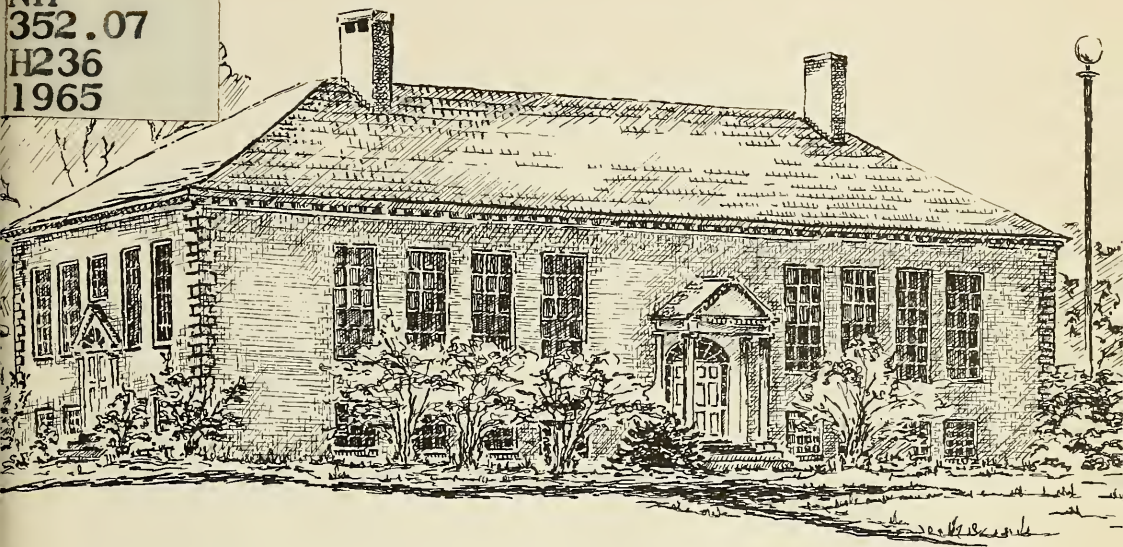

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (five hundred dollars) \$500 for the Town History Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 for the Fire Hose Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (five hundred dollars) \$500 to buy a portable fire pump for the Fire Department, or take any other action relating thereto.
6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appropriate the principal and interest in the Town Highway Equipment Fund and to borrow an additional sum not to exceed (seven thousand five hundred dollars) \$7500 for the purchase of a new dump truck for the Highway Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (eight hundred and ninety seven dollars and seventy eight cents) \$897.78 as our share of the T.R.A. program, or take any other action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (three hundred and ninety two dollars and ten cents) \$392.10 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 for White Pine Blister Control, or take any other action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (four hundred and fifty dollars) \$450.00 for Old Home Day, or take any other action relating thereto.

11. To hear the report of the Committee appointed to study the problem of what to do with the High School Building, or take any other action relating thereto.

12. To hear the report and recommendations of the special Committee appointed to study all aspects of extensions to the Hancock water system, or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one thousand dollars) \$1000.00 for the Water Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will adopt the revised regulations of the Hancock Water Department as recommended by the special Water Study Committee and as previously posted and advertised, and incorporated herein by reference, these regulations to replace those adopted at the annual Town Meeting of 1963, or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of (five hundred dollars) \$500 for the use of the Trustees of the Hancock Town Library in meeting the costs of necessary repairs and improvements to the library building, or take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (four hundred dollars) \$400.00 to purchase folding chairs and storage racks for the Town Hall, or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate money to extend the street lighting system to include a light at the town beach at Norway Pond, or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (two hundred and twenty five dollars) \$225.00 to purchase an electric adding machine for the use of the Town Officers, or take any other action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100.00 to rebind three volumes of Vital Statistic records, or take any other action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one thousand six hundred dollars) \$1600.00 to construct an underground drainage system with catch basins on Wilder Road, or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to accept for the Town and make a public thoroughfare the so-called "Tripp Road" located on the "Old Fairfield Farm" so called on the Forest Road, running in a generally northerly direction from its beginning at a point approximately opposite the Hancock Company to its terminus at a stone wall approximately 1000 feet distant, right-of-way to be forty feet wide.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in the anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 1% on property taxes if paid within 30 days after date of bill, or take any other action relating thereto.

24. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

25. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take any other action relating thereto.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE HANCOCK TOWN LIBRARY

The library trustees have tried during the past year to continue with the updating of the Library both as to the reading material and the physical plant; in this we have been aided by the friends of the library and by the town through its appropriation of last March.

During the year we became affiliated with the State-wide Library Development program, which, while not hampering in any way our administration of our own library, enables us to buy books at an additional savings through the Cooperative Book Purchasing Plan. Mrs. Valentine Gerrish was appointed to represent the Hancock Town Library on the Library Council in connection with the Development Program. Full advantage has been taken of the visits of the Bookmobile of the State Library Extension Service to supplement purchases of books from library funds.

The exhibitions of paintings by local artists have been continued throughout the year and have attracted many people. This was particularly true of Old Home Day when the library was open to the public during the entire day; while the exhibit was the principal attraction, many compliments were received concerning the improvements which have been made. During Library Week an open house was held which was well attended, with refreshments served by volunteer assistants. The weekly visits of the school children under the supervision of their teachers have been continued, and Mrs. Garland has kept on with her weekly story hour which is very much appreciated.

In June, Herbert M. Johnson submitted his resignation as trustee which was accepted with regret; however, we were very fortunate in having Robert W. Stewart appointed as his successor. Mr. Stewart has also assumed the duties of treasurer and financial agent of the Trustees.

During the year our insurance was consolidated into one package policy with the Bellows-Nichols Agency, covering fire insurance, third-party liability, etc.

In order to give Miss Frank more free time we were fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Arthur Olson and the duties of librarian are shared between them most satisfactorily. Mrs. Flindell continues as children's librarian.

Physical improvements to the library include the pointing of the so-called "middle room" to correspond with the reading room, the installation of a new electric clock to replace the worn-out original, and the refinishing of the tops of the tables in the adult reading-room with the installation of center racks for magazines, which, while making the magazines readily accessible, leave the table tops clear. The old magazine rack was given to the grammar school. It was necessary to make repairs to the roof, which proved to be more extensive than expected. The total amount expended for redecorating the middle room and repairing the roof was \$834.93, of which \$400.00 was appropriated at the last town meeting and the balance came from library funds. Since the first of the current year a new fluorescent lighting fixture has been installed in the children's reading room to match that in the adults' reading room and a beginning has been made to provide more adequate lighting in the stack room. It was discovered that a leak had developed in one of the oil-storage tanks in the cellar; since the gauge of the steel in this tank is lighter than that demanded by the code of the State Fire Marshal's office and there is no way to determine how much corrosion exists inside the tank, it was decided that in order to prevent possible future disaster a new tank should be installed at once. The cost of this will be approximately \$75.00. Because expenditures for repairs and improvements have exceeded our expectations, and because it is the desire of the trustees to use the income from the trust funds as far as possible for the usual current expenses of running the library, including book purchases, it was decided to put an article in the Town Meeting Warrant asking for the appropriation of \$500.00 for the Library.

The trustees take this opportunity to express publicly their sincere gratitude to all the friends of the library whose voluntary efforts have contributed so much toward the improvement of our library.

**REPORT ON THE MONADNOCK REGION
ASSOCIATION TO THE TOWN OF HANCOCK**

The Monadnock Region Association maintains a building of its own at the junction of Routes #202 and #101 at the Peterborough By-Pass. This combination showroom and information center is staffed by a full-time receptionist-office secretary and an executive secretary who divides his time between the office and the field.

Aside from fixed charges and overhead, the bulk of the money received is used for promotional work, and includes such items as 30,000 Regionaires, 30,000 summer folders, 25,000 fall foliage folders, and tour maps, 25,000 winter ski and sports brochures and maple syrup bulletins. Four season vacations are emphasized. Apple blossom, laurel, and fall foliage tours are publicized and posted in season.

The Association sponsors 4-H activities, high school bands, the N. H. Philharmonic Orchestra, agriculture, industry, and the hotel-tourist trade. In addition, as occasion arises the Association lends its weight for better roads, better and more picnic areas, better hunting and fishing with protection to land owners, better forestry practices and, in short, for all things that tend to make the Region more livable and attractive.

Our exhibition facilities are open and available to anyone in the Region. The local public, as well as the tourist public, are welcome at headquarters anytime.

