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Selectmen's Foreword And Report

The arrival of Town Meeting brings the period of inventory and analysis of past year performance and projection of requirements for the future.

The Town Meeting of 1965 "voted out" the Town Manager system (article 17), returning the full responsibility for execution and follow-up to the Selectmen. Despite some initial misalignment in the 1964 accounts and the number of major projects programmed, all matters authorized by the meeting of 1965 have been either initiated or completed.

Emphasis during 1965 was on the improvement of Highways and Bridges, refurbishing municipal property and continued updating of office procedures and accounts including the completion of property revaluation by the State Appraisers employed by the town in 1964 and validated by Article 7 of 1965 Town Warrant.

The position of Road Agent was not on the 1965 ballot since the 1964 Town Manager plan reduced the position to that of a supervisor, however, the selectmen appointed the previous road agent. Mr. Cooper, as Foreman.

Under the supervision of the highway department fortified by newer and improved equipment the following listed articles of the 1965 warrant were completed at substantial savings over prior years. The greatest savings were effected in standard accounts such as repairs and maintenance and a good percentage in sealing and extra labor, this was due in part to better selection of equipment and more intensive supervision. (Completed articles of 1965 warrant: Article 8 - Sidewalk, Crystal Avenue to Grinnell - Article 12 - TRA "A" funds)

The funds under Article 13 and Article 9 of the 1965 warrant were assigned to completion of projects identified by Article 9 and a summary of these projects is set forth in another section.

Utilization of reserve TRA "B" funds had been planned as an additional supplement to the funding by bond issue. To use TRA funds requires State participation in planning, design and construction of projects where funds are applied. Because of the delay involved in these proceedings, the Selectmen were obliged to proceed without full utilization of TRA funds (the Town Meeting vote required all work to start in 1965). This situation plus the unexpected high cost of the new bridges made it necessary to rearrange the schedule for payment of the "multipurpose" capital improvement projects. One additional factor encountered was the refusal of the Federal Government to participate in the short interceptor which was planned to branch eastward from the Horne Brook interceptor now under construction. However, the state is anxious to have this work done and will participate to extent of 40% of the expense.

The rearrangement is as follows:

- 1. West Broadway paving expense was paid from 1965 highway funds where a surplus resulted from reduced cost of operation, as previously stated.
- 2. Eleven thousand two hundred and forty-two dollars (\$11,242.00) was left in TRA reserve and scheduled for use in the 1966 planned repairing of Birch Street. These funds together with 1966 TRA funds and a requested

\$7,000.00 (which is in the Town Budget) represent the estimated \$30-000,00 required to complete the project.

- 3. The east branch interceptor will appear as an article in the 1966 Town Warrant in order to legalize the Town and State financing since this was not so advanced in the sewer project as it appeared in the 1965 warrant. To complete this project, \$7,000.00 will appear in the budget as the Town Share of the estimated cost.
- 4. A summary of these projects will appear elsewhere in the town report.

With the heavy money demands required to meet the forthcoming community obligations, the Selectmen urge that no new increases in labor rates be granted and further urge that no changes to job levels in salary schedule be authorized, since it will upset the work of two prior salary studies which are deemed to be adequate to current requirements.

According to present schedule, the zoning ordinances and planning will be completed in the first quarter of 1966. The revaluation of property has been completed and will be updated during spring and summer of 1966. To continue proper maintenance of assessments, provide adequate inspection of buildings and structures and develop information toward practical building codes, the Selectmen are recommending the addition of a full time Assessor and Building and Health Inspector combination and are requesting funding in the 1966 budget.

The Town Dump is a matter of grave concern. Fire hazard during dry spells eliminates burning which results in unsightly health hazard reflecting on adjacent property; unless we can obtain improved control, we face the possibility of closing the facility under State Board of Health orders. Looking toward better control, both present and future, the Selectmen are presenting a program for full time supervision and incineration of waste. This calls for using small bulldozer housed in protective shed at the dump, and an incinerator and one full time employee to control, burn and provide covering.

The 1966 budget further presents recommendations for increasing the police force by one officer, continued replacement of Town Highway Garage and improvements in equipment for various operating departments.

All projects proposed plus the initial "payback" on the 1965 bond issue total to a 1966 budget which will compare very favorably with the 1965 budget. If the Selectmen's recommendations are accepted it will represent an increase of approx. \$72,000 during 1966 by the departments under the purview of the Selectmen; of the total sum \$89,800 is non-recurring expense.

The office of Selectmen during the year 1965 made initial application for federal participation in construction projects for extension of sewer through Derry Village toward Beaver Lake; and the replacement of paving on Crystal Avenue from Broadway to Ross Corner. These projects are tentatively requested for 1968 and 1969.

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- TOWN WARRANT -

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at Veterans Memorial Building in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

By vote of the Selectmen, the polls for this meeting will remain open from ten o'clock in the forenoon until seven-thirty o'clock in the afternoon, and as much longer thereafter as the Town, at the opening of the meeting, may vote.

- 1. To elect a Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Library Trustees, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Cemetery Trustees, Auditors, and other necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.
- 2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, for buildings and repairing bridges, for suppression of moths, for police department, for the Derry District Court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of Town officials, for the Board of Health, for the expense of the Town Hall, for support of the libraries, for State and County taxes, for the observances of Memorial Day, for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for playground purposes and for band concerts, for cooperating with the State and Federal governments in the control of insect pests and white pine blister, and for all necessary charges arising in said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction and convey any real estate acquired through deeds from the Collector of Taxes or as reimbursement for assistance furnished to citizens, providing that in the case of tax deeded real estate the previous owner, or his or her heirs, if known, or its successors or assigns in the case of a corporation, shall have first opportunity to purchase the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes of the municipal year in which such debts are incurred and made payable therefrom, by such vote, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 80, Section 52-a, providing for the prepayment of taxes, and authorize the Collector of Taxes to accept payments in prepayment of taxes, and to further allow the Collector of Taxes to discount taxes according to the following schedule or such other schedule or such other schedule as the meeting may determine, fix the rate of such discount, and pass any vote relating thereto. The Selectmen recommend the

following schedule and discount: 2% discount on taxes prepaid in full. or on installments of not less than \$100.00 prior to July 1, 1966; 1½% discount on installment payments of \$10.00 or more until October 1, 1966, or until tax bills are issued; and a 1% discount from the time that the tax bills are issued until December 1, 1966, or 30 days after date of invoice, whichever is earliest.

6. By petition: Real estate properties were appraised for 1965 Taxes as follows: "All property is to be appraised upon the basis of its value for its best use, regardless of the actual use being made of the property."

