## TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Lisbon, in the county of Grafton, and state of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lisbon on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, polls to be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed before five o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and to make appropriations for the same.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will fix and determine the compensation to be paid each of the town officers.
- Art. 4. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and special committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote in relation thereto.
- Art. 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

- Art. 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the public libraries in addition to what is required by law, and to determine how the same shall be divided.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to give a discount on all taxes paid on or before such time as they may designate.
- Art. 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries in the town of Lisbon.
- Art. 9. To see how much the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Pine Blister Rust control.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to light the streets of Lisbon Village District all night during the entire year; Sugar Hill from the dwelling of H. Jay Field to Hotel Lookoff, from the Baptist Church through Lovers' Lane to the Franconia line, from the former location of the Goodnow school house to the Homestead, and from the Lisbon and Franconia town line to the dwelling of Arthur Hunt; Sugar Hill and vicinity to be lighted the entire year until midnight, and from 5 a. m. until daylight, excepting the lights from the Homestead to the Hotel Lookoff for six months of the year; all the above premises to be lighted with electricity; and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.
- Art. 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the District Nursing Association.

- Art. 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the proper observance of Memorial Day.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will accept Town Road Aid, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$983.44.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to plow the town roads, and if so to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to oil such roads in the town as are already oiled, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain peace of the world.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purpose of advertising the town of Lisbon.
- Art. 18. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the poor, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.
- Art. 19. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Old Age Assistance, and to appropriate the necessary money for the same.

- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to apply on General Expenses of Highway Department, not included in Art. 5.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow such sums of money as they deem necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 22. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the town hall for the purposes of basketball and other use by the High School.
- Art. 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## Headmaster's Report Lisbon High School

#### 1944-45

The Lisbon High School Register for the year 1943-44 showed a total of 110 pupils: 49 were carried on the Junior High School Register. For the year 1944-45, 111 were shown to be attending the High School, and 35 the Junior High School.

Of last year's class of twenty-five, five are pursuing post-secondary education at higher institutions of learning (two at Plymouth, two at the University of N. H., one at the University of Iowa). Two are studying nursing at the Mary Hitchcock Hospital at Hanover, N. H. One is studying hairdressing at Concord. The boys, naturally, are serving in some capacity in the U. S. Armed Service. None were lost prior to graduation,

At the opening of the school year, September 6, 1944, there were two changes noted in the personnel of the faculty — Mrs. Marion Lewis from Littleton, Seventh and Eight Grade subjects; Mrs. Vivian Gombar, French and Science. Older faculty members include: Mr.·Olin Swett, Submaster, Math and Shop Work; Miss Marjorie Martin, Commercial Department; Mr. George Bountress, English and Sociology; Mrs. Emma Swett, Home Economics; and Headmaster Eben B. Hutton, Biology and Social Science. Miss Eunice Hawkins and Mr. Robert Sharp are substituting for Mrs. Gombar's classes for the time being.

Two new courses were added to the Program of Studies, General Math. (compulsory for Freshmen) and

World Problems (compulsory for Seniors). Correspondence courses in Aeronautics and Agriculture were made possible through the U. of Nebraska Extension Service. gram. Tenth year typing was also made available to outstanding students who intend to follow the Commercial program. A total offorty courses was offered by the school for the year. New physical equipment has been added in every department of the school. Particularly noteworthy additions have been made in the Biology and Home Economics Departments in the past few years. Notable progress has been made in the visual aids department now under the direction of Mr. Swett. The High School has purchased with its own money, and money given to it by interested citizens, a new Eastman sound projector valued at \$400.00. The school has also purchased a new film strip projector, \$75.00. The school is receiving financial assistance from the district in order to rent films and purchase film strips. Both machines are available to the elementary teachers.

The regular noon lunch program, so successful for the year 1943-44, had to be discontinued because of interference with the regular school program. Mrs. Swett was spending too much of her time in the preparation of daily meals for seventy-five people at the expense of her regular class-room work. (An assistant for this one department would make this program realizable). One hot dish, soup or cocoa, is now being offered. The penny milk program is again being offered to all grades and the high school. This is open to every student in the school.

Interscholastic basketball was conducted last year under the supervision of Mr. Olin L. Swett, and a total of ten games were played. Nine baseball games were played by Lisbon High School last spring. The team was under the direction of Mr. Walter L. Leavitt. Girls'

basketball for the year 1944-45 is under the direction of Miss Beverly Moffett; boys' basketball is under the direction of Mr. Hutton.

Four copies of the Echo were issued last year. The same number is being planned for this year. The work of the Commercial Department has been exceptionally commendable, and a number of very fine reports have been received through our exchange department. Twenty-three contributors had material in the Christmas issue of 1944; twelve students helped with the printing. Twice as many copies are being sold this year as last. We have 36 advertisers and exchange 25 copies with other schools.