The "Great Society" and its influences bring changes to our Town. Rampant prosperity sweeps the land with many happily riding the crest, a few left behind, bewildered. The struggle, we might as well call it war, says Fred Villaume, in Vietnam escalated during the year. "Escalate" is the word of this year.

And industry in Peterborough and other nearby towns flourishes, jobs are seeking workers. There is work for all . . . except for those who fear loss of social security if they earn too much and for some whose age or infirmities keep them near home.

In December Geminis VI and VII rendez-voused in space. A landing on the moon is nearer.

It is easy for anyone to note new houses popping up here and there around town, the new fire engine, more shine on the recent model family auto, and new faces to be seen in Town. People are busier — rushing here and there — the time for just hanging around talking in a relaxed fashion and, as Tommy Manning says, savoring the country air, seems limited.

But . . . while the tempo rises, it does so more gradually here. We're better off than most Americans.

Warren and Cynthia Kinney and others like to point with pride to the outside of the Meeting House, now gleaming white, and to anticipate the refurbishing by Harrison Kendall of the interior which is to be done right away. This year there was a dullish white (with rain) Christmas and, it so happened, a white Easter for the special service with choral singing. The Memorial Day parade attracted a record crowd. And still our favorite occasion, Old Home Day, despite all the changes, was greeted with changeless fervor.

The same could be said for Town Meeting Day and the Annual School Meeting. We voted to send the seventh and eighth grades to Peterborough which leaves only the smaller children being educated in Town. The extra small are in pre-school directed by Heather Robinson.

Before we got carried away with all the progress we are making it should be noted that a bear was seen in Town October 16th and that in nearby Temple, a wolf. This simply means, according to Harry Waterbury, that even as our population grows, our farm lands revert even faster into woodlands.

And don't forget, Charlie Hoyt reminds the writer, speaking of progress, that even Hancock shared the incredible electric power failure in Eastern United States on November 9th, even if our share was about six minutes as compared with eight and ten hours in Boston, New York and elsewhere. It makes us muse – "suppose it happened again in winter and we couldn't run our oil burners and it lasted longer."

To come back to animals, as a Town we landed in the news when triplet heifers were born on our one remaining farm owned by Mrs. John Peabody. Incidentally it is on this farm where many of our children continue to enjoy and profit by 4-H meetings.

Nancy Adams is the new correspondent of the TRANSCRIPT and will keep her eyes peeled for things we like to know about like Bessie Hennessey being honored for 20 years with the Telephone Company, or if Ruth Patton is to be watching over our beach at Norway Pond, Ray Kimball, Jr. (Florence Kimball's son) riding a winner at Suffolk Downs, and if Persis Baldwin is improving her golf score.

Progress has not reached the point that we are not concerned with our exciting and unpredictable weather. Besides being a dry and nearly snowless year with a dreary spring, it contained the driest May in 60 years, the coldest August 30th and 31st on record and the warmest December 31st.

REPORT OF 1965-1966 WATER STUDY COMMITTEE

Your committee, over the past several months, has made a broad study of the town water supply system and offers these comments and recommendations.

We strongly urge that the Water Department inaugurate and maintain a separate set of accounts and records as specified in previously established Water Department Regulations.

We have considered the possible advantages of establishing a Water Precinct for the purpose of realizing better fiscal and operating controls. It is our conclusion that such change cannot be justified at this time.

Attention should be directed to system planning to meet the problems and added cost already in view as a result of town growth and increasing demands on supply and distribution facilities. We would, however, recommend against any approaches to available engineering consultants for system studies at this time. We consider that there is a fair amount of needed basic information about the system which the commissioners can assemble with local volunteer help.

We call attention to the fact that Hancock water service charges are among the highest in New Hampshire. At the same time revenues are not adequate to develop even a modest contingency fund to cover plant depreciation. The majority of the committee believes that some part of water system costs should be met with town funds, and recommends that the town establish a program for contribution of \$1000 per year over a period of ten years to help develop such a contingency fund.

To realize a fair allocation of water system extension costs and to clarify the management position of the Commissioners, the majority of the committee further recommends adoption of new "Regulations for the Organization and Government of the Hancock Water Department" to supercede such "Regulations" as are now in force. The proposed new "Regulations" are as follows:

Regulations for the Organization and Government of the Hancock Water Department

Revision as proposed by the 1965-1966 Water Study Committee.

