

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lee on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two hundred dollars (\$200) for fire protection.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand dollars (\$1000) for Old Age Assistance and Relief.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five dollars (25) for the purchase of a suitable Roll of Honor of citizens of Lee now serving in the Armed Forces of the United States.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Hartford property, so called, at public or private sale if in their opinion it is advisable, and to execute good and sufficient deed thereof.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

As the tempo of America's war effort mounts, demands upon its citizens for service become more numerous and exacting. To some comes the call to arms; others to public service and still others to defense industries and organizations. No one can possibly escape if he would. All must bear a proportionate share of the burden and the sacrifice. Strong first line fronts on land, sea and in the air are needed and can be developed and maintained only if there is unity of purpose and common determination behind the home front.

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those forced to remain at home. Here, team work becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by wholehearted cooperation between citizens and leaders.

There is no field of endeavor where cooperation and compliance with law and regulation are more needed than that of forest fire control. The most effective and economical effort in this field of activity is that of prevention. The old adage "an ounce of precention" being "worth a pound of cure" was never more aptly applied than to forest fire control.

The forest fire warden is, by law, the designated local leader in forest fire matters. He exercises his prerogatives and discharges his duties as such under the direction of the State Forester. There was never a time when the warden needed each citizen's good will and cooperation more than he does now. With manpower waning, fire prevention, through efficient preparation, care with fire and compliance with necessary regulations become a vital duty of citizenship.

For years efforts have been made to improve the usual bad Spring and Fall fire record. It was not until this year, however, that this problem was, to a great extent solved when permit burning was more rigidly restricted. Forest fire wardens were instructed not to issue permits except on rainy days. This plan worked out so well it has been decided to make it the established policy governing legal burning.

Everyone is well acquainted with the several civilian defense groups. Many of our fellow townsmen are serving in one or other of them. It is only recently, however, that the Office of Civilian Defense, recognizing the threat forest fires are to our timber facilities and resources and the possible disruption of war activities in critical areas, established the "Forest Fire Fighters' Service." Its purpose is to provide fire fighters, equipped and trained, to strengthen the hand of the local forest fire warden; to acquaint the people in the area with their responsibility in fire prevention and suppression and to provide an opportunity for people in and near forested areas to participate in the war The State Forester is the State Coordinator; effort. the District Fire Chiefs are District Coordinators and the Warden is the Local Coordinator. The Forest Fire Fighters Service personnel will be registered under the direction of the Office of Civilian Defense; it will be trained by the local warden and his assistants, aided by the District Chief. Individual citizens are urged to join this service group by applying to their local forest fire warden. By becoming a part of this organization locally, individuals can contribute their share toward the protection of our forest resources which are so vital to the war job.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember

1. That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

2. To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not to throw lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches from moving vehicles.

3. To notify your local warden promptly of any fires you see.

4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report. 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75 for seating equipment at Town Hall School.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for additional High and Elementary School tuitions for the present year.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Lee:

War developments have strongly influenced the schools during the past year. The study of Current Events has of course dealt largely with this theme. Geography has been practically remade by the Air Age. The schools have received a constant stream of posters and information from government agencies. Under the guidance of the teachers, the pupils have collected and sold metal and rubber, continued their campaign of war savings, and made scrapbooks of their defense activities. Our young people attending high school outside have been offered pre-induction courses in technical subjects designed to fit them for rapid advancement in the armed services. Both boys and girls are being given special physical training. Seniors have the option of receiving the War Emergency Diplomas in case they wish to finish their courses early in order to enlist or enter upon one of the accelerated programs at the colleges.

Beginning last May, our elementary teachers, assisted by townspeople, have handled a series of war rationing programs, including Sugar and Book No. 1, two gasoline rationings, fuel-oil registration, and the forthcoming issuance of Book No. 2 for processed fruits and vegetables, probably to include meat later. Uncle Sam was able to find no other agency so well able to contact the people of every neighborhood throughout the nation and carry on the intricate and responsible work involved.

The report of the School Nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald, indicates that the health of the pupils was generally good, no serious epidemics occurring. The few pupils who desired dental work were accommodated at a neighboring clinic arranged by the Nurse, or else had their work done by their own dentists. Minor ailments doubtless accounted in part for the unusually low attendance record of 92.9%. But it is extremely probable that a little more of the good old Yankee trait of "gumption" would have prevented some of the absences and tardinesses. Much credit is due to the many homes where regular and prompt attendance has been insisted upon by parents and cheerfully complied with by the children, especially in winter with "war time" prevailing.

The names of some who have recently been pupils in Lee schools are beginning to appear in the news regarding war enlistment and training. We hope that the instruction that they received here in character and learning may stand them in good stead. In cases where persons are under consideration for promotion in the armed services or in industry, it is not unusual for their records to be investigated, even as far back as the elementary schools.

Minor repairs of a varied nature were carefully looked after during last summer, so that the buildings were in improved condition in the fall.

The School Board entertained the annual meeting of the Joint Board of Supervisory Union No. 44 at Mr. George Bennett's in April.
