Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, on the ninth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for a term of three years, one or more Road Agents for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, and two Auditors for the year ensuing.
2. Is it expedient to change the Constitution?
3. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the School and Parsonage fund interest for the year ensuing.
4. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses for the year ensuing.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 and appropriate the same for use of the Laconia Hospital Association.
6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the care of cemeteries.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151.48 to procure State aid in Class 5 Highway construction. The State to contribute \$605.93.

8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to lay out and construct a highway from a point on West Main street, between the Brewster and O. J. Smith property, so called, in a North Westerly direction to a suitable point on High street.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$229.00 to the Lake Region Association of New Hampshire, for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in co-operation with other towns in the lake region.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control, to be spent in co-operation with the State Forest Department. State to possibly contribute \$100.00.

11. To see if the Town will allow a discount on early paid taxes.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the year ensuing.

13. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the reports of it's officers and agents for the past year.

14. To choose any other officers and agents for the year ensuing.

15. To see if the Town will vote to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Class honors for high scholastic attainment for the four year course were awarded to graduates of our Junior High School. Garland M. Berry was given the first honor and Ruth Moses was given the second honor.

Report of School Nurse

During the past year two general medical inspections of the school children have been made by Dr. T. H. Huckins, the school physician.

Dr. Nordholm and Dr. Forrest kindly gave their services and examined thoroughly the teeth of the school children, finding 168 out of 449 who needed some kind of dental care.

The children's eyes have been examined and 42 were found to have defects requiring attention.

Notices of all defects have been sent to the parents and home visits have been made whenever it seemed necessary.

Free milk for needy school children has been provided at the expense of the local chapter of the American Red Cross.

There have been two cases of chicken pox, one of whooping cough, three of trench mouth, and two of impetigo in the schools. The fact that these cases have not been more numerous is due to the cooperation of parent and of the teachers. If parents were more careful not to send their children to school when they have symptoms of contagious diseases some of the 111 cases of mumps, 44 of German measles and 43 of pediculosis might have been avoided.

The cooperation of the school department has been greatly appreciated.

Teacher and Enrollment

There have been few changes in our teaching force during the last year. Miss Frances Smith, who had had charge of the work in cooking and sewing, resigned in June. Later in the summer the resignations of Miss Jeannette Paquin, teacher of grade one, and Miss Lillian Connolly, teacher at No. Four, were received. These vacancies were filled by the appointment of Miss Flora Sanborn, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire in the class of 1936, Miss C. Ruth Haire one of our own Tilton girls, and Miss Mary A. Reilly of Littleton, a Plymouth graduate. Miss Haire was graduated from Plymouth Normal School and had had several years' successful experience before beginning work with us. Miss Lillian Milotte, another of our Tilton girls, was chosen as an additional teacher for grade six.

Miss Milotte was graduated from Plymouth and for three years was a teacher in Gilford.

Because of small enrollment the Sanborn Road School was not opened in September. For thirteen years Mrs. Carrie W. Abbott was the faithful and efficient teacher in this school. The children are being transported to the No. Four and Union Schools.

Tilton School—Local Enrollment

There have been enrolled in Tilton School this school year one hundred sixty-two local students. Withdrawals have brought the number down to one hundred fifty-five at this writing, and this is just twenty more than the number enrolled a year ago.

The new developments at Tilton School have much of significance and importance for the community. Tilton and Northfield are vitally interested in the prosperity of this school. With the success of the new plans assured, and we have no reason to anticipate otherwise, the community may find itself confronted with the old question of a local high school, presented, it may be, in a somewhat different form than previously. If or when such question does appear how well will the community be prepared to meet it?

Alterations and Improvements

Electric lights have been installed at the Lochmere School. The chemical toilets at Oak Hill, which had outlived their usefulness and which had never been very satisfactory, have been replaced with a modern Septic System.

The rooms on the second floor of the Eastman building used for the sewing classes have been remodeled into a satisfactory classroom accommodating thirty pupils. This room corresponds with the one on the first floor. These two rooms are now used for the two divisions of the fourth grade. The rooms in the rear of the kitchen have been remodeled for the use of the sewing classes.

One end of the basement of the Union building has been fitted up for a classroom of standard size. This necessitated a new entrance into the girls' toilet room and a new exit from the building through the boys' basement. This

new class room is perhaps the most attractive one we now have.

With the additional classrooms available it is no longer necessary to use the school hall on the third floor as an ordinary class room. The cost of these alterations and improvements was, as might be expected, considerably more than was anticipated in the budget.

There are other repairs that should receive early attention. The Oak Hill building should be reshingled. The Lochmere building should be repainted. The No. Four building needs repainting and also other repairs. The interior wood work of the Union building should be re-varnished and the walls repainted. It is hardly economy to wait longer for W. P. A. assistance although to put this building into proper shape will mean a large outlay. If the Eastman building is to be used indefinitely it certainly should be painted before another school year.

Finances

The school costs this current year will be about \$4,500 more than provided for by the budget. We are faced, then, with a probable deficit at the end of the school year of this amount. The school board is asking for a deficiency appropriation to meet this situation. Why has this situation arisen? The explanation is not difficult. We closed the last financial year with a deficit of \$800 and therefore started this year with that handicap. The three items of transportation, repairs and high school tuition tell the rest of the story. Transportation will cost about \$250 more than the budget estimate, the alteration already referred to \$1,650 more, and high school tuition will overrun the budget estimate \$1,800.

The budget for this current year and the one proposed

by the school board for the next fiscal year are presented that they may be more easily compared item by item.