1—The governing body of the Hancock Water Department shall be a Board of Water Commissioners elected by the Town of Hancock.

2—The Commissioners shall choose a chairman from their number and shall appoint a treasurer, who shall receive all funds due to the department, pay all bills approved by the Commissioners, keep separate accounts and records of the transactions of the department, and make an annual report to the town.

3—The salary of the treasurer shall be determined by vote of the Commissioners, but may not exceed 1% of the gross revenue of the Department.

4—The water service rates shall be established by the Commissioners with the consent of the town.

5—Application for water service shall be made in writing to the Commissioners on a form prescribed by the Commissioners.

a—For every new service connection or tap-on to system mains there shall be a top-on charge of seventy-five (75) dollars, payable in advance of turning on the service. This fee is independent of, and not to be credited toward, payment of any other charges related to the service.

b—Where application is made by a person other than the owner of the premises to be served, such application must be signed by said owner.

6—Water main line extensions will be made only under the following Terms and Conditions:

a—All such extensions must be initiated by written petition to the Commissioners signed by the owners of not less than $\frac{3}{4}$ of the total property frontages along the route of the proposed extension. Where town, county or state owned property is included in the frontages along the route of the proposed extension, the town shall participate in the petition by appropriate action by the Board of Selectmen.

b—The total costs of extensions will be assessed against all of the properties abutting the route of the extension, pro-rated on the basis of frontage feet. Such assessments will be payable in annual installments as a tax on the properties over a period of ten (10) years. Such assessments will be an obligation on the properties until fully paid and are entirely apart from any other charges related to water services. Costs of extensions will include all principal and interest payments necessary to reimburse the town and Water Department for all expenditures required to complete the extension. Where town, county or state properties are involved, the town will assume costs related to such property frontages.

c—All petitions for water main extensions will be subject to review and approval by the Board of Water Commissioners.

d—The size, type and location of pipes to be installed for water main extensions shall be determined solely by the Board of Water Commissioners.

e—Construction of line extensions can be undertaken by the Board of Water Commissioners only after affirmative action by a duly called and warned Town Meeting.

f—To override disapproval of a petition for a water main extension or a request for a service tap-on by the Board of Water Commissioners, will require a 2/3 majority vote at a duly called and warned Town Meeting.

g—In the event that there be insufficient Water Department funds exclusive of its contingency fund for depreciation, to finance the gross cost of an approved line extension, then appropriate action, initiated by the Board of Water Commissioners, at a duly called and warned Town Meeting will be required.

h—Highways and streets in which water main extensions may be made must have been laid out, lines and grades established, rough graded and accepted by the town or acceptable to the town for public use.

7—All water rents and other fees charged by the Water Department for services and which are unpaid shall constitute a lien on the property served.

D. REPORT OF DISTRICT CLERK

HANCOCK SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Hancock, New Hampshire, March 6, 1965

On March 6, 1965 the annual School District Meeting was opened at 4 p.m. by Robert English, Moderator. The polls were declared open for voting on the first four Articles of the Warrant, namely to choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Member of the School Board for three years.

After the Moderator read the first four Articles of the Warrant, Mr. Simes Moore moved "that the polls be now opened and remain open until 8 p.m. to consider Articles 1 through 4 of the Warrant and that Articles 5 through 12 be taken up at 8 p.m." The motion carried, the Moderator declared the meeting recessed until 8 p.m., and voting began.

Mrs. Alice Brown and Mrs. Edith Decker were Ballot Clerks.

At 8 p.m. the Moderator reopened the Meeting and introduced Superintendent William Kelly and Mr. Earl Barnes. The Moderator then declared the polls closed and read Articles 5 through 12 of the Warrant and the certification. Voting was as follows:

Article 5. Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay, member of the School Board:

"I move that the salaries of the district officers for the ensuing year be as follows: Chairman of the School

Board, \$75.00; each other member, \$50.00; Treasurer, \$50.00; Clerk, \$15.00; Moderator, \$10.00; Ballot Clerks, \$1.50 per hour each; Auditors, \$1.50 per hour each."

The motion passed.

Article 6. Motion by Mr. George Hampson, Chairman of the School Board: "I move that the reports as printed be accepted and placed on file with the clerk."

