

### GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION PROCEEDINGS

### PUBLIC HEARING GRAFTON COUNTY BUDGET

February 17, 1964

A public hearing on the Grafton County Budget was held at the County Court House, Woodsville, at 2:00 p. m., February 17, 1964. The hearing was called to order by Chairman Edwin P. Chamberlin, who turned the meeting over to County Commissioner Kenneth Bell who read the budget items and answered questions pertaining to them.

Sherriff Ash requested an increase in the budget for office help, the increase to be \$800.00.

Sam Samaha spoke on the purchase of a reproducing machine for use of County offices, explained need for it, old one to be turned in toward purchase. He also spoke on the matter of hospitalization insurance for County employees, and requested that a committee be appointed to look into this matter, particularly having the County pay half the cost of this insurance. This would, in effect, amount to a pay increase for County employees. He also spoke on the deplorable condition of the seats at the Plymouth Court House, and a need for a fan to draw hot air out of Court Room at Woodsville.

Fletcher Low of Hanover questioned expenditures on amount appropriated for Court Houses — with \$896.74 being spent and \$2,500.00 being appropriated.

Ernest Coutermarsh of Lebanon suggested that a committee be appointed to look into insurance plan

for County employees and report back to delegation. Commissioners appointed Johnson of Hanover, Whipple of Lebanon and Coutermarsh of Lebanon.

Caroline Grey of Canaan questioned whether or not the County budget was a line item budget. It is permissible to transfer funds from one category to another.

Inquiry was made regarding the hospital addition to County Home. No new developments on this. Public Hearing called for November was cancelled due to death of President Kennedy.

Meeting adjourned at 3:10 p. m.

Present were County Commissioners, Bell of Plymouth, Clement of Landaff and Shores of Lebanon, also Chairman Edwin Chamberlin, Clerk Mary Demers of Lebanon, Low of Hanover, Plumer of Bristol, McGee of Lincoln, Adams, Beard, Whipple, Coutermarsh of Lebanon, Morse of Enfield, Gage of Grafton, Beck of Wentworth, DeWolf of Alexandria, Bowles of Easton, Frazer of Monroe, Goodfellow of Dorchester, Berringer of Woodstock, Karsten of Holderness, Larty of Woodsville (Haverhill), Aldrich of Sugar Hill, Grey of Canaan, Hayward of Hanover, Martin of Littleton, Kinghorn of Piermont, Park of Lyme.

#### March 2, 1964

The County delegation meeting to act upon the annual budget was held at the County Home in Haverhill on Monday, March 2, 1964. The meeting was preceded by a wonderful dinner attended by many of the representatives and delegates. An inspection tour of the County Buildings was enjoyed by many.

The delegation meeting was called to order at 2:00 p. m. by Chairman Edwin P. Chamberlin who announced that the meeting was for the purpose of adopting the budget. Many questions were asked — Johnson of Franconia inquired about Soldiers Aid in budget; Commissioner Bell replied that the statutes state this must be kept separate; otherwise it is same as "Poor off farm". Stevenson of Bethlehem questioned "estimated budget".

Low of Hanover offered amendment to budget — Low moved that the estimated revenue for County Farm for 1964 be changed to \$145,000.00 and that the estimated expense be reduced to \$232,000.00 No second. Motion withdrawn.

Various questions were asked of the three Commissioners and Supt. Little by McMeekin, Stevenson, Cushman, Bradley, Brummer, Johnson, Martin, Low and Morse.

Report from Committee — Whipple, Coutermarsh of Lebanon and Johnson of Hanover — appointed to investigate Health Insurance for County Employees. The following motion was offered by Johnson of Hanover:

"That the County participate in the payment of the cost of Health Insurance for Eligible County Employees to the extent of up to eight dollars (\$8.00) per month per employee. "That an Eligible Employee shall mean every employee of Grafton County for whom the County paid Social Security taxes upon earnings of Eighteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) or more in the previous calendar year, except, that no former full-time County Employee, now partially retired from County Service, with at least fifteen years of continuous service, shall be excluded from participation in this plan. That the Deputy Register of Probate, a County Employee paid by the State, be expressly permitted to participate.

