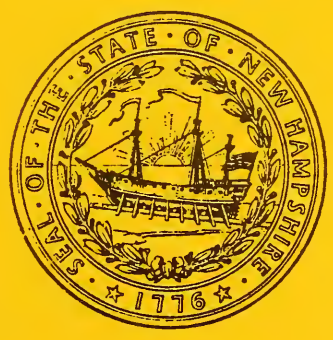

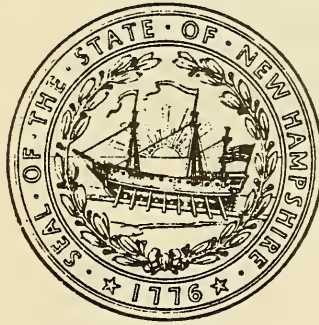

## TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hebron, in Grafton County, in the State of New Hampshire, you who are qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Hall in Hebron on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at five o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

### ARTICLE:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. The polls will be open from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., and the business meeting will commence at 7:00 p.m.

The Village Cooperative Kindergarten will prepare and serve a Roast Beef Dinner from 5:00 to 6:15 p.m. Five dollars for adults and three dollars for children.

2. To hear the reports of any committee.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize a two percent cash discount on property taxes paid within thirty days of the date of the tax bill.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for a fence, gate, and eight grills for the Town Beach. (Beach Committee recommendation - supported by the Selectmen.)
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) to purchase a photocopier to be used by all Town departments.
7. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure. These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the State may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-C which authorizes any Town to elect not to assess, levy, or collect a resident tax. If so voted, this article would be effective 1 April 1988.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate eight thousand two hundred sixty dollars (\$8,260.00) to insulate and install vinyl siding on the Town Office Building and Library.
10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the practice of plowing private driveways.
11. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to recommend what to do about the condition and use of the Town Common, and to vote to raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) towards any improvements so recommended.
12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose to create a Land Conservation Investment Program, and to raise and appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to be placed in this fund.
13. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a radar unit for seventeen hundred fifty dollars (\$1,750.00) and to raise and appropriate eight hundred seventy-five dollars (\$875.00) for this purpose with the balance of \$875.00 to be furnished by the State Department of Highway Safety. (Police Department request.)
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## REPORT OF PEMI-BAKER HOME HEALTH AGENCY

The Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency, a non-profit agency, has provided services to its member towns since 1967. We continue to strive to strengthen our current services and provide quality Home Care to those in need so that we bring a level of care to our clients that will allow them to remain in their homes in the best possible health.

In August of 1987, Elaine Vieira, RN, returned to the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency to assume the position of Director of Clinical Services. Mary Moulton, Susan Reese, Darlene Pierce and Nancy Morin provide Aide services to those in need of personal care. Dorothy Curran, Jeanne Erickson, Sharon Smith and Alice McGarry provide Skilled Nursing care to our clients. Meinsje DeNoble, Physical Therapist; Paul Lister, Speech Pathologist; and Kathryn Smith, Occupational Therapist provide therapeutic services to our clients. Janice Gallinger is the current Board President. Kathryn Dauphine is the Bookkeeper/Administrative Assistant and Margaret Crowell is the Executive Director of the Agency.

The Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency holds free Blood Pressure and Diabetic Screening clinics in Ashland, Hebron, Plymouth and Rumney. We hold free Immunization Clinics every other month at the American Legion in Plymouth.

In October the Agency offered a two day flu clinic. One hundred and forty flu shots were given.

In November the "Helping Hands" program was introduced to the community. This program provides, at no expense, free time on a regular basis for individuals who have full charge and care of a home-bound person, who cannot be left unattended. The coordinators of this program are Alice Andrews, Peggy Thompson and June Winsor.

Our 1987 visit statistics indicate a continued "team effort" to provide our ten member towns with quality home care.

## HEBRON LIBRARY REPORT

The Hebron Library was a busy place in 1987. There was an increase in the number of people using the Library as well as an increase in the number and types of materials loaned.

With the addition of the new classroom for third and fourth graders in the Hebron Village School, up to forty school children visit the Library to borrow books and magazines every Wednesday afternoon. The children are eager readers, and they have put to good use the books we have for their age level. We hope to add more books that will challenge and interest them this year.