We as citizens of Derry, believing this method is unfair and causes many hardships, do hereby direct our Selectmen to negotiate with the members of the New Hampshire State Tax Commission for the discontinuance of this method. Thus all property will henceforth be appraised each year for its value according to its current use.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000.00 as the second and final installment on the payment for the reassessment of all taxable property by the State Tax Commission, \$15-000.00 having been paid in 1965, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to permit the hire of a full time employee to act in the capacity of Property Assessor, Building Inspector and Health Officer, the annual salary to be established by the Selectmen, but not more than \$6,500.00 plus \$500.00 expense, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incorporate changes to Horne Brook Interceptor to construct easterly branch extending to Route 28, the total estimated cost of \$11,000.00 to be absorbed by 40% State participaion and \$7,000.00 by the Town, part drawn from income of original authorization of multi-purpose bond, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a sewer capital reserve fund, said fund being established for the purpose of a reserve for capital equipment and replacement and repair of said equipment, and said fund to be a separate fund from the general sewer capital reserve fund already established, and to further authorize the Selectmen to transfer \$20,000.00 from the regular sewer fund to the new sewer capital equipment fund, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 11. By petition: To see if the Town will vote to extend the existing sewer system to Derry Village.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,707.19 for aid under apportionment A of Town Road Aid Plan to match a State appropriation amounting to \$11,381.28 for the purpose of construction of Class IV and Class V highways, and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,250.00 for aid under apportionment B of Town Road Aid Plan to match an appropriation by the State of \$6,250.00 for the purpose of construction and reconstruction of Town highways as provided for in said Town Road Aid Plan, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to transfer meter receipts to the departments for purposes outlined in the following distribution: to the Police Department for patroling of meters \$3,500.00; to the Highway Department for cleaning about meters \$2,500.00; for the maintenance of meters \$560.00; for care and maintenance of parking lots \$400.00; and any remaining balance be transferred to the Trustees of Trust Funds, to be added to the capital reserve funds, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to acquire from the Cooperative School District No. 1 of the Town of Derry the land and buildings on West Broadway commonly called the West Side School, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6.000.00 for the purpose of defraying costs incurred in exploration and testing in search of additional water sources for the Municipal Water System, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to recommend to the Selectmen that an ordinance be enacted by the Board of Selectmen for the restraint of dogs from running at large in the town, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for the purchase and erection of an incinerator to be constructed at the site of the Town Dump, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to request the Recreation Commission to arrange for band concerts during the summer of 1966 at the MacGregor Park, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to change the name of Alexander Playground to Alexander-Carr Playground, so that recognition will be given to Dr. Harrison Alexander, who originally donated the land, and to Dr. William G. Carr and his wife, Lida M. Carr, who donated a large fund to be held by the Trustees of Trust Funds, the income from which shall forever be used for the playground, and, further, to request the Selectmen to erect a suitable plaque, in an appropriate place at the playground, commemorating the above named donors, and pass any vote relating thereto.

22. By petition: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500) to be set aside with the Trustees of the Trust Funds to be used to help defray the cost of the 250th Anniversary Celebration in 1969 of the first settlement of Nutfield.

And that the Board of Selectmen appoint a committee consisting of not less than nine (9) members within the next sixty (60) days. This committee shall formulate plans for this observance. And that the Board of Selectmen contact the surrounding communities that were included in the founding of Nutfield to invite them to participate in this celebration.

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$277.54 for membership by the Town in the New Hampshire Municipal Association, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 24. To see what action the Town wishes to take on the following question: "Shall the zoning ordinance as sponsored by the Planning Board be adopted for this Town?" To be voted on by ballot.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to increase the membership of the Planning Board, as established by vote of the 1960 Town Meeting, from five members to seven, as provided by RSA 36:4, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 26. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 27. To appoint any necessary committee on any article embraced in this warrant.
- 28. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before this meeting,

A condensed report from Camp, Dresser & McKee to the Board of Water Commissioners. Work performed by Layne-New England Company under contract awarded September 16, 1965.


Nine sites were examined by Mr. Erickson of the Layne-New England Company and with Mr. Harold Bean, Superintendent, Derry Water Works.

Examine map -

- 1. High Street drilled 72 feet clay and fine sand rejected.
- 2. South Avenue 38 feet drilled clay and fine sand rejected.
- 3. West of Site No. 2, south of sand pit drilled 8 feet rejected.
- East of Beaver Brook one-half mile below present wells 100 gallons per minute, does not warrant consideration.
- North of Island Pond Road, southwesterly of Ballard Pond two test wells - refusal at 12 feet.
- 6. Taylor Brook and ¼ mile west of Island Pond deepest was only 27 feet pumped 25 gallons per minute.

Remaining to be tested -

- A. East of Shields Brook, South of Scobie Pond Road.
- B. North of Ski Tow near confluence of West Running Brook and Beaver Brook.
- C. East side of brook about 1,200 feet southwesterly of Adams Pond.

1965 DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The purpose of the Recreation and Parks Commission is to provide leisure time activities for the citizens of the town of Derry, young and old alike. We have strived to have some activity to fill the needs of all age categories this year. We have successfully conducted activities for the preschoolers as well as the senior citizens. This covers the entire scope. In its third year of operation the department has made progress in many areas of activity. New activities have been added and improvements and construction to existing facilities have also been made. The business of the commission has also improved through the adoption of a financial code which corresponds with the new operating procedures of the Selectmen's Office and submitting plans to the Planning Services Group which is drafting a comprehensive master plan for the town of Derry. The commission has also submitted to the Selectmen for their approval, operating policy for future action.

The new aspects of the program include a program for our deserving senior citizens, popular activity in slow pitch softball for men, a revival of horseshoe play, a planned program for tennis, assisting with the organization of a camping group, a ski club, and a model race car group.

Improvements to the facilities have included work on the infield at the Veterans Field as well as a new backstop at that area which can be used for baseball and softball. New bottom section of backstop at O'Hara Park where the Little Leaguers play. The removal of a great deal of loam from the bottom of Hood Park. The installation of much needed play equipment in the area of Hood Park and picnic tables in Hood Park as well as Alexander Playground.

With an increase over the previous year's budget we were able to increase the program somewhat. The program activities included skiing and skating on a limited basis in 1965, craft program with the Home Demonstration Workshop, men's basketball as well as the girl's Pin-up bas-

ketball, a very popular roller skating program and an equally popular bowling program for children. The younger boys also had the advantage of a basketball clinic as well as the Jet Jr. and teenage basketball activity. Square and round dance were also made available through the department. We also assisted with the Soap Box Derby, the Easter egg drop, the youth center activities, we organized fly fishing clinic, a boating course, besides several tournament opportunities in basketball, bowling and softball. During the summer, our activities are geared primarily around the playground program in the morning at Hood Park and the swimming program in the afternoon at Maloof's Pond. In addition to these we also conducted the Grasshoppers baseball for the younger boys and slo pitch softball for the men. Horseshoes and tennis also were begun under the auspices of the department. The fall program includes the flag football, some camping activities along with the holiday parties of Halloween and Christmas. We also had some activity for the senior citizens through various tours and provided some instructions to our teenagers in hunter safety and first aid.

