

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Deering, having been projected the fastest growing town in the state through the year 2000, has created a dynamic increase in the activities involving the planning and managing of all Town business.

One part of regulating the growth is the updating of the Town Master Plan, which is already in progress under the capable auspices of the Planning Board chaired by H. Robert Pilley; the Conservation Commission chaired by Robert Compton; and the Zoning Board of Adjustment chaired by Michael Hays. Completing this Master Plan will cost \$10,000 and is supported by the Selectmen.

Another proposal with far reaching ramifications is the suggestion that the long overdue highway bypass around Hillsboro follow a southern route through a portion of Deering; thus creating better access to West Deering, an improved approach to Route 149, and a potential commercial district broadening the tax base of the Town. This southern bypass route is also supported by the Board of Selectmen.

The Board of Selectmen is satisfied that the Town will enjoy improved fire protection by the purchase of a new KME Fire Engine which is housed at the Old County Road Station; and thank Chief William Edes and his Firefighters, the Board of Fire Wards, and the Rescue Squad for their continued fine service to the Town of Deering.

The Highway Department, in spite of the heavy damages incurred in the spring flood, succeeded in completing all of their proposed improvements in a timely and effective manner. The board commends Highway Agent Peter Beard and the Highway Crew for their

efforts and cooperation during the spring storm and throughout the year and look forward to working closely with the Highway Department during the coming year.

Growth has not left the Police Department unchanged, resulting in an increased budget to provide more hours of patrol with two officers in the cruiser during high risk hours. We have confidence that these new operating procedures will keep up with the expanding needs of the Town. The Board thanks Chief John Mitchell and the Police Officers for the dedicated service they have provided.

The Planning Board is proposing a Capital Improvement Program guided by Richard Mooney. While the Selectmen do not wish to limit any citizen participation it has received in the past, we ask your continued effort be directed to this Planning Committee which the Board heartily supports.

The Board wished to thank all of the citizens who have given their advice and suggestions as well as their time to make Deering a better Town.

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Deering in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs,

GREETINGS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday the 8th of March next, at 10:00 AM in the morning to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote the following question: "Are you in favor of having the office of Town Clerk combined with the office of Tax Collector thereby creating a new office of Town Clerk-Tax Collector to be held by one individual"?

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Zoning Amendment I as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Deering Zoning Ordinance as follows:
"The establishment of a Wetlands Conservation District using soils and vegetation and hydrology as selection criteria. The purpose of the Conservation District shall be one to protect the public health and well being and guide sensible development around areas of wetland classification."?

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Zoning Amendment II as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Deering Zoning Ordinance as follows: add "National Flood Program requirements" to Section 2.C add clarification on road frontage to Section 2.D, add new "Section 2.D.6 minimum road frontage for any lot shall be 200 feet", Section 4 heading change from Commercial Exceptions to Commercial Exceptions and Variances, Section 4.C Signs (sizes, illumination and setback requirements), add Section 4.F on Site Plans, Section 4.G add sanitary requirements for retail food sale, Section 4.H add parking requirements for delivery and removal operations, Section 4.I add provision for preliminary consultation.?

Polls will open at 10:00AM in the morning and will remain open until 6:00PM. (The Polls may be continued to be open following the above hour by vote of the meeting but may not be closed before the hour of 6:00PM - RSA 39:2).

ADDITIONALLY, pursuant to RSA 39:2a, you are hereby notified that Article 5 through 46 will be taken up at 7:30 PM. (All articles hereinafter are submitted by the Selectmen unless otherwise noted.)

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers, Agents, Committees and Auditors for the year 1987.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for payment of interest expense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to auction property taken by Tax Collector's Deeds, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:42.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,067 for the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the support of the Hillsboro Park Board, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the support of the Hillsboro Youth Services Director, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,275 for the current operating expenses allocated as follows: \$775 for the Planning Board; \$750 for the Zoning Board of Adjustment; and \$750 for the Conservation Commission, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the updating, re-

vising and publication of the Master Plan or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following in accordance with the regulation powers established in RSA 155-E pertaining to excavations and gravel pits: "The 'regulator' shall have the authority to investigate and determine upon permit application for new excavations, performance bonds to guaranty proper restoration of all disturbed areas", or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following in accordance with the regulation powers established in RSA 155-E pertaining to excavations and gravel pits: "The 'regulator' shall have the authority to investigate and determine upon permit application for new excavations, performance bonds to guaranty the protection and maintenance of town roads, specifically exposed to the potentially damaging effects of heavy trucking", or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following in accordance with the regulation powers established in RSA 155-E pertaining to excavations and gravel pits: "The 'regulator' shall upon such permit application have the authority to levy a \$0.10 per ton removal fee for all excavated product leaving the town limits", or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to prepare and amend a recommended program of municipal capital improvement projects projected over a period of at least 6 years. The capital improvements program may encompass major projects being currently undertaken or future projects to be undertaken with federal, state, county, or other public funds. The sole purpose and effect of the capital improvements program shall be to aid the Selectmen in their consideration of the annual budget, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to the Conservation Fund as authorized by RSA 36-A:5 and authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the Conservation

