THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Polls will open at 10:00 A.M. and close not earlier than 7:00 P.M.

To meet on the eighteenth day of March at 1:30 P.M. to act on the rest of the articles in the warrant.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all property taxes paid within thirty days after presentation of tax bill.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in the aggregate more than 75% of the anticipated amount to be collected in taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town of Loudon negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in 1967 from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$317.00 for the Concord Hospital to help defray their estimated deficit for the year 1967.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Fire Department's Capital Reserve Fund as set up in the 1963 Town Meeting.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for restoring abandoned cemeteries in Town. This is the estimate of the Cemetery Commission which was appointed by the Town in March 1966.

9. To see if the Town will vote to open the part of Bumfagon Road which was closed by a vote of the people in 1956.

10. To see if the Town will allow the Selectmen to withdraw from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund the sum of \$2,900.00 for the purchase of a mechanical sand spreader.

11. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$1,525.00 from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund to buy a snow plow.

12. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to establish their office along with offices for the Town Clerk, Tax Collector, and Police Department in the building now owned by the American Legion in Loudon Village.

13. If favorable action is taken on Article 12, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be the approximate cost of the rent for the same for the last three months of the year.

14. Requesting a change in the building ordinance governing the size of house lot in connection with Mobile-home Parks. It is requested to change the minimum lot size from 100 ft. by 150 ft. to 100 ft. by 75 ft. for lots within a Mobilehome Park only.

A Mobilehome Park means a plot of ground on which four or more Mobilehomes occupied for dwelling or sleeping purposes are located. To qualify for a Mobilehome Park this plot of land must conform to adequate sanitation requirements.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

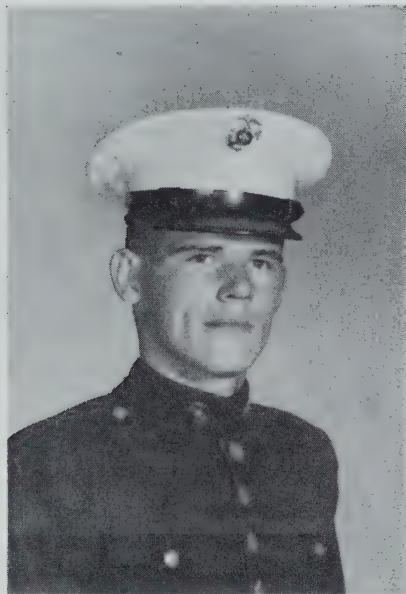

SELECTMEN'S REPORT 1966

As we look back at the past year, we feel that there has been slow but steady progress in the improvement of our roads and equipment.

The Chichester Road has been tarred — a T. R. A. project.

The hill on Currier Road at Donald Colby's house has been widened and tarred — a Town project. This piece of road has been a source of trouble in the past and required constant attention because of washouts. There are quite a few similar places that we hope can be given the same treatment.

Repairing Twin Bridge on the Ridge Road has been under inspection by the New Hampshire Highway Department and we expect to start work on it this Spring.

The repair of the bridge on the Chichester Road west of the Ricker Road is also expected to be completed this year.

The Town acquired additional land adjacent to our present dump. This was done to lessen the danger of fire and to take care of future expansion. We think it will be needed to take care of junk cars. Most of you know the State Law in regards to junk cars on your property. Anyone with two or more unregistered or old cars no longer intended or in condition for legal use on the highways, or used auto parts equal in bulk to two or more vehicles, is requested to have them removed. If the Selectmen do not enforce this law, the State will. We hope you will comply with this law.

This year the Selectmen will again be at the Town Hall on Tuesday nights 8:00 to 10:00 P.M. to be of service to you in any way we can.

You will note in the Warrant of the Town Report, a request for the opening of the Bumfagon Road which has

been partially closed. This road was closed some time back before we had the type of snow removal equipment we have today and its opening should be of help in case of fire. No appropriation will be needed for the work necessary. We hope you will give this favorable consideration.

This past year we had to borrow money for a period of six months to carry out our obligations. This is the first time in three years we had to do so. However, the loan has been paid and we are in a sound financial position. The school commitments have been paid for the 1966 to 1967 school year which ends on June 30, 1967.

Your 1967 taxes will be in for a sizeable increase due to the new school. Just how much this increase will amount to depends largely on the amount of State Aid we will receive this year. Do not forget the Annual School Meeting at the Penacook High School, March 11, 1967.

Please read the instructions on your Inventory Blank. We need the correct information for our records and this could be a benefit to you in the future.

ROAD AGENT REPORT



This has been a productive year for the Highway Department. Replacing old culverts, with new ones in some locations; widening narrow places on both dirt and macadam roads; also ditching and re-shaping the shoulders of about five miles of tar roads, plus regular maintenance throughout the year.

Two new 15 inch cement culverts were installed on Oak hill road, one on the Lovejoy road, and one on the Loudon Ridge road. Also a number of existing culverts were taken up, cleaned, lengthened and replaced.