The motion carried.

Article 7. Mr. William Brown and Mr. Nelson Gay were re-elected, following nomination from the floor, School District auditors. The Moderator administered the oath of office.

Mr. John Hill moved that Article 10 be taken up at this time before Articles 8 and 9. The motion carried.

Article 10. Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay of the School Board: "I move that the school board be authorized to fully implement its contractual agreement with the Peterborough School District and educate Grades 7 and 8 in the Peterborough Junior-Senior High School."

There was considerable discussion.

The subject of transportation of the students to and from Peterborough was discussed, namely – the time the children would be picked up by the bus in the morning, how students who participated in extra-curricular activities would get home from Peterborough, and how much the cost of transportation would be increased. Mr. Arthur Tremblay explained the time schedule, stating that bus service would be provided to and from Peterborough but not for students with after-school activities. He further explained that under the present system Peterborough and Hancock share the bus and that Peterborough pays part of the expense: if this Article passes, Hancock will carry all of the expense which would amount to an increase of approximately \$1,900.00.

After a question was addressed to Superintendent Kelly from the floor, Mrs. Nancy West asked, "Doesn't it need a vote to hear from Mr. Kelly?" After some discussion it was moved that "both visitors, i.e. Mr. William Kelly and Mr. Earl Barnes, may speak only if questions are addressed to them." The motion carried.

Mr. Alfred Dillon asked if parents had the choice of what high school their children could attend. Mr. Tremblay answered "Yes, as it stands now."

There were additional questions on the subject of whether or not Hancock would have a voice in the School Board Meetings in Peterborough. The Moderator invited further discussion.

It was requested from the floor that Mr. Kelly discuss the advantages of sending the 7th and 8th grade pupils to Peterborough. Mr. Kelly spoke of the disadvantages of the present system in Hancock of having two grades in one room — that the teacher could not give the students his full attention and that 40% of the time was necessarily devoted to study periods. He spoke further about the superior science equipment in Peterborough, the cost of which would be prohibitive in Hancock, and the advantages of a foreign language at the 7th grade level.

Mr. Hampson explained that the Peterborough system offered better education at very little additional cost.

Mrs. Mary Garland, member of the School Board, for the benefit of those who did not attend the special School Meeting, showed by means of charts a comparison of the amount of time spent in instruction in the Hancock and Peterborough Schools. She stressed the advantages of having a separate teacher, especially qualified in his field, to teach English, Social Studies, Mathematics and Science. She explained Peterborough's system of the 7th and 8th grades having a self-contained class each to provide special help for children who need it. Mrs. Garland added that the extra-curricular activities would include Student Council, Athletic Association and Drama Club.

Mr. Elijah West asked if the School Board has investigated the advantages of sending students to Antrim. Mrs. Garland answered, for the School Board, that Antrim is trying to meet comprehensive requirements but that they have not yet completed doing so. She further stated that the Board found that, as far as they could determine, Antrim did not compare favorably with Peterborough.

Mrs. Albert Garand read a newspaper article concerning the conditions in the Peterborough School. There was some discussion and Mr. Kelly, on request, responded that there would be plenty of room for Hancock students.

After further discussion the Moderator read Article 10 again. It was moved and seconded that the voting on this Article be by secret ballot. The motion carried.

Results of the voting: For 83 Against 57
The motion carried.

Article 8. Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay, member of the School Board: "I move that the School District raise and appropriate \$72,638.55 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District."

Mr. Arthur Tremblay explained the reason for the increase in this amount over that of the current year.

The motion carried.

Article 9. Motion by Mrs. Mary Garland, Member of the School Board: "I move that the school board be authorized to make application for and accept on behalf of the district, any or all grants forthcoming under Title III, V or VIII, or any combination thereof, of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864 or any or all grants of other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act."

The motion carried.

Article 11. Motion by Mr. George Hampson, Chairman of the School Board: "I move that the school board be authorized to create an area school district planning committee, as prescribed in R.S.A. 195-A:3 with the members appointed by the Moderator."

At the request of Mr. George Hampson, Mr. Kelly explained the area school plan.

The motion carried.

Article 12: Motion by Mr. George Hampson, Chairman of the School Board: "I move that the district accept the provisions of Chapter 197, Section 1-a, of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and elect its District Officers at the Annual Town Meeting."

