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## IN MEMORIAM

### MARGUERITE C. KELLY

1914 – 1999



On June 20, 1999, with the death of Marguerite Kelly, the Town of Rye lost a long time resident whose life was devoted to her fellow man through education.

A scholarship student at Vassar College, Marguerite was a member of Phi Beta Kappa. She later earned a master's degree in education from New York University. Employed by the New York Times to lecture on current events and teach young adults to learn from the daily newspaper, she next took a position with the New York City Board of Education.

Settling in Rye in 1959 with her husband, the late John F. Kelly, and their three children, Marguerite employed her teaching skills here in Rye first in an elementary classroom and later at the Rye Junior High. Her former students continue to recall her sincerity, fairness, and dedication with affection.

Marguerite retired from the classroom in 1976 and continued to share her expertise and experience in education by serving as a member of the Rye School Board for fifteen years. On the broader scene, she assisted Rye residents along with others as she tutored at-risk teens at Odyssey House in Hampton, participated in the Seacoast Retired Seniors Volunteer Program tutoring in the general equivalency diploma program, aided seniors with their Medicare forms, and served on RSVP's Board of Directors. Marguerite was a delegate to the White House Conference on Aging in 1981 and an original member of the Board of Directors of Webster at Rye serving from 1984 until her death.

Survivors include Richard J. Kelly of Portland, Maine, Nancy A. Kelly of Peabody, Mass., and Joan Kelly of Cambridge, Mass., all of whom grew up in Rye. Today, Marguerite's memory lives on through donations to the Rye Education Foundation.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This year has been a year of change. In February, because of SB2 we held our first deliberative session instead of the traditional Town meeting. In order to make sure the public was thoroughly informed, the Town issued a quarterly newsletter written by Jack and Carole Beckwith with help from Janet Thompson. We consider the Town Election a success with our 1999 budget approved by 1,756 informed voters rather than 200 to 250 voters at Town Meeting.

Our greatest effort has been to protect the Town Of Rye by protesting HB999, which increased our property taxes by 34%. We consider this new tax unfair to our citizens. We feel we are penalized for our past frugality and good financial management. Moreover, people are taxed on property values rather than their ability to pay. We have joined the Coalition of Communities against HB999 and have voted to withhold our share of the education tax pending a decision from the State Supreme Court.

Our 1999 budget included \$95,000 for a new Town-wide computer system. This has been installed and connects all Town departments.

The Parsonage Apartments have been completed after a setback caused by undetected rot to the frame of the 189-year-old building. The C.B.D.G. grant from the State Office of Planning made this project possible without affecting our taxpayers and we now provide safe housing for our citizens of low and moderate income.

One of the most significant events this year was the compromise reached by the Town Forest Committee, the Conservation Commission and our Recreation Department. After a year of intense discussion, they have all agreed to support a warrant article that will protect the Town Forest and at the same time provide the Recreation Department with land for future expansion.

The Municipal Budget, which has been agreed upon by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee, is less than last year's, but still provides our Town employees with salary increases.

Our Fire Station project has been placed on hold until next year and \$50,000 has been budgeted for the Capital Reserve Fund. Next year we will be ready.

We have also experienced changes in personnel. Janet Thompson, who gave us dedicated service for 14 years, has retired to Florida. She will be missed.

Cornelius "Bud" Moynahan, Director of Public Works for the last 14 years has also retired. Our superior road maintenance and plowing and the Town Recycling Program are a testimony to his efforts.

We have hired their replacements. Matthew Upton is our new Administrative Assistant. He comes with a great deal of experience as Town Administrator in Belmont, NH, and is also a practicing attorney. His expertise will help reduce our growing legal fees. Everett "Bud" Jordan is our new Director of Public Works. He has a great deal of experience in road maintenance and construction. He was selected by a committee consisting of knowledgeable citizens.

Our jobs as Selectmen have been made easier by the many volunteers who continue to serve the Town whenever they are asked. We all need to thank these devoted citizens for making Rye such a special Town.

**A glimpse into our past: L. B. Parsons, *A History of Rye, N.H. 1623 – 1903*, (1905)**

In the warrant for the town-meeting of 1820, the following articles were inserted :

“ Several of the Inhabitants of the town in 1820, taking into consideration the circumstances of the town and being alarmed in view of a number of vices and discord prevalent among us, such as profane swearing, intemperance, gambling, profanation of the sabbath, which in their opinion serve very much to injure the reputation, morals, and interest not only of individuals and families but of the town at large, are therefore convinced of the necessity and propriety of some measures being adopted by the Inhabitants of this town in order to check, or as far as may be these prevailing vices and disorders. No servants or minors to be trusted for any ardent spirits without leave of their parents or guardians or masters, and likewise that they should shut up their houses and stores at nine o'clock in the winter and ten o'clock in the summer, except when the town or publick business may require a longer time, or when young persons of both sexes may occasionally meet together for singing or civil amusement and then not to keep unseasonable hours.”

“ To see if the town will give directions to the Selectmen not to grant license to any person as tavenors or store keepers for retailing speritous licquors, unless they come under the above obligation.”

“Voted the above resolve as it now stands.”

