TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. s.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Community House in said Pembroke on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear and act upon the report of the Town budget committee.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to construct a sewer, commencing at a point near the residence of Isadore Grenier on Broadway Street; thence southerly along Broadway to a point near the residence of Ferdinand Daviault; thence westerly to the Merrimack River; and will vote to accept from the Works Progress Administration, a Federal Agency, the following aid, offered by said Agency in its construction, namely: 50% of the construction cost, the remaining 50% to be borne by the town, and will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on eight serial notes of the town, a sum not to exceed eight thousand (\$8,000.) Dollars to pay for it's proportionate share, said notes to be in the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.) Dollars each and payable in one, two, three, four, five, six, seven and eight years from date, and to be payable

exclusively from funds to be raised by taxation, and also authorize the Selectmen to make contracts, and execute instruments and agreements containing such terms as in the discretion of the Selectmen may be necessary or advisable for the purpose of obtaining the aforesaid financial grant and assistance from the Works Progress Administration, or other Federal Agency.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purchase of a Safe File to house and protect from fire, the Vital Records in the Town Clerk's Office.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, to be set aside as an accumulative Library Fund for building purposes.

7. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to lay out a street leading westerly from High Street to land of Joseph Fontaine, thence northerly by land of said Fontaine and others to land of Joseph Richards, Jr.

8. To take the sense of the qualified voters present as to the necessity of calling a Constitutoinal Convention, and to vote upon the following question, viz., "Is it expedient to revise the Constitution."

9. To see if the town will vote to confirm the action of its Trustees of Trust Funds in accepting the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:

- (1) Bequest of George E. Miller of \$100 for his lot in Evergreen Cemetery.
- (2) Gift of the heirs of Stephen A. Bates of \$200 for his lot in the Pembroke Street Cemetery.
- (3) Gift of Frank Quimby of \$100 to be known as the "Charles N. Quimby Fund" for lot in the Buck Street Cemetery.

10. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF PEMBROKE FIRE DEPARTMENT

In accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire I am pleased to present the report of the Fire Department for the year 1936.

The equipment for fire fighting consists of one pumper which was purchased in 1925, now in fair condition, and one ladder truck which has been built by the present firemen out of proceeds gained from a Lawn Party. A used truck for this purpose was procured and adapted to the ladders and other equipment. A small amount of 1½ inch hose has been purchase which can be easily handled and used in close quarters. Also a pyrene extinguisher has been added.

The departments of surrounding cities have been very helpful in their co-operation and advice.

I feel that the fire whistle is decidedly slow acting and unreliable and that in the future an air whistle should be substituted. The alarm circuit about town has been re-insulated where necessary. A band of yellow has been painted on poles situated near hydrants for easy spotting. The alarm boxes have been newly painted and the station is now kept clean and orderly.

The expenses of the department show a small increase over last year partially due to our desire to elevate the equipment.

Constructive criticism is always welcome and appreciated. Therefore, may I recommend a fixed sum of money be appropriated each year for the maintenance of the department to a respectable level in the future.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To The School Board of Pembroke:

It is a pleasure to present to your Board my third annual report. Attention is given particularly to enrollment and promotions, changes in teaching staff, improved and added facilities, special activities, and recommendations.

Enrollment and Promotions

The total enrollment of two hundred twenty-seven public school children is sixteen greater than that of the previous year. This increase is distributed among all schools except the Borough.

Through the four methods outlined in my last report, the goal of one hundred per cent in June promotions was attained in four rooms of the Grammar School and in three of the five rural schools. The percentage of promotions for the town was 95.6, a gain of four points over the former year.

A complete record of every pupil in the elementary grades is kept in the Superintendent's office. Parents are urged to consult with the teachers and Superintendent concerning the progress being made by their children.

Changes in Teaching Staff

Schools opened in September with four changes in the staff of regular teachers. Two highly efficient members, Josephine Roy of the Pembroke Street School and Mary E. Colby of Pembroke Hill, withdrew automatically by reason of marriage. Soon after her re-election to teach the Buck Street School, Miss E. Ellen Mitchell resigned to accept a similar position in North Sutton. Miss Mary

Pickwick, part-time teacher of domestic science in the Suncook Grammar School, accepted a full-time position.

Anna M. Gobis of Manchester succeeded Miss Roy at the Pembroke Street School. Miss Gobis is a 1935 graduate of the three-year Elementary Course at Plymouth. She had since taught with success in the schools of Gilmanton.

Yvonne E. Laflamme of Littleton was elected teacher at Pembroke Hill. Miss Laflamme graduated from the three-year Elementary Course at Plymouth in the Class of 1936 .

Dorothy W. Boland of Haverhill, New Hampshire, also a Plymouth graduate and a teacher of several years' experience, was elected to the Buck Street School.

Domestic Science work in the seventh and eighth grades of the Suncook Grammar School is being conducted by Miss Marion A. Brown, home-room teacher of grades five and six. On three half-days a week her home-room classes are under the instruction of Mr. Peter J. Valeska of Salem, New Hampshire. Mr. Valeska is a 1935 graduate of the three-year junior high school course at Keene and is serving as a part-time substitute teacher.

Two changes have occurred on the staff of the nursery school. Ruth C. Lennartson, formerly head teacher, resigned in September to pursue graduate training at Gordon College. Mrs. Helen F. Rogers, who succeeded Miss Lennartson as head teacher, withdrew in January.

Helen G. Carpenter of Somersworth served as assistant teacher from September to January when she was appointed head teacher. Miss Carpenter is a 1932 graduate of New Hampshire University.