Fund for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for an accept the state matching funds under the LCIP for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and state matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the Conservation Commission, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850 for the membership fee for the Central NH Regional Planning Commission for the ensuing year, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500 for the ocntinued use of the Hillsboro Landfill (Deering's share to be determined by dividing the sum of the equalized evaluation of both Deering & Hillsboro into the cost of the landfill's operation and multiplying the result by Deering's equalized evaluation) and for refuse removal, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the investigation and engineering studies to determine the feasibility of possible sites on which to house a transfer station and septage disposal as required by RSA 149M:13I, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,781.65 for the Concord Regional Resource Recovery Cooperative, Town's share based on annual tonnage, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$148,445 for the general town operations allocated as follows:

and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the Town Charges for the year 1988, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$213,972 for the reconstruction of Old County Road (from Route 149 to corner - approximately 2.5 miles), or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$87,395.64 to purchase a new Highway Road Grader and authorize the withdrawal of \$76,702.14 plus accrued interest from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of \$10,693.50 to come from general taxation, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$209,154 for the following Highway Purposes:

- 1. Maintenance & General Expense \$197,154
- 2. Road Sealing 12,000 (State Share Block Grant Aid \$58,108.65), or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,500 for the Fire Department current operating expenses, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$78,105 for the purchase of the KMC Fire Truck authorized at the January 26, 1988 Special Town Meeting, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund created in 1979 and said funds with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal be returned to the general fund.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,800 for the Police Department current operating expenses or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,860 for the purchase of a new cruiser radio, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the support of the Deering Rescue Squad and \$200 for Civil Defense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the support of Boy Scout Explorer Post 105, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-B or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept or purchase on behalf of the Town any Federal or State surplus fire, police, or highway equipment, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 36. $_{
m To}$ see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus Town property, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote the follow-

ing question: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80: 58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provided that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.", or to take any other action relating thereto. (Ballot Vote Required)(Submitted by Petition)

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 for an upgrade computer system, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for a new copier, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will adopt an ordinance requiring 4' fences to surround all inground swimming pools, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to join the NH Resource Recovery Association, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to St. Jospeh Community Services, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the Grand Mondanock Arts Council, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to relocate the fire/police antenna from the Town Hall to Gregg Hill, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will accept an additional 320' of Hedgehog Mountain Road, (between the old McQuirk house to Belliveau's new driveway) as a Class V town highway, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 46. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Deering qualified to vote in Town Affairs was called to order at 10:00AM in the morning of March 10, 1987.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Total ballots cast - 165.

At 7:30PM Charles A. Gaides, Moderator, opened the meeting with a salute to the flag, followed by a moment of silent prayer for George G. Wolf and Roland F. Cote.

Article 2. It was voted to accept the reports of Town Officers, Agents, Committees, and Auditors for the year 1986.

Article 3. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for payment of interest expense.

- Article 4. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to auction property taken by Tax Collector's Deeds, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:42.
- Article 5. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,045 for the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center.
- Article 6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the support of the Hillsboro Town Park Board.
- Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the support of the Hillsboro Youth Services Director.
- Article 8. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 for the current operating expenses of the Planning Board; \$400 for the current operating expenses of the Zoning Board of Adjustment; and \$750 for the current operating expenses of the Conservation Commission.
- Article 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$710 for the membership fee for the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission for the ensuing year.
- Article 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for the continued use of the Hillsboro Landfill (Deering's share of the cost of using the landfill to be determined by dividing the sum of the equalized evaluation of both Deering and Hillsboro into the cost of the landfill's operation and multiplying the result by Deering's equalized evaluation) and for refuse removal.
- Article II. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$747 for the Concord Regional Resource Recovery Cooperative, Town's share based on annual tonnage.
- Article 12. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the following sums of money:
 - 1. Town Officers Salaries \$16,000
 2. Town Officers Expenses 26,500
 3. Election and Registration 1,000
 4. Town Buildings 27,000

Article 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$46,912 to reconstruct Peter Woods Hill Road and the sume of \$115,000 to shim and overlay the remainder of East Deering Road (including Cross Road and Dudley Brook Road).

Article 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for Highway purposes:

- Maintenance and General Expense of the Highway Department - \$191,357
- 2. Road Sealing 15,750

(State Share Highway Block Grant Aid \$58,311.61)

Article 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 16. By amendment, a paper ballot vote was taken to see if the Town would raise and appropriate the sum of \$72,500 for the purchase of a new Fire Truck, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$72,500 under the Municipal Finance Act, and issue bonds or notes payable within five years of issue date. A 2/3 vote was required, there were 119 ballots cast: Yes - 71, No - 47. Article defeated.