The total attendance for these programs amounted to some 66.711 participations. That is to say that people attended that many sessions of activities during the twelve months of 1965. The highest participation being during the summer months, June, July and August when the outdoor facilities are used the most.

Various groups to utilize the services and resources of the Recreation and Parks Commission include the Boy Scouts, the Cub Scouts, the Girl Scouts and Brownies, the 4H, Grange, the Antique Auto Club, the Junior Garden Club, Sportsmen's Association, Jr. Rifle Club, the Home Demonstration group, the Derry Little League and many other groups too numerous to mention.

Since we have a one man department, volunteers are absolutely necessary to operate a successful program. Our thanks go out to the many volunteers of the town, parents and youngsters alike, who have given their time and effort to help us complete a successful year. Top on the list for those who help us go our thanks to the School Department who again has allowed us the use of the schools for our various programs. Due to the fact that the classrooms have taken over many of the spaces in Hood and Grinnell Schools, the program has been somewhat limited this year. We also would like to thank Mr. Tom Maloof for allowing us to use his swimming area for our summer swim program. The men who donated their time to coach the various teams; the Lions Club for their effort in helping the youth of the town; the sponsors who made possible the extra niceties for some of the teams; the Legion for allowing us to use the facility of the Legion Hall; Sandy's bowling establishment for its cooperation with the bowling; the Plaza Cinema for the generosity of allowing the Senior citizens to take advantage of their facilities as well as the Showcase Cinema in Lawrence for inviting the senior citizens down there. Our special thanks go to Mr. Harold Moynihan for teaching housewives groups in skiing and tennis and also for the extra help he has given on the fireplace at Hood Park, Most of all, thanks go to the Recreation Commissioners who are appointed by the Selectmen. This year Mr. Frank Smith was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Robert

Gannon and Mrs. Marilyn Ball who was reappointed to the Commission by the Selectmen. I'm only sorry that space doesn't allow us to thank individually the many people and groups who have cooperated to bring this program to the citizens of the town of Derry.

Our summer program was amply handled by Mrs. Sandra Crocker and Miss Gail Laycock. These girls taught the arts and crafts and handled the playground activities during the morning and taught the Red Cross swimming courses in the afternoon throughout the summer. They also helped conduct the annual field day which is held at the end of the summer.

Your director has also participated in recreation activities beyond the boundaries of the town. I was a member of the New England Advisory Council on Recreation and held office in the New Hampshire Recreation Society. I also was chairman of the Playground Leaders Institute and was active in promoting a new state office which will assist municipal recreation departments throughout the state of New Hampshire.

The facilities operated by the Recreation and Parks Commission include Hood Park on Rollins Street. Hood Park is still closed by the state for swimming purposes and it looks like it will not be available again for the summer of 1966, but we are looking forward to reopening the pond and using the facility on a full time basis in 1967. The park now does have a lot of new play equipment as well as additional facilities for picnicing and plans are being made to maintain the park on a high level which will allow further use of it for all the citizens of the town.

Another facility is MacGregor Park. This is a popular showpiece in the town of Derry with its green, grassy areas. The annual band concerts are always popular and benches have been made available for those walking along the park. The new chain link fence has also been erected along the Library to replace the old worn out fence of many years ago. Veterans Field and O'Hara Park are also a part of the facilities maintained by the Recreation and Parks Commission.

Alexander Playground is also a part of the facilities made available by the Commission and thanks to the Carr Trust Fund, seeding of the ski area was completed this year and picnic tables were added to the picnic areas for the use of picnickers. Plans for this area include a toboggan run for next year as well as additional parking and picnic space.

Our department also is not without problems. Some of our problems which we hope to iron out this year include the lack of facilities, the need for more maintenance in the present facilities, the need for repairs to the Recreation Office, the fact that the shooting range as directed by Town Meeting last year has not been secured. As soon as we find town owned property for such a facility, it will be constructed and made available to the public. Vandalism has also been a continual maintenance problem especially during this past year, Lights have been broken in Hood Park; doors and windows to buildings have been broken in; buildings have been damaged; and water pipes and other utilities have been ruined so that repair was necessary. Vandalism is costing us more tax dollars every year.

The Commissioners put much of their time and energy into plan-

ning for the future. Their meetings are open to the public and constructive suggestions are welcomed at any time. We will continue to strive to provide the best recreation program possible for the amount of money which is budgeted for that purpose. Continued cooperation is needed from every individual and group throughout the town. With everyone's cooperation, we hope to improve our program and facilities as much as we possibly can.

The building has been used for meetings of various kinds, as well as being the host Library for many of the Advisory Board meetings for this area.

National Book Week and Children's Book Week were appropriately observed, and we are always pleased to have displays or exhibits of any kind to show to the public.

The Bookmobile made the usual 5 visits during the year and we borrowed heavily from them.

The following reference books have been added to our steadily growing Reference section: Encyclopedia Americana; Book of Knowledge; Van Nostrand's Scientific Encyclopedia; Webster's new third unabridged Dictionary; Encyclopedia of World History, as well as several others in this same catagory.

We are indeed grateful to the many individuals and organizations who have given books, bookmarks, and flowers throughout the year. We wish we had space to mention each by name. The Derry Garden Club again decorated the Library for the Christmas season and we are most grateful for their continued interest.

The Librarian attended many Library meetings and Workshops, and has recently completed a course, given by the State Library, at Notre Dame College, Manchester.

To Mrs. Ruth Johnson and Mrs. Mildred Ingalls, the Librarian's assistants, the Librarian expresses her appreciation for their support and

cooperation. To the many people who have helped to make the past year a pleasant and successful one, the Librarian offers sincere thanks.

It is our wish to serve the students, teachers and general reading public in the most efficient manner possible, and we hope you will find both informative and enjoyable reading materials at your Library.

The Library hours are: Monday through Friday 2:00 until 8:00 and Saturdays 2:00 until 5:00.

This year, as in the past few years, your Board's duties have been divided between the two principal functions of a Planning Board the administration of the subdivision regulations as they pertain to the orderly subdivision of land and the development of a Comprehensive Plan for the Town.