More summer and part-time people have been using the Library. Their comments have been very favorable about our lovely building and the availability of new books. Often their own town libraries have long waiting lists for the newer books. One of our goals is to provide patrons with current and popular works. Since the State Library Bookmobile service to libraries has been eliminated, we have to rely on our own funds to purchase these books. We welcome suggestions for books to purchase and also appreciate donations of relatively new fiction and nonfiction for our collection.

Along with increased circulation of books; magazines, the Mayo Health Newsletter, and the Enterprise newspaper have been read and borrowed regularly. Several of the magazines, the newsletter, and the newspaper have been donated to us.

In 1987, a rotating collection of Large Print Books from the Talking Book Center in Concord has been available for those who cannot see to read regular print and to those who just like the larger kind of type. The Librarian also has information and the application forms for the free Talking Book program for people who are physically unable to read or who cannot hold regular books.

The Library Trustees and the Librarian are working hard to evaluate the Library with the intention of joining the New Hampshire Statewide Library Program at the associate or entry level. We have been pleased with how well we have met many of the criteria for membership, and we were particularly encouraged by the gift of a new set of Children's Encyclopedias and a new unabridged dictionary from the Hebron Women's Group. Our reference collection needs to be updated, and this is a good start.

The Hebron Library appreciates the support of the Town and the people in it, and we hope you will all come to the Library to see how we can be of service to you.

## HEBRON FIRE DEPARTMENT Annual Report for 1987

During 1987, the Hebron Fire Department responded to a total of 58 calls. This compares with 71 calls in 1986 and 86 calls in 1985. The breakdown of the 58 calls was as follows: 29 medical emergencies and 29 fire related incidents. Of the 29 medical calls, 15 were illness related, 13 trauma related, and 1 accidental poisoning. The 29 fire related incidents breakdown as follows: 3 structure fires, 5 mutual aid to other towns, 3 chimney fires, 4 powerlines down, 5 fire alarm activations, 2 oil furnace problems, 2 grass fires, 1 rekindle, 1 service call, and 3 smoke investigations. Total loss for 1987 from fire was \$150,000.

In looking at the statistics for the last several years, it is interesting to note that medical emergencies account for at least 50% of the calls. This has important implications for budget planning and equipment purchases. It has also put the pressure on to replace our rescue truck which just squeaked through state inspection because of severe body rust.

In 1987, the department had its first motor vehicle accident involving fire apparatus when a brake line failed due to old age on Engine 1, our 1959 GMC. Fortunately, the vehicle was already stopped when the line burst and it rolled downhill about 75 feet into the back of Engine 2 which was also stopped. The resulting damage came to about \$1,000. We are grateful no firefighters were standing at the rear of Engine 2.

The past year was a very busy one in relation to the purchase of a new fire engine. After two town meetings, writing specifications, choosing companies to bid, traveling to see trucks they had built for other towns (going all the way to Rhode Island in two cases), the contract was finally awarded to Golden Eagle Inc. of Gainesville, Florida. Delivery is expected to be late April or May of 1988.

Fire service administration can be likened to a circus performer juggling three glass balls. One glass ball is personnel. We have to have people. The second ball is training. People alone are of little value if they do not have the tools to do that for which they are trained. The secret then to a smooth running effective fire department is to keep all three of those glass balls in the air. The reality is, however, that all three of these factors are rarely in perfect balance. Over the years, one or more has usually been lacking. At present, with the anticipated addition of the new engine, we are in good shape as far as equipment. However, we are beginning to feel the squeeze in the area of training and personnel. In the recent past, we have lost key people through moves. We are anticipating losing another officer, who is a state certified firefighter, in the near future, because of a move. Changing employment responsibilities have also had an effect on the time other key personnel have available to give to the department. If in 1987 most of the energy in the department went into procuring a new piece



of apparatus, in 1988 the energy will have to go into personnel and training.

Finally, I am thankful for the support the department has received from the community. Without such a high level of support our task would be much more difficult. I also want to personally thank the officers and firefighters for their loyalty. There is little in the way of financial reward for a job well done. It takes a special person, to give as much as some do, simply for love of the fire and emergency medical service.

**REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN  
and  
STATE FOREST RANGER**

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again: children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden, and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest tax law may be violated, call you Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

## GRAFTON COUNTY REPORT

Budget for the current fiscal year is \$8,947,343. Town taxes to the County average 6.7% or \$2.21 per \$1,000, of the property owner's tax bill. The major portion of county expenses goes to the operation of the Nursing Home (39.69%) and to human services programs for the edlerly, disabled, nursing care and children (26.86%).

REGISTRY OF DEEDS had gross income of \$3,630,159 in 1987. The total number of documents processed in 1987 was 29,983. \$3,184,982 was received in transfer tax, of which 96% or \$3,057,584 went to the State of NH and 4% or \$127,398 was retained as county income. Other receipts include recording and copy fees in the amount of \$445,177. Total income to the County was \$572,575 compared to a total of \$3,057,584 paid to the State, although the County is liable for 100% of all operating costs.

HUMAN SERVICES: Old Age & Disabled grant programs remain fairly constant with the elderly program averaging 100 cases at \$4,800 per month and the disabled averaging 225 cases at \$21,000 per month.

Intermediate Nursing Care caseload increased with SB-1 where the County became responsible for all INC cases and eliminated town liability. INC cases now average 225 at \$110,000 per month, a rapidly increasing cost to the counties with savings to the towns.

Children and Youth Services also became a county liability under Senate Bill 1, with counties reimbursing the State 25% for all child service costs. It is impossible to give accurate figures for child expenses, as they are rapidly increasing monthly. Current accounts reflect 130 to 150 cases costing from \$64,000 to \$75,000 per month. (At the beginning of this fiscal year, we had approximately 120 cases at about \$50,000 per month.) The County has 25% funding liability of child placement costs and we are taking an active interest in the needs of children in Grafton County.

Social Service agencies receive \$247,217 or \$4.03 per capita, to provide much needed services for home health, mental health, developmentally disabled, senior citizens transportation and nutrition and many other valuable programs.

CORRECTIONAL FACILITY is increasingly overpopulated, now averaging 58 inmates per day and frequently housing 60+. The current cost of operation is \$28.63 per inmate day. We have contracted with an architect to present design and cost for a 34 bed addition. Schematic designs and price estimates are expected by mid-January to go out for bid by late January with bid results due in by the end of February. Funding issues should go to the delegation and public in March with anticipated ground breaking in April.

GRAFTON COUNTY NURSING HOME for intermediate nursing care is licensed for 136 beds and is about 80% reimbursable. FY 87 cost per patient day was \$68.78 with \$58.87 reimbursed by Medicaid.

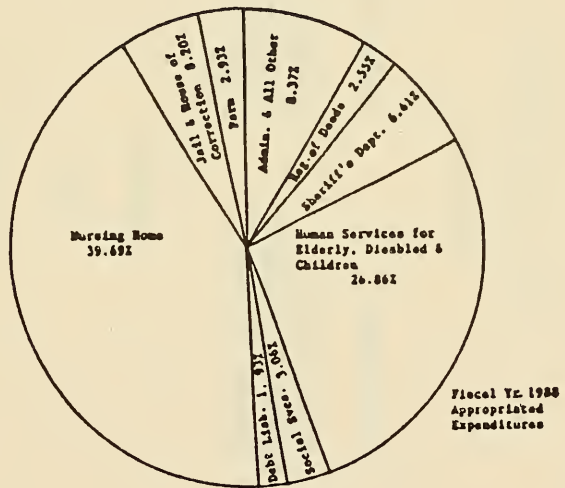
GRAFTON COUNTY FARM continues to be self-supporting and provides work for inmates as well as offering access for experimental agricultural projects. This is primarily a dairy farm with an average herd of 170, but also grows produce for the nursing home.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS meet weekly on Wednesdays. We encourage public attendance and welcome facility tours.

We were deeply saddened by the deaths of Commissioner Arthur E. Snell, Dist. #2, and Commissioner Leonard Anderson, Dist. #3, early this year.