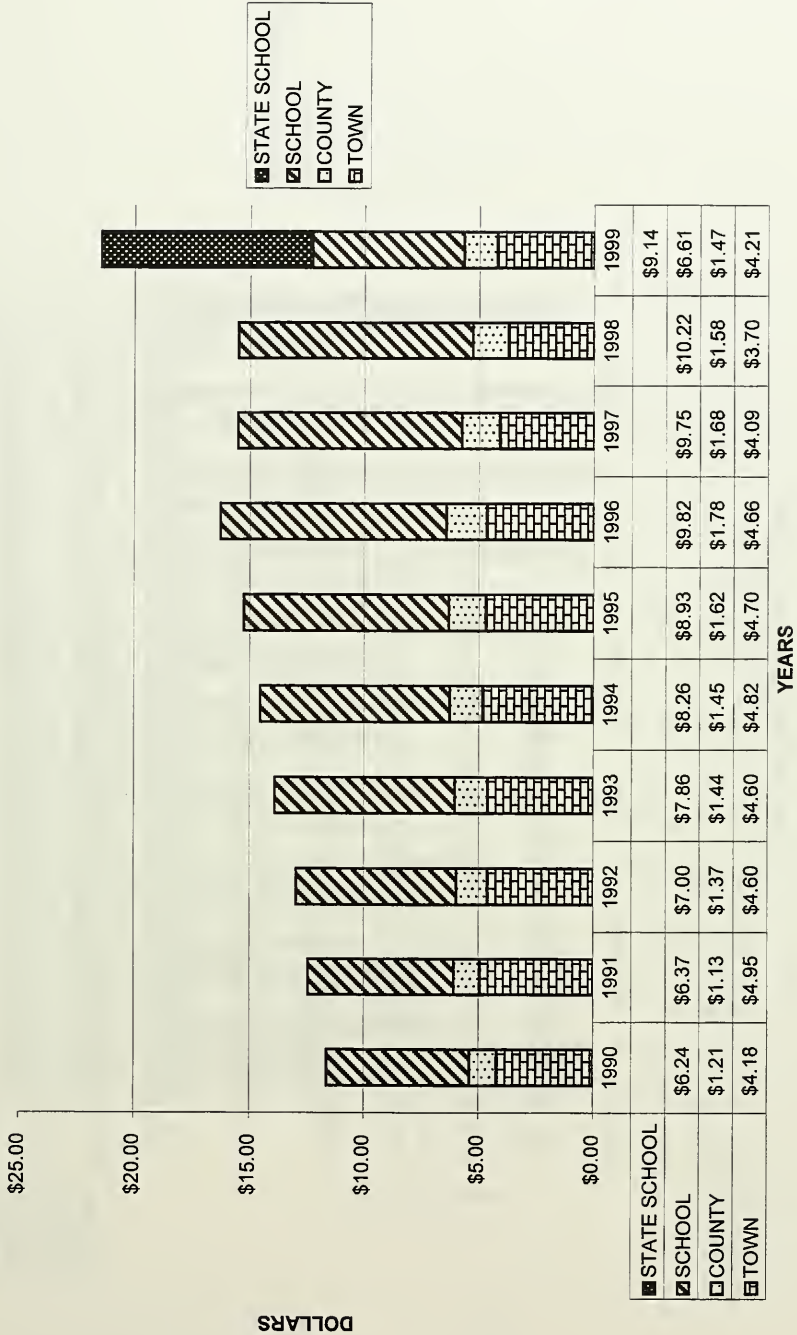

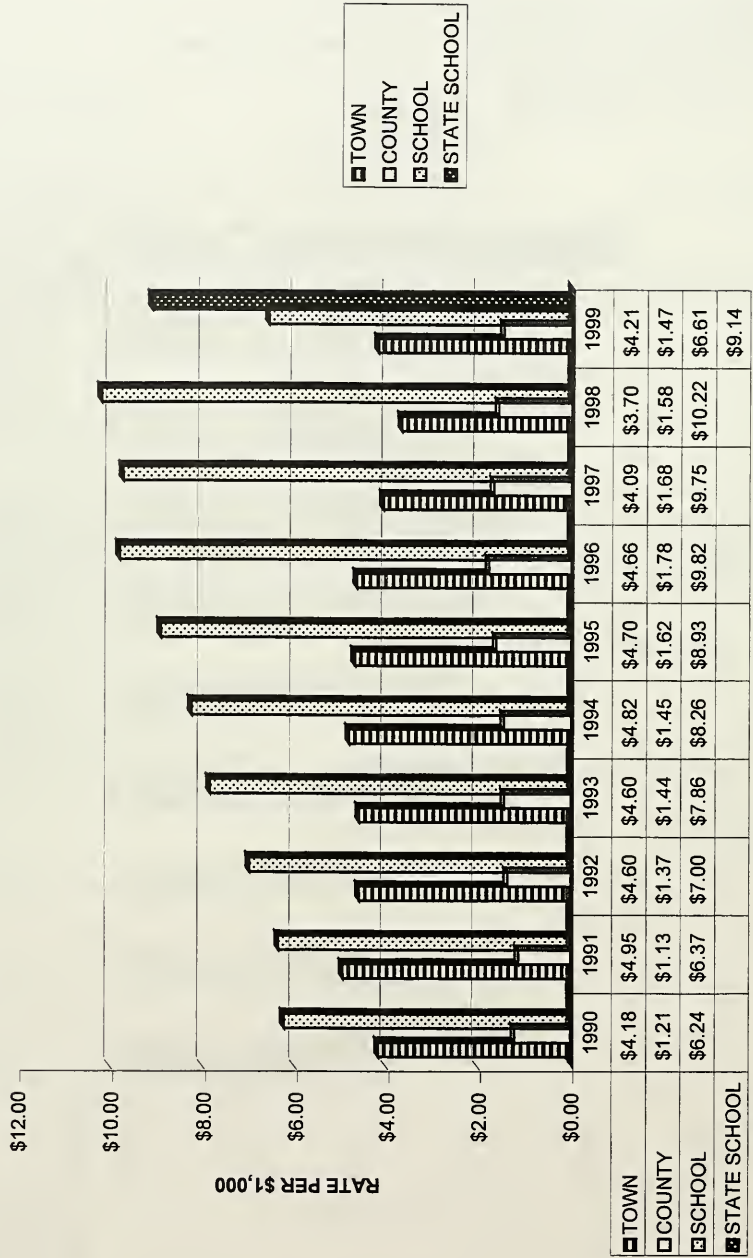

# TAX RATE BREAKDOWN

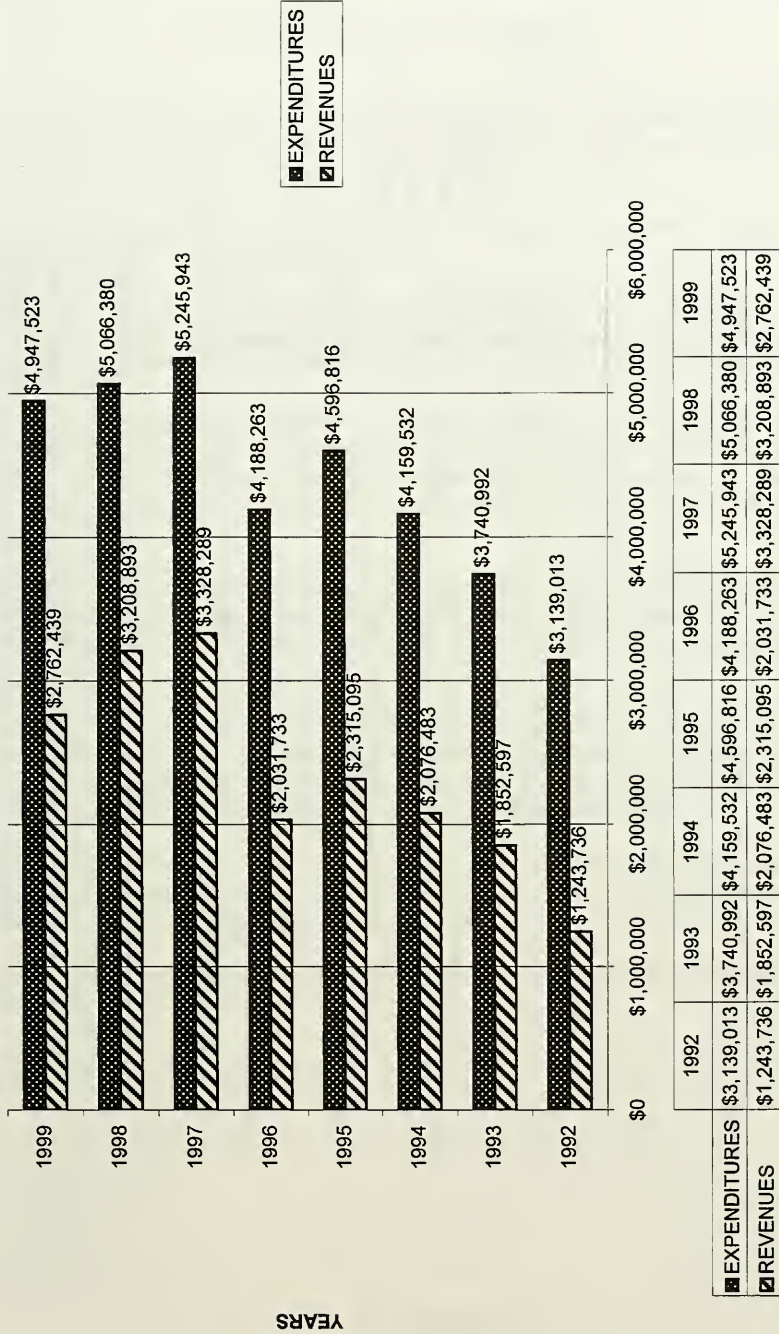

# TAX RATES FOR 1990 - 1999



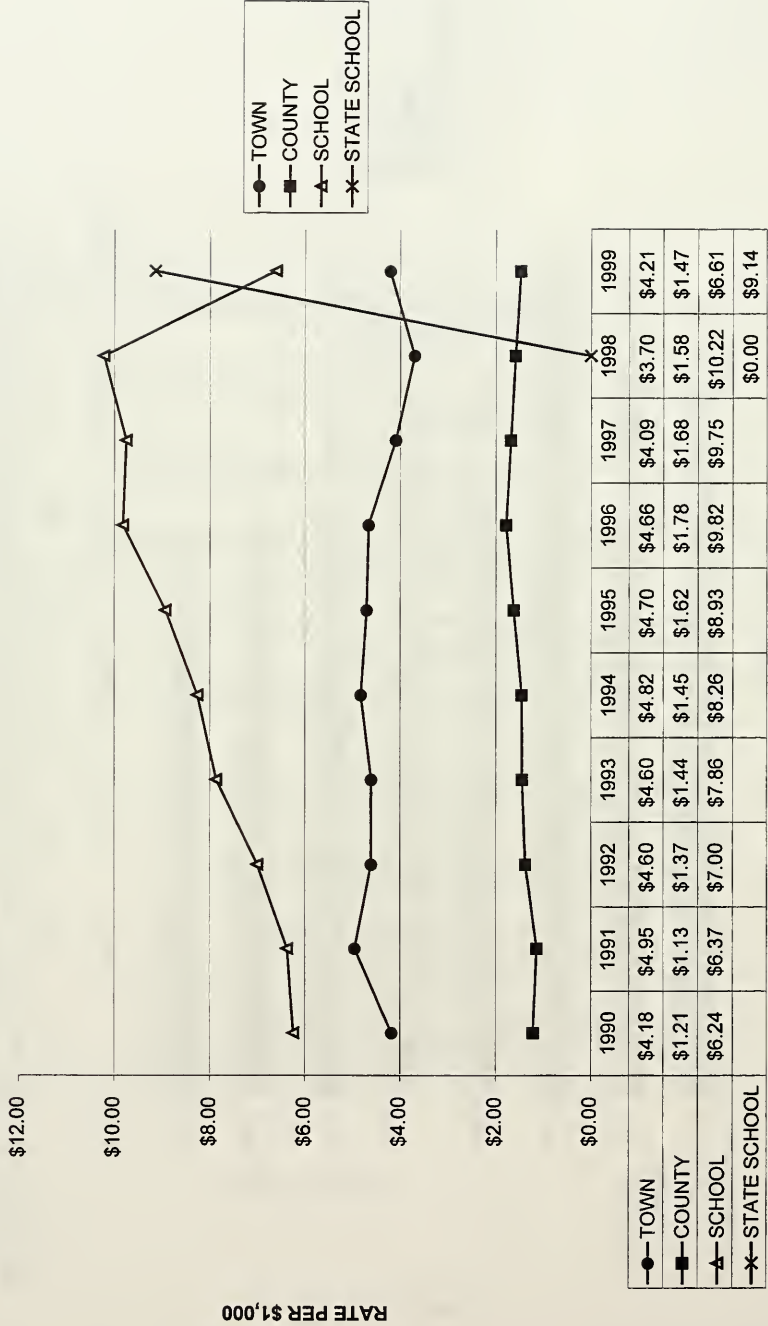
# TOTAL REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

## BUDGET COMMITTEE'S REPORT

At our April meeting the following officers were elected: John W. Moynahan, Chairman; Gary Chapman, Vice-Chairman, and William Zechel, Clerk. Mr. Zechel was elected to fill the vacancy created when Gary Dodds was elected to the School Board.

This is our second year operating under Senate Bill 2 and again it has proven to be very difficult working within the time schedule allowed.

We started earlier this year because we knew it would be difficult when we found out in August that Janet Thompson, Administrative Assistant, was leaving the Town. We never realized how much of the Selectmen's work she did in preparing their recommended budget.

It has been a very frustrating year because we not only lost Janet but we also lost the services of the bookkeeper for an extended period of time and also the Selectmen's Secretary, Jeannie Cronin, who suffered a serious fall. This left the Selectmen's office in disarray. The Budget Committee was unable to get the necessary budget material on time and when we finally did, it changed from hour to hour.

The Committee did write a formal letter to the Selectmen asking for the Town Auditors to come in sometime in December as they have always done in the past to make sure we are in good shape financially. We had some concerns with the budget but of course our request was denied.

Due to the additional education funding required by the State, the Budget Committee is trying relentlessly to keep spending down and to stop any unnecessary funding in our Budgets. We hesitate to think what next year's educational funding will be. Please rest assure that your Budget Committee will keep all citizens in mind when working on the budget.

The Budget Committee would like to thank Janet Thompson, former Administrative Assistant, for serving the Town over the years. She was truly a professional in her field of work and a wonderful person to know. She is surely missed by all of us.

As Chairman, I thank all members of the Budget Committee for all their time and effort spent on this year's budget.

**POPULATION**

From the constables' rates of the town of Newcastle, made in December, 1688, it appears probable that at that time there were not more than fifteen or twenty voters in the Sandy Beach section of the town – the part that later was set off to the Parish of Rye – nearly all of these being named Berry, Foss, Marden, Ordiorne, Brackett, Seavey, or Wallis. This would indicate a total population of 100 to 120.....

In 1949 the annual revenues from vehicle registrations in Rye were \$6,160.23. Fifty years later those revenues are \$929,253.00. That amount is almost \$93,000 more than in 1998, or an 11% increase. These dollars go into the town's general fund to help reduce the property tax rate. The financial reports for this office appear on the following pages.

The State of New Hampshire implemented the State Wide Property Tax, in the process naming Rye a "donor town". On the heels of this legislation, we were charged with sending out tax bills that reflected our donor status, and resulted in a hefty increase for all of us to bear. Hardship relief was offered under the new law, and we scheduled appointments with Jim Helm, Leo Appel, Harold Moldoff and John Crowley who generously volunteered to help applicants complete the required forms. As a result many of our property owners received refunds from the state.

Subsequent to last year's vote, new computers and software programs were installed in our office. This insured our Y2K compliance, and upgraded our outdated tax system.

In 2000 there will be four elections: in February the Presidential Primary, in March the Town Election, September the State Primary and in November the State and Federal General Election. If you're not already registered to vote you need only to come to our office to fill out a short voter registration form. Bring a photo i.d., such as your driver's license.

I appreciate the support and cooperation of the Board of Selectmen, other town officials and personnel, and the citizens of this community. I am particularly grateful to my deputy, Beth Yeaton, and our assistant, Phyllis Lundgren, for their hard work and dedication. On the days when some might be overwhelmed by the demands of this office, they accept the challenge without complaint. My sincerest thanks to you all.



## FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

The Fire & EMS Department responded to a total of 597 calls this year. The department experienced 2 major fires and several minor fires this year, but again, quick action and response by the department kept these fires minor in nature. Again I strongly feel that this is due to our effective and efficient Fire Inspection, Fire Prevention and Training programs.

Both the Fire and EMS departments continue to train on a monthly basis to keep their skills up in their respective fields. The Fire Department received the Town's new ambulance the end of June. It was put into service July 2 and is working out very well.

The building committee is presently working with our architect and has come up with a design of a building which will fit in the center of town. We had hope to come before the Town in March for approval of the addition, but due to time constraints we will be asking in 2001 for the approval of the building. We are asking for another \$50,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve this year.

**A glimpse into our past: L. B. Parsons, *A History of Rye, N. H. 1623 – 1903*, (1905)**

### THE DARK DAY

The 19<sup>th</sup> day of May, 1780, was unprecedented in New England for its great darkness. Belknap says, --“ It presented a complete specimen of as total darkness as can be conceived.” The darkness became noticeable about eleven o'clock and it soon became necessary to have lights. Fowls went to roost and the cattle collected around the barn-yards. For some days previous the air had been filled with smoke, probably arising from vast forest fires.

September 6, 1881, was known as yellow day, the sun was obscured and lights needed at mid-day. Fowls went to roost and in some places it caused fear and excitement.

## EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR'S REPORT

1999 was a busy year for Rye's Emergency Management Department. There were no major incidents requiring us to open and operate our emergency operating center, however we were knee deep in training through out the year.

Early in the year working with New Hampshire Office of Emergency Management (NHOEM) we planned and hosted a major table top exercise on Bioterrorism, being held on August 10 with over 20 local, county, state and federal agencies participating. Training also continued both locally and off site with all related costs picked up under state and federal grants.

Looking ahead into 2000 we have 3 scheduled Emergency Response Preparedness Exercises, the 3<sup>rd</sup> being a graded exercise by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. During the time leading up to our exercises we will be polishing our skills with training provided by NHOEM and local staff.

## BUILDING INSPECTOR'S REPORT

1999 showed no signs of slowing down. An additional 22 new homes were built, adding 82 bedrooms. Over 300 permits were issued, at an estimated value of \$12, 640,000 bringing in a total of \$116,000 in building permit fees. January of 1999 brought in \$24,705 in building permit fees, based on \$2,157,800 estimated cost of construction. In the last three months, the estimated cost of construction exceeded \$1.5 million dollars **PER MONTH**, and even went as high as \$1.7 million dollars in October.

The department is confronted daily with enforcement issues, health issues, septic repairs and replacements, witnessing test pits for subdivision and septic systems, questions relating to building, permits, State and Federal regulations applications to each project, and general questions. Typically from 8:am to 12:00 pm the phone continually rings and people are generally lined up in the hallway waiting to discuss such issues with us.