Article 16A. To see if the Town would authorize with-drawal of the sum of \$11,000 from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund for partial payment of the new Fire Truck. Articles defeated.

Artcile 17. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000 for the Fire Department.

- Article 18. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$35,000 for the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund.
- Article 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,410 for the Police Department and the sum of \$200 for Civil Defense.
- Article 20. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund.
- Article 21. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the support of the Deering Rescue Squad.
- Article 22. It was voted to instruct the Town's Representatives to the Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook Nuclear Plant shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of Deering unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.
- Article 23. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the support of Boy Scout Explorer Post 105 sponsored by the Deering & Hillsboro Police Departments.
- Article 24. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to return by Selectmen's Deed, a portion of the land at the McAllister Fire Station, as determined by the Deering Fire Department, to the McAllister family.
- Article 25. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or other governmental unit, or a private source, which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95B.
- Article 26. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of, any surplus Town property.
- Article 27. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept or purchase, on behalf of the Town, any Federal or State surplus fire, police, or highway equipment.

Article 28. By a ballot vote, it was voted to "Adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1C, which authorizes any town or city to elect not to access, levy and collect a resident tax". Yes - 53, No - 4.

Article 29. Moderator Gaides requested observance of a moment of silent prayer for Howard Whitney.

Meeting was adjourned at 12 Midnight.

DEERING FIRE AND RESCUE REPORT

The Deering Fire Dept. has answered an increasing number of calls this year. We have also supplied mutual aid to Hillsboro, Weare, and Antrim. These towns have also supplied mutual aid to Deering.

This year we lost a pump and a transmission in 84Ml (pumper stationed at County Rd. Station). This truck is the oldest in the Dept., and is the truck we are planning on replacing this year. I brought this problem to the attention of the fire wards and the selectmen, and a decision was made to look into leasing the truck we are going to ask the town to purchase this year.

As in the past, members of the department have continued their fire service training. The men have also taken time to give fire prevention presentations at several schools.

We had the opportunity to work closely with the police, highway departments during the flooding we experienced this past spring. I was very pleased with cooperation, and professionalism shown by all. In an emergency of this size, it is good to know that through teamwork the job can be accomplished.

As always the Selectmen, Fire Wards, myself, and the men of the Deering Fire and Rescue wish to thank the residents of Deering for their continued support, and their efforts in fire prevention. It takes all of us to make this a safe town to live in. If at any time you have a problem, question, or suggestion, please feel free to call myself, the fire wards, or the selectmen. This is your fire department, and your input is important to the growth and development of the Deering Fire and Rescue.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN & STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed. If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest tax law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217.

It you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

DEERING CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

The Deering Conservation Commission spent much of 1987 actively reaching out to inform residents about important issues such as water quality, septic awareness and wetland protection. The sharp increase of new homes in town is clearly evident in the changing landscape in Deering, making the task of protecting and preserving our natural resources more important than ever.

One far-reaching accomplishment in 1987 was the drafting of the "Wetland" ordinance for the town. This document represented months of study and review by commission members of wetlands protection procedures already adopted at the Federal, State and local levels.

The annual clean-up day in April was one of most suc-

cessful on record in terms of volunteer involvement and roadside trash collected.

In June, the commission sponsored two young people to attend youth conservation camp. A third young person was co-sponsored by the Deering Fish & Game Club. Young men and women who attend conservation camp are trained to become conservation leaders in their schools and communities. Campers learn about our renewable natural resources: forests, soil, water and wildlife.

This summer, Deering participated in a regional "Home Toxic Waste Clean-up Day", co-sponsored by the Deering Rescue Squad. The event offered townspeople an opportunity to dispose of household toxic waste, such as chemicals and solvents, safely and responsibly.

Conservation commission members knocked on every cottage door on Deering Lake this summer to discuss water quality issues. This informal approach touched on important subjects like septic system leaching, dredge & fill procedure, and lake testing. the commission plans to make lake canvassing an annual event.

A unique "Lay Monitoring Program" was also started in the summer of 1987 for Deering Lake. Volunteers take samples of lake water in the months of July, August, and September and state biologists analyze and interpret the data. This collection of key information over time will help identify changes in the lake's water quality and help with decision making concerning the uses and protection of Deering Lake. This ongoing testing program is being made possible by a generous contribution from the Deering Association. the complete 15-page 1987 report for Deering Lake is posted at the Town Office bulletin board.

The commission plans to continue work on wetlands mapping. We are currently working with the planning and zoning boards on an update of the town master plan. Commission members continue to perform on-site inspections of proposed new building sites in Deering. A major focus in 1988 will be to pursue land protection

opportunities presented by the Trust for New Hampshire Lands.