At its regular bimonthly meetings, as well as additional special meetings, the Board examined, reviewed and discussed with potential developers a number of plans involving several hundred lots. In addition to reviewing these plans for compliance with the subdivision regulations, this aspect also frequently required actual review of the site to consider special problems. During the year 32 plans comprising 164 lots were given final approval.

The greatest amount of time, however, was devoted to the development of the Comprehensive Plan undertaken the previous year, under a matching funds program with the State and Federal governments. Through the assistance of The Planning Services Group, the consulting firm engaged to assist the Board under State supervision, a number of background studies of various aspects of the Town were completed. These included a review of the population, economic base, existing land use, traffic and parking problems, school building program and other community facilities of the Town. In addition to reporting existing conditions and facilities, these reports indicated the trends and planning implications of their findings and recommendations for the future. Summaries of each of these were published in the local newspapers for the general information of the public.

Based on these reports as well as the views obtained from an analysis of the neighborhood meetings held last year, a Comprehensive Plan for the Town was evolved, consisting of basic goals to which it was felt the Town was striving and guidelines or proposals by which the community could reach these goals. This involved countless hours of the members' time reviewing, analyzing and criticizing the reports and meeting with the consultants. Although it was found inexpedient to hold additional neighborhood meetings, the Board and consultants did meet, at various stages of the program, with appropriate Town officials and committees, the Chamber of Commerce and other civic and service groups. Also, several town wide meetings were held to acquaint the public with the program and obtain their reactions. Copies of the Comprehensive Plan are available for the examination and review of the public at the Town office and libraries.

The development of the Comprehensive Plan is now complete. However, this is only the first phase of the planning process. Equally, or perhaps even more, important is the implementation of the plan by the citizens of the Town through acquaintance with the plan, service on the various committees and study groups to be set up in the future and action at Town meeting when required. At present one of the main methods of implementation, through a new zoning ordinance, is to be voted on at Town meeting. The Board hopes each voter will give thoughtful and careful consideration to this naturally controversial issue, especially in

light of the number of man hours spent on its development. Other methods of implementation through a capital improvements program and community action is already underway.

As the phase of the planning process is completed, your Board would like to express its sincere thanks to the many unheralded citizens who gave their assistance, including those who assisted in setting up various meetings, those who served as a zoning advisory group, those who volunteered clerical and secretarial help, as well as both town newspapers and other news media serving the Town for freely publishing the many reports and articles, and finally those citizens who made the effort to attend the public meeting and become acquainted with the program. We hope that many more will take the opportunity to examine the various reports and studies available for public review at the local libraries.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS

The Zoning Board of Appeals is empowered by the Zoning Ordinance to hear and decide requests for appeals, special exceptions and variances. The function of the Board is to grant relief to an individual when the provisions of the Ordinance are unduly harsh in his particular case provided such relief will not harm the community welfare.

In 1965, the Zoning Board held 108 public hearings at the request of the citizens. The breakdown of these hearings, by type and by disposition, follows:

Hearings have nearly doubled in 1 year's time to the point where over 2 people per week seek variances from the terms of the present Zoning Ordinance. Persons who wish to start a business in Derry find the present Business area so inadequate that an average of better than 1 per week seeks a variance from the Zoning Board.

The comparison of the 1964 and 1965 figures clearly shows the trend. As Derry continues to grow, the Board expects requests for variances to grow accordingly. Proper Zoning provides answers for most of these problems in the Ordinance itself instead of leaving these answers to a Board of Appeals.

The logical answer to this problem lies in the adoption of a new Zoning Ordinance which is more closely aligned with the needs of our growing community. Our experience over the past few years has clearly demonstrated the need for a new Ordinance which would both encourage Industrial and Business development while, at the same time, affording necessary protection to home-owners. To this end, a representative of the Zoning Board has worked closely with the Planning Board and its Advisory Committee in drafting a new Zoning Ordinance based on the Comprehensive Plan for Derry which has been under study for over 2 years. The Zoning Board supports the Proposed Zoning Ordinance offered by the Planning Board.

Finally, the Board wishes to commend all those conscientious citizens who attended our hearings over the past year. Their interest and cooperation have been a definite help to us as we sought fair decisions in the cases before us. The Board hopes all interested citizens, from the statistics cited above and from their own experience, will support the Proposed Zoning Ordinance as a means of developing a better community for all.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Derry, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Hood Junior High School in said district on the 3rd day of March 1966, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees. or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 2. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
- 3. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to accept, in the name of and in behalf of the school district, gifts for the use of the schools.
- 4. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and expend on behalf of the school district any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now, or hereafter, be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.
- 5. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for the purchase of land. This land is described as follows:

A certain parcel of land being part of Hood Farm so called and situated northerly of the Hood Junior High School so called and running along the north-easterly side of Hood Road; said parcel contains approximately fourteen and onehalf acres.

6. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the original appropriation for 1966-67 a sum of money in the amount of thirty-five thousand, five hundred and fifty-seven dollars and twenty cents (\$35,357.20) for a deficiency made necessary by the employment of extra teachers, preparing of temporary quarters, and providing furniture, school supplies and transportation for the great influx of new pupils over and above those planned for.

This amount of money and the reasons were approved by the school board, municipal budget committee and the New Hampshire State Department of Education.

7. To see if the school district will vote to authorize the employment of a business administrator for New Hampshire Supervisory Union No. 10 according to RSA 186, II, XXII, XXIII, XXIV as amended.

- 8. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10 designed to improve educational opportunities with particular reference to children of low-income families, and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.
- 9. To see if the school district will vote to convey the West Side School property, both land and building to the Town of Derry for future civic use.

School Board Chairman's Report

The biggest problem in American education is how to educate every child, whatever his ability, background, interests, handicaps, gifts. For most of us the opportunity for each person to grow mentally to his fullest capacity is a basic premise. This opportunity for everybody must be provided by the Derry Schools. This should include programs for the "slow"-"average" and academically talented children as well as programs for the creative children.

During this past year the Derry School Board and Administrative staff of Mr. Dolph and Mr. Stickney have constructed a budget that was based on the idea that 1) EDUCATION IS IMPORTANT and 2) a respect for the dollars that we have to earn to support education

The burgeoning school population and growing complexity of modern education frightens many into asking can we afford it, when the question should be can we afford not to have good schools.

During the past two years I feel that Derry has made great strides in its thinking, concerning school construction, however our business is still INSTRUCTION. Until we can initiate a salary structure that is competitive in relationship to towns in our immediate area which will allow us to hold present teachers, and be able to compete for the best teachers coming out of our colleges, we shall continue to be a training ground for teachers which indirectly affects student achievement. We are, and should be, concerned about school construction, but unless we put the best qualified person in front of our children all the new bricks, mortar and copper tubing are for nothing.

