SELECTMEN'S SUMMARY & RECOMMENDATIONS

ROADS

Last year the State and Town Highway Departments spent the TRA funds on Burleigh Hill Road, and we hope that we will be able to have the remainder of the road to connect with Rt. 127 gravelled so that it will be available for a bus route in the fall of 1963. Due to rock obstruction, progress has been slow and costly.

The Duncan Fund was distributed on Knox Mt. Road, Johnson Barn Road, Plummer Road, and Perkins Road. This year a portion of the Duncan Fund will be used to black-top part of Perkins Road, the balance to be applied to construction of a road to connect Upper and Lower Bay Roads in the Huse Hill area. Smith Road has been gravelled and will be black-topped this year.

TOWN-OWNED PROPERTY

The Hermit Lake property has all been sold except for one back lot. This year we expect to close out the Hermit Lake account by transfer of all funds to the Equipment Reserve Fund.

TOWN HALL

The steeple on the town hall was painted this past year, and some minor repairs will be made this coming year.

DUMP

The Town Dump was open for two days per week this past year from May to November, and we hope to have it open three days per week during the summer season of 1963. Mr. Curran, who has been very faithful in his duties as custodian for the past six years, passed away in January 1963. The towns-people extend their condolences to his family.

The Selectmen wish to thank all other Town Officers, the various Town Committees, and all the people of Sanbornton for their whole-hearted cooperation and assistance during the past year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept, raise, and appropriate the sum of one thousand one hundred thirty three dollars and eighty six cents (\$1,133.86) for Town Road Aid (T.R.A.), the State's share seven thousand five hundred fifty nine dollars and nine cents (\$7,559.09).

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) for the Sanbornton Fire Department.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be put in a Capital Reserve Fund for the construction of a new fire station.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the Winnisquam Fire Department for the purpose of maintenance and equipment.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty five dollars (\$35.00) for Memorial Day.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for Old Home Day.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred eighty dollars (\$880.00) and make the same available for the use of the Library Trustees.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for Band Concerts.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) for oiling.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) for culverts.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred eighty seven dollars (\$387.00) for Laconia Hospital.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for Franklin Hospital.

17. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new truck and equipment at an estimated cost of forty six hundred dollars (\$4600.00), to be open for bids subject

to acceptance or rejection by the Selectmen, and to withdraw from the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund the sum of forty six hundred dollars (\$4600.00) to pay for said truck.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy five dollars (\$75.00) for necessary expenses of the Planning Board and the Board of Adjustment.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred twenty seven dollars and forty five cents (\$227.45) which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, for the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Civilian Defense.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) for the White Pine Blister Control.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$20,000.00 for erecting a heated building for housing and maintaining the highway equipment of the Town. The selectmen to be authorized to select the site and determine the type of

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Sanbornton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library, Fire Department and Hermit Lake Project Account.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1961-December 31, 1962:
 (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance sheets as of December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus increased by \$8,292.01 in 1962.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

**Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—
Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A4)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,912.78, less a revenue deficit of \$1,636.36, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,276.42.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1962, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

Statement of Hermit Lake Project Account: (Exhibit I)

A statement showing the activity in the Hermit Lake Project Account for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, is presented in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$2,276.74, from \$18,175.89 to \$20,452.63, in 1962, as shown herewith:

PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control—pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives..

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to instill in the child's mind a respect for fire.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

For the Year 1962

The investigation and final approval of the Winnisquam Development and also the study of a Development near the dam on Hermit Lake, both owned by Maurice Heuber, required much of the time of the Board.

After the Town took favorable action on its participation in the Federal Urban Planning Assistance Program, the Board interviewed five candidates for the position of consultant for this program and finally unanimously chose James R. Woglom, who represents Metcalf & Eddy, Engineers of Boston.