"That the selection of a particular Health Insurance Plan be left to the decision of a majority of the Eligible Employees to be decided at a meeting of said employees to be called by Unwar J. Samaha, Esq., Clerk of the Superior Court, upon due notice to all of said employees.

"That interested insurance companies be invited to submit plans and prices for said Health Insurance, and make such presentation as they desire to the employees, by a notice published three successive days in the Manchester Union Leader, the last publication to be at least twenty days prior to the meeting of the Eligible Employees called for the adoption of a Health Insurance Plan.

"That this Health Insurance program become effective July 1, 1964.

"That the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$3,500.00) be appropriated for the current calendar year to pay for the participation of the County in said plan."

This motion was seconded by Coutermarsh of Lebanon and passed by unanimous vote of delegation. (\$3,500.00 added to budget)

Commissioner Bell spoke on increase for Clerk of Court.

It was moved by Coutermarsh of Lebanon, seconded by Grey of Canaan that the sum of \$1,000.00 be added to estimated expense of Clerk of Court, thus making the amount \$17,000.00 for 1964 instead of \$16,000.00. Motion carried unanimously. (\$1,000.00 added to budget)

It was moved by Coutermarsh of Lebanon, seconded by Karsten of Holderness, that the estimated expenses for Sheriff and Deputies be increased to \$25,500.00 for 1964. Vote was in affirmative. (\$500.00 added to budget)

Discussion regarding addition to County Home. Lester K. Billings, Director Hospital Services, Dept. of Health and Welfare spoke on this and answered questions regarding availability of Federal Funds. Speaking on subject were Low, McMeekin, Johnson of Hanover, Grey, Brummer.

It was moved by Johnson of Hanover that we appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for legal fees in connection with the application for government funds in connection with the construction of a nursing hospital or home and that Mr. Batchelder be hired as County Attorney to assist the commissioners and executive committee in taking steps to bring this matter to a vote before the full delegation as soon as possible. Seconded by Courtermarsh of Lebanon. Unanimously passed. (\$1,000.00 added to budget)

It was moved by Brummer of Lisbon seconded by Coutermarsh of Lebanon that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$410,660.89 for the Grafton County Budget. Vote in affirmative.

Bradley of Thornton, Aldrich of Sugar Hill, Grummer of Lisbon, Smith of Plymouth, Berringer of Woodstock, Hayward of Hanover, Martin of Littleton, Budklin of Bridgewater, Myers of Landaff, Johnson of Hanover, Grey of Canaan, Park of Lyme, Coutermarsh of Lebanon and County Commissioners Bell of Plymouth, Clement of Landaff and Shores of Lebanon.

Present were Larty of Haverhill, Low of Hanover, Nettleton of Groton, Vice Chairman Gladys Whipple of Lebanon, Demers of Lebanon (Clerk), Bowdoin Plumer of Bristol and County Commissioners

Kenneth Bell of Plymouth, George Clement of Landaff and Bert Shores of Lebanon.

Matter of County Budget for January 1, 1964 to March 31, 1964 was brought up for discussion.

Clerk Unwar J. Samaha reported on progress of securing hospitalization insurance for County employees; 34 insurance companies contacted; advertised in paper; meetings set up with insurance representatives and county employees.

It was moved by Low of Hanover, seconded by Whipple of Lebanon, that the expense of \$3,881.75 for architect's fee be approved by Executive Committee. Unanimous vote in affirmative.

It was moved by Larty of Haverhill, seconded by Whipple of Lebanon, that the clerk write to Attorney Batchelder regarding progress on application for funds for addition of Infirmary to County Home. Unanimous vote in affirmative.

It was moved by Larty of Haverhill, seconded by Nettleton of Groton, that meeting adjourn. Unanimous vote in affirmative. 11:45 a. m.

### GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

County Court House, Woodsville, N. H. July 27, 1964

The Executive Committee of the Grafton County Delegation met in the office of the County Commissioners at the Court House, Woodsville, on Mon-

day, July 27, 1964. Meeting was called to order by Chairman Edwin Chamberlin at 10:30 a. m. County Agent Rutherford and Director Hoyt of the Extension Service were present to speak to the committee on matters brought up before the County Council - a proposal to change the financing of the work of the County Agent, so that five of the agents would be Area Agents and would work in more than one county. This is a matter of changing the financing; it would be financed more by State funds. Director Hoyt pointed out that five of the ten counties have a second agricultural agent. They could better serve if five of these agents could serve more than one county, such as one for dairy, one for poultry, one for horticulture, etc. Director Hoyt suggested a \$200.00 increase in State support for our agents. If this proposal were approved by the Legislature, it would result in a saving to the County of about \$3,500.00.

Discussion followed on Grafton County Budget. On motion by Low of Hanover, seconded by Larty of Haverhill, it was the unanimous vote that the County Commissioners be authorized to borrow \$50,000 in anticipation of taxes.

On motion by Larty of Haverhill, seconded by Nettleton of Groton, Meeting adjourned at 11:35 a.m.

### GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

#### November 9, 1964

The Executive Committee of the Grafton County Delegation met in the office of the County Commissioners, Monday, November 9, 1964 with 100% attendance. Also present were the three County Commissioners — Bell of Plymouth, Clement of Landaff and Shores of Lebanon. Meeting was called to order at 10:30 a. m. by Chairman Edwin P. Chamberlain of Bath. Commissioner Bell presented the budget for the County from January 1, 1964 to October 31, 1964. As there appeared to be sufficient funds on hand to meet current expenditures, no formal action was taken at this time.

Motion by Plumer of Bristol, seconded by Low of Hanover, that the Executive Committee recommend to the incoming delegation that they investigate the cost of transporting prisoners from Municipal Court to Grafton County Jail and that they further recommend that this cost be borne by the Municipality. Motion carried.

Commissioner Bell reported that he had discussed with County Attorney Batchelder the matter of the addition to the County Home.

Commissioner Clement spoke to the executive committee in regard to having a convalescent area in the County Home, using existing facilities, plus additional renovations that would be needed.

McGee of Lincoln spoke of financing in Belknap County.

Motion by Larty of Haverhill, seconded by McGee

of Lincoln, that meeting adjourn. Motion carried. Adjourned at 11:30 a. m.

### GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

December 21, 1964

The Executive Committee of the Grafton County Delegation met in the office of the County Commissioners, Court House, Woodsville, N. H., December 21, 1964 with the following present: Chairman Edwin Chamberlin of Bath, Fletcher Low of Hanover, George McGee of Lincoln, Nettleton of Groton, Larty of Haverhill and Demers of Lebanon (Clerk), also the three County Commissioners, Bell of Plymouth, Clement of Landaff and Shores of Lebanon, Public Hearing was called, as advertised, at 10 a.m., with two members of the public present, both representing the press. The purpose of the public hearing was in regard to County budget. Hearing called to order by Chairman Chamberlin who turned it over to Commissioner Bell. He explained the balances remaining in the budget for Grafton County, what was needed for the remainder of the year, and requested authorization from the Executive Committee to use any unexpended funds on hand, also that statutes require a public hearing on above. He also explained that the Commissioners wished to borrow funds in anticipation of taxes. Public hearing closed.

Chairman Chamberlin called meeting of Executive Committee to order. Motion by McGee of Lincoln,

seconded by Larty of Haverhill that the Commissioners be authorized to borrow up to \$300,000 in three notes of \$100,000 each in anticipation of taxes for 1965. Motion passed unanimously.

Clerk of Court Unwar Samaha was called in for point of information.

Motion by Larty of Haverhill, seconded by McGee of Lincoln, that commissioners be authorized to use unexpended balance to pay current expenses. Motion passed unanimously.