Colby hill on the Carrier road has always been a trouble spot. It was decided to widen, gravel and tar an 800 foot section, which was a much needed improvement.

The T.R.A. project on the Chichester road was continued this year with the paving of .9 mile and the excavation and graveling of another .5 mile. This road is being paved at 20 foot width.

We also replaced the complete bridge, stringers and planks, on the Bumfagon road, and erected a new iron pipe railing on the Staniels bridge.

A portion of the Ricker road was widened by the cutting of bushes and lengthening culverts.

In the summer tar seal program, we applied 30,000 gallons of asphalt to cover 9½ miles of road.

In the last several years, we have been replacing old and worn out snow fence, which meant updating the program to meet present day conditions.

In looking to the future, we hope to continue the steady improvement and correction of so called trouble spots as rapidly as time and money will allow, eventually making Loudon a more travel-safe town in which to live.

This was a busy year for your fire department. In response to 39 calls, we gave prompt attention to 9 chimney fires, 1 faulty oil burner, 6 motor vehicle fires, 9 brush or grass fires, 7 mutual aid calls, 1 building, 3 dump fires, 2 smoke in house calls and 1 missing person assistance.

There was no major loss and all fires were quickly brought under control, due to the prompt attention given in reporting the fires and the untiring efforts of the men who make up your Loudon Fire Department.

We purchased and installed a new base radio this past year, that should be trouble free for many years.

We are proud to say the new tanker is built and now in use. After the bids had been received, the truck com-

mittee decided on a heavy duty Ford F600 chassis, and it was also decided to purchase a used 1200 gallon oil tank. We wish to thank all those that made this truck possible; to those that worked mounting the tank and pump, also the piping that was required. We wish to thank Ray Rattee for donating all the pipe fittings necessary, making this truck the valuable piece of fire fighting equipment needed in this town. We invite your personal inspection of the equipment at the station, any time.

We would like to impress you with the fact, that to burn any refuse, rubbish or incinerators, you must first obtain a permit. Furthermore, no burning of any kind will be permitted between the hours of 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., except on rainy days.

We wish to thank all those that made 1966 a fire safe year and we also wish to thank the Ladies Fire Auxiliary for their valuable assistance to the Department.

POLICE REPORT



The year 1966 was marked by an intense rise in activities. The Department has made every effort to stay in stride with these demands. Our Department files have recorded more accidents, larceny cases, breaks, general complaints and aids. Due to this, our Department expenditures exceeded our budget. Last year we had a large increase in juvenile problems and foresee even more. Many of these problems are known only by the Department and are growing at an alarming rate.

Your Department has had more schooling on prevention of crime and procedures due to the interest to learn by these men. Many of these hours were done on our own time, but were rewarding. The Department attended schools at Belmont and received a first place trophy on the use of

firearms and marksmanship. Each man received a diploma upon passing and completing a Practical Patrolman's Course with all marks above average. We also attended St. Anselm's College in Manchester on two different occasions.

The Department has formed its own Association and raised money for the purpose of having well uniformed men and needed equipment. Our purchases of last year were dress uniform jackets for each man and a typewriter for the Department.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

1. Community and home fallout shelters are highly urged.

(a) Loudon does not have public buildings which have a protection factor great enough to receive federal aid in stocking without a large expense to the town in building the same.

(b) Home fallout shelters can be constructed by home owners at a nominal cost, without additional taxation. (Bill to be presented to the 1967 Legislature to make same official.)

2. Loudon's radiological monitoring instruments were replaced by new and calibrated kits in the summer of 1966. They also were replaced again in January, 1967. The "67" kits include one new type meter.

(a) These kits are located at: No. 1 kit, headquarters, Loudon Village Fire Station.

(b) No. 2 kit at Royal Page's, Station No. 2, Loudon Ridge Fire Station.

3. Rural community must believe in self help in all phases of Civil Defense.

(a) Information may be obtained from your local C.D. Director or your State C.D. office, (National Guard Armory, Concord, N. H.)

4. National Warning Network

(a) An approaching enemy missile or plane is detected by one or more radar stations on alert 24 hours per day.

(b) Information then goes to North American Air Defense Command (NORAD). Military forces are alerted to strike back.

(c) Warning of attack goes from OCD over the National warning system (NAWAS) to 700 warning points at state and local levels.

(d) From these points, the warnings are passed to thousands of secondary points in local communities.

(e) Loudon has received a number of test calls during 1966 that had to be reported back to state C.D. Headquarters, as to date, time, and sources from which received.

(f) Loudon local officials to warn the town. (In the 1966 test alerts, called checkerboard, the general public was not to be alerted.)

5. Loudon's 1966 Civil Defense Budget of \$200.00 was very small, however could be used to a good advantage in an emergency of any kind of disaster.

(a) Monies appropriated in the past in this budget have not all been spent, however these monies remain to help the next year's tax figures.

(b) It is suggested that the \$200.00 appropriated for the 1967 budget be passed.