Metcalf & Eddy was established in 1907. Since that time the firm has provided engineering and related architectural services to clients both in the United States and abroad. While the first forty years of its existence was devoted primarily to sanitary engineering, in the last two decades the firm has added to its offerings so that at the present time it offers services in the fields of planning, engineering and related architecture. Over the years, the firm has had the pleasure of working for over 25 cities and towns in this state.

We have had many meetings with Mr. Woglom. One of the projects of the program which the Board sponsored was a complete census of the residents of the Town which has brought us much pertinent information.

A great deal of study by the Board on the recommendation of Mr. Woglom will be required during the year 1963.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

*To the Board of Education and Citizens of the
Sanbornton School District*

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

PERSONNEL

Mrs. Margarite Finley left the Sanbornton School System at the close of the 1961-62 school year to accept a position in Meredith. Mrs. Alisoun Wright discontinued full time teaching but has continued on a part-time basis teaching the classes in Conversational French in grades six through eight.

Mrs. Pauline Morton, a graduate of Gorham Maine Teachers College, replaced Mrs. Finley. Mrs. Morton has previously taught in Bartlett and West Lebanon.

Mrs. Elaine Leh is a new teacher added to the staff due to separating a double sixth and seventh grade. Mrs. Leh is a Plymouth Teachers College graduate with considerable substitute teaching experience in the Laconia School System.

Mr. Gerald Culhane replaced Mrs. Wright. Mr. Culhane is a graduate of Boston University, and this is his first teaching experience.

CURRICULUM

We are continuing to place a major emphasis on our reading program. We feel that this subject is the key to success in all school work for our pupils. The results, as indicated from our testing program, show that our pupils are gaining in their ability to read well.

Conversational French is continuing on a daily basis in grades four through eight. Also, the use of Educational Television from the University of New Hampshire is helping very much in supplementing the work we are covering.

Since success in high school is demanding more competence from its pupils, it is imperative that our elementary school offer a strong, basic educational program. In keeping with this need, we are endeavoring to strengthen all the subject areas offered at our school. This means that more is being required from our pupils. Our problem in all this is to obtain the maximum from our pupils without our demanding more or accepting less quality than a pupil is capable of giving.

BUILDING

Inadequate space, which had been a problem for the past two years, has been entirely eliminated with the new addition. Our physical facilities in terms of School Building are excellent.

There will undoubtedly come a time in the future when additional facilities will be needed. Due to the limitations of the present site in terms of space and drainage, it would seem desirable at that time to consider additional facilities at the center of population in another section of town.

BUDGET

The budget this year is up \$13,647.36 over last year. Of this amount, \$5,362 is for increased cost in tuitions. \$5,600 is for teachers' salaries, \$1,500 is for principal on indebtedness, and the balance is spread in small amounts over several items in the budget.

After deliberate consideration at a school board meeting, the following salary policy for teachers working in Sanbornton was voted:

Teachers without previous teaching experience will receive a starting salary of \$4,000. With each additional year of experience for teachers whose work measures up to his professional responsibility, an increment of \$150 will be granted until a teacher has reached a maximum salary of \$5,500.

This salary policy will become effective with the 1963-1964 school year and requires an appropriation of \$2,450 to place all teachers on schedule. Following the first year, a nominal increase to keep teachers on schedule would require \$825.

It is hoped that a clearly defined salary policy will enable the school district to obtain and keep well-qualified teachers for the Sanbornton School System.

The School Board and Superintendent of Schools feel that this budget is needed for the proper operation of the Sanbornton Central School for 1963-1964.

I would like to express my appreciation for the support given our school system this past year by the School Board and Citizens of Sanbornton.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

I herewith submit my second annual report as Principal of the Sanbornton Central Schools

It was not long after I submitted my first report that activity began in the rear of the school to signal the start of the new addition. Its completion gives us a room for each class, an ideal teaching situation, and one of the finest school plants in the state.

The coming of spring activated the ball teams and the competition provided by other teams was not only stimulating and fun but provided an opportunity for the development of sportsmanship.