It's about time we took a good look at ourselves and ask - are we willing to settle for second best for our children?

Dear Mr. Perry:

The State Board of Education had before it at its regular meeting on November 12, 1965, the request of the Derry Cooperative School Board to increase its school appropriation for 1965-66 in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act, RSA 32. The State Board considered in great detail the information supplied in your letter of October 29 and took the following action:

"The Board voted to approve a certificate of emergency under the provisions of RSA 32:10-a, Municipal Budget Act, as requested by the Derry Cooperative School Board and the Derry Municipal Budget Committee, and after investigation by the department staff, in an amount of \$35,557,20, for hiring three additional teachers, pupil transportation, custodial care, equipment, and providing temporary classrooms."

Every year the State Board is presented with a number of requests of this kind, asking authority to exceed a local appropriation. The members of the State Board feel very strongly that cases of this kind should only be approved if a real emergency exists and that there is no other alternative for a community.

The State Board approved your request with the understanding that I clearly indicate to you and the members of the school board that every effort should be made during the budget process prior to the annual district meeting to prepare and present to the voters the most adequate budget possible at that time. It was recognized that in the case of Derry that the school district is in an area that is growing rapidly and that it is often impossible to prepare an adequate budget. It was only under these circumstances that the Board was willing to exercise their authority under the statute and approve the request. You can rest assured that we here in the department will be very glad to help as much as we can in matters of this kind.

Subject: Annual Report

The report of the Superintendent of Schools will not follow the same format as in previous years but instead will give information about the regulations of the State Board of Education which spell out the powers and duties of School Boards and Superintendents.

REGULATIONS OF THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Powers and Duties of School Boards

- 1. The school boards shall determine the salary and term of employment of all teachers and shall elect them upon nomination by the superintendent. If they reject any nominations they shall require the superintendent to make further nominations.
- 2. They shall employ janitors and other employees required for the proper operation of the schools, determine their salaries and terms of employment and prescribe their duties.
 - 3. They shall authorize all purchases.
- 4. They shall make suitable provision for the accommodation of pupils in approved schoolhouses and for proper transportation and shall provide that all schoolhouses and outbuildings are kept in a clean and proper condition.
- 5. They shall seasonably prepare a budget of school expenditures and before September of each year make suitable assignment of the school money to the various needs of the schools. In state aided districts accounts shall be kept as the State Board shall require and shall be open at all times to the inspection of the superintendent or any other officer of the State Board.
- 6. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business at least once in two months and shall require the attendance of the superintendent. The secretary shall keep a written record of each meeting.
- 7. They shall exercise all powers and perform all duties vested in and imposed upon the school board by law or regulations of the State Board which are not committed to the superintendent or by them expressly delegated to him.
- 8. They shall, upon recommendation of the superintendent and in accordance with the regulations of the State Board, determine the subjects of instruction for each of the several grades and the school time to be devoted to each subject.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF SUPERINTENDENTS

- 1. The superintendent of schools of each union shall be nominated by the joint board of the union and employed by the State Board of Education. He shall give his entire time to the performance of the duties prescribed by law and by the regulation of the State Board, Assistant superintendents shall be employed in the same manner and shall devote their entire time to the performance of the duties delegated to them.
- 2. He shall enforce or cause to be enforced the rules of the school board, the regulations of the State Board and all laws relating to the school attendance and employment of children and illiterates. He shall report to the proper officers violations of the laws of the state or

of the regulations of the State Board relating to the administration of the public or private schools or affecting the welfare of children.

3. He shall direct and supervise the work of all teachers and janitors and shall have all powers necessary to make such direction effective.

4. He shall nominate all teachers in accordance with the law and the regulations of the State Board, subject to such rules governing salary. term of employment, etc., as the school board shall determine.

5. He shall select and purchase textbooks and all other scholastic apparatus and supplies in accordance with the regulations of the school board and the State Board and see that the same are suitably distributed to the schools, accurately accounted for and economically used.

6. He shall keep such records and make such reports of his doings, the condition of the schools and the financial standing of the districts as shall be required by the school board or the regulations of the State Board.

7. He shall remove any teacher or other employee of the district found by him to be immoral or incompetent, or who shall not conform to the regulations legally prescribed by the State Board of Education, or by the school board.

8. He shall provide for temporary vacancies in the teaching force and shall have authority to secure fuel or other supplies immediately needed for the operation of the schools, if the school board shall fail to provide them.

9. He shall admit in accordance with the laws of the state and the regulations of the State Board pupils to school attendance. He shall assign them to such classes and grades as he finds their preparation warrants, shall advance them in accordance with their capacity and attainments and shall recommend to the school board their graduation when they have completed the program adopted for the school.

JOB ANALYSIS

A job analysis sheet for the Superintendent of Schools and the Assistant Superintendent of Schools has been worked out and presented to the Supervisory Union School Board. This job analysis attempts to define the duties of each school administrator and is printed here for public knowledge.

The Superintendent is responsible to see that all policies of the school districts are carried out, that funds are spent as budgeted and that he exerts the leadership necessary so that the educational system will meet high standards and the needs of all the pupils.

All principals and other personnel are answerable to him. It is his responsibility to see that the schools are administered satisfactorily. His position is primarily a decision-making one. The principals, office personnel as well as various other personnel come to him for answers that are not usually spelled out and he must assume the responsibility for the decision.

Trouble-shooting is another of his concerns. If someone needs to be corrected, reprimanded, warned or even dismissed, he must make the decision and take action.

He attends all Board meetings. He decides mainly what should go

on the Agenda. He helps gather information necessary to discuss agenda items and probably one of the jobs that takes much of his time is the follow-up of the business conducted at the various board meetings. Much time is consumed in following-up telephone requests from board members and others.

A major responsibility is the recruitment of teachers and principals. This is almost a six-month job. This year approximately forty-two teachers and two principals were hired and there were several candidates interviewed for each position.

Probably the most important responsibility is the preparation and development of the budgets and at budget time there is time for little else.

The superintendent gathers various statistics and makes projections on future enrollments. He is involved with school construction and planning, and attends meetings with building committees and architects.

He is the liaison between the State Department and the school districts and is responsible to see that school laws are upheld.

In the area of public relations, he has many responsibilities dealing with the press, Parent Teacher Associations, town officials, budget committees, etc., and is the official representative of the school districts and Union on many occasions.

He supervises and helps set up all bids. He is involved with transportation and cafeteria problems. He works in the area of supervision of operation and maintenance of the school plants and summer maintenance programs, as well as contacts with custodians and tradespeople as they work in the area of repair and maintenance. He meets with salesmen in certain areas.

He attends school district meetings, and although not an active participant, is ready with various information that he has compiled.