This is the reason the office is closed to the public at noon. The afternoon is reserved to review the permit applications, complaints, septic systems, complete paperwork, meet privately with attorneys, builders and residents and conduct inspections. However, the list of things to do and items to research never seem to get any smaller and we are continually trying to devise ways to be more efficient so we can better serve you.

We deal with a dynamic environment, where we need to closely review each application for conformance to local, State and Federal regulations. These regulations change and it takes quite an effort to coordinate reviews with the updated regulations. We see our function as to assist you in understanding the maze of regulatory nightmares, and obtaining the necessary permits for your home project. It is a continual learning process because there are never two projects quite alike, and the same question is never asked twice.

Please remember that most projects require a building permit. Fences, sheds, decks, stairways, patios, new roofs, and different siding all require a permit. Fences and driveways are exempt from setbacks.

## MOSQUITO CONTROL COMMISSION'S REPORT

The Mosquito Control Commission has a daunting task due to the fact that a significant area of the town' topography is composed of wetlands and salt marshes. There are hundreds of acres of mosquito breeding areas in the Town of Rye. These areas must be monitored and controlled continuously through the Spring and Summer months.

The Commission has diversified its effort to include many innovations for controlling mosquitos. A "state of the art" project is currently being used which is a capture and release method in which predatory minnows called Mummichogs are used to control mosquitos in wetland breeding areas. A new type of method called "Throw Trapping" has resulted in our ability to capture hundreds of these minnows at a low cost.

The Commission has partnered with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the NH Office of State Planning ( National Estuaries Project ) to restore several acres of salt marsh for improved fish and wildlife habitat and due to the Mummichog Project, these restored areas no longer require mosquito control applications.

The drought of 1999 had profound effects on mosquito breeding areas. The Red Maple Swamps and woodland pools were very dry and did not produce a heavy influx of mosquitos, however, the salt marshes were active mosquito breeding areas during the Summer as tidal flooding of the marshes occurred every month from May to September.

The Commission is very concerned with the outbreak of the West Nile Virus which is transmitted by mosquitos and occurred in New York last Summer. We are also monitoring this situation with regard for the potential of this virus to occur in our area. The Commission is also monitoring the situation with regard to Eastern Equine Encephalitis outbreaks in 1998 on the Rhode Island / Massachusetts borders.

The Commission is continuing to work on a long range plan to reduce potential and actual mosquito breeding areas and enhance the environment at the same time.

Our appreciation is also extended to the Rye School system: the Rye School Board, Superintendent Maio, Principals Cushing, Ingraham and Livingstone, as well as the support staff of both schools. As the Recreation Department does not have a functional building, we frequently rely upon the schools to provide a space for our programs. We appreciate their support.

The Recreation Department has been very active in 1999, sponsoring 26 different programs (9 of which were new offerings in 1999). We have stayed true to our goal of strengthening the adult offerings of the Recreation Department. Our youth programming has also expanded to encompass the Elementary Aged Afterschool Program in 1999. This program serves fifty children per day, primarily children of families where both parents are employed outside the home, as well as single parent families. The Recreation Department's involvement in this program allows recreational opportunities to be offered within the context of the afternoon schedule while their parents are at work. The Afterschool Program offered six-week classes (with professional instruction) in: Watercolor, Guitar, Drama Workshop, Gift-making and Soccer. The children are supervised by highly interactive Counselors (all with a college degree and experience with child development / education) through an afternoon mix of structured time for homework and free time to develop and explore friendships. The program offers quality care at a very reasonable cost, and is self-supporting.

The Recreation Department returned a total of \$81,000 in program fees, which was 67% of the total Recreation Department budget. This meant that the net cost to the town was reduced to \$40,000. This is approximately the same cost to the Town as in 1994, when the percentage of return against the budget was 23%, with substantially fewer services offered to the residents of Rye.

The residents of Rye owe a strong vote of thanks for the outstanding job that continues to be done by our excellent Recreation Director, Jody Jackson. As the only full-time staff member in the Recreation Department, she initiates and manages a wide variety of programs through part-time staff and volunteers who recognize her creativity, enthusiasm, capability and genuine caring in bringing her very best to the children and adults of Rye. I would also like to personally thank the Rye Recreation Commissioners, Selectmen and the many people of Rye for their dedication and support of Rye Recreation. I am proud to be a part of it.

In the year 2000, the Recreation Department will be working toward extending the Town water line to include the Recreation Area, improving the facility with running water and restrooms. #### RYE HARBOR

In May, 1792, the town voted a committee to dig out Rye harbor between Ragged Neck and Little Neck, and appointed a committee of seven "to dig out where they think it proper." "At a legal meeting chose Samuel Jenness, Moderator to hear report of Committee chosen to view the harbor betwixt Little Neck and Ragged Neck. At said meeting chose Nathan Goss, Simon Jenness, Capt. Joseph Jenness, John Garland, John Webster, Reuben Philbrick, and Jeremiah Berry, a committee to dig out a harbor where they think proper. The following are the subscriptions or work to complete the harbor."

Dated April 9, 1792,

**NOTE:** There follows a list of forty five names, the first of which was:

Nathan Goss, 15 days and 10 Gals. Rum.

## LIBRARY DIRECTOR'S REPORT

This year has been one of amazing change and growth for the library. We opened our newly expanded building on January 16, after being closed for over two months. After nearly ten years in the planning, fund-raising and construction phase, the Town has a library of which to be very proud. The new facility doubled in size, added a computer system, a thirty-slot parking lot, an elevator, children's and adult computer rooms, a sixty-seat capacity meeting room and expanded both its' children's and adult areas. The expanded hours are: Monday, Wednesday and Friday from nine to five, Tuesday and Thursday from one to eight and Saturday from nine to three. Our web page has been redesigned and offers the ability to search our catalog from your home or office. The site address is: [www.nh.ultranet.com/~ryepl](http://www.nh.ultranet.com/~ryepl).

It was also a year for numerous personnel changes. Kathleen Teaze, director for nine years, resigned. Her expert skills are now being enjoyed by the public library on Sanibel Island, Florida where she is a reference librarian. Sherry Evans was appointed director in June. Sherry is a New Hampshire native and returns to the area after nine years of living in the West and Southwest. Randall O'Brien was added as Adult Services Librarian; a move from his former part-time duties as Circulation Assistant. Marnie Tracey, Children's Librarian, resigned in the Fall of 1998 and was very ably replaced in the Spring of 1999 by Rye resident, Julie Doherty. Jonathan Ramsay, another Rye resident, joined the staff over the summer through a work-study program as computer technician. Our experienced staff of Tricia Quinn, Pam Jautaikis and Sharon Macdonald expertly saw us through the staff changes and building opening and our faithful pages, Stef Metalious and Hunter Emery, returned for the summer.

Children's programming continues to grow in our expanded facility. The Summer Reading program, 'Once upon a summer reading', had 244 Readers of the Round Table, logging a total of 673 hours and 43 minutes of reading time over the summer. Loris Burbine, of Classics Alive, performed spellbinding renditions of several fairy tales and Pat Spalding led a puppet workshop which ended with an original presentation of 'The Frog Princess'. The summer program concluded with a Medieval Faire including juggling, jousting, and bobbing for apples. Throughout the year Story Times were offered twice weekly, young adult book discussions occurred on a monthly basis and book talks and visits were made to local schools and day care centers.

1999 saw the reintroduction of Adult programming. An adult book discussion began in April with 15-20 (and growing) participants meeting monthly. Drop-in, beginning Internet classes were offered twice each month and were well-attended. A monthly poetry reading/discussion began in November. The Friends of the Library inaugurated a Speaker Series which drew in 212 Seacoast residents. Topics, including slide presentations, varied from Rye history to seacoast aquaculture to Tales from the Big Apple and mountain climbing. The series continues in 2000. The Friends also successfully hosted their annual book and bake sale in July.

#### NAMES OF RYE ROADS

In 1893, one hundred and sixty-seven years after Rye was set off from Newcastle as a separate parish, and more than a century after its final and complete political separation from the parent town, it occurred to the people of Rye that it was advisable to do something that had never been done, that would probably prove a convenience and certainly could do no harm, and that would cost nothing, namely, to give official names to the highways of the town. In accordance with this idea, at an adjourned town meeting held the 15<sup>th</sup> day of March in that year, it was "Voted to accept the report of the selectmen in regard to naming the roads," from which it is reasonable to infer that the subject had been considered and some action taken at a previous meeting, although the town records do not say so, nor is the report of the selectmen given.

Note: The Parsons' History of Rye indicates that in many cases our roads follow old Indian trails used in their travels from one hunting ground to another and from the seashore to the interior. He adds that these trails were "always well located"..... "The Indians were tireless travelers, when the occasion required, but much preferred an easy route to a difficult one when they had the choice."

## LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT

1999 has been an exciting year for the Rye Public Library. It has been a "settling in" time. The Library opened its newly expanded and remodeled building in mid-January, after nearly a three month hiatus of being closed to allow for renovations to the old part of the library and completion of the new. The expanded building more than doubled the space available in the previous library, but also included all the attributes that make the building and all of its facilities fully accessible by the handicapped.

Our previous Library Director, Kathleen Teaze, resigned in December as she planned to move to Florida, where she is now employed as a reference librarian.

Sherry Evans, MLS, joined our staff in January as a staff librarian. The Trustees initiated an intensive search in April for a new Library Director and Sherry was chosen from a field of applicants. She assumed Library directorship duties in June.

In many ways this "settling in" year can be compared to a rising meteorite. Sherry and her dedicated staff have assessed the needs of our patrons – from early childhood forward. The result has been the development of several innovative programs, which have been well received by patrons, and continue to grow in depth and numbers. (Please see the Library Director's report for details.)

The Trustees, Victor Azzi, Judy Gaskell, and Bettey Tobey, have continued to provide the leadership, under RSA202-A:11, to develop policies for Library operations, to adopt relevant rules and regulations, prepare the annual budget, expend all monies raised by the town for Library purposes, and expend income from all trust funds for Library purposes for support and maintenance of the Library, as necessary.

To this end, the Trustees have worked conscientiously with the Director to obtain funding for our new computer system, whose linkages with our two schools infinitely expands students' abilities to research and otherwise enhance their in-school learning opportunities.

We have added a part-time contract bookkeeper, Kathy Benevento, who also works with two other seacoast Libraries. Kathy has structured and implemented a bookkeeping system that meets Generally Accepted Accounting Principles. Her involvement has insured the highest level of compliance with annual audit practices. Obviously, this minimizes any potential problems.

Overall, 1999 has been a great year for your Library. Programming will continue forward, thanks to a superb combination of staff, very capable Directorship, and intense Trustees involvement, all cohered by a supportive town whose residents are responsible for the new building and continued support for our programs and developments.

In closing, I wish to thank the townspeople for their support of my six years as Trustee, the last two as Chairman. The goal I envisioned both as a Trustee and for a few years before as "ardent onlooker" has been met. Your new Library has been brought "on-line". The best possible staffing has enabled the best possible programming. My biggest "wish" is that this



community support continues forever. The numbers speak for themselves. The “wish” has become and will continue to be a reality. Thank you, Rye.

**PUBLIC LIBRARY – SLEEPER LEGACY**

Of the thirty-seven towns in Rockingham county thirty-six have public libraries in successful operation, the one lonesome town that stands out in such splendid isolation being Rye; and yet Rye came very near establishing a public library so long ago that if it had been established it would have put the town well up toward the head of the list of New Hampshire towns having such institutions, in the order of their creation.

Oliver Sleeper, a native of Rye, who died in Massachusetts, left to the town by will about \$8,000 for a library, with the proviso that if the town declined to accept the bequest it should go in equal sums to the two churches (the Congregational and the Christian) of the town. A special town meeting was called for August 1, 1883, to take action on the question of accepting the legacy. That was the farmers' busiest time of year --- haying time --- and as the meeting was generally assumed to be a mere matter of form, and the acceptance of the bequest by unanimous vote a certainty, only a handful of the town's three hundred and more voters attended the meeting, and the vote stood twenty-six against acceptance to six in favor of accepting.

Then came something very like a storm.....