The school year did not really end with graduation as several teachers added to their storehouse of knowledge by attending summer school and traveling. Late in the summer several blue ribbons were received for school exhibits at the Plymouth Fair.

The new school year found several teachers adjusting to their new jobs. The uncertainties involved point out the desirability of a stable teaching force backed by the advantage of experience. We were sorry to lose Mrs. Morton because of illness, and it was fortunate that Mrs. Thompson was able to take over and continue her work with the third grade. Most of the teachers are, again this year, attending evening extension courses that they may do their best in teaching your children.

The P.T.A. continues to provide the best liason between parents and teachers in town and is worthy of your partici-

pation. The group sponsored square dancing, ballroom dancing lessons, provided the school with a second TV set, and is assisting in providing books for room libraries.

Mrs. Hewitt and Mrs. Wilson are able to serve their excellent lunches in one sitting this year, now that no class has to share the auditorium.

The success of any school program depends on the cooperation of all concerned and in this respect I would like to thank the Sanbornton School Board, Mr. Donegan, Mr. Kilmister, and all the school staff for their assistance with our program.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

School health programs were originally instigated for the control of communicable diseases. As the years went by, it was found that more effort should be placed upon the correction of defects. Today we are concerned not only with these two areas of physical health, but also with the development of the whole child. The school health program also aims to help the pupils improve and maintain their own health and to assume their share of responsibility for the health of others.

A Diabetes Detection clinic was held for all pupils in Grades 1, 4, and 7. Seventy-one students took part in the test and all proved negative.

A Polio Clinic was held in May for all students in need of their first, second and third and fourth shots. Fifty pupils were inoculated.

A dental Clinic sponsored by the Sanbornton Parent-Teachers Association was held during the months of April and May. Seventy-seven school children and one pre-school child received an examination and a cleaning by Mrs. Phyllis Morin, Dental Hygienist. Five children received complete dental care. Funds were obtained from the dental program.

A pre-registration clinic was held on May 16. Nineteen students registered and papers were sent home to two parents who were unable to attend the clinic. The children were weighed, measured, a vision and hearing test was given, as well as a medical inspection by the nurse.

It has long been recognized that the state of the health of the body as a whole, has a definite effect on the health of the eyes. By the same token, the state of visual health in an individual often is reflected in his general physical con-

dition. This year, the Massachusetts Vision Test was administered to 250 students. Nineteen children had their glasses checked with no changes made.

A child learns to talk by imitating the sounds he hears. If his hearing is defective, his speech may not only be delayed, but also impaired. Indeed, a good sense of hearing is vital to the development of good communication, and the child's hearing should be tested early in life. To this effect, 225 students were tested with the Puretone Audiometer instrument. As a result of these tests, five children were found to have a hearing loss of 10 per cent or more in either or both ears.

The most common defects discovered by the Nurse in the medical inspection of 200 children were: decayed teeth, enlarged tonsils, wax in ears, enlarged glands and poor posture.

Six children who received a positive reaction to previous Tuberculin Test were X-rayed at the chest clinics. Eight children had their tonsils removed during the year.

In addition to the above mentioned health services, conferences were held throughout the year with teachers, pupils and parents.

I wish to take this occasion to express my sincere gratitude to all for their wholehearted cooperation and financial assistance during the past year.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Sanbornton School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, which was made by this Division. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1961 and June 30, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$23,958.42 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962.

Analysis of Change in Financial Conditions (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

*Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures
—Estimated and Actual Revenues:* (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended

June 30, 1962, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary, (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,075.79, plus a revenue surplus of \$294.42, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,370.21.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:
(Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Statements of Building Fund Accounts: (Exhibits G-1 & G-2)

Statements showing the activity in the two Building Fund Accounts during the fiscal year are presented in Exhibits G-1 and G-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1962, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

Sstatement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Sanbornton is included in Exhibit J. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1962, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1961-62 School Tax in the amount of \$84,189.67.