McGee of Lincoln moved to adjourn, duly passed. Adjourned at 11:30 a. m.

An increase in the rate of board is anticipated for boarded children in 1965, also raises for County employees and higher expenditures for Superior Court.

The Grafton County Delegation voted to contribute toward hospitalization benefits covering county employees in the Spring of 1964.

Court expenses exceeded their appropriation due to overdraft in the sheriff's department and jury payrolls.

Repairs and improvements at the County Farm have been made as needed and a more detailed coverage will be found in the report of the Superintendent and Matron.

Horace B. Knight, a county auditor since 1932 has completed his services and we wish him well in his retirement. He has been replaced by Floyd D. Chase Jr. of Woodsville, N. H.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff of employees, the County Delegation, the various town officials and State Welfare Department for their continued cooperation.

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, the biennial examination and audit of the accounts of Grafton County has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission. #### Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Farm.

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1961—1962 and December 31, 1962—1963, are presented in Exhibits A and K, respectively. As indicated therein the financial condition of the County changed from a Net Debt of \$10,292.61 to a Surplus of \$42,640.23 in 1962. In 1963 the Surplus decreased by \$36,895.31, from \$42,640.23 to \$5,744.92.

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1962 (Exhibits C and D)

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1963 (Exhibits M and N)

In the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, a revenue surplus of \$41,490.34, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$6,350.03, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$47,840.37.

A revenue surplus of \$18,424.29 plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$171.94, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$18,596.23, in 1963.

Summary statements of the receipts and expenditures of the County, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1962 and 1963, are presented in Exhibits E and O, respectively.

#### **Accounts of Commissioners and Treasurer**

Orders issued by the Commissioners and Clerk of the Superior Court during the two fiscal years were examined and compared with corresponding entries in the Treasurer's records. Supporting invoices and payrolls were also examined and the classification of expenditures noted. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1963, is shown in Exhibit P.

#### Clerk of the Superior Court

The financial accounts and records of the Clerk of Court of Grafton County were examined. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

#### **County Farm**

The accounts and records of the Superintendent of the County Farm were examined. Receipts of the Farm were checked by source through the triplicate receipt forms. All receipts, as recorded in the cash book, were properly accounted for by the Superintendent through deposits to the credit of the County Treasurer's account in the Woodsville National Bank.

Statements of receipts and expenditures of the County Farm and Hospital for the years 1962 and 1963 are presented in Exhibits G and Q, respectively.

#### Conclusion:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, a copy of this report or summary of its findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal should be published in the next annual report of the County. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the publication of Exhibits is optional.



Equipment purchased for the institution was a mangle in our laundry and Geriatric chairs for the hospital. One major item was the repairing of the lightning rods on all buildings. The usual necessary repairs were made, including plumbing and painting. One of the employee's houses was converted from coal to oil.

Due to a hail storm our corn crop was damaged so we had to purchase another five acres of corn to carry us through the year. All other crops were average. The usual amount of freezing and canning of vegetables was done.

Many groups from several towns in the County have made tours of the farm this past year. We are always very happy to have interested people learn of our operation. Every two months a group of ladies from the Wentworth-Orford area held birthday parties for the women. An afternoon of games, singing, gifts and refreshments was enjoyed by all. Individuals have given books, magazines, and other gifts for which we are most grateful.

The Christmas season was a very busy one. Many organizations, clubs and individuals gave generously to the residents and patients so their Christmas was a most happy one. For the gifts, visits, carolers and other activities we say a most sincere thank you.

Church services for Catholics and Protestants are held as in past years. Several ministers in the area make frequent calls.

The Occupational Theraphy program is still under the leadership of Mrs. Marjorie Jamback. Varied projects are completed and either used by the residents or sold to the public.

It is indeed a pleasure to have a very willing and cooperative staff to work with us on the farm, in the institution and hospital.