.....  
It was about ten years from the time of the first town meeting to act in the matter before the dispute was settled by the court, the decision being that the legacy which in the meantime had been much reduced by litigation belonged to the two churches, which together received about \$3,000. All the benefit the town ever received from the legacy was three or four hundred dollars as costs of court, which it had to pay.

Every year since the movement for providing state-aided town libraries began, an article has been inserted in the election warrant for Rye to take the sense of the voters on the question “Is it expedient to establish a town library?” and every year the town meeting has voted “No” by a large majority.

## PLANNING BOARD'S REPORT

As land prices continued to soar at the close of the millenium, pressure mounted to develop every square inch of Rye real estate! The voters agreed with the Board in March, 1999 that a larger lot size should be introduced in the Single Residence District and consequently, there were fewer subdivision proposals in the first part of this year as developers regrouped their holdings. Meanwhile, the Board kept very busy revising the building code, drafting stricter zoning laws and reorganizing the land development regulations.

We expect to complete the reorganization of the subdivision and site plan regulations in 2000. Another goal for 2000 is to explore further the concept of open space zoning and over 55 age-restricted subdivisions. Considerable time was spent on this subject during 1999. We also monitored the town-wide drainage plan and considered ways to improve drainage & grading on individual lots under construction.

## BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

The Board of Adjustment consists of five selectmen appointed members: Chairman David Wajda; Vice Chairman Frank Drake; Clerk Benjamin King; Gregg Mikolaities; and Betty Menson. The alternates are: Carlene Carey; John Facella; and Raymond Samplawski.

The duties and powers of the board are prescribed by NH State Law and delineated in the Rye Zoning Ordinance. Mostly the Board hears four types of appeals:

**Variations:** to authorize upon appeal, in specific cases, variances from the terms of the Ordinance provided that all five of these conditions can be met:

1. Proposed use would not diminish the value of abutting property;
2. Granting the variance will not be contrary to the public interest;
3. Denial of the variance would result in unnecessary hardship to the owner because of unique features of the land;
4. Granting the variance will do substantial justice;
5. The proposed use is not contrary to the spirit of the Ordinance.

**Special Exceptions:** to decide special exceptions to the Ordinance which are specially delineated in the Ordinance. The granting of a special exception is a matter of right, not a privilege provided that: the request is not injurious or detrimental to the neighborhood; is in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the Ordinance; and meets all the rules and requirements for that exception.

**Appeals:** to hear appeals from administrative decisions where it is alleged that the Zoning Officer has incorrectly applied terms of the Ordinance.

**Equitable Waivers of Dimensional Requirements:** The Board may grant an equitable waiver only for existing dimensional nonconformities provided the applicant can meet the required standards as listed in the Zoning Ordinance.

The Board heard 54 petitions in 1999 as follows:

The power to grant appeals is treated with respect and with the knowledge that the task of the BOA is to correct inequities and not to create them.

The BOA had a 1999 budget appropriation of \$5,304. It had revenues of \$5237.

The members of the Board have consistently demonstrated a very professional attitude in determining the merits of all the petitions that have been presented to them.

A debt of gratitude is owed to Therese Zartarian who served the Board as Recording Secretary for 10 years. We are fortunate to have found a very capable replacement in Michele Scannell.

## CONSERVATION COMMISSION'S REPORT

In 1999 the number of wetland applications that required conservation site inspections with owners and engineers increased. The Conservation Commission was able to maintain minimum impact in wetland buffer zones. The developer on Washington Road agreed to a conservation easement on 80.5 acres and conservation restriction on 66.07 acres with a management plan on the property to be developed so minimum impact during construction will occur.

Conservation Commission members participated in a public hearing at the Wetland Board concerning the bridge building over a salt marsh. As the impact in the buffer zone would negatively impact the Marsh we oppose this type of construction. (The bridge would be 104 ft. long and if it was twelve feet wide it would have to be twelve feet high.) The Conservation Commission assisted the Town Forest Committee with the town warrant article to protect the 176 acres in perpetuity.

The Conservation Commission mission statement is:

The Rye Conservation Commission is committed to the protection and proper utilization of Rye's natural resources. The commission will serve as gatekeeper for environmental concerns in the town of Rye and act as advisors to other municipal boards. The Commission will be a resource for information about Rye's natural resources and environmental welfare.

The Conservation Commission and the New Hampshire Coastal Program has completed another matching grant salt marsh restoration project. This is to replace an undersized culvert and open a marsh channel at Wallis Sands, additional culvert installation and removal of spoils at the road crossing on Harbor Road, and open marsh channels and farmers ditches to reduce the growth of phragmites on Harbor Road. This will increase the total salt marsh restoration in the town of Rye to over three hundred acres during the past five years. In 1999 the Rye Conservation Commission will be making application to the NH Coastal Program to work in conjunction with the Federal Reserve Program and the Army Corps of Engineers for restoration work at Awcomin Marsh. (This project was held over from 1998 because the Army Corps had designs attached which NRCS completes at no extra charge for the town.)

The most important land protection completed this year was the Conservation Commission and the Water Department purchase of 52 acres of forest adjacent to the new well in the same area we purchased five acres from Mr. Eldridge making nearly 60 acres of protected forest.

In closing I would like to thank the members of the Conservation Commission for the dedication and hard work of all members during the year.

## HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION'S REPORT

The Rye Historic District covers the area between Grange Park, where Washington Rd. and Wallis Rd. meet, to the War Memorial, where Washington Rd. and Central Rd. meet, and within 500 feet of either side of the Center of Washington Rd. The District also includes the Isles of Shoals in Rye, the Brackett Road Massacre Site and the Cable House at 20 Old Beach Road.

The Cable House and 570 Washington Rd. (next to the Church) were both completely restored this year. They are fine examples of how the Historic District can be enriched.

Established in 1978 by a vote of town residents, the Historic District Commission is made up of seven appointed and sworn members and two appointed and sworn alternate members.

The Historic District Commission continues to be committed to:

Promoting the preservation and maintenance of the properties within the District.

Insuring that new construction and alterations are in harmony with the District.

Reviewing new uses of land or buildings within the District.

While the Commission is concerned primarily with maintaining the visual impact of modifications to property and use, any project within the district requiring a building permit must come before the Commission.

In addition to reviewing specific applications, the HDC continues to focus on the preservation and use of Parsons Field. The water hydrant has been moved away from the opening in the stone wall and is now quite inconspicuous in location, height and color.

The Commission will request to have the revised Policies and Guidelines for the Use of Parsons Park included in the Town Newsletter and on the Rye Web Site.

The HDC is actively involved in the on-going efforts to renovate the Rye Fire Station, the yet to be completed 1810 Parsonage, and the renovation of the Rye Town Museum.

The over-grown bushes at the War Memorial were removed this fall. The Rye Driftwood Garden Club donated the six new low growing junipers. The Highway Department and volunteers did the actual work. The recommendation was made by the HDC. The Board of Selectmen approved.

Historic Districts and Forests are precious community resources and a haven from development and growth that continues to alter the entire seacoast area. Historic areas are fragile environments. We welcome your active participation in protecting these locations for the enjoyment and appreciation of generations yet to come.

HDC meets the second Wednesday every other month as a general rule unless a specific situation arises that needs to be addressed. The next regularly scheduled meeting will be April 12, 2000. All meetings are posted at the Town Hall, Library, Post Office and should be listed on the Rye Web Site: <http://www.rye.com/town>

#### COMMON

It is not known just when the common or training field was laid out, but probably at a very early date. The continental militia received their first lessons in discipline and field exercises on the common. And later it was customary for the state militia to drill there, and some of our citizens remember well when the captain gave the order for his men to fire their guns while on the “double quick” around the elms in front of Isaac D. Rand’s.

In 1798 the town voted: “The Selectmen may sell the training field.” It was not sold, and eight years later the town enlarged the grounds by purchasing more land at a cost of \$67.50.

#### SHEEP

In the year 1779 the town voted: “That the rams in this parish be confined by the owners thereof from the first of September until the last of October next. And if any ram be found loose in that time, he that takes him up shall notify the owner thereof, and if he refuses to pay the charges thereof the person who took up said ram may sell said ram in eight days after proper notice is given.” Each owner probably had an earmark for his sheep, and it was his duty to notify the town clerk of the earmark used by him for marking his cattle and sheep, for it must be remembered that all stock was turned out on the commons together, and the town clerk was required to keep a record of the different earmarks.

## RYE HISTORICAL SOCIETY'S REPORT

### RYE TOWN MUSEUM

The Rye Historical Society reports that progress is steady in the effort to turn the small white building adjacent to the Library into a Museum for the Town of Rye.

The second floor has been renovated to be research space, workspace, and storage. The Society is in the process of painting and putting down carpeting. The bathroom has been rehabbed and a small kitchen area is being added. Shelves will be added and computer work space is being planned. The Society will be moving into this area during the spring and will begin to catalog and sort our treasures.

The first floor of the building has been turned into two large, open rooms that will be devoted to display space. Next year by this time we hope that you will visit us and see what has been accomplished for yourselves.

A spare furnace from the old apartment building that was taken down to make way for the Library expansion, is up and running and the old cast iron radiators keep the building toasty.

Rye Public Works Department has helped with grading and building a stone retaining wall at the back of the building. During the summer we will be doing finish landscaping.

Rye Water Department has hooked the building up to water.

The exterior of the building has new siding and doors, and will be finish painted during the summer.

The Society is grateful to local contractors, tradesmen, volunteers, and the Board of Selectmen, for their continued interest and suggestions during the past year. We encourage you to keep track of our progress and visit when we open at the end of the year.

**ARTICLE 1.** To choose one (1) **Selectman** for three (3) years, one (1) **Moderator** for two (2) years, one (1) **Supervisor of the Check List** for six (6) years, one (1) **Sewer Commissioner** for three (3) years, one (1) **Cemetery Trustee** for three (3) years, one (1) **Library Trustee** for three (3) years, one (1) **Trustee of the Trust Funds** for three (3) years, two (2) **Budget Committee Members** for three (3) years, two (2) **Planning Board Members** for three (3) years, one (1) **Treasurer** for a three (3) years, and one (1) **Town Clerk/Tax Collector** for three (3) years.

**ARTICLE 2.** To choose all necessary officers for the Rye School District in accordance with the statutory procedure adopted by said District at its March 1962 annual meeting.

**ARTICLE 3.** To see if the Town will vote to amend the Rye Zoning Ordinance in accordance with the recommendations of the Planning Board as follows:

**Note:** In the following amendments, new text is emboldened and in { }+s. Deleted text is ~~struck through~~.

Amendment 1: Re: Residential Uses in Commercial District

Delete residential uses from the uses allowed in the Commercial District by amending Section 211.1 Permitted Uses [in Commercial District], as follows:

211.1 Permitted Uses: In a C District the following uses are permitted:

- A. Any use permitted in any residence district including accessory uses so authorized, and subject to all limitations there applicable, **{except that residential uses, including single family dwellings and two family dwellings, are not permitted.}**

Amendment 2: Re: Annual Building Permit Limitation

Amend Section 901.1 Annual [Building Permit] Limitation to reduce the annual building permit limitation from 1.75% to 0.75%.

Amendment 3: Re: Upland Soils

Add the following new Section 202.13 to Section 202 Applicability of Use District Regulations and add the following two new definitions to the Appendix of Definitions:

**{202.13 Upland Soils: All lots shall have at least 44,000 square feet of upland soils, of which at least 30,000 square feet shall be contiguous.}**

New definitions to be added to Appendix:

**Upland Soils: Soils which are non-wetland soils. Such soils may be: (1) any soil other than poorly drained or very poorly drained soils, as delineated by High Intensity Soils (HIS) mapping done by a certified soils scientist; or (2) any non-hydric soil, as mapped by a certified soils scientist.}**

**Hydric Soil: A soil that formed under conditions of saturation, flooding or ponding long enough during the growing season to develop anaerobic conditions in the upper part. See NH ADMIN RULES Env-Ws 1002.36 (August 26, 1999).}**

Amendment 4: Re: Storm Water Management

Add the following new Section 507 Storm Water Management to the Zoning Ordinance.

{SECTION 507  
STORM WATER MANAGEMENT

507.1 Purpose.

It is the intent of this section to regulate building and land development so that surface water drainage from building and land development does not adversely affect adjacent properties, watercourses or the town's storm drainage system.