Mr. Arthur Tremblay explained that there is a greater opportunity to vote on Town Meeting day, that more people come to Town Meeting than School Meeting and the voting hours are longer, thus a larger vote.

There was some discussion.

A division vote was requested.

Results: For 47 Against 54

The motion lost.

At 10:15 P.M., a recess was declared by the Moderator on a motion by Mrs. Barbara Schneider so that the ballots could be counted. At 10:45 P.M. the results were announced as follows:

There were 180 ballots cast and the following were elected:

Moderator: Robert English, 106 votes.

Clerk: Dorothee English, 166 votes.

Treasurer: Mary E. Wilder, 174 votes.

School Board Member for 3 years: Mary Garland
119 votes.

The Moderator administered the oaths of office.

At 10:55 p.m. the meeting was adjourned.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Hancock qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 5th day of March, 1966, at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon, (Polls close at 8:00 P.M., unless otherwise voted) to act on Articles 1-4, and you are further notified to meet at the same place on the same day at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act on Article 5-12 hereof:

To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10, designed to improve educational opportunities with particular reference to children of low-income families, and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said federal act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

11. To see if the district will authorize the school board to include a contingency fund item in the regular school district budget, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for this purpose.

12. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the area school district planning committee.

B. School Program

Enthusiasm seems to be the key word to the Hancock School atmosphere. We started the year with a competent friendly staff. Needless to say, Mrs. Doris Rogers of the third and fourth grade has brought experience, wisdom and graciousness to our classroom. Mrs. Gloria Kaminski substituted in a most efficient way until Mrs. Jeanne Deschenes returned to the first and second grade room in November. The Spalding phonics program and that of the "new mathematics" are now a deep-seated part of the curriculum. We were especially fortunate to have members of the staff take advantage of meeting and learning from Mrs. Spalding in person this summer in a concentrated two-week college course. They also took part in a two-day workshop in modern math prior to the fall opening of school. We were indeed lucky to be able to send a representative to the annual Reading Conference in Boston for this is a very meaningful and inspirational program. In addition to this, we are exploring the modern approach to science in an effort to standardize this curriculum throughout the Supervisory Union. Members of the Hancock School faculty are on this committee and also have taken advantage of Dr. Evans course in the Teaching of Elementary Science at MCC.

Miss Barbara Carter, the Music Supervisor and Miss Elizabeth Robertson, the Art Supervisor, by their own keen interest in their special fields have given the children new enthusiasm for music and art. This was reflected in the Christmas production of **Hansel and Gretel**. We believe that it was obvious that the excitement created by these two teachers is also a wonderful lesson in dis-

cipline. They have channeled the children's imagination and abilities into many worthwhile creations.

At odd moments throughout the school week will be heard the musical efforts of aspiring and perspiring young instrumentalists. Mr. Edgerly has a group who are learning the techniques of drumming, clarinet, and trumpet playing. Miss Carter is teaching lessons in violin.

Mr. Mayberger, a student art teacher, under Miss Robertson's capable supervision, gave us many new ideas and the children were especially fascinated by the loom which he brought to school and upon which the children were allowed to weave. There are so many things to learn and so many wonderful ways in which to learn. Not the least of these is by films and by listening to experienced speakers. We are compiling a list of available speakers (most of whom have slides and films to show) and we are very enthusiastic about this part of our future program. Our movies have been especially apropos this year and have been a very useful supplement to the standard curriculum.

Mrs. Barbara Hamilton, our school nurse, is the kind of person who gets things done quietly and quickly. We have enjoyed her friendly cooperation.

Mrs. Peter Garland continues with her weekly sessions of telling stories to the lower grade children; another contribution which enlivens the learning atmosphere.

In May our fifth and sixth grades will make their annual pilgrimage to Sargent Camp.

Project SAVE (Suitable Surroundings for the Audio-Visual Equipment) is really rolling and the wonderful response of the organizations and individuals of the town reflects the support and interest typical of Hancock. One individual, our Custodian, Mr. Bob Fish, also contributes much, especially patience, humor, understanding and all manner of help. The town librarians play an essential part in our educational efforts.

It would appear that all is sunshine and roses. Never fear, we have had our problems but according to the "records" the consumption of aspirin this year has been no higher than in former years.
