. Whole No. 7; average 6; wages

including board \$6 50

DISTRICT. NO. 18.

One term of 9 weeks, taught by Geo. F. Nason. Noticed improvement in Grammar, Geography. Arithmetic and several other classes. As good a school as one often finds in a country district. Whole No. 22; average 18; wages including board, \$7 75.

DISTRICT. NO. 19.

Two terms of 12 weeks each, both taught by Olive C. Eaton. Marked progress in nearly every class. This school like those in Nos. 6, 14, 15, 16 and 18, illustrates the advantage of having one good teacher for two or more terms. This school stood second in list in improvement. Whole No 13; average 11; wages including board \$5.

With some exceptions the schools of the town have made good progress during the year. It is to be noticed as one of the benefits of printing the School Report that new interest is exhibited in the direction of education over the whole town. It is sometime asked, why with our improved School Books, and better methods of teaching, the common district school is on the average no better, if as good, as it was 50 years ago. Here is the one great cause, a lack of interest in the community especially in rural districts.

The other important reason is the leaving school by a large part of our youths, or at least an attendance which is but occasional, and as valueless to those; as it is injurious to our schools, after arriving at the age of 14 or 15. Ought this town to send out into the world young men who can scarcely read, and who cannot write well enough to do ordinary business, or even keep their own accounts? Let this interest in education increase until this is impossible; until every district have a good School-house and a good School at least 5 months in a year. That the funds annually appropriated to schools be used to the best advantage these things are greatly needed. First, district consolidation.

Something has been accomplished in this direction during the past year. District No. 11 and 9 have united, also 18 and 16. More ought to be done in the work thus begun. Second, better School-houses. One of our frail apologies for something bearing that name has been burned by accident during the past year in

District No. 9. Another partially in No. 3. It is not worth while to burn any more. Third, better and more permanent teachers. To do good work more than a six weeks term is necessary. Though six weeks is long enough to employ some teachers. Shall not another year see greater progress than the one just passed,?