507.2 Drainage Onto Adjacent Properties.

No use of land; no construction, reconstruction, alterations, replacement, or expansion of buildings, structures and impermeable surfaces; no grading of the land; and no destruction or alteration of natural vegetation or ground cover shall increase the surface water drainage flowing onto an adjacent property unless a drainage easement allowing such flowage in perpetuity is recorded.

507.3 Drainage Into Watercourses/Town Drainage System.

No use of land; no construction, reconstruction, alterations, replacement, or expansion of buildings, structures and impermeable surfaces; no grading of the land; and no destruction or alteration of natural vegetation or ground cover shall increase the surface water drainage or flowage into existing water courses or into the town's storm drainage system unless the Public Works Director determines that the water course or drainage system will have the capacity to accommodate the additional flow, both now and in the future.

#### 507.4 Drainage and Drainage Plan Required.

A Drainage and Grading Plan shall be submitted with the building permit application whenever the following occurs:

- A. The initial development of a vacant lot.
- B. The replacement of a principal building on a lot.

#### 507.5 Requirements for Drainage and Grading Plan.

The Drainage and Grading Plan required by this section shall:

- A. Be drawn at a scale not smaller than 1" = 20'.
- B. Show the footprints of all buildings on the lot; all drives, walks, decks, patios, walls and other impermeable surfaces; and all lawn areas.
- C. Include a plan view of all roof areas, decks and patios with vectors indicating the direction of flow off of each such surface.
- D. Show the location on the lot of all points where drainage from roofs will flow onto the lot. A description of the roof drainage system shall be included on the plan.
- E. Show all areas where the existing vegetation or ground cover will be removed or disturbed and the areas where the existing vegetation or ground cover will not be disturbed. For the purposes of this section, the planting of a lawn is considered to be a disturbance of the natural ground cover.
- F. Show the pre development and post development contours of the lot at one foot intervals for areas being disturbed and at two foot intervals for areas not being disturbed.
- G. Show elevations for the sills of all buildings, street elevations along the street frontage every twenty feet; and elevations of all drainage system facilities such as catch basin inverts and ditch flow lines.

H. Show the location of all on-site waste disposal systems. The contours of the finished grading of such systems should be included in (F), above.

I. Reference all elevations and contours to National Geodetic Vertical Datum of 1929 (NGVD).

J. Show all on site drainage retention facilities to be constructed.

K. Show all erosion control methods to be used during construction and development.

L. Indicate the pre development and post development flows off of the lot for the 25 year/24 hour storm and the 100 year/24 hour storm calculated in accordance with the Soil Conservation Service's technical standards. Sufficient points of analysis shall be included to accomplish the purposes of this section.

M. Include a breakdown of the above flows categorized by drainage from buildings; drainage from other impermeable areas; drainage from lawn areas.

N. Be stamped by a professional engineer registered in the State of New Hampshire.

O. Be accompanied by a written hydrological analysis, prepared by a professional engineer registered in the State of New Hampshire, which contain all of the technical support for the information shown on the plan.

The Drainage and Grading Plan may contain as many sheets as are necessary to portray the required information.

#### 507.6 Approval of Drainage and Grading Plan.

A building permit shall not be issued unless the required Drainage and Grading Plan has been approved by the Building Inspector. A plan shall not be approved:

A. If it does not comply with the standards of Sections 507.2 and 507.3; or

B. If it destroys or does not include adequate means to protect significant natural features such as trees,

scenic points, brooks, streams, rock outcroppings, water bodies, wetlands, other natural features and historic landmarks.

The Building Inspector may have the plan reviewed by the Town Engineer, in which case the applicant shall be responsible for payment of the engineer's fee.

#### 507.7 Status of Approved Plans.

When a Drainage and Grading Plan has been approved for a lot, no further construction of buildings and structures on the lot, grading of the lot or removal of natural vegetation and ground cover on the lot shall occur without the submittal of an amended plan to the Building Inspector and the Building Inspector's approval thereof.}

#### Amendment 5: Re: Bed & Breakfast Facilities

Amend Section 203.2 Uses Permitted By Special Exception [in the SR District] and Section 204.2 Uses Permitted By Special Exception [in the GR District] by adding the following to each section.

{J. Bed & Breakfast Facilities, subject to limitations for customary home occupations in Section 203.1.C and subject also to site plan review by the Planning Board.}

#### Amendment 6: Re: Lot Coverage/Coastal Area Overlay District

Amend Section 304.5 Coverage to change the restriction on dwelling coverage from 20% to 15% and to change the restriction on total coverage of buildings, paved driveways, sidewalks and other impermeable surfaces from 50% to 30%.

#### Amendment 7: Re: Building Height/Coastal Area Overlay District

Amend Section 304.4 Building Height as follows:

304.4 Building Height: Within the Coastal Area District, building height shall not exceed the greater of: ~~(1) 28 feet or (2) the average height of the adjacent dwellings on either side.~~

Amendment 8: Re: Vacant Non-conforming Lots/Coastal Area Overlay District.

Amend Section 304.3 Vacant Non-Conforming Lots, as follows:

Section 304.3 Vacant Non-Conforming Lots. [In Coastal Area District]

For variance applications to build on a {**an existing**} non-conforming lot located in the Coastal Area District, the Board of Adjustment shall apply the following criteria in order to determine whether the application is contrary to the public interest and/or observes the spirit of the Zoning Ordinance.

{**This section shall not apply to variance applications to create a new non-conforming lot by subdivision. In Paragraphs A and B below, the 7000 square feet standard applies only to existing lots of record. It is not to be construed as a minimum lot size for subdivision purposes**}.

- A. Building on lots less than 7,000 square feet in area shall be prohibited.
- B. For lots 7,000 square feet in area or larger, the lot shall not be materially smaller than developed lots in the surrounding area. In making this determination, the Board shall first consider developed abutting lots. If there are an insufficient number of such lots to make a determination, the board shall then consider the size of developed lots within the same block. If there still are an insufficient number of developed lots, the board shall consider the size of developed lots in the neighborhood.

Explanatory Note: This amendment is a clarification of the intent of Section 304.3.



Amendment 9: Re: Access to Lots

Add the following new Section 202.14 to Section 202  
Applicability of Use District Requirements:

{202.14 Access to Lots: Access to a lot shall be over its own frontage. (While a lot may be reached via a shared driveway by permission of the Planning Board for safety reasons, a lot shall not be considered suitable for development unless it is accessible over its own frontage.)}

Amendment 10: Re: Zoning Map Change

Amend the "Zoning Map Town of Rye" to reclassify (i.e. rezone) the following land from Business District to General Residence District:

Tax Map 5.1, Lots 51, 51-1, 51-2. These are the three lots on the south side of Perkins Road, directly behind the Dunes Motel and Restaurant.

Amendment 11: Zoning Map Change

Amend the "Zoning Map Town of Rye" to reclassify (i.e. rezone) the following land from Business District to General Residence District:

Tax Map 5.3, Lot 2: Ocean Scape Condominiums.

**ARTICLE 4.** To see if the Town will vote to amend THE BUILDING CODE OF RYE, NEW HAMPSHIRE, as recommended by the Rye Planning Board, as follows:

Amendment No. 1: Re: Adoption of Revised Building Code

Amend the Building Code by adopting the comprehensively revised Building Code which has been prepared by the Rye Planning Board.

Explanatory Note: The amendment replaces the present building code with a comprehensively revised building code. The revised code eliminates the text of code sections which are either outdated or duplicative of the national codes which the Town has adopted over the years. The revised code also includes new, more restrictive regulations of septic systems. A copy of the new building code is posted at the Town Hall, and copies are available at the office of the Building Inspector and Planning and Zoning Administrator. A copy will also be posted at the polling place.

Amendment No. 2: Re: Deletion of Pipeline Code

Amend the Building Code by deleting the Pipeline Code.

Explanatory Note: Both the present Building Code and Revised Building Code contain approximately 6 pages of detailed pipeline regulations adopted during the 1970's when a major offshore oil refinery project was proposed for the seacoast region. Amendment 2 would delete these provisions from the building code, whether or not Amendment 1 is adopted.

This is a non-lapsing appropriation that will not lapse until the project is complete or in five years (December 31, 2003), whichever occurs first. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

These funds shall only be used in the event the Rye Highway Department cannot complete the project. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

**ARTICLE 12.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be used to support the litigation challenging the validity of House Bill 999 (**State Wide Property Tax**), with such amount to be funded from the 1999 undesignated fund balance (surplus). It is the intent of this Article to recapture a portion of the unexpended administrative funds that were provided to the Town by the State pursuant to House Bill 999. **ARTICLE 15.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to be added to the non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI established by Article 8 at the 1997 Rye Town Meeting for the purpose of engineering, designing, and installing an overall drainage plan for the Town of Rye updating the current drainage system. This is a non-lapsing appropriation that will not lapse until the project is complete or in five (5) years (December 31, 2003), whichever occurs first. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

Should this article be defeated, the default operating budget shall be \$4,326,180, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Mills, Jr., and at least 24 other voters of the Town of Rye, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred and sixty six dollars (\$7,566.00) to be paid to Janet Thompson, representing the remainder of her salary account from the 1999 budget, and further authorize that such sum be taken from the undesignated 1999 fund balance (surplus), in recognition of 14 years of excellent service above and beyond the job description for her position. It is widely recognized that Janet Thompson saved this town thousands of dollars over her tenure here. This payment is only a small fraction of the amount she saved the taxpayers.

**ARTICLE 18.** To see if the Town will vote to accept the recommendations of the Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee appointed by the Selectmen to protect the Town Forest in perpetuity. These recommendations seek to balance the protection of the Town Forest with the reasonable organized recreation needs of Town residents, as follows:

1. To authorize and direct the Selectmen to grant and convey to the Rockingham County Conservation District a Conservation Easement on approximately 176 acres of Town Forest, including all woods, fields, swamps and marshland located within the lot boundaries of the Assessor's Lots described below. The Conservation Easement shall be in the form recommended by the Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee and approved by Town Counsel. OWNERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT OF THE TOWN FOREST SHALL REMAIN WITH THE TOWN OF RYE.

2. To designate as a Town Recreation Area the approximately 14 acres, including the current soccer fields, little league fields, parking area, the area around and behind the Recreation Building, and an area of approximately 5 acres of woodland north and west of the soccer fields and parking lot, shown on Plan entitled "Sketch Plan, Recreation Road, Rye, NH", dated 1/ /00, prepared by James Verra and Associates, Inc. The 14 acres shall be expressly excluded from

the Conservation Easement. The Town Recreation Area shall be used for future recreational needs, both active and passive, of the Town of Rye and shall be managed by the Rye Recreation Commission. The Rye Recreation Commission shall consult with the Rye Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee and the Rye Conservation Commission regarding any development plans for the Town Recreation Area so as to minimize to the extent possible the environmental damage arising from such development. Any future development of the Town Recreation Area, including any cutting of trees in the approximately 5-acre portion of the Town Recreation Area located north and west of the current soccer fields and the parking lot except for the cutting of individual trees that are diseased or are a hazard to public safety, must first be approved by the Board of Selectmen and the residents of Rye through a vote at Town Meeting.

**ARTICLE 19.** By petition of Joseph G. Mills, Jr. and at least 24 other voters of the Town of Rye, are you in favor of authorizing the Town of Rye Selectmen to withhold the State Education Funding portion of the 1999 Town of Rye real estate tax bill to be held in an escrow account until such time that the court rules on the fairness of the recent bill (**State Wide Property Tax**) enacted by the House and Senate and signed into law by the Governor?

**ARTICLE 20.** To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 273-A: 12, III, to accept the fact finder's recommendations on the cost items only for a collective bargaining agreement with the Rye Fire Association, Teamster's Local 633, which calls for the following increases in salaries and related benefits (i.e. FICA, etc.):

Such sum representing the additional cost attributable to the increase in salaries and related benefits for the years as indicated over those paid in prior fiscal years, plus payment of the retroactive increases for 1999. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

Note: The Board of Selectmen has rejected the fact finder's recommendations and the Rye Fire Association, Teamster's Local 633 has accepted the Fact Finder's recommendations. A "yes" vote is to accept the fact Finder's recommendations and a "no" vote is to reject the fact finder's recommendations.

