You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Litchfield on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate for the Public Library.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate sufficient sum to obtain Town Road Aid for permanent improvement of highways.
5. To see what action the Town will take in regards to Memorial Day and make appropriation for the same.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes for the year 1943.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum to provide for additional protection due to the War Emergency.
8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hudson, New Hampshire
February 12, 1943

To the School Board and Citizens of the
Town of Litchfield:

I herewith submit my second annual report as
Superintendent of Schools:

Our school year has had to be modified to meet
war conditions. Early in the fall the need for harvest-

ing vegetables was so great that the schools were called upon for help. Eleven pupils were excused a part of the school day for this work. The general work of the school was not too badly effected by this vital service to the war effort.

The teachers have been called upon by the United States Government to ration sugar, gas, fuel oil and canned fruits and vegetables. Four or five interested citizens have helped the teachers in this work. Their services are greatly appreciated. While the school work is somewhat interfered with, we feel that the community contacts and service to the community has more than offset the loss of school time. We expect more of this same work before the end of the present school year. The general feeling seems to be that this work should be done by the teachers as their contribution to the war effort.

Our graduating class last June was small compared to the previous year. One member of this class left high school before the middle of the school year. The number of boys and girls dropping out of high school for one reason and another is very much larger than is normally the case. We regret to say that this practice will probably continue and even larger numbers will leave school as time goes on.

I am pleased to report that there were no changes in the teaching staff this year. The teaching program follows the same general plan of last year. Standard tests are a real measurement which show impartially both to the teacher and pupil whether they are above or below standard or are average for their grade. By giving these tests about the middle of the year, if pupils are below standard, we have plenty of opportunity to correct the difficulty and bring them up to standard before the school year closes.

In spite of the decrease in the amount of Surplus Commodities and increase in price of foods the noon lunch program is carried on as in former years with the exception of the small rise in the cost per week per pupil. Mrs. Haight is to be commended for her very efficient management of the school lunch.

I would like to express my appreciation for the fine cooperation of the School Board, teachers, pupils and all others concerned who have helped to make this a most successful school year.