Irene Livingston of Portsmouth, a graduate of Plymouth in the class of 1926 and for a number of years teacher in the elementary schools of the State, is serving as the present assistant teacher.

Improved and Added Facilities

During the summer the North Pembroke schoolroom was remodeled, and new woodshed and toilet rooms were connected with the building. The relocation of windows now gives standard lighting in the classroom. New equipment includes individual and adjustable chair and desk sets, slate blackboards, wet sink, and heated coatroom. A small room is available for domestic science. One of the two hallways has been converted into a manual training shop. This has just been equipped with a complete set of carpenter tools, bench vise and tool grinder. The pupils are building their own work benches.

By the use of movable furniture the school room is now adapted to community gatherings as well as to school purposes.

With the exception of electric lights and running water, this building has facilities equal to those of any one-room rural school.

If unexpended balances from other items are available, I strongly recommend that similar improvements be made at the Buck Street School, where window lighting and toilet facilities are now below the standards of the one-room schools in Pembroke.

At the Suncook Grammar School outside windows have been provided with metal weather strips. These much reduce air drafts on the northern and western exposures and should reduce fuel consumption. A convenience in the handling of fuel and ashes is the recent construction of a rollway with bulkhead leading from the furnace room to the school grounds.

The enrollment of larger pupils made necessary the purchase of ten grammar school desks and chairs for the seventh grade room. A like number of the same type should be added another year.

General science equipment for demonstrating lecture table experiments has been purchased for use in the seventh and eighth grades.

A new Singer sewing machine has replaced the worn out machine in the domestic science rooms. The new machine is of the treadle type. Since the enrollment in these classes is large, a second machine will be needed another year. With the increasing use of electricity in the homes, it would be an advantage to have one motor driven machine for use in your sewing classes. The more general use of electric and gas ranges by the community is rapidly making obsolete the kerosene burners in school kitchens.

Special Activities

A new activity in Pembroke was a spelling contest among the various schools in the town. Each school, except Pembroke Street — which has no seventh and eighth grades — was represented by a team of three members, chosen from the six upper grades. The Suncook Grammar School — represented by Arthur Letendre of Grade VIII, Gladys Smith, Grade VI, and Mary Farnum, Grade IV — won by a score of 298 out of a possible 300 points. The team from the Borough School won second place.

Late in May the same team from Suncook Grammar School represented the town of Pembroke and won first place among similar teams from the towns of Hooksett, Allenstown, Candia, Deerfield, and Raymond. A trophy cup is held for the following year by the winning team and becomes the permanent possession of any town that wins it three times.

The enrollment in your nursery school continues at the maximum of thirty children. The average daily attendance is over twenty-five. The ages of these children range from two to five years.

It is particularly gratifying to observe the physical improvement made by these small children from one month to another.

To the Mother Craft Club, town officials, business men, and other interested people we are deeply indebted for donations of fuel and other supplies for which no federal money is granted. On several occasions the supply has been nearly exhausted, when a generous individual or organization has donated money or fuel. Other expenses, amounting to more than \$3,000.00 a year, are paid by the federal government.

The adult classes, organized a year ago, are being continued with an enrollment of over one hundred men and women. Different groups are studying sewing, weaving, English, and mathematics. So keen was the interest in the sewing and weaving that classes were continued with good attendance throughout the summer vacation. These classes have merited and received the patronage of the community.

In June a class of eighteen pupils was graduated from the eighth grade of the Grammar, Pembroke Hill, and Buck Street Schools. Fourteen members of this class entered Pembroke Academy. One is attending the Rundlett Junior High School in Concord.

There are this year sixty local pupils enrolled in Pembroke Academy. In view of the number in attendance, the present contracted sum of \$3,900.00 paid annually for tuition by the Town of Pembroke is small. The present cost per pupil averages \$65 in comparison with last year's average cost of \$75.55, including all public high schools in the state.

This year for the first time contract has been signed with the Allenstown school district by which the pupils of its Grammar School use the Community House for physical training and other purposes. Allenstown pays

as its proportional share \$150.00 towards the maintenance of this recreational center.

Recommendations

It is generally accepted in all parts of our state that the educational advantages in its elementary rural schools now compare favorably with those in its villages and cities. It is the policy of the State Board to encourage maintenance of rural schools wherever these represent community centers and the attendance is sufficient to balance the added money cost by educational advantage. Where the per pupil costs become excessive and the enrollment very small, educational returns diminish rapidly.

The Borough School has only seven pupils. There is small probability of more than eight or nine pupils another year. The cost per pupil in this school exceeds \$130, while the average elementary school cost per pupil last year, in the entire town was \$66.06. It is doubtful if the educational advantages, derived by maintenance of the Borough School, double those shared by the average pupil in Pembroke. If the Borough School is long continued, the improvement of lighting and toilet facilities will become imperative.

For these reasons I recommend the combination of the Borough and North Pembroke schools and the transportation of those children who reside two miles or more from the school to which they are assigned.

In Conclusion

I wish to mention the success of your school nurse in the improvement of physical conditions which contribute much to educational possibilities. Statistics for the year ending with June 1936, are found in her printed report. This does not include the large number of home visits and the transportation of children to and from clinic centers outside of her nursing district.

Characteristic of the past year has been a more general co-operation by parents. I believe this is largely in response to the home visits made by your teachers. It greatly assists both the child and the teacher in making those improved adjustments that determine educative growth. The attitudes of the child, more than high marks, determine his prospects for efficient living.