**ARTICLE 21.** Shall the Town, if Article 20 is defeated, authorize the governing body to call one special town meeting, at its option, to address the any cost items that may be agreed to through continued collective bargaining between the Town of Rye and the Rye Fire Association, Teamster's Local 633.

**ARTICLE 22.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt the recommendations of the New Hampshire Municipal Association to change the title of **Administrative Assistant to Town Administrator** to reflect the high degree of knowledge and professionalism required to effectively discharge the duties of the position. The passage of this Article will not result in any change in the duties, authority or responsibility exercised by the position.







## HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

1999 was an interesting and productive year for me as Health Officer. I have continued to monitor RSA-143A health regulation compliance of local restaurants and the other food-vending establishments as well as those regulations pertaining to child-care facilities.

For the past several years rabies had been an ever present concern here in Rye as in other towns and cities throughout New Hampshire. In 1998 there were 83 cases of animal rabies statewide and no reported cases of human rabies. In 1999 there were 47 cases of animal rabies reported and again no human cases reported in the state of New Hampshire. This represents a 43% decrease in animal rabies. Fortunately, there were no reported cases of animal or human rabies reported in Rye for 1998. In 1999, however there was one animal, a raccoon, positive for rabies but no human cases were reported in Rye.

We have continued, as in past years, to offer immunizations against the rabies virus to Police and Fire personnel, Highway and Transfer Station employees, and to the animal control officer. This is a cost-effective measure to guard against contracting rabies in those individuals with increased likelihood of being exposed. Hepatitis B immunizations also continue to be offered.

I have also worked with several State agencies in concert with Town officials to investigate reports of high coliform/bacterial counts in various areas of the Town. This, as well as many of my other duties, is an on-going process that will continue in the year 2000.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, numerous other Town Officials and personnel, both past and present, and the citizens of Rye for their continued support and cooperation. I have enjoyed serving the citizens of Rye and look forward to a busy and productive year 2000.

A glimpse into our past : L. B. Parsons, *A History of Rye, N. H. 1623 – 1903*, (1905)

### PHYSICIANS

The first resident physician in Rye was Dr. Joseph Parsons, who commenced practising about 1770. Prior to that time physicians were called upon from Portsmouth and Hampton to attend the sick. Dr. Parsons studied medicine with Dr. Dearborn of North Hampton and was succeeded by his son, John Wilkes Parsons. His prominent traits of character were independence, decision, and energy.

## WELFARE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The revised Statutes Annotated 165.1 mandates that welfare must be given to any person in Town who is unable to support him/her self. As the Welfare Director, I am responsible to the Selectmen (overseers of the poor) and I assist them in administering the fund.

The largest item in my budget is rent and \$26,461 was spent for the 1999 year. During the past year, approximately 45 clients were served by this office, some for a one-time emergency and others on a regular basis. When clients do not have a job, we provide a work search form and expect that they will follow through before they return. Since the economy has remained favorable, many were able to obtain employment and had no need to return for help.

This year we received \$7578.00 payback from clients. This money goes to the General Fund. Numerous baskets were given this year at Thanksgiving and Christmas thanks to the generosity of the Fire Department as well as the Girl Scouts and churches.

A glimpse into our past: L.B. Parsons, *A History of Rye, N.H. 1623 - 1903*, (1905)

### VOTED IN TOWN MEETING

An article was inserted in the warrant for the meeting held in 1836; "To see if the town will change the name of Rye to that of Rockville or Greenville, or any name they see proper to adopt". It was voted to postpone the article to change the name of Rye to that of Rockville or Greenville indefinitely.

At the same meeting it was voted that a committee shall be nominated by the selectmen to purchase a town farm. Capt. Samuel Jenness, Capt. John Clark, and Samuel Walker were chosen on said committee and authorized and empowered to purchase a farm for the town.

In 1838 the town voted "To purchase Lieut. Amos Seavey's farm and pay him the sum of \$4,000 on condition that he leave the manure on the same and give possession in the course of this month and that the Selectmen take a deed of said Seavey's farm as soon as convenient."

The town passed the following vote in 1842: "That all persons that do not pay their taxes shall be sent to the town farm to work it out.".....

.....In 1869 the town voted to sell the town farm.

**TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS  
1999 REPORT**

The Trustees deemed it prudent to lower equity exposure as the market continued to climb. Again the accent was on increasing income to both the library and cemetery funds. Short term bonds yielding in excess of 6% were purchased with the proceeds from equity sales.

Jane Ireland's knowledge of procedures and all around help have once again been invaluable.

Also, Walter Parenteau serves as Clerk-of-the-Works and Terry Zartarian as Administrative Assistant.

The Commission is responsible for the operation, maintenance, and billing of the sewer district which at present consists of 510 users. The Commission is also responsible for any extensions and /or expansions of the sewer into other areas of the town.

The Commission normally meets on the first Tuesday of every month at 6:00 P.M. at the Rye Town Hall. There are circumstances that change this allotted time, so check with the town hall to be sure a meeting is scheduled.

We were very sorry to accept the resignation of Leon Valley, who has been a part of this commission right from the beginning. We wish him lots of luck and happiness in his retirement.

Melia Michaud was voted in as the third member at the town elections. She brings with her all the knowledge and expertise that she gained as being the commission's previous administrative assistant. Congratulations are also extended to her on earning her degree in accounting.

Inspections are performed daily to insure that no interruptions or excessive costs are spent in maintaining normal sewer operations.

An increasing number of people are using a secondary meter to measure water usage for swimming pools and lawn irrigation. The reading from this secondary meter is credited to the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter billing each year.

Please note on your sewer bill the dates of usage that you are charged come from your Hampton Water Works bill for the same period of time.

## TOWN FOREST CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE'S REPORT

The Rye Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee was established pursuant to Article 15 of the 1998 Rye Town Warrant. The Committee was charged by the voters with the duty to 1) find a method by which to preserve in perpetuity the Town Forest as open conservation land and 2) develop legally binding restrictions to prevent any development in the existing Town Forest and any contiguous properties that are purchased, donated, or granted as Town Forest in the future. During the past two years, the Committee worked hard to develop a recommendation to the selectmen and the residents of Rye on how to protect in perpetuity the Rye Town Forest. Last year, the residents of Rye approved Article 26 of the 1999 Rye Town Warrant which designated 190 acres of Town-owned land as Town Forest, with an undetermined acreage thereof to be excepted out of the Town Forest and designated as Town Recreation Land. Article 27 of the 1999 Rye Town Warrant instructed the Committee to recommend a qualified land trust organization to hold a conservation easement requiring approval of a future town vote.

The Rye Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee has completed its work and has recommended to the Selectmen that 176 acres of Rye Town Forest be permanently protected through the granting of a Conservation Easement on those 176 acres to the Rockingham County Conservation District. Ownership and management of the Town Forest will remain with the Town of Rye. A Warrant Article requesting Town voters to authorize the Selectmen to grant this Conservation Easement was approved by the Selectmen on January 10<sup>th</sup> and will be on the Town Warrant for voter approval at the Rye 2000 Town Meeting in March.

In addition, the proposed Warrant Article requests the voters to designate 14 acres of land, including 5 acres of forest land adjacent to the current recreation area off Locke Road, as a Town Recreation Area to be managed by the Rye Recreation Commission. The Recreation Commission has agreed that no trees will be cut in these 5 acres of forest land, other than individual trees that are diseased or pose a hazard to public safety, without first obtaining the approval of the Selectmen and the voters at Town Meeting. The Recreation Commission has also agreed to participate in an informal committee that will seek to identify other sites in Rye that may be suitable for soccer fields, tennis courts, and other organized recreational facilities and to recommend to the Selectmen and the voters that feasible sites be acquired or otherwise secured for future recreational facility development.

This Town Forest Protection Warrant Article is supported by the Board of Selectmen, the Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee, the Rye Recreation Commission, the Rye Conservation Commission, and the Concerned Citizens of Rye.

I would like to thank the other members of the Committee for all their hard work during the past two years. These members were Jim Raynes, Janet Thompson, John Provencher, and Daane Crook.

## PARSONS FIELD COMMITTEE'S REPORT

In May of 1999, an ad hoc committee was created by the Board of Selectmen "to look into all the aspects of putting the field back into shape". Although this was the official charge to the committee, controversy both within and without the committee grew based on the fact that the proposed / voted gazebo (declared to be in violation of the deed restriction by Town Attorney Michael Donovan) was also mentioned in the initial letter to committee members.

Despite often heated and passionate debate related to the gazebo over the summer, in the final analysis the committee provided the selectmen with recommendations in keeping with the original charge as stated in their minutes. The Board of Selectmen took action on our initial suggestion to spread lime before winter in order to begin to counteract the high acidity of the soil. Our final report made the following additional recommendations:

1. Lime and fertilizer: The committee recommended that the soil be tested again in 2000 and, based on the results, lime and fertilizer be applied.
2. Additional maintenance: The committee suggested the removal of poison ivy and brush around the perimeter of the field as well as maintenance of the stone walls.
3. Electricity: The committee recommended replacement of the current temporary service with underground installation to a new, secured panel. It was also suggested that the selectmen revisit the issue of existing light poles as they relate to public safety.
3. Porta-potty and trash container: The committee, although it was not unanimous, recommended that one porta-potty and one trash container be maintained on a year round basis.
4. Town awareness of Parsons Field: The committee suggested that awareness of the availability of the field could be encouraged through use of volunteers, update and clarification of the Policy Guidelines, and use of the Town's web site and the selectmen's bimonthly newsletter.

The committee also reviewed, revised and coordinated existing guideline policies for use of Parsons Field and submitted the resulting document to the selectmen for their consideration.

**FEBRUARY 12, 2000 AND MARCH 14, 2000**

DELIBERATIVE SESSION

At 9:00 a.m. on the twelfth day of February 2000, at the Junior High School gymnasium, Moderator Daniel C. Hoefle called to order the Deliberative Session of the Annual Town Meeting. He introduced Jenna Provencher, from Girl Scout Troop 2253, who led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Hoefle began the meeting by reading the names of our friends and neighbors who died in 1999. A moment of silence was observed.

Mr. Hoefle introduced Selectmen Joseph Mills, Kenneth Fox, and Mel Low, Administrative Assistant Matthew Upton, Town Counsel Michael Donovan, and Town Clerk Jane Ireland. He announced the candidates for office for the March 14<sup>th</sup> town and school elections.

Moderator Hoefle then stated his rules for the meeting: Everyone is invited to speak. Anyone wishing to speak should come to the microphone and identify himself. All comments should be directed to the moderator. He reminded everyone we are here in the spirit of debate and asked that any acrimony be omitted. All amendments need to be in writing. All voters need to be checked in at the checklist and receive a card. We will be voting by a show of hands unless a secret vote is requested. Five voters may request a secret ballot by written request; seven voters present may seek a recount of a voice vote or hand vote after a vote is taken. We will follow the articles in the order they appear on the Warrant, starting with Article 5. Any ruling I make, as moderator, can be challenged by this deliberative session, and any motion anyone wishes to make will be entertained.

He felt it best to wait until next year to start this project because of the Statewide Property Tax and the increased pressures put on this town. We presently have \$86,000 in a reserve account, so by adding this \$50,000 we will have a fund of \$136,000. The estimated total cost is \$400,000. If we bring this up next year, we can handle this financially very well. Mr. Low added that Bruce Walker is in support of this. As you know, Bruce is sick and needs our support and prayers.

After determining there would be no further discussion, the moderator **ordered Article 9 to be placed on the ballot as it appears.**

The moderator read Article 10.

**ARTICLE 10.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ninety-five thousand (\$95,000) to purchase a thirty (30) yard packer (**GARBAGE TRUCK**) to replace the 1986 model currently in service. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

One thousand two hundred forty three (\$1,243.00) of this amount will be used to make physical improvements to the Town's facilities to accommodate the compactor and the fifty (50) yard waste containers. This agreement will contain a fiscal funding clause which will relieve the Town of any obligation beyond the first year of the agreement should the Town fail to appropriate the necessary funds in the successive years.