He should attend Superintendents' Conventions or Conferences, to learn what is new in education as it relates to the curriculum and teaching techniques and also observes what is new in the maintenance field. He should at least peruse if not study state and local legislation, activities and programs that now or will in the future affect the educational program.

By law the position is described as having the following duties and responsibilities:

He shall enforce or cause to be enforced the rules of the school board, the regulations of the State Board and all laws relating to the school attendance and employment of children and illiterates. He shall report to the proper officers violations of the laws of the State or of the regulations of the State Board relating to the administration of the public or private schools or affecting the welfare of children.

He shall direct and supervise the work of all Principals, Teachers and Janitors and shall have all powers necessary to make such direction effective.

He shall recommend teachers in accordance with the law and regulations of the State Board. Local Board.

He shall select and purchase textbooks and all other scholastic apparatus and supplies in accordance with the regulations of the School

Board and the State Board and see that the same are suitably distributed to the schools, accurately accounted for and economically used.

He shall keep such records and make such reports of his doings, the conditions of the schools and the financial standing of the districts as shall be required by the school board or the regulations of the State Board.

He shall recommend removal of any teacher or other employee of the district found by him to be immoral or incompetent or who shall not conform to the regulations legally prescribed by the State Board of Education, or by the school board.

He shall provide for temporary vacancies in the teaching force and shall have authority to secure fuel or other supplies immediately needed for the operation of the schools, if the school board shall fail to provide them.

He shall admit in accordance with the laws of the State and the regulations of the State Board pupils to school attendance. He shall help assign them to such classes and grades as he finds their preparation warrants, shall advance them in accordance with their capacity and attainments and shall help to recommend to the school board their graduation when they have completed the program adopted for the school.

He shall prepare an annual report for the school district,

He shall supervise the program for alterations and repairs to the school plant.

He shall direct the instruction, supervision and discipline for all pupils.

JOB ANALYSIS - ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

Responsible for improving and up-dating the curriculum and Teacher supervision. Emphasis is on Junior High, liaison with all High schools serving our pupils, responsible for custodians, custodial time schedules, custodial supplies, in-service training of custodians, meeting with salesmen.

BREAKDOWN OF RESPONSIBILITIES:

Supervision: Supervision of teachers (Emphasis on Junior High)

Curriculum - Available to assist teachers with problems concerning grouping, selection of texts, continuity of program, etc.

Employment of Teachers - Assist the Superintendent in interviewing and evaluating each candidate for positions in Union 10. In absence of Superintendent, carry out interviews and procedure to select teachers.

Book Requisitions - Assist Superintendent and Principals with budget requests.

Principals' Meetings - Responsible for agenda, conducting of meeting, follow-up arrangements, etc.

Responsible for group meetings to discuss items of interest, problems and programs with teacher-principal groups, particularly at Junior High level; also will give assistance to group meetings at other teaching levels.

Attend School Board meetings.

Assist in Budget preparations.

Prepare specifications, bids, oversee requisitions and purchase all custodial and operational supplies.

Prepare budget recommendations for this department.

Act as liaison between custodial staff and superintendent or board.

Receive and take care of all calls relating to Operation of all Plants.

Be responsible for the operation of all plants in areas of:

- a. heating
- b. lighting
- c, rubbish and snow removal

Assist the Superintendent in the area of transportation:

- a. preparation specifications and/or bids
- b. driver supervision
- c. schedules and problems
- d. budgets

Serve as necessary in an advisory capacity in building programs.

- a. specifications
- b. estimates
- c. plans and inspections

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

It is my pleasure to present my third annual report to the citizens of Derry for the year ending June 30, 1965.

The teachers of Derry made an initial start on evaluation of our school system. The faculty made their first effort with a representative committee to arrive at a philosophy of education for the Derry Schools. This committee was made up of teachers, all schools represented, principals, two School Board Members and two Parents. The philosophy was written and objectives were being worked on as school closed in June.

I wish to again comment on the areas of our system that need attention and while I know that I am being repetitious it is well to understand that progress is being made in nearly all areas as follows:

1. LIBRARY

There is a need now being felt and recognized in this area. This need is nationwide and happily Derry is quite well along in its planning.

2. PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Our slowness in this department has been in the lack of ability to hire qualified instructors. The growth of the town has required a priority and thus far the need has been in classroom teachers.

3. GUIDANCE

Again priority. This area however needs attention very soon. There are many services being neglected, because of time and work load, that could make for better teaching if accomplished.

4. LANGUAGES

A great deal has been done in this area. Plans call for increasing the number of students in French and this will continue until very shortly the second Language teacher will be needed.

5. The Shop offerings have been gradually expanding to include

metal work and electricity and again, numbers increasing as they are, we are soon to be faced with additional staff needs.

 The physical area involved in our Home Economics offerings is inadequate presently and will continue to be progressively more cramped as the number of students increases.

During the latter part of the school year Pinkerton Academy made available to Hood School a guidance counselor for a two week period. Records were reviewed, pupils interviewed and placed in the proper groups for grade 9 at Pinkerton. This was very helpful to us and thanks are due Pinkerton Academy.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the people of Derry, the School Board, Mr. Dolph and members of the faculty and staff for making this another successful and progressive year.

REPORT OF THE GRINNELL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

To the Derry School Board and the Superintendent of Schools:

The 1964-65 school year began with an enrollment of 461 pupils as compared with the enrollment of 409 pupils at the same time last year. Our present June enrollment is 484. In discussing enrollment it must be remembered that this includes the Special Class at the Episcopal Church on Hood Road; and Grades 1 and 4 that are on the stage and floor of the Grinnell School Auditorium. It is most fortunate that this present overcrowded condition will exist for only one more year as the new school building will be ready for occupancy in the Fall of 1966.

I consider myself most fortunate in having such a willing and able staff. Included in this staff are seven new teachers. I wish to take this opportunity to wish well to the Principal of the Floyd School, Mrs. Martha Moore, who is retiring after many years of dedicated service to the children of Derry, and to Mr. Angelo Panteli, Assistant Principal at this school, who will be replacing Mrs. Moore.

I wish to thank the Grinnell P.T.A. for their fine cooperation and assistance in procuring visual aids for our children. The School and Book Fair held in May was most successful and well attended.

The Educational T.V. Programs are viewed on Channel 11 and continue to be a part of our curriculum with study guides provided. Programs viewed are as follows:

Grade 3 Literature, Phonics and Music
Grade 3 Literature, Music and Science
Grade 4 Social Studies (New Hampshire)

Grade 5 Natural Sciences, Art and New England Field Trips

It should be noted that the school ceilings have been insulated; that the classrooms on the first floor were freshly painted this past summer and that the new boiler was installed during January.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Henry Barrieau,

owner of Kans' Bus Lines, and his drivers, for their fine assistance.