In closing we wish to thank the Commissioners, Mrs. Madeline Kirk, Mrs. Doris Hobbs, Dr. C. D. Eastman, the chaplains and staff for their fine cooperation and help during the past year.

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

It is a pleasure to again report on my activities as chaplain at the Grafton County Farm. Services are held on the first and third Sunday afternoons of each month with a certain number of regular attenders and new ones coming from time to time.

Group participation is encouraged as much as possible in the hope that the service will be more meaningful to them. Some variety is introduced into the services. The choir from the Community Methodist Church in North Haverhill sang on three occasions during the year. The sacrament of Holy Communion was served in keeping with the observance of World Wide Communion Sunday.

Under my guidance, the Methodist Youth Fellowship of Woodsville and North Haverhill held a party for the residents in December. They provided entertainment, games and refreshments. It seemed that all had a good time.

I attended the Annual Christmas party. This was the high-light of the year for many I am sure.

Several counseling sessions were held with prisoners in the jail at their request. This is a difficult task but one which I feel should be expanded if possible.

I conducted one wedding in the Chapel during the year. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Little acted as witnesses.

Miss Wanda Clough continues to lead the music for the services. Her faithful service is greatly appreciated. Also appreciated is the fine spirit of cooperation received from all those connected with the County Farm in relation to the services.

Dear Sirs:

During the year 1964, I have frequented the visitation of those at the County Home and also at the House of Correction and Jail. Administering the work of my chaplaincy has been a great pleasure due to the fact of the extreme assistance that was given to me by the Superintendent and the entire staff of the same institution. Whenever I was needed or requested by anyone; I was notified without delay, thereby allowing my work to be one of great pleasure.

At the County Home, I have administered the sacrament of the Eucharist each first Friday of the month and also administered the sacrament of the sick on seven diffrent occasions during the year. The remaining of my ministry has been a weekly visit of encouragement and the spreading of the Gospel. Frequently, I am asked for advice on matters which I have tried to return with diligence and consideration of what the problems demand.

There have been numerous occasions that I have taken to call at the House of Correction and the Jail. This is a very delicate situation and has required the patience of Job. These men many times request my presence for consultation. My great concern is to

allow them to properly come to see themselves and with time hope for a kind of rehabilitation. In some instances all is simply a waste of time; yet there are individuals that seek help and desire a new way of life; actually these are few. The greatest difficulty is a lack of space for proper counseling. The use of the cells does not always create any privacy and sometime the men resent this encounter. Generally speaking, I feel that I have accomplished something with some of the men even though at times it has appeared to be very minor.

My work as a priest at the County Farm for 1964 has been most enjoyable and I wish to thank most sincerely Mr. and Mrs. Frank Little, the Turnkeyes and all others who have been so kind and helpful to me.

#### REPORT OF COUNTY PHYSICIAN

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I hereby submit my report for 1964:

The hospital unit of the Grafton County Farm has been very busy during the entire year. Our capacity is 33 beds, one of which is in a room than can be locked with bars on windows etc. This we try to use only for prisoners, acute mentally disturbed patients and emergencies. Much of the time this room is empty. In spite of this our average census is 31.8 patients.

Among our improvements is a bath lift which enables old and feeble patients, cardiacs, etc., to get in and out without exertion. We also have twelve new Geriatric chairs which are comfortable and have a tray that can be attached to help patients with their meals. It is much easier for patients to feed themselves while sitting in a chair than in bed. All of our hospital patients are unable to go to the dining room.

We still have crowded hallways which are often full of wheel chairs, mechanical lifts, oxygen tents, food carts etc. There is just not enough room for storage.

The policy in regard to surgery is the same as before—if the surgery requires general anaesthesia we transfer to Cottage Hospital and back here as soon as we think it safe and practical. All obstetrical work is done at Cottage Hospital in Woodsville. This policy is laid down by the State Board of Health.

We were inspected by the American Hospital Association in October 1964 and accepted under "Regis-

tration Requirements for Inpatient Care of Institutions Other than Hospitals." This is the goal we had hoped to attain.