Mr. Fox's motion to amend Article 10 was seconded by Mr. Mills.

After comments from Mr. Fox and Attorney Donovan, Mr. Fox introduced the new DPW Supervisor, Bud Jordan. Mr. Jordan pointed out the reason for this article was as much for safety as it was cost savings.

Mr. Ladrie spoke in support of the article. Mr. Katner raised a point of order and determined this amendment replaces Article 10 as written. Budget Committee Chairman John Moynahan stated the Budget Committee recommends the concept.

Upon determining there was no more discussion, the moderator called for a **vote** on the amendment. **Show of hands. Amendment is declared adopted.**

The moderator **ordered Article 10, as amended, be placed on the ballot.**

The moderator read Article 11.

**ARTICLE 11.** To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to be added to the non-lapsing appropriation pursuant to RSA 31:19, established by Article 14 of the 1990 Rye Town Meeting for the purpose of funding the Employee

Mr. Low said today we have \$40,000 in this account. With the \$50,000, we would end up with \$90,000. We have three people in the Fire Department who have been there twenty years, and if they left their share of the Employee Leave account would be about \$74,000. So we need to fund this account. In response to a question from Mr. Ladrie, Mr. Low explained that last year Janet Thompson and Bud Moynahan retired. They both received lump sum payments.

The moderator determined there was no more discussion and **ordered Article 11 to be placed on the ballot as written.**

The moderator read Article 12.

**ARTICLE 12.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be used to support the litigation challenging the validity of House Bill 999 (**State Wide Property Tax**), with such amount to be funded from the 1999 undesignated fund balance (surplus). It is the intent of this Article to recapture a portion of the unexpended administrative funds that were provided to the Town by the State pursuant to House Bill 999. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

The article was **moved** by Selectman Fox, seconded by Joe Mills.

Mr. Fox **moved to amend** Article 12 by changing the sum of money from \$15,000 to **the sum of twenty two thousand five hundred dollars (\$22,500)**. His motion was seconded by Selectman Mills.

Selectman Fox explained this warrant article is intended to use the funds being given to us by the State of New Hampshire as a grant for administrative expenses as part of the State Wide

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Property Tax legislation and use it to fight the State. Originally we thought that \$15,000 would be sufficient but we are now looking at additional legal avenues to bring an end to this oppressive tax. As a matter of reference, we received approximately \$22,500 as the full amount of the grant.

Norman Katner ascertained it was legal to appropriate monies from the 1999 budget to expend in the year 2000. Attorney Donovan explained these are surplus funds and occasionally it is done this way.

Rep. Jane Langley and Selectmen Mills spoke in support of the amendment.

There being no further discussion, the moderator called for a **vote** on the amendment. **Show of Hands. Amendment is declared adopted.**

The moderator **ordered Article 12 to be placed on the ballot as amended.**

The moderator read Article 13.

**ARTICLE 13.** To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to be placed in the capital reserve account established in Article 18 of the 1990 Rye Town Meeting for the purpose of conducting a revaluation of property in the Town of Rye. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

Mr. Low said this is something we have to do. Our present percent of valuation is 72% and is going down again next year. We're putting away money for the future so it won't affect our tax rate so much in the following year.

Lester Stevens reminded the assembly the state mandates a revaluation every ten years, and the last time Rye was done was 1986.

Paula Snyder said if we have a revaluation, that's going to increase the value of properties in town. Will that not also in



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turn increase the amount of money the town has to send to the state for this Education Tax?

Selectman Low said Paula is correct, but every other town is faced with the same situation and that is part of our defense that this valuation is not a fair thing.

There was no further discussion on Article 13. The moderator **ordered Article 13 to be placed on the ballot as written.**

The moderator read Article 14.

**ARTICLE 14.** By petition of Norman C. Katner and at least 24 other voters of the Town of Rye, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the modification of the Town's Elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Rye, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, effective January 1, 2000, as follows: For a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, **\$100,000**; For a person 75 years up to 80 years, **EXEMPT**; For a person 80 years of age or older, **EXEMPT**. To qualify a person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five years, own real estate individually or jointly. If the real estate is owned by a spouse, then the person seeking the exemption must have been married for at least five years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$40,000, or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$59,900 and own assets not in excess of \$199,000, excluding the value of the person's residence.

The article was **moved** by Mr. Low and seconded by Mr. Fox.

William Ladrie asked if this included property owned in other states?

Atty. Donovan clarified that property outside of Rye would count against the asset test.

Norman Katner explained this article to the audience. Mr. Katner **proposed an amendment** to the article, changing \$100,000 in line 6 to **\$40,000**; the word "exempt" in line 7 to **\$50,000**; and the word "exempt" in line 8 to **\$60,000**. It would read as follows: For a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$40,000; For a person 75 years up to 80 years, \$50,000; For a person 80 years of age or older, \$60,000.

His **motion was seconded** by Joe Kenney.

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Following discussion on the amendment, the moderator called for a **vote. Show of Hands. Moderator Hoefle declared the amendment Adopted.**

The moderator determined there would be no further amendments or discussion and **ordered Article 14 be placed on the ballot as amended.**

The moderator read Article 15.

**ARTICLE 15.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to be added to the non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI established by Article 8 at the 1997 Rye Town Meeting for the purpose of engineering, designing, and installing an overall drainage plan for the Town of Rye updating the current drainage system. This is a non-lapsing appropriation that will not lapse until the project is complete or in five (5) years (December 31, 2003), whichever occurs first. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

Article 15 was **moved** by Ken Fox, seconded by Joe Mills.

Following an explanation from DPW Director Bud Jordan, Moderator Hoefle determined there would be no further discussion. He **ordered Article 15 placed on the ballot as written.**

The moderator read Article 16.

**ARTICLE 16.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$4,439,394. Should this article be defeated, the default operating budget shall be \$4,326,180, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Article 16 was **moved** by Joe Mills, and seconded by Ken Fox.

Chairman of the Budget Committee, John Moynahan, clarified that this was the operating budget and does not include the Warrant Articles.

Budget Committee member Paula Snyder **moved** to reduce the operating budget by \$11,400. John Moynahan seconded her motion.

Mrs. Snyder explained this was money allocated for an additional part time person in the Selectmen's office. She said she did not understand the need for another part time person in the Town Hall.

In response to Mrs. Snyder's remarks, Administrative Assistant Matthew Upton said he has had a chance to evaluate the operation of the town hall and the duties of each person. He felt this was vital to the staffing of town hall.

Mr. Katner said he didn't know how many bodies were in the Selectmen's office. He mentioned several had been out sick. Mr. Upton responded that Jeanne is out on sick leave as a result of a fall. Our bookkeeper was out and is now back full time. Ideally a fully staffed office should have a bookkeeper, secretary/receptionist, and a part time individual that could be used for assessing work as well as assisting the Selectmen's secretary. Mr. Upton emphasized that we are looking to go into a revaluation shortly. That would create an inordinate burden on the Selectmen's office. In answer to Mr. Katner, Mr. Upton clarified there would be two full time and one part time position in addition to himself.

Mr. Fox stated Mr. Upton is in the best position to evaluate the needs of that office and should be supported.

Mr. Guy Chichester said it has always been a great revelation for him to watch the operations at the Town Hall and has always been somewhat amazed by the great amount of work that gets done by a very few people. This is a big operation for the town and we all want it to run well. If they need a part time person, he said, I believe they should have it.

Moderator Hoefle ascertained there was no more discussion and called for a **vote** on Mrs. Snyder's amendment. He restated the

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amendment, saying it would reduce the budget by \$11,400 to a total of \$4,427,994. **Show of Hands. Amendment is declared defeated.**

There being no further discussion on Article 16, the moderator **ordered Article placed on the ballot as written.**

The moderator read Article 17.

**ARTICLE 17.** By petition of Joseph G. Mills, Jr., and at least 24 other voters of the Town of Rye, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred and sixty six dollars (\$7,566.00) to be paid to Janet Thompson, representing the remainder of her salary account from the 1999 budget, and further authorize that such sum be taken from the undesignated 1999 fund balance (surplus), in recognition of 14 years of excellent service above and beyond the job description for her position. It is widely recognized that Janet Thompson saved this town thousands of dollars over her tenure here. This payment is only a small fraction of the amount she saved the taxpayers.

The article was **moved** by Joe Mills, and seconded by Mel Low.

Mr. Mills said this is small sum to pay this person. He said she easily put in 60 hours a week, and never took comp time. She turned back 169 days sick leave to the town. She was a very dedicated person and will be sadly missed by the town.

Lester Stevens said he thought Janet Thompson was the best thing that ever happened to this town.

William Ladrie agreed with the article 100%.

The moderator determined there was no further discussion and **ordered Article 17 placed on the ballot as written.**

The moderator read Article 18.

**ARTICLE 18.** To see if the Town will vote to accept the recommendations of the Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee appointed by the Selectmen to protect the Town Forest in perpetuity. These recommendations seek to balance the protection of the Town Forest with the reasonable organized recreation needs of Town residents, as follows:

1. To authorize and direct the Selectmen to grant and convey to the Rockingham County Conservation District a Conservation Easement on approximately 176 acres of Town Forest, including all woods, fields, swamps and marshland located within the lot boundaries of the Assessor's Lots described below. The Conservation Easement shall be in the form recommended by the Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee and approved by Town Counsel. OWNERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT OF THE TOWN FOREST SHALL REMAIN WITH THE TOWN OF RYE.

2. To designate as a Town Recreation Area the approximately 14 acres, including the current soccer fields, little league fields, parking area, the area around and behind the Recreation Building, and an area of approximately 5 acres of woodland north and west of the soccer fields and parking lot, shown on Plan entitled "Sketch Plan, Recreation Road, Rye, NH", dated 1/ /00, prepared by James Verra and Associates, Inc. The 14 acres shall be expressly excluded from the Conservation Easement. The Town Recreation Area shall be used for future recreational needs, both active and passive, of the Town of Rye and shall be managed by the Rye Recreation Commission. The Rye Recreation Commission shall consult with the Rye Town Forest Citizens Advisory Committee and the Rye Conservation Commission regarding any development plans for the Town Recreation Area so as to minimize to the extent possible the environmental damage arising from such development. Any future development of the Town Recreation Area, including any cutting of trees in the approximately 5-acre portion of the Town Recreation Area located north and west of the current soccer fields and the parking lot except for the cutting of individual trees that are diseased or are a hazard to public safety, must first be approved by the Board of Selectmen and the residents of Rye through a vote at Town Meeting.

**THIS ARTICLE IS RECOMMENDED BY THE SELECTMEN**

The article was **moved** by Mel Low, seconded by Ken Fox.

Selectman Low said this is an example of a tremendous achievement for this town. Two groups, in direct opposition to each other, one wanting to preserve everything and one wanting to develop for recreation, met for one year. They have come up with an agreement and this agreement shows the spirit of this town. Mr. Low said we are in good shape. This is a great town. Support this article.

Ray Jarvis said this agreement will enable the Town of Rye to preserve 136 acres of forest and about 40 acres of marshland.

Bill Ladrie ascertained nothing would be able to be done to this land without a vote of the town.

Following discussion with regard to the Conservation Easement, and the cutting of trees, Recreation Commission member Chick Hayden **proposed an amendment:** To add the following at the end of Article 18:

This article is subject to the January 2000 agreement signed by the Town Forest Committee and the Recreation Commission, stating that the restriction on cutting individual trees does not apply to underbrush or minor growth in order to clear for a picnic area, for example. Further, this article would not restrict the minimal tree cutting necessary to relocate the softball field in order to add a soccer field without expanding the footprint of the soccer area.

Joe Mills seconded the motion to amend.

Joan Dawley felt they should study this for another year because we don't have a management plan to know what we're giving away.

Ray Jarvis responded to Mrs. Dawley's concerns by saying when you are preserving a natural habitat such as the town forest, you allow all kinds of passive activities. He said the Conservation Easement would be subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen and Town Counsel.

Betty Tobey said she thought it would be foolish to do this at this time and questioned the advisability of a conservation easement and the giving away of our rights.

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Mrs. Snyder stated the proposed easement protects the land. Ownership and management of the town forest shall remain with the Town of Rye.