The Conservation Commission meets every third Monday of each month at 7:30PM at the Town Hall, and welcomes attendance by concerned citizens.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

1987 was a busy year for the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Three requests for Special Exception and three requests for Variances were heard by the board. In several cases these hearings required multiple meeting and site reviews. Based upon our experiences with these various requests during 1987, the ZBA has submitted recommendations for modification and clarification of Deering's Zoning Ordinance to the Planning Board.

In addition to regular board meetings, several members have attended educational meetings sponsored by the NH Municipal Association, which dealt with zoning enforcement, court cases regarding zoning decisions and master plan requirements.

Currently, the Zoning Board has the required five members, but we still need two alternates to ensure business can be conducted at our scheduled meetings. If anyone is interested in participating on the ZBA as an alternate member, he/she should contact the town secretary. Previous experience in zoning is not required, however an individual must be prepared to become familiar with town zoning ordinances, state statutes relating to zoning and be able to participate in monthly meetings. The ZBA meets on the third Monday of each month at the Town Hall.

PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

The year of 1987 has been a busy one for the Planning Board. Regional economic conditions have created a period of growth and development for the town. Office of State Planning (OSP) population projections (May 87) place Deering at the top of a statewide list. Projections indicate that Deering will see a doubling of town population by 1995. Sensible administration, combined with the proper framework of Ordinances and Regulations is the ony way to guarantee our future. Ordinances, Regulations and Plans must guide our future growth so that we may always enjoy what is Deering, afford what is Deering and protect what is Deering. this, is the Planning Board's Challenge.

The Planning Board is presently receiving guidance from the Central NH Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) and the OSP for updating town plans. The Planning Board with help from other town boards. groups and agents is working on updating the Master Plan. In support of this work has been the Master Plan questionnaire in which an excellent 45% return rate was achieved. Tabulated results sent to the CHNRPC were analyzed for statistical trends and correlations with OSP data. Questionnaire inputs comined with inputs from other town groups in compliance with state regulations will form the basis of the Master Plan. It is the intent to have a Master Plan which identifies specific attributes of the town: historical areas, watersheds & wetlands, soil types, topography, flood plain, residential & commercial areas, conservational & recreational areas.

National Flood Insurance Program Development Ordinance was incorporated into the Subdivision Regulations on March 31st. Adoption and inclusion of these requirements was mandatory if Deering was to remain in the National Flood Insurance Program.

During the year II subdivision applications were received. Of the II applications received 3 were major subdivisions, 7 were minor subdivisions and I was a minor lot line adjustment. The Board approved 3 major subdivisions, 5 minor subdivisions and I lot

line adjustment.

This is the second year of membership in the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. Personally I have found it a great forum for discussion of regional planning issues. In addition CNHRPC staff planners have helped the town significantly with regulations, ordinances and planning issues.

The Planning Board meets the second Wednesday of the month at 7:30PM at the Town Hall, and attendance by concerned citizens is always welcome.

The report of Deering being the faster growing town in N.H. might be, there has been 87 building applications this year, all but one was granted.

33 of these were new home construction; 16 additions and roof alterations; 6 garages and carports; 17 sheds and utility storage buildings; 11 patios, decks, and breezeways; and 4 office and business expansions.

REPORT OF THE CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE

New Hampshire Industrial Development Authority Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$48,000,000. were issued in August to finance construction of the new facility. Ground breaking was held on September 10, 1987. It is anticipated that the facility will go on line by June 1989. All necessary permits, including permission to deposit the incinerator ash in the Concord landfill have been received.

Yes, the Deering Library is small, but so is Deering. The Library is also only open four hours a week, but there is no paid staff. Your elected trustees have spent many hours improving the collection and reorganizing your Library for use from June to September. They staff the Library and arrange the well received story hours.

Winter hours were increased at the Town Hall by opening on Thursdays from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM. But residents still do not use their Library. Why?

Many changes were made as a result of our 1983 survey. We will conduct another survey in 1988 and keep trying to increase the use of the Library by all residents.

In 1987 we continued the repair and leveling of grave stones in our cemeteries. The Keene Monument Company worked in the Wilkins Cemetery on 165 grave stones at a cost of \$4505.

In 1988 we hope to have the grave stone work done in the Goodall cemetery.

An unexpected expense in 1987 was the removal of a huge tree that went down in the West Deering cemetery during the wet snow storm of late April. Due to the size of the tree and the difficulty of access the cost was \$1000.

The expansion of the East Deering Cemetery by clearing and grading the rear parcel is an immediate necessity as we have fewer than twenty-seven grave sites left in town owned cemeteries. Expansion is a chief priority if we wish to continue to provide burial sites in our town.