Finally, I would like to express my sincere thanks to Mr. Robert Dolph, Superintendent of Schools; Mr. Ira Stickney, Assistant Superintendent; the Administration Staff; the Teaching Staff; Mrs. Claire Eddy, School Nurse; Mrs. Helen Higgins, Reading Consultant; Mr. Donald Day, Principal of Hood School; Mrs. Helen Riddervold, School Secretary; the School Custodians; and the Cafeteria Staff, for their most helpful cooperation.

REPORT OF THE FLOYD SCHOOL

To the School Board and the Superintendent of Schools:

The Floyd School opened on September 9, 1964 for its fiftieth year of service to the District with an enrollment of 222 pupils, and one change in the staff. Mrs. Carol Jones replaced Miss Eleanor Charette, who returned to the Grinnell School.

Mrs, Anna Stevens, School Board Member, Mrs. Florence Dexter and Mrs. Claridelle Anderson, Room Mothers assisted with the registration and assignment of pupils.

In line with the School Board's long range plan of repairs the southeast room on the second floor had been redone during the summer. With painted surfaces and tile floor in shades of green, the room is very attractive. A new ceiling and lights had also been installed in the Library making it a much quieter and lighter room in which to have classes. The next step in this room is heating. Floors throughout the building had also been cleaned and refinished.

During September fourteen 1st graders were transferred to a new first grade at the Grinnell School, relieving crowded conditions in the First Grades. This unfortunate experience might have been avoided if the children had been registered earlier.

Continuing the program of updating basic texts, revised editions of Reading, Health and Modern Math texts in the fourth grades.

During the first semester Miss Clancy, Miss Doughty, Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Moore completed a course in Modern Math given by Miss Stone at the University. During the second semester Miss Clancy and Miss Doughty attended classes at the University and Rivier College respectively.

In December, due to changes in the staff at Grinnell School, Mr. Beauregarde was transferred to that school and his position filled by Mr. Stark. A reminder of Mr. Beauregarde's stay is the lawn in front of the school. With the trees planted by Mr. Black the exterior of the school is more attractive. Mr. Stark, our new custodian, has done a fine job of caring for the building and its occupants.

Fire Chief Walter Boyce has made several inspections of the building during the year. His cooperation on two occasions was appropriated.

In the Spring new swings were installed on the lower playground.

They have several new safety features and there should be no accidents as a result of their use.

With the aid of the Floyd School PTA a library was started during the year. The Association voted \$250 to be spent for books. Some of the books are in use, others will be delivered in the Fall of 1965. These books have been selected to fit the curriculum in the first three grades, and the writer hopes that the project will be continued for the fourth grades. Learning to read is not enough, learning to WANT to read is equally important. What better incentive can one have for building a good school library?

Under the supervision of Mrs. Claire Eddy, Nurse-Teacher, the annual Dental Clinic sponsored by the PTA was held in October. During the year Hearing and Vision examinations were given all pupils, Physical Examinations were given in the first grades, and TB tests were given in the first and third grades.

Mr. Tgettis. Music Supervisor, held classes in the TV room regularly and assisted in planning programs for Christmas and Memorial Day, as well as individual programs.

Mrs. Higgins, Reading Consultant has conducted reading classes for pupils needing special help in the Library, and prepared an outline for Phonic lessons at each grade level. She has observed Reading Groups in each classroom and held conferences with the teachers.

As in the past the School has participated in the Educational TV programs.

Open Houses were held in the Fall and Spring. We wish that more parents would avail themselves of the opportunity to visit their child's classroom and meet his teacher.

Field trips were made to the following places: University of New Hampshire Experimental Farm; Benson's Wild Animal Farm; Turner's Dairy and Farm and the Capitol at Concord.

A serious problem which has plagued the school this year is the presence of dogs on the playground. More stringent rules are needed regarding the ownership of dogs.

The writer wishes to extend to the Administrative Staff, the School Board, School Department Personnel, the Floyd School Staff, the PTA and Friends of Floyd School, her sincere appreciation for their cooperation and assistance during the year.

And to all the people who have made forty-one years of teaching go by so fast, sincere good wishes for their future happiness and success.

REPORT OF HOOD MEMORIAL SCHOOL

To the Derry School Board and Superintendent of Schools:

September, 1964 saw Hood School open its door to the seventh, eighth, four six grades and a third grade. This brought the number of pupils to a little over four hundred.

Following are curricula changes which took place:

Instruction in working with sheet metal was added to the Industrial Arts program.

A part-time guidance program was initiated but could be carried on only in a limited way because of the non-availability of space and time. Mr. Currier of the Pinkerton Guidance Department spent two weeks with us helping individual students with course choices for Pinkerton.

At mid-year we introduced Modern Mathematics to the seventh and eighth grade students.

A new academic policy was dopted with the intent of improving academic standards at Hood School which would also be of greater value to the students.

Members of the faculty began work on a program of curriculum evaluation. Outlines were formulated for each unit of work to be presented with time limits for each unit and audio-visual materials to be used with each unit.

The area over the gymnasium and second floor classrooms was insulated in May.

Six teachers were new to Hood School this year. Mrs. Eileen Thompson, Mrs. Beverly Ells and Mr. Robert Blakslee were new in the English Department. Miss Anne Flammia was added to the Mathematics Department. Miss Carol Medico was hired for the Science Department and Miss Irene Cronin filled a vacancy in one of the sixth grades.

June 21st was the graduation night for 115 eighth grade students and school closed for another year.

At this time I would like to express a sincere thank you to the superintendent's office, members of the faculty, custodians, cafeteria help, my secretary, the school nurse, the School Board, parents and friends of Hood Memorial School for their interest and help in making my first year in Derry a very pleasant one.

REPORT OF THE READING PROGRAM

No area of the curriculum is more important to teachers and parents, no more widely discussed, than reading. Herein is the information about the importance of the Derry reading program plus the instructional program in our schools.

During the summer of 1964 the Grinnell School opened its doors to the first Reading Clinic to be held in the town of Derry. There were forty-five children enrolled for this additional summer work. Three teachers were employed in order that boys and girls could receive much individual attention. Since this program is self-supporting, different reading materials and a variety of techniques were implemented to make these classes a rich and valuable experience for our children.

In-service training for teachers in phonics was provided through a workshop given by Mrs. Elinor Martin, a consultant from the Phono-Visual School in Washington, D.C. This particular system of phonics is one with a background of value and research. Teachers are supplementing the basal reading system with this method of teaching sounds in the classroom.