Our music program has developed rapidly in the last two or three years. The Drum Corps, under the direction of Mr. Laurence Danforth, made marked progress during the school year 1943-44. Their help in the Memorial Day program was appreciated by many townspeople and their playing was well received. The band is being continued this year with approximately sixty seeking positions in the corps. The Girls' Glee Club, under the direction of Miss Marjorie Martin, made several appearances last year. The spirit and enthusiasm shown by the girls is a very commendable feature. In all public appearances they have conducted themselves to distinct advantage.

Mrs. Doris Buswell, music supervisor of the Littleton schools and chairman of the State festival, is new directing music in the entire Lisbon Public School system. Although here but a month she presented Lisbon High School students in a very delightful Christmas musicale entitled "The Miracle of the Clock," given at the High school building. Music interest in the school is definitely improving.

A public debate was given again last year before the

Friends in Council. Mr. Hutton was responsible for the coaching and directing. The annual Poppy Posters were also under Mr. Hutton's supervision. Approximately thirty students submitted posters last year.

Entre-Nous parties are conducted as a regular function of the school. Student Council meets every week for the purpose of participatory government. The Radio Club meets once a month. An annual Senior play is staged, and a spring play with the cast chosen from the Ninth, Tenth and Eleventh grades. A regular staff of the Commercial Department conducts the sale of stamps and bonds. One school picnic was held at Ogontz Camp this year. The entire school attended, including faculty. Distinct advantages were noted under this plan. Class rings are purchased through the Balfour Company.

Suitable facilities for conducting a good health program for all students are needed. Certain improvements could be made at the Town Hall (which would help us temporarily.) Lisbon needs a new gymnasium or a Community house.

An expanded shop program is definitely needed at the High school. Shop courses should be offered to the boys in every year at High school. At present only seventh and eighth grade boys receive instruction. An additional teacher on the faculty would provide and permit more personal assistance and improve general instruction. Remedial work and better class divisions would be possible under this plan.

This report is submitted with the candid hope that more people will become better acquainted with the actual program of the school. Weekly publicity is given the school through the Courier and more should read the news there. This report is included in the Town Report in order that all may have access to it and know more about the educational program of Lisbon High School. These educational facts should be of more interest and fully as important as the financial statistics which you receive at your school meeting.

In closing this, my first report on Lisbon High School, I should like to thank every one who through his personal interest in the school and its problems has helped in any way to contribute to this our accepted responsibility.

#### Help the War Effort by Preventing Forest Fires

No one is exempt from helping to win the war! Everyone, regardless of age, has his or her place in the overall effort. Some men, because of age, are called upon to bear arms; man ships, submarines and planes; minister to the injurrd and maintain morale. Women, in large numbers, are serving with the armed forces as nurses and members of the several women's military organizations—Waacs, Waves, Spars, etc. War industry has taken millions of men and women whose accomplishments have been the marvel of the world. Civilians at home are doubling up on their activities because of the shortage in manpower, purchasing bonds, assisting in numerous patriotic undertakings, maintaining home morale and, on the whole, carrying on with a cheerfulness and determination that is typically American. Yet, despite the time, thought and effort we are all putting into the war effort in general, we are, true to our peculiar American characteristics. heedless and careless about many important things and one of these is FIRE as it relates to our forests.

Much harm can be done the war effort because of our carelessness with fire. Lumber has gone to war in a big way! Our New Hampshire forests are contributing their full share insofar as manpower permits. Fire, the greatest enemy of the forests, destroys, during each of these critical years, hundreds of acres of valuable trees that could contribute to the war effort. Forest fires disrupt the war's business by taking men from their important work in industry and on the farm and reduces production of necessary war materials and food. Forest fires require the spending of much money and material that might otherwise be diverted into vital war channels. Forest fires are, for the most part, unnecessary and avoidable for ninety-eight percent of such fires are, annually, the result of human carelessness, yours and mine. This can and should be remedied. Now! You can help the war effort by preventing forest fires! The rules of the game are simple.

- 1. ALWAYS be careful with fire in or near woodlands.
- 2. Comply with regulations governing the use of starting of fires there.
  - REMEMBER—(a) You need written permission from your local forest fire warden for debris burning fires when the ground is not covered with snow.
  - (b) Be sure your match, cigar, cigarette and pipe ashes are OUT before dropping them.
- 3. Be fire-minded NOW as never before; be careful; caution others to be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden, your town, your nation and yourself!

The 1944 fire record for our town is: Number of fires, 4. Acreage burned, 101. Number of permits issued, 25.

#### THE LISBON PUBLIC LIBRARY