In answer to a query, Mr. Jarvis clarified that the easement has not been written, although it has been drafted. He explained the procedure by which the easement is created.

Robert Herold asked if there was a means for the town to change the easement in the future.

Mr. Jarvis introduced Daane Crook who explained the benefits of a conservation easement and described it as a widely recognized tool for preserving land and preventing future development. Regarding the issue of amending, there is a provision for how to amend the easement if necessary.

Moderator Hoefle restated the amendment and called for a **vote. Show of Hands. Amendment is declared adopted.**

Robert Vincent asked if in an emergency situation the forest would be opened up to apparatus such as a fire truck. Atty. Donovan replied that under state statute the Fire Chief or Fire Warden has the authority to do that sort of thing.

The moderator **ordered Article 18, as amended, be placed on the ballot.**

The moderator read Article 19.

**ARTICLE 19.** By petition of Joseph G. Mills, Jr. and at least 24 other voters of the Town of Rye, are you in favor of authorizing the Town of Rye Selectmen to withhold the State Education Funding portion of the 1999 Town of Rye real estate tax bill to be held in an escrow account until such time that the court rules on the fairness of the recent bill (**State Wide Property Tax**) enacted by the House and Senate and signed into law by the Governor?

The article was **moved** by Joe Mills, and seconded by Ken Fox.

Mr. Mills said this is going to be voted on March 14<sup>th</sup>. If the vote is in the affirmative, we will go to court on the 15<sup>th</sup> and ask the court to put it in escrow and hold it until the decision is made. If you vote against this, then we will send the check to Concord on the 15<sup>th</sup>.

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Don Stevens asked Mr. Mills how the town would return the funds to the property owners of Rye if the courts reverse the decision. Mr. Mills responded that had not been worked out as yet.

Town Counsel Michael Donovan commented that it would be up to court in the end to decide how to structure the remedy, after hearing arguments from both sides. We will be pushing for reimbursement, but it may not come out that way.

Mr. Stevens noted the Attorney General has said he has the lawful right to seize those funds from the court. He asked if we might be wise to put those funds out of state. Mr. Mills responded it would have to be the U.S. Attorney, not the N.H. Attorney General.

William Ladrie asked what would happen to the interest earned in the escrow account, to which Mr. Donovan answered that the intent of this article is to give the Selectmen permission to escrow in court. If that is done, on March 15<sup>th</sup> the Selectmen would go down to the court and pay it into the court. It would then be up to the court, after hearing legal arguments by the state, to either hang onto that money through the pendency of the litigation or it could conceivably release it to the state. By putting it into the court, the state is not going to be able to come down here and take any action against the town, or to try to seize it. The interest stays with the court.

Norman Katner **motioned to move the question**, and subsequently withdrew his motion.

Paula Snyder **moved to amend** Article 19 by replacing the words in lines 3 and 4 "State Education Funding portion of the 1999 Town of Rye real estate tax bill" with the following phrase: **State's excess portion of the State Education Property Tax assessed for 1999 against the Town of Rye.**

Mrs. Snyder stated that the portion due the state should be mentioned in this article so there would be no misunderstanding.

Mr. Katner seconded her motion to amend.

Attorney Donovan read the Article 19 as it would read if amended:

By petition of Joseph G. Mills, Jr. and at least 24 other voters of the Town of Rye, are you in favor of authorizing the Town of Rye Selectmen to withhold the State's excess portion of the State Education Property Tax assessed for 1999 against the Town of Rye to be held in an escrow account until such time that the court



rules on the fairness of the recent bill (**State Wide Property Tax**) enacted by the House and Senate and signed into law by the Governor?

The moderator ascertained this was the correct wording, and he called for a **vote on the amendment. Show of Hands. Amendment is declared adopted.**

The moderator **ordered Article 18, as amended, be placed on the ballot.**

The moderator read Article 20.

**ARTICLE 20.** To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 273-A: 12, III, to accept the fact finder's recommendations on the cost items only for a collective bargaining agreement with the Rye Fire Association, Teamster's Local 633, which calls for the following increases in salaries and related benefits (i.e. FICA, etc.):

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of eleven thousand four hundred and sixty nine dollars (\$11,469) in fiscal year 2000. Such sum representing the additional cost attributable to the increase in salaries and related benefits for the years as indicated over those paid in prior fiscal years, plus payment of the retroactive increases for 1999. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

**Note:** The Board of Selectmen has rejected the fact finder's recommendations and the Rye Fire Association, Teamster's Local 633 has accepted the Fact Finder's recommendations. **A "yes" vote is to accept the fact Finder's recommendations and a "no" vote is to reject the fact finder's recommendations.**

Selectman Low **moved** Article 20. Mr. Fox seconded his motion.

Mr. Low said we have a tentative agreement with the firefighters, and **moved to amend Article 20, as follows:**

To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items included in a collective bargaining agreement reached between the Town of Rye Board of Selectmen and the Rye permanent Fire fighter's Association, Teamster's Local 633, which calls for the following increases in salaries and related benefits (i.e. FICA, etc.):

Such sum representing the additional cost attributable to the increase in salaries and related benefits for the years as indicated over those paid in prior fiscal years, plus payment of the retroactive increases for 1999. This appropriation is in addition to the operating budget.

Fire Lt. Leon Blaisdell spoke in support of the amendment, and seconded Mr. Low's motion.

There being no further discussion, Moderator Hoefle called for a **vote on the amendment. Show of Hands. Amendment is declared adopted.**

The moderator **ordered Article 20, as amended, placed on the ballot.**

Paula Snyder clarified that the note at the end of the original Article 20 has been deleted.

The moderator read Article 21.

**ARTICLE 21.** Shall the Town, if Article 20 is defeated, authorize the governing body to call one special town meeting, at its option, to address the any cost items that may be agreed to through continued collective bargaining between the Town of Rye and the Rye Fire Association, Teamster's Local 633.

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The article was **moved** by Selectman Fox, seconded by Mel Low.

In response to a question from Lester Stevens, Atty. Donovan said under Senate Bill 2, if Article 21 were defeated you would not be able to have a Town Meeting approve a collective bargaining agreement until next year.

There being no further discussion, the moderator **ordered Article 21 be placed on the ballot as written.**

The moderator read Article 22.

At this point in the proceedings, Selectman Mills left the stage.

**ARTICLE 22.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt the recommendations of the New Hampshire Municipal Association to change the title of **Administrative Assistant** to **Town Administrator** to reflect the high degree of knowledge and professionalism required to effectively discharge the duties of the position. The passage of this Article will not result in any change in the duties, authority or responsibility exercised by the position.

**THIS ARTICLE IS RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

Article 22 was **moved** by Selectman Fox, seconded by Mr. Low.

William Ladrie said he was confused by this article. He asked, if this article doesn't mean anything, why is it on here?

Mr. Fox responded, saying the town advertised the position as Town Administrator on the advice of the NH Municipal Association and Janet Thompson. We received over thirty applications for this position. We believe the terminology of the ad had a lot to do with that. The term "administrative assistant" seems to indicate more of a secretarial position. Mr. Low added that every person they interviewed that had a similar job in another town in New Hampshire was called a Town Administrator. Mr. Low said Janet Thompson was hired as a secretary and then she went to school to get the education to carry out the job of town administrator. We never changed her title. We should have. He clarified this is not a Town Manager, it is a Town Administrator.

Randy Crapo said he believed the position should change so that the Administrator can discipline someone in his own department.

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Mr. Low said the job description is attached to the contract Mr. Upton signed and is well laid out. Basically it hasn't changed. In response to further questions from Mr. Crapo, Mr. Low clarified that Mr. Upton advises the Board of Selectmen, but the decisions are still theirs to make.

Mr. Katner asked when the selectmen voted to put this article on the warrant. Mr. Low responded he did not know the exact day and time, but that all three of the Selectmen were for this article. Mr. Katner continued, questioning the legality of this article if the vote had not been taken in an public, properly noticed meeting of the Selectmen. Selectman Low offered to have the Selectman vote here and now so that Mr. Katner would know they are all for it.

It was **moved** and seconded to **move the question**.

Mr. Katner ascertained that passing this article does not change the job description of this position.

Jane Holway said she was at the meeting when the Selectmen discussed referring to Matthew's position as Town Administrator. She said she reminded them at that time the position had been established at a Town Meeting and it would take a vote of the people to change it. Simple, she said. Not complicated. It was agreed, she said. I was there.

Don Stevens wanted to be assured that the Selectmen of this town are in fact responsible for the actions of this town, i.e. hiring, firing, etc.

Selectman Low said "Don, you don't have to ask. You know we are responsible. He's going to recommend to us and we are the final vote."

The moderator determined there would be no further discussion and **ordered Article 22 to be placed on the ballot as written**.

The moderator read Article 23.

**ARTICLE 23.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder at public auction, or sealed bid, such surplus Town equipment as is not traded in on new equipment in 1999.

The article was **moved** by Mel Low, and seconded by Mr. Fox.

There being no discussion, the moderator **ordered Article 23 be**

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placed on the ballot as written.



Visit of the New Hampshire Dignitaries.  
to the Isles of Shoals. Sept 24 1864.

Gov Harriman, Senator Craigie and Mr Cla,  
Representative from this Congressional District,  
with other distinguished guests and some fifty cit-  
izens of Portsmouth visited this Island.

The steamer Enterprise took them speedily and  
safely to this rock-bound Island. The heavens smiled  
propitiously and the spirits of the party were in  
unison with the sweet influences around them.

Landing on the Island the company proceeded  
to the school house, the teacher was there but  
her twenty eight pupils had not yet arrived.

After exploring the Island, visiting the fatal chasm  
in the cliff, from which persons seated apparent-  
ly safely have been swept into the ocean - the case  
in which Mrs Moody in sixteen hundred and  
ninety six concealed herself and two grand-  
children from an invasion of the Indians, who  
came while the men were fishing, she escaped  
and was found safe when the fishermen returned  
but on the spot she put to death the two chil-  
dren whose cries she could not quiet fearing that  
the Indians might be guided by the sound.

The Monument to the memory of Capt John  
Smith, the discoverer of these Islands, of which  
this (Star Island), is one and which was erected by  
Gov Daniel Austin of Portsmouth was next visited.

Then leaving the traditions and memorials of  
past ages, the whole party proceeded to the School  
house now filled with young pupils.

Gov Harriman was introduced to the teacher  
and pupils, by Dr Beebe who resides upon the  
Island and then addressed the company present  
in an elegant and impressive manner.

Gov A. H. Craigie was next introduced by the  
Governor. He said that this was his first visit  
to this part of New Hampshire and here he found  
one of the characteristics of New Hampshire as  
pleasing as unexpected in this small and barren  
island viz, the church and school-house side by side.

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Wm J. B. Cole then address the school; He said, "Let New Hampshire do all that she can to promote education in accordance with the instructions of our fathers."

The meeting was then addressed by several others, among whom were the State Treasurer and the Secretary of the State to the great satisfaction of all present. After which some conversations with the teacher showed the necessity of having maps &c which were beyond her reach means to obtain, on the suggestion of Mayor Dearborn the sum requisite was at once subscribed. Then the party seated on the rocks near the church partook of an excellent chowder after which they delivered some very fine speeches. Mr. Bufford then stated that the church on this Island was in need of repairs, that a sum had been given by former visitants and that a balance was wanted to fill the estimated cost. The sum wanted was cheerfully contributed by the party who then embarked and pursued up the River to their homes.

### Game and Resolute Battle

Between

Mathew H. Alias, "Bockey" Moose of New York  
and

George Poole of Providence Rhode Island

Fought Oct 24 1867 for \$2,000.

At Smuttys Nose Island: The fight resulted in the victory of "Bockey" Moose after a violent struggle occupying sixty five minutes, during which time 25 rounds were contested.

This two page document, selected in part as background for our Town Museum cover design, is the script of Town Clerk Origen S. Caswell, Town of Gosport, Isles of Shoals, 1867. It was taken from the records of Gosport. Discovered in disrepair within the State Archives in Concord, N.H. in 1995, the Gosport documents were restored and bound in two volumes. It should be noted that by act of the legislature, approved July 20, 1876, the Town of Gosport, consisting of all the Shoals group within the boundaries of the State of New Hampshire, was annexed to Rye.