The largest coordinated study in the history of education is now under way in first-grade reading instruction. Only through continual work and investigation of this kind, with participation by us, the teaching staff at Derry, will we show results in the excellence of teaching of reading. Pupil interest and ability, values, type and quality of equipment, current materials, guided by the all important person, the classroom teacher, will give to our girls and boys "excellence in reading."

In the fall of 1964, two pilot programs in reading were initiated; one in the first grade, one in the second grade. Both grades received additional services through the consultant of the American Book Company. Progress of both grade levels participating in these programs is submitted through results of the Gates Primary Reading Tests. Grade 1-28 children tested - all were above grade level according to the national norm. Grade II - 28 children tested - 25 above the national norm.

A developmental reading program was initiated at the Junior High School. The course at this level is to continue the reading skills and to strengthen the student's program - a three dimensional program:

1. one with good literary quality

2. a developed and maintained program of reading skills, including:

a. mechanics of word recognition

b. advanced comprehension and interpretation

c. a complete how-to-study program

In addition to the basal reading system, Scott-Foresman, and The American Book series that was initiated as a pilot study, the Literature Series of Charles B. Merrill Company is being used to further enrich the reading program in the primary grades.

In November 1964, Miss Goldie Wilson, consultant of the Charles B. Merrill Company, presided at a workshop on The Teaching of Literature. At this particular workshop, members of the State Department of Concord, N.H., Mr. John Economopoulus, Director of Elementary Education, and Dr. Alice Baumgarner, Director of Art and Music, added to the

in-service training by participating in their special areas.

Later in the year it was decided with the administrators, Mr. Dolph and Mr. Stickney, a group of parents, the principals and teaching staff, that a study of curriculum was necessary to meet the needs for better education in the schools of Derry. The Language Arts curriculum which includes Reading, was one of the first to be evaluated. After evaluation, research and study, a guide for this area will be presented for the Board's approval.

Remedial work was continued with small groups of children. These children met with the Reading Consultant for at least three periods each week. A program is effective, only when there is enough time for all children who need this instruction. With the school population increasing at such a fast pace it is hoped that another reading specialist can be added to the staff to ensure this part of the reading program.

Periodic in-service conferences and meetings were held at each grade level throughout the year. Criteria for first, second and third grade reading progress has been an outcome of intensive study by the teachers of these levels. Intermediate grades, four, five and six, will intensify their study. Both intermediate and primary grade teachers realize the need of extended library facilities. A school library is necessary!

During the month of May 1965, reading tests were given at all grade levels. Once again results of these tests were studied. After the completion and summarization of this battery of tests, evaluation and recommendations were presented to the administration and school board.

Through the efforts of Mr. Dolph, the Superintendent of Schools, a federal grant was received in May which provided for a Child-Development Center in the summer of 1965. The proposal for this program indicated a readiness program for the disadvantaged child, one who had a need for kindergarten.

Again it is my pleasure to be associated with the administration, Mr. Robert Dolph, Mr. Ira Stickney; the principals, Mrs. Martha Moore, Mrs. Alice Follansbee, Mr. Anastas S. Christo, and Mr. Donald Day; and the teaching staff.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE-TEACHER

The total pupil enrollment of all schools in Derry receiving health services this year was 1467.

Two new programs were initiated in the public schools. In January 1965, our first-grade pupils were given a physical examination by Dr. W. D. Wilder, M.D. One-hundred and fifty took advantage of this service. 10 refused. Seventeen referrals were made after the exams for further re-examination. During the month of February a dental health program, sponsored by Crest, was held in each classroom, Grades 1 through 5. Children in Grade 3 received a toothbrush and paste. Colorful posters were displayed in all rooms, and supplementary reading material was fur-

nished by the company. We do hope to have this program again next year.

Our Dental Clinics, sponsored by the P.T.A.'s were held again. Dr. R. Banister of Derry and Dr. A. Tannebaum of Meredith, N. H. were the participating dentists. Ninety children were examined and 134 fillings were done.

Films and filmstrips from the American Medical Association, Heart Association and the National Dairy Council, were shown to our primary

and intermediate classes.

Our Pre-School registration was the largest ever held, with 163 registering.

In April, Grades 1-3-5-8 received the new T.B. Heaf Test. The chestX-Ray Clinic which was held in my office at Grinnell School, X-Rayed 111 people. This was also the largest clinic held.

Vision was tested in each grade. Hearing was tested in Grades 1-3-5-8. Twelve children were treated by the Child Guidance Clinic in Concord,

271 visits were made to the schools during the year.

204 visits and calls made to parents concerning special problems.

SUBJECT: Policies Regarding Education in Derry as it pertains to Buildings and Personnel.

I have answered the questions put to me by Mr. Bowyer of the Planning Services Group. Considerable thought and careful evaluation has determined what I firmly believe to be the policy that the School Board should consider as their stand on education in Derry.

1. GRADE STRUCTURE

- A. Kindergarten (future) through Grade Six
- B. Junior High, Grades Seven and Eight
- C. High School, Grades Nine through Twelve.

2. SIZE OF SCHOOL DISTRICT AREAS

The large land area and the philosophy and policy of the administration tend to favor several large districts with a combination of busing and walking.

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

COMPARATIVE BALANCE SHEETS - June 30, 1964 - June 30, 1965: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1964 and June 30, 1965, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$21,146.30 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965.

ANALYSIS OF CHANGE IN FINANCIAL CONDITION: (EXHIBIT B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1965, is indicated in Exhibit F. STATEMEN'T OF SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM ACCOUNT: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the School Lunch Program Account for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit G.

STATEMENT OF SCHOOL TAX ACCOUNT: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Derry is presented in Exhibit H. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1965, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1964-65 School Tax, plus a prepayment on account of the 1965-66 Tax of \$12,000.00. This prepayment represented a deficiency appropriation for 1964-65 of like amount which was made at the annual meeting of the District in March 1965.

STATEMENT OF LONG TERM DEBT: (Exhibit 1)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1965, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

GENERAL COMMENTS

CURRENT SURPLUS:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$3,646.30, from \$8,064.04 to \$11,710.34, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965, as shown herewith:

OVERDRAFT OF APPROPRIATIONS AND APPLICATION OF MUNICIPAL BUDGET LAW:

It is noted that there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$20,694.84. In other words - total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount, as indicated herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (R,S.A., Chapter 32, Section 10) application was made to the State Board for authority to exceed budgetary appropriations. A certificate of emergency was issued by the State Board of Education on December 2, 1964, which granted authority to the School Board to make expenditures of \$9,932.00 in excess of budgetary appropriations. This was supplemented by a deficiency appropriation of \$12,000.00, which was voted at the annual District meeting in March 1965.

CONCLUSION:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) of this report shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.


